Father Complains To State Council

An Oviedo father said today he had filed a complaint with the State Professional Practices Council at Tallahassee after his 15-year-old son fell while being forced to pick up garbage at the school athletic field, and cut his hand.

Theodore Jackson said nine stitches were needed to close the wound on his son David's hand, after the youth was compelled under Oviedo High School's internal suspension policy to pick up trash in a locked football field.

Buty Jackson, the eighth grader's mother, reported both parents had talked with Supt. John Anzel about the incident, which first started after the boy was accused of cutting classes rather than sit in an unheated portable classroom on a cold day.

She said her son was suspended by Clyde Holder, the school's principal, and made to water flowers for five days before instructions were given to the boy to remove the trash from the football field.

Upon arriving at the athletic field with two other youths for garbage detail, the boys found the stadium was locked and they had to scale the fence.

Next day, David returned alone to the field and climbed the fence, later he fell and cut himself and according to Mrs. Jackson had it not been for Coach Miller arriving at the field to take school annual pictures, the boy might not have been able to climb out to get medical attention.

As it was, the coach removed the boy to seek medical attention, according to Mrs. Jackson, who stated she was made aware of the accident when she received a call from the doctor's office.

The boy's father said he didn't feel it was right that he should be forced to pay the doctor's bill, since his son was working under the direction of the school officials when the mishap occurred.

Supt. John Anzel acknowledged he had been informed by the Jacksons of the situation concerning their son, but made no direct comment.

'Fuel Oil Pollution' Dumping Blamed On Railroad

Fuel oil pollution, noted for the past two weeks by fishermen on the St. Johns River in Lake Monroe north to Deland and the blame laid on Seaboard Coastline Railroad.

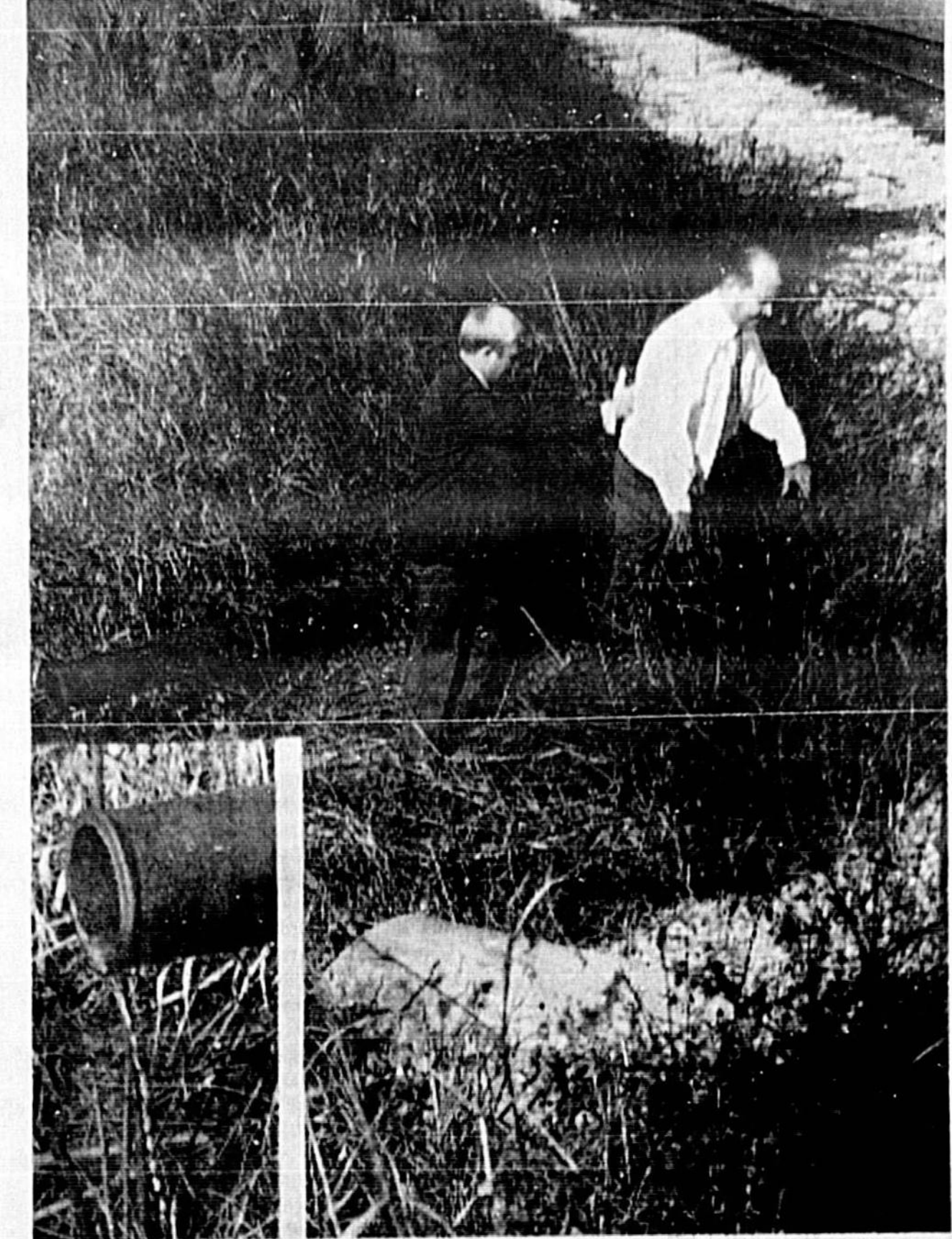
County Commissioner Sidney Vihlen reports that evidence of fuel oil dumping at Mills Creek has existed for several years, but for the past two weeks there has been an excessive amount noticed by people coming in and out of Meador's Marine located near the creek.

