

Sanford Marine Writes Home

(Editor's note: Letters from "Sanford" Marine fighting in South Vietnam to his mother offer a graphic word picture of the conflict. So much so, that his mother has agreed to share the letters with the Sanford Herald readers. Here is the first; five others will follow on a daily basis.)

Dear Ma,
 Just a short letter to let you know I'm still here. (Know) I'm slight — have practically no time to write letters — things have really been "happening!" So I'm afraid you and Joyce won't be getting mail from me very often — unless things cool off.

I spent 3 or 4 days in Okinawa, one day in Da Nang, and now I'm in An Hoa with my unit, which is about 30 mi. or so South of Da Nang. We're having a terrible time with the NVA (North Vietnamese Army) here — you wouldn't believe it until you lived through one afternoon.

Today it was 105 degrees — in the shade. Once the monsoon season hits — a few months from now — things will cool off.

I'm living for the day I can have something "ice-cold" to drink again — that's all you think about — something "ice-cold!"

It chills your bones and does something to you — to hear and see the incoming rocket and mortar rains hit and hear everything up. You just pray you aren't within the 135 yard (Continued on Page 2A, Col. 4)

Change Orders Eyed

Architect Eoghan Kelley will be given the word by the Casselberry City Council in work session at 7:30 tonight on which change orders will be approved for the new \$230,000 city hall complex.

The architect and Council wrangled for more than an hour last Monday night over the change orders which would add some \$3,000 plus to the cost of the facility.

Councilman Louis Kirby noting that the city government is going to be hard-pressed to find additional funds for the complex, asked why many of the items had not been included in the original plans for the building.

Kelley said he had spent many hours on the plans and had attempted to please all concerned. In a dramatic statement following close questioning on the complex plans, Kelley said he would not charge architect's fees for the changes.

"It's on the house, gentlemen."

Another matter to be discussed by Council this evening will be the complaints of citizens of the community concerning the garbage service.

The timing of a charter revision committee for the changing of the city charter is also expected to receive attention from the five-member commission, which will be held in the absence of W. E. Knowles, city manager, who is attending a southeastern housing conference in Memphis this first part of the week.

Knowles is expected to return Wednesday.

Stamp Tax Up 15% In Area Collection

Documentary stamp tax collections increased nearly 15 percent in Seminole County during the month of May, Fred O. (Bud) Dickinson, comptroller, reports. The Seminole increase topped substantially the statewide increase of 12 percent.

Total collected locally in May from the stamp collections was \$21,918.55 compared with \$19,105.65 during the same month last year.

Surtax receipts, at the same time, were \$9,149.85.

The stamp tax, levied on deeds, notes and other written obligations of payment, Dickinson said, is generally a good economic indicator as a whole.

The surtax is a separate tax imposed on realty transfers, and replaces a former wholesale sporting goods tax.

Fern Park P. O. Burglary Probe Is Continued

Sheriff John Polk said today his department is checking out several leads in hopes of solving the burglary of approximately \$10,000 in stamps, cash and money orders taken Thursday by a yeggo who opened two safes after entering the Fern Park Post Office, located near the Orlando Seminole Jail Alai Prison near U.S. Highway 17-92.

Polk stated "If certain leads pan out, we might be able to make a quick arrest."

While not revealing the nature of the evidence, the sheriff said "Certain pieces of evidence gathered by investigators at the scene and other reports on the background of possible suspects are being checked out."

J. Q. (Bill) Galloway, chief county investigator, said at least four persons were involved in the robbery, which was well planned.

Polk said walkie-talkie units were used by the burglars as several batteries, like the type found in the units, were found near the scene.

The sheriff said Postal Inspector W. R. Ritchie was also probing the federal offense.

Polk said the entire operation showed signs of professionalism by the yeggo, who took the contents of two safes, and left a third, which they could not open.

Burglars Active On Weekend

At least three burglaries were successful and a fourth was thwarted during the weekend, according to Seminole sheriff's department and Sanford police records.

