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## Lost boaters find way out of state park

WEKIVA - Two boaters found their way home Thursday after getting lost for nearly two days in the Rock Springs State Preserve.

Donald Richards, 18, and Robert Dawson, 20, of Longwood, went fishing on the Little Wekiva River at about 11 p.m. Tuesday, saying they would return Wednesday afternoon. Their parents called the Seminole County Sheriff's Office at 8:30 a.m. Thursday when the two had not returned, deputies said.

Richards and Dawson were located by police at about 12:45 p.m. Thursday. They had pulled off the Wekiva River in Rock Springs State Preserve, hiked about two miles into the park, and found a group of YMCA campers at a POW-WOW.

The campers took Richards and Dawson home to Longwood. Members of the Florida Department of Environmental Protection towed the boat they were using back to the Wekiva Springs Marina.

"Both of them are fine, a little dehydrated and tired, but doing okay," Seminole County

Sheriff's Office spokesperson Deanna Brown said.

Richards and Dawson entered the Little Wekiva River at Springs Landing Blvd. off of Markham Woods Road in Longwood. They were on an 8-to-10 foot aluminum Kitty Hawk, owned by their 20-year old friend John Reed.

The only items Richards and Dawson brought with them were a couple fishing poles, two car batteries for the trolling motor, four batteries for their lantern, a knife with a compass, and a cooler with a few snacks and kool-aid. They did not bring paddles or life jackets.

Richards told police that he and Dawson got lost while hiking at night.

After putting in the river and heading up stream, it took three hours to reach the springs. They then turned around and headed back downstream before getting a cup of coffee at a Denny's restaurant, police said.

"By this time the trolling motor is dead, they've turned the wrong way on a fork in the river and are using paddles and have no food or drink," Brown said.

## Trust fund opens for twin babies' family

LAKE MARY - A trust fund has been established for the Bernauer twins, who died a little more than 24 hours after their mother, Violetta Bernauer, suffered a ruptured uterus in a traffic accident in Lake Mary on Monday. Meanwhile, the driver who ran a red light and struck Bernauer's car is pleading not guilty to vehicular homicide.

Sanford resident Kenneth Hinson, 48, ran a red light on Rhinehart Road in Lake Mary Monday at 10:57 a.m. and struck the driver's side door of Violetta Bernauer's Honda Prelude with his Dodge pickup. Bernauer was about seven months pregnant.

Baby Brian died just before midnight Monday, and baby Joshua died shortly after noon Tuesday at the Arnold Palmer Hospital for Children & Women. They were delivered

by Caesarian section at the hospital shortly after the accident.

The Bernauer family has established a trust fund to offset medical and funeral expenses, with any remainder of the fund dedicated to charity. Anyone wishing to donate can make a check payable to The Babies Bernauer Trust Fund, in care of any Nations Bank in Central Florida.

Bernauer, 30, is recovering in stable condition at ORMC. She has been removed from the intensive care unit, according to hospital spokesman Joe Brown.

In addition to the ruptured uterus, Bernauer suffered lacerations to her left arm and left leg.

"She's continuing to recuperate," Brown said. "She's doing fairly well."

This was the first pregnancy for Violetta and David Bernauer of Lake Mary, who have

## Lake Mary Oks new police cameras

LAKE MARY - Lake Mary city officials on Thursday authorized their police chief to purchase six in-car video camera systems for a total expenditure of \$22,998. Considered by law enforcement officials to be an essential tool to obtain convictions on criminal charges, these six units supplement the six currently in use.

According to Capt. Sam Belfiore, an original bid request from Lady Lake Police Department allowed the city to save 45 days in the bid process by "piggy backing" on to the Lady Lake request.

"We also get the best price

for our effort," said Belfiore. Using \$9,000 in funds from the Capital Project Fund per the approved Fiscal Year 1999 budget and a supplemental appropriation for an additional \$13,998 of expenditure, the installation of the additional systems would now find 12 of the city's 22 patrol cars upgraded with this equipment.

The city purchased the systems from On Patrol Video Systems of Ontario, Ohio.

Belfiore said that the units would be installed by Enforcement Electronics of Lakeland. They are contracted and certified by On Patrol to install and repair the units. The authorized service center for the product, the installers

**A saint surely worth knowing**

A columnist for one of the area newspapers seems to think that Gonzaga isn't much of a name for a school. Can anyone tell me what a Gonzaga is? he asks.

