Sanford waits for Bush's OK on state funding

SANFORD - The state legislature has approved more than \$6.5 million in funding for programs in the city of Sanford.

The legislature has ear-

marked funds for expansion of the Orlando Sanford Airport's domestic terminal, renovations to the Rita Theatre and Historic Sanford Memorial Stadium, as well as a project to control midgets at the city's waterfront, according to Sanford Mayor Larry Dale.

Governor Jeb Bush still needs to approve the funding. "I hope he doesn't line-item (veto) anything," Dale said. "These projects are important to the city."

Clean team wants more breaths of fresh air

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Officials in Seminole County are taking part in a campaign to clean up air pollution in Central Florida.

The Central Florida Clean Air Team coordinated by Metropolitan Orlando launched a public information campaign on Monday that focuses on how individual choices can affect air quality and traffic congestion in Central Florida.

"There is not one county in Central Florida that is in the clear," Mary Jane Arrington, an commissioner for Osceola County, said.

Air pollution particularly affects the elderly and children with respiratory problems such as asthma. There are 26,000 children with asthma in Seminole, Orange and Osceola counties.

In 2000, the Environmental Protection Agency will redesignate urban areas for attainment or nonattainment with the National Ambient Air Quality Standards.

Failure to meet the standard of 85 parts per billion in ozone in 2000 will result in a State Implementation Plan. The fourth highest reading for 1997, 1998 and 1999 will be averaged by the EPA. The ozone reading must be below

85 parts per billion. The plan could require an annual inspection of motor vehicles and traffic control measures, such as limiting parking or requiring carpooling.

Additional measures could include requiring less volatile paints and solvents, tightened emissions level standards for motor vehicles, strict permitting requirements for new development, and cleaner fuel requirements.

If these measures fail to bring an area into attainment with federal standards, federal highway funds could be withheld. More than \$700 million in projects were recently sanc-

tion in Atlanta, Ga. because the area did not meet federal air quality standards.

"In Atlanta this is a very serious issue," Harold Bailey, executive director of Metropolitan Orlando, a regional transportation planning partnership for Orange, Osceola, and Seminole Counties, said.

This year's readings so far are 89 parts per billion in Seminole and Osceola counties, and 79 in Orange County. The three counties will be evaluated as a group.

In 1998, the fourth highest ozone average was 89 in Seminole, 91 in Osceola, and 96 in Orange County. In 1997, the fourth highest average was

76 in Seminole, 75 in Osceola and 79 in Orange County.

Ozone is caused by the chemical reaction of Volatile Organic Compounds and Nitrogen Oxides in the presence of sunlight.

The sources for the organic compounds and nitrogen oxides include power plants, gasoline service stations and dry cleaners.

Internal combustion engines such as motor vehicles, aircraft, railroad engines, and marine craft, lawn mowers, and weed trimmers, contribute to ozone.

Officials recommend that residents reduce ozone pro-

Front Porch swings into gear in Florida

SANFORD - More than 60 people attended the first meeting of a program aimed at bringing economic development to areas in the city in need of a shot in the arm on Tuesday.

Sanford officials are hoping to be one of the first 20 cities receiving funds through a new state program called Front Porch Florida.

The program's goals include improving schools, reducing crime, and increasing economic opportunities in an "urban core" community of a city.

"There are a lot of wounds in the city that need to heal," Pastor Ricky Scott said. "The city has sore spots that need to be mended. This is a beautiful opportunity."

Business owners, educators, religious leaders, representatives from civic and

business organizations, law enforcement, and city officials met at the Sanford/Seminole County Chamber of Commerce Tuesday to discuss the program.

"This is truly a cross-section of the community," City Commissioner Velma Williams said. "This is the beginning of something great."

If Sanford is selected to participate in the program, Williams said the funding may focus on the Goldsboro, Georgetown, and Historic District areas of the city.

"Sanford has been needing this for a long time," Eliza Pringle, a retired educator, said.

This year, state officials plan on naming the first three communities participating in the program. By 2002, the state hopes to have 20 cities participating.