A child's scream apparently frightened away a would-be intruder who attempted to enter a window at the rear of the Barbara Wilson home, 1019 Cedar Avenue.

Sanford police investigating the report received early Sunday found a small foot print under the window, which had a screen and curtains removed.

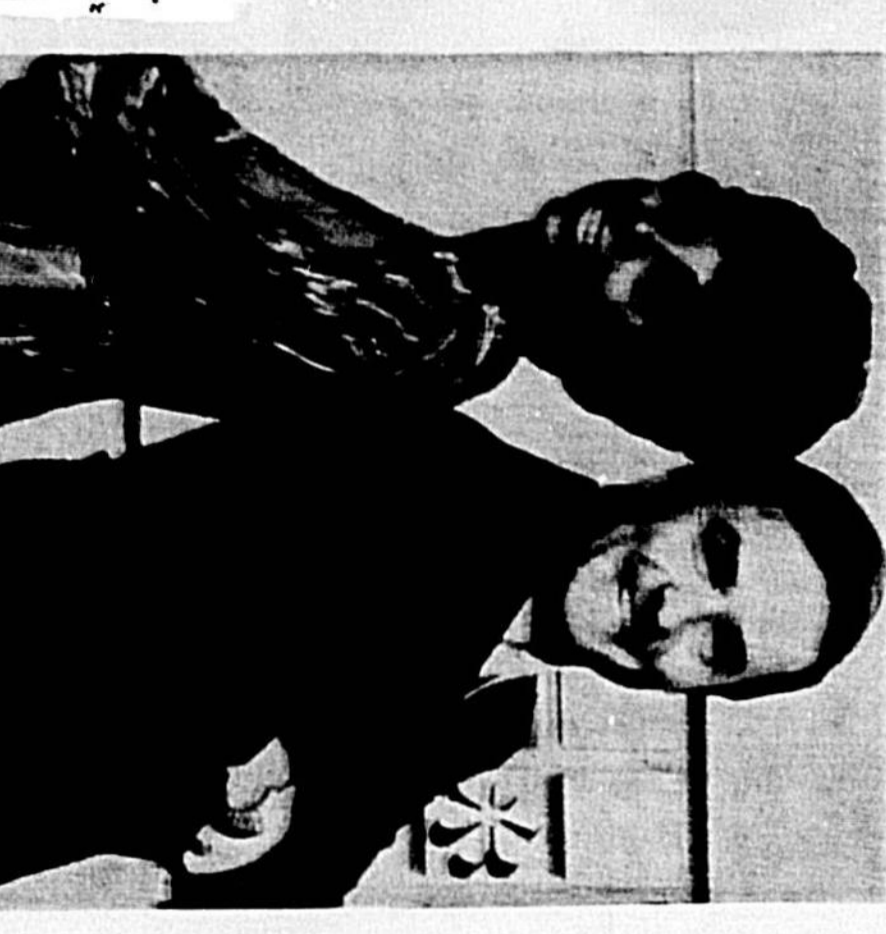

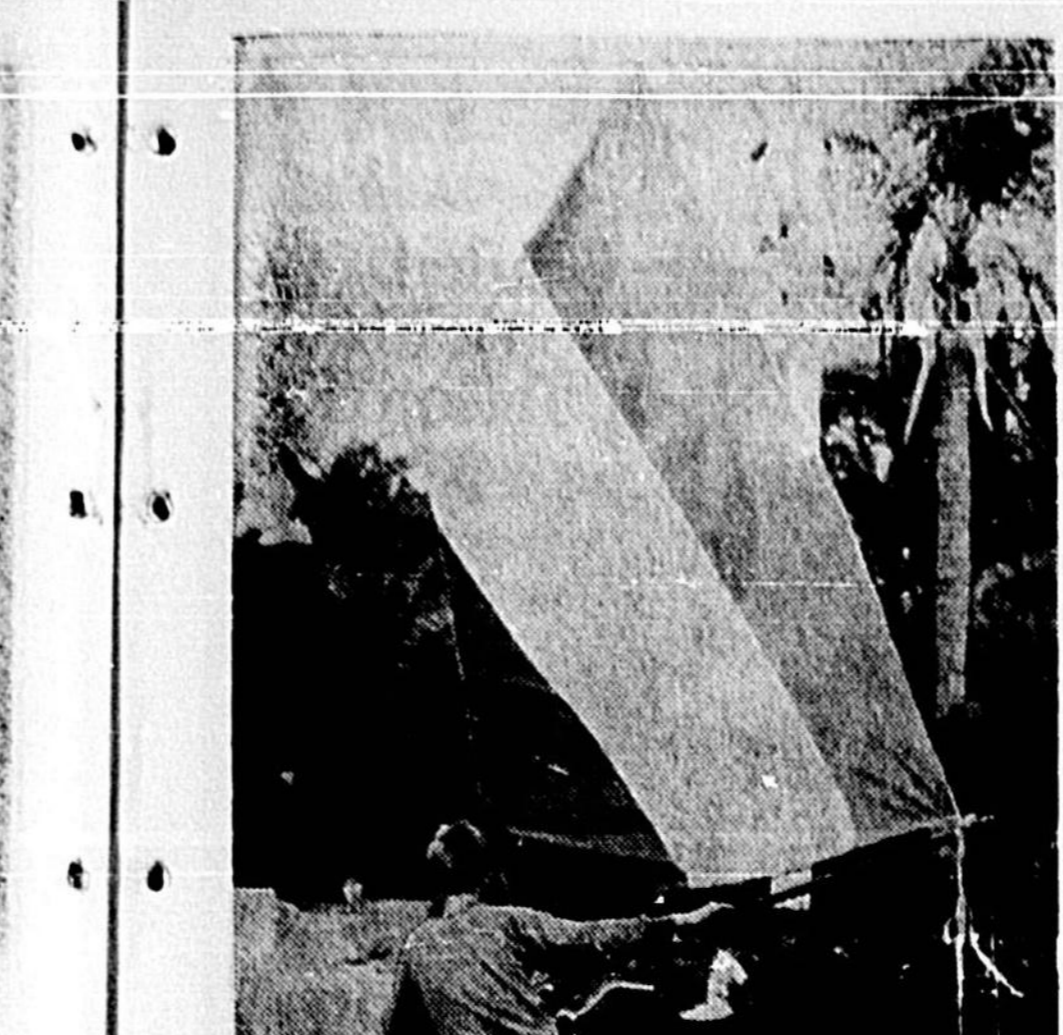

14 Die In Auto Mishaps

An automobile and a pickup truck collided near Haines City Saturday night, killing three persons, and a gasoline tanker crushed a car near Fort Lauderdale, killing a man and his wife.

They were among 14 persons who died in traffic mishaps on Florida highways during the weekend.

Dead in the accident nine miles north of Haines City were Thurman William McKinley, 42, and his son, Warren, 12, of Cleveland, and Joe Louis Blake, 31, of Winter Haven.

Lawrence Elmer Dann, 70, and his wife, Elizabeth, 85, of Pompano Beach, were crushed to death when a gasoline tanker blew a tire and jackknifed into their car, flattening the car to less than two feet.

The accident occurred at State Road 84 and 130th St. in Broward County.

A two-car collision in West Melbourne killed Lois Maddox Reeves, 24, of that city.

Cynthia Anne Copley, 4, was killed when a car was struck by a utility pole in her home town of Cape Canaveral.

Robert E. Creel, 25, of North Miami, was killed when his car hit a utility pole in Miami and Amanda Ernest Balthour, 18, of Miami, was killed when his car struck a tree.

Thomas Claunch, 33, died when his car crashed into a palm tree in West Palm Beach. Henry C. Richardson Jr., 36, of West Palm Beach, was killed when his car was struck by a Florida East Coast Railway freight train in that city.