Although I never met St. Aloysius Gonzaga, he was very much on my mind in the 1950s thanks to the Jesuit priests and scholastics who were my teachers.

I attended Gonzaga College High School in Washington, D.C. It is named for St. Aloysius Gonzaga, the patron of Catholic Youth. St. Aloysius was born at Castiglione, Spain in 1568. He died in 1591 after helping plague victims for more than four years.

There are a number of American schools named for St. Aloysius including Gonzaga University in Spokane, Wash. The school's most famous graduates are the late entertainer Bing Crosby and the professional basketball star John Stockton.

Gonzaga College High School in Washington, D.C. was begun in 1821. It is the oldest educational institution in the old Federal City. I didn't come on the roll until 1953. I wore a coat and tie to school each day. One of my classmates was Pat Buchanan - he's running for president, you know.

At Gonzaga, I translated Caesar's Gaelic Wars from Latin to English, recited Shakespeare in Father Bellwoar's Oratory class, avoided Mr. Donahue, the Prefect of Discipline and shot baskets in Mr. Joe Kozik's gymnasium which was once a swimming pool. Gonzaga had to play all its basketball games away from home.

My favorite teacher at Gonzaga was Mr. Frank Bourbon. He pronounced the name Bore-Bon not Bur-Ban. He was a Jesuit not a whiskey. He was a big man, a son of a Baltimore fireman. Years and years after I left Gonzaga, Father Bourbon stayed in touch. He was always the first Christmas card - the first birthday greeting.

Girls did not attend Gonzaga. They went to Notre Dame Academy, which was next door off North Capitol Street. The best time to be with the Notre Dame girls was on the Capital Transit trolleys that stopped on North Capitol. We paid three cents a ride in 1953.

If a Gonzaga lad misbehaved he sometimes was sent over to Notre Dame to spend the day with the girls. Another form of punishment - less severe the Jesuits thought - was for offenders to spend time in JUO (Judgment Under God). JUO was an after school detention. Pat Buchanan probably was Jugged more than he'll admit.

Gonzaga's sports teams were always among the best in Washington, D.C., and the students not on the varsities attended games just as The Navy Midshipmen or Army Cadets do. A Gonzaga-St. John's game was as fierce as Army-Navy. I once received 20 extra points on a Religion exam by predicting a 14-7 Gonzaga football victory over St. John's.

On Fridays, Gonzagas went to 8 a.m. Mass at St. Aloysius Church. We sang the hymns in Latin and the

**Rep. Corrine Brown meets residents on Sunday**

SANFORD - Whenever Rep. Corrine Brown comes to town, there are many residents who want to hear what she is trying to do for them and to remind her of what Washington can do for the community.

On Sunday from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. Brown will hold court in a town meeting at Trinity United Methodist Church at Sanford and 6th streets. Brown will also speak at the 11 a.m. service at 1st Shiloh Missionary Church at 700 Elm St.

Brown's aide, Gretchen

Hitchner, said Thursday that the congresswoman was eager to visit again with the residents of Sanford, many of whom have been among her most avid supporters. Brown, a Democrat, has served in the U.S. House of Representatives since 1993. She was re-elected in November.

When Brown was first elected, it was the first time since Reconstruction that Florida sent an African American to Congress. She is one of three African Americans among the 23 Florida Representatives - one of eight Democrats.

"Congresswoman Brown has been a voice for the poor and the working people, the sen-

iors and the children," Hitchner said. She's been an ardent supporter of the President's Crime Bill.

Brown represents the newly created 3rd Congressional District of Florida, that includes Jacksonville, Daytona and Orlando and parts of nine counties - Clay, Duval, Flagler, Lake, Putnam, Orange, St. Johns, Seminole and Volusia.

Although her opponent spent three times as much to unseat Brown last November, she stayed on in Washington. Her own campaign was highlighted by a number of TV and radio spots, the most popular being a spirited "Oh Happy Day" ad.

"While a number of those in

the House were consumed by the recent impeachment process, Corrine Brown continued to do the work she was elected to do," Hitchner said. "She didn't go off track with the political witch hunt. Her priorities are the communities she represents."

