

Polish Army Is Being Organized In United States

General Haller Hopes To Repeat History With Expatriates

Bugles are blowing assembly for a legion that never was listed, whose leader, a general without an army, has come to America representing a government without a country. His beard is white now, but his deep-set eyes still flash determination to repeat history he made when he led 25,000 men fighting beside our Rainbow Division, to help break the last German offensive of World War I, and free their own country.

Those 25,000 were Polish volunteers, largely from America, fighting under Gen. Joseph Haller who has come to America to sound the call for action. Once again the home land is invaded; once again American Poles are asked to help. Poland's government-in-exile hopes that Haller's voice will summon aid in money and in men.

A new Polish army is forming in France, an army determined to do better than the army that was misled by the "Government of Colonels" that characteristically shelved Poland's greatest strategist, General Sikorski. He predicted the crushing outcome, and at last commands the effort to retrieve what has been lost.

"OLD ARMY" OFFICERS ARE BARRED

In his new army no Polish officer who was high in the old army will find a place. There will be plenty of room for all the 200,000 expected to volunteer or be conscripted from among refugees, and from the large Polish population in France and elsewhere, especially in America, where there are 4,000,000 of Polish birth or descent, of whom almost all are citizens. Poles formed 12 percent of the American Army in 1917-18 and when well led, made

fine soldiers. In World War II, already they have been trickling across the border—needing no passports—into Canada. There they may enlist in Canadian units or be shipped to France to join the Polish Army.

This violates no neutrality law or proclamation and American Poles say they will violate none. But to arrange this and other matters, including recruiting of Poles in Canada, General Haller will go to the Dominion, after spending some time in Washington and visiting American cities where most of the 4,000,000 Americans of Polish ancestry may be found.

WILL HELP RED CROSS CAMPAIGN

He will also stimulate the campaign to raise money for relief through the American Red Cross, which already has produced a half million dollars. Collections are being taken up in Polish communities every-

where for "our oppressed brethren." This movement was made nation wide only two weeks ago when a Council of Poles in America was formed, with Dean F. X. Ewielik of the Marquette University Law School as head. It includes all American Polish organizations, and everywhere American Poles are responding to the call for financial help with an ardor even more fiery than in World War I.

In fact, the ardor is frightening to those who wish a lasting peace to grow from World War II. For American Poles are receiving word from home of oppression by Germans and Russians; of families thrown out of their homes on 48 hours notice to make room for Germans from Estonia and Latvia; of universities closed; libraries stolen; newspapers and radios confiscated, everything Polish stamped out. "That," they say, "is what Hitler means by 'lebensraum'."

Savings And Loan Association Has Retired Big Sum

Private Savings In Insured Groups Now Nears Two Billion

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—Savings and loan association members of the Federal Home Loan Bank system have voluntarily retired more than \$10,000,000 of Government investments since June 30, 1935, as the increasing flow from the public has supplied them with ample funds for financing homes.

The \$10,000,000 repaid since June 30 compares with \$3,000,000 repaid during the entire period from 1934 to that date—proof of the significant recent trend, the Federal Home Loan Bank Board points out. Only about \$50,000 of the total of \$18,000,000 repayments was due and callable. The savings and loan associations have long since liquidated more than \$115,000,000 of \$120,000,000 loaned them by the Reconstruction Finance Corporation during the depression.

Practically all of these U. S. Treasury and HOLC investments, which originally aggregated \$208,000,000 were made in savings and loan associations whose accounts are projected up to \$5,000 each through the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation. These investments now represent less than 14 percent of the volume of private savings in the 2,188 insured associations.

"Private savings in insured associations now total \$1,748,000,000, an increase of \$350,000,000 in the past year alone, as compared with the present Government investment of \$250,000,000," said John H. Fabey, Chairman of the Federal Home Loan Bank Board. "These constantly increasing sav-

ings assure ample home-financing funds for member institutions of the bank system and have enabled them to take steps toward the retirement of their indebtedness to the Government."

Japs Report New Chinese Army Is Fighting Kai-Shek

SHANGHAI, Feb. 14.—A Chinese army supporting former Premier Wang Ching-Wei has landed on the coast of Fukien province and is fighting the forces of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek, Japanese military authorities here stated today.

Without mentioning where the troops came from, the Japanese said they had landed Monday at an unnamed spot "with the cooperation of the Japanese army and navy."

