One of worst accidents occurred at 5 p.m. Monday on Interstate 95, north of Mims in Brevard County. Two were killed, and holiday traffic was backed up for miles.

A South Florida man was killed Friday in a three-car accident on Interstate 95 near Port Orange.

There were no traffic fatalities in Seminole or Orange counties.

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Thousands turn out for Sanford celebration

SANFORD — Seminole County did not lack for July Fourth festivities this weekend. Several thousand people watched the fireworks in Sanford on Sunday, filling Fort Mellon Park from the Sanford/Seminole County Chamber of Commerce to Mellonville Avenue. The more than 30 minute display drew comments such as "this is incredible" from the crowd.

"It's been a long time since I've seen a fireworks display that was so good," said Longwood resident Rusty

Miles. "I can't remember seeing a display anywhere of equal or better magnitude in 10 to 12 years. It was excellent."

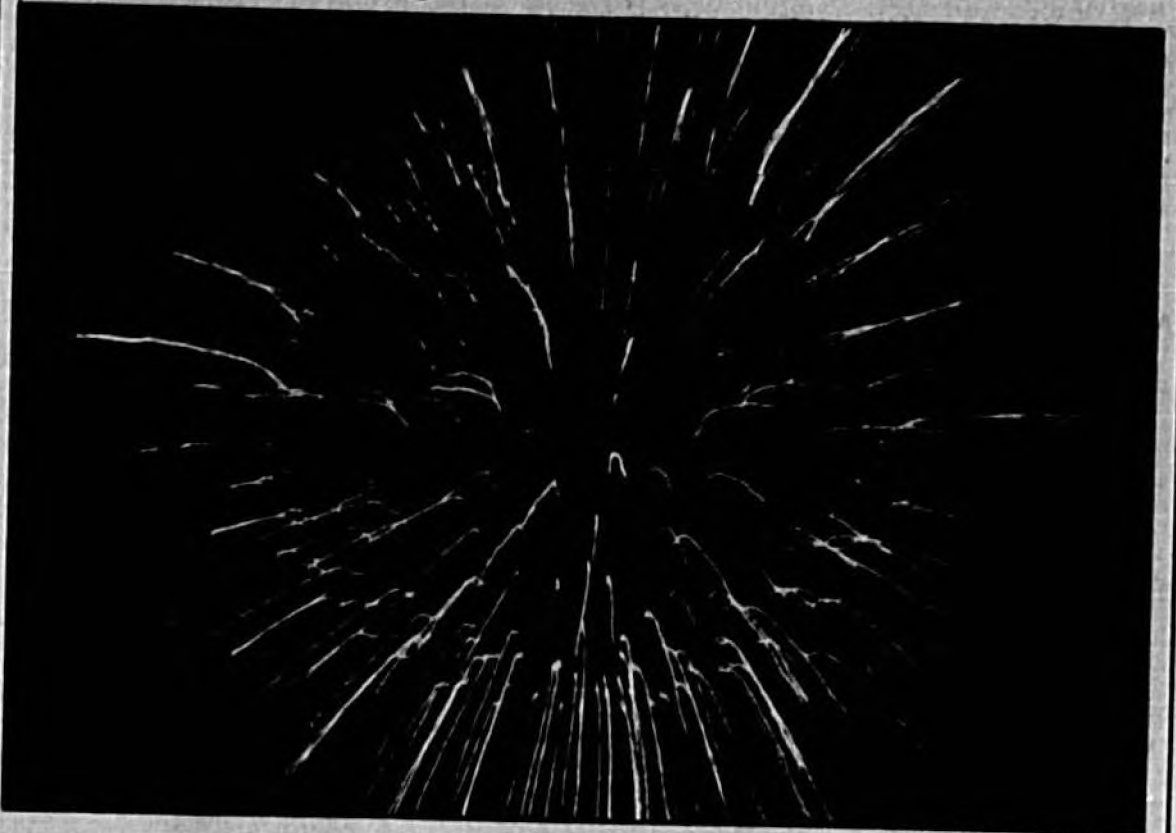
The festivities, sponsored by Sanford Main Street started at 5 p.m. at Fort Mellon Park, featuring two live bands and a variety of vendors and booths. Many businesses along First Street also remained open.