Brown is the only member of Florida's delegation on the Subcommittee on Aviation, and has a keen interest in the success of the Sanford Orlando Airport. She has consistently

tried to get more funds for Florida's Airports from the Federal Aviation Administration. She also supports funding for a light-rail system for Central Florida.

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**Working out at home/Search smarter on the Web**

Sales of home exercise equipment have increased by 78 percent in the past five years. According to industry surveys, half of American households contain at least one piece of exercise equipment.

Is that hardware in regular use, or has it become an expensive clothes rack? To find out, we surveyed our readers, who told us about more than 8,000 home exercise machines they'd bought between 1994 and 1998.

Our findings suggest that many garments could adorn the nation's home exercise riders, nonmotorized treadmills and stair climbers. Only about one-quarter of those machines bought by readers in the past five years were still being used when we conducted our survey in spring 1998.

Voted most likely to be used: motorized treadmills. More than half bought between 1994 and 1998 were still in use. On the whole, our survey results singled out motorized treadmills as the best bet in home exercise equipment. (The elliptical exerciser, a cross between an exercise bike, a ski machine and a stair climber, is growing in popularity, but too few of our readers owned one at the time of our survey for us to have results on them. Our tests indicate that an elliptical exerciser provides a workout equivalent to a treadmill's, although some are a nuisance to maintain.)

Whether their goal was to manage weight, improve fitness or reduce stress, readers were more satisfied with treadmills than with any other type of machine. In addition, among readers who had stopped using their machine, comparatively few owners of motorized treadmills did so because they were bored.

Just 38 percent of all exercise machines were bought by readers who said they were already exercising regularly. The rest were bought by people who intended to start exercising. This



is not necessarily a good idea: Although half of the machines bought by a current exerciser were still being used, less than a third of those bought by beginners were in use.

If, after taking the first steps toward a regular exercise program, you're still interested in buying eng equipment, look for a machine that matches your preferences. For example, if you like cycling, try a stationary bike. If you like hiking, a stair stepper may be more your speed.

Sample various types of machine at a store. Some health clubs will let you use equipment for a small fee or join on a short-term basis. Realize, though, that home machines may bear only a passing resemblance to their larger, more elaborate brethren at health clubs.

Before buying machine, consider the service and warranty offered. Warranties on the treadmills we tested were as short as 90 days - and require you to take the machine to an authorized service center. Furthermore, about one in seven motorized treadmills our readers bought between 1994 and 1998 required repair - a higher percentage than for many of the other machines in our survey. That may be because they have motors and electronic equipment, or because they were used more often. In any case, a treadmill is one of the few products for which an extended warranty may be appropriate. (Such a warranty generally provides for in-home repairs and costs about \$70 to \$120 for one to three years of coverage.)

You can save money on exercise equipment by buying a machine sec-

ondhand. With many machines gathering dust, there are bargains to be had through classified ads and garage sales. A rowing machine that cost \$1,000 new can be yours for a few hundred dollars used. But be careful when buying a motorized treadmill. If it has had heavy use, its motor and other mechanical components may be prone to breakdowns - and those problems aren't easy to see.

If you can name it, you can probably find it on the World Wide Web - if you know the Web address. But if you don't have a clue about which address to use, you probably use one of the Web's search sites - a free service like Yahoo! or Infoseek that lets you type in a subject or name, then see a list of related Web sites.

Useful as search engines are, if you don't know how to use them effectively, you can waste hours picking through hundreds or thousands of irrelevant search results. Here are some tips to help you make the most of your searches:

1. Pick the right kind of service. It's best to let the type of search dictate which service you use. For very specific information, such as a particular organization, start with a site like Yahoo!. Though it works like other search engines, Yahoo! is more properly termed a "directory" - it organizes sites into categories such as business, recreation and arts. Yahoo! doesn't get you everywhere on the Web, but it can lead you to pages at many useful Web sites.

For general subjects (e.g. stain removal) or esoteric subjects (e.g. multiple myeloma), start with a site like Alta Vista, Excite, HotBot, Infoseek or Lycos. These services use their own resources to directly access and collect the content from individual Web sites, indexing it for quick searches.

For unique types of searches, such as reading the text of recent discourse in public discussion groups collectively known as Usenet, go to a specialized site known as Deja News. The site known as List will search through thousands of subscriber-only discussion groups for one on your topic of interest and tell you how to sign up.