"We're going to be selected," Pastor Hezekiah Ross See Porch, Page 6A



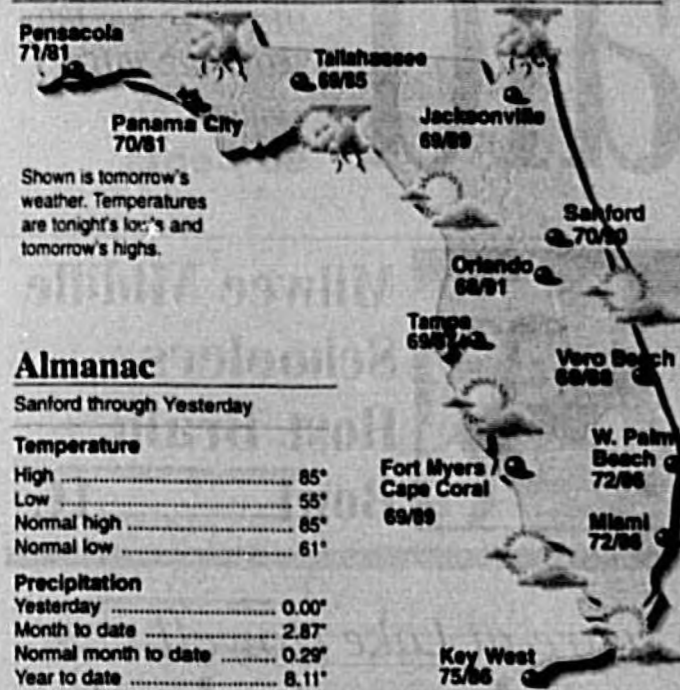
No lack of taste in Oviedo

Police said the student made a note with a diagram of himself blowing up the school as well as the hit list.

A fellow eighth-grade student informed a school official

of the note. On April 27, a 13-year old student at Rock Lake Middle School in Longwood was arrested when a deputy found a map in the student's locker that included drawings of the school's hallways and a note reading "hide bomb in globe in science (building)".

Investigators did not find a bomb or weapon at Rock Lake Middle School.

duction while traveling by refueling vehicles after 7 p.m., avoiding excessive idling or jack rabbit starts, carpooling, taking mass transit, and by avoiding using gasoline powered equipment such as outboard motors and off-road vehicles until the evening hours or on weekends.

At home, people can avoid mowing the lawns until the late evening or the weekend. When barbecuing, people can use an electric starter instead of charcoal lighter fluid. Conserving energy at home will lessen the demand on electric generating power plants.

People can also avoid using aerosol versions of household products, such as cleaners, hair spray or spray paint. Officials recommend using oil-base paints, solvents or varnishes during the evenings or weekends.

The children would cluster around her and listen intently.

terminal expansion project received \$6 million in funding from the legislature. The funding is for extra terminal space, ramp space, and gates. Dale said.

"It's very important now that we've got Pan Am coming," Dale said. "We'll have to wait and see if we actually have it [state funding]."

The terminal will be designed to handle overflow traffic from the international terminal. Inadequate terminal facilities have hampered the airport's efforts to add domestic flights.

Pan American Airlines established a line maintenance facility at the airport in March, and plans to begin regularly scheduled domestic service in June. This will provide the airport with its first regularly scheduled domestic service.

The airport handled about 1.1 million passengers last year.

The project to control the so-called blind mosquitoes or midges at the waterfront received \$250,000.

"This is an important state-wide issue," Dale said.

The city will use state funding to install attraction lights, begin a larvicide and adulticide program, and introduce species of fish that feed on midges into Lake Monroe.

As the weather warms up, the number of midges along the city's waterfront and downtown business district at times reaches emergency levels.

Representatives from Palatka and the Seminole County Expressway Authority wrote letters to state legislators in support of Sanford receiving funding to control the midges.

The Ritz Theatre renovations project received \$125,000 in state funding. Dale said he wished more funding had been provided.

The Ritz Community Theatre project had been recommended for state funding of \$278,551 by the Florida Department of State to complete the renovations.

The state funding is for termite control, masonry, wood and plastic concrete, electrical work, and thermal and moisture work.