Investigation by Vihlen and Gene Meadors showed that oil residue was being dumped into the creek from a four-inch pipe running out of Seaboard Coastline property, where fueling docks are located. County Sanitarian Val Robbins who followed complaints about oil on the river, had made inspection, but was unable to determine the origin. Vihlen and Meadors in checking out the situation at the creek Monday morning.

Shop foreman for Seaboard Roy R. et al explained to the commissioner that the problem is that the pipe is draining from an oil spillage area and there is a catch tank which filters oil out of water resulting from the fueling operation of the trains. After the separation process the oil is supposed to be burned in another portion of the tank with the pipe draining of the excess water. During the past two weeks, this separation process has been malfunctioning causing a tremendous amount of diesel fuel to go into the creek and the lake.

Vihlen stated he then talked to L. A. Anderson, assistant superintendent of Seaboard Coastline, who expressed concern about the oil being dumped in the creek and promised him the railroad would cooperate fully in alleviating the problem. Although he does not have control over the shops, he felt there would be complete cooperation.

Reel placed a call to the Seaboard Coastline Head Engineer's Office requesting that they send down personnel to investigate and take steps to prevent the spill. Anderson and Reel have both informed Vihlen that Seaboard Coastline has recognized certain problems in excess oil leaving their property via creek, but not to this extent. They have in their budget \$164,000 to completely build a new facility which will separate

Teachers Seeking Pay Raise?

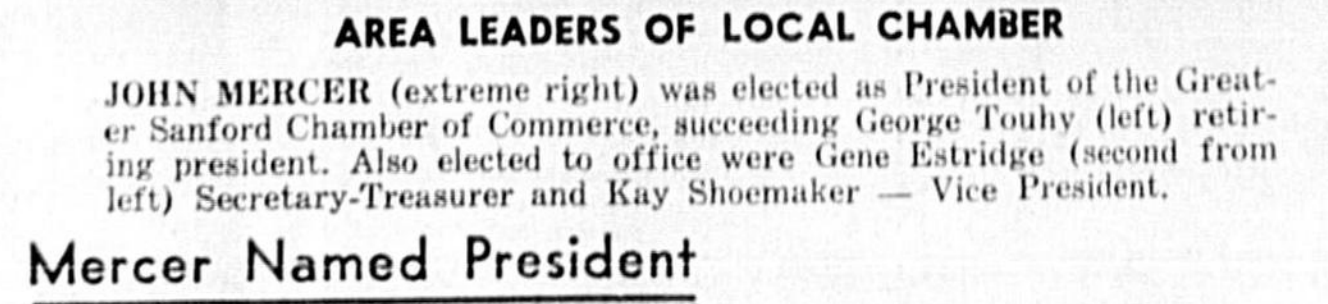
Seminole County school Board's Thursday 7 p.m. meeting with a proposal for the board to consider.