3. Refine your search. Reducing "noise" - information that's irrelevant to your search - is the key to finding information quickly. You can specify two or more words that a Web page must contain to be included in the search results. If, for example, you want information about the soundtrack of the movie "Paris, Texas" - and not about just anything to do with "Paris" or "Texas" - you can specify two or more words that a Web page must contain to be included in the search results. In this instance, entering "Paris and Texas and soundtrack" reduces the number of resultant links to those containing all three words. The result is links that are far more germane. To further reduce noise, Excite and other search engines rank the links according to how relevant they appear to be.

3. Shift to power tools. If a single search engine doesn't produce useful results, you can use a meta-search site that will submit a single search simultaneously to several major engines. One such site, Meta-Crawler, provides detailed descriptions of the

links found by several major search engines, grouped by search engine. Another site, Inference Find, groups its search results into useful categories.

4. Remember these points:  
- Don't rely entirely on one search site. Instead, bookmark preferred search services, or use your browser's "preferences" setting to reconfigure its home page or toolbar to bring up sites you want to use.

- Expect plenty of ads on search sites, including ads that look like part of the search service. The program Intermute, \$20 (www.intermute.com), works well at reducing or eliminating ads.

- To learn more about search services' features, visit www.searchenginewatch.com. This commercial site includes reviews of search-engine performance, basic information about how the engines work and how they compare. Or go to a search service and search for "search engine."

# 'New' Longwood city hall opens its doors

**LONGWOOD** - The renovated Longwood City Commission Chambers opened Monday as about 25 people attended the City Commission session.

The four month renovation project cost nearly \$90,000. The commission had been holding meetings at the Longwood Civic League Women's Club since Nov. 11.

The renovation included painting and wallpaper, new carpet and furniture, tiling at the entrances, a new dias, a ceiling, a sound system, window treatments, and privacy walls in the restrooms, according to Monica Mitchell, director of administrative services.

"I think it's super," Mayor Rusty Miles said. "The ambience is more homey than it used to be. All I need now a big screen T.V. and a box of popcorn, then I'd really feel at home."

The commission heard a presentation from Dwayne

Darbonne on a model street paving design aimed at calming traffic throughout the city.

The commission did not take a vote on the direction to take on paving the city's dirt roads and traffic calming measures because commissioner Steve Miller said it would be best to wait until commissioner Paul Lovstrand, who was absent, had a chance to study the plans.

The additional cost of the proposed project is about five percent above the current city street paving design. Darbonne said. The funding is available in the fiscal year 1998/99 budget, according to staff.

"The goal of applying traffic calming techniques to roads in Longwood is to provide a safe condition for pedestrians, especially children on foot going to and from the school, play ground, fields and area shopping," Darbonne said.

All the commissioners present at the session said they were pleased with the renovated chambers.

Commissioner Steve Miller said his concern is that more chairs may need to be placed in the commission chambers for times when there is a large audience.

City Manager John Drago said bringing in additional

chairs would not be a problem.

Commissioner Annamarte Vacca said she is also pleased with the renovated chambers.

"They did a great job," Vacca said. "Finally we've got something the city can be proud of."

been married for about a year and a half. The hospital is not releasing information on whether Bernauer can have children again, Brown said.

Hinson, who has been arrested 27 times according to police, remains in the Seminole County jail in Sanford with a \$10,000 bond, charged with two counts of vehicular homicide.

Attorney Mark O'Mara of Winter Park, representing Hinson, said he is working with Hinson's family to decide whether bond will be posted in the coming days.

Hinson has two prior DUI convictions. Police at the accident's scene did not believe Hinson was intoxicated, although the results of the blood test are not available.

O'Mara said that while the death of the Bernauer twins is "unfathomable," running a red light is not the type of conduct that should be the basis of vehicular homicide.

"Running a red light does not constitute reckless disregard," O'Mara said. "Reckless disregard would be going 75-80 (miles per hour) through a school zone."

Hinson is married with one

child. He is depressed over the accident and the death of the Bernauer twins, O'Mara said.

"He's very depressed and very sorry for the results of the accident," O'Mara said. "I can't even begin to imagine the pain the Bernauer family is going through."

## Devine leader for the Depression

The Depression was everywhere. You could see it and feel it. Unemployed men sold apples for a nickel on street corners or were reduced to begging: "Brother, can you spare a dime?"

