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# Lost boaters find way out of state park

WEKIVA - Two boaters found their way home Thursday after getting lost for nearly two days in the Rock Springs State Pre-

Donald Richards, 18, and Robert Dawson, 20, of Longwood, went fishing on the Little Wekiva River at about 11 p.m. Tuesday, saying they would return Wednesday afternoon. Their parents called the Seminole County Sheriff's Office at 8:30 a.m. Thursday when the two had not returned, deputies said.

Richards and Dawson were Richards and Dawson were located by police at about 12:45 p.m. Thursday. They had pulled off the Wekiva River in Rock Springs State Preserve, hiked about two miles into the park, and found a group of YMCA campers at a POW-WOW.

The campers took Richards and Dawson home to Long-wood. Members of the Florida Protection towed the boat they were using back to the Wekiva Springs Marina.

Both of them are fine, a lit-

tle dehydrated and tired, but doing okay," Seminole County

Sheriffs Office spokesperson Deanna Brown said.

Richards and Dawson en-tered the Little Wekiva River at Springs Landing Blvd. off of Markham Woods Road in Longwood. They were on an 8-to-10 foot aluminum Kitty Hawk, owned by their 20-year old friend John Reed.

The only items Richards and Dawson brought with them were a couple fishing poles, two car batteries for the trolling motor, four batteries for their lantern, a knife with a compass, and a cooler with a few anacks and kool-aid. They did not bring paddles or life

Richards told police that he and Dawson got lost while hiking at night.

After putting in the river and heading up stream, it took three hours to reach the springs. They then turned around and headed back downstream before getting a cup of coffee at a Denny's restaurant, police said,

"By this time the trolling motor is dead, they've turned the wrong way on a fork in the river and are using paddles and have no food or drink," Brown said.

# Trust fund opens for twin babies' family

LAKE MARY - A trust fund has been established for the Bernauer twins, who died a little more than 24 hours after their mother, Violetta Ber-nauer, suffered a ruptered uterus in a traffic accident in Lake Mary on Monday. Meanwhile, the driver who ran a red light and struck Bernauer's car is pleading not guilty to vehicular homicide.

Sanford resident Kenneth Hinson, 48, ran a red light on Rhinehart Road in Lake Mary Monday, at 10:57, a m. and

Monday at 10:57 a.m. and struck the driver's side door of Violetta Bernauer's Honda with his Dodge Prelude pickup. Bernauer was about

seven months pregnant.

Baby Brian died just before midnight Monday, and baby Joshua died shortly after noon Tuesday at the Arnold Palmer Hospital for Children & Women. They were delivered

The Bernauer family has established a trust fund to offset medical and funeral expenses. with any remainder of the fund dedicated to charity. Anyone wishing to donate can make a check payable to The Babies Bernauer Trust Fund, in care of any Nations Bank in Central Florida. Bernauer, 30, is recovering in stable condition at ORMC.

She has been removed from the intensive care unit, according to hospital spokesman Joe Brown. In addition to the ruptered uterus, Bernauer suffered lac-

erations to her left arm and left leg. "She's continuing to recu-perate," Brown said. "She's

LAKE MARY - Lake Mary city officials on Thursday authorized their police chief to purchase six in-car video camera systems for a total expenditure of \$22,998. Considered by law enforcement officials to be an essential tool to obtain convictions on criminal charges,

these six units supplement the six currently in use.

According to Capt. Sam Belflore, an original bid request from Lady Lake Police Department allowed the city to save 45 days in the bid proceas by "piggy backing" on to the Lady Lake request:


"We also get the best price

## A saint surely worth knowing

A columnist for one of the area newspapers seems to think that Gonzaga isn't much of a name for a school. Can anyone tell me what a Gonzaga is? he asks.

Although I never met St. Aloysius Gonzaga, he was very much on my mind in the 1950s thanks to the Jesuit priests and scholastics who were my teachers.

l attended Gonzaga College High School in Washington, D.C. It is named for St. Aloysius Conzaga, the patron of Catholic Youth. St. Aloysius was born at Castiglione, Spain in 1568. He died in 1591 after helping plague victims for more than four years.