As dusk turned to nightfall, members of the audience were still dancing to Swing music or eating hot dogs and ice cream.

The fireworks display was musically choreographed with the assistance of MIX 105.1 and Power 105.9. Songs ranging

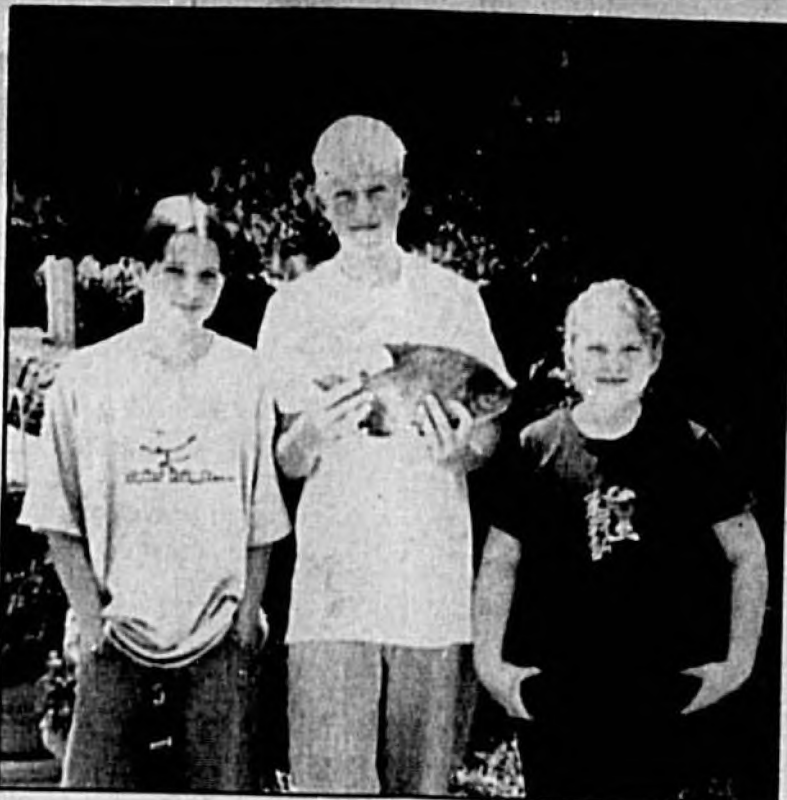
SANFORD — There are fish stories, and then there are fish stories. But this one really bites.

A trio of young anglers looking for some catfish action got quite a surprise late Thursday night while wetting a line in a private lake at the Lake Forest subdivision off of SR 46 in Sanford.

Armed with a Shumano bait caster rod and using chopped up brim for bait, 13-year-old Aaron Wood and buddies Dakota Hill and Britney Burney got a hit shortly after 10 p.m.

"It put up a pretty good fight and at first I thought it was a good size bass," said Wood. When he landed the "it" with the help of friends Hill and Burney, "it" turned out to be a species of carnivorous South American piranha. The jagged-toothed fish measured 15 inches in length and weighed in at just over three pounds.

Watch your Ps and Qs at county intersections

CASSELBERRY — Stan Bessmer says he is now noticing more drivers breaking on yellow warning lights. The other day Bessmer marvelled when an 18-wheeler burned its breaks at State Road 436 and U.S. Highway 17-92.

"Usually, those guys go running through," Bessmer said. The word is out that Seminole County cops and deputies are watching for "aggressive drivers" particularly at intersections such as 436 and 17-92.

The State Roads 436 and 434 intersection is the second most dangerous intersection in Florida according to crash statistics released this week by State Farm Insurance.

"That's an intersection I try to avoid," Bessmer said. "You definitely have to watch your Ps and Qs there and at a number of other busy, high-speed

intersections where people haven't been slowing down until recently."