Stetson Prexy Dies In Two-Car Collision

LONDON, Ky. (AP)—Paul F. Geren, who forced resignation as president of Stetson University at DeLand, Fla., was to have become effective today, was fatally injured Sunday in a two-car collision near here.

Geren's wife and daughter, Nancy, 17, were en route to Lexington, Ky., to visit his sister, Mrs. Marion Blighen, when their car collided with one from Columbus, Ohio, at a point where U.S. Highway 25 narrows from three to two lanes seven miles north of London.

Geren's widow, Elizabeth, 51, was hospitalized with a broken arm and two broken ribs. She was reported in fair condition.

Their daughter was in good condition and suffered only bruises. Listed as critical in a Lexington hospital was Lewis Stetson Jr., 30, his father, Lewis, 46; mother, Jane, 40, and sister, Lorie, 8, were also hospitalized.

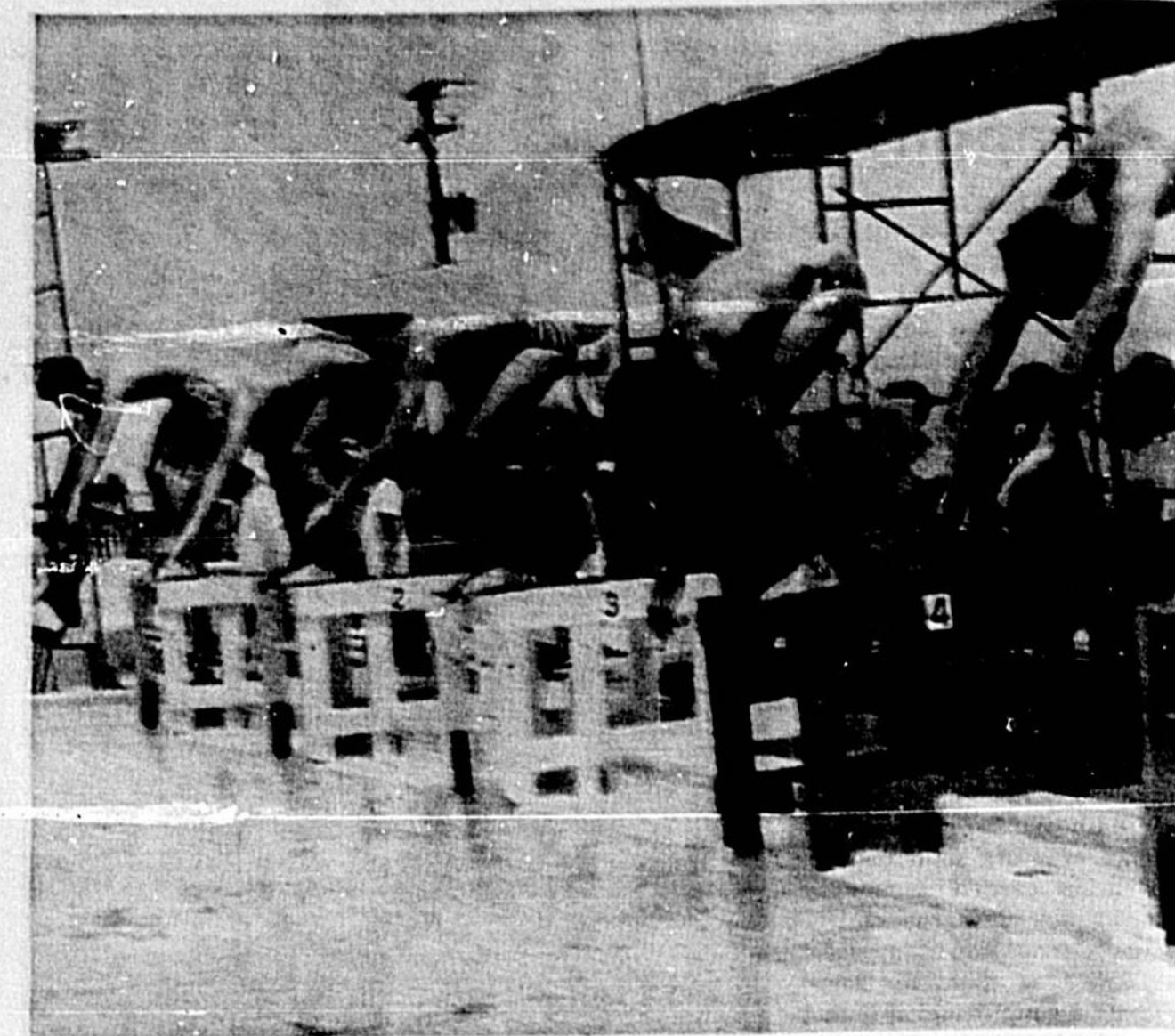

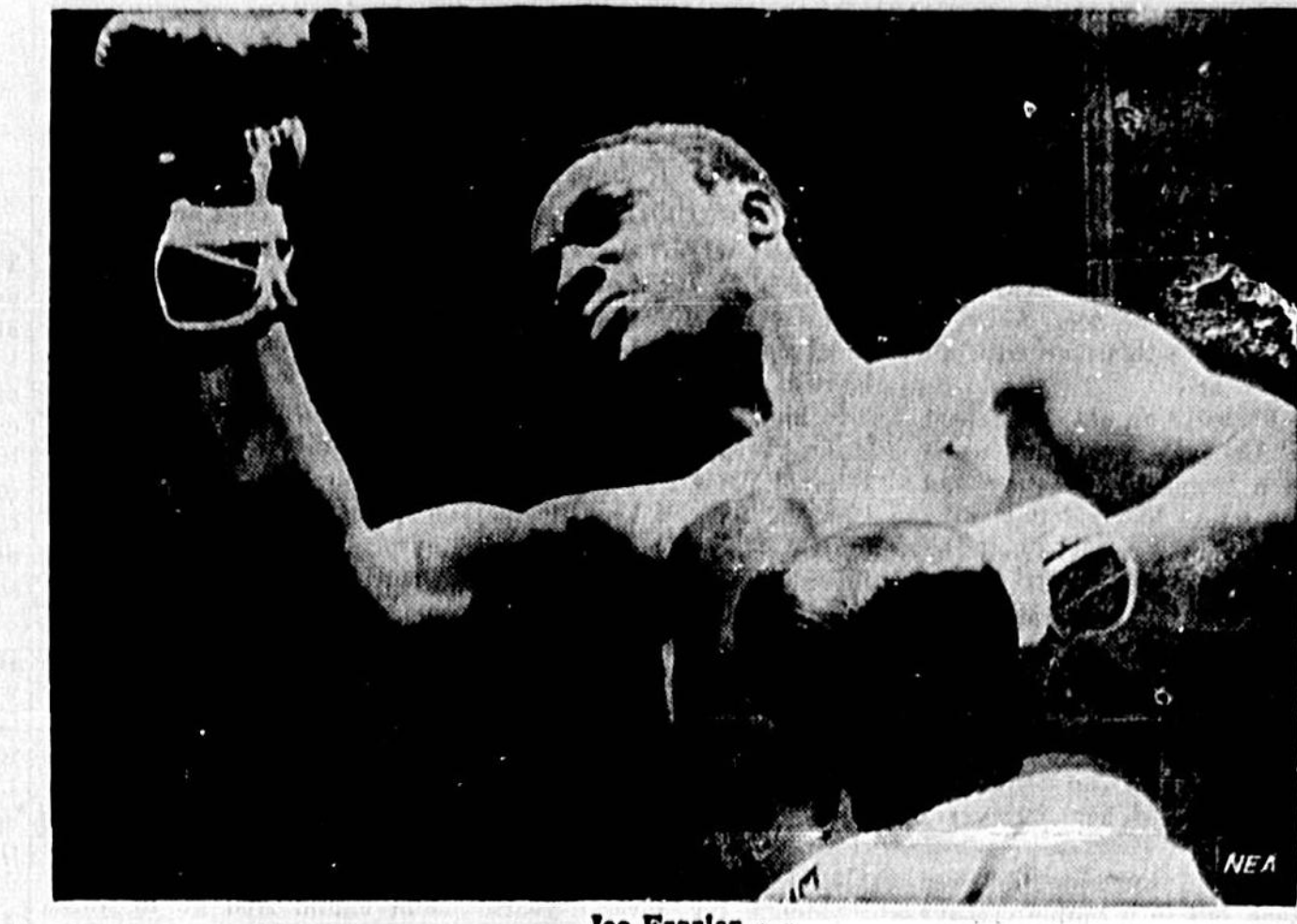

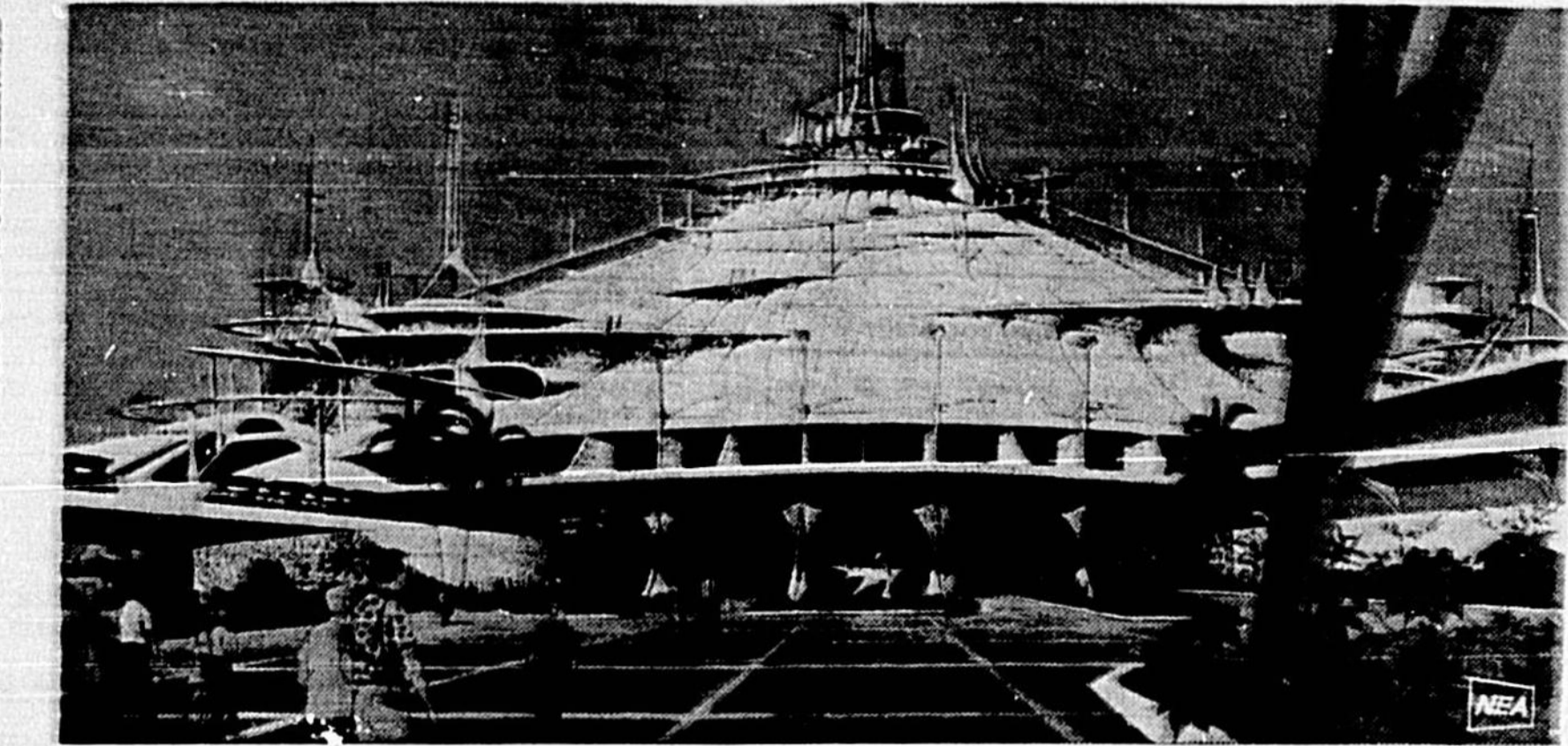

Farmers Market Is 'Big Business'

The spirit that led to the establishment of the Sanford Farmers Market on Dec. 18, 1964, exists today but the system has been sophisticated.

From its inception, the grower-broker and wholesaler-broker market system was efficient and is still efficient today.

Among those who thrive on the heartless is a segment of society for whom, today, there is much concern—the young people. How can you keep them busy?

