Iowa State, under Coach Louis Menze, lost all of its starters from last season, but picked up Ronnie Norman, a regular guard in 1943, from the Army and has considerable talent from 1944-45 reserves.

Coach Bruce Drake's Sooners, who won the title in 1944 have nine returning lettermen. Jack Landon, unanimous All-Big Six last season, is their key man.

The Kansas State Wildcats and Nebraska Cornhuskers can be rated as "trouble makers" at best. Jay Payton, All-Big Six guard, is back at State and Coach Fritz Knorr's Wildcats will have to get along with a freshman-dominated team.

Coach Pop Klein says Nebraska will be much like the Cornhusker football outfit—tough late in the season. His squad includes letterman Fred Decox, 6-foot forward.

### Will Create Furore Among Nazi Leaders

#### Hermann Goering Is Not Surprised At Hitler's Charge Of Being Traitor

NUERNBERG, Dec. 31. (AP) — The 20 top Nazis awaiting resumption of their war crimes trial in Nuremberg learned today of the sensational revelations contained in Adolf Hitler's last will. It created a furore among the onetime Hitler henchmen, particularly Hermann Goering, who was charged with treason and Heinrich Himmler, who was charged with treason.

The accused Nazis learned of the Hitler will's contents in their jail cells where they are waiting for their trial to be resumed Wednesday after a holiday recess. The disclosure came to them during a busy morning of conferences with their lawyers.

But Hitler's charges were no particular surprise to Hermann Goering. He was arrested in Berchtesgaden on Apr. 28 while he was waiting word that he had been made the new German Fuehrer. Virtually all the other defendants are understood to have been surprised at the strong language used against Goering and Himmler in Hitler's will.

"Altogether from their disloyalty to me, Goering and Himmler have brought irreparable shame on the country and the whole nation by secretly negotiating with the enemy without my knowledge and against my will and also by illegally attempting to seize control of the state."

It is understood that Arthur Seyss-Inquart did not know until the will was made public that Hitler had named him as Joachim von Ribbentrop's successor as Foreign Minister.

Lt. F. D. Scott, of the United States Navy and former service station operator here, has returned to Sanford after being separated from the Naval service.

Lt. Scott entered the service on May 19, 1943, and was assigned to the communications department of the Naval Base at Key West.

Lt. Scott, currently on terminal leave, has been visiting friends and relatives in Sanford, White Plains, Miami and points in Alabama.

### Stark's Letters Reveal Pre-Pearl Harbor Activities

#### Measure To Aid Veteran Passed By Commission

#### Probe Of Surplus Property Disposal Methods Requested

In an effort to enable veterans of the United States armed forces to obtain property deemed surplus and overcome the complexity of regulations and practices of officials and bureaus having charge of the disposal of this equipment, the State Veterans Commission has issued a resolution calling for an investigation and drastic action by Congress and government authorities.

The resolution was adopted at a recent meeting of the commission in Jacksonville. The group considered caking surplus supplies and equipment of the armed forces available to the discharged veterans of vital importance in his rehabilitation and conversion to the civilian life.

The Commission has forwarded a copy of the resolution to each member of Congress from Florida, to the Governor of the State and other officials and agencies of the United States Government and the State of Florida having jurisdiction in the matter.

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#### Naval Chief In 1941 Discloses Troubles With Congress And President Roosevelt

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31. (AP) — A huge sheaf of important correspondence was turned over to the Congressional Pearl Harbor Committee today by Admiral Harold Stark, who was Chief of Naval Operations in 1941.

It shed a good deal of light on events that preceded the Japanese attack — and it also revealed Stark as a very outspoken Admiral. He was quoted in some of the letters burned after they were read. He told of his troubles with Congress and with President Roosevelt in getting the Navy up to strength in those pre-war years.

Admiral Stark recommended, right after the German invasion of Russia, that the United States get into the war — but at the same time he expressed the hope that Germany and Russia would wear each other out to avoid the possibility of a Communist Europe. As early as Nov. 7, 1941, Stark wrote that we were already in the war. He recalled that back in May, 1941, President Roosevelt wanted an expedition made ready to take the Azores.

