Gives Kidney To Save Son's Life

BOSTON (UPI)—A father who sacrificed many of his possessions and a precious kidney to save his son from certain death began the longest wait of his life today.

Physicians at Peter Bent Brigham Hospital said it may be weeks or even months before they will be able to determine if the operation, believed to be the first father-son transplant, was a success.

Successful. Whether the transferred kidney will "take" is another question, doctors explained. The body tends to reject substances not grown within itself, in this case the new kidney. This tendency is greatly reduced when doctors deal with identical twins and to some extent in the cases of fraternal twins.

Should the transplant take effect, young Reck would still have to undergo further surgery for the removal of his diseased kidneys. The boy has been at the hospital since April 21 and recently was placed in a sterile room to reduce the danger of infection. The long delay between the admission and the actual operation was to provide time for various tests and to improve the boy's general health.

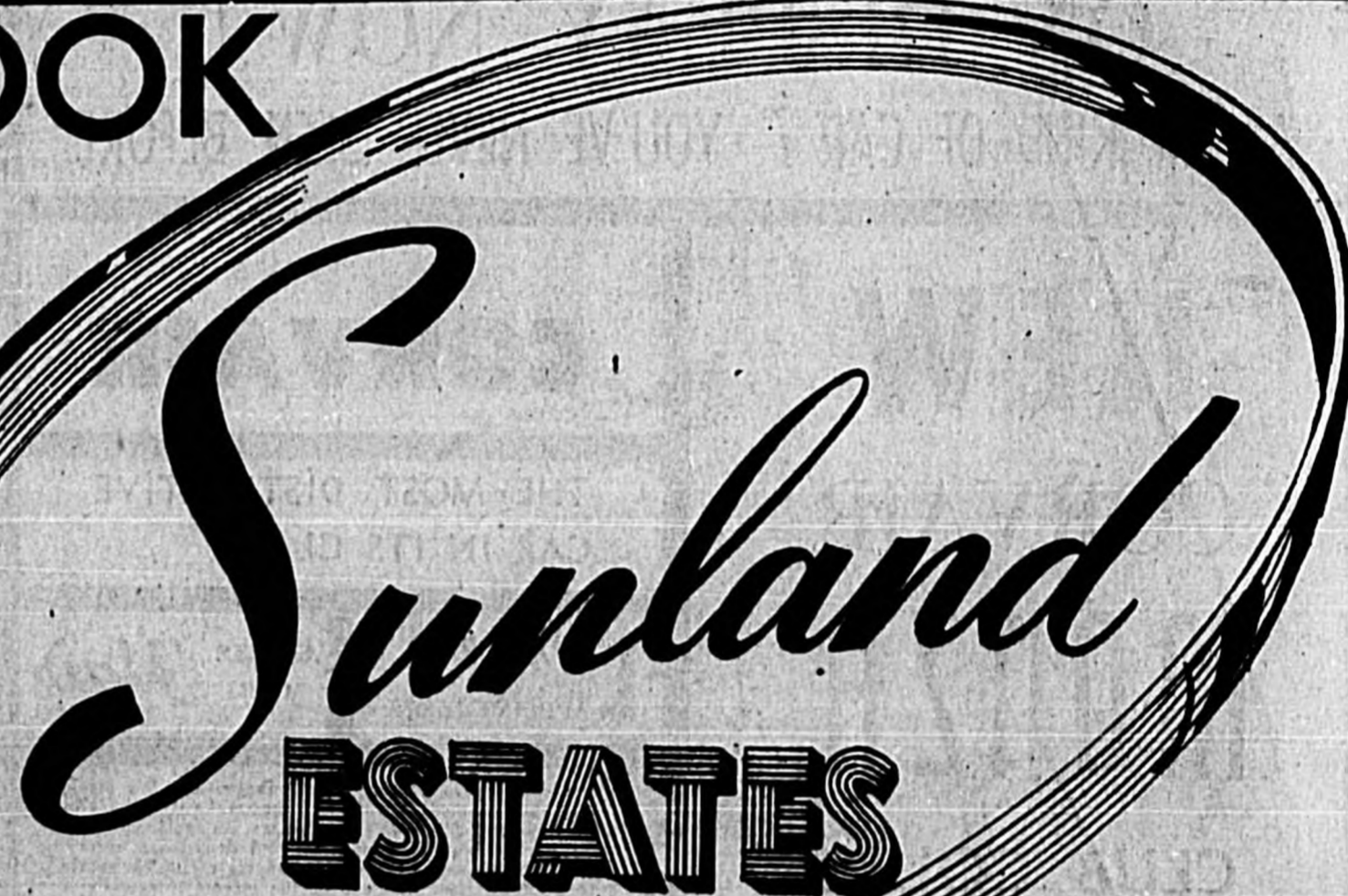

Command Change Day At SNAS Planned Tuesday

Tuesday will be change of command day at the Sanford Naval Air Station. Joint ceremonies will start at 9 a. m. with Cdr. F. D. Milner relieving Cdr. K. F. Rowell as commander of Heavy Attack Squadron Seven; Rowell will then relieve Capt. F. G. Edwards as commanding officer of Heavy Attack Squadron Three and Edwards will relieve Capt. James D. Capt. Ramage will take command of the USS Salisburg Sound in the Pacific later this month.

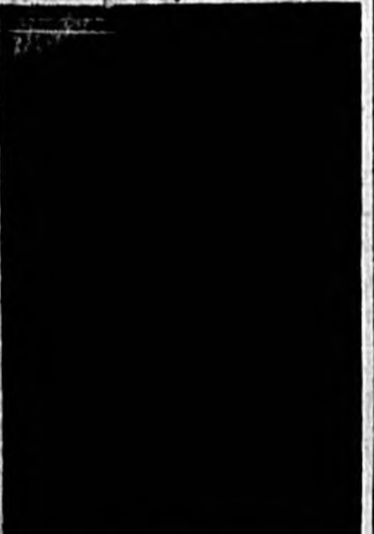

Machinists Strike Talks Continue

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (UPI)—Almost continuous negotiations since Saturday spurred hopes today that a settlement may be near in the week-long machinists strike at Convair.

Talks also were held with machinists at Douglas and Lockheed in efforts to head off threatened strikes at those large aircraft-manufacturing firms.

Although Convair and the International Association of Machinists were hopeful of a settlement in the near future, unrest spread at Convair to about 2,000 of its employees who are members of the Engineers and Architects Assn.

The EAA said it planned to go through with its "one-day-a-week" strike strategy by not showing up at work today—or any other Monday until a new work contract is negotiated.

