## County Plan Switch Opens Door

# A New Industrial Park Near Sanford?

The initial step in developing a new industrial park just west of Sanford has been taken. The park, designed for light industrial manufacturing, would be located on a 16-acre tract just west of town on the north side of State Road 46 between Airport Boulevard and River Road.

"Hopefully it will be developed for manufacturing outside. That's what we're shooting for," said Robert Moseley, president of United Conveyor, Sanford.

Development of the park site will begin in about six months if the project is economically feasible.

"It may not even go," Moseley said today. "We have to run the figures to be sure it is economically viable. Moseley appeared before the San Mateo County Com-

mission Tuesday night to seek an exception to the county's comprehensive plan. That exception, granted by the commission, will allow development of a parking lot and water retention area on a 2.4-acre tract adjoining the north side of the 16-acre tract, just north of Fifth Street.

The 2.4-acre site is owned by Moseley and does not carry a provision allowing the construction of parking lots. The 16-acre parcel for the industrial park is zoned for light manufacturing. The commission action did not change zoning in the area.

Commissioners Harry Kvitashvili and John Alexander voted to deny the request. They cited a board of adjustment recommendation to deny the special exception.

Commissioners Dick Williams, Bob French and Bill Kirschner voted in the majority.

"Our plans call for retention of about one-inch of water on our own land and when we get a downpour of two or three inches," responded Moseley, "that won't be a

problem."

Responding to a question about how water would be retained, Moseley noted retention ponds will not be used on the site. He said water retention areas bordering the parking lot will be used. He said three areas are created by building the road up to retain a certain amount of water.

"Water would not be retained for long," Moseley said. He explained he hoped to be able to drain the water from the area into drainage ditches on the north side of the road. Water is kind of flow to the north, away from the residents, according to a planning report.

"The water drainage there really doesn't affect these residents," Kirschner said following the meeting. He noted the site plan would have to be approved by the commission before the parking lot could be constructed and the handling of drainage would be a factor in approving these plans.

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## Latin Tells Carter: Oil A Weapon

CARACAS, Venezuela (UPI)—Venezuelan President Carlos Andres Perez warned President Carter today that oil will be used as a weapon to force industrialized nations to help forge a new world economic order.

Carter had just endorsed his own plan for a new international economic order in a speech to the Venezuelan congress by proposing a three-point plan to improve global economic conditions and to raise living standards in order to Third World demands.

Carter, who made a hit with two Spanish language speeches during his 19-hour visit in this oil-producing nation, flew to Brazil for talks with President Figueiredo on Tuesday night and returned to Caracas on Wednesday.

Carter's speech was met with a wide range of reactions. He was cheered and applauded by thousands of Venezuelans and he was criticized by some of the Venezuelan press.

"I've never seen said it was during these talks that Perez warned that oil will be used to attempt to force such industrialized nations as the United States to help create a new world order," Carter, for his part, had taken a different tack in a major policy speech to the Venezuelan congress Tuesday night. He said that while he was in Caracas, he had seen the oil-rich nations must share in the burden and that the developing nations must also do their part.

Despite their differences over oil, Carter wants to hold peace where they are and Perez wants a 10 to 15 percent increase in the price of oil. Among other things they say eye to eye on the necessity of Senate ratification of the Panama Canal treaties.

Perez accused Carter to the airport after the two held their first one-hour conference. Perez said the talks centered on energy and economic policies, but no joint communique had been issued by the time Carter departed on the 4 1/2 hour flight to Brasilia.

Carter, in his speech to the Chamber of Deputies in Venezuela's domed capitol building, declared, "We need to share a responsibility for solving problems — not to divide the blame for ignoring them."

He stressed his remarks are in Spanish, saying: "The view of the commission provided by any address at the airport in Spanish yesterday, I have decided to speak to you today in English."

Actually, Venezuelans had been surprised and favorably impressed with Carter's Tuesday evening speech in Spanish, which was easily intelligible despite his southern drawl.

Carter was not interrupted a single time by applause during his brief address and got only a modest ovation at the end.

"All of the OPEC nations here and I have a responsibility to use their surplus wealth to meet the human needs of the world's people," Carter said.

## In Winter Springs Illegal Sewer Tax Refund Studied

The Winter Springs city council is preparing an ordinance calling for the refund to city residents a utility tax on sewer service which has been declared illegal.

Following a lengthy discussion by council members on Tuesday night, the city attorney advised that a vote will be given to the city to refund the utility tax on sewer service.

