

Deal To Weaken Rights Bill Seen

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Two Republican senators suspect the Johnson administration may have agreed to weaken the civil rights bill in a deal for southern support to continue excise taxes.

Sens. Thurston B. Morton, Ky., and Hugh Scott, Pa., suggested Sunday that while southern Democrats held fast during Senate debate against repeal of taxes on items such as luggage and cosmetics, southerners in the House put up little fight against the broad civil rights measure.

"We all think that means they've got a deal brewing in the Senate with the administration," Scott said in a radio and television interview. "We don't know what the deal is, but we are very suspicious that it's something to weaken the civil rights bill."

Morton added that it was the only way he could account for the fact that southern Democrats voted solidly to retain these taxes. He said that friends in the retail business had assured him they had "definite commitments" from five southern senators to vote with Republicans on repeal of the taxes during debate of the \$11.8 billion tax cut bill.

Conner Puts State Fair On Probation

TAMPA (UPI) — State Agricultural Commissioner Doyle Conner issued an order putting the State Fair on probation for alleged violation of 22 state laws.

The action was taken shortly after the fair closed here Saturday night when the pirate ship Jose Gasparilla sailed out of Hillsborough Bay under a canopy of fireworks, the traditional end of the fair.

The probation order followed an investigation of the state agriculture and livestock fair committee. The committee's report said the investigation included the wounding of eight persons by a cannon during a Thursday night parade and alleged violation of state gambling laws.

3 Oviedo-Slavia Schools Looted

\$90 Stolen; Thieves Fail To Open Safe

Thieves using the same method of operation in most cases broke into three schools in the Oviedo-Slavia area early this morning and netted about \$90 for their efforts.

In each case a glass pane was broken and doors or windows opened to gain access to the schools.

A torch was used on a safe at Oviedo Elementary and High School in an unsuccessful attempt to crack it. After wrecking the safe, they turned to a desk in the office and took about \$15, according to Constable George Kelsey and Deputy Sheriff J. Q. (Slim) Gallaway.

At the Jackson Heights School they cracked a window, entered the building, jimmied a desk and made off with \$75. The burglars then turned their attention on the Slavia Lutheran School. A door glass was smashed, the door opened, and the office ransacked. Nothing was taken, however.

The officers say they believe the thieves then drove to the John Jakubcin farm, ripped the locks from a gasoline tank and filled their car with gas to complete the getaway.

Constable Kelsey said it is believed the same group visited the area Monday morning and tried to break into the Seminole bar. He said they were frightened off before the burglary could be accomplished.

Kelsey reported a number of leads have been obtained in the miniature crime wave. He said the similarity in each instance points to the same gang being involved.

Two-year-old Darwin Stevens Jr., of Seminole Boulevard, Casselberry, was taken to Winter Park Memorial Hospital for examination and observation after falling into a drainage canal near his home this morning. Emergency treatment on the scene was given by the Casselberry Volunteer Fire Department which administered oxygen. The child was pulled from the canal by his mother who also was treated at the hospital for shock.

Belli Puts On Show Of Anger

DALLAS (UPI) — Jack Ruby's lawyer erupted angrily in court today and twice demanded transfer of the murder trial to another city because two prospective jurors had opinions on insanity and Ruby's guilt.

Chief defense attorney Melvin Belli renewed his motion for a change of venue to any other Texas community when the state insisted on questioning a prospective juror who said he did not believe Ruby could be proved insane at the time he shot Lee Harvey Oswald.