Eddie Cantor tried his best to keep the country's spirits up by singing "Happy Days Are Here Again" on the radio. To families living in cardboard shantytowns known as "Hoovervilles," President Hoover promised "a chicken in every pot."

The chickens never came home to roost, however, and it would be another five or 10 years for the happy days to return.

In New York's Harlem, conditions were as bad as anywhere else (or worse), but the mood was different. The one responsible for this difference was a black evangelist of small stature known as Father Divine, whose followers believed he was God. Indeed, he was savior to many homeless and unemployed in Harlem during the 1930s.

He ran an employment agency that got jobs for thousands. True, they had to turn over all their earnings to Father Divine, but it is also true that they lacked nothing.

The various residences he owned were called "Heavens." Here his "Angels" (the name he gave his followers) received free room and board. There was a fine dinner every evening and a comfortable place to sleep every night. They were happier than they had ever been.

Those who attended his meetings but were not ready to forsake all for Father paid \$1 to \$2 a week to live in one of his "Extension Heavens." Meals were 15 to 20 cents.

He served free Sunday dinners to hundreds—with hams, roasts, chickens and turkeys.

With his Angels turning over all their earnings to him, Father Divine was able to dress in \$500 silk suits and ride around in a chauffeur driven Rolls-Royce. In the 1930s he bought 25 restaurants, six grocery stores, 10 dry-cleaning establishments and a coal business. His net income was figured at \$10,000 a week.

In 1941 he moved into a 32-room mansion along Philadelphia's posh Main Line. In 1946 he married Edna Rose Ritchings, the 21-year-old white daughter of a Vancouver florist whom he renamed Spotless Virgin Bride. They remained married for 19 years—until Father Divine's death in 1965.

Father Divine preached purity of mind and behavior. His worshippers greeted each other with the word "peace" because "Hello" started with a swear word.

Sometimes when the 5-foot-2 deity would seem to be violating his own tenets about sexual abstinence, he would explain to his female partner of the moment, "I am bringing your desires to the surface so that I can eliminate them."

A judge once denounced Father Divine from the bench as a home-breaker.

The black religious leader, who was born George Baker, established his divinity in the minds of his followers in 1931 when the judge who sentenced him to jail in a disorderly conduct charge dropped dead. "I hated to do it," said Father Divine when he heard the news. To his followers, this left no doubt that Father had struck the jurist dead.

The words were passed along that the dignified evangelist had taken into his own body all the physical afflictions of mankind.

"Isn't that just like Father?" his followers said.

### St. Alban's offers tradition in Oviedo

As churches become more modern with many old ideas being replaced by new ones, there's still some traditional parishes remaining.

One of them is in Oviedo. The St. Alban's Cathedral is the Cathedral Church of the Eastern United States of the Anglican Province of America.

To be more succinct, one of the differences is that, in the Anglican Church, some of the older traditions remain.

"One of the things that separates up from the Episcopal Churches are liturgical differences," said The Most Reverend Walter Grundorf. "We use a traditional liturgy based on the 1928 Book of Common Prayer. We also believe in a male priesthood because that's the way it was presented in the old testam-

ent. We don't have a right to change that."

The service also features active participation including kneeling on all prayers and standing for the reading of the Holy Gospel.

The Anglican church still celebrates the same feast days and the same sacramental system, but is a separate jurisdiction from the Episcopal church.

Grundorf said many of the changes came in the mid-70s which is right around the time St. Alban's was built on an orange grove. The property is currently undergoing an expansion program that will install a new parish hall and, in the future, it is hoped to build an elementary school. There is also a vision to build a retirement community the church held a ceremony marking the blessing of the new land in January.

One of the things that really makes St. Alban's special is its music program. B. Richard Wright is the organist and music director and acclaimed all over. There is an active adult choir which performs challenging classical music from all periods and a bell choir has been formed. It will hold a dedication concert in the fall.

## Safe sex is subject of Longwood lecture series

Susan Idensohn, Executive Director of Planned Parenthood of Orlando and former Director of the Division of International Trade and Development of the Florida Department of Commerce, will be speaking at Longwood Congregation Beth Am's Sunday Connection lecture series on March 28 beginning at 11 a.m. with a light breakfast available at no cost. Idensohn will be speaking about local efforts to curb teen pregnancy. She will also touch on the difficulties organizations such as hers receive from various groups within the political community.