Douglas Aircraft Co. was facing a strike threat of 12,000 of its machinists. They have said they would walk off the job Saturday at Douglas installations at Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif.; Cape Canaveral; White Sands, N. M.; Sacramento, Calif. and the Santa Monica, Calif., plant.

VFW Commander Named At Meet

ORLANDO (UPI)—C. N. Merinker of Eau Gallie is the new state commander of the Florida Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Merinker was elected Sunday night at the close of the VFW state convention here. Other new officers are Therle F. Holl, Lake Wales, senior vice commander; James M. Hiles, Dunedin, junior vice commander; and Sam Story, Lake Wales, national council member.

The Women's Auxiliary elected Mrs. Victor Meier of Miami president.

Nikita Backed

LONDON (UPI)—An unusually frank statement in a major Soviet newspaper indicated today Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev has recaptured a Kremlin majority for his policy of peaceful coexistence with the West.

More Industry Needed In Florida

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—A national research firm, finishing a \$10,000 survey for the state, said Florida will urgently need more manufacturing to furnish jobs for two million citizens it will add during the next decade.

The Arthur D. Little Co. of Cambridge, Mass., said the state's present population of 4,897,000 will expand to 7,140,000 by 1970.

Florida must grow beyond its present reliance on tourism and agriculture, the survey said, if jobs are to be found to meet this growth.

The firm said more tourists were coming to Florida each year, but said they were staying for shorter vacations and spending less money. Also cited were "signs of some overbuilding in the higher-priced tourist accommodations."

The firm predicted continued but slower growth in the value of state agriculture.

According to the survey, the state's 1970 population will still be most concentrated, as today, in the Gold Coast complex of Dade, Broward, Palm Beach and adjacent counties.

But the swiftest growth was predicted for the West Coast counties of Sarasota, Manatee, Charlotte, Lee and Collier.

The number of persons there will more than double within the decade, the researchers forecast.

