Wilson tapped coach for Lions girls' basketball

OVIEDO - Oviedo could have chosen almost anyone, but the Lions stayed within the family. With two of the best players in the county returning for next year's girls' basketball season, to one of the state's most consistently strong programs, Oviedo needed to decide who would replace Tom Bieri who retired after four years at the Lions' helm.

Oviedo stayed at home, and Tuesday chose junior varsity coach Brian Wilson to take Bieri's place.

Wilson played at Oviedo until he graduated in 1988.

After teaching a year at Dr. Phillips upon his graduation from Florida State in 1993, Wilson spent a year helping out with the Oviedo football team, then became a varsity assistant under Bieri two seasons ago.

While Bieri was known for his fiery style, Wilson said he will be more of an X's and O's kind of coach.

"I feel I won't be quite as demonstrative as Tom," Wilson said. "Some people compare us to each other but I think we're a lot different."

Wilson's junior varsity teams finished 20-4 each of the past two seasons. He has a chance to be even better once he takes

over the varsity program with Mary Lou Johnston, one of the best players in the state, and Kelly Brock, Shannon Cotton and Lynette Smiley among the returning starters.

"They are great basketball players," Wilson said. "I know they can get things done."

Oviedo is coming off a year in which the Lions weren't as strong as expected. The season ended with a drubbing by Lynn as Bieri's responsibilities with the Orlando Magic started to consume much of his time. Wilson ran many of the practices when Bieri wasn't there, so the players should be used to his routine.

"I'm confident that if we can win, everything will take care of itself."

Wilson said he hasn't met with the team since he was named head coach but he's hoping the transformation will be a smooth one.

"Tom built a great program here," Wilson said. "We'll just try to move it forward without changing things too much."

Wilson, whose sister Kerri is another member of the Oviedo basketball staff, said it was his lifelong dream to be a head coach. He said he wasn't sure about returning to his alma mater for that job, but now that he has it, he can't wait for next year.

"I'll just take it one year at a time," he said.

Another step toward development

SANFORD - Work toward creating Twin Lakes Apartments in western Sanford is continuing although progress is slow because of the number of government bodies involved.

Twin Lakes Garden Apartments is planned on 50.5 acres of land presently zoned Agriculture. It is located south of Hinehart Road, north of Paola Road, and between the bodies of water known as Twin Lakes.

According to a request to be brought before the Sanford Planning and Zoning Commission this Thursday evening, the master plan for the development has a limit of 574 dwelling units on the property with the southernmost 20 acres limited to 225 dwelling units for a density of 11.25 dwelling units per acre.

Obtaining all necessary agreements and approvals for the development has involved extensive applications. Approvals have been required from the City of Lake Mary with city limits immediately south of the property. Also involved have been the Hills

of Lake Mary Homeowner's Association and Kaywood residents protesting the development. Seminole County, State Department of Environmental Protection, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, St. Johns River Water Management District, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, Sanford Local Planning Agency (SLPA), and the Sanford City Commission.

Although nearby homeowners have hotly protested the apartment complex as not in keeping with the single family homes in the area, most of the government bodies

SEMINOLE COUNTY - The friends and supporters of Seminole County Commission Chairman Randy Morris attended a party Monday night that raised \$26,000 for his reelection campaign.

The \$250-a-pop fund raiser was organized by Rep. John Mica, and drew more than 100 business and civic leaders from the county, because he was away to attend the funeral of a friend, Mica's wife, Ann, hosted the party at the Sheraton North Hotel.

Morris, 42, said it was refreshing that half those in attendance were new supporters. "They were people who are pleased with the success of the county," Morris said. "They told me we were on the right track."

As his campaign kicks into high gear, Morris intends to interface with many voters and taxpayers throughout the county. "It's important to simplify things, help everyone understand the issues and what we have been doing. We've got some good news."

Most of the functions he attends will not have the \$250 tag as the one on Monday, Morris said. Those who wish to contribute can do so, but are not obligated, Morris said. "We're talking about low-end fund raisers, barbecues, small groups," he said.

Seated as District 2 commissioner on Nov. 22, 1994 for a 4-year term, Morris has served as chairman on the commission in three of four years. He also is chairman of Metropolitan Orlando and serves on the Eco-

Crooms students ready to kick butts against smoking

SANFORD - The Crooms Academy is ready to kick some serious butt.

Thursday, Crooms Middle Schoolers are joining thousands of people from all over America in standing up against the tobacco industry and what they feel are persistent efforts to lure children into the dangers of smoking.