Idensohn has many years of experience dealing with pregnancy in teens, and not just through her current position. She was responsible for a program in St. Louis, which dropped the teen pregnancy in the area twenty percent in its

first year. The program involved recruiting teens at high risk of pregnancy and trained them to be peer facilitators for other at risk teens.

Idensohn says she is very interested in the Sunday Connection as a forum, mostly due to the participation of those in attendance.

"The audience tends to be motivated and interested in the topics which are discussed," says Idensohn. "And hopefully, people who wouldn't normally be exposed to reproductive advocacy issues will attend."

Idensohn cites her own long-standing interest in women's health issues and years of non-profit experience as her current motivation as Director of Planned Parenthood. "My first job was as a pharmaceutical representative, calling on Planned Parenthood and family physicians," says Idensohn. "I was

instrumental in convincing my management to reduce the cost of family planning products for low-income patients, and started a unique inner-city program for young teens, both programs still in effect today."

Idensohn spent six years managing non-profits in Asia, including a position as the Executive Director of the Management Development Institute of Singapore. Upon her return to Florida, she was named Division Director of the Division of International Trade and Development of the Florida Department of Commerce, a position she held for four years. Her most recent position was interfacing with the state's WAGES Coalition in providing solutions for welfare-to-work participants.

Beth Am's Sunday Connection series has been known for addressing a wide range of issues important to the community since its inception in

1996. Sunday Connection breakfasts begin at 11 a.m. in the synagogue's sanctuary. The forum has hosted a variety of guests, including politicians, school board members,

## Debit cards do not affect credit history

**DEAR BRUCE:** I am a college student, and I have no credit cards. I decided to apply for one and was turned down because my credit report showed excessive bank-card utilization. I use my debit card frequently, but I don't understand how this could reflect badly on my credit rating. — J.E., Rollo, Mo.

**DEAR J.E.:** I am at a loss as to why they would deny you credit on that basis. Generally, college students — particularly those in their last undergraduate year — are bombarded with credit-card applications, even though they have no appreciable income. The theory behind this is that if they can hook them in college, they'll remain customers for a good many years. A debit card is simply a way to access deposited and credited funds. How frequently it is used should have no bearing on your credit, as the funds are there as you use the card. Please ask for a more complete explanation — it could well be that somebody has dropped the ball.

**DEAR BRUCE:** In a recent column, you answered a question about unclaimed accounts in escheat. I have a variation: What happens to gift certificates that have expired? Is this the same as unclaimed bank accounts and the like? Does the holder of the gift certificate have any claim against the merchant, or are they out of luck? — B.S., via e-mail

**DEAR B.S.:** The issuer of the gift certificate has the same responsibilities as the bank, trading stamp purveyor, etc. — and that is to turn over the money that was collected for the gift certificates that were never redeemed to the escheat division. In reality, this seldom happens. You might walk into the merchant where you have this old gift certificate and inquire whether they have turned it over to escheat; if they haven't, tell them they have broken the law and, unless they honor your certificate, you will be obliged to notify the state. Most merchants will suddenly have an epiphany, and your gift certificate will no longer be expired.

**DEAR BRUCE:** Your answer for T.M. in Las Vegas — regarding the uniform transfers to minors' act account — is incorrect. Under UTMA provisions, the first \$650 of unearned income to the account is tax-free each year. The next \$650 is taxed at the child's bracket, with no separate tax return required. Unearned income in excess of \$1,300 a year is taxed in the adult custodian's marginal tax bracket. Once the child is 14, all earned income is taxed to the child. While access to the account at the age of majority of the child is a disadvantage, the tax advantages often make this vehicle attractive to the parent. — Bill Rogensmoserch, F.C., via e-mail

**DEAR BILL:** Thank you for the correction. The area where I disagree is that the rather modest tax advantage justifies the risk of putting the youngster in control of a large sum at a very tender age.

**DEAR BRUCE:** I have friends who claim that because they have put all their money into an irrevocable trust, if they have to go into a nursing home,

they can keep the money or give it away, and not have to spend it on their care. — S.C., Manitowoc, Wis.

