



corporate limits of Casselberry. "It is my understanding", Stenstrom said, "that the County Commission threatens to eliminate this .06 of a mile of Red Bug Road in its road program because it is in Casselberry's corporate limits." The commissioner said in his orinion that is a

"rather sorry excuse" for not including the road work which he said would benefit all county citizens, since the people of Casselberry and other cities and towns pay county taxes just like those who live out-

"Consequently, the time has come to remind the Lakeview Middle School, Mid-County Commission that all Seminole County property way Elementary, Oviedo and owners pay county taxes regardless of where they live in the county - inside or outside the corporate limits of a municipality."

The Sanford commissioner said he also supported the opinion of Longwood Mayor E. E. Williamson, who is dissatisfied with the attitudes of the County Commission toward taxpayers in corporate limits.

"I take this position because the county derives its fiscal resources from taxpayers of Sanford, Casselberry, Longwood, North Orlando, Altamonte Springs and Oviedo, as well as from those property owners outside city and town boundaries," Stenstrom added.

The commissioner said it is time for the County they're too busy to read the Commission to give equal considersation and recognition toward property owners inside corporate limits. In addition to Stenstrom's remarks, Casselberry municipal government officials have expressed themselves heatedly over the road paving situation.





Gls Lured By Reds To Give Up

PARIS (AP) - The Viet Cong offered special protection and unstated rewards today to U.S. antiwar servicemen in Vietnam who cross over to its lines out of sympathy for the

The offer was a new attempt to stir rebellion among U.S. forces. It was contained in an order of the day issued to all "South Vietnam People's Liberation Armed Forces" and was distributed here by the Viet Cong delegation to the Paris peace

This order instructed all Viet Cong troops in South Vietnam not to fire on surrendering or deserting American soldiers, but to give them "good treatment . . . sid and protection."

It promised a special welcome and "appropriate rewards" to U.S. soldiers or units who support the Viet Cong. It did not spell out what the rewards would be. Americans who surrender while carrying antiwar literature or who can point to an antiwar record were also singled out for special treatment.

The order repeated a standing offer to give American de serters a safe conduct to asylum in a neutral country.







TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) State Rep. Talbot "Sandy" D'Alemberte says he feels like a man speeding down a hill in a car with no brakes when he considers the future of cable television.

"He can steer the thing, but he sure can't stop it," D'Alemberte said.

The analogy isn't original, but D'Alemberte has adopted it because he feels it fits closely with the goals he hopes to establish for cable television.

"Now is the time for us to steer it and to steer it toward education and public service while we still can," the Miami Democrat said.

To accomplish the purpose D'Alemberte has filed bills requiring cable television owners devote about 10 per cent of their channels to education uses and establishing an advisory council. The bills have received a favorable hearing in a House eduation subcommittee.

"The cable TV people bave been telling us what a great hing this is going to be because it will bring education right into he home," D'Alemberte said.

Captain Goes On Trial

FT. McPHERSON, Ga. (AP) - Capt. Eugene M. Kotouc, an intelligence officer charged with maiming and assaulting a Viet Cong suspect after U.S.

Kotouc, 37, a stocky, baldish paratrooper from Humboldt, Neb., faces a maximum sentence of 10 years imprisonment if convicted by a milita jury of seven career Army officers chosen earlier.

He is the fourth soldier to be court-martialed un criminal charges arising from an alleged massacre at May Laf and its aftermath. Two enlisted men were acquitted of assault and Lt. William L. Calley Jr., was convicted of murdering 22 civilians during the operation. The Army said Kotouc did

not take part in the actual assault. But, as the intelligence officer for Task Force Baker, he was assigned to interrogate suspects afterwards. The task force provided the assault troops for the operation. Kotouc is accused of maim-