It was only a matter of time that someone began ranking dangerous intersections. We now know what the 100 best movies were, the 50 best actors and actresses, the 10 most wanted criminals and 50 best pro basketball players.

The intersection story is based on crashes at particular sites. Obviously, every busy intersection in the state is a dangerous site. The 436 and 434 intersection is 95,000 vehicles a day busy. Drivers change lanes, run yellow lights, turn without signaling.

"The problem is there are more drivers than room on our roads," Chief Deputy Sheriff Steve Harriett said. "Accidents can happen anywhere - especially with so many people trying to get from Point A to Point B without allocating the proper

The mettle of 10 million men

Six years ago, the Hall of Fame quarterback Johnny Unitas came to Orlando to speak about prostate cancer. A hundred or more people came to hear him. Most were middle-aged men and their spouses.

Unitas spoke for an hour. He said that he was a prostate cancer survivor, and that he was giving talks throughout the country to advise men 50 years or older to get an annual prostate cancer checkups.

After he spoke, Unitas noticed a dozen or more people with pictures of him and two with footballs. They had waited for him to finish so they could collect autographs.

Politely, he signed each request.

"If signing a few autographs helps men become aware of getting prostate cancer checks, I'll gladly sign," Unitas said. "I'm a survivor. They found my cancer early."

It troubled Unitas that many cancers were not being detected. That many men did not get

their checkups. Many were frightened about the effects of a prostate operation or treatment.

Disturbing, too, was the lack of focus on the disease — and that of adequate research.

"This is very frustrating," Unitas said.

Strangely, the frustration lingers six years later despite the fact 10 million American men are affected by prostate cancer today.

A group of baseball players — past and present — are conducting a pledge drive for the National Prostate Cancer Coalition and Cancer Research Institute.

There have been full-page advertisements in various magazines. They picture St. Louis Cardinals' slugger Mark McGwire.

"Help me set the most important home record of all ... the one that beats prostate cancer," McGwire requests.

All you had to do was make a pledge for each major-league home run hit from June 20 to June 25. To do this, you could call 1-800-547-CURE.

My call to this 1-800 number was answered by former Los Angeles Dodgers manager Tom Lasorda.

The recorded voice of Tom Lasorda. He said he managed for 30 years and learned something about management.

"Now, I want to talk about managing prostate cancer," Lasorda said. "I've joined with others like Ken Griffey, Jr., Mark McGwire, Reggie Jackson and recent prostate cancer survivor

Joe Torre," he said. "We're asking for your help to defeat this disease."

Torre needed sufficient time to return to managing the New York Yankees this year after prostate surgery. He found out about his cancer the last week of spring training. Within hours, everyone in America knew the Yankees manager had prostate cancer.

Millions of other men are being tested this very day at urology centers or in hospitals throughout the United States.

A week ago at a Lake Mary urology center, a half dozen men and their spouses sat in a waiting room. They held each another, speaking quietly if at all.

Then, everyone looked at once.

"Mr. White," an attendant called.

time." In a single day, sheriff's deputies issued 188 citations to aggressive drivers at various sites. Many ran red lights at intersections such as the one at 436 and 434. Other citations were issued for wrecklessly weaving from lane to lane.

Sanford Acting Police Chief Mitch Tindel said that the department has a supervisor and four officers assigned solely to traffic division. "We brought back the division after the study a couple of years ago," he said. "Our main concerns are at the busy intersections along 17-92, at Lake Mary Blvd., Airport,

25th Street and 1st St. (State Road 46)."

Tindel said that Sanford officers worked with the sheriff's deputies on the latest aggressive driver patrol. One of the hot spots was at State Road 46 and Airport Blvd. Drivers speed more than 50 miles on both sides of SR 46 as they approach or go over the overpass.

Drivers making a left turn off SR 46 to Airport Blvd. have little time or space to move into the turn lane. If three cars are in the lane, a fourth either has to stop outside the lane itself or keep driving because of cars speeding from behind them.