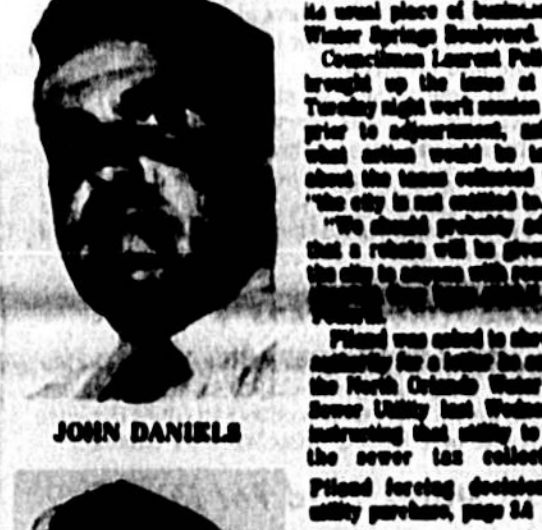
"The people are tired of being ripped off by taxes," said Winter Springs City Councilman Danieles Tuesday night, demanding utility taxes on sewer service, now declared illegal, be refunded to Winter Springs residents.

While the North Orlando Water and Sewer Co., which serves most of the city, services its customers for only the past 11 months, Danieles said the tax has been levied on Winter Springs residents by the San Mateo Utilities for the past four years.

He used his own water and sewer bills as an example to prove his contention. In addition, Danieles said, San Mateo Utilities has continued collecting utility tax on service at the rate of five percent even though the rate was reduced to four percent beginning Jan. 1.

Danieles said his major objection is that the tax has not been collected equally, adding that he would favor the city refunding the utility tax to all residents who have paid over the years in utility taxes on sewer service.

Or, he said, the city could refund the same paid by Winter Springs residents over the past three years that the tax had not

been levied on North Orlando Water and Sewer Co. customers.

The utility has contended that it did not receive notice from the city of the utility tax rate reduction and received notice from Mayor Terry Pineda to stop collecting taxes on sewer service only after March 15th, indicating the utility portion of the community served by North Orlando Water and Sewer Co.

Asked why he had proposed the city council to adopt an ordinance to refund the utility tax, Danieles said, "I was not given a chance to research it. If I had been aware it was illegal, I would have said no."

Pineda said he is in favor of doing something to guarantee equal rates to the people "on his side of town," indicating the utility portion of the community served by North Orlando Water and Sewer Co.

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## Altamonte Sinkhole Fill Should Be Complete Today

## Chemical-Laden Train

### Derails; Blast Follows

LEWISVILLE, Ark. (UPI) — A train carrying vinyl chloride and an explosive chemical derailed behind a petroleum pump in this Southwest Arkansas town early today, causing an explosion and fire at the plant and forcing the town's 1,700 residents out of the area.

Lafayette County Sheriff Wade Tatum said three crew members on the Cotton Belt train suffered minor injuries and were treated and released.

The train derailed about 12:10 a.m. and Tatum said explosive experts in Washington said there is no danger to anyone within two-mile radius of the accident.

## \$150 Million For Oil Rights

SAVANNAH, Ga. (UPI) — Major oil companies have offered to pay \$150 million for "wildcat" rights to explore the Atlantic ocean floor between Charleston, S.C., and Jacksonville, Fla., for oil and natural gas.

Seven major oil companies and consortiums made bids for five-year leases Tuesday to U.S. Department of Interior officials during a 10-month bidding period at the Sheraton Hotel in Savannah. It would be the first exploration for gas and oil in the south Atlantic.

# Utility Tax Cut In Half

The Altamonte Springs City Commission Tuesday evening unanimously adopted an ordinance cutting in half—from eight percent to four percent—the utility tax rate, effective January 1, 1980.

City officials said that despite the rate reduction called for in the new ordinance, the tax will generate revenues of more than \$100,000 annually.

For many years Altamonte levied a 10 percent utility tax with a maximum of 10 monthly payments.

In the early 1970s the utility rate was changed to eight percent and the 10 monthly payments were removed. The purpose of the ordinance was to finance the construction of the city hall on Newberryport Avenue and the civic center.

In other business, the commission adopted an ordinance requiring more 500 customers of the city's utility system, who receive meter service, but have refused to connect to the city sewer, to pay a sewer fee of \$7.74 monthly anyway.

Most of the 500 customers who have not connected to the sewer system, although the service is available, reside on the north side of the city and are adjacent to the Public Service Director David Newman has said.