By Sept. of this year, \$437,000 in Seminole County grant funding will be spent to restore the theater. Work is underway on the doors and windows, mechanical, electrical, and plumbing systems.

When the renovations are complete, about \$1 million will have been spent to restore the Ritz Theatre since Sept. 1996. A feasibility study in 1996 estimated that the renovated theater will attract 245,000 people per year.

The Ritz Theatre, previously known as the Milane Theater, was constructed in 1921. The state of the art theater had a 30-by-60 foot stage that is still intact.

Stadium renovations received \$180,000 in state funding.

City officials are trying to raise \$1.7 million for stadium renovations through public and private sources. The city has committed \$500,000 toward stadium renovations, and is requesting \$600,000 in Tourist Development Council funding.

The plans for the stadium call for 1,472 seats in the bleachers, with additional seating available along the foul lines. There would be 133 parking spaces.

City officials and members of the Central Florida Sports Commission say the renovated stadium could host baseball and softball tournaments, concerts, and other events.

Sanford officials are still waiting to receive word on funding for renovations to the city's seawall along Lake Monroe. A private consulting firm said the sea wall is in need of repair.

Pamper Mom with a classy meal on Mother's Day

I can't speak for other moms, but on Mother's Day what I want most is a break from motherhood. Not the hugs-and-kisses part of motherhood, which I'll take any day, but the pick-up-after-everyone-do-the-laundry-organize-the-backpack part of motherhood. Now, before I am accused of sexism, I will acknowledge that in thousands of households around the country, these tasks are shared (or performed entirely) by other members of the family. But in mine, those tasks fall to mostly to me. And I have the feeling I am not alone.

So on Mother's Day, the best present my family can give me is some time to myself, to take a walk or a hot bath, to hang out with a friend or read a book. They can also cook for me. They can also — and this is key — clean up. Now, I'm not fussy, but I do think my kids can do better than frozen pizza or macaroni-and-cheese from a box when it comes to Mother's Day. I want real food, food that is delicious and satisfying and — most of all — not cooked by me.

So here's a menu I will post on our refrigerator with a large sign that says "HINT." It is simple enough for children — or noncooking adults — to make, and yummy enough for me to enjoy. Best of all, this meal is designed with the whole family's tastes in mind: baked chicken, carrot salad, baked potatoes and shortbread. The recipes are basic, and they're my own, with the exception of the carrot and parsley salad, which comes from the sophisticated and charming children's cookbook "Fanny at Chez Panisse."

CLASSIC SHORTBREAD

1 cup unsalted butter, at room temperature (soft but not runny)
2 cups sifted all-purpose flour (sift before measuring)
1/2 cup sifted confectioners' sugar (sift before measuring)
1/4 teaspoon salt

Preheat the oven to 325 degrees. With an electric mixer, beat the butter in a large bowl until creamy. Mix the flour, sugar and salt together in a bowl. Add this in large spoonfuls to the butter, mixing as you add. When it is all very well-mixed,

press the dough with your hands into a round cake pan that is 8 or 9 inches in diameter. Smooth the top with a rubber spatula. Prick the dough with a fork about every half-inch. If you like, press the lines of a fork around the rim of the dough to make it look like store-bought shortbread. Cut the shortbread into 12 wedges.

Bake for 20 to 30 minutes. It is done when it is just beginning to turn a little bit golden. Re-cut the wedges while the shortbread is warm. Then allow the whole pan to cool on a rack.

Serve the shortbread plain or with fruit salad. Yield: 12 pieces of shortbread.