The Japanese, who are supporting Wang in his program to form a new central Chinese government in cooperation with Tokyo and in opposition to Gen. Chiang's Chungking regime, called the force the "peace and national construction army."

This army, the existence of which has not been mentioned before, was said to have captured the town of Shaolin, in Fukien province near the Kwangtung border. The Japanese hinted the

force was about 50,000 strong. Two other fields of battle kept Chinese spotlights today. In Kwangsi province the south the Chinese laid claim to victories over the Japanese in a hard-hitting counter-offensive, while the Japanese told of gas in the extreme northwest, in Inner Mongolia.

Official Chinese military dispatches received at Chungking said the Chinese had recaptured the town of Pingyang 50 miles northeast of Nanning, Kwangsi capital, on Sunday and nearby Wuming the day before.

An result, the Chinese said, the recent Japanese offensive in this region threatening the Chinese southwestern "lifeline" supply routes had been checked, and the invaders are said to have been put on the defensive in the Nanning area.

The Japanese countered such claims by saying their forces had "successfully concluded" an attack on 31 Chinese divisions. They said Chinese in the Pingyang area were "almost annihilated."

Storm Leaves 20 Dead As It Heads To Sea

High Winds Drop 13 Inches Of Snow Over Most Of New Jersey As 8 Die Eight Persons Are Dead In New York Blizzard Cripples Traffic On Highways And In Air

Winter's nastiest north-easter headed on to sea today, leaving behind a trail of 36 dead, after burying eastern states under heavy snowfalls. Clearing weather was forecast. In New Jersey eight persons died as a snow and sleet storm, accompanied by a 75-mile-an-hour winds dropped 13 inches of snow over parts of the state.

New England recorded three deaths in the storm, the worst since the 1939 hurricane ripped across six states. In New York City where several persons were swept overboard from the fourth floor scaffolding on a court building, Upstate New York reported eight dead and Maryland's toll was three. The storm crippled highway traffic and grounded planes from Ohio to Boston.

Pennsylvania counted eight fatalities while lashing sales brought new snow to the high country, although high (Continued on Page Three)

FDR Arrives In Pensacola For Sea Trip

President Roosevelt boards Destroyer But Expected To Travel On Cruiser

PENSACOLA, Feb. 15—(AP)—President Roosevelt arrived here today by train from Washington and boarded the destroyer Lang in the bay. It was assumed he would transfer from the Lang to the Cruiser Tuscaloosa for a fishing trip through the Gulf of Mexico waters. The Tuscaloosa also was in the bay but could not come as close as the Lang.

Finns Call In More Reserves To Stop Reds

4,000 Russian Troops Reported Killed In Hammering On Finnish Frontier

Sixteen Soviet Planes Downed

58,000 Tons Of Shipping Is Reported Sunk By Germany

Finland's plight was emphasized today by a second call for more reservists within 24 hours and communique describing furious fighting against the Red army on the Karelian Isthmus, the Lake Ladoga front and farther north near Kuhmo.

Men 43 and 44 were ordered mobilized in 1 day which saw 27 Soviet planes fly over Helsinki without dropping bombs.

Russian hammering on the Finnish fronts was reported to have cost 1,000 Soviet dead yesterday, 3,500 on the Isthmus communique said attacks had been repulsed.

Declaring 16 Russian warplanes had been shot down, the Finns reported a curious and unexplained incident—an apparent attack by Soviet aircraft on some of their own number. One of these was said to have crashed behind Finnish lines.

Finland pinned her hopes on foreign aid and on diversion of Soviet attention to the far north after admitting setbacks on the shell-cracked Summa sector.

New gains were announced by the Red Army, which said it captured Finnish fortifications—100 within a week—had been captured and "heavy losses" inflicted on the embattled Finns.

The Red's Admiralty counted four German submarines as sunk in the last six days, bringing their total claims to 50 for the war.

Authoritative sources said Britain was prepared to offer a loan of 100 million to all neutral shipping as a result of German bombardments on sea warfare.

Germany announced 58,000 tons of shipping had been sunk.

The American Way

President Roosevelt is off for a ten-day fishing trip in southern waters without so much as a hint as to the answer to the present all absorbing national pastime of solving the riddle of the third term. The reporter who manages by trick or pull to extract that answer from the Chief Executive is likely to go down in the history as newspaperman's smartest questioner.

The Herald has maintained for some time, without knowing anything about it, that Mr. Roosevelt would not seek a third term. We know this is in conflict with most of the expert opinion now being voiced throughout the country which seems to agree he is quietly laying his plans to capture the nomination and win re-election.