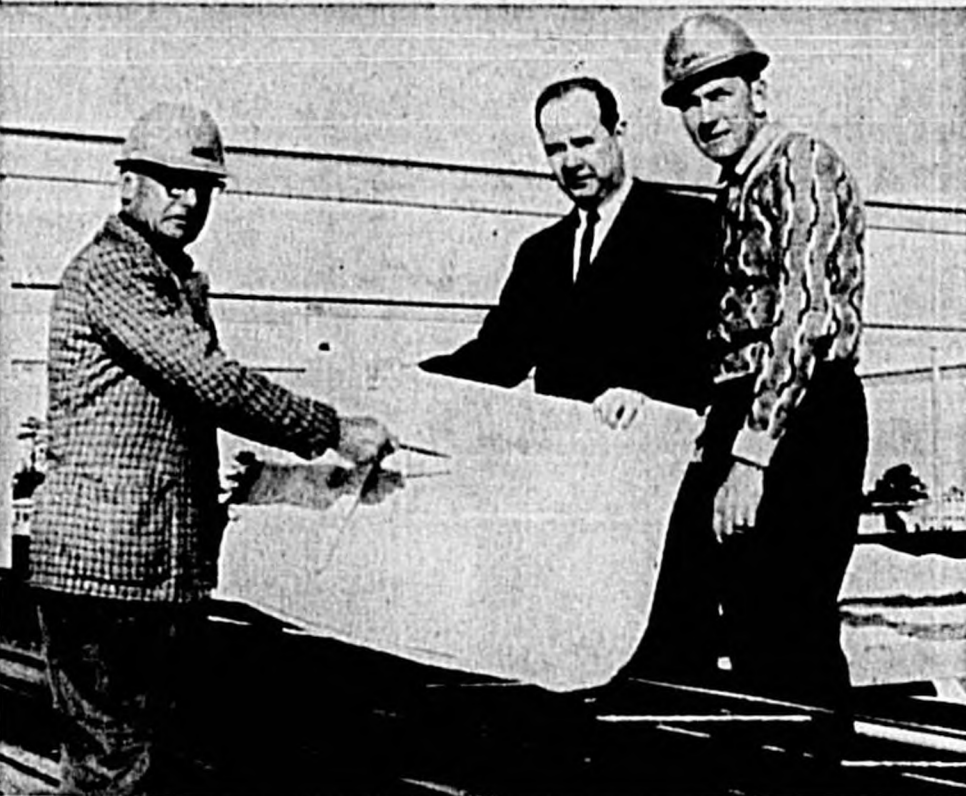
He demanded trial in another city "where it will be apparent that we are not in the dark ages, that there is such a thing as insanity." He was overruled.

JACKSONVILLE (UPI)—A Navy jet photo reconnaissance plane crashed in the ocean near here Wednesday, killing the pilot, Lt. Col. John M. McCall.

Penney's New Store To Be Much Larger

More details about the new J. C. Penney Co. department store in the Sanford Shopping Center were announced today by Charles Robinson, manager of Penney's downtown store.

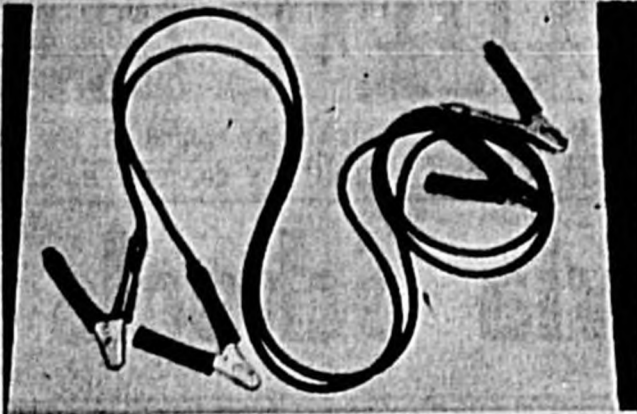
The "achievers" organized their company, elect officers and sell stock for starting capital.

Average Tax Cut Figured At 19 Percent

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Congressional leaders were confident today the \$11.5 billion tax cut bill would be on President Johnson's desk by the middle of next week to provide an early March paycheck boost for millions of wage earners.

The final compromise version of the biggest tax cut in U. S. history was cleared by a House-Senate conference committee Wednesday — almost 18 months after the late President John F. Kennedy proposed to "remove the brakes" of high wartime federal tax rates.

House leaders planned to allot one hour of debate and

pass the bill next Tuesday. The Senate was to follow suit the same day or Wednesday. Final approval by both chambers was assured.

When fully effective in 1965, the average taxpayer will enjoy about a 19 per cent tax cut, the first major reduction in federal income taxes since a 10 per cent slash in 1954.

Most important to the President, the take-home pay of wage earners will increase an average of \$4.50 a week eight days after the bill is signed into law when payroll withholding rates drop from 18

to 14 per cent. Johnson is anxious to see this \$27 million-a-day in greater consumer spending start flowing into the economy as early as possible this election year.

The compromise bill which emerged from the House-Senate conference group after four days of bargaining gave the new Chief Executive about all that he wanted.