Pioneer spirit to establish Sanford as the first market in Florida's State Farmers Markets, now directed by W. O. Whittle and under the Department of Agriculture's marketing division, was developed by hard knocks suffered by "Dutchman" farmers.

The word of mouth supply and demand communication of the 1950s has been refined and expanded. Weekly forecasts are sent to many in the produce industry and are placed at the inspection stations at the Florida state line.

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Even this system created hardships on the farmer. Sellers who crop that needed constant care so there were times that some farmers could not come in person to the market.

Small haulers provide the transportation. Growers like to ship their own produce. The coolers, cabbage, beans, turnips and other vegetables are a constant 42 degrees.

Quality testing, proper packing, timely harvesting and marketing, and ultimate delivery to the consumer in as soon as two to five days after shipment from the market are refined standards which have skyrocketed since records from the day the market opened.

When harvest time is in full swing, the market is a busy place. From 1964 to June 1965, the market handled 20,719,491 units of Florida produce for \$49,512,972.51 and 680,806 out-of-state units valued at \$1,714,282.32 in four years from 1964 to July 1968.

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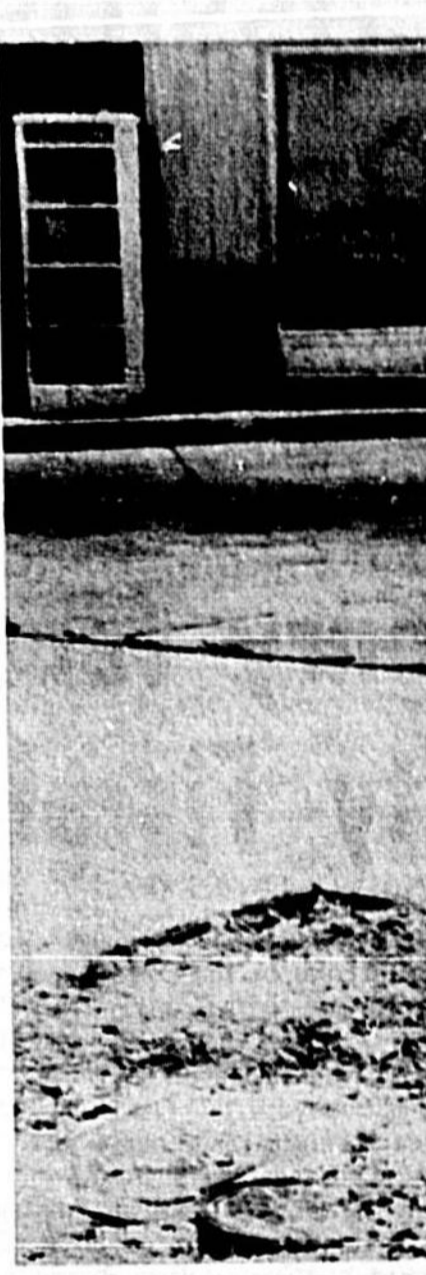

