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Reminder: Homestead Exemption

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Sanford To Fight City Paving Suit

City of Sanford will file an answer to a federal court suit brought by a Daytona Beach attorney representing several property owners of Sanford's Georgetown area who are opposed to the city levying a special assessment to finance the costs of paving that section's north-south streets.

This was decided at Monday night's City Commission meeting after Mayor Lee P. Moore advised he had served Wednesday by a U.S. marshal with papers in the action brought by attorney Horace Hill at the request of the Georgetown Taxpayers Association, named used by the suit filers.

Until the process served, it had been thought the suit was being dropped by the group, especially after the commission met with Rev. John T. Owens and other taxpayers in an effort to assure them that no racial discrimination existed in the proposal to pave the streets.

MOSCOW (UPI) — The Soviet announced today that their Venus spacecraft landed in operating condition on Venus last Dec. 13 and relayed scientific information from the surface of the planet for the first time. Venus is hot as believed and the atmosphere is thick as believed.

An announcement by the Soviet news agency Tass said the spacecraft which blasted off from Central Asia on Aug. 17 radiated back word the temperature on Venus was in the neighborhood of 887 degrees Fahrenheit and that the atmospheric pressure was around 90 times that of earth—or 1,523 pounds per square inch.

Garbage Pickup Charges Upped 8% For Sanford

Sanford residents soon will be paying an additional 25 cents per month for backyard garbage pickups but commercial users may find their charges for contracting for city disposal of trash increased by several times the present fee.

The above was indicated at Monday night's Sanford Commission meeting when it approved the rewriting of the city refuse ordinance and incorporated revisions in three key areas to 5,500 customers, including commercial and residential.

On a motion by Commissioner Gordon Meyer and seconded by Commissioner Julian Stenstrom, the commission voted unanimously to have City Attorney William Hutchinson re-draft the present ordinance incorporating the increased rates and changes as outlined by City Manager W. E. Knowles, who spent two weeks gathering material from six nearby municipalities.

Drummond Chastises Municipalities School Overpass Bid Causes Hassle

Access to Altamonte Elementary School, across SR 436, was the topic of discussion at this morning's session of the County Commission. Recently, parents have been marching across the highway with their children to dramatize what they consider to be a serious problem and are pushing for the construction of an overpass.

Commission Chairman Greg Drummond said that the county is pursuing the possibility of an overpass at the crossing but that it would be constructed when a definite need has been ascertained and not just because a group of people demand one. He said that if the county constructed one every time one was requested, it would be irresponsible on the part of the commissioners due to the \$100,000 price tag on an overpass over a four-lane highway.

County Engineer William E. Bush was directed by the commission to survey the area and consider the possibility of lengthening the school zone at that point; the installation of a manually operated traffic signal at Altamonte Springs; and of controlling the traffic in the area, and report back to the commissioners.

Drummond chastised municipalities in general and the City of Altamonte Springs specifically for annexing rights-of-way to state roads without first determining if they can properly handle the responsibilities that go along with them.

Commissioner Sidney Viblen stated that perhaps the commissioners should request that the city of Altamonte Springs and the Sheriff's office by providing a policeman to help the deputy sheriff assigned to the crossing. Drummond reiterated his feeling saying that the city should assume their responsibilities, not try to just help the county.

Chief Deputy Duane Harrell reported to the commission that the Sheriff's office had contacted the Altamonte Springs police department about helping traffic control at the crossing and said that they were confident that the police department lacked the personnel to provide an officer at the crossing.

Drummond said that Altamonte Springs had stated that an officer was assigned to the crossing but often had to leave to handle other police calls. Drummond added that he had not seen an Altamonte Springs policeman there at all and the only occasion that he had observed one in the area he appeared to be on routine patrol.

Casselberry Council Acts Police Department Probe Voted

(Editor's note: The Sanford Herald learned this morning there are rumors of a mass resignation by the Casselberry police department, including Chief Donald Brumley, after the Chief was censured last night by the City Council although State Attorney Abbott Herring was quoted "It seems to me the solution should be for the council to censure the Mayor" Curtis Blow.)

William Grier presented then Chairman Thomas Napier with a packet containing information alleging "certain unspecified charges against an elected city official."

Napier then appointed Councilman Grier and Sanbrook to a special committee to investigate the matter.

On Thursday, Jan. 14, his committee met with Thomas Speer, Paul Legge and Fred Legge, one of the state attorney's office, since the packet contained certain documents prepared by that office. Speer advised the committee that Donald Brumley, police chief of the City of Casselberry, had earlier submitted statements from a former employee of the city alleging a certain irregularity concerning Mayor Blow.

