Apology To Public For False Report Sought Of NYA

JACKSONVILLE, Oct. 15.—(Special)—Public apology to the people of Florida was sought Monday by Aubrey Williams, by Harold Cole, executive vice president of the Florida State Chamber of Commerce, for one "hyperbolic" and "moronic" report made on Florida in 1936 by a field representative of the National Youth Administration's division of guidance and placement. The report came to light by action of the comptroller general, Lindsay C. Warren, who submitted it to the house appropriations committee as an example "of the character of official travel" engaged in by NYA.

Cole made his demand through Florida members of the house. To them he wrote: "The Associated Press account of the letter found in NYA files by the comptroller general and submitted to the House appropriations committee by him in which one 'Red' (identified as a field representative of the NYA sent to Florida in 1936 on a tour of investigation) engaged in hyperbolic and moronic statements concerning this state should draw from National Administrator Aubrey Williams a full and complete apology to the people of Florida for such reprehensible conduct on the part of an official in his employ, and a guarantee that Mr. Williams that he will exert greater care in the future in the selection of the traveling envoys sent by him to 'report' on Florida people.

"As a matter of fact, we are not prepared to admit that the character of the people of Florida is of official concern to any federal agency."

Cole said he would follow up his request to the highest Washington authority in the event Williams failed to accede to the request. "The whole correspondence," he said should be laid before the congress, "that the people might know how their tax monies are being spent."

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Russian Crisis

The Nazis have announced that the Russian campaign is over so many times during the last few months, that one may reasonably question their most recent boasts, but with their panzer divisions already hammering at the gates of Moscow, there might seem to be more truth than propaganda in the latest dispatches from Berlin.

However, it need not be so. The Germans surrounded Leningrad weeks ago; but despite furious assaults they have not yet captured it. At about the same time they completely encircled Odessa, at the other end of the front, but though their forces have passed completely beyond Odessa still holds out, at least it did the last we heard in spite of fighting in the streets.

Even if the Germans take Moscow, the war may not be over and the campaign in the east may still keep millions of Nazi soldiers occupied for months to come. Napoleon captured Moscow only to find that his troubles had just begun. The Japanese took Peking, Shanghai, Canton and Nanking years ago, but the capture of these various capitals of the Chinese republic did not end the war.

The question is whether Russian morale can hold out with the loss of their principal cities. If the Russians have the courage, the unity, and the will power to go on fighting against what appears to be hopeless odds, the war will not end this Fall, and will not end at all until Hitler is beaten. The Russians can retreat to the Ural mountains if necessary, spread the Nazi lines of communication so thin that even German efficiency and ingenuity cannot keep them open and win in the end simply by refusing to quit.

Britain and the United States can do a great deal to keep Russian morale from cracking even if they are not able to help more effectively with an invasion of the continent. They can keep open a constant flow of supplies in the form of food, tanks, airplanes and guns without which the Russians cannot hope to carry on the war. And they can keep up an incessant bombing of German cities so that German supplies are depleted at the same time.

And the United States can, if Japan undertakes to emulate the example of Italy with respect to France and knife Russia in the back, prevent the Japanese from doing so. We do not believe the Japanese would attack Russia if they knew it meant war with the United States. But if they were so foolish as to undertake so large a gamble, it would be better to fight them now than to wait until after Russia is defeated.

As long as Russia is kept in the fight, the United States will have a breathing spell in which to get ready—a breathing spell of better proportions than if Russia were eliminated from the fight.

ASCONA, Switzerland, Oct. 17 (AP)—For months a physician in this little town in southern Switzerland—with the mistaken notion that letters could be sent to occupied France—patiently wrote letters after letter to friends in Paris.

A few days later he was surprised and chagrined when he received a large parcel from the postal authorities at the Swiss frontier. It contained all the letters. On the wrapper was simply one word: "Ascona"—and the photograph.