**DEAR S.C.:** There are many ways to take money out of your own control, a trust is one way, but it must be done longer than the look-back period,

which is two years. In other words, you would have to do it two years ahead of time. Still, the larger question is whether or not it's appropriate and proper to take your money and put it somewhere where it cannot be used for your benefit and then look to welfare to pay your bills. I guess either side of the argument could be made, and I leave it to your sense of honor and morality to make a decision you are comfortable with.

**DEAR BRUCE:** My wife and I inherited an empty lot on a golf course. We have no plans to use the property, so we put it on the market for two years at \$30,000. No takers. It is currently costing \$1,600 a year in taxes and fees. We recently got our tax bill, and the assessed value is \$65,000. At

first I thought I should try to get it reassessed to lower the taxes, but then I thought it might be a good idea to donate it to a charity and deduct the \$65,000. What do you think? — J. and J.T. Nitro, W.V.

OVIEDO - It may have looked like a blowout on the scoreboard, but Thursday night's finale of the Paul Mikler-Reebok Classic between the Oviedo Lions and Boone Braves was almost too close for comfort for the Lions and their fans.

"Winning the tournament is nice, but what was more important for me was that it was a very competitive tournament," said Oviedo coach Kerne Brown. "Not one of the six teams walked away thinking they were outclassed. One pitch here, a hit there and the outcome could have been completely different."

"It was a lot of work. A lot of people volunteered a lot of hours to help make this tournament a success and I can't thank them enough. The end result was an event worthy to bear Mr. Paul Mikler's name."

The final day of the three-day, nine-game tourney began with the Colonial Grenadiers shutting out the Lyman Grey-

## House dust can trigger allergies

House dust is not dust that blows in from out-of-doors. Instead, house dust is produced indoors from fibers and the breakdown of plant and animal material used in the home including feathers, cotton, wool, jute, hemp, animal hairs, etc.

House dust also may include human skin scales, animal dander and saliva and a large variety of mold. Other allergy triggers found in the house are proteins that are one of the major triggers of asthma and other allergic reactions.

House dust mite allergy is especially troublesome where the indoor humidity is high. Dust mites can be found throughout the house, but they especially thrive where human dander is located, such as on mattresses, pillows, bed covers, upholstered furniture and carpeting.

**How To Reduce Dust In Your Home**

**1. Bedrooms.** Smooth, uncluttered, easily cleaned surfaces are recommended. Small objects, such as knickknacks, books, records, tapes, stereos, televisions and stuffed animals should be placed in drawers or closed cabinets. Avoid using your bedroom as a library or study room.

**2. Controlling dust mites** in mattresses requires either regular vacuuming or putting them in dust-free casings.

**3. Bedding** must be washable and should be washed weekly in hot water. Washing with cool water does not kill dust mites.

**4. Carpetsing.** House dust mites, mold spores, animal

dander and other allergens are abundant in carpeting. Carpeting laid over concrete floors contains especially high levels of dust mites because of increased humidity. Smooth flooring is a better choice.

**5. Vacuuming.** Cleaning is essential, but vacuum cleaners stir dust up into the air. Upholstered furniture should be vacuumed, other surfaces should be mopped or wiped. Weekly housecleaning is suggested.

**6. Air Conditioning.** Con-

trolling the indoor relative humidity to below 70 percent is important to reduce the growth of dust mites and mold. Central air conditioning is the most effective way of controlling humidity. Air conditioning cleans and cools the indoor air and keeps the moist outside air outdoors. Mechanical A/C filters using standard disposable fiberglass should be changed monthly. Permanent filters with baffles should be cleaned periodically. The most effective filter is a high-efficiency particulate (HEPA) filter that also mechanically cleans air.

**7. Mold.** Molds thrive in areas of the house with increased humidity. Consistent cleaning helps keep mold growth to a minimum. Chlorine bleach, TSP and household cleaners help keep surfaces clear of mold. Before remodeling or selecting household furnishings or surfaces, consider how the decision will impact the dust in your home.