It will of course be argued by those who want to feather their own political nests through Mr. Roosevelt's re-election that this is an emergency and that emergencies require unprecedented measures. It was an emergency, as we recall it, that resulted in Mr. Roosevelt's election in 1932.

The most constructive demonstration of the democratic system which President Roosevelt could give the world today would be to publicly renounce any personal ambition for the perpetuation of his power. He could go further than that and simply refuse to run.

Better Health

A group of important diseases made new low mortality records in 1939, according to a report made by the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, covering the year's experience among the American and Canadian insured wage-earners.

Diseases with new low record death rates were the principal communicable diseases of childhood—measles, scarlet fever, whooping cough and diphtheria; diarrheal diseases of infancy; diseases and conditions associated with pregnancy and childbirth; tuberculosis; pneumonia; appendicitis; typhoid fever; and chronic nephritis.

The reduction in mortality from the principal communicable diseases of childhood is pointed to as an outstanding accomplishment. Not only did the death rate for the four diseases combined drop 34 percent in a single year to the new low level of 4.2 per 100,000, but a new low death rate was attained for each individual disease separately.

The tuberculosis mortality rate declined to less than 45 per 100,000, a decline of 4.9 percent from the preceding year, and nearly 50 percent in 10 years. The decline in the pneumonia death rate of 15.2 percent since 1938, to a new minimum of 42.9 per 100,000, is singled out as "the most striking achievement of 1939 in the entire field of public health."

Mortality from Diarrheal diseases of infants, with an all-time low death rate of 3.7 per 100,000, was less than one fourth of what it was ten years ago, while the per-purperal death rate of 5.4 per 100,000 for 1939, the lowest on record, represented a drop of 12.9 percent in a single year and 80 percent in 10 years.

The death rate of 46.3 per 100,000 for accidents—all forms—was 4.8 percent under the 1938 level and 29 percent lower than the rate 10 years ago. While the death rate for fatalities from automobile accidents failed to reach a record low point, the 1939 figure of 17.1 per 100,000 was the lowest recorded since 1926.

The generally favorable health picture, the Metropolitan Life says, was somewhat marred however, by the fact that new high death rates were recorded for three causes—cancer, diabetes and diseases of coronary arteries, while mortality from influenza, cerebral hemorrhage, heart disease and railroad accidents was less favorable than in 1938.

Bulletin Available On Care Of Groves

Its first great discovery is that it should be noted that during the eight months following after Mr. Hoover had the panic down for the count and before his successor took office, there were among the evidences of returning prosperity these happenings:

There were 20,000 business failures. Unemployment went to fifteen million—the all-time high. The National income dropped to forty billion dollars for the year. In the first eight months of Roosevelt, after the banking moratorium: There were 164 failures—all of nearly all those that were not deemed sound enough to reopen.

Eight thousand fewer commercial failures than in the Hoover period. Two and a half million of the unemployed were back at work. The National income had jumped two and a half billion dollars—its record nearly seventy billions last year.

Like-wise it was Mr. Hoover who first acknowledged the obligation of Government to relieve those in need. It is curious that nobody—least of all the members of the Hoover cabinet—has ever mentioned this. We are forced to the conclusion that there were nearly 22,000,000 chickens in the United States in 1932 who did not realize that the depression was lifted and that they were consuming themselves to starvation.

Senator Pepper Attacks Imports Of Cuban Sugar

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15.—Citing statistics showing that the United States purchased more than \$300,000,000 of sugar, syrup, and molasses from Cuba during 1936, 1937 and 1938, Senator Claude E. Pepper of Florida told the Senate that "I believe the voice of 21 sugar-producing states will be heard on the floors of Congress during the present session in protest against the all-too-severe limitations placed upon domestic sugar production."

The detailed statistics placed in the Congressional Record for benefit of Congress, by Senator Pepper, showed that in spite of all the concessions granted on Cuban sugar, and in spite of the tremendous subsidies resulting therefrom, the United States still has a serious trade disadvantage, purchasing much more from Cuba than Cuba purchases from the United States.

On taxes they are quite clear. They want to reduce the higher individual surtaxes, and put them on people in the middle brackets. Everybody must sympathize with the distressed multi-millionaires. A pathetic case was recalled recently when one of these panting refugees complained that after the Government had taken its toll he had a bare \$500,000 a year to live on.

