Christian Unity Seen From Visit With Pope Paul

ROME (UPI) — The Archbishop of Canterbury, concluding his historic visit to Pope Paul VI, today urged both Anglicans and Roman Catholics "to forget the things that are behind and press forward" toward Christian unity.

The Archbishop, Dr. Michael Ramsey, told a news conference shortly before his departure that his meetings with the pontiff will have "considerable effect on the cause of Christian unity in my generation, and even greater in the next generation."

The Anglican primates first met with Pope Paul at the Vatican for a meeting with leaders of the World Council of Churches. He returns to London Friday.

"The final act of their meeting was to exchange a formal 'list of peace' and to worship together in a stirring ceremony held in the vaulted basilica of St. Paul's Outside the Walls. They also pledged themselves to a 'serious' search for the unity between their two churches, which split in the 16th century."

As a parting and apparently spontaneous gesture of good will, Pope Paul, as they left the basilica, took a precious gold and emerald ring off his finger and put it on Ramsey's finger. Although valuable, it was not the so-called "Fisher-man's Ring" which is the sign of the pontiff and is almost never worn.

In their "common declaration," read in Latin and English and the two primates pledged themselves "to inaugurate between the Roman Catholic Church and the Anglican Communion a serious dialogue which, through the Gospel and on the ancient common traditions, may lead to that unity in truth, for which Christ prayed."

At his news conference, Archbishop Ramsey was asked if there was any major barrier to the unity.

"There is no one single barrier," he said. "But there are a number of doctrinal and practical questions." He pointed up the question of mixed marriages and added that the recent Vatican ruling on the matter "does not satisfy the conscience of Anglican Christians and other Christian denominations."

However, he said, "a careful reading of the instructions on the contract will make it clear it is not meant to be a final settlement."

3-Newspaper Merger Near

NEW YORK (UPI)—Thomas J. Murphy, executive vice president of the New York Times, said today that the merger of three New York City newspapers will take place "within a few days" after approval by the Justice Department.

The papers announced their proposed merger Monday and submitted the plan to the Justice Department the next day.

Under the proposal, one of the papers—the Herald Tribune—would be merged with the Journal-American and the Mirror. The new paper would be named the New York Journal.

Regional Session Saturday

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Regional meetings of Florida Education Association members throughout the state will be held Saturday to give teachers details of the "Sanctions Alert" called by the organization, President Robert Jones of Ocala said today.

Jones said the sessions were called by the FEA board of directors, which said it was prepared to invoke sanctions against Florida's school systems unless deficiencies cited in a National Education Association report were cleared up by the 1967 Legislature.

The meetings also will be used to start planning a program of increasing political activity for teachers, Jones said.

The NEA report said if the professional atmosphere of public education in Florida was to be improved, teachers should take a bigger hand in politics.

High Court To Hear Rapists' Plea

Selection of a jury which convicted two Seminole County teenagers for the rape of a 12-year-old girl will be questioned in a brief to be filed in the State Supreme Court Monday.

The two youths, Israel Gilley, 17, and Jimmie Lee Drumwright, 18, are in death row at Raiford. They were sentenced to electrocution by Judge Tom Waddell following their trials in Circuit Court here last year.

Albert N. Pitts, court appointed attorney, said today he will file a brief with the state supreme court Monday, asking that the convictions be set aside.

There were errors in the trial held here last May. They were sentenced by Judge Waddell last August after an appeal for a new trial was denied.

The case automatically went to the Supreme Court on appeal and is expected to be heard during early Fall, Pitts said.

Pitts pointed out that there have been no electrocutions for rape in the State of Florida since 1960. Most of those awaiting execution at Raiford have appeals pending before the U.S. Supreme Court.

It was reported the American Civil Liberties Union of Florida also was seeking to enter the Gilley-Drumwright case.

Robbery Fake, Boys Admit

"The best laid schemes of mice and men gang aft a-gley."

Many years ago the Scot poet Robert Burns wrote those oft-quoted words, and early this morning the truth of the saying was borne out for two Sanford men.

Kenneth George Stidd, 19, of 214 E. Palm Street, manager of the Shamrock Oil Station at 1901 Country Club Road (West 2nd Street), and his assistant, Charles Henry McIntosh, 17, of 274 Country Club Road, were arrested Saturday night.

The plan was begun about 6 p. m. Wednesday, when McIntosh called the Sanford police station and asked that a patrol car come to the Shamrock station as he expected trouble. He reported four men were hanging around the station inquiring how business was. He said he feared a robbery attempt.

Pitts, Johnnie Parker went to the scene, and this apparent new trial or sentence of the trial of the pair, began to fall apart. Parker stayed at the station until 11:30 p. m. According to police, McIntosh and Stidd continued to hang around the station and Parker stayed also, finally leaving about midnight.