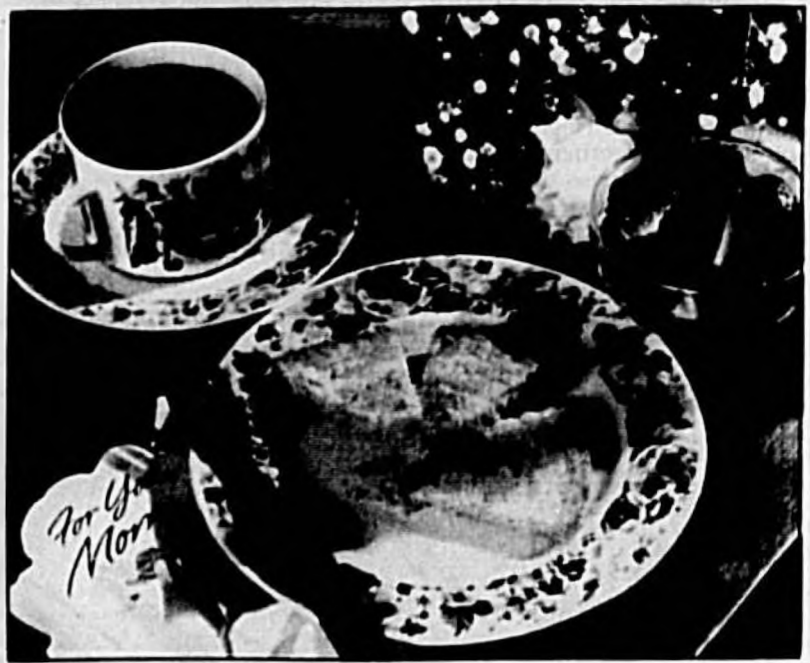

CRUNCHY BAKED CHICKEN

vegetable oil for pan
1 chicken (about 3 pounds), cut up into 6 pieces
2 eggs
1/2 cup corn flake crumbs (See note)
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon garlic powder (optional)
1/4 teaspoon black pepper
2 tablespoons sesame seeds (optional)
2 tablespoons butter

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Lightly oil a 9-by-13-inch baking dish. Set it aside.

Rinse the chicken pieces under cold running water. Put them in a colander to drain.

Crack the eggs into a shallow bowl, and mix them up with a fork.

On a plate or a piece of waxed paper, stir together the corn-flake crumbs, salt, garlic powder, pepper and sesame seeds. (If you or Mom hate garlic or sesame seeds, you can leave these out.)

Dip each chicken piece in the egg mixture, then roll it in the crumb mixture. Put it in the oiled pan. Repeat for each piece of chicken. Cut the butter up into small pieces and distribute the pieces over the chicken.

Put the pan in the oven. Right away, reduce the heat to 375 degrees. Bake for half an hour. Using tongs or a metal spatula turn the chicken pieces over. Bake at least 30 minutes longer — the chicken should be brown and crispy.

Transfer the chicken to a platter and

serve. Note: You can buy corn-flake crumbs in a box at the grocery store, or make your own by putting corn flakes into a plastic bag and mashing them with a rolling pin. Yield: 4 to 6 servings.

BAKED POTATOES

4 to 6 large baking potatoes, or one for each person (buy organic potatoes if you like to eat the skin)

oil

garlic powder (optional)

Preheat the oven to at least 350 degrees. (You can cook these while the chicken is cooking, at 375 degrees.)

Scrub the potatoes under cold running water. Dry them with a clean dish towel. Stab each potato with a knife (this will keep the potato from exploding). Rub each potato with a little bit of oil, then sprinkle each with salt and garlic powder (if you like garlic). Put them right on the oven rack and bake them for 45 minutes to 1 hour, or until you can stick a fork in them easily. Remove them from the oven

and keep in a warm place (the stove top is good) until serving. Yield: 4 to 6 servings.

Hint: Try to time the cooking of the potatoes so that they'll be done when the chicken is done. Put them in about 15 minutes after the chicken starts cooking.

CARROT AND PARSLEY SALAD

6 large carrots (about 1 pound total)
one bunch parsley
1 clove of garlic
4 teaspoons red-wine vinegar
4 tablespoons light olive oil or vegetable oil
salt to taste

Peel and wash the carrots. Use a grater to grate them into fine threads. Pick off the parsley leaves. Throw away the stems. Put the leaves in a colander and wash them under cold running water. Set them aside to drain. When they are well-drained, chop them.

Peel the garlic. Hold a fork so that it is standing on its pointy ends in the salad bowl. Rub the garlic piece back and forth against the lines of the fork, and it will make a juicy little puree of the garlic. Then add the vinegar and the oil to the bowl and mix it together.