The columnist credit many of the ideas of the survey to the advice and influence of ex-President Hoover. To that extent, the survey is rather fitting for what the G. O. P. would like to see in a return to the good old days, before any of this nonsense of public relief and consideration to the most privileged came along to change up the conventional notions under which the great factories of America directed the Government, and pretty much everything else.

They have to do something, so they are forced to the rather expedient of telling how bad the Democrats have been doing, and throw in a lot of words that mean only: "Let us have the Government and the delayed millennium will be on us in a rush."

WASHINGTON DAYBOOK BY PRESTON GROVER

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15.—(AP)—Already the method of attack on the Trade Agreement acts has been outlined by the opposition in the House. It will be the guerrilla warfare. Critics will let Secretary Hull and his trade statistics tell whatever story they will. Then the critics will recite how certain tariff concessions made under the act have damaged their home districts.

Midwest opposition, not wholly shared, was represented on the house committee by Representative Knutson who declared oppositions can gradually be decreased. American vessels are forbidden by the United States neutrality act to enter belligerent areas voluntarily.

Hardly had the German threat of reprisals for the British blockade reached this country than Secretary of State Hull went into conference with Lord Lothian, British ambassador, to discuss anew this nation's demands that British stop taking United States ships into forbidden war areas.

At a press conference earlier Hull would not comment on the Nazi announcement except to say the rights of belligerent to this neutral vessels are well defined under international law.

Anyone wanting to acquire Murphy land may have the first cut Court Clerk advertise the property for sale. He must deposit with the clerk sufficient money to pay for the newspaper advertisement and the clerk's fee.

NEW YORK, Feb. 15.—(P)—New York has a way of honoring its heroes by naming buildings and bridges after them. This is a gracious and a laudatory thing, and yet I wonder if the city doesn't err in naming its edifices after men when an examination of the surrounding terrain would suggest more appropriate names.

I have in mind particularly the George Washington bridge and the Lincoln tunnel. The George Washington bridge is a magnificent expanse of concrete and steel and it spans the Hudson in a great hanging highway that may be seen for many miles.

But much as we love George Washington, the Palisades Bridge would be a better name. The Palisades are among the nation's most beautiful landmarks. They rise in sheer rocky eminences for miles along the Hudson. They are the scenes of many incidents of historic importance. On them Alexander Hamilton and Aaron Burr had their famous, tragic duel. Washington's spies used to lie on them and study the activities of the British, who then held Manhattan. Once the Indians built their campfires on the spot

Rumania Plans Adding 200,000 Troops To Army

By ROBERT B. PARKER, JR. BUDAPEST, Feb. 15.—(P)—

Fresh preparations to augment the men under arms in the Balkans yesterday underscored fears that southeastern Europe might become a battleground in the Spring.

Rumania, over whose potent resources of oil and grain the Allies and Germans have been maneuvering, was reported planning to add 200,000 recruits to her active forces on March 1.

This development follows reports that Britain and France have a force of 500,000 men concentrated in the Near East.

Their number, military leaders here said today, held the threat of a backdoor drive through the Balkans against Germany, or they would be strategically ready should Germany, now meeting diplomatic rebuffs from both Turkey and Rumania, decide herself upon a drive through the area upon which she depends for essential materials for her European war.

A Turkish-British-French drive on rich Russian oil fields has been cited as another possibility for expanding Europe's war.

The Bucharest government admits it has 500,000 men on duty now but foreign military observers place the total at close to 400,000. The calling up of 300,000 reservists, thus, by their estimates, would give the nation 1,000,000 men ready to face any Spring danger.

Officials reported that among the many factors leading to uncertainty over the future, and therefore causing the Rumanians to take the extra precaution, was a noncommittal reply from Germany to Bucharest government request for Nazi guarantees of Rumanian territory.

Such a request had been threatened by Bucharest when Rumania's Balkan entente partners—Yugoslavia, Turkey and Greece—failed to agree at their recent Belgrade conference on an ironclad military alliance. Rumania's proposal to preserve Balkan neutrality.

Elsewhere in the Balkans, a survey has shown that dissenting military concentrations of last year are ready to be in force; that the little neutrals' conscript armies will be on a war footing by mid-March.

The steady deterioration of Turkish-German relations, as exemplified last week by Turkey's discharge of 100 German technical experts and the occupation of German-owned shipyards, has done much to impress leaders of the little neutrals with the possibility of war.

