LBJ Optimistic Over Vietnam Problems

JOHNSON CITY, Tenn. (AP) — President Johnson, declaring the Communists know they cannot win a military victory in Vietnam, has voiced optimism that "we are on the way" to solving the Vietnamese problem.

Johnson planned a series of Vietnam conferences at his ranch home near here tonight, according to Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara, saying Ambassador W. Averell Harriman and other military and diplomatic advisers for an overnight business visit.

The President expressed an optimistic view of the war during a news conference Tuesday on the front lawn of his ranch — a session presided by a Johnson staffer served by Mrs. Johnson and daughter Luci.

Other conference highlights: —Discussing racial problems throughout the country. In the four months between now and the November elections, he said that if he continues his recent travel rate, he could cover all 50 states by late October.

—The latest budget deficit, he reported, will be "far below" the \$6.4-billion estimate he gave Congress in January. He said

U. S. Must Halt Aggression In Vietnam: Humphrey

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey told the nation's governors today that the United States has the initiative in Vietnam and must stay and fight there until it has stopped the aggression from the North.

The vice president, in an address to the 39th annual Governors' Conference, said that because of a series of "smash-and-grab" attacks by the Viet Cong, the

initiative in the conflict clearly "has shifted to the allied forces."

The governors are considering a resolution in support of President Johnson's Southeast Asia policy.

As a representative of the President, who canceled a visit to the conference session, Humphrey launched a defense in depth of the President's course in a war most of the governors

said the people want ended, fight, but not vigorously," he said. "I am not sure whether they fully support a half war or give half-way support to a full war."

"I say that we must stay and fight and work in South Vietnam until we have achieved our objective—the halt of aggression from the North, the independence of South Vietnam and peace in Southeast Asia."

"There are those who suggest that we should stay, but be quiet about it—that we should