It provides top-to-bottom cuts in taxpayers in all income brackets. Another 1.5 million would be removed from the tax rolls altogether through more liberal tax

treatment of low-income persons.

A single taxpayer, for example, earning \$5,000 a year will pay \$147 less taxes when the program is fully effective. A married couple with two children, \$10,000 a year income and typical itemized deductions, will have the tax bill reduced by \$233 a year.

Two-thirds of the tax reduction bill will be effective this year, retroactive to Jan. 1. The remainder will go into effect Jan. 1, 1965. The cuts do not apply to taxes due now on 1963 income.

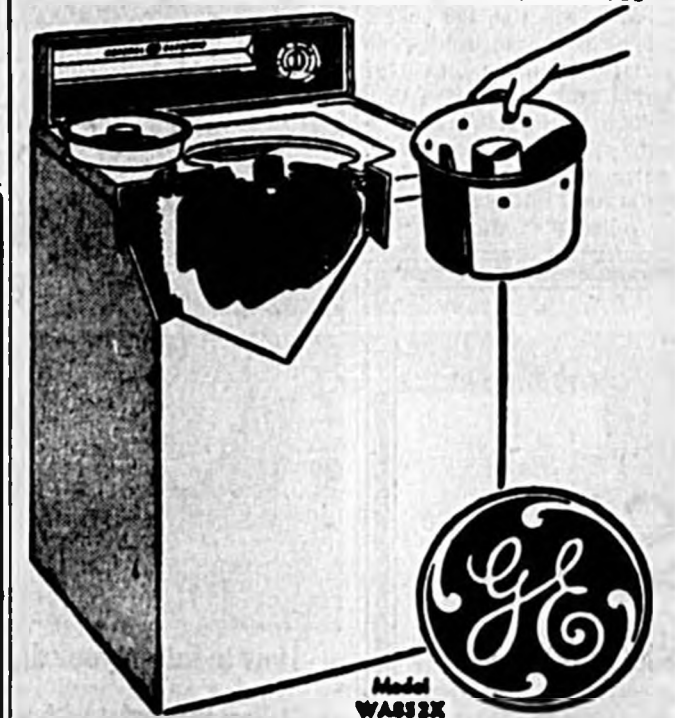

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Filling Up Space

Some people won't care; others will think it's a mighty fine thing. But it should interest all those who can remember back when there was such a thing as a space race.

The U.S. orbited more than three times as many payloads in 1963 as the Soviet Union. North American Defense Command's Space Detection and Tracking System counted 88 U.S. launches and 60 payloads, of which 48 are still orbiting. The Russians managed 17 payloads, of

which four are still in orbit. The reason there are more payloads than launches is because much useless junk goes into orbit along with a satellite—burned out rockets, protective shrouds, assorted nuts and bolts.

SPADATS is currently keeping tabs on 418 artificial satellites. Of these, 92 are actual payloads; the rest are debris. Some of the pieces being tracked are no larger than a pencil.

One Man's Meat

Wiping out starvation and malnutrition in the world would be a difficult enough matter if it only involved spreading the knowledge of modern farming methods, improving distribution or curbing runaway population growth.

The goal is made immeasurably more elusive because of a factor often overlooked—religious and superstitious taboos concerning food.

Half the children born in central Africa die before the age of five, writes Gwen Schultz in "Today's Health." In this same area of the continent, milk is looked on as a vile body waste. Some think it a sin to drink milk. Other groups believe milk will make women sterile. Many Latin-American mothers believe a sick child should not be given milk.

Fish is one of the cheapest and best sources of protein, yet many starving people reject it. In some parts of Africa fish are considered unclean and possessed of evil spirits.

Last Westerners shake their heads in disbelief, it should be recalled how the Irish during the 18th-century potato famine and Europeans after World War II rejected American corn because they thought it was fit only for animals.

Westerners have their own food taboos and often impose them on people they are trying to help. Monkeys, bats, rats, termites and other such things may be unpalatable to us but they provide valuable proteins whose loss the bringers of civilization do not always replace.

Numerous peoples in eastern and southern Asia, where cattle are in abundance, also reject milk. In many places, cattle are status symbols and are seldom killed for food.

India has one-fifth of the world's cattle. Not only are they sacred to the Hindus but so are all other animals.