A possible Allied campaign in the Balkans to strike at Germany's back door, would pursue three routes, as envisioned by military experts here:

- (1) From Belgrade through the Vardar and Morava river valleys to the Danube.
- (2) Along "the diagonal furrow" from Istanbul through Bulgaria.
- (3) Up the Danube river valley from Rumania.

Other lines of possible attack, military strategists felt sure, would involve united action by Turkey and Britain against the rich Caucasian oil fields of Soviet Russia. Turkey has mutual assistance pacts with the Allies and has declared herself "not neutral" in the European war but "merely non-belligerent."

Gen. Maxime Weygand, commander-in-chief of the French forces in the Near East, has conferred in Ankara on the possibility of Turkish collaboration with the Allied troops.

The general, who has supplemented these conferences with an inspection of British troops in Egypt the past three days today left Cairo for Beirut by air.

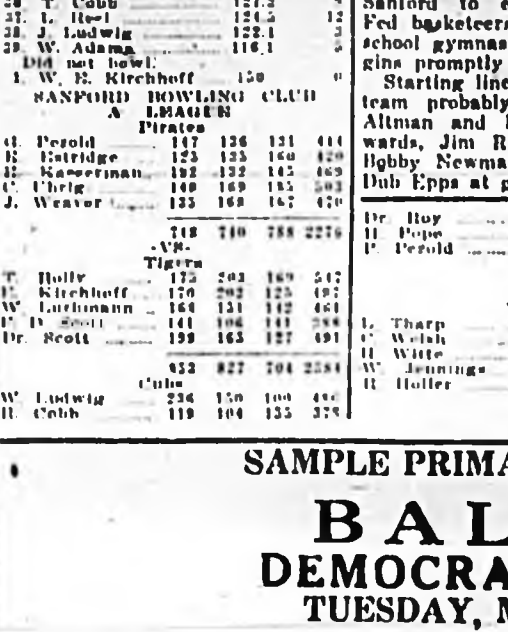

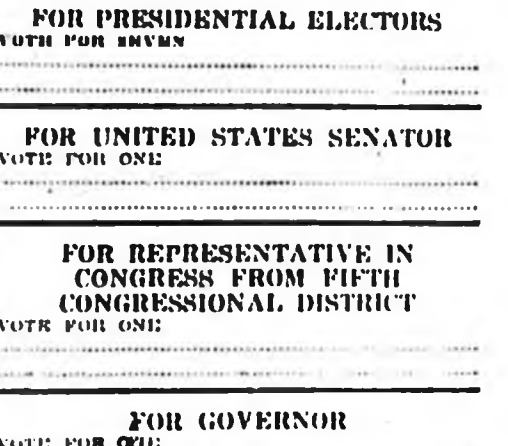
SAMPLE PRIMARY ELECTION BALLOT DEMOCRATIC PARTY

