WASHINGTON (AP) — Security and Air Force domestic intelligence gathering duties similar to those of the Army and Navy are being used on many civilians, according to a report by the Senate Intelligence Committee. The report, which is the first to name specific military units involved in the gathering of information on the activities of state and local officials, political contributors, newspaper reporters, lawyers and church figures.

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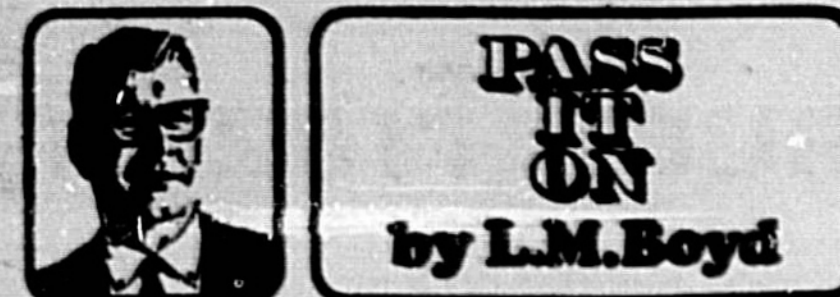

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI) — Howard Hughes and his top Nevada executive, Robert A. McGovern Will Soon Announce Plans On Running

By WALTER R. MEARS and CARL F. LEIBSDORF AP Political Writers WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. George McGovern, impelled by what he calls the frustration of ineffectiveness in the Senate, will soon become the first man to declare for the presidency in 1972.

But there may be political frustration ahead as McGovern begins an open campaign to overcome the lead he concedes Sen. Edmund S. Muskie holds over a crowded field of Democratic prospects.

When the South Dakota senator makes the official declaration next month, it will be the first time in more than a year he has waged an obvious if unannounced drive for the 1972 nomination.

"I've been working for over a year now, trying to see whether there was a basis for a candidacy," McGovern said in an interview. "I'm pretty well convinced there is."

That indication can hardly be learning. But McGovern says, once he has the nomination, he will name a nationwide cadre to rally to him. "What I'm told is that I'm serious about running, they'll be serious about supporting me."

He goes on: "My chances of getting the nomination depend on working on it over a long period of time. I don't think anyone is going to get it handed to him this time."

Compared to his most formidable prospective rivals—Muskie, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, Hubert H. Humphrey—McGovern is little known, and he concedes he has an educational job in front of him to make his views known to the country.

And because of his small recognition factor, the presidential primaries loom particularly important to McGovern. He needs a strong showing to prove he can win, and to attract support from the professional Democrats, now lining up with Muskie.

"I'm going into a number of primaries, but I haven't decided which ones," McGovern says. "If you can't do well in a number of primaries, you can't do well in the fall."

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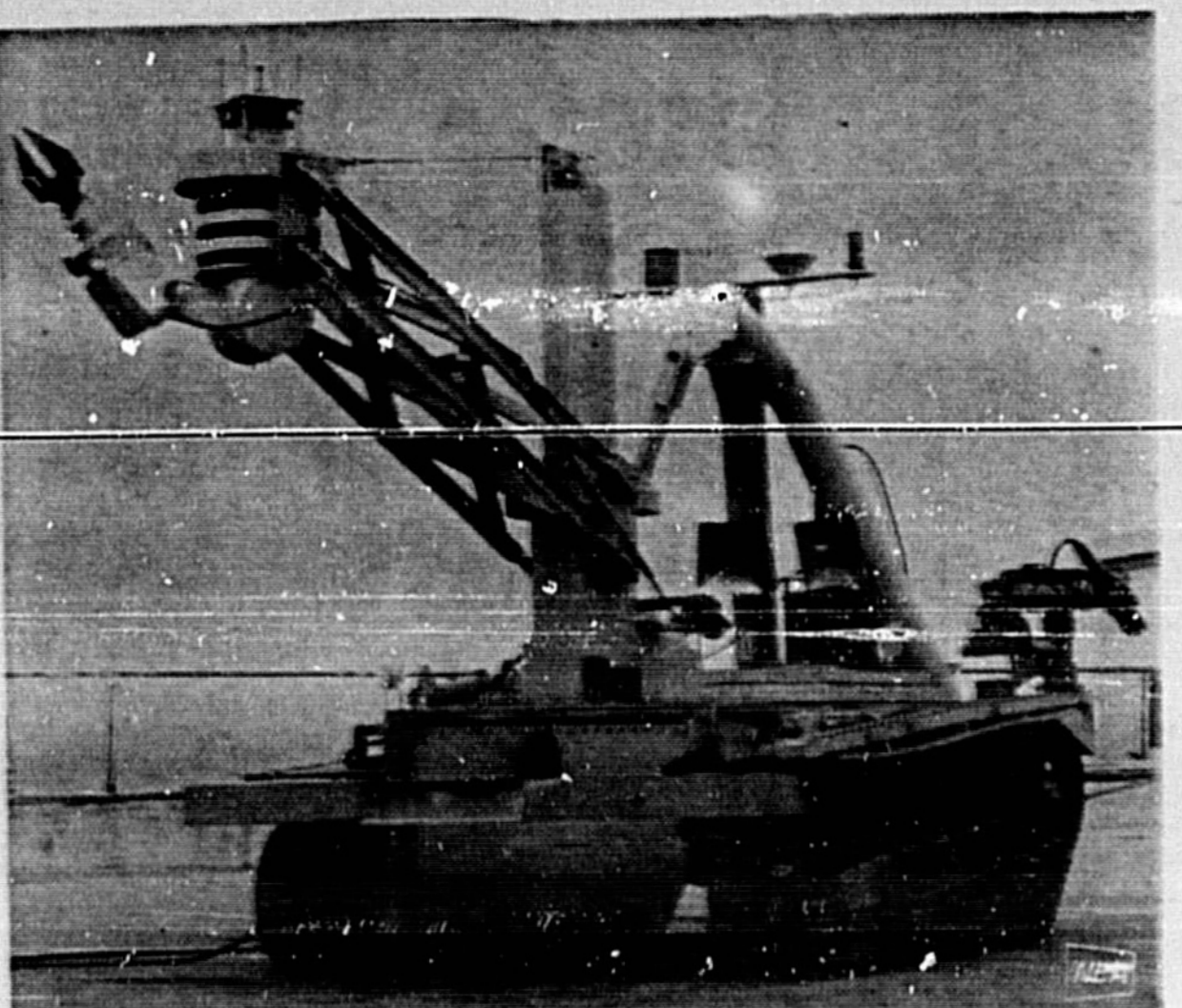