There are a number of American schools named for St. Aloysius including Gonzaga University in Spokane. Wash. The school's most famous graduates are the late entertainer Bing Crosby and the professional basketball star John Stockton.

Gonzaga College High School in Washington, D.C. was begun in 1821. It is the oldest educational institution in the old Federal City. I didn't come on the roll until 1953. I wore a coat and tie to school each day. One of my classmates was Pat Buchanan - he's running for president, you know.

At Gonzaga, I translated Caesar's Gaelic Wars from Latin to English, recited Shakespeare in Father Bellwoar's Oratory class, avoided Mr. Donahue, the Prefect of Disclipine and shot baskets in Mr. Joe Kozik's gymnasium which was once a swimming pool. Gonzaga had to play all its balkerball f games away from home.

My favorite teacher at Gonzaga was Mr. Frank Bourbon. He pronounced the name Bore-Bon not Bur-Ban. He was a Jesuit not a whiskey. He was a big man, a son of a Baltimore fireman. Years and years after I left Gonzaga. Father Bourbon stayed in touch. His was always the first Christmas card - the first birthday greeting.
Girls did not attend Gon-

zaga. They went to Notre Dame Academy, which was next door off North Capitol Street. The best time to be with the Notre Dame girls was on the Capital Transit trolleys that stopped on North Capitol. We paid three cents a ride in 1953.

If a Gonzaga lad misbehaved he sometimes was sent over to Notre Dame to spend the day with the girls. Another form of punishment - less severe the Jesuita thought - was for offenders to spend time in JUO Judgment Under God). JUG was an after school detention. Pat Buchanan probably was Jugged more than he'll admit.

Gonzaga's sports teams were always among the best in Washington, D.C., and the students not on the varsities attended games just as The Navy Midshipmen or Army Cadets do. A Gonzaga-St. John's game was as flerce as Army-Navy. I once received 20 extra points on a Religion exam by predicting a 14-7 Gonzaga football victory over St. John's.

On Fridays, Gonzagans went to 8 a.m. Mass at St. Aloysius Church. We sang the hymns in Latin and the

# Rep. Corrine Brown meets residents on Sunday

SANFORD - Whenever Rep. Corrine Brown comes to town, there are many residents who want to hear what she is trying to do for them and to remind her of what Washington can do for the community.

On Sunday from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. Brown will hold court in a town meeting at Trinity United Methodist Church at Sanford and 6th streets. Brown will also speak at the 11 a.m service at 1st Shiloh Missionary Church at 700 Elm

Brown's aide, Gretchen

Hitchner, said Thursday that the congresswoman was eager to visit again with the residents of Sanford, many of whom have been among her most avid supporters. Brown, a Democrat, has served in the U.S. House of Representatives since 1993. She was reelected in November.

When Brown was first elected, it was the first time since Reconstruction that Florida sent an African American to Congress. She is one of three African Americans among the 23 Florida Representatives - one of eight Democrats.

## Working out at home/Search smarter on the Web links found by several major search ondhand. With many machines gath-

Sales of home exercise equipment have increased by 78 percent in the past five years. According to industry surveys, half of American households contain at least one piece of exercise

equipment Is that hardware in regular use, or has it become an expensive clothes rack? To find out, we surveyed our readers, who told us about more than 8,000 home exercise machines they'd

bought between 1994 and 1998 Our findings suggest that many garments could adorn the nation's home exercise riders, nonmotorized treadmills and stair climbers. Only about one-quarter of those machines bought by readers in the past five years were still being used when we conducted

our survey in spring 1998.

Voted most likely to be used: motorized treadmills. More than half bought between 1994 and 1998 were still in use. On the whole, our survey results singled out motorized treadmills as the best bet in home exercise equipment. (The elliptical exerciser, a cross between an exercise bike, a ski machine and a stair climber, is growing in popularity, but too few of our readers owned one at the time of our survey for us to have results on them. Our tests indicate that an elliptical exerciser provides a workout equivalent to a treadmill's, although some are a nuisance to maintain.)

Whether their goal was to manage weight, improve fitness or reduce stress, readers were more satisfied with treadmills than with any other type of machine. In addition, among readers who had stopped using their machine, comparatively few owners of motorized treadmills did so because they were bored.