The pig is shunned by Moslems and Jews, as is well known. The latter also forbid the eating of shellfish or meat and dairy products at the same meal.

In parts of Asia and Africa, eggs are considered to be excrement. Eating them will destroy one's fertility or potency or make one's wife unfaithful.

Sophisticated cultures are also spreading the belief that breast-feeding is vulgar and just not done. Thus infants are being weaned earlier to the starchy diet of their elders, which eventually shortens their lives.

"Do unto others" is not the uncomplicated rule it seems to be.

Political Notebook

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—An angry President Johnson is personally taking a hand in strong new protests to British Prime Minister Alec Douglas-Home over the British agreement to sell buses to Cuba.

A U. S. official close to the White House says "Lyndon Johnson was angry enough before, but since Castro shut off the water to Guantanamo, he's hopping mad. He's really worked up. He's going to make (the British) feel it. And he's the man who can do it."

But dressing down the British is one thing and keeping Britain, France, Spain and other allies from selling to Fidel Castro is another. Despite a lagging agriculture and declining sugar output, high world sugar prices mean Castro is "rolling" in foreign exchange and can pay for what he wants.

Johnson has told Secretary of State Dean Rusk he must find some way to keep the West from selling Castro significant amounts of those things he needs to pin his

limping economy together. High on the list: Oil refinery and other industrial production parts and equipment, railroad locomotives and freight cars, buses and trucks. The word is that Rusk is supposed to bear down especially hard on our European allies.

The State Department is finding this easier said than done.

U. S. diplomats had been trying to get the Latin-American states to band together in a strong protest against West European trade with Cuba. But by helping whip up the trouble in Panama, Castro likely has prevented any strong, concerted action.

If Spain sells key items to Cuba the United States can shut off aid to Spain. "But there's a catch," says one official. "Our bases in Spain are tied in with aid. If we abolish the aid, what happens to our bases?"

During the past several months, government officials have looked into the possibility of breaking world sugar prices in an effort to cut

A political poll can be started in the early months to help stampede public opinion. But it can then save itself in the last 48 hours by claiming a "last minute switch" by voters.

CASE R-488: Dr. Philip M. Crane is our eldest living son. He now is an American History professor at Bradley University, but when he was home recently, we began discussing politics.

Philip is an ardent rooter for teaching American youth to place a halo on the bravery and self-sacrifice of our pioneer patriots.

Thus, he doesn't believe in sneering at Nathan Hale or John Paul Jones and the other Colonial Patriots.

But during those early months of the campaign, the poll can still be used as propaganda to help stampede public opinion in the opposite direction.

"It could deliberately select a higher percentage of its interviews in New York or New England where the liberal sentiment is highest.

"And as a result, it could subtly be helping stampede millions of Americans in the early days of the primary campaign, for most people remember the high batting average of the polls and thus tend to accept them uncritically.

"So a polling organization could utilize public credulity in trying to create an artificial support for one candidate vs. another.

"Then, if it failed to sway the tide against the undercurrent of inarticulate public opinion, it could scramble off the hot spot and always swing over by that neat argument that a last minute switch of opinion had occurred.

"Dad, couldn't this take place very easily?"

You Bible scholars are familiar with Doubting Thomas among Christ's 12 Apostles.

Well, here we have a Doubting Philip.

But he is entirely correct. If we could suddenly call for an unexpected election, I am inclined to the view that our famous polls would often be found sadly in error.

But because of the definite date for the fall election or National Conventions, there is always ample time for a last minute switch so the polling organization can still protect itself and ride the winner.

This established prestige of a respected polling organization, can thus be used very easily both to help generate opinion, as well as record it.

Thus, the polls in the early months could be manipulated readily, but that last 48-hour poll would obviously have to be free from such pressure if the poll were to be vindicated at the ballot box.

So, public opinion polls can be utilized for early propaganda purposes.

They can thus propagandize people's opinions in a previously planned direction.

Editor, Herald:

As an interested citizen I feel it important that as much information as possible be brought to the attention of the public in order that they may gain a better perspective of the issues. In this spirit I would like to submit another view of the fee system in relation to the budget system.

The fee system is in effect the system under which the departments of most of the counties of Florida operate. Therefore it is well that we try to gain an understanding of just what is meant by fee system.

