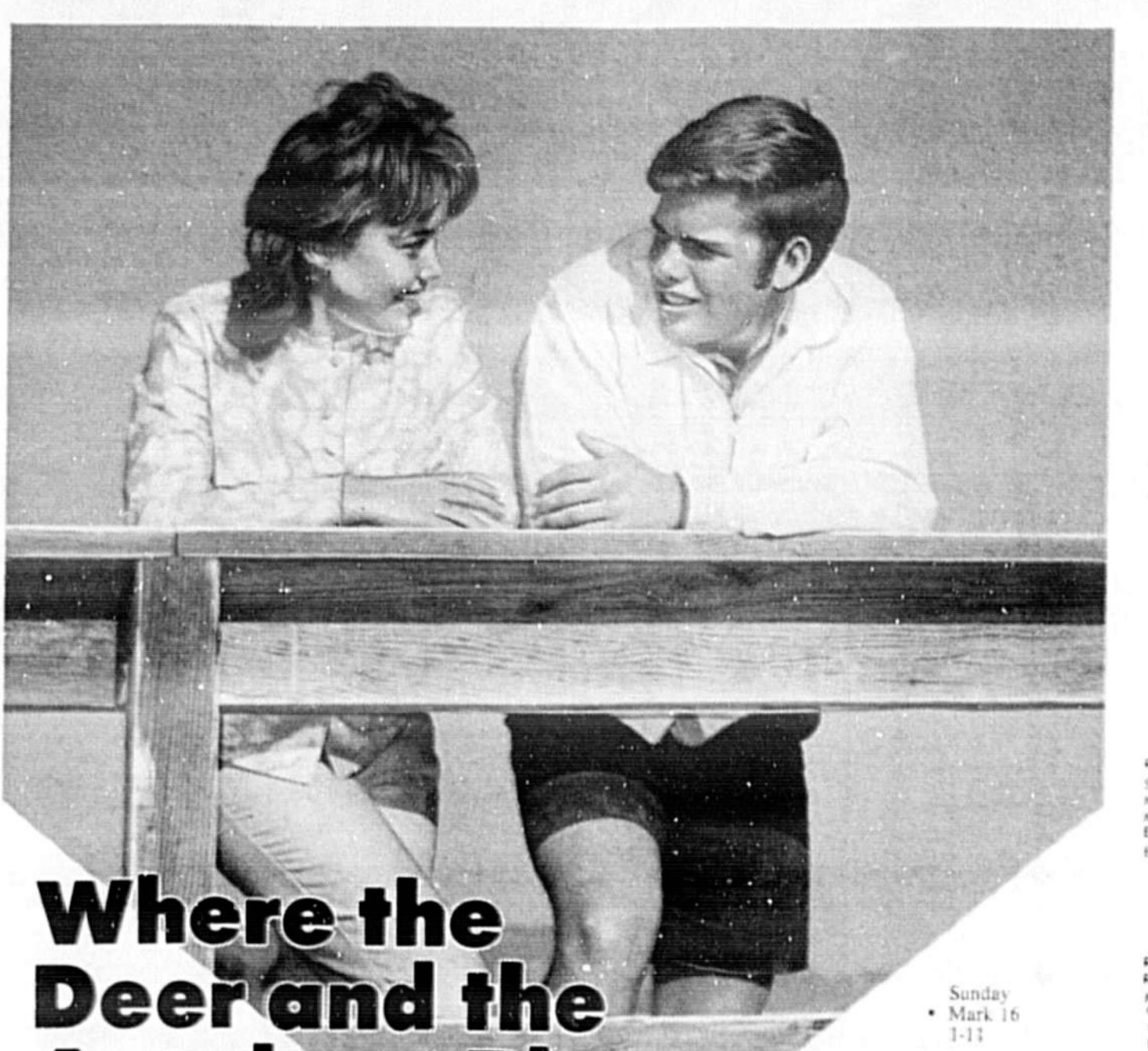
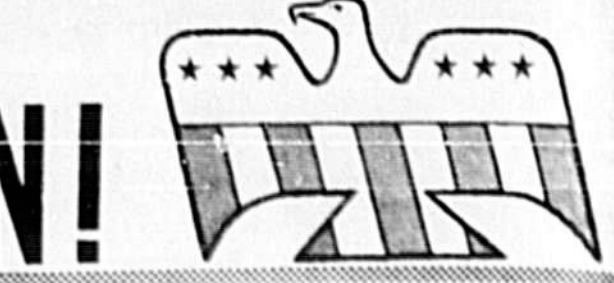

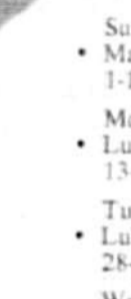
Later, Bob played basketball with my brothers and tinkered with the tractor, getting black and greasy right along with Dad. Everybody loved him.

