"There are some people who feel that false "patriots" have too often been the first to "wave the flag." That even some honest men are too quick to invoke "flag and country" to support their views when it is obvious to most that their opposition is

every bit as patriotic.

Because some deliberately or intentionally mock patriotism, others sky away from patriotic expressions,

But it need not be so. For every one of us, flying the American flag in front of our homes can be our aimple expression of belief in the basic rightness of democracy as we know it in the United States.

Not perfect, for man is not perfect; not easily described, for it is dynamic — ever changing, ever moving, getting better. It is not exactly the same for everyone and each of us from our own background and experience feel just a little different about our country.

about our country.

But for all of us there is a basic belief that in the United States we have something special even though it may be a little different for each

we think a good way to express this feeling, this belief in American democracy is to fly the American flag as the symbol for that which represents our highest ideals.

A Wrong Slant

According to two separate acunts, a young Negro is reported to have told Attorney General Robert Kennedy that he felt no obligation to help liberate Cubans - if it should ever come to that — so long as the United States failed to assure the Negro's full freedom.

It is said that the attorney gen-

eral's reported shock at this state-ment produced an unbridgeable gap between him and a group of northern Negroes he was meeting in New York.

Though it is not an easy thing to do, we ought to try to take the young Negro's proposition out of its purely racial context and examine it for what it is.

He is saying that he will not sup-

port his country (a Cuban enterprise is only an example) so long as it deals imperfectly with rights and privileges the federal courts have said were his.

By that reasoning, any individual American could argue that, at any time when he feels deprived of rights and privileges, he is freed of duty to his nation. This might be so whether he was acting individually or as a member of a racial, religious, foreign - born minority or other

Let's put it more bluntly: This amounts to saying that a nation still flawed by imperfection a owed nothing by its citizens if they happen to be affected by those flaws. In a highly imperfect world this is a seriously unreasonable proposition, What if the argument were taken out of the area of constitutional protections into, say, the economic sphere? What if millions of unemployed people said:

"This country won't provide us with work. Therefore we won't fight its wars, pay the taxes it demands, or respond to any other demands it

may make"? Seldom if ever does any people or community or nation realize in full its purpose and ideals. But our community and national life would quick-ly disintegrate if we, as citizens, were to say we would not fulfill our obligations unless all was perfect.

There is another side to this. A-long with rights and privileges go duties and responsibilities. What if the government were to

"You citizens who are not fulfilling your responsibilities hereby are formally deprived of your rights until you measure up."

There are plenty of Americans of every creed and color who do not in fact measure up in 1963. Does the government of city, state or nation therefore strip them of their rights? Only when they are convicted crim-