They are participating in the third annual Kick Butts Day Thursday.

Sanford is joining a list of cities nationwide in an effort to overpower last year's 82-city campaign.

Some of the kids at Crooms Academy have personal experiences that make them thin twice about the stupidity of smoking cigarettes.

"I just don't want to see anybody dying of drugs that are in cigarettes," said sixth-grader Tiffany Wamley. "People get sick from ciga-

rettes and that's not right." Sixth-grader Nydia Bustillo added, "You don't want black lungs and clogs all of the time. It's bad."

Senior Class President Sinaca Lingard will give a speech tomorrow starting with a proclamation from the Seminole County government which will kick off a national campaign for tobacco-free kids.

After that, for the next week, Crooms kids will be read every day over the school's a closed-circuit broadcast station about the harmful affects of tobacco.

Kicking off the campaign will be a nationally-aired TBS special on teen-smoking featuring Tyra Banks.

The Crooms kids have both felt the effects of tobacco in their own families.

"I would say that if people want to smoke, they're probably going to die," Tiffany said. "There are smokers in my family and I pray for my Dad every night. It hasn't worked

but I just keep praying that it won't kill him."

Both of the kids said they had family members who smoked and they had all tried to quit but the kids explained that their parents were addicted.

They always say that soon they will stop," Mydia said. Evon Lisle, a guidance counselor at Crooms, said she helped get the project started when she heard about it from the National Education Association. Crooms teacher Carol Clemente-Ferrzano, the television-production teacher, said the commentaries would be broadcast into each class.

The kids at Crooms said that, although cigarettes and tobacco products aren't allowed on campus - or any Seminole County school - they said cigarette smoking isn't uncommon on places like bathrooms and other hidden parts of the school.

Even though peer pressure can be a hard thing to escape, some of the Crooms kids said

they just said "no." "Some people think they are cool if they smoke," Mydia

said. "My friend in one of my classes asked me if I wanted

In combining these two, it doesn't mean that everyone at the work place must be a practical joker in order to avoid stress. Libraries adopt 7-day schedule

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Seminole County residents who want to visit their libraries on Fridays will be able to do so beginning April 10.

Suzy Goldman, library and leisure services director for the county, said a revision of the days and hours the libraries operate are in response to citizen input solicited before the draft of the 1998 strategic plan.

The new hours expand the library system's weekly operating hours from 64 to 68 hours.

Three years ago the county decided to close its five libraries on Fridays, a strategy that was not well received by residents. "The reasoning behind this was that Fridays were the lightest for library usage and we wanted to extend our services to Sundays," Goldman said.

The shift proved to be good and bad. "Sundays from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. became our busiest hours," Goldman said. "What we did was make a trade-off of Fridays for Sundays. Now, we'll have the libraries open both days."

Under the new schedule, the county libraries will be open Monday through Thursday from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m., Fridays and Saturdays from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and on Sunday from 1

p.m. to 5 p.m. Goldman said that no new staff members were needed to accommodate the new schedule. She said there are 68 full-time and 12 part-time people. "We also bring in temporary people to help shelve," she said.

The five county libraries located in Sanford, Casselberry, Oviedo, Lake Mary and Longwood serve as many as 4,000 a day. Goldman said the new seven-day service was similar to those in Orange and Osceola counties, Winter Park and Maitland.

The new scheduling goes into effect on Sunday, April 5.

Maui flavor sparks leftover smoked ham

Honey Glazed Baked Ham With Orange Sauce (from the Plantation House Inn)

This recipe makes a ham lover out of everyone that I have made it for. This Inn serves some of the best country style meals in a setting straight from Gone With The Wind. The first recipe leads to the flavor of the "left over" meal that comes from the north shore of Maui and works great with the ham that is left or can stand on its own when made with a ham steak.

Ingredients:

- 1 fully cooked smoked ham 5 to 6 lbs.
1 cup orange juice
2 lbs. honey
1/2 tsp. each clove, cinnamon, onion powder, garlic powder
1/4 tsp. each allspice, nutmeg, white pepper

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Cut top side of ham (thickest side from the bone) in diagonal cuts 1/2 inch deep, 1 inch apart, in each direction forming a 1 inch square diamond pattern across the top. degrees. Uncover the meat for the last 15 minutes of cooking time to brown the top.