State Attorney Abbott Herring said his office had investigated the matter to the extent of assigning an investigator to the case and "after considerable expense to the taxpayers" had concluded that the charges did not warrant further action by that office.

During the meeting, the committee also learned that Brumley had also turned the dossier over to the Florida Bureau of Law Enforcement, which also concluded that no action was warranted. Brumley then took the dossier to Gov. Claude Kirk's campaign headquarters in Orlando, "supposedly for transfer of this information to the Governor's office in Tallahassee." A clerk in the headquarters discovered the file some eight days later, and called the state attorney's office in Sanford. Legge was immediately dispatched to Orlando to return the dossier to Sanford.

BRUMLEY MEETS GOVERNOR

Since this meeting with the state attorney's office, the council committee has learned that Brumley, without consulting the council, had "taken it upon himself" to personally go to Tallahassee and present copies of this dossier to Governor Askew. He was then returned to the local department, which reached the same conclusion that no further action was warranted.

Sylvia Powell Pleads 'Not Guilty' To Murder

Sylvia Thobia Powell, 37, charged with first degree murder in the death of her husband, Maynard Powell, 52, entered a "not guilty" plea to the charge at arraignments held this morning in Circuit Court before Judge Dominick Salfi.

Trial was set for the two-week period of Feb. 15-22. Mrs. Powell's attorney, Wendell Harris, was granted five days to file motions.

Larry Heert, also known as Karl Jon Porter, charged with possession of a narcotic, had his arraignment continued until Feb. 2 due to Julian advising the court that he was not prepared to enter a plea due to being involved in conflicting litigation at the time of the preliminary hearing.

The arraignment of Ronald Howe, charged with two counts of possession of narcotics and one count of possession of a narcotic, was continued until Feb. 17. Wilson entered a not guilty plea.

Edgar Burkett, charged with rape in an incident which allegedly occurred Nov. 8 involving a 14-year-old girl at her home, entered a not guilty plea to the charges. Trial was set for the week of Feb. 15-22.

Several defendants in cases involving narcotics violations were present for arraignment.

Susan Aikens, charged on two counts of possession of a hallucinogenic and sale of a narcotic entered a not guilty plea to the second count. Edw. Merle Harris declared the post had reached its quota in the recent membership drive. He also announced a barbeque will be held on Sunday, Feb. 28.