Just 38 percent of all exercise m chines were bought by readers who said they were already exercising regularly. The rest were bought by people who intended to start exercising. This

by beginners were in use. If, after taking the first steps toward a regular exercise program, you're still interested in buying eng equipment, look for a machine that matches your preferences. For example, if you like cycling, try a stationary bike. If you like hiking, a stair stepper may be more your speed.

Sample various types of machine at a store. Some health clubs will let you use equipment for a small fee or join on a short-term basis. Realize, though, that home machines may bear only a passing resemblance to their larger, more elaborate brethren at health

Before buying machine, consider the service and warranty offered. Warranties on the treadmills we tested were as short as 90 days - and require you to take the machine to an authorized service center. Furthermore, about one in seven motorized treadmills our readers bought between 1994 and 1998 required repair - a higher percentage than for many of the other machines in our survey. That may be because they have motors and electronic equipment, or because the were used more often. In any case, a treadmill is one of the few products for which an extended warranty may be appropriate. (Such a warranty genercosts about \$70 to \$120 for one to three years of coverage.)

If you can name it, you can proba-bly find it on the World Wide Web — if you know the Web address. But if you don't have a clue about which address to use, you probably use one of the Web's search sites — a free ser-vice like Yahoo! or Infoseek that lets you type in a subject or name, then see a list of related Web sites.

Useful as search engines are, if you don't know how to use them effectively, you can waste hours picking ough hundreds or thousands of irrelevant search results. Here are some tips to help you make the most of your

1. Pick the right kind of service. It's est to let the type of search dictate which service you use. For very spe-cific information, such as a particular organization, start with a site like Yahoo!. Though it works like other search engines, Yahoo! is more properly termed a "directory" — it organizes sites into categories such as business, recreation and arts. Yahoo!

doesn't get you everywhere on the Web, but it can lead you to pages at many useful Web sites.

For general subjects (e.g. stain removal) or enclare indijects (e.g. militate systems), start with a six like Alta Vista, Excite, HotBot, Infoseek or Lycos. These services use their own resources to directly access and collect the contest from individual Web indexing it for o

For unique types of searches, such as reading the text of recent discourse in public discussion groups collective by known as Usenet, go to a special-ized site known as Deja News. The site ined site known as Deja News. The site known as Liszt will search through thousands of subscriber-only discussion groups for one on your topic of interest and tell you how to sign up.

2. Refine your search. Reducing "noise" — information that's irrelevant to your search — is the key to finding information quickly. You can specify two or more words that a Web page must contain to be included in the search results. If, for example, you want information about the soundtrack of the movie "Paris, Texas" — and not

of the movie "Paris, Texas" - and not about just anything to do with "Paris" or "Texas" - you can specify two or more words that a Web page must con-tain to be included in the search results. In this instance, entering "Paris and Texas and soundtrack" reduces the number of resultant links to those containing all three words. The result is links that are far more germane. To further reduce noise, Excite and other search engines rank the links accord-

ing to how relevant they appear to be.



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

# Devine leader for the Depression

The Depression was everywhere. You could see it and feel it. Unemployed men sold apples for a nickel on street corners or were reduced to begging: "Brother, can you spare a dime?"

Eddie Cantor tried his best to keep the country's spirits up by singing "Happy Days Are Here Again" on the radio. To families living in cardboard shantytowns known as "Hoovervilles," President Roover promised "a chicken in

every pot. The chickens never came home to roost, however, and it would be another five or 10 years for the happy days to

In New York's Harlem, conditions were as bad as anywhere else (or worse), but the mood was different. The one responsible for this difference was a black evangelist of small stature known as Father Divine, whose followers believed he was God. Indeed, he was savior to many homeless and unemployed in Harlem during the 1930s.

He ran an employment agency that got jobs for thousands. True, they had to turn over all their earnings to Father Divine, but it is also true that they lacked nothing.

The various residences he owned were called "Heavens." Here his "Angels" (the name he gave his followers) received free room and board. There was a fine dinner every evening and a comfortable place to sleep every night. They were

happier than they had ever

Those who attended his meetings but were not ready to forsake all for Father paid \$1 to \$2 a week to live in one of his "Extension Heavens." Meals were 15 to 20 cents.