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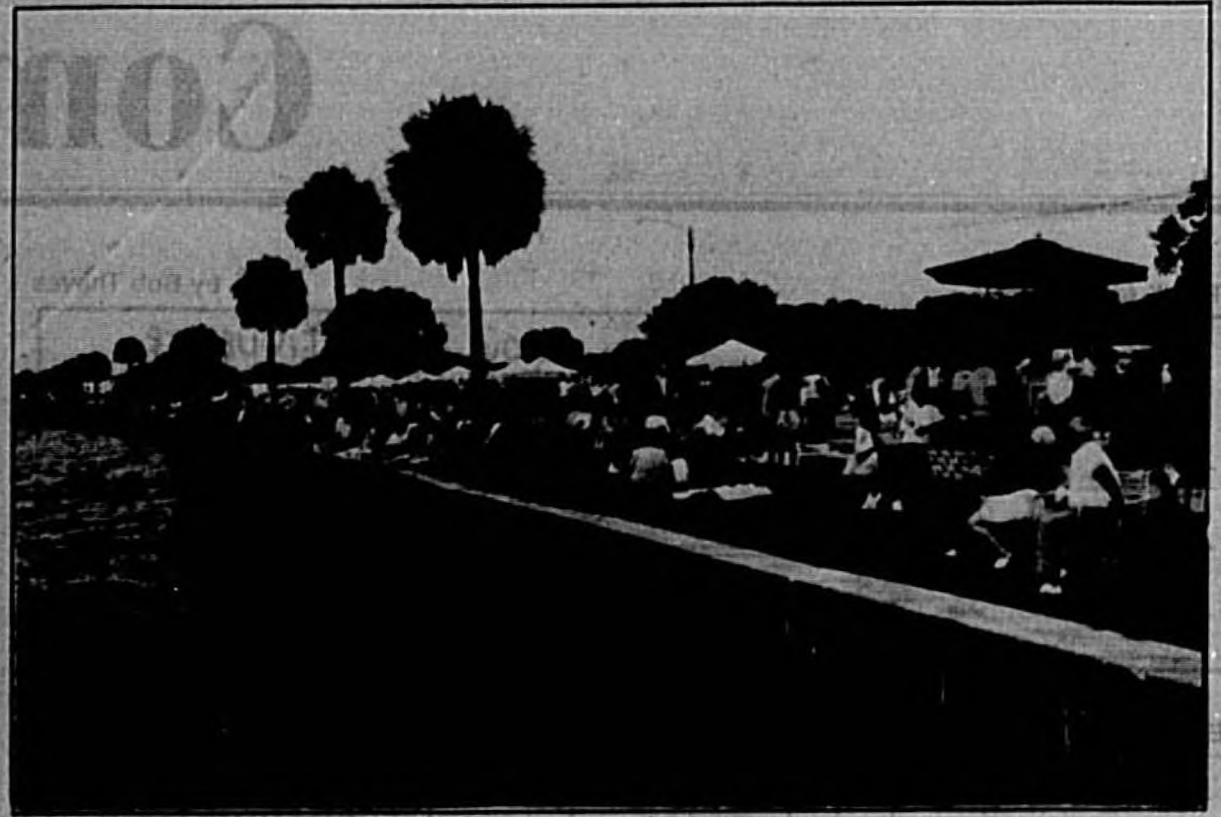

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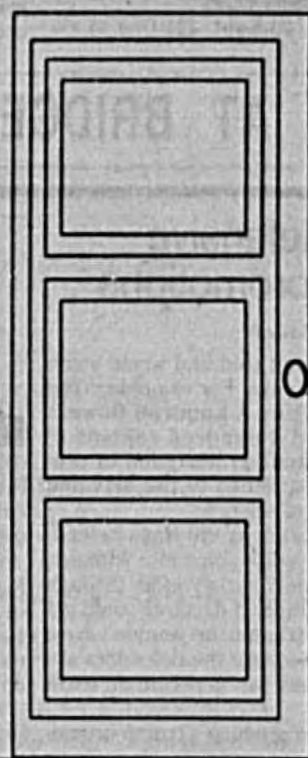

More defensive trump promotions

Mao Tse-tung said and wrote some penetrating things. For example: "The policy of letting a hundred flowers blossom and a hundred schools of thought contend is designed to promote the flourishing of the arts and the progress of science."