The portion of the sewer system, north of SR 68, has been completed since early March, 1977.

Newman said that the city would not require in March, 1977 that property owners the option of connecting to the system by June, 1977 to take advantage of a reduced connection fee of \$20. After June, the connection fee was increased to \$50, still less than the \$60 normally charged.

## Operators May Have Hit Jackpot On Bingo Ruling

MIAMI (UPI) — The state attorney's office says it will appeal a decision declaring the state's bingo law unconstitutional directly to the state Supreme Court, while police pounce over the immediate effect of the ruling.

Some law enforcement officials say Judge Morton Perry's decision Tuesday won't hamper a crackdown on bingo in south Florida, because until it is upheld by a higher court it is not binding on other judges.

Other officials, however, said they were afraid the ruling would throw enforcement of bingo laws into limbo until the higher court rules.

## Boom To Bust...Boom...

To do so, the court would have to rule that the PSC is a judicial tribunal, a decision that could open a Pandora's box of problems affecting other areas of law as well as other state agencies.

## One For All And All For...

MIAMI (UPI) — In hopes of getting more help in fighting drug traffic, Florida officials are giving each other more help and cooperation.

Top officials of the Drug Enforcement Administration, the Coast Guard and U.S. Customs signed a document Tuesday promising to share information and work together openly in their war with smugglers.

Although cooperation among the three agencies has been improving for the last three years after a period of shaky relations, officials hope the formal agreement will lead to more success in the Miami area and the southeast coast in general.

## Pitts-Lee: No Need For Blame

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Legislators will try to get the state to pay pardoned death row inmates Freddie Pitts and Wilbert Lee \$100,000 to \$500,000 without charging State Attorney Lee Jones of Panama City with negligence.

The decision was reached in a huddle Tuesday between Sen. Jack Gordon, D-Miami, and Rep. John Adams, D-Fort Lauderdale, leading sponsors of the Pitts-Lee claims legislation.

## The Businesses Are Coming

MIAMI (UPI) — The business-hunting trips abroad by Florida officials are already beginning to pay off, says Commerce Secretary Phil Ashler, but the state's tourism is lagging because of a lack of hospitality.

Ashler was in Miami Tuesday to address a group of international business and financial executives. He told them several industries in Germany, the Netherlands and Belgium will be opening plants in Florida soon, including the West German Seimen company which is participating in a \$120 million joint manufacturing venture near Bradenton.

# Piland Forces Decision On Buying Utility

Water Springs Mayor Trey Piland, who has brought up the issue of buying the North Orlando Water and Sewer Co. during at least four council meetings in the past few months, made his move Tuesday night to force a decision.

Piland told the council at the Tuesday night work session that he is placing on the agenda for the April 4 regular meeting "resolution from the council" on the matter.

Counting that vote will continue to escalate as long as the utility is owned and operated by the North Orlando Co., Piland said that in the future city residents served by the privately owned Orlando Utilities will be suffering the same problem.

He said that currently for 14,000 gallons of water, 1,500 customers of the North Orlando Water and Sewer Co., comprising the majority of city residents, are paying monthly \$8.45 while those served by Orlando Utilities, mostly in the Timberlake area are paying \$1.84.

He said the city needs advice from a fiscal agent and that a preliminary engineering feasibility study could be done for \$4,000 to \$5,000.

In answer to questions from councilmen, Dr. Dietz said that usually federal funding is not available to cities for the purchase of a privately-owned utility. He said that the value of the sewer plant, generally considered to be worth 50 percent of the overall utility, would have to be thought of in light of the fact that it must be connected to the regional plant at Iron Bridge in 1985. The sewer plant then has only interim value, he said.

He said the sewer plant could be operated with three-four employees and that the cost of treatment per customer goes down as additional customers are added to the system.

**Dutch Treats From The Netherlands**

"The streets! They are so big, with so many different foods on display!" said Geertje (Margaret) Vlasco, of Apeldoorn, in the Netherlands. Enjoying a family reunion with her daughter, Lucy, and her son-in-law, Edwin Bonta, and family of Altamonte Springs, Margaret and her sister, Betty Goodenbourer, have been busy taking in many of the special tourist attractions.

The City of Apeldoorn is a well-known tourist attraction in the Netherlands, with the summer palace of the Royal Family and a famous museum located there.

Margaret has a good English vocabulary now, but laughingly told of her first visit to this country.