Hotel Units Assembled At Disney

WALT DISNEY WORLD — The nation's first on-the-job assembly line erection of fully completed, steel-framed hotel rooms was unrolling here today by United States Steel's realty development division.

Local, state and national press observed the operation which is turning out complete hotel room units for the first two resort hotels at this 27,000-acre facility. Both the 1,057-room Tempo Bay Resort Hotel, featuring a monorail running through the lobby, and the 425-unit South Seas Polynesian Village are scheduled to open in the fall of 1971.

The room units, assembled with all utilities installed and interior decor complete, progress past 26 separate assembly points.

The Tempo Bay Resort Hotel features a central history high rise structure with a complex of three-story annex structures radiating from the center of activity. The high rise structure employs a three-story primary structural frame, allowing the assembled room units to be stacked one on another between simple supports. The annex buildings will be made up of the same room units, placed three high. The Polynesian Village is composed of low rise structures.

Polynesian Village and the Tempo Resort Hotel, largest of the five theme hotels planned for Walt Disney World, are expected to be open when the public is admitted to the Disney entertainment extravaganza next October. Tempo Bay will feature a 90-foot high open-hall lobby through which the monorail trains will transport guests to a mid recreation area. Clustered around the lobby will be shops and restaurants as well as exhibition and other convention facility.

Both the Tempo Bay Resort Hotel and the Polynesian Village will have lake settings, featuring swimming, boating and water skiing.