Stir in the carrots and parsley. Season it with salt, and mix very well. Yield: 4 to 6 servings.



said. "That's positive thinking. This can be a real asset to the city. It can help bring people together. People need to be together."

Residents of communities participating in the program would work in committees to develop solutions to their problems.

"We need to bring all areas of Sanford together," Lenora Mobley, a business owner and retired educator, said. "In unity there is strength." The state's Office of Urban

Opportunity will manage \$5.2 million for Front Porch Florida incentive programs. It will serve as a "civic switchboard" to connect communities in the program with federal and state funding, other agencies and departments, private resources, and non-profit agencies.

The state will target \$1.6 million in economic development grants to communities in the program.

The state's urban brownfields program will be expanded by \$1 million to en-

courage cleanup and development of partially contaminated properties.

A job bonus program will provide \$700,000 to communities in the program for a tax refund program to enhance job creation incentives.

There will be \$100,000 in support mentoring programs.

A low income rental housing tax credit program will include \$400,000 to develop a state program to provide a corporate income tax credit for private developers who

build or rehabilitate low income rental housing.

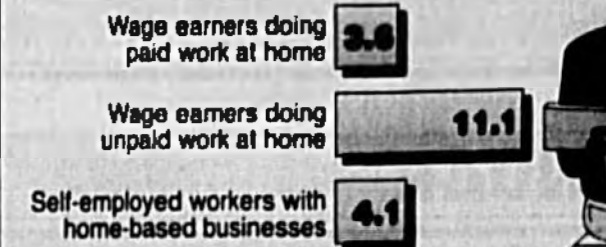
There will be \$300,000 in funding for an urban home-steading program.

The next meeting for the program will be May 25 at 5:30 p.m. at the Sanford/Seminole County Chamber of Commerce.

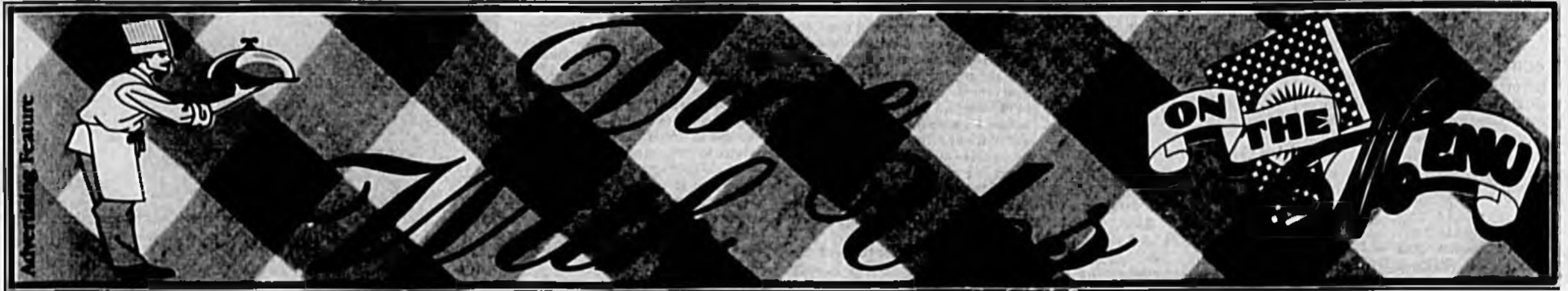

Seminole blanks Gateway; Winter Springs pulls off upset

SANFORD - Opportunistic. That would best describe the 3-0 victory the Seminole High School baseball team posted in the Regional Quarterfinals over Gateway Tuesday night at Alumni Field.

The Fighting Seminoles scored a run on a throwing error, a dropped throw and a stolen base and then used excellent pitching and defense to improve to 28-7 on the season and earn a home game Friday night in the Regional Semifinals.

Seminole head coach Mike Powers went with experience on the mound in this game, turning to four-year varsity veteran Chas Lytle.

And the senior, who did not pitch at all in the district tournament last week, responded in fine fashion, striking out six and walking only one over six-plus innings to get his fifth win against three defeats.

"Chas pitched a very nice game," said Powers. "We worked hard on our baserunning and it paid off tonight."