U.S. Has Farther To Travel And Less Time To Do It In

ATHENS, Ga. (AP) — Trade reform is imperative and our ranks tax reform in importance, Rep. Phil Landrum, D-Ga., said here today.

Addressing a Law Day seminar on U.S. trade with Communist countries, Landrum said, "Relations with Communist nations are opening and with a suddenness our natural resistance to change finds bewildering and among some, even unwelcome."

"Obviously the United States has farther to travel and less time than we would like to have to catch up with the trade between our trading partners of the free world and Communist nations."

And he added, "The challenge is whether to lead the United States back to the top in trade and world influence or whether to witness our further decline."

The Georgia Congressman told the first of four seminars on East-West trade relations that the Trade Reform Act of 1973 which President Nixon has sent to Congress will be thoroughly debated in the Congress, and he listed a number of questions which he said will be asked.

He added that, "coming from the political arena," he typically did not answer the questions, but said "from all such

4,400 View Harness Action Seminole Turf 'Handles' Opening Gracefully

CASSELBERRY — Central Florida Trotter aficionados, gambling but nuts and curious assembled at the Seminole Turf Club Friday night to the tune of 4,400 — and an even more pleasing \$129,340 total handle — for the first night of racing after flat racing died here in 1970.

From the start of things, Managing Director Al Grillo, who maintained throughout the renovation period at Seminole that, "Central Florida is ready for racing," and if first night attendance and handle maintains something near the opening, he will have been more than vindicated. About \$90,000 a night passing through the bettors' hands would make a go of it for Grillo.

The opening night figures surpassed the 1970 thoroughbred opening of 3,570, but the handle then was \$135,000. However, they never reached that figure again, closing long before the end of their scheduled season.

Reports were that Seminole Turf Club drew well from out-of-area visitors as well as local track followers.

The well-lit grandstand and rail areas were well attended, about half-full, while the snar Ocala Terrace clubhouse enjoyed a brisk business all night and was slated again for a sellout.

There were problems, to be sure, admitted Grillo. First, at least \$7,000 was lost on the second race because of inexperienced operators on the parimutual machines, who did not change plates in time for the betting to get up to the \$13,151 first race standard. As it was, however, \$5,124 passed in that race, the problem seemed to exist. The handle on that race almost reached \$12,000.

But that, and other minor first-night bugs, soon found their way out of the system and things functioned smoothly for the remainder of the 10 race card.

Best time of the evening came from Walter He Good, in the \$1,500 Open Preferred

Handicap, with a 2:06.1. Perfecta (7-4) was good for \$3.20, \$2.40 and \$3.20. The Puntela (4-7) with Pearl Chip paid \$8.40, while the

Police-Fire Jobs Shared By Officer

WINTER SPRINGS — F. Scott Kenneth has a dual role in the safety and welfare of the city. He is the patrol sergeant, second in command, of the police department and Chief 2, the equivalent of assistant chief, in the volunteer fire department.

As the second in command of the police department he represents the police chief at meetings the chief is unable to attend. Administrative duties are split between him and the chief for the "in-house" work. His time is equally divided between patrol and administrative work.

Kenneth's opinion is there is a need for at least three patrol cars on the road in the city during prime crime time and the three will be sufficient at least for this fiscal year.

One car could be assigned for the majority of its patrol in the area east of Tusawilla Road, another would work the main sections of the city, and the remaining one could be used by the shift supervisor to handle problems in areas where a car is busy or an officer is in need of assistance.