The booming Cape Canaveral-Daytona Beach area will show the second fastest growth — 86 per cent — and the Tampa-St. Petersburg area will rise 72.7 per cent.

The state's population, said the survey, will grow 130,000 yearly due to new citizens moving in, and another 90,000 yearly because of that many more births than deaths among the residents.

Weighing its population forecast, the Little Company estimated

ed 885,000 new jobs will have to be created in Florida within the next 10 years. Manufacturing will have to account for a fourth of them, it said.

To amend what it called "weaknesses" in the present economy, the firm recommended higher wages for unskilled labor, changes in property tax rates to yield more local revenue for public services, and wider state control over land development companies.

In a special report section dealing with land, the report recommended the state exercise more authority in planning zoning and regulation of subdivisions and building codes.

Gov. LeRoy Collins, far whom the three month survey was made said the conclusions identify Florida as "the sunniest, healthiest and greenest state in America."

He commended it as a doctor's okay after a checkup on a healthy patient.

FCD Launches St. John's Flood Control Plan

A giant water control project for the upper St. John's River basin which would eliminate flooding and give a supply of fresh water to the area has been launched. Chamber of Commerce Manager John Krider said today.

The Central and South Florida Flood Control District, after surveying the area for seven years, sent its tentative plans to the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers late last week.

The plan, calling for four large reservoirs stretching between SR 46 in Seminole and Volusia Counties and extending to SR 60 in Indian River County, is subject to change by the engineers, Krider added.

Now that the plans have been submitted to the engineers, the next step will be to obtain federal approval of the project to get funds.

The FCD hopes that the project will insure an adequate supply of water for industrial demands and irrigation of farm lands in that area.

The reservoirs when completed will regulate water during dry spells and during excessive rainfall.

Krider said the plan would also contribute to the economic and urban development of that area and increase marketing values.

However, Krider added that it would be several years before actual construction can be started.

Argentina Puts Down Bloodless 'Pocket' Revolt

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (UPI)—President Arturo Frondisi crushed a bloodless "pocket revolt" by military forces in the city of San Luis in western Argentina today, just six hours before he was to leave for Europe. Not a shot was fired.

Most of the rebels fled, leaving in the hands of the government Gen. Mauricio Gomez, self-styled commander of the "Army of the Andes" and one of the two highest-ranking officers in the uprising.

Gen. Fortunato Giovannoni, a 66-year-old retired officer, had been "reinstated" as commander in chief by the rebels and the "Army of the Andes" proclaimed by them as the San Luis.

But the revolt, scarcely got off the ground, and Giovannoni disappeared with most of the rest of the rebels, including the "ministers" of his short-lived cabinet.

The rebels gained some success in the first few hours by arresting Gov. Alberto Domeneico of San Luis province and some of his ministers. But they received no additional support and their most intense campaign was waged orally over the radio.

The rebels captured a radio station known as LV 13 in San Luis shortly before midnight and announced they were staging a coup "against the Communist and Trotskyist government."

They said they had formed a "national revolutionary movement" to free Argentina "from Communists and Peronists" — the latter a reference to followers of deposed Dictator Juan D. Peron.

All the armed forces rallied to the defense of the Frondisi government, and the revolt was doomed to failure when it was unable to extend its influence to other areas. At 5:40 p. m. the radio stopped broadcasting rebel pronouncements.

Ten minutes later, Gov. Domeneico announced over the same station that he had resumed power and that the situation was normal again.

Virginia Marie Fajardo, 18, Ormond Beach entry and Sandra Ford, 18, of Daytona Beach were runner-ups in the contest.

The fire first started Saturday on a 15 acre tract of land, presumably caused by lightning, John Sizelove, ranger from the Longwood area, said.