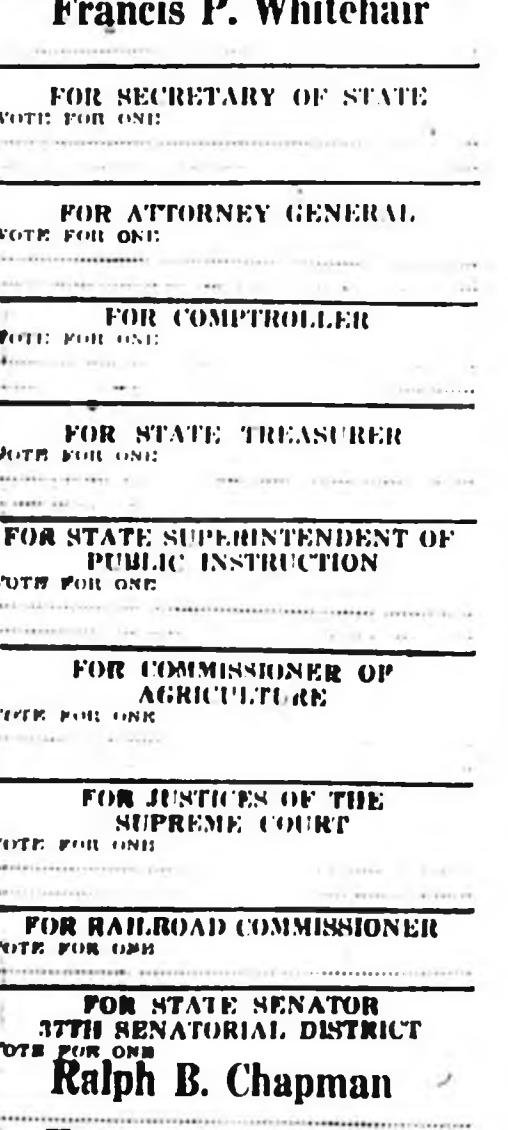

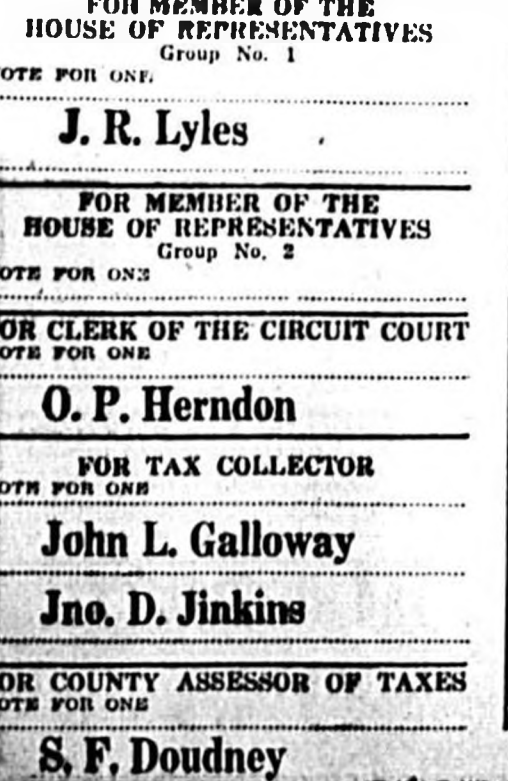

Family Congress In Arizona Seeks To Aid Americans

PHOENIX Ariz., Feb. 15.—Arizona's first contribution in the way of plans to aid America's economic life is the incorporation of the Family Congress of America, described as an organization to "further the safety, security and prosperity of the American People."

Howard N. Blazard, of Prescott, Ariz., head of the Family Congress, said it differed greatly from other such projects in that it featured a program for persons of all ages rather than for old people alone.

"Our program is for a permanent national plan toward uniting families of this country in a realization of the great and glorious privileges but which we are in danger of losing," Blazard said.

While the Family Congress is not primarily concerned with pensions, Blazard said, it does provide for a pension of \$60 a month for every citizen of 60 who is not in an institution and who wishes to retire.

The Family Congress also would:

- 1—Promote real and actual social security "through an abundance of productive work and ready circulation of money."
 - 2—Make medical service actually available for all as an American right and a national economy.
 - 3—Build a financial strength in the Family Congress of America and an understanding among its members and the public generally "that will make it possible for the common man to be better heard in the protection and realization of his constitutional rights, privileges and opportunities."
 - 4—Seek an abundance of productive public work, well-paid and dependable for every citizen as an American right with no connection of relief or relief status.
- A tax on idle money and transactions would finance the FCA's program to provide jobs for all, public health facilities and old age pensions.
- To force money into circulation and thereby stimulate industry and provide more jobs, the FCA would call it in periodically and exchange it for new, less a tax deduction on money withheld from

Newspapers To Get Bank's Advertising

CHICAGO, Feb. 15.—(AP)—Newspapers will receive more than half of the advertising expenditures of the nation's banks this year, results of a survey by the National Advertisers' association indicated yesterday.

Thirty percent of the banks studied, the survey showed, were increasing their appropriations in 1945, while 65 percent were maintaining their budget set up in 1939 and only 5 percent were reducing them. Banks included in the survey ranged from the world's largest institutions to those with resources of around a million dollars.

Banks in the 25 and 50 million dollar class reported they would use 64 percent of their appropriation in newspapers, those in the 50 to 100 million dollar class, 54 percent; those under 25 million, 58 percent; and those of 100 million or more, 50 percent. The banks reported 15 to 27 percent would be used in direct mail advertising. Other media, such as sectional periodicals, novelties, car cards, outdoor advertising, displays, national magazines and radio will receive the remainder.

More Than One Million Is Given For Finns

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15.—(AP)—Dr. Edmund A. Walsh, chairman of the Washington unit, said yesterday that more than \$1,000,000 in \$1 contributions had been received by the Finnish relief fund.

Work Expected To Be Resumed Soon On Channel Tunnel

LONDON, Feb. 15.—(AP)—Work on a railroad tunnel beneath the English channel, suspended nearly 60 years ago, may be resumed after the war.