He served free Sunday dinners to hundreds--with hams, roasts, chickens and turkeys.

With his Angels turning over all their earnings to him. Father Divine was able to dress in \$500 silk suits and ride around in a chauffeur driven Rolls-Royce. In the 1930s he bought 25 restaurants, six grocery stores, 10 drycleaning establishments and a coal business. His net income was figured at \$10,000 a week.

In 1941 he moved into a 32room mansion along Philadelphia's posh Main Line. In 1946 he married Edna Rose Ritchings, the 21-year-old white daughter of a Vancouver florist whom he renamed Spotless Virgin Bride. They remained married for 19 years--until Father Divine's death in 1965.

Father Divine preached purity of mind and behavior. His worshippers greeted each other with the word "peace" because "Hello" started with a swear word.

Sometimes when the 5-foot-2 deity would seem to be violating his own tenets about sexual abstinence, he would explain to his female partner of the moment, "I am bringing your desires to the surface so that I can eliminate them."

A judge once denounced Father Divine from the bench as a home-breaker.

The black religious leader, who was born George Baker, established his divinity in the minds of his followers in 1931 when the judge who sentenced him to jail in a disorderly conduct charge dropped dead.
"I hated to do it," said Father Divine when he heard the news. To his followers, this left no doubt that Father had struck the jurist dead.

The words was passed along that the dignified evangelist had taken into his won body all the physical afflictions of

"lan't that just like Father?" his followers said.

# Debit cards do not affect credit history

DEAR BRUCE: I am a college student, and I have no credit cards. I decided to apply for one and was turned down because my credit report showed excessive bank-card utilization. I use my debit card frequently, but I don't understand how this could reflect badly on my credit rating. -J.E., Rollo, Mo.

DEAR J.E.: I am at a loss as to why they would deny you credit on that basis. Generally, college students particularly those in their last under-graduate year — are bombarded with credit-card applications, even though they have no appreciable income. The theory behind this is that if they can hook them in college, they'll remain customers for a good many years. A debit card is simply a way to access deposited and credited funds. How frequently it is used should have no bearing on your credit, as the funds are there as you use the card. Please ask for a more complete explanation - it could well be that somebody has dropped the ball.

DEAR BRUCE: In a recent column, you answered a question about un-claimed accounts in escheat. I have a variation: What happens to gift certificates that have expired? Is this the same as unclaimed bank accounts and the like? Does the holder of the gift certificate have any claim against the merchant, or are they out of luck? -B.S., via e-mail

DEAR B.S.: The issuer of the gift certificate has the same responsibilities as the bank, trading stamp purveyor, etc. - and that is to turn over the money that was collected for the gift certificates that were never re-deemed to the escheat division. In reality, this seldom happens. You might walk into the merchant where you have this old gift certificate and in-quire whether they have turned it over to escheat; if they haven't, tell them they have broken the law and, unless they honor your certificate, you will be obliged to notify the state. Most mer-chants will suddenly have an epiphany, and your gift certificate will no longer be expired.

DEAR BRUCE: Your answer for T.M. in Las Vegas - regarding the uniform transfers to minors' act account - is incorrect. Under UTMA provisions, the first \$650 of unearned income to the account is tax-free each year. The next \$650 is taxed at the child's bracket, with no separate tax return required. Unearned income in excess of \$1,300 a year is taxed in the adult custodian's marginal tax bracket. Once the child is 14, all earned income is taxed to the child. While access to the account at the age of majority of the child is a disadvantage, the tax advantages often make this vehicle attractive to the parent. - Bill Rogenmoserch, F.C., via e-mail DEAR BILL: Thank you for the cor-

rection. The area where I disagree is that the rather modest tax advantage justifies the risk of putting the youngster in control of a large sum at a very tender age.

DEAR BRUCE: I have friends who claim that because they have put all their money into an irrevocable trust, if they have to go into a nursing home,



# Bishop Moore loss keeps trophy at home

OVIEDO - It may have looked like a blowout on the scoreboard, but Thursday night's fi-nale of the Paul Mikler-Reebok Classic between the Oviedo Lions and Boone Braves was almost too close for comfort for the Lions and their fans.