Kenneth said the department is seeking a federal-state grant to enable all officers to be equipped with portable radios. This would allow the law enforcement officers to maintain constant contact with headquarters. The department is also working with the State Division of Communications to coordinate Winter Springs Police Department personalized radio systems with the Command Control Center in Sanford.

At the present time, the Police Department has only one portable radio which was donated by Florida Land Com-

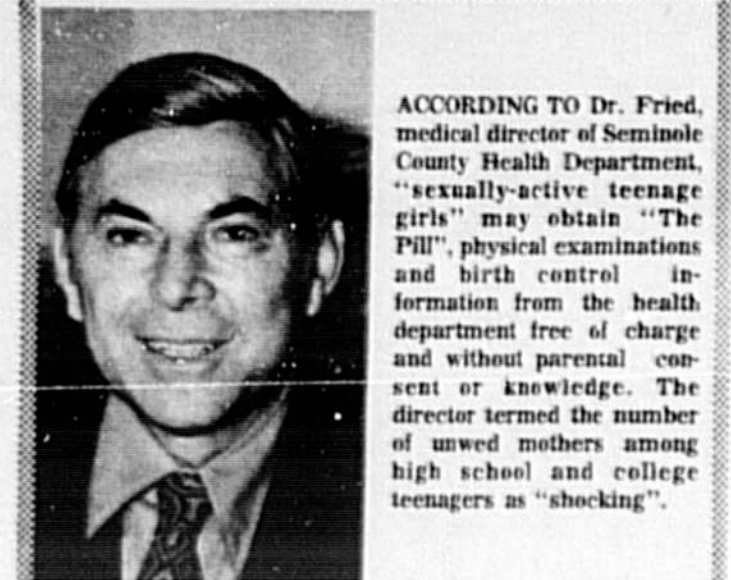

Unwed Teenagers Get 'The Pill' Free At Health Office

Birth control information, physical examinations and the "pill" can be obtained by the "sexually-active teenage girl" in Seminole County with or without her parents' knowledge and consent free of charge.

Dr. Julian Fried, medical director of the Seminole County Health Department was interviewed by the Herald and gave the information.

"If in our opinion, after discussion with the child we feel the dangers of unwed pregnancy are great, we give the sexually-active teenager birth control information, physical examination and birth control pills without discussing it with her parents," Dr. Fried said.

"We have a tremendous number of unwed mothers coming in," Dr. Fried said. He added that those specifically desiring abortions are referred to Planned Parenthood and the department never counsels on abortion, but merely refers them to the organization because the "set up there is the best."

"We tell the girls of all the possibilities of having the baby and bringing it up, of having the baby and placing it for adoption or of being aborted it is early enough." In the latter two cases the girls are referred to Planned Parenthood.

Planned Parenthood of Central Florida sends many girls to the Seminole County Health Department clinic for assistance with birth control information and devices.

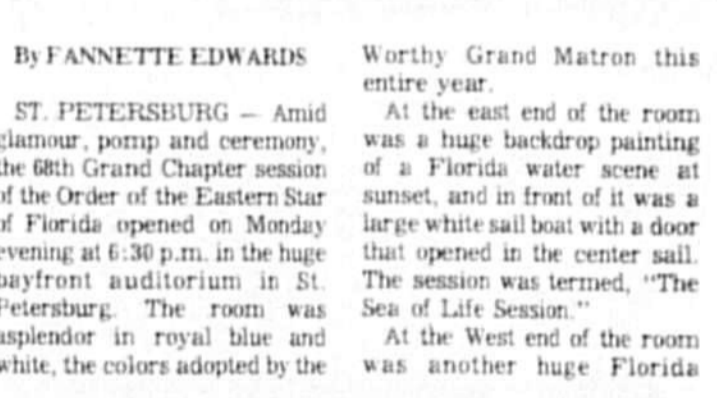

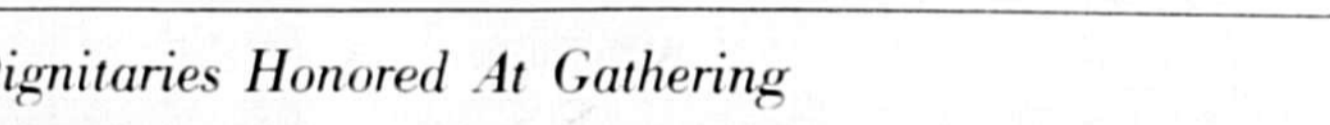

When Bruce (Bundini) Brown Jr. left Sanford to join the CCC Camp in Del-Judo he was 11 years old, it was the start of a journey that would carry him around the world a number of times, and find him living with personalities whose names are completely unknown to the thousands.