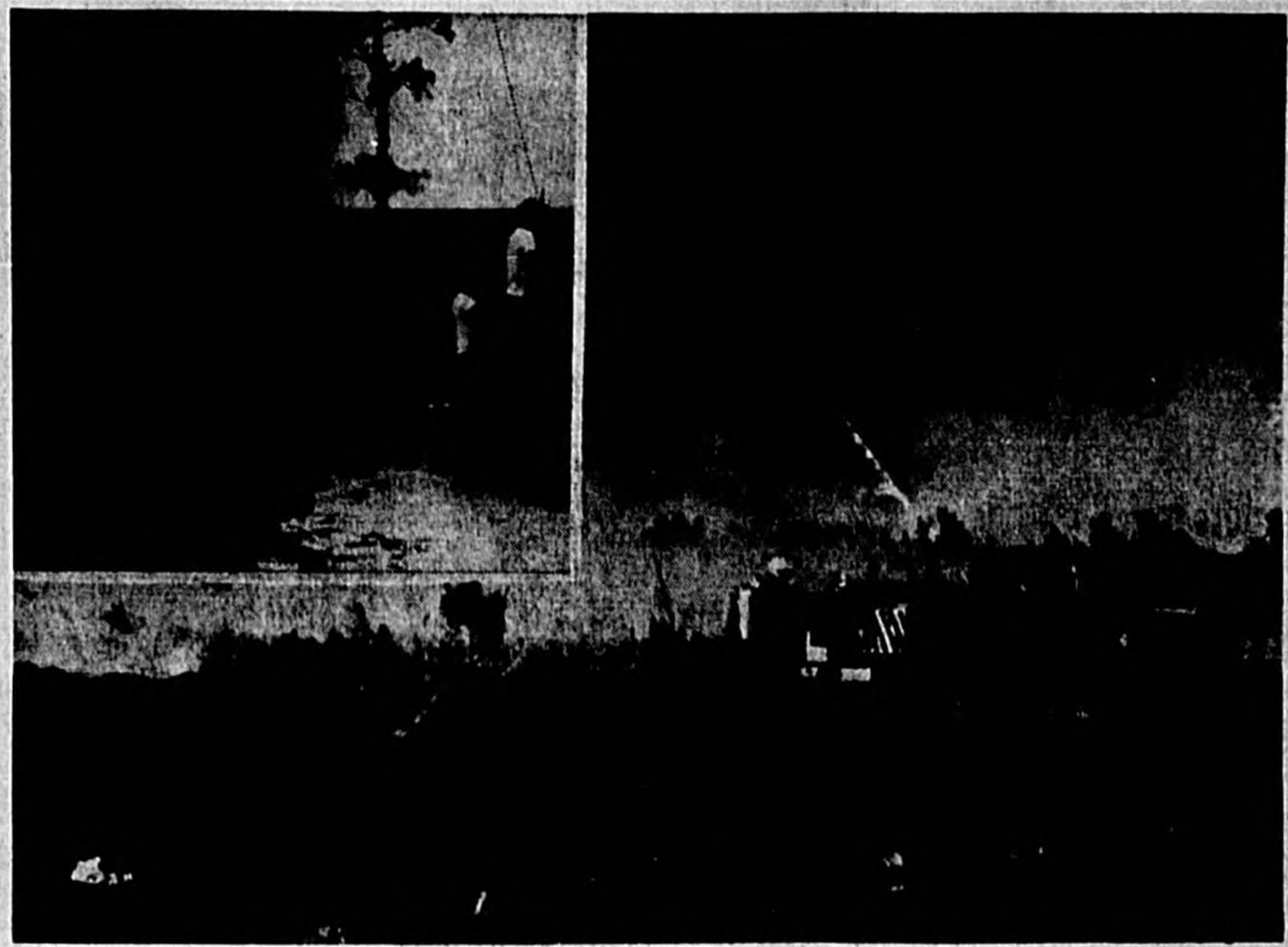
Sunday the fire again blazed and this time spread over a wider area covering more than 60 acres of land in that section.

"A small fire still burns deep in the swamp and muckland section of the acreage," Sizelove said, "however there is no longer any danger to homes or of the fire spreading."

Seminole County Ranger, A. L. McDowell of the Oviedo area assisted Sizelove in the two day woods fire.

"Our crews will remain in the area today to make certain the fire is completely snuffed out," Sizelove said.

Ike Opens Orient Tour

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (UPI)—President Eisenhower flies into the Orient today for the first visit of a United States Chief Executive to the ancient islands of the Far East and their multitude of 20th Century problems.

After spending the night at Elmendorf Air Force Base here in the nation's 49th state, the President's first Oriental port of call was Manila, metropolis of the Philippine republic, where a million or more Filipinos waited to give him a hearty welcome.

"Undaunted by recent riots in Japan against the U. S. - Japan security treaty, the President still was determined to go on to Tokyo, via Formosa and Okinawa, after his three days as guest of Philippine President Carlos P. Garcia.