Sauce:

Dissolve 1-1/2 lbs. corn starch in 1 cup of cold water. Remove ham from roasting pan. Add corn starch and water to the orange juice and drippings in the pan. Bring to a light boil stirring constantly until it thickens.

Slice ham thin and pour sauce over each serving. I served this dinner with deep fried beef steak, French fries, applesauce and steamed spinach with lemon butter.

Maui Pineapple Ham and Sweet Potatoes

Ingredients: 4 sweet potatoes, peeled, cut in half and slice into 1/2 inch pieces. 1 8-oz. can chunk pineapple. 1 green bell pepper cut in thin strips. 4 lbs. applesauce. 2 lbs. each brown sugar, light roux, and vinegar. 1/2 tsp. each salt, white pepper, nutmeg. 1 lbs. sugar.

Slice down remaining ham into about 3/4 inch thick pieces and place into a large covered casserole dish. Save the remaining bone and small pieces of ham for a pot of beans or soup for a third meal. Drain pineapple juice into a saucepan. Pour pineapple chunks and pepper slices over the ham slices into the saucepan with the pineapple juice add brown sugar, vinegar, roux, salt, pepper, nutmeg, and sugar bring to a light simmer and pour over ham. Place sweet potato slices evenly over top of casserole dish. Spread

applesauce over sweet potato slices and sprinkle with cinnamon. Cover and bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

Serve this dish with rice and garnish the plate with slices of kiwi and star fruit or your favorite tropical fruits.

It does not have to be an expensive wine, just something palatable that you enjoy. I prefer to use dry wines to cook with so the sweetness of the wine does not affect the flavor of the dish.

DEAR ABBY: I saw the letter about the poor young woman who suffered from depression and chronic fatigue syndrome. I feel deeply for the sister who ignored her sister's call for help. When "Lesson Learned" told her sister that the younger woman didn't know what

"chronic-living-life-fatigue is," it was clear that she did not understand that chronic fatigue syndrome is a real disease, for which diagnostic criteria were established by the Centers for Disease Control in 1988. The disease is insidious, leaving the patient constantly exhausted, depressed, and burdened with a myriad of problems.

Many medical professionals do not believe that the disease is

caused by a virus, an enzyme deficiency, or any of the other scientific reasons that validate this as a physical disease. They believe it to be "mental" or nonexistent. Because of this, a vast majority of those who have it go undiagnosed. Many patients do not receive the proper medical care because of their physician's lack of interest in a disease with no known cause or cure, so it's passed off as hypochondria or a mental disorder.

Suicide among those afflicted with chronic fatigue and immune dysfunction syndrome (CFIDS) is high. "Lesson Learned" was devastated by the death of her sister, but it is doubtful she could have done anything to prevent it. They are doing the best they can to teach their players the rules, strategies and finer points of a sport while also conditioning and strengthening their players, most of whom they have never coached before.

While building a program from the ground up is quite a task and the efforts are rewarded in time when the team is a success, it is a very hard road to travel, there will be losses, frustration and ridicule from parents and community members. There will be broken hearts among both the players and the coaching staff when, night after night, the team is playing the very best they can and continue to lose. But their day will come.

The perseverance of the coaches and the players, coupled with the support of administration and parents, can only serve to build a team that will know what it is like to lose and will find a way to overcome those obstacles that faced them early on. Every team has gone through it. Every school has been new at one time. They have found the strength to continue and hold their heads high when it seemed they would never pull out a winning season.

Winter Springs has competed on the varsity level in every sport except football, despite an enrollment of only freshmen and sophomores, and has been a team to reckon with. They have not slided away from any opponent and stood their ground, taking lumps and occasional wins with them along the way. Just remember, those kids will have a year of experience behind them next year and will only be juniors and sophomores. And just wait until they are Seniors and Juniors who have been playing together for these years. Who'll be laughing then?

As for the girls' lacrosse team at Seminole, cut them some slack. Some of those girls have never even seen a lacrosse ball before, much less know the ins and outs of the game itself. They are working very hard and are learning with every match. Sure, they make mistakes. But doesn't every team? Only difference is, other teams know how to cover them up better. They'll get there. This is the very first year for a team at the school and they can't be expected to be competitive against aged programs.