Lytle did give up seven hits, one in each inning, but only allowed one person to reach third base.

Lytle found himself in a little trouble to start the seventh inning as a wild pitch on strike three allowed one runner to reach and the next Panthers batter singled with no one out.

Powers went to closer Jeremy Meyers, who came on to strike out the first batter he faced and then got a line drive double play to end the game. The save was the sixth of the season for the hard-throwing junior.

The Tribe defense was also strong, turning three double plays, and Paulo Silva made a running catch in deep center field to save another run.

Seminole had an opportunity to break the

game open early against Gateway ace Joe Torres (5-6), a hard-throwing lefthander.

Ricardo Montalvo led off the Seminole first with a single and Silva walked. But the Gateway third baseman made a good stab on a shot down the leftfield line by Lytle to retire Montalvo and Mike Robinson hit a liner that the shortstop caught and turned into an inning-ending double play.

In the second inning, Angelo Petracca led off with a single, his eighth hit in 10 at bats in the post-season, and moved to second on a wild pitch. On the next pitch, the junior took off for third and came on in to score when the throw eluded the Panthers third baseman.

Jacob Davis followed with a single and Hal Kronenberg drew a walk. After a force out for the first out of the inning, Anthony DiFonso walked to load the bases.

Torres almost got out of the jam, striking out the next batter and getting Silva to hit a slow roller to second base. But the flip to second was dropped by the Gateway shortstop and Davis scored the second run of the game.

Holmes, Alvarez ignite Lion rally

OVIDO - Justin Holmes' two-run double and Javier Alvarez's three-run double highlighted an eight-run rally in the second inning that helped the Oviedo Lions defeat the Apopka Blue Darters 12-6 in a Class 6A baseball regional quarterfinal Tuesday night at Mikler Field.

Another hit and another error later in the inning put the Blue Darts up 4-0.

While Lubrano (who had two no-hitters, four shutouts, and nine complete games to his credit going into Tuesday night) never really did find his rhythm, he pitched well enough to protect the lead that his teammates gave up in the bottom of the second inning.

In fact, Lubrano drove in the go-ahead run himself when he singled home Holmes in the bottom of the second inning to break the 4-4 tie. After taking second on the throw to the plate, Lubrano scored the Lions' sixth run on Larry Grayson's single.

Alvarez's bases-loaded triple completed the rally.

The Lions scored two more runs in the third and another in the fourth to construct a

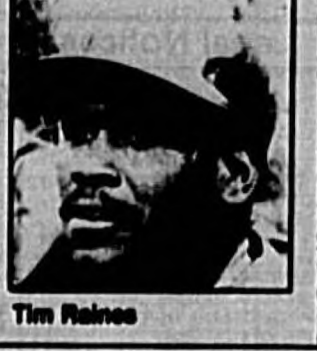

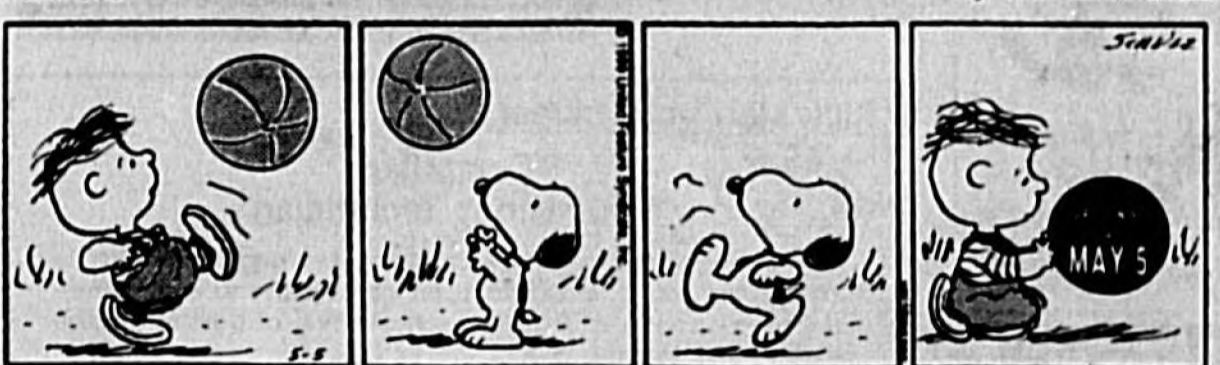

WIN AT BRIDGE

Do you see it?