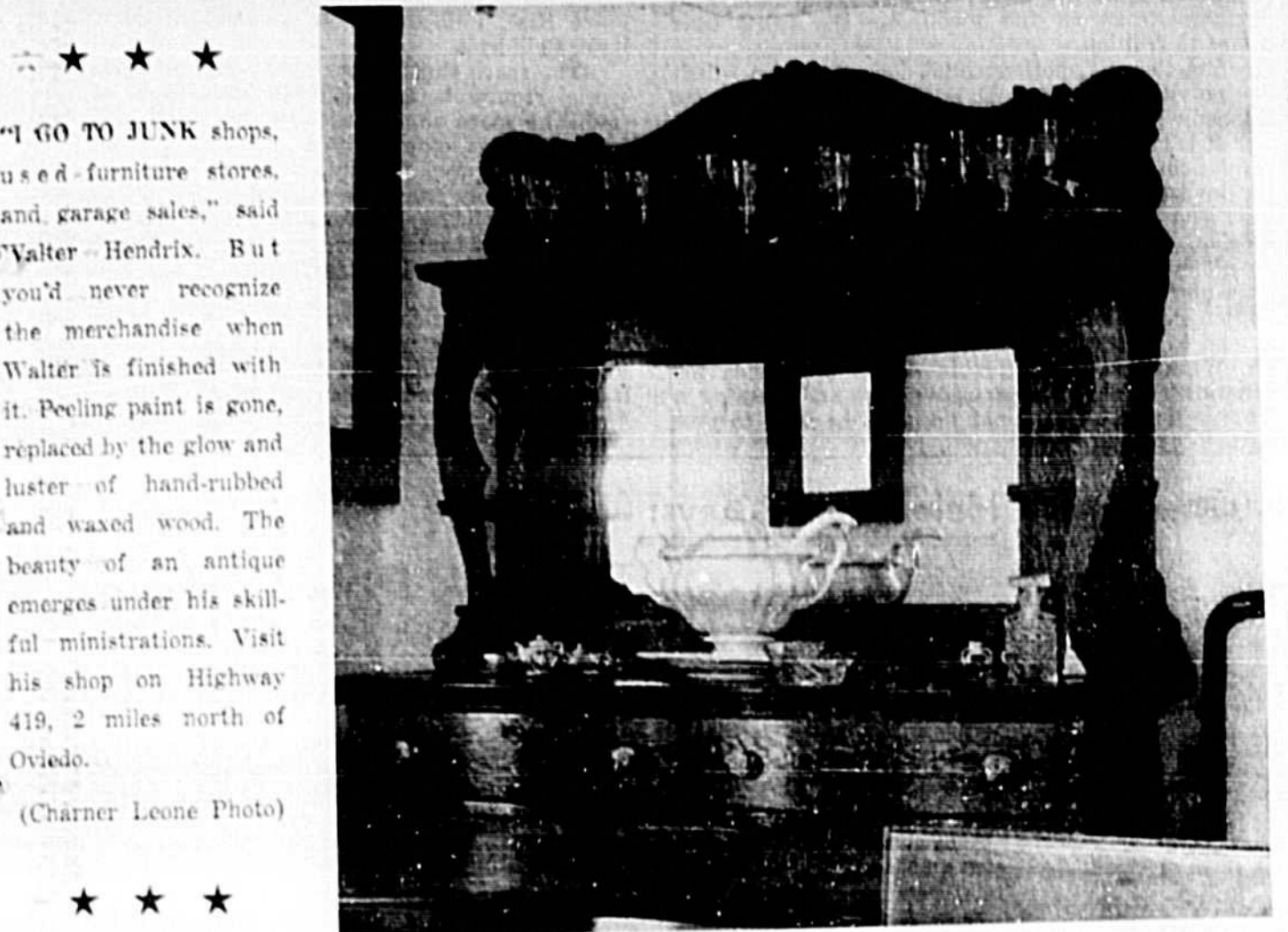

Apollo 14 Countdown And Its Latent Meaning

Final countdown for Apollo 14, moon probe, is underway. This dangerous and delicate mission to land American astronauts on the Fra Mauro highlands is the best prepared in terms of craft and crew that had won experience can produce.

Stuart Allen Roosa, who will be in command of the lonely CM Kitty Hawk, as his fellows explore the moon surface, is to be in space for the first time. A prime purpose for Roosa will be the camera operation which will be taking views of the moon as guides for the next lunar probes.

The trip is placed at \$400 million. Results are estimated to be of incalculable value in terms of scientific knowledge with realistic practical applications on earth.

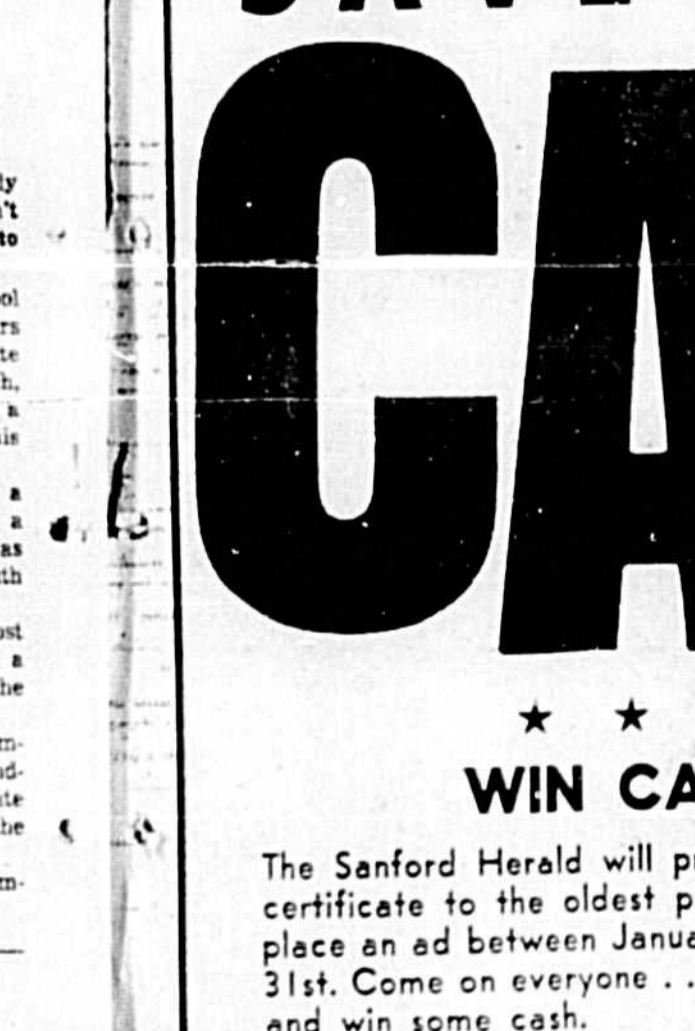

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — The Apollo 14 astronauts today practice a new landing technique intended to steer them to a pinpoint landing in one of the roughest areas of the moon, the craggy Fra Mauro highlands.