'Freedom Of The Press' Confusion Is Continuing

"I had always understood," observed Richard S. Salant, president of CBS News, "the First Amendment was designed not only to keep government from PROHIBITING speech or writings, but at least equally, historically, our forefathers adopted the First Amendment to keep the government from specifying what was REQUIRED to be said, or written, or published."

This important fact is being forgotten in the growing intellectual confusion over what constitutes "freedom of the press."

Almost one year after Vice President Spiro Agnew's attack on the press in a Nov. 15, 1969, Des Moines, Iowa, speech, a muddled perspective remains over the meaning of freedom for the media.

A thoughtful talk by Salant before the Tennessee Association of Broadcasters on Oct. 16 was a speech that Agnew should have delivered, but didn't.

Salant is the first broadcasting executive of stature to publicly identify the principal problem facing the American broadcasting industry. Acknowledging that Agnew did not create the problems confronting electronic journalism, Salant observed:

"It is a towering paradox that at a time when surveys tell us people rely so heavily on electronic journalism for their news, our freedom to present that news is most severely under attack. . . . The time to defend liberty is while we still have it."

As Salant sees it, government licensing of broadcasting is at the bottom of the problem.

"We must try to achieve," he notes, "the extraordinary mental feat of putting out of our minds the presence of that sword of Damocles called licensing, which hangs over all our heads."

Here in New York, the Federal Communications Commission is holding license hearings to determine whether the New York Daily News should be denied a license to operate WPIX-TV. The basis of hearings rests on whether the station "distorted the news," which raises the ominous question of whether an agency of government should be in the business of setting itself up as a judge of what is or is not "distorted news." Always On The Move

SINGAPORE (AP) — Singapore's "biggest" supermarket moves every night. It has 80 locations, and each is invisible by day.

But that's hardly strange in a city where buildings are constantly changing into a dining room table if you leave it too long in a parking lot.

The reason for these curious characteristics is Singapore's corps of hawkers—gherwal merchants who sell everything from stolen dentures to fried noodles in the streets, alleys and empty spaces of this crowded city.

The elite corps of 1,000 runs the "Pasar Malam (Night Market)," a rambling department store that is permitted to set up in several of 60 locations each night.

Merchandise is varied, from a better mousetrap to piles of "Darky Toothpaste," or lingerie.

Best of all is Wednesday, when the Night Market can operate near Orchard Road, the golden strip of tourists and rich foreigners. It's an automatic three-to-one bonus in cases like this recent one:

Hawker: "That is \$5 (meaning Singapore dollars, or \$3 U.S. currency)."
Tourist: "You mean U.S. dollars?"
Hawker: "Es . . . um, sure."
Now long portable neon lights blaze along the whole Night Market, now, replacing the old gas lanterns used since the market started a decade ago. It's spotlessly clean, with trash bins everywhere.