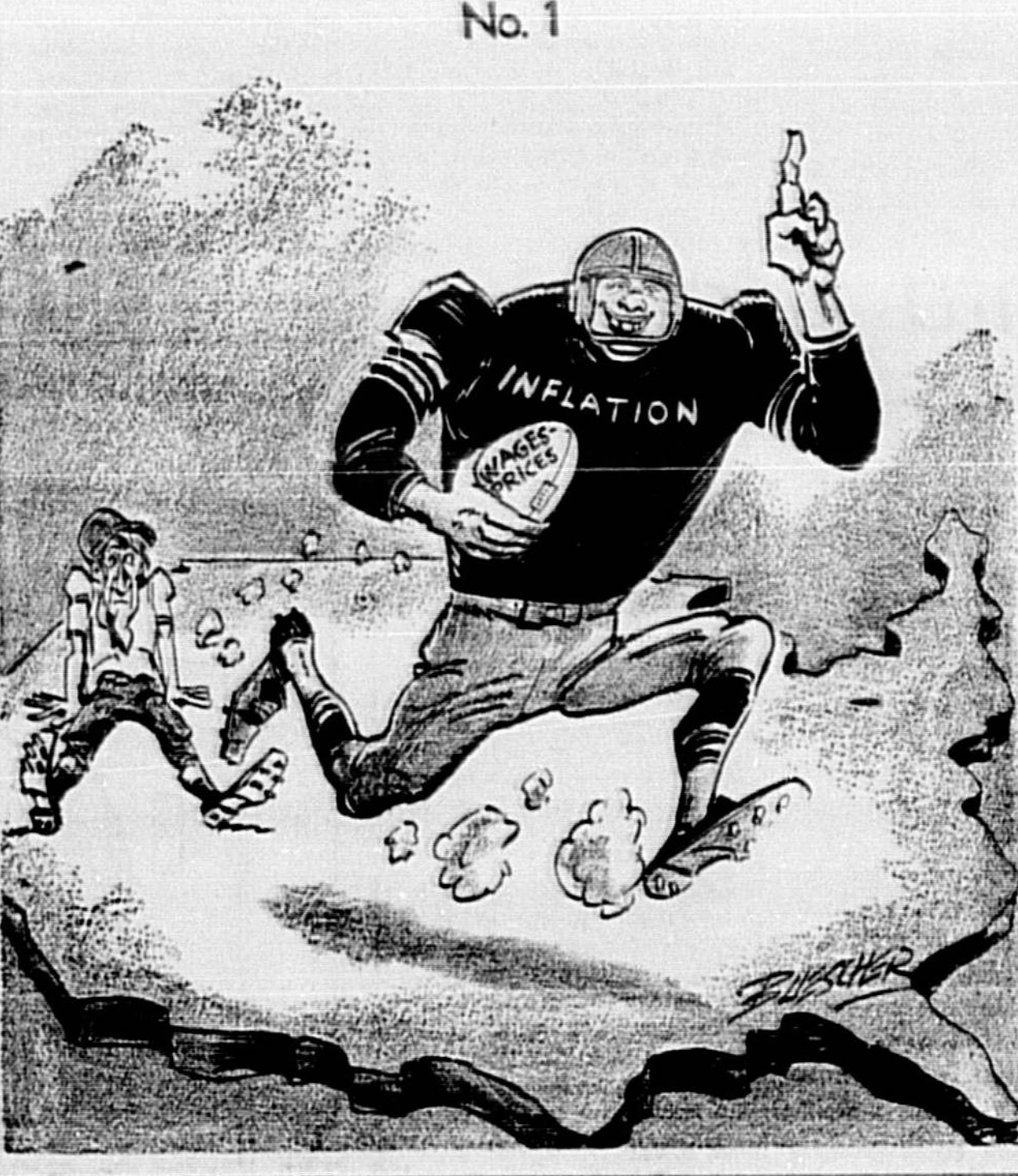

Holiday Table Show Reflects Touch Of Genius