Alan B. Shepard Jr., Edgar D. Mitchell and Stuart A. Roosa planned several hours in spaceship simulators, honing themselves for the delicate landing attempt.

The rehearsal starts with Shepard and Mitchell in the lunar module simulator, activating the systems as they will be for the separation and descent. Roosa works in the command ship simulator.

Meanwhile, the lengthy countdown which started Monday continued on schedule toward a launching Sunday at 3:23 p.m. EST. Major items today included hooking up umbilicals and loading liquid oxygen aboard the fuel cells in the command ship and checking systems of the first stage of the Saturn V rocket.

Kitty Hawk will dip to within 12 miles of the lunar surface Feb. 5. In a recent interview, Roosa explained the joined spaceships will fire into an initial lunar orbit ranging from 65 to 185 miles by 65 miles high.

"On low passes over the landing site we'll obtain a good look at the area and also get some data. This will give us a greater confidence they can make it."



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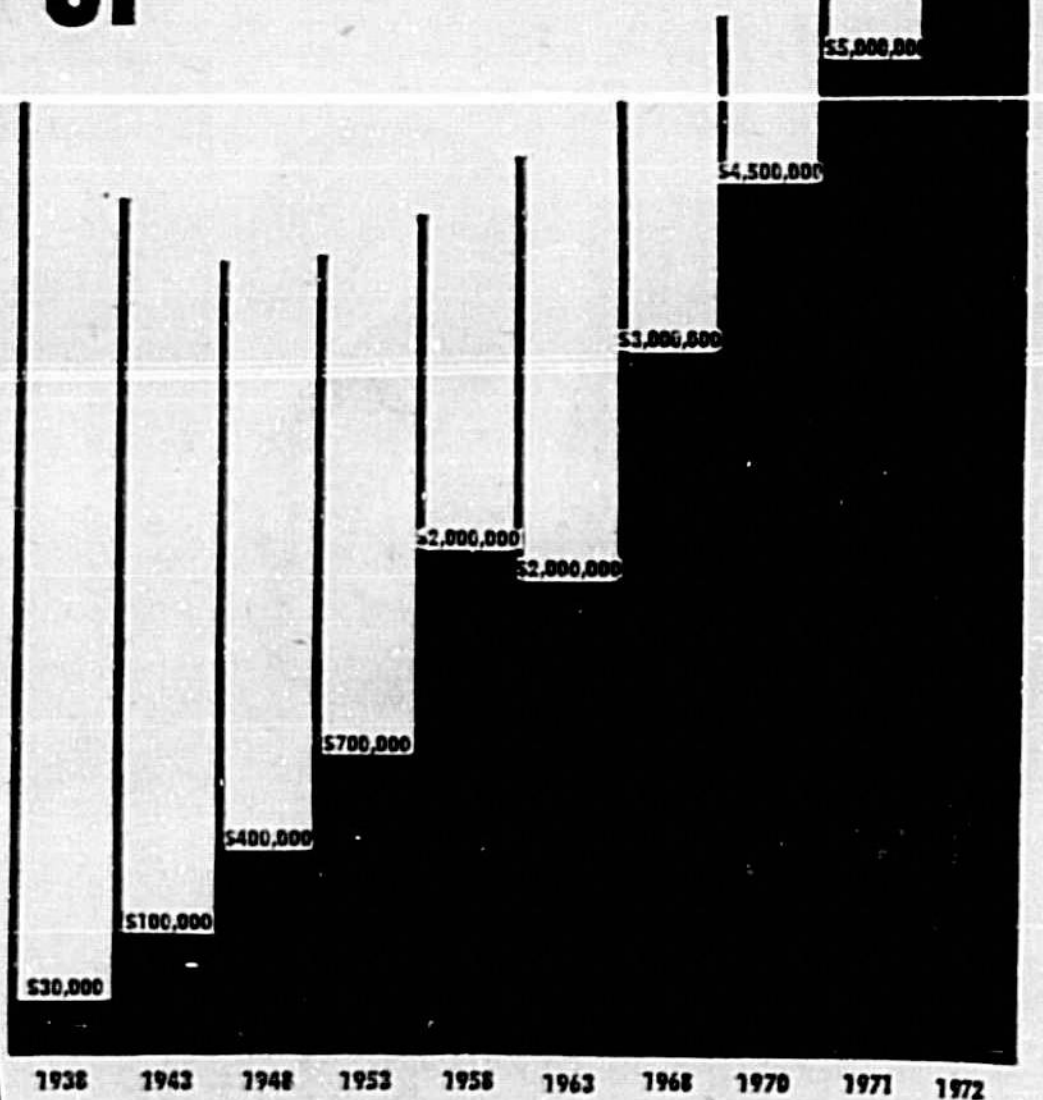