There are other first year teams out there, and although they have not been names, they haven't been forgotten. Hopefully, the support they are receiving from coaches, friends and family will carry over to the other areas of the community. Until that happens, the athletes just have to know that no first year team should be expected to break records or win districts. Active kid may not have ADD

DR. GOTT

DEAR DR. GOTT: My 9-year-old grandson is very "busy." Although happy, he is strong-willed. His second-grade teacher told us that he has attention-deficit disorder. Eventually, without testing, he was placed on Ritalin. The medicine caused him to cry all the time and he became a very different little boy.

We stopped the Ritalin. He improved. We believe that the problem can better be handled with love and training. Are we off the mark?

DEAR READER: Not in my opinion. According to experts who spoke at the recent annual meeting of the American Academy of Pediatrics, ADD is being overdiagnosed. While up to 15 percent of children are treated for it, the actual prevalence is only about 5 percent. Before inattentive, hyperactive or impulsive children are labeled with the disorder, other causes have to be investigated. For instance, mood disorders, mental retardation, abuse, oppositional behavior and hearing deficits are a few of the afflictions that can masquerade as ADD.

Authorities emphasize that the following characteristics of ADD must be present for at least six months: difficulty sustaining attention, tendency to lose materials needed for tasks, forgetfulness, pattern of fidgeting, excessive talking, and the habit of interrupting others' conversations and games. Such children should be evaluated by a psychologist or other specialist.

Treatment for ADD includes stimulants, such as Ritalin and Dexedrine. Fortunately, this medication may not have to be prescribed indefinitely; about 10 percent of children can get off the medicine after a year of therapy.

From the brief description you offered, I question whether your grandson has ADD. Certainly the diagnosis should have been confirmed by an appropriate health professional. If he is better without the Ritalin, I agree that he should not take it. Can love and training help your grandson perform more effectively? Possibly. Let me know the results of your experiment.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm 77 and had prostate surgery for cancer in 1992. Since then, my semiannual PSA readings have been less than .02.

My last reading was .05. My urologist reassured me that as long as the PSA stays below 4.0, I don't have to worry. However, the new PSA, which is double the old value, has me concerned. Should I be?

DEAR READER: Don't worry. Your prostate specific antigen is well below the normal limit of 4.0. Although you should continue to be checked once or

twice a year, you needn't be concerned unless the PSA rises well above 4.0. Your urologist is correct.

DEAR DR. GOTT: What causes macular degeneration?

DEAR READER: This serious eye problem, marked by falling vision due to deterioration of the retina, is the

most common uncorrectable cause of vision loss in the elderly. Until recently, the cause was unknown, although smoking and high cholesterol levels appear to aggravate the condition.

In the journal Science, researchers reported that a particularly aggressive form of macular degeneration appears to be caused by a genetic mutation.

Although the discovery of a specific gene defect does not guarantee that successful therapy for macular degeneration is imminent, it does give scientists a point at which to begin investigating the possibility that the disease may be controllable by gene manipulation. I'll keep my readers informed as new information becomes available.

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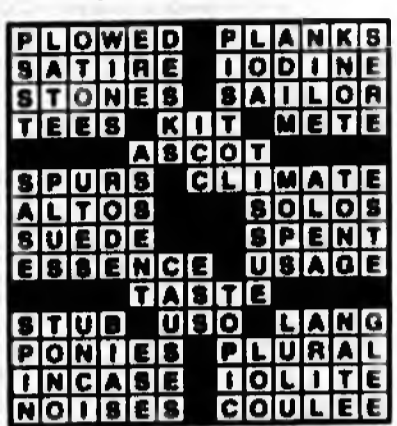

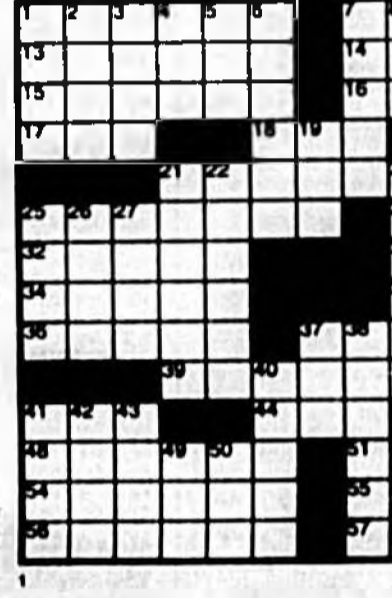

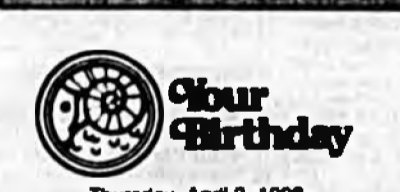
