WASHINGTON, JAN. 16.—The "do-nothing" Congress entered its sixth week today with a multitude of tasks awaiting action.

Summerall Leaves For Jacksonville To Receive Sword

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—(INS)—Maj. Gen. Charles P. Summerall chief of staff, left Washington today for Jacksonville, Fla., to receive tomorrow a sword to be presented to him in behalf of the Florida State Legislature and the people of the state. The award is made under a special act of the legislature in recognition of distinguished services in his capacity as Chief of Staff to the State of Florida and the nation at large.

HAGAN BECOMES CANDIDATE AGAIN FOR LEGISLATURE

Sanford, Jan. 16.—(INS)—Mr. Frank L. Hagan, representative from Seminole County, today announced for re-election from group two.

"One of the greatest needs of Florida at this time is a set of bank laws with teeth in them," said Mr. Hagan. "Under present statutes the interests of depositors in state banks are not adequately safeguarded and this is a condition that needs remedying. I shall work wholeheartedly to secure such legislation as will bring about a correction of this condition."

OFFICERS SEEK CULT HEAD FOR MORBID CRIME

Sanford, Jan. 16.—(INS)—Officers today began a search for a man in Bay county who was described as the head of a cult two months ago.

The man gave his name as Oscar Nelson, 45, of Chicago. He is described as answering minutely the description of the slayer. He was arrested by deputy sheriffs Andrew Carnody and Herman Nelson in Port Huron, where he was lodged in jail under heavy guard.

SOMEONE KILLED

WEST, Fla., Jan. 16.—(INS)—Police Chief Silas West died in a hospital here today of bullet wounds sustained last night when Perry Chumley, 23, was killed and another man slightly wounded during a pistol battle between Chumley, a companion, and police.