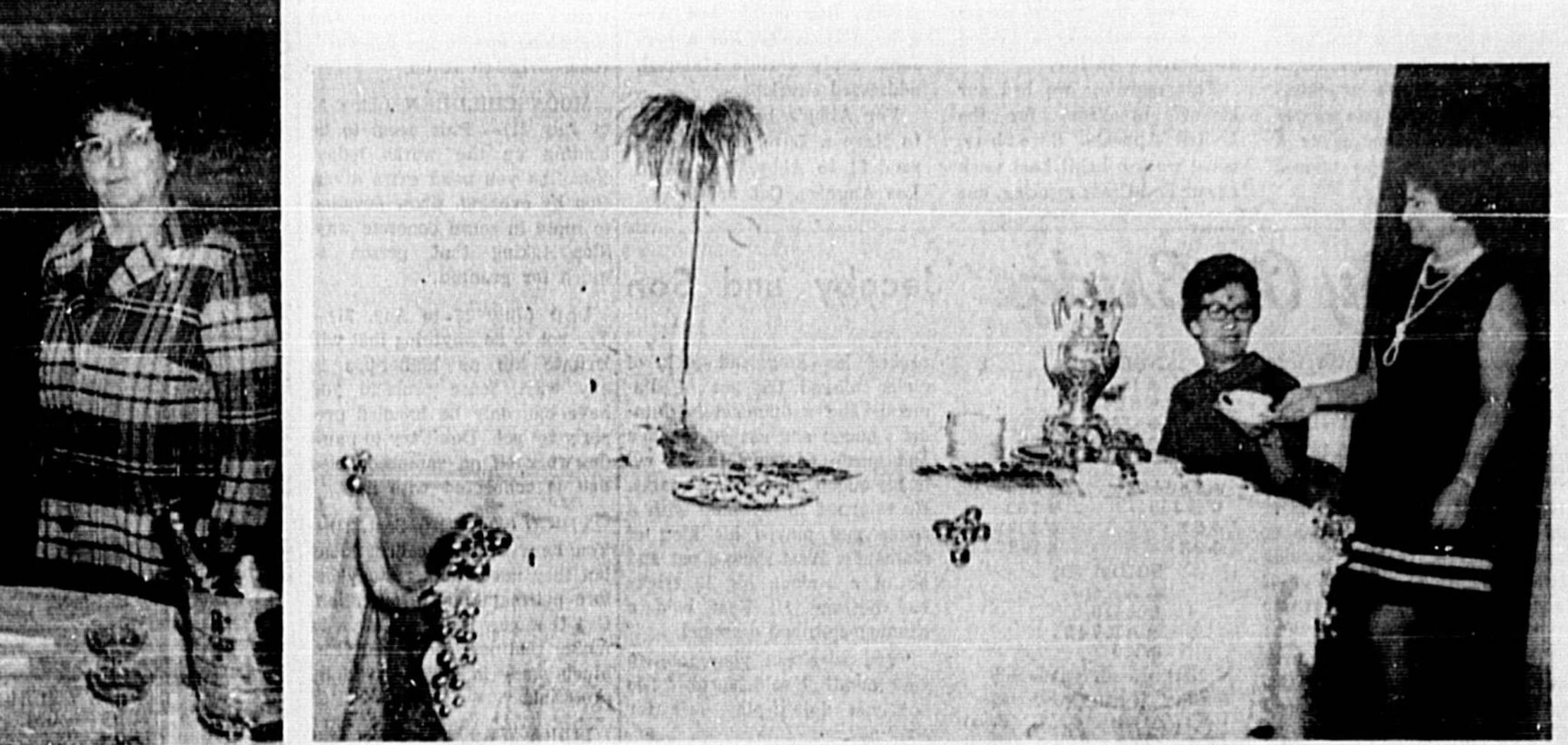

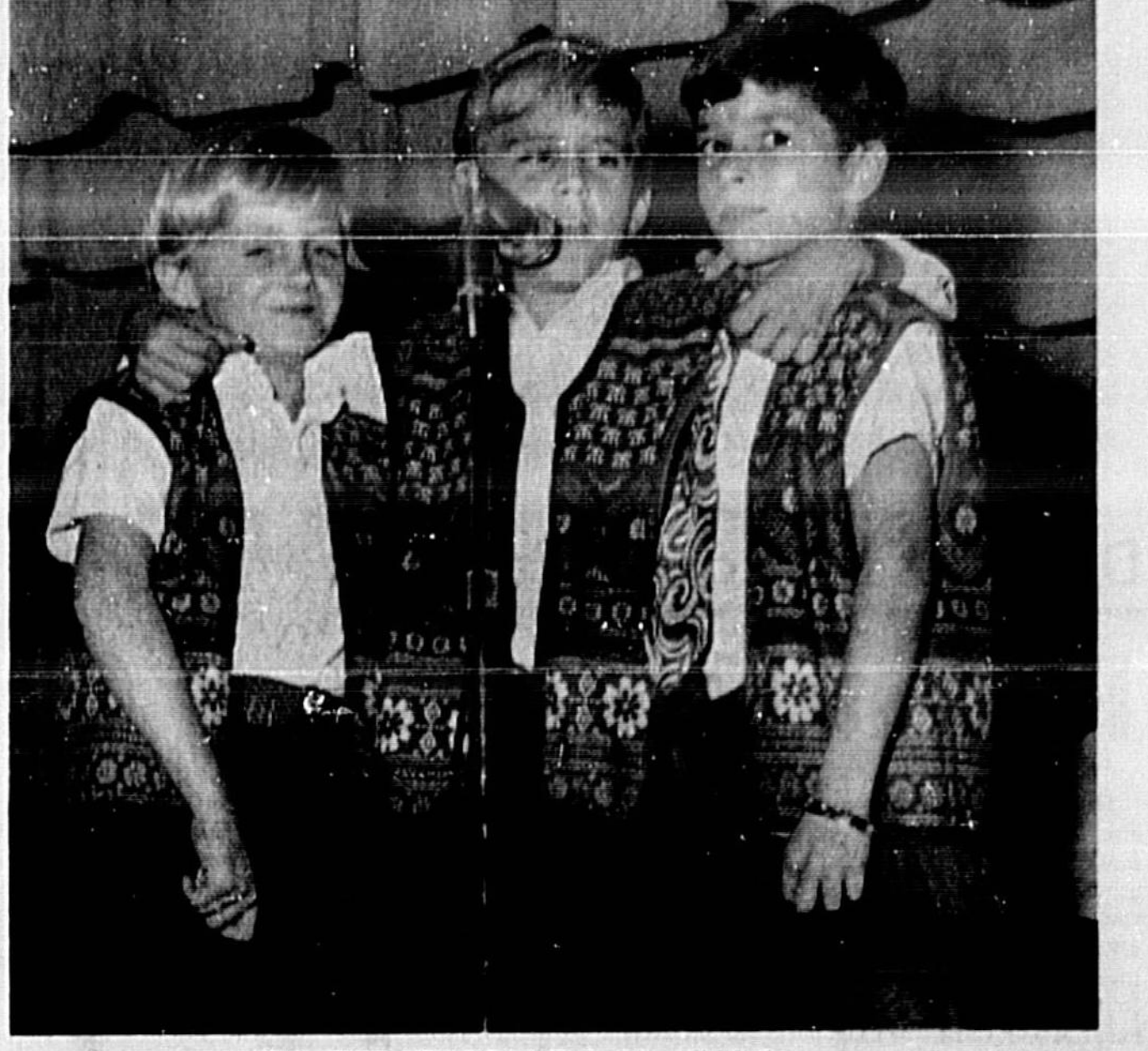