Reports that Moscow and Peking propaganda organs were encouraging anti-Eisenhower demonstrations caused no major changes in the President's plans and for this he received accolades from the European press.

"This man has guts," said the London Daily Mirror.

"We tip our hat because of his personal courage," said the West German newspaper "Neue Presse."

Some revisions in Eisenhower's Japanese schedule were under consideration by the two governments, according to Press Secretary James C. Hagerty, but the basic plan of the visit beginning in Tokyo June 19 remained unchanged. Hagerty, however, may not be able to announce a detailed itinerary for Japan until shortly before the President prepares to leave the Philippines.

En route from Alaska to the Philippines today, the President's big silver and orange jet transport scheduled a refueling stop at Wake Island. The flight to Wake,

the tiny dot of land in the Pacific that leaped into history during World War II, is expected to take seven and one-half hours.

From Wake, the President has another long overwater flight (over six hours) to Clark Air Force Base in the Philippines where he will switch to a propeller-powered plane, the Columbine III, for a short hop into the Manila International Airport.

Japan Tightens Security Measures

TOKYO (UPI)—Indignation at the mob attack on James Hagerty swept Japan today and Prime Minister Nobusuke Kishi personally assumed command of security arrangements for President Eisenhower.

A spokesman for the opposition Socialist Party, which has sought to cancel the Eisenhower visit and topple the Kishi government, denounced Friday's demonstration although many Socialist members of Parliament were in the mob that attacked Hagerty's car.

"We regret such disgraceful action on the part of the demonstrators," said the spokesman, Seisuke Katsumata.

The Socialists said they would not go so far as to join a public welcome for Eisenhower but they would try to prevent any "deplorable" incidents.

Japanese newspapers were incensed and called the demonstration a national shame.

A widely-read column in the mass circulation Asahi newspaper, which bitterly opposed the Eisenhower visit, said the mob scene was "a barbarous act that makes it impossible for us to show our faces in public before other nations."

Philippines Ready To Welcome Ike

MANILA (UPI)—The Philippines was prepared today to give President Eisenhower the greatest welcoming celebration ever seen in this young, pro-American Asian republic.

Authorities predicted that a million-or-more Filipinos would jam Manila, many from remote rural areas, to catch a look at the American leader when he arrives here Tuesday.

"Only the weather can spoil things now," a jubilant government official told United Press International. He referred to a tropical depression which was lingering off the Philippines, and threatening heavy rainfall.

To the 24 million people of the Philippine nation, Eisenhower's visit will be one, big homecoming celebration. Eisenhower served in the Philippines as an Army major and lieutenant colonel in the late 1930s as an aide to Gen. Douglas MacArthur.

NEW YORK (UPI)—A spreading wildcat pilots' strike left Eastern Air Lines operations at a virtual standstill today in five major cities. About half the airline's flights were canceled Sunday as a result of the strike, which began Friday midnight and has continued despite instructions to pilots from their union to return to work.

Curtains Up
NEW YORK (UPI)—Curtains go up on Broadway tonight for the first time in 11 days. Nineteen of 22 plays and musicals playing when the Broadway blackout began June 2 were scheduled to resume. Three closed during the 11-day mass theater shutdown which climaxed a bitter contract dispute between Actors Equity and the League of New York Theaters.

Indian Riots
NEW DELHI (UPI)—More than 50,000 bearded Sikhs fought police for three hours Sunday in the worst riots in Delhi since Indian independence. One person was killed and 175 wounded. More than 1,000 Sikhs were detained. Delhi was placed under emergency regulations prohibiting demonstrations, processions, and gatherings of more than four persons.

Mrs. Roosevelt Endorses Adlai

NEW YORK (UPI)—Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt Thursday night endorsed Adlai E. Stevenson for the Democratic presidential nomination.

Mrs. Roosevelt called on Sen. John F. Kennedy to show "unselfishness" and give up running for the nomination. She urged Kennedy to be Stevenson's running mate.

Mrs. Roosevelt said a Stevenson-Kennedy ticket would be the strongest one the Democrats could nominate. She said this ticket was needed to beat the "tough and unscrupulous campaign" which she said could be expected to be waged by Vice President Richard M. Nixon, if he receives the Republican nomination.