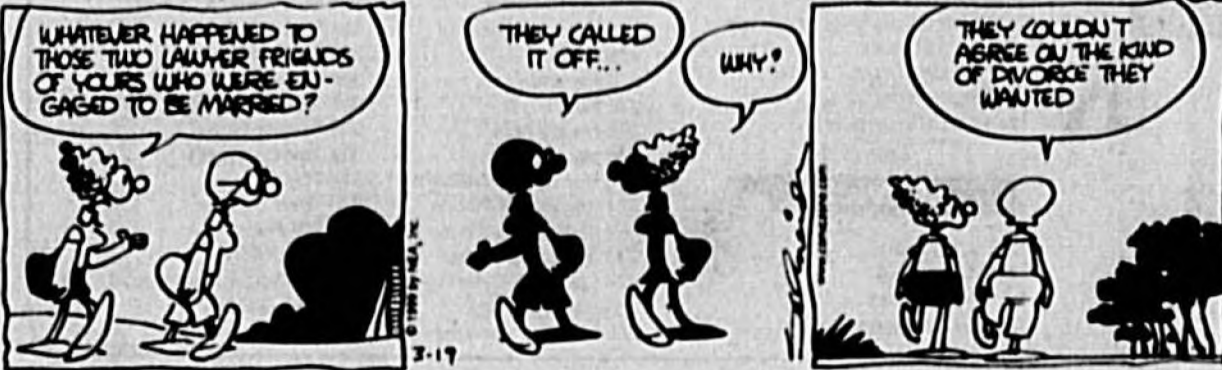

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## WIN AT BRIDGE

### Fact, not fiction

Let's end the week with two deals from real life featuring suit combinations. How would you play today's club suit for no loser?

The declarer was Patrick Huang, from Taiwan. He is the top-ranked player from that part of the Pacific Rim, having first represented his country in the Open Teams at the Far East Championships when only 15 years old.

The bidding was wild, as it often is at the tournament level these days, especially when the weaker side has a big fit and is nonvulnerable. Still, the final contract was excellent.

After taking dummy's heart king with his ace, East switched to the diamond three: ace, 10, six. Huang drew trumps, then took his other diamond

tricks, West playing the two and four, East the five and jack.

The auction suggested that the hearts were splitting 5-3: East needed five for his overall, and West wouldn't have gone to the five-level without five-card support. Still, how could West, a passed hand, justify bidding five hearts? He had to have a distributional hand. Perhaps the diamonds were 6-3, as the carding suggested. If so, West started with 3-5-4-0 distribution.

In isolation, it is best to start with dummy's club jack. Perhaps East, with Q-10-2, will err by covering with the queen, exposing both the 3-0 split and his 10 to a second-round finesse. If East plays low smoothly, though, you plan to win with the ace.

Huang crossed to dummy with a trump, then called for the club jack. Although East correctly played low, Huang did likewise to make his slam. Brilliant!

## ASK DR. GOTT

### Keeping the mouth happy and healthy

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** Is chewing gum bad for you? Is there any food or habit I should avoid to keep my mouth healthy?

**DEAR READER:** Chewing gum is not harmful. However, the brands that contain sugar do promote tooth decay. Spicy gum may cause swelling or irritation of the tongue and oral lining. Some types of sugarless gum are quite hard to chew and may lead to premature wearing-down of the teeth.

You can improve your dental health by brushing and flossing regularly, using fluoride toothpaste and going easy on sugary edibles. In addition, obtain regular dental check-ups and follow your dentist's instructions about oral hygiene.

Remember that the regular use of tobacco (especially the smokeless variety) is associated with tumors of the mouth and throat.

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** What causes the droopy lower eyelids that are common in the elderly? Our road is rocky enough without the added burden of

looking like ghosts.

**DEAR READER:** As people age, their skin begins to sag. In addition, they often lose subcutaneous fat.

These two factors can cause the appearance of bags under the eyes. You may be relieved to learn that many plastic surgeons are quite adept at removing excess tissue around the eyes. If you are tired of looking like the Ghost of Christmas Past, see a plastic surgeon for an opinion.

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** Yesterday my wife had an appointment with our HMO physician and had a blood pressure reading of 180/106. She was sent home and told to "watch it." At what point should we be concerned and do more than "watch it"?

**DEAR READER:** A blood pressure of 180/106 is dangerously high. I wouldn't "watch it" for long. Your wife should have several more

BP determinations made at various times of the day. The doctor can perform this task; so can a nurse or any qualified professional.

If your wife's blood pressure falls to normal (140/90 or below), additional monitoring every month or two would be appropriate.

On the other hand, if the reading remains elevated, she should be treated with medicine. I'd make that decision after a week or two of monitoring.