Under this method of operation a fee is charged for the service rendered, which will cover the cost of that service. These fees are determined by the statutes. The statutory fees have changed very little in relation to time with few exceptions—variable factors in some instances.

The fee is paid by the person using the service, not the taxpayer in general. In areas where work is done for the county directly funds are usually budgeted by the county. However, in the course of operation under this system it is largely the responsibility of the department head to operate on what revenue is obtained from service fees.

According to the 1963 annual report of counties by the State Comptroller's office, at least 10 tax collectors did not earn enough fees to pay them their statutory salaries. The aforementioned counties could hardly support the various departments on a budget without increasing general taxes.

If through efficient operation, an office has an excess at the end of the year this excess goes into the general fund of the county and thereby contributes to the cash carry over for the county budget. The taxpayer is thereby spared the burden of services he did not use and has not been penalized, and the office has contributed to the operation of the county budget.

Of the several counties which have elected to go on the budget system, the 1963 annual report of the counties indicates that in many areas their operation has not been as effective. It has been stated by some department heads that initiative and incentive have been somewhat curtailed by that system.

The 1963 report is not yet published and may or may not support this trend. This is not to say that for some departments the budget system is not the best method. I merely point out that some departments by the nature of their services to the public are not as adaptable to this system.

The procedure usually involved in going on the budget system is one of setting up special legislation, as the Florida Statutes and the Constitution of Florida have already provided specifically, for the operation of the various offices. In the case of the tax collector's office, Section 193.02 provides that the tax collector shall submit his budget to the comptroller for his approval. This is the law.

However, special legislation can be enacted for individual counties to go on a complete budget system and submit a budget to the board of county commissioners. It is also possible for county offices to submit budgets to a special budget commission which is a non-policy making commission set up separately for that purpose.

Here again special legislation is needed. This to me would be a better system as it would tend to maintain the integrity and responsibility of the individual department heads.

I strongly feel whatever system is used that it be borne in mind that it is the intent of the law as it presently stands that the elected tax collector be vested with the full responsibility of this office. He and he alone is vested with the responsibility of running his office, setting the policies of that office, and administering the services for the public that the law specifically states that he must do.

This is an individual task assumed by the elected official, and one that he is pledged to fulfill. The importance of a "Yes" vote on the extended Seminole County telephone service survey has not been adequately explained to many subscribers who are eligible to vote. The following two important points are often overlooked.

First, all telephone rates are approved by a commission of the Florida State Government; the communication company only proposes rates on an equity basis. The average South Seminole subscriber is now paying much more than a Sanford subscriber (in some instances nearly double) for his telephone. He is already an Orlando municipal area subscriber, and for him the percentage increase in listings, under the proposal, is too small to effect rates. Consequently, South Seminole subscribers are not voting in this survey.

Second, communications barriers in Seminole County do tend to obstruct government operations, stymie civic activities and restrain trade. For example: South Seminole residents must call long distance in order to reach the county government, school board, hospital, health agency and employment office, all of which he supports taxwise. Similarly his call to a church, civic club, friend, etc. in the Sanford area is always a toll call. Along Highway 17-92, this frustrating but invisible barrier is located believe it or not) north of Dynatronics.

What all this eventually adds up to is that only Sanford and Geneva telephone subscribers are voting on whether it is worth while to remove this north-south communications barrier. An overwhelming "yes" vote would accomplish this, and it would in addition make working together toward common civic goals much easier. Conversely, a majority vote of "no" by Sanford is likely to be interpreted by South Seminole residents as a rather deliberate affront. I cannot believe that Sanford people want this to happen.

If reading the above has changed your viewpoint, then you should change your vote. Why not call the telephone company business office (322-9011) and ask how this is done? Some people have it ready done so.