Anatole de Monsie, French minister of public works, declared in the French chamber of deputies that construction of the tunnel would be one of the first public works undertaken when peace comes.

The war has served to focus attention anew on the project at a possible national defense measure—to provide a lifeline attack from plane and submarine attack by which food may be sped to this island and by which troops may be sent to France.

More than a mile of the tunnel was bored some six decades ago before construction was halted in 1823 by Joseph Chamberlain, then Minister of Works. Chamberlain obtained a permanent injunction to restrain the Channel Tunnel company from boring any further toward the French coast without Parliamentary sanction.

Regularly since then, advocates of the tunnel have attempted unsuccessfully to obtain this sanction. The present prime minister only last year said he did not believe that the tunnel would provide any extra protection to the food supply of the country in the event of an air attack.

However, Winston Churchill wrote in 1936 that such a tunnel would be of inestimable value in wartime. And de Monsie in his French chamber speech said: "We see now the great international need of the tunnel."

A tunnel linking England and France first was proposed in 1802 by a French engineer named Mathieu, but it was not until 1873 that the first Channel Tunnel company was formed.

STREAMER IN DISTRESS

Finns Appeal To Swedes For Direct Armed Assistance

Scandinavian Nation, However, Rebuffs, Pleas On Grounds Of Endangering Self

Russians Achieve Admitted Results

Red Forces Occupy Shell-Shattered Village Of Summa

Sweden disclosed today Finland had appealed to her for direct military assistance against the steady pounding of Russia's vast army but had been rebuffed.

Finland's call for help, which Sweden said she could not heed and still protect her own neutrality, sharply underlined the embattled land's difficulties under unrelenting Russian pressure which the Finnish high command now admits is achieving results.

A Finnish communique conceded that the Russians had penetrated the Mannerheim line defense system on the Karelian Isthmus in some places but at a heavy cost in men.

The Swedish newspaper Aftonbladet reported the Finns told Sweden they either must conclude peace with Russia on Russian terms or get help from the western powers if Sweden failed them.

But London offered little hope of British regulars being sent quickly in sizable numbers or of such aid from France.

"It would seem the present situation is too bleak on the score," one British source said.

The Finns admitted the Russians had occupied the shell-shattered village of Summa.

Seminole Is Now In Orlando WPA District

Changes Are Made In Transfer Order In Washington

With the re-organization of the 11 Florida WPA administrative areas in 10 districts, Seminole County is no longer a part of the Daytona Beach area but has been placed in the Orlando district, according to information received from the office of K. Marion Googans, director of operations for the district.

There is no longer an area office in Daytona Beach, and Volusia county has been made a part of the Jacksonville district. It was pointed out by Rodney Thursday, assistant area supervisor who supervised this county's WPA program, is now an assistant in the newly created Jacksonville district.

Replacing the assistant supervisor in the new setup will be the field engineer of the district office who will direct the progress of projects in the six counties of the Orlando district which are: Orange, Lake, Osceola, Sumter, Seminole and Brevard counties.

It was reported at the Orlando office that Mr. Googans has requested an allotment of funds for the City-sponsored project to replace the present wooden pipeline from the City wells to the new water plant. It was stated that an allotment for the recently approved sewer project will be requested as soon as there are more details on the project.

The changes made in the administration of the WPA in this state were in accordance with the suggestions issued from Washington, and the purpose of the rearrangement of counties in new districts was to provide a more compact division of the work to be done in each district, it was pointed out.

Officials of district No. 3, Orlando, include Mr. Googans, director of operations; Dorothy Hanson, director of projects; and Joseph C. Gregory, district employment officer, and James E. Keel, district finance officer.

Validity Of State Citrus Laws Upheld

Judge Petteway Denies Injunction Asked In Independent's Challenge

Growers Request Law Enforcement

Relaxation Would Destroy Confidence, Association Says

LAKELAND, Feb. 16.—(AP)—Circuit Judge H. C. Petteway today upheld the constitutionality of Florida's citrus inspection, and maturity laws which group 236 independent growers had challenged.

He issued an order denying a temporary injunction which would have restrained the Citrus Commission and Commissioner of Agriculture Mayo from applying and enforcing the 1935 law on grading, stamping and certifying the fruit, and the 1939 law on maturity standards.

While the attack was not directed at all citrus laws, it was generally conceded that the whole program of State regulation would be undermined if it were successful.

Meanwhile a continuation of strict enforcement of federal and state citrus laws was urged yesterday by directors of the Florida Citrus Growers, Inc., at their monthly meeting here.