As for the Pearl Harbor attack, Stark told the Committee today that the Navy Commander in Hawaii, Admiral Husband E. Kimmel, had received adequate warning to be on guard. Stark said that on Nov. 27, 1941, he sent a message to fleet commanders warning that it was being considered as a war warning — words that he had never used in any other dispatch. He informed the fleet commanders that negotiations with Japan had broken down, and told them to be ready to carry out their war plans. Stark told the Congressional Committee that over a period of two years his correspondence had emphasized the danger of continuing the danger of war with Japan. The possibility of a surprise attack on Pearl Harbor, he said, had been fully considered.

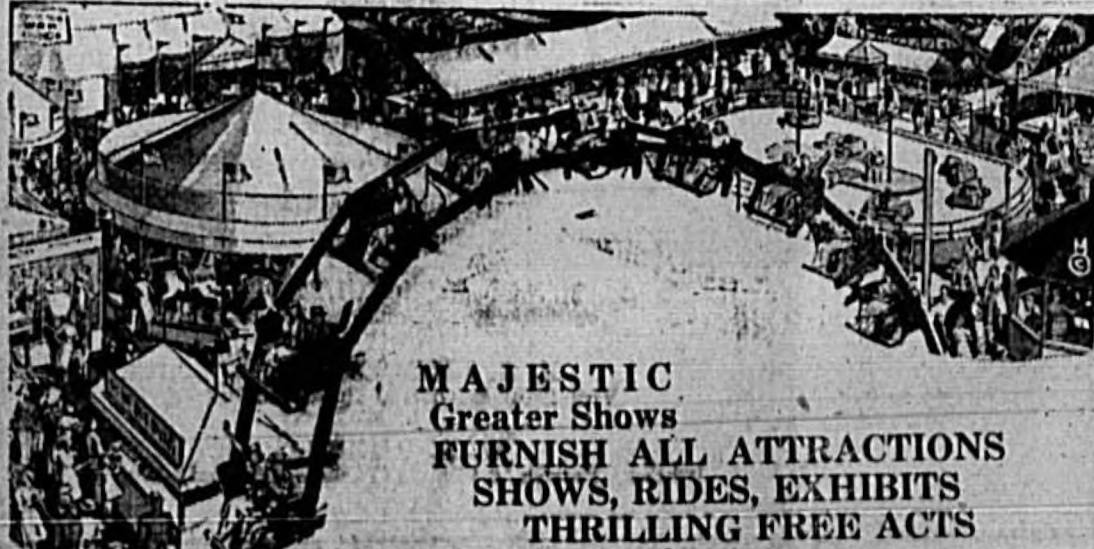

(Continued from Page Two) which was born out by later events. West First Street resurfacing was under way.

The final quarter of the year marked the beginning of reconstruction and reconversion to the ways of peace and the return of many veterans, including Brig. Gen. J. C. Hutchison to whom the Japs surrendered on Mindanao.

Government engineers started surveying the upper St. Johns River Valley, heavily flooded by rains, with a view to what should be done in the way of flood control. Dire need of a new hospital in the county was discussed by county commissioners. Mayor Edward Higgins and City Commissioner M. J. Lodge declined to run again. A \$30,000 fund for a swimming pool was announced. The Celery Feds defeated Ocala 21 to 7.

At the State Market a new addition of eight stalls was projected. Citrus packers installed new machinery for the packing season which started Oct. 10. The Cowan Company started moving into its new building. An old landmark was torn down by

Joe Moss at Sanford Avenue and Third Street and replaced by a modern store structure. Residents shivered in the first cold snap of the season. Thorpe Furniture got in readiness to reopen. Hollywood Shops, Sears Roebuck made alterations to store. Vals Williams started work on the new bowling alley to replace the one burned.

Navy Day was celebrated Oct. 27 at the Sanford Naval Air Station. Ed Whitner, ex-Rollins athlete and baseball star took over management of Seminole Country Club and a new corporation was formed. Dean Matherly of Florida University was speaker at a Navy Day dinner at the Hotel Mayfair. Legion induction of many veterans took place at Seminole High School Field as Celeryettes marched.