Recruits Stage Anti-Red Riot

NEW DELHI (UPI)—Chinese and Tibetan recruits staged a bloody uprising against their Communist Chinese officers in several Tibetan camps, according to reports from India's northern border reaching here Wednesday.

Several Chinese officers were shot dead by their men, and several hundred Tibetan and Chinese recruits were killed in clashes, the reports said. One unconfirmed report said there were 2,000 casualties in one clash alone, including 800 Tibetans killed.

The reports came from Kalimpong, considered an international intelligence center, and Sikkim state. Kalimpong is on the main road from Tibet into northern India.

Bid Opening Set June 22 On Jet Facilities At NAS

Bids will be opened June 22 at the Sixth Naval District Public Works Office, Charleston, S. C., for construction of special facilities for checking the power of jet aircraft at the Marine Corps Air Station, Beaufort, S. C., and the Naval Air Station at Sanford, Glynco, Georgia; Jacksonville, and Key West.

Bids for each of the five facilities will be opened separately and are expected to be in the official approximate cost range of "between \$25,000 and \$100,000 each," Capt. John W. Gordanier, District Public Works Officer and District Civil Engineer reported.

The facilities are designed so that a jet plane can be tied down on a footing device and the engine let loose at full speed. Though the blast deflector gets a full blast of the jet, the concrete pad beneath the engine must be heat resistant or it will disintegrate.

In addition to the concrete pad, each contract calls for a bituminous or concrete paved access roadway, an anchor track for the deflector; excavation and fill, and other appurtenances.

The facility at Sanford will be the largest, with two movable steel blast deflectors. The others will have only one.

Sealed bids for providing all labor, equipment, and material, and for performing all work for the project will be received until 2:30 p. m. June 22 in the District Public Works Office, Building 13, U. S. Naval Base, Charleston.

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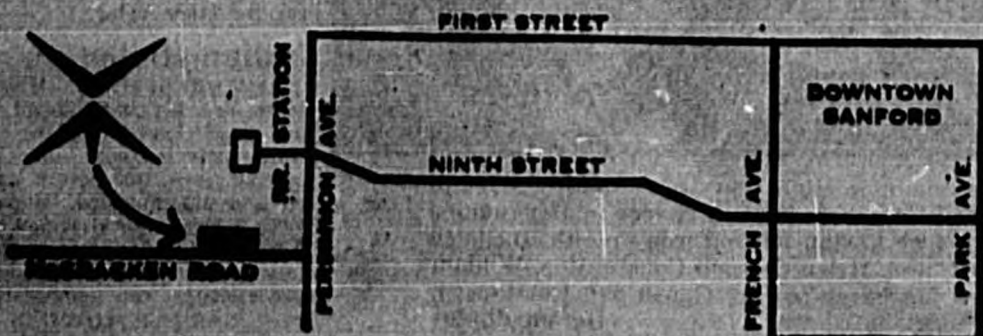

Natural Gas Hearings Open

JACKSONVILLE (UPI)—The Public Utilities Commission began today the first of 10 hearings which will help decide what Florida citizens will have to pay for natural gas.

The first utility company whose rate structure and operations came under study was Jacksonville Gas Co., a subsidiary of the Houston Corp. Houston pumps most of the gas distributed in Florida.

Houston has asked the Federal Power Commission for an 11 per cent increase in its Florida rates. The utilities commission lodged a strong protest last week against such an increase.

The commission said the request was premature since Houston has been operating in the state less than a year. It charged that Houston had led customers to believe its early rates would be lowered rather than raised.

The gas companies are under direction from the commission to submit at the hearings records of their operations, number of customers, income and other data.

Reds Taking Arms Talk Seriously

GENEVA (UPI)—The United States said today Russian persistence in an "all or nothing" stand on disarmament would be taken as a sign the Reds do not take the disarmament talks here seriously.