President Nixon's Stop Order on Florida Barge Canal construction has evoked considerable speculation concerning the eventual disposition of the lands acquired for canal use.

The Florida Defenders of the Environment, a leader in the fight against the canal, has suggested that the land be returned to the adjoining Ocala National Forest. James M. Wallich, Acting Forest Supervisor of the National Forest in Florida, pointed out that about 1,400 acres of land which have been flooded by the Barge Canal still belong to the Forest Service. No formal action was ever taken to transfer the land to the Corps of Engineers. Another 2,300 acres lying within the Barge Canal area has also been retained in Forest Service ownership. Wallich stated that if canal construction was permanently abandoned the Forest Service would participate in the fullest possible extent in the restoration of the environmental integrity of the Ocala National Forest.

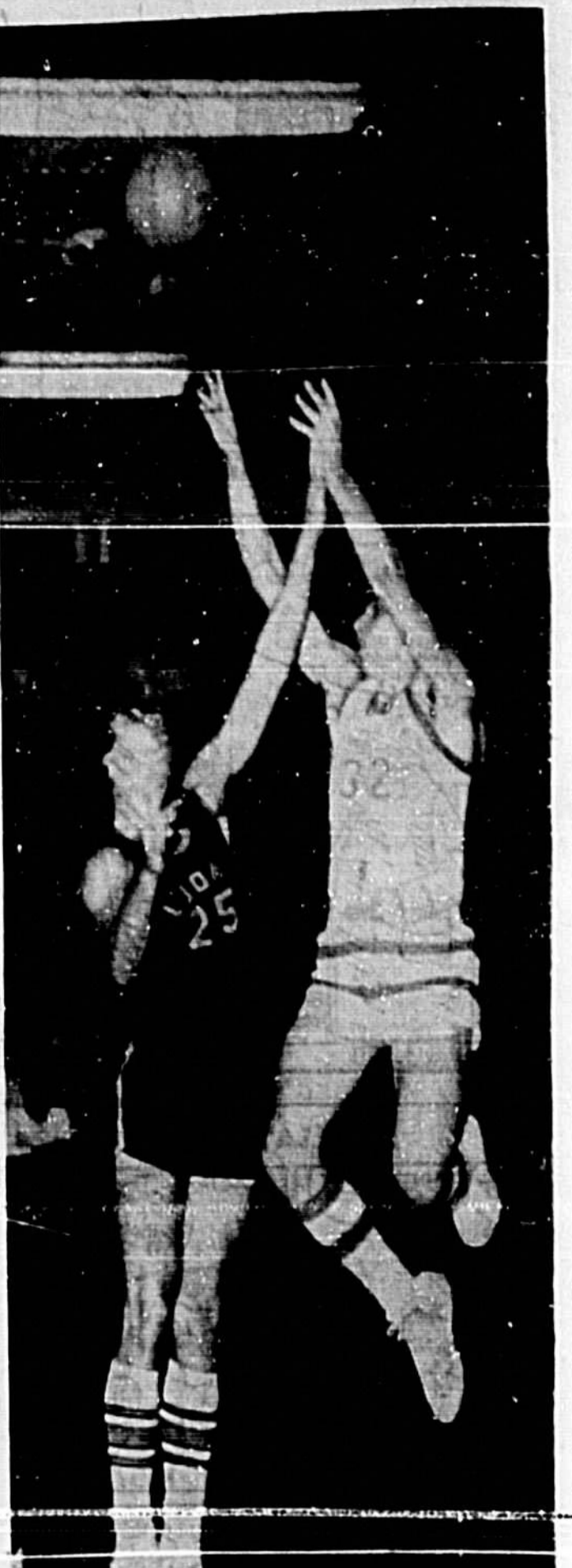