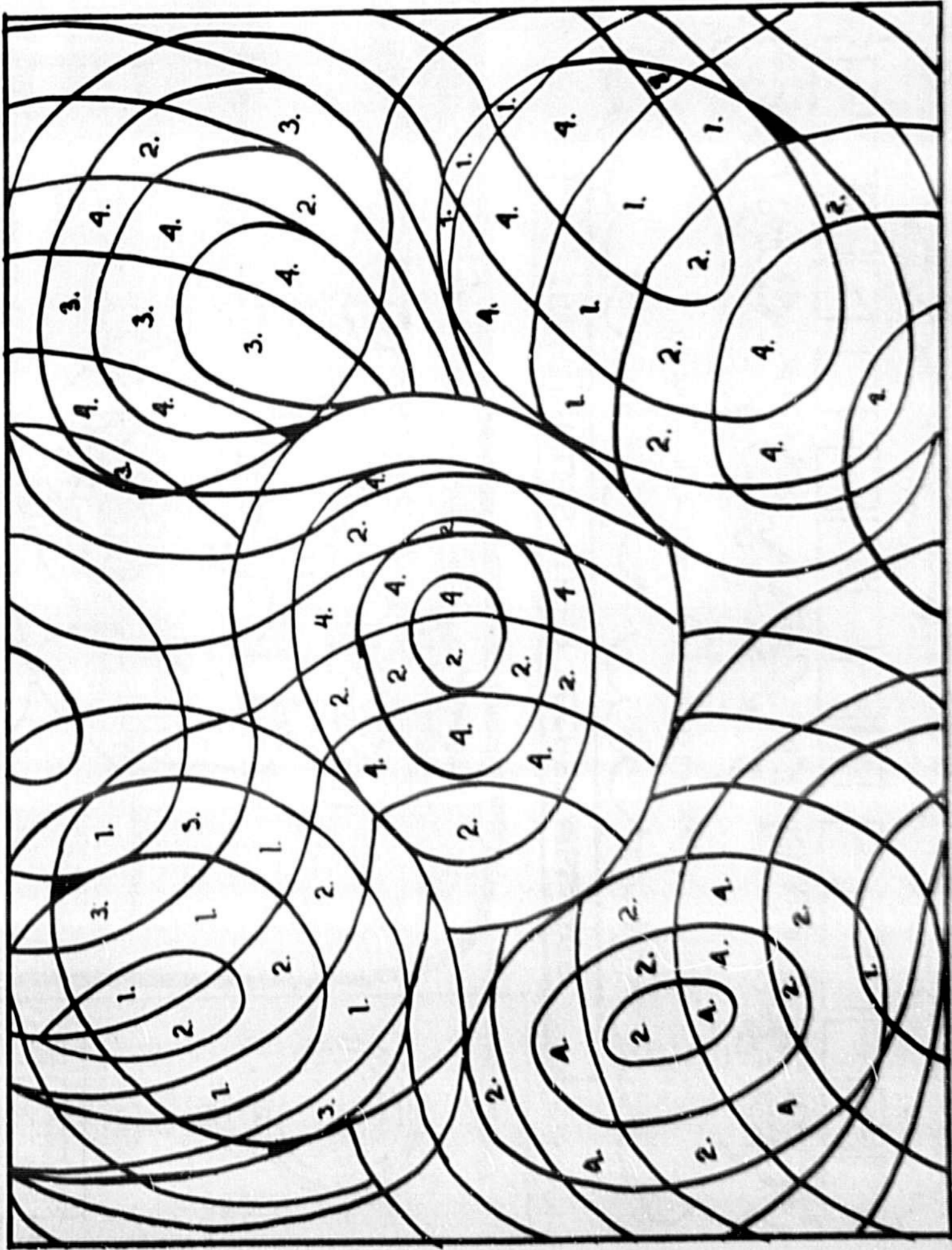