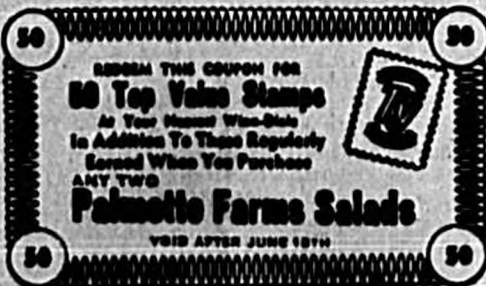

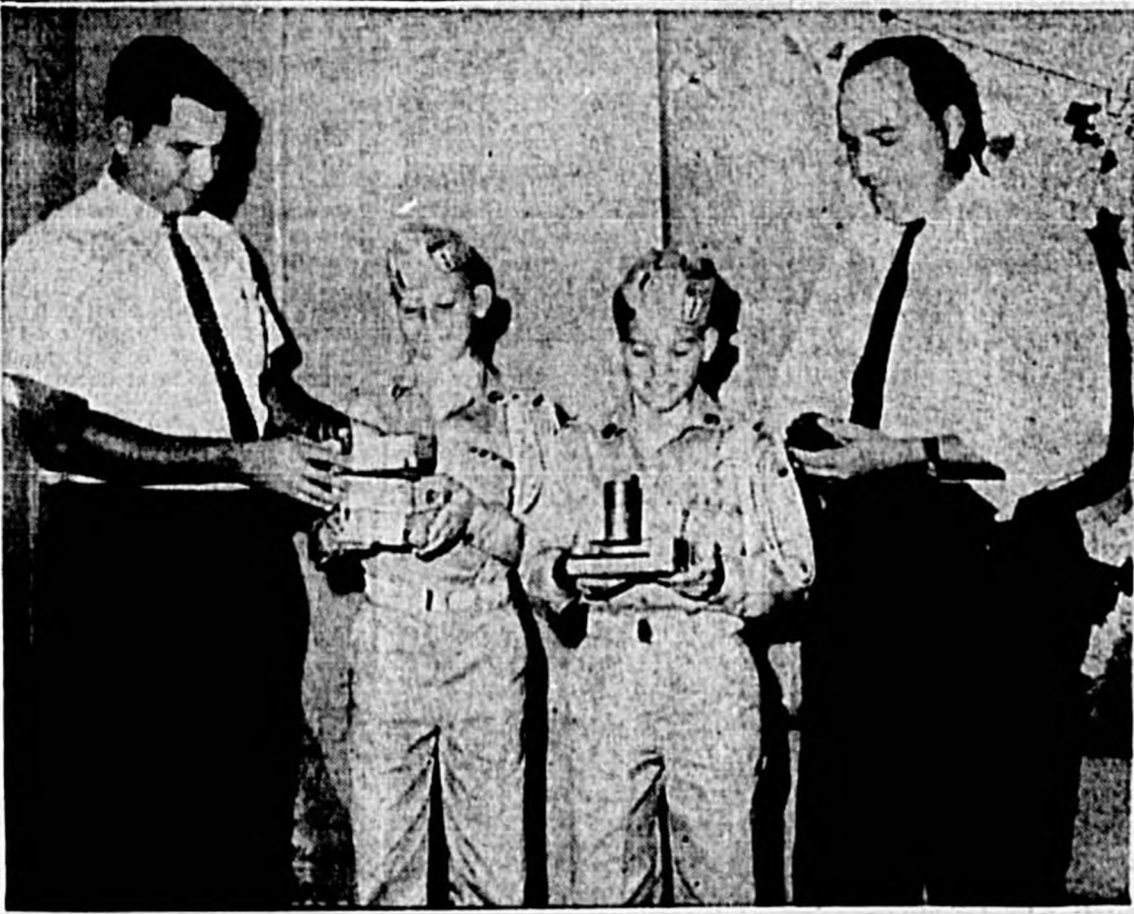

Butler Raps AMA For Closing Eyes On Drug Probe

MIAMI BEACH (UPI)—Democratic National Chairman Paul Butler warned a group of physicians Sunday, "If socialized medicine should come to America it may well be that the medical profession itself may have brought it about."

Butler's comment came in an address before the conference of presidents and officers of state medical associations, meeting here in conjunction with the American Medical Assn. convention.

Butler charged the AMA contributed to a growing shortage of doctors by its opposition to federal aid for medical schools in 1949 and 1951, and accused AMA members of closing their eyes to recent testimony before the Senate anti-trust and monopoly subcommittee concerning alleged drug profiteering.

The Democratic chairman was also critical of the record of the Eisenhower administration in the health field. He said the Republican approach to medical care seemed to be "it would be nice to be healthy if it didn't cost so much."