"I journeyed to New Jersey and could not speak much English. There I was, frightened and all alone in this big America. I had a frog in my throat and could barely speak, but people were very kind to me."

Grocery stores here entrance Margaret and her sister. "You see, back home we have large, open markets. There are separate sections for different foods, like meat, vegetables and baked goods. We generally get our fresh vegetables each day for that day's meal."

Health foods are beginning to be accepted in the Netherlands, according to Margaret.

"We try to eat less meat and bake our own bread. A famous doctor from Switzerland urges people to turn to health and natural foods. We try to eat raw vegetables every day. The recipe called 'Hache' is especially recommended for people who wish to avoid cancer," she said.

Both Margaret and her sister have beautiful skin tones that seem to speak well for the health foods.

Margaret loves bike riding and walking. She also attends a gymnastics club once a week back home. Reading and knitting round out her hobbies.

Clothing and bed linens are much cheaper here, according to Margaret.

Her sister, Betty, a paleo victim, said, "The nuts and say how much handicapped people appreciate the facilities here, making it so much more convenient for people in wheelchairs."

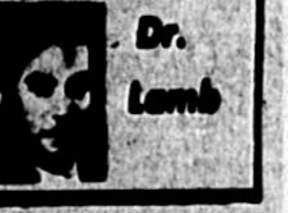

## During Stop In Brazil

# Carter Gives Begin Vote Of Confidence

BRASILIA, Brazil (UPI) — President Carter gave a vote of confidence today to Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin and said he believed the Begin government is completely capable of negotiating a settlement with Egypt.

In a news conference at the inland capital Carter tried to play down the serious disputes with Israel over the question of human rights and President Brando Gole's \$6 billion agreement with West Germany for a nuclear reactor that can produce weapons-grade plutonium.

Carter, who has been given a public welcome in Brazil in sharp contrast to the warm welcome he received in Venezuela, conferred with Gole before flying on to Rio de Janeiro.

In a brief speech to the Brazilian congress after the news conference, Carter stressed the "common problems" of Brazil and the United States and asked for cooperative

questions from both the White House press corps covering his trip and from South American journalists.

Brazil is the second stop on Carter's four-month, 14,000-mile journey to South America and Africa. He flew later today to Rio de Janeiro for an unofficial visit and talks with two Roman Catholic cardinals who are outspoken critics of Gole's military government.

Carter's most forceful remarks concerned the Middle East and the search for peace there.

Carter called "completely false" reports that his administration was seeking the ouster of the Israeli Prime Minister in hopes of facilitating a Middle East peace settlement.

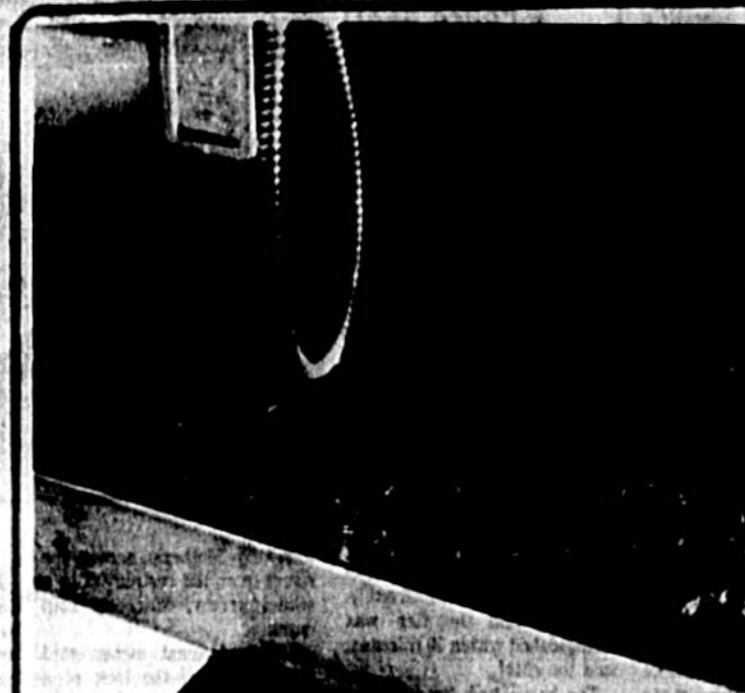
"I can say unequivocally that no one in a position of authority in the U.S. government has indicated that Prime Minister Begin is unqualified and should be replaced," he said.

"We are not giving up hope of a negotiated peace settlement in the Middle East," Carter said, adding that the visit to Cairo of Israeli Defense Minister Ezer Weizman represented a "step toward compatibility."

