For the loss incurred in the ad valorem tax, municipalities, if they maintained their present efficiency of government would be compelled to seek elsewhere for adequate revenue with which to operate.

Opponents of the amendment proposal declare that wide approval by the home owners has been gained through their lack of understanding of its various phases. They can see nothing gained in taking away one tax and compelling another to be levied no matter in what guise. Many believe that it will lead into a sales tax.

Frank Hart, Grand Master of South Carolina Masons and one of the directors before turning one of the pistols against his own chest and firing a bullet which penetrated his heart.

The one thing holding recovery back here is the lack of confidence on the part of capitalists. One would almost think that somebody was after them.

Reports of a "mysterious wildcat" in the vicinity of a Toronto suburb resulted in some embarrassment for a Canadian game warden the other day. Responding hastily to these rumors, the game warden took his trusty field glass "stacy" into the woods in search of his game. When he encountered the "wild cat," his flashlight was snatched, but he killed a pedigree Venezuelan hound out the pet of a neighboring vicar.

A few years from now when everybody is generous again, public speakers will get up and deliver the depression and what have those things are necessary were so often to make themselves felt to keep them from becoming too big. And they will control how much money is spent without being the owners of anything in themselves, and they will control how much about the bank of every nation.

Business and professional men in England are making the prediction of a "great change" necessary by which it is believed to be the only way to get out of the depression. The prediction is that many thousands of people will be thrown out of work in the next few years.

The Banker's Way

There was when the business men, particularly bankers, officers of insurance companies, and other public institutions, deliberately sought to envelop their organizations and their operations with an air of mystery. Financial statements, as required by law, were published from time to time, but not one person in a thousand could tell what they meant. Questioning of officials invariably resulted in a smile and a nod toward the door.

Recently, however, there has been a decided reaction on the part of many business leaders to acquaint the public in a general way, not only with the facts regarding their institutions, but also with a simple guide to a ready interpretation of the facts. Public statements, institutional advertising, lectures and courses of study, especially prepared for the general public, are being reported to in many places for the express purpose of giving the public a better understanding of legitimate business practice.

Recently the Literary Digest told of a school which is being conducted by the Poudre Valley National Bank of Fort Collins, Colorado, to which groups of depositors are invited, thirty or forty at a time, to hear lectures by trained economists on such subjects as the fundamentals of banking, the meaning of technical terms, and the new legislation involving banking.

"One thing which has been emphasized particularly," says the Literary Digest, "is the reason why banks have to impose a service charge on some accounts. It was explained carefully that such charges simply represent the cost to the bank of services performed for the customer in cases where the balance is so small that the bank can not make any money by lending it. The bank officials have concluded that the school is successful because there has been an increase of \$170,000 in deposits since it began.

The bankers of the country should be deeply indebted to their colleagues of Fort Collins for showing them such a painless method of increasing deposits. Possibly there is a suggestion here for other professions, as well. Clothiers, for instance, might hold evening classes offering an adequate explanation for that "small charge for alterations."

We have no doubt that much of the suspicion which still exists in a large part of the public mind with regard to many business institutions can be traced, at least in part, to a lack of understanding of many of the essentials of good business practice. There is nothing which appears quite so unnecessary or so repulsive as that which we do not understand.

It is perhaps one of the best signs of our changing civilization that the old policy of the "Public Be Damned" is giving way to a feeling that the people are entitled to know what is being done and to be kept informed as to the whys and wherefores.

Foreign Political Terms

The dispatches from Europe these days contain many strange words, definitions of which may help us to understand better what is going on over there. The Associated Press has recently compiled a list of these words, somewhat akin to our various political parties, our federal army, National Guard, and so forth, a few of the more common of which are as follows:

Fascism—A system of authoritarian, as opposed to parliamentary, government; i. e., a one-party administration with its "chief" ("duce" in Italian, "Fuehrer" in German) as dictator. The system is anti-socialist and anti-communist.

THE BANKING SYSTEM

Senator Kiefer Thomas, of Oklahoma, leader of what is popularly referred to as the "conservative reform bloc" in Congress, is planning to introduce a bill to be known as an evening session bill to launch a campaign for the nationalization of the Federal Reserve system.

The Oklahoma bill, one of a host of two age resolutions proposed by his associates regarding currency matters, by making the Government of the United States the sole issuer of money, would eliminate the Federal Reserve system.

If Mr. Thomas had deliberately set out to pick the two banking systems in the world that controlled the whole idea that he is exposing as could not possibly have done a better job of it, almost everybody but the Senator from Oklahoma knows the Bank of England represents the nearest approach to be found anywhere in the world to complete divestment of the central bank and the government.