Oviedo's 14-2 rout of Boone, combined with Lake Mary's 3-2 decision over Bishop Moore earlier in the day, left three teams with 2-1 tournament records - Oviedo, Lake Mary, and Bishop Moore.

Because the tournament followed a sort of pool play, it had been decided in advance to follow the Olympic tie-breaking format. After head-to-head competition, the next tiebreaker is fewest runs allowed.

Lake Mary, which had lost to Boone 8-4 and defeated Colonial 10-7 earlier in the week, had given up 17 runs. Bishop Moore, which defeated Lyman 8-4 and Oviedo 12-8, had allowed 15 runs. Oviedo, which had shutout Colonial 2-0 on Monday before losing to Bishop Moore Tuesday, had given up 12 runs going into Thursday.

Heading into the bottom of the seventh inning holding a 14-0 lead, it appeared that Oviedo had a firm grasp on the tour-nament championship.

But when Brian Gilbert dou-

bled in two runs for Boone, the Lions' runs-allowed total was up to 14.

Fortunately for the Lions, Larry Grayson (who had given up the two-run double to Gilbert) struck out the next two batters to close out the win and secure the title.

"Winning the tournament is nice, but what was more important for me was that it was a very competitive tournament," said Oviedo coach Kenne Brown. Not one of the six teams walked away thinking they were outclassed. One pitch here, a hit there and the outcome could have been completely different.



# House dust can trigger allergies

House dust is not dust that blows in from out-of-doors, instead, house dust is produced indoors from fibers and the breakdown of plant and ani-mal material used in the home including feathers, cotton, wool, jute, hemp, animal hairs,

House dust also may include human skin scales, animal dander and saliva and a large variety of mold. Other allergy triggers found in the house are proteins that are one of the major triggers of asthma and other allergic reactions.

House dust mite allergy is especially troublesome where the indoor humidity is high.

Dust mites can be found throughout the house, but they especially thrive where human dander is located, such as on mattresses, pillows, bed covers, upholstered furniture and carpeting. How To Reduce Dust in Your

1. Bedreems. Smooth, uncluttered, easily cleaned surfaces are recommended. Small objects, such as knickknacks, books, records, tapes, stereos, televisions and stuffed animals should be placed in drawers or closed cabinets. Avoid using your bedroom as a library or

study room. 3. Controlling dust mites in mattresses requires either regular vacuuming or putting them in dust-free casings.

3. Bedding must be wash-able and should be washed weekly in hot water. Washing with cool water does not kill dust mites.

4.Corysting House dust mites, mold spores, animal BARBARA HEGHIS



dander and other allergens are abundant in carpeting. Car-peting laid over concrete floors contains especially high levels of dust mites because of increased humidity. Smooth flooring is a better choice.

5. Vacuuming. Cleaning is essential, but vacuum cleaners atir dust up into the air. Up-holstered furniture should be vacuumed, other surfaces should be mopped or wiped. Weekly housecleaning is sug-

6. Air Conditioning. Con-

trolling the indoor relative humidity to below 70 percent is important to reduce the growth of dust mites and mold. Central air conditioning is the most effective way of controlling humidity. Air conditioning cleans and cools the indoor air and keeps the moist outside air outdoors. Mechanical A/C filters using standard disposable fiberglass should be changed monthly. Permanent filters with baffles should be cleaned periodically. The most effective filter is a highefficiency particulate (HEPA) filter that also mechanically cleans air.

7. Mold. Molds thrive in areas of the house with in-creased humidity. Consistent cleaning helps keep mold growth to a minimum. Chlorine bleach, TSP and household cleaners help keep sur-faces clear of mold. Before remodeling or selecting household furnishings or surfaces, consider how the decision will impact the dust in your home.



East the five and jack.



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

BP determinations made at various times of the day. The doctor can per-form this task; so can a nurse or any qualified professional.

If your wife's blood pressure falls to normal (140/90 or below), additional

monitoring every month or two would be appropriate.

On the other hand, if the reading remains elevated, she should be treated with medicine. I'd make that decision after a week or two of monitoring.