Directors adopted a resolution declaring attempts were being made to have present enforcement relaxed, and that any lowering of grades or relaxation of enforcement will result in "destroying the confidence in Florida fruit, now regained after five years of effective advertising, as well as nullifying the effect of future advertising."

The resolution asked the Florida Citrus Commission to maintain the present U. S. grade standards without change and Commissioner Mayo to enforce strictly the standards of these grades.

Frank H. Rex, vice president, said the industry now is operating under the federal-state citrus marketing agreement and not the so-called state frozen fruit law which was invoked recently to declare a seven-day embargo on shipments.

Marvin Walker, Lakeland, executive secretary of the Florida Citrus Producers' Trade Association and F. G. Todd, Avon Park, member of the commission, explained provisions of both the marketing agreement and the state frozen fruit law.

Walter Rex, president of the Orange County Citrus Growers association, said efforts were being made to obtain a WPA project providing for investigators personally to survey on damage done during January freeze and the amount of financial assistance needed by citrus producers.

Proposal Made For Warships To Carry U. S. Mail

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—(AP)—Angry denials of Great Britain's interference with American shipping in her blockade against Germany rang in both House and Senate yesterday, climaxed by a proposal that the British be used to carry this country's overseas mail in future.

However, the Senate turned down, 46 to 25, an attempt by Senator Clark, Democrat, Missouri, to prohibit American air-mail planes from landing at the British possession of Bermuda where, Clark charged, British consuls were "refiling the mails."

Charles Pittman, Democrat, Nevada, of the foreign relations committee opposed Clark's proposal. Pittman acknowledged that one time might need to be at hand to stop "light discriminations against our mails," but he added that steps should be taken only after consultation with the state department and consideration in committee.

Representative Mann, Republican, Minnesota, made the proposal that warships carry the mails. He charged that the real reason the British were examining American mail was to get cost data and other business information to enable their submarines to underbid this country in world markets.

Referring to Germany's recent warning that American ships which stop at Allied ports or contraband control stations would be kept prey for her submarines, Mann bluntly accused Great Britain of adopting her present contraband control policy in a deliberate attempt to drag the United States into the war.

The Minnesota led the House British warships carrying mail to commit acts calculated to upset this country and bring it into the war on the side of the Allies.

"Under the guise of protecting their blockade against Germany," Mann asserted, "the British are doing the same reprehensible things they did in 1914."

Cone Orders No Arrests Until March On Tags

TALLAHASSEE, Feb. 16.—(AP)—Governor Cone yesterday asked all Florida law enforcement officers to wait until March 1 before making arrests for failure to have a 1940 license tag on an automobile.

The governor already had extended the deadline from Jan. 15 to Feb. 1 and then added 15 additional days of grace. His request yesterday means another 15-day extension for tag buyers.

He explained that the motor vehicle license law does not permit him to grant another extension of the deadline for buying new tags but he said the recent "disastrous freeze" had caused many fruit growers and farmers to be hard hit financially.

The governor's letter said: "Section 1284, compiled general laws of 1927, prohibits the further extension of time for the purchase of motor vehicle license tags, but there has been a very disastrous freeze in the state which has caused a great financial loss to many of our citizens, particularly those interested in the citrus, vegetable and trucking industries.

"In my judgment an emergency now exists and because of such emergency I request and suggest that no arrests be made and no penalties be imposed for failure to purchase motor vehicle license tags prior to March 1, 1940."

Welfare Checks - Total \$5,738 During January

458 Seminole County Recipients Received Assistance Checks

A total of \$5,738 was paid by the State Welfare Board to 458 recipients in Seminole County during the month of January, according to a report received today from the Jacksonville headquarters of the Board.

A breakdown of the expenditures revealed that there were 400 persons in this county who received Old Age Assistance checks amounting to \$4,115 for the month while 492 cases expended \$1,623 in the Aid to Dependent Children program. Blind assistance checks were paid to 21 persons totalling \$311.

Over the state, 11,054 persons actually directly benefited through the distribution of the grants, the announcement said.

In the Old Age Assistance program 3,287 persons received \$140,139 in the Aid to Dependent Children group 2,631 families received \$96,771 in the Aid to the Blind category 2,133 persons received \$35,419.

State Welfare Commissioner C. C. Whittington stated that state federal cash benefits now exceed \$6,000,000 per year, and that this is supplemented by the distribution of surplus commodities to 59,569 cases representing 243,492 persons.