Weizman flew from Tel Aviv to Cairo today. Carter said there still are "key differences that must be resolved" including the Palestinian problem and Israel's interpretation of U.N. Resolution 242 calling for Israel to yield occupied Arab lands.

"I think the Begin government is completely capable of negotiating a settlement with Egypt," Carter said.

Carter defended his proposal to sell fighter jets to Saudi Arabia and Egypt as well as to Israel, a move that has been strongly criticized in Congress and in Tel Aviv.

# Midge Toll: \$4.69 Million

The blind mosquito is costing property owners, government and the business community in Sanford \$4.69 million annually in terms of unsuccessful real-estate efforts, losses of sales and tax revenues and declining values of affected properties according to an economic impact study prepared by the Sanford Chamber of Commerce midday last week with cooperation from the University of Florida.

And the anticipated future loss is \$6.8 million, according to a forecast study by the State Department of Commerce to calculate such losses.

The economic impact study will be delivered to the Sanford Chamber of Commerce at a breakfast meeting at the Holiday Inn at 11:30 a.m. Friday.

John Krider, chairman of the task force, said that he has agreed to request special legislation through the legislature to provide \$200,000 in state

money to initiate a research program to find an ecologically and environmentally safe method of controlling the insects.

In addition, the University of Florida, which would be directing the research program at its Sanford research center if funding is approved, has agreed to include the \$200,000 in its budget.

Krider said the special legislation is the best way to use the state funds in the best way possible.

Along with the impact study, the chamber committee of which Krider is chairman is submitting photographs and Evening Herald news accounts illustrating the problem with the midges including automobile accident reports.

"The Sanford Chamber of Commerce has about 100 members and they are all interested in the problem," Krider said. "The study is being done by the University of Florida. It has been named to head the research project."

Also being submitted are letters from the nine Central Florida and South Florida counties which are plagued with similar blind mosquito problems.

"We have heard no opposition to the proposed funding of the proposed research program," said Krider, adding, "This program will have more impact on the City of Sanford than any other program."

"The massive program of these pests has been and is continuing to be a major pest problem in Sanford. It is a major problem in the health, welfare, safety and well-being and to property of the citizens of Seminole County," according to the presentation to the impact study.

Krider said the midges are a major pest and has recovered with increasing severity over recent years.

"The blind mosquito has been estimated to be a two-week period of breeding of blind mosquitoes. By 1977, the severity of the problem has increased to now cover a six to eight-month span of more than a

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# Health Plan Faces County Opposition

A program to control mosquitoes in Seminole County will meet stiff opposition in the county commission unless information being prepared by Terry Tuck, director of Human Services, sways current opinion.

A preliminary sampling of commissioners indicates a majority are presently opposed to spending up to \$100,000 for a county-wide mosquito control program. Seminole is the only county in central Florida without a spraying program, said Tuck.

Volusia and Brevard counties spend about \$1 million annually to control mosquitoes, said Tuck. He noted they are not spraying because they are rural counties and it would be too costly for the comfort of the tourists as far as health means.

Recently Dr. Humada Battie, county public health director, submitted a memo to the county commission urging such a program to prevent an outbreak of St. Louis encephalitis.

Last year, according to Dr. Battie, three persons died in Seminole County as a result of encephalitis.

"It's tough to look at the correlation with other counties," Commissioner Bill Kirshoff, "to see if there is a relationship between us and other counties in the number of encephalitis cases here and in counties that spray."

"There is no specific vaccine for St. Louis encephalitis," said Dr. Berra Iyengar, pediatrician and member of the Seminole Memorial Inflection Control Committee. He noted the only effective method of controlling the disease is to eradicate mosquitoes.

The disease is carried from birds by mosquitoes to humans, according to Dr. Battie.

"If the money is to be used to save lives," said Kirshoff, "we ought to look at the program and the need and see if there is a more effective way to spend money to save lives. Perhaps we should look at our mosquito and see what we can do to save lives in our counties last year. We should not spend the money unless it is cost effective."

"I'm still opposed to the program," commented Commissioner Bill French, "until someone proves to me that it is needed. He can't just claim an epidemic that we are going to have an epidemic."

French indicated he would favor the program if there is a need.

"I don't see how that it is needed or wanted unless we can show we are going to have a health problem unless we do it. I'd love to finance against it if I could find someone. Only Commissioner John Alexander has expressed

# Casselberry Spray Plans Start