He called the administration's voluntary insurance plan "a feeble thing."

As to the AMA, Butler said neither it nor private insurance companies have "come up with a workable substitute (old age health care) plan although they have condemned a Democratic measure . . . which would go a long way toward meeting the problem."

Actor Says He's 'Tired Of Living'

VAN NUYS, Calif. (UPI)—Actor Richard Webb, who plays Captain Midnight on television, was arrested Sunday night when he wore a loaded revolver in a holster to greet police investigating a disturbing the peace report.

"I'm tired of living," the 48-year-old actor was reported to have said to Sgt. Kenneth Bouey. "I want to draw my gun and start shooting."

Bouey tricked Webb to turn around and he and five other officers jumped the armed actor and carried him off to jail on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon.

Thousands Pray For Ike On Tour

LOGANSPORT, Ind. (UPI)—Thousands of church-goers of all denominations prayed Sunday for President Eisenhower's safety on his Far Eastern trip.

They were joined by former President Harry S. Truman who held a commencement audience at Michigan State University to remember the President in their prayers.

"I sincerely hope you will pray for his safe return," Truman said, drawing hearty applause from the crowd of 17,000 at East Lansing, Mich.

Plans for the special prayers in the Logansport area were started by the Rev. Tom Weigand, pastor of the Wheatland Ave. Methodist Church and president of the Cass County Ministerial Assn.

Churchmen of other faiths quickly agreed to offer up invocations at Sunday services.

The Rev. Dr. M. L. Robinson of the Baptist Temple prayed that the President "will have a receptive welcome particularly in Japan . . . and that out of his trip may

Navy's Research Balloon Still Refusing To Return To Earth

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (UPI)—The Navy's research balloon "Skyhook Glynco" bobbed high in the sky over the Pacific today, refusing to return to earth with its valuable cargo.

The balloon, 40 stories tall and carrying a two-ton gondola crammed with cosmic ray research instruments, has spent the past two days oscillating between 50,000 and 60,000 feet.

It was staying in an area about 500 miles west of this coastal city—and about 2,000 miles west of Houston, Tex., where the Navy had hoped to recover it one week ago.

It was launched June 5 from Glynco Naval Air Station at Brunswick, Ga.

A crew of 16 Navy men chased it clear across the country in a vain attempt to get the wayward balloon and its valuable scientific cargo back to earth.

A planned explosive charge to separate the gondola Tuesday near Houston failed. The Navy said the ordinary life expectancy of such balloons was three days, but "Skyhook Glynco" has floated merrily along.

The instruments record cosmic

ray activity. Already they have been working longer than any others, and the Navy said they become more valuable the longer they stay up.

With radar and radio signal beacons keeping a close track on the balloon's movements, the Navy was prepared to wait it out.

"The gondola is designed to float, so we'll just stay around until it comes down," said an officer.

Tampa To Start Helicopter Service

TAMPA (UPI)—The Tampa Bay area will be the first in the nation to employ a multi-city jet helicopter service.

James P. Van Pelt, president of the Air Florida, Inc., airline, said Wednesday the four-passenger helicopter will service Tampa, St. Petersburg, Clearwater, Sarasota and Bradenton.

He said two French-made Alouette 2-C models, costing \$125,000, will arrive within the next 10 days and test flights will begin immediately.

Van Pelt said sites for the heliports, which will be ready when service begins, are being surveyed.

Carl T. Hensen, 38, Philadelphia, Pa., was named chief pilot. Hensen has 19 years of flying experience and has logged 3,050 hours in helicopters.

Van Pelt said other cities have been using non-jet helicopter service within their boundaries.

He said estimated flying times from Tampa International Airport to St. Petersburg would be 12 minutes; to Clearwater, 12; to Sarasota, 26; to Bradenton, 22; and to downtown Tampa, three.

Housing Bill Gets Approval

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A House Banking subcommittee Thursday approved an administration-opposed \$1,285,000,000 housing bill which, for the first time, would extend "no down-payment" financing to non-veteran home-buyers.

The catch-all bill was approved by voice vote. Five Democrats and one Republican attended the subcommittee session. The bill is expected to clear the full committee next Tuesday.

Stiles, 44, was suspended recently after the Post Office took offense at publication of his picture in the nudist magazine "Sunshine and Health."