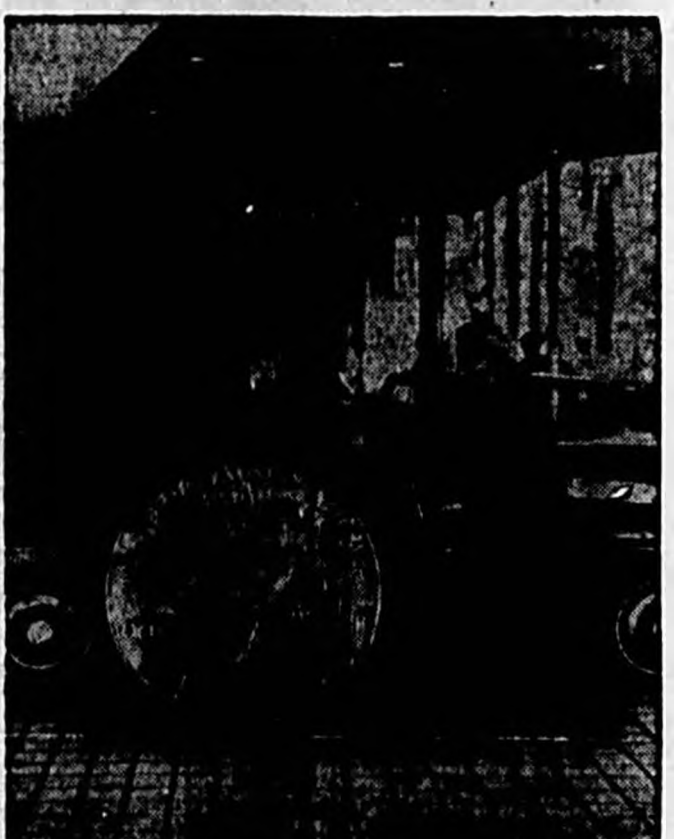

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Military Agrees Bomber Needed

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The nation's military chiefs are in unanimous agreement that the United States should press forward with work to design a new manned bomber as a successor to the B52 and B58.

The House Armed Services Committee released a testimony Tuesday in which the Air Force chief of staff, Gen. Curtis E. LeMay, said studies had strengthened the belief of the Joint Chiefs of Staff that a new bomber was urgently required for the 1970's.

The final decision on whether such work will be undertaken on the scale sought by the military leaders is up to Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara. He has put more stress on missiles than LeMay.

In a companion development, however, committee Chairman Carl Vinson, D-Ga., said LeMay and McNamara agree that America's missiles are reliable. Vinson said his committee shared this view.

"Witches do not exist," Robbins repeated Wednesday night.

The witches said nothing. But Hotfoot Jackson, a Jackdaw perched on Mrs. Leek's shoulder, took a pinch of snuff and squawked angrily at the professor.

"Ours is the only true religion," Mrs. Leek, who calls herself the "high priestess of the New Forest coven," said later. "There were 30 of us hearing him say we didn't exist."

Mrs. Leek said that Wednesday night wasn't the time for witchcraft.

"We meet only four times a year at full moon," she said. "Travel is easier then."

Then she left, ignoring two broomsticks placed outside the meeting room, and went home to the New Forest—by car.

 Hunting and fishing rules and regulations for the 1964-65 season will be discussed at 23 public meetings to be held throughout Florida by the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission during the months of March and April.

Five of these meetings will be held in Central Florida. The first is slated for March 4 at Palatka. The rest are: March 11 at DeLand, March 18 at Ocala, March 25 at Orlando, and April 1 at Iverness.

A. D. Aldrich, the commission's director, says these annual meetings represent an effort on the part of the commission to provide sportsmen of Florida an opportunity to express opinions and to play a role in establishing both hunting and fishing regulations.

The public meetings also provide the commission itself a chance to explain the reasoning behind certain regulations. The final 1964-65 rules and regulations will be established at a meeting of the commission in Tallahassee in late April—after all of the public meetings have been completed.

The early pre-regulations public meeting and the annual rules and regulations meeting serve several beneficial purposes. The public meetings in March and April permit sportsmen to voice opinions while memories of the last hunting season are still fresh. Also, the early meetings don't conflict with summer vacations. As a result the commission hopes it will have many more sportsmen in attendance.

So, you hunters and fishermen who have opinions, gripes, requests for clarification of regulations and rules, here's your chance!

CHICAGO (UPI) —Charles O. Finley, owner of the Kansas City Athletics, and Kansas City officials remained deadlocked today over terms for a stadium lease and the next move was up to Finley's fellow American League owners.

Finley Wednesday offered to forget—at least for the time being—attempts to move his club to Oakland, Calif., if the Kansas City fathers agreed to a two-year lease.

But Mayor Ius W. Davis of Kansas City gave Finley his usual answer—"No."