We are looking at the ways defenders can turn low trumps into winners. One of the most satisfying is through trump promotion. If declarer could get in and draw trumps, he wouldn't have a loser, but because the defenders are in control, they can generate an extra trump trick.

How do you produce a trump promotion? You lead a card through declarer when both he and your partner are out of that suit. The declarer is left with two losing options: ruff low and be overruled, or ruff high and promote a trump trick for the defender.

(Obviously, you might also lead a suit through the dummy when both that hand and your partner sitting over the dummy are void of this suit.)

In today's deal, defending against four spades, West leads the heart nine in answer to his partner's overall. East wins with the heart queen, then cashes the heart ace. What should he do next?

As the minor-suit finesses are working even if South is missing one of those kings (unlikely after his jump to game), East can see that his side has taken all possible side-suit tricks. So, he should continue with a third top heart. Presumably, South will ruff high, enter dummy, and play a trump.

ASK DR. GOTT

Double vision could be serious

DEAR DR. GOTT: For the past few months, I have experienced headaches and blurred vision — sometimes even double vision — while exercising strenuously. What could cause this? Need I worry?

DEAR READER: When blood flow is inappropriately shunted away from parts of the brain, a variety of symptoms may appear. The fact that you may experience double vision (diplopia) during exercise suggests that the nerves to your eye muscles are not receiving enough blood; consequently, they are malfunctioning. The cause could be ominous. Let me explain why.

About six months ago, a healthy 40-year-old man came to the office with symptoms identical to yours. He experienced headache and diplopia at a specific time: an hour after he had started playing volleyball at his usual Thursday night session. I could find nothing wrong, so I referred him to an ophthalmologist. The specialist could find nothing wrong either, but he suspected multiple sclerosis, a neurological disease that often causes strange and unusual complaints. So he ordered an MRI scan.

To our astonishment, the test revealed a large aneurysm (swelling) of a major artery in the brain. When the patient exercised, his blood pressure rose, the aneurysm temporarily enlarged and pressed on the nerves to his eye muscles. This middle-aged man was a walking time-bomb; the aneurysm could rupture at any time, leading to death or profound disability.

I am happy to report that the patient had his aneurysm successfully repaired. He is now back to full activity, including volleyball, with no headache or diplopia.

Get to your doctor now. You need further testing, which she can organize — as well as a referral to an ophthalmologist, at least. Let me know what happens.

DEAR READER: I doubt it. Meniere's disease is a disorder of the inner ear, marked by deafness, balance problems and a hissing or buzzing (tinnitus.) Nobody knows the cause and there is no cure. If you already consume a balanced diet, additional foods or supplements are probably unnecessary.

The symptoms of Meniere's disease may result from other, readily treatable conditions. Therefore, I suggest that you check with an ear-nose-and-throat specialist. If you truly have Meniere's disease, she may be able to offer specific therapy.

Jarrett captures first Pepsi 400 win

DAYTONA BEACH - Dale Jarrett extended his domination as NASCAR Winston Cup points leader by edging Dale Earnhardt as the Pepsi 400 finished under the caution at Daytona International Speedway.

Since getting involved in wreck in the Daytona 500 to open the season and finishing 37th, Jarrett has finished in the top 10 in each of the last 16 races, including three wins.

Saturday night's win was Jarrett's third at the Daytona International Speedway and his first in the Pepsi 400 after 14 attempts.

His previous victories at the World Center of Racing came in the 1993 and 1998 Daytona 500. Jarrett earned \$164,985 for the winning the Pepsi 400, the 17th race on the 34 race 1999 Winston Cup schedule.

Jarrett, driver of the No. 88 Quality Care Ford Taurus, used a splash-and-go gas stop with 16 laps left to secure the lead and hold off a charging Earnhardt, who took two tires on his final pit stop.