Today's deal occurred during the Niklas Data Championship, which was held in Stockholm, Sweden, February 18-21. Swedish internationals Tommy Gullberg and Lars Andersson won this pairs event by a wide margin. They pocketed about \$1,600 each.

In this deal, the winners did well against four hearts. However, the interesting question is this: Can East-West defeat four spades?

West's three diamonds was a weak jump overall, showing in principle about 6-10 high-card points and a decent six-card suit. With a seventh card, one would sometimes bid four diamonds, but that has the disadvantage of taking the auction past three no-trump.

Andersson cashed his top diamonds, Gullberg discarding an en-

couraging club on the second round. There was a natural reaction for West to continue with the diamond jack, hoping his partner could overruff the dummy. But Andersson trusted his partner, switching to the club jack. Now, with the 5-0 trump split, declarer ran out of control, finishing two down. (Yes, leading the diamond jack at trick three defeats the contract, but by only one trick.)

It takes some defense to beat the better four spades. (Do you think South should have overlooked his heart suit with such strong spades? It looks right to do so, though I suppose North could be void in spades and have five-plus hearts.) West starts with two top diamonds, but East must ruff the second to switch to a heart, ruffed by West. Then the diamond jack forces dummy to ruff, leaving declarer unable to draw trumps and get back to the dummy to take the heart finesse.

ASK DR. GOTT

What's so funny about the humerus?

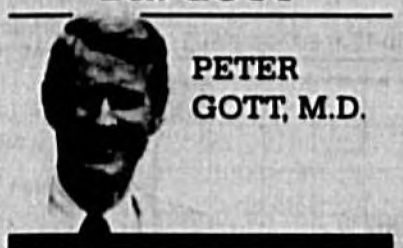
DEAR DR. GOTT: What is the "funny bone" in the elbow, and why does it hurt so much when I bump it?

DEAR READER: This is a classic case of miscommunication. The answer to your question may surprise you.

The bone of the upper arm is the humerus, not to be confused with the rib-tickling adjective "humorous." At the elbow, there is a groove in the humerus through which a major nerve to the lower arm (the ulnar nerve) travels. At this point, the ulnar nerve is relatively exposed. Its only protection is skin and sparse subcutaneous tissue. Consequently, a blow to this part of the elbow often affects the nerve, which is then pressed against the bony groove, leading to pain and tingling.

I suppose — but I am guessing now — that, when asked, old-time doctors would respond that such symptoms were caused by a blow to the humerus bone. In speech, this could easily be interpreted as "funny bone"; hence, the phrase entered the vernacular. In actual fact, there is no "funny bone." The trauma involves the ulnar nerve,

but — like so many things in life — the term "funny bone" became popular because it is so unforgettable.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm too embarrassed to bring my problem to my doctor's attention. For the past few months, I have noticed increasingly coarse hair growth on my breasts, especially around the nipple areas. Is this normal for a woman of 33?

DEAR READER: Breast hair may develop in women as they age. A few strands can easily be plucked, but if you are experiencing significant new hair growth — particularly between the breasts — I urge you to see a doctor who specializes in endocrine (hormonal) problems. I can understand

your reluctance to discuss this with a male doctor, so find a female physician with whom you will be more comfortable.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 37-year-old mother of four children. For the past two years, I've become increasingly forgetful and have great difficulty recalling everyday objects. For example, in my mind I see a familiar refrigerator but I can't remember what it is called. Is this normal for my age? How can I find out what the problem is?

DEAR READER: Although all of us tend to become somewhat forgetful as we age, you describe a more accelerated and sinister process that, in my view, is far from normal. You should be examined by a neurologist. In addition to a complete examination of your nervous system, I suspect that you will need extensive testing to identify the cause of your poor recall. Once a diagnosis is made, treatment can be addressed.