The American League owners meet Friday to consider what to do about Finley's failure to heed their order to sign a lease renewal with Kansas City by Feb. 15.

The millionaire insurance executive has been threatened with loss of his franchise for failure to comply but the outspoken Finley stated recently: "When the American League season opens, Charles O. Finley will be owner of the Athletics."

David Wednesday repeated the city's demands that Finley sign at least a four-year lease.

Mohair Requires Care When Sewing, Washing

Should I buy woven or knit fabric of mohair or a mohair sweater? What is mohair? How does it behave? How much does it cost? These are a few of the questions you need to ask yourself before you decide says Myrtle Wilson, Illinois Demonstration agent.

Mohair is the hair of the Angora goat. The fibers are wiry and lustrous. The kind of wear you will get from mohair will depend somewhat on whether it is a closely woven fabric or a very loosely knitted fabric.

All mohair fabric should be preshrunk before it is cut. After this has been done you can expect less shrinkage from the woven mohair fabric when cleaned.

All mohair shrinks. The loosest knit fabric shrinks a large amount when preshrunk. It is one of the most delicate fabrics for the professional cleaner to handle. Your dry cleaner must hand clean it and air dry it. Otherwise it will shrink a large amount when cleaned. Garments of mohair fabric may shrink a size smaller. All

knitted mohair is easily pulled. Hand cleaning demands more time and care. Because of this, cleaning charges are higher at most cleaning establishments.

Costwise, mohair is expensive. It is high style. Less wear can be expected from loosely knitted or woven mohair than from closely woven mohair. It is very expensive for one on a tight budget.

If you wish to sew on mohair, here are a few suggestions: preshrink fabric before cutting, it might be necessary to buy one-fourth to one-half yard extra for shrinkage allowance in four yards; underline the entire garment, you can do this by cutting the pattern of mohair, and cutting the pattern pieces from the underlining fabric; sew each of the pattern pieces cut from mohair to the underlining and stitch these together in the seam allowance, and then treat the two fabrics as one when constructing the garment.

A teaspoon of cream of tartar in the wash and rinse water crases rust stains from most clothes.

For marmalade measure 3 cups of stock into a large saucepan. Bring to a boil. Add 3 cups of sugar. Stir to dissolve sugar. Cook rapidly to 220 degrees F. on a candy thermometer or jelly thermometer. Remove from heat, cool to 100 degrees. Pour into clean jars and close with self-sealing lids.