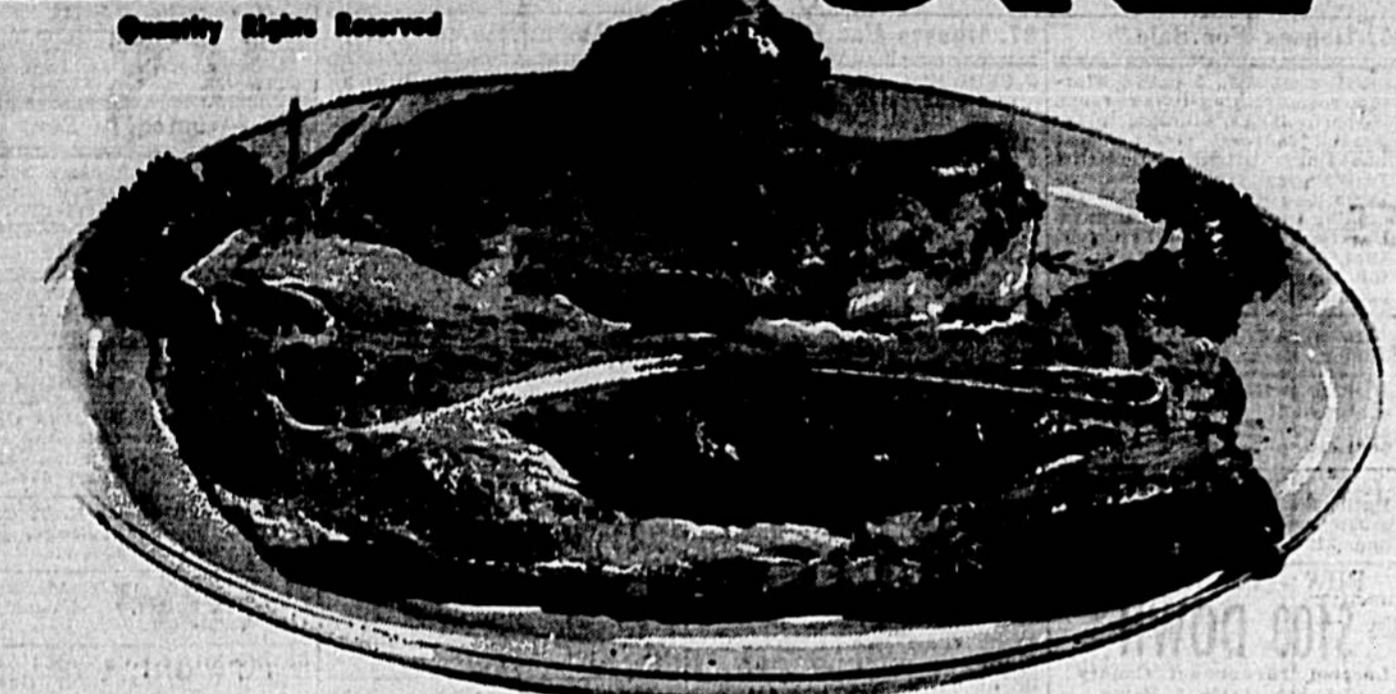

Benefits For Veterans - 2

Completed Service Opens Educational Doors To GIs

WASHINGTON — (NEA)—The day of education under the "GI Bill" is back. The new legislation in federal benefits for veterans opens the doors of colleges and specialized training schools to more than 10 million after World War II and Korea.

Now similar aid is available to the sons and young brothers of those who helped a generation ago. These benefits for post-Korea veterans of active duty with U.S. military forces began June 1.

By 1967, some 6 1/2 million men and women are expected to be eligible for these educational benefits. For some, GI Bill "scholarships" will be worth up to \$5,000 over four years.



Library Of Congress Splitting At Seams

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Library of Congress, growing at the knowledge-explosion rate of a million items a year, is splitting its marble-walled seams. Help is in sight, but far off. After a decade of talk, Congress has approved in principle a new building that may contain the library's expansion for 25 years.

You may take grade school, high school, college, graduate or postgraduate courses. You may attend a trade, vocational or technical school.

You may take co-operative courses, combining full time school with alternate phases of training in a business or industrial establishment. But these co-operative courses must be full-time.

Apprentice or, other on-the-job training is not covered, either in a shop or on a farm. In some cases, you may even study abroad.

But whether in the United States or abroad, you must study at an approved school. You are eligible for these benefits if you were on active duty with the U.S. Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines or Coast Guard for 181 days or more since Jan. 31, 1955, and are now a civilian.

New and future draftees and volunteers will become eligible as they complete these requirements.

But if you have been discharged from active duty since Jan. 31, 1955, for a service-connected disability you are eligible for the full 36 months of educational benefits regardless of how long you may have served. You are also entitled to vocational rehabilitation. This benefit will also apply to future disabled veterans.

A veteran who remains on active duty after the completion of two years of active-duty service is eligible for a full 36 months of educational benefits while still on active duty for training as a 6-month's reservist is not thereby eligible for any benefits.

However, courses in applied music, physical education and public speaking are eligible if offered by institutions of higher learning. For credit as an integral part of a program leading to an educational objective.

Fight training is covered unless taken for credit toward a college degree.

Navy Jets Again Hit Oil Depot

A U.S. spokesman said four Skyhawks from the aircraft carrier Hancock struck the fuel installation at 1 p.m. and that pilots reported "all bombs on target."

The spokesman said one Skyhawk was shot down by anti-aircraft fire but the pilot was rescued.

Pilots reported smoke from the depot rose 20,000 feet and a fireball erupted from a second explosion, the spokesman said.

He said pilots saw no ships at the pier near the oil depot but that there were three ships in the outer harbor. The ships apparently were not attacked.

Earlier the U.S. command announced American planes flew a record 113 missiles against North Viet Nam Wednesday and slotted four air bases to destroy ground targets.

The three pilots were listed as missing.

The U.S. command again reported no significant ground action by American forces.

Assessors Get Word On Taxes

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — County assessors were expected to get the official word on how to put 100 per cent property tax assessments into effect this year during a meeting with Comptroller Dickinson today.

"We have got to do the job this year," Dickinson declared Wednesday as he made final preparations for the meeting, which will have an economic impact on most counties in the state.

The comptroller said he expected to get the assessors the necessary tools to do the job. He gave no indication of what he planned to say to the assessors but said the "contemplated program of action will be quite far afield from anything any comptroller has ever done."

The State Supreme Court, in a ruling last month ordered Dickinson to comply with the legal requirement for full valuation. "If I had done this, I would have given them (the assessors) more than one year to get their houses in order," said Dickinson, noting that the law requiring 100 per cent property tax valuation has not been previously enforced.

"But," he added, "the court has given them a time schedule of this year and that's that."

The court said that only eight counties had completed reassessment. It said the counties with 100 per cent valuations were Alachua, Baker, Bradford, Duval, Hendry, Orange, Palm Beach and Union.

(Mrs. Mary Earle Walker, Seminole County tax assessor, is attending the Tallahassee conference. She has claimed Seminole property is assessed at "just" valuations.)