"It would have been awfully close on gas," said Jarrett. "I think we could have made it because being out front I could kind of dictate what was going on."

Jarrett outran Earnhardt and Jeff Burton, who had also taken on two tires during his final stop, back to the caution flag after Jeremy Mayfield, Wally Dallenbach and Jimmy Spencer tangled on the front stretch with two laps left.

Earnhardt and Burton came out of the pits in eighth and ninth place after their pit stops, but hooked up together and quickly came to the front with the fresher tires, as did Ward Burton, who put on four tires and came from 28th to seventh over the final 11 laps.

"I told the guys before the last stop that if we didn't get right side tires I didn't know if we would finish at all," said Earnhardt, the seven-time Winston Cup champion who placed second for the sixth time in his career at Daytona in the GM Goodwrench Plus Chevrolet.

"It really didn't hurt us, maybe on position. I wasn't aware of Jarrett's problem, if he was going to run out of gas or be close. I think if it had stayed green, we could've got Jarrett."

After taking the caution flag Jarrett, who was supposed to

stop for four seconds to get gas but was probably only in for less than three, ran around the track on the flat apron to try to keep what little fuel was left in the tank flowing to the pick-up.

Rounding out the top five in the race were Jeff Burton in his

Exide Batteries Ford, Mike Skinner in the Lowe's Chevrolet and Bobby Labonte, who finished second in last year's Pepsi 400, in the Interstate Batteries Pontiac.

Burton scored his third top 10 finish in Winston Cup races

at Daytona.

Finishing sixth-through-10th were rookie Tony Stewart in The Home Depot Pontiac, Ward Burton in the Caterpillar Pontiac, Bobby Hamilton in the Kodak Chevrolet, Ernie Ivan in the M&M's Pontiac and Terry

Labonte in the Kellogg's Chevrolet.

Rusty Wallace, who led the most laps in the race, just like he had in the Daytona 500 in February, wound up 11th.

Daytona Beach's Mark Martin, who suffered a broken left wrist in Friday's "Happy Hour" practice, drove the whole race and finished 17th after starting 43rd.

Defending Pepsi 400 and 1999 Daytona 500 champion Jeff Gordon finished 24th (which was changed to 19th after a review of tapes on Tuesday).

NASCAR veteran Dave Marcis completed 159 laps Saturday night and broke Richard Petty's record for most laps completed in the Pepsi 400. 129 races, Marcis has completed 4,161 laps for 10,402 miles.

The victory by Jarrett marked the eighth win of the season for Ford and was the first for the Taurus at Daytona International Speedway in a points race.

Jarrett averaged 159.231 mph as three cautions slowed the 160-lap race for nine laps.

Jarrett was one of nine drivers who swapped the lead 17 times during the two-hour, 21-minute event.

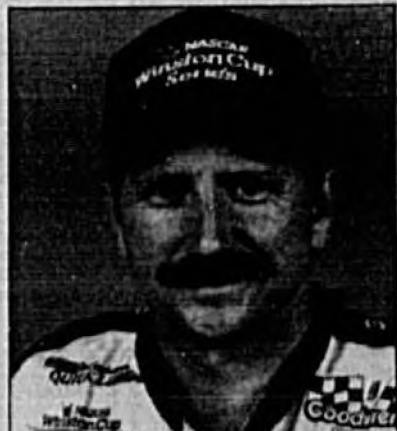
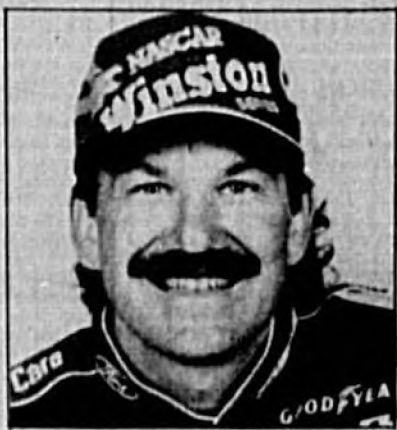