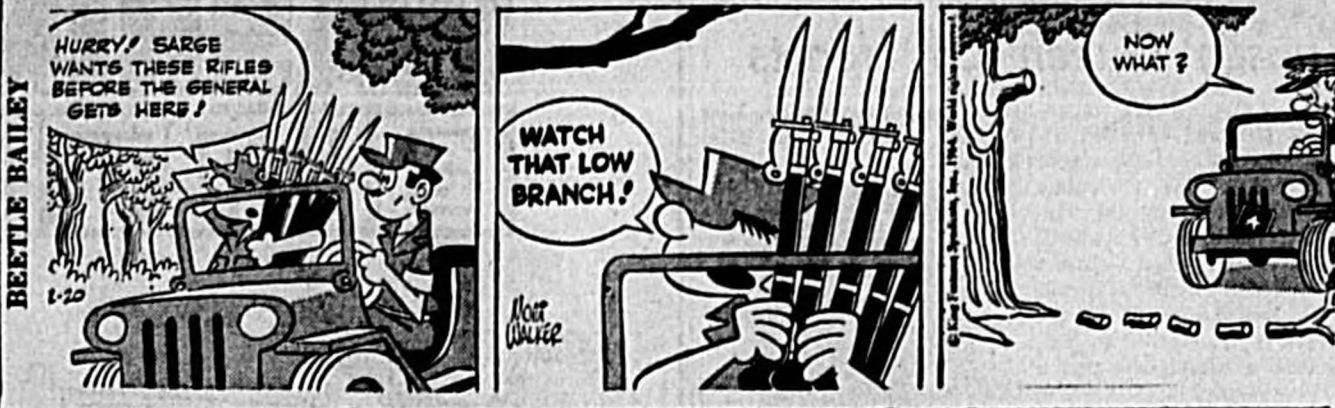

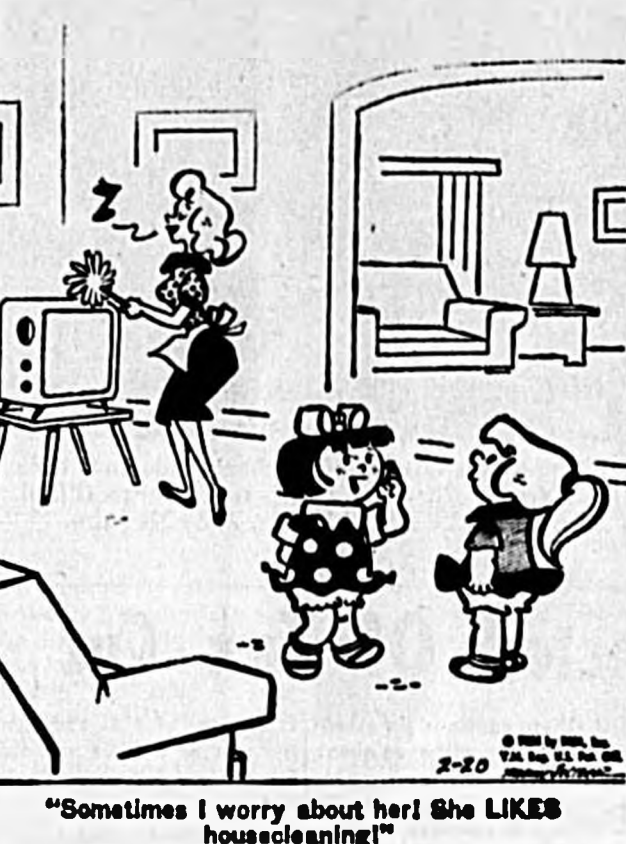

Quake Victims May Not Return

LAJES AIR BASE, Azores (UPI) — The islanders of nearby Sao Jorge escaped three days of destructive earth shocks without casualties, but many of the 1,500 who fled say they will never return, a U. S. Air Force spokesman said today.

This big U. S. Air Force base on the neighboring island of Terceira was a communications center for the rescue operation after the tremors began to jar Sao Jorge Sunday night.

Gale winds of up to 80 miles per hour kept rescue planes on the ground, but an international fleet bucked high waves to come to the aid of the islanders.

There are about 18,000 islanders remaining on Sao Jorge, a pencil-shaped island about twice the size of New York City's Manhattan with volcanoes at each end.

Most of the clay and wooden houses in the island's largest town, Vila das Velas, were destroyed.

One refugee said 4,000 to 5,000 head of cattle may have been killed.

Here's What Is Expected Of Tax Cut

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The administration is expecting big dividends from the tax cut. Among them: —\$20 billion more a year spending by Americans on television sets, automobiles,

shoes and other consumer goods.

—\$12 billion more invested each year in new industrial plant and equipment, new homes and new schools, roads and other public works.

—Between 2 and 3 million new jobs.

—\$3 billion more taxes for state and local governments.

—And, last but not least, \$12 billion more tax revenues for the federal government, canceling out the \$12 billion loss from the tax cut when it becomes fully effective.

Here is how administration economists figure it:

The cut in personal income taxes will put \$9.5 billion more in the hands of consumers. In addition, corporations are expected to pass along about \$1 billion of their \$2.4 billion tax reduction to stockholders in the form of increased dividends.

All-in-all, consumers will have about \$10.5 billion more to spend.

Demos Look To GOP For Votes

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Senate Democratic leaders are ready to give Republicans "full credit" if they furnish needed votes to crack an expected southern filibuster against the civil rights bill.

Democratic supporters of civil rights legislation believe the cause may be lost if the GOP does not produce about 25 votes to help an estimated 42 or 43 Democrats shut off a filibuster. They feel the GOP is "on the spot" to aid in getting the two-thirds majority needed to gag debate.

7 per cent of that and spend the rest or a little less than \$10 billion. But it won't end here.

The higher production of goods to meet this extra spending will mean more jobs, higher payrolls, bigger profits and higher incomes for farmers and professional and service people.

This added purchasing power will generate still further increases in spending and incomes in an endless, although diminishing, chain. Economists call this the "multiplier effect."

When it's all done, the initial \$10 billion increase is expected to produce about \$20 billion more consumer spending.