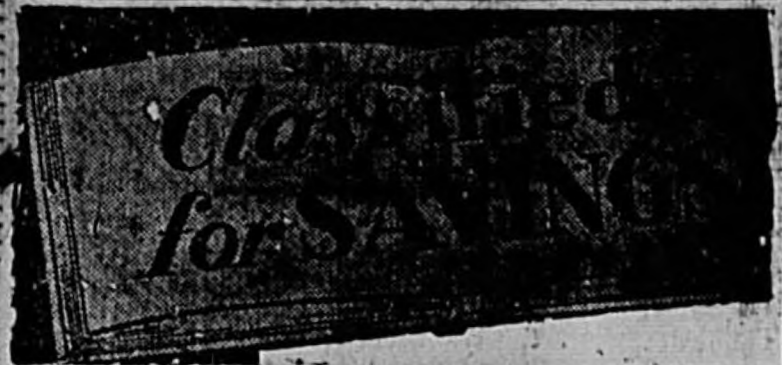

It was nearly impossible to keep up with the teams since the Stars and Stripes, the famed Army newspaper, carried in most cases, only the final scores. Who made the touchdowns and who displayed the defensive gems of the day, was not printed.

However, after arriving in the United States, we began to follow most of the teams and feel today that we are a bit qualified to walk out on the proverbial limb and make a few predictions concerning the Tuesday afternoon bowl games.

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# HERE IS THE ISSUE

Is American Business to Be Based on Free Competition, or Is It to Become Socialized, With All Activities Controlled and Regimented?

General Motors has faced what it believes is a highly critical issue. It has made its decision. It is important that the public understand the issue. The issue at stake transcends the interests of General Motors. There is involved something far more consequential — a most vital principle.

contive to do a more efficient job? Would it be intelligent to subscribe to the principle that no one should be forced to pay more than the going rate? Should General Motors, assuming it is more efficient, be required to pay more for materials, for transportation, for services or for wages than it's competition? And how much more determined by a political governmental agency.

In American business in the future, as in the past, to be conducted as a competitive system? Or is the determination of the essential economic factors, such as costs, prices, profits, etc., upon which business success and progress depend, to be made politically by some governmental agency instead of by the management appointed by the owners of the business for that purpose?

Do you subscribe to the belief that you should pay for what you buy or the services you use on the basis of your financial resources? It is clear that this is the principle involved.

America is at the crossroads! It must preserve the freedom of each unit of American business to determine its own destinies. Or it must transfer to some governmental bureaucracy or agency, or to a union, the responsibility of management that has been the very backbone of American business. Shall this responsibility be surrendered? That is the decision the American people face. America must choose!

The President of the United States has appointed a fact-finding board to inquire into the circumstances involved in the demands of the UAW/CIO upon General Motors and to make recommendations related thereto. General Motors stood ready to supply the board with all necessary data regarding wage rates, employees' earnings, hours of employment, and all other relevant information regarding wages and employment. However, the board has ruled that General Motors' ability to pay will be considered as a factor in determining an increase in wages. This would require an appraisal of costs, prices, prospective volume of business, investment factors, expenses, and the entire forward operating program of the business. Thus the board would assume the most vital functions of management.

General Motors has made its choice. It refuses to subscribe to what it believes will ultimately become, through the process of evolution, the death of the American system of competitive enterprise. It will not participate voluntarily in what stands out crystal clear at the end of the road — a regimented economy. If this is what the American people want, they must make that choice through their accredited representatives in Congress. General Motors declines for itself to take such a great responsibility.

General Motors is not contending that it has or has not the ability to pay. It always has paid liberal wages. It has attempted through unrestricted collective bargaining sessions to determine what is fair and equitable today. It has made a fair and liberal offer to the union.

It may be said that this is an exaggeration. It is not! All business questions are interrelated. Costs, prices, wages, profits, schedules, investments must be the responsibility of management. Political determination of such relationships means regimentation. The ability to pay, whatever its validity may be, is not responsible to an individual business within an economy as a basis for raising its wages beyond the going rate.

Notwithstanding the importance of reestablishing employment and resuming production at the earliest possible moment, the above reasons have made it impossible for General Motors to participate in the proceedings of the board under the procedures now established, and it has therefore withdrawn from the hearings. It takes that position with great regret, but it does so in the sincere belief that this action is in the long-term interest of employees, management, investors, and of the public as well — and of higher standards for all.