WASHINGTON (NEA) — First off, most cited figures affecting control over the rural population, leaving out of account the people in Saigon, Hue and a few other key cities. These matters deserve examination, since they stand at the heart of the argument many Democratic senators are making—that the NLF should be included as an independent entity in any negotiations and possibly also in the Liberation Front, in other words, permanent governments to follow. Citing South Vietnamese Premier Cao Ky as the source, New York's Sen. Robert Kennedy has said often that the Vietnamese government in Saigon controls only 25 per cent of the country's population of 15 million. In the context of his remarks, the clear implication is inevitably left that the Viet Cong control the other 75 per cent. Other critics of administration policy in Vietnam have said or implied again and again that, for all practical purposes, the Viet Cong are the dominant force in that land. These notions do not fit the known judgments of appraisers close to the South Vietnamese scene. To be sure, the Viet Cong are pushing more and more villagers to the point of total alienation. Ancient prejudices against the north-landers play a part in villagers' hostility. Some 25 per cent of the South Vietnamese people may or may not continue under effective Red control as the war proceeds. If that figure does hold, the indications seem strong that these hard-core rural folk will in time be ruled largely by the North Vietnamese army—not by the Viet Cong.

\$2.5 Million Land Deal Ok'd On 'Leadership'

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—The State Cabinet agreed today to pay \$2.5 million for 100 acres of land on Cape Florida, pending the result of negotiations still in progress on the option date for more of the land in the proposed recreation area.

The purchase of the land, located at the tip of Key Biscayne in Dade County, is the first from the major outdoor recreational land purchase funds.

Negotiations will continue with the vendor for options on the tract, which includes 430 acres of upland and 490 acres of submerged property. The vendor, Mrs. Elena Sainsteiro Garcia, had offered an option until July 31, 1965, but the state wants it extended to Jan. 1, 1968.

Mrs. Garcia has reportedly offered to let the state use the optioned tract if she could be exempted from Dade County property taxes.

The money will come from the five per cent wholesale tax on sporting goods and purchases for motor vehicles have been requested from the federal government and Water Conservation Act. Total cost of the entire tract is \$6.5 million.

170-Acre Location Selected

A site about halfway between SR 427 at Five Points and Lake Mary Boulevard south of Sanford, today was named the choice of Seminole County Board of Public Instruction for location of Seminole Junior College and the vocational-technical center.

The site is about one-half mile west of Hwy. 17-92, south and east of the county agricultural center, about one-half mile north of Five Points and about one mile south of Sanford Estates.

The location was pinpointed as the "possible site" on a map published in The Herald-Sun on March 18.

Access to the property, at the present time, will be from Hwy. 17-92 and on Broadmoor Avenue, at the edge of the south Lake Mary city limits.

The Broadmoor entrance will lead directly off the planned I-4-Lake Mary Boulevard interchange. Another road, to be provided by the county, will come through the county agricultural center property.

School board officials disclosed their decision today after receiving written approval from the State Board of Education survey headed by Dr. Lee G. Henderson, which inspected several proposed sites last week.

The chosen grade site is by far the most desirable site offered for the junior college," Dr. Henderson's letter stated.

Both the Sanford City Commission and the Seminole County Board of Commissioners have indicated willingness to give "all out" co-operation to the school board in matters pertaining to the site.

In an unofficial meeting several weeks ago, Sanford school commissioners indicated they would be willing to run water and sewer lines to the property. Estimated cost is \$100,000.

"The city is moving south and it is within reason to expect the break-in of the city limits will have reached the area of the school and the residential and commercial buildup that may be expected to spring up around the college site," Mayor A. L. Wilson said.

Dr. Earl Weldon, president of Seminole Junior College, said the site "is an excellent one and we are pleased that the selection has been made. We are glad to have a location suitable to construct both the junior college and the vocational-technical center, as the proximity will be of mutual benefit to both schools."

The site is within a radius of five miles of all county high schools with the exception of Oviedo. Pupils from the high schools will be transported by bus for vocational-technical classes.

Classes at the college will begin in September in temporary buildings, with construction of the permanent campus expected to start in 1967.

Hiring of administrative and instructional personnel will begin soon.

Construction of the vocational-technical school, on the same site as the junior college, is expected to begin sometime last year. School officials presently are drawing up plans for the school and determining the number and type of classes and courses which will be needed. Over-all cost of the "tech" school will be close to \$1 million.

Local officials heard a play-back of a taped speech by Dr. Stanley Kruger of the regional office of the HEW, given at a meeting of state school superintendents in Tampa last week, which outlined the school as being intended for persons of one race, color or national origin. This may result in a lawsuit.

The board must also eliminate identification of any suit in all school name designations.

At Thursday's meeting, school officials authorized the filing of Form 411-B, which provides that the school system plan will be carried out in accordance with the standards outlined in the 1966 guidelines. This is essentially a statement of intent and requires additional evidence of performance.

From April 1 to 30, freedom of choice applications will be made available to every student and parent and each student and parent must indicate his choice of a school, "without fear of reprisal."