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Youngsters' Petitions Bear Fruit City Will Open Swim Pools

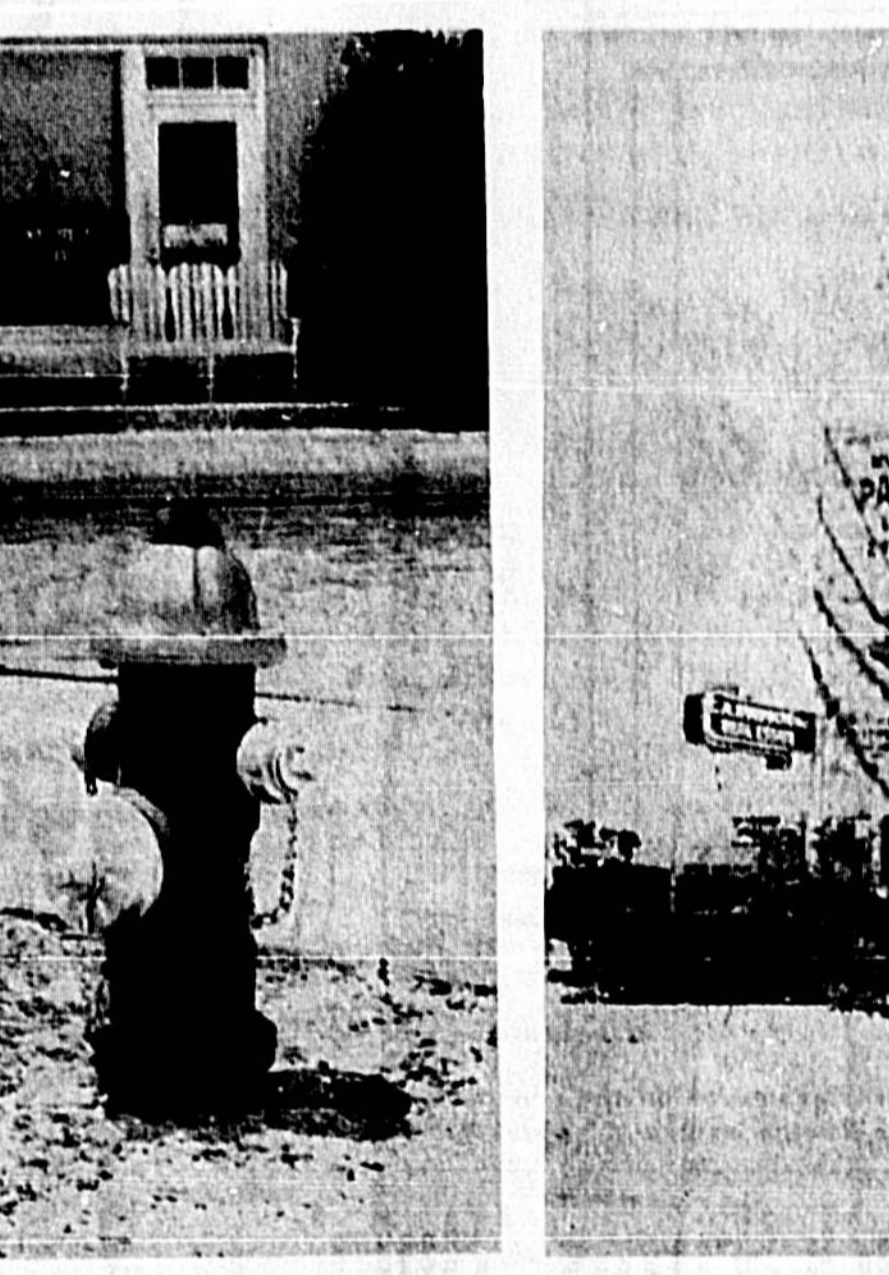
