Williams Offer Reported

Pierce Turns Down Interim County Post

Seminole County Commissioners planned to offer *Asst. County Atty. Robert Pierce the attorney's position for a six-month interim period, a source said today. But Pierce turned down the job.

Pierce met last Friday with Commission Chairman Dick Williams, who, it is reported, offered Pierce the position for a minimum of six-months. County commissioners, the source said, were to officially offer Pierce the position at Tuesday's meeting. But Pierce called Williams today and declined the offer.

Williams reportedly assured Pierce at least four county commissioners favored offering him the

Pierce confirmed today he and Williams "talked about" the possibility of Pierce staying on as county attorney until the new in-house legal staff is a reality. Last week, County Atty. Tom Freeman said Pierce had resigned from the Freeman law firm and because of that Freeman asked the county to find a new county attorney by Dec. 10. "I thought about it," Pierce said this morning.

"But I don't think it's what I want." Pierce said he resigned because of the political hassles, to save his sanity — and for his family. "From the beginning this has been a crazy ex- County perience," the 31-year-old attorney declared.



State Warns Eagle

"warning notice" to Eagle Utilities in Casselberry, state officials confirmed today. Len Kozlof, an enforcement chief in the state's Department of Environmental Regulations, said the utility was cited for

The Seminole Court Switchover: Only Minor Hangups

Herald Staff Writer The phase-out of municipal courts in south Seminole cities is scheduled for Jan. 3, 1977, and officials report only minor hang-ups in the planned switch of traffic and city ordinance cases to county court.

Chief County Court Judge Wallace Hall has issued an administrative order abolishing the city courts on Jan. 3, as required by judicial revision approved by state voters

The city of Sanford abolished its municipal court following the revision so that Seminole could have a second county court judge

Attorney Alan Dickey was elected last month to fill a new third county judgeship. He takes office in January. Judge Hall has declared a moratorium on municipal courts activity for the last two weeks of December and there will be no regularly scheduled trials, hearings or

arraignments in city courts after Dec. 17. Starting Jan. 4, county courts judges will sit in three south Seminole cities for traffic arraignments. The schedule calls for county court sessions every Tuesday at 5 p.m. at Casselberry for cases of Casselberry

and Winter Springs police Arraignments will be held every Thursday at 5 p.m. at Altamonte Springs on cases made by Altamonte Springs and Longwood police.

Oviedo police department cases will be arraigned the second and fourth Mondays of each month at Oviedo at 5 p.m., according to the administrative order. All traffic cases requiring an appearance in court of the defendant, mandatory civil infractions, criminal traffic

Hearings on traffic infractions will be scheduled for Monday, Tuesday or Thursday afternoons in the same

and license violations will be returnable on the above

location where traffic arraignments are to be held. Arraignments on non-traffic city ordinance violations will be held every Friday at 9 a.m. in Courtroom D, Rand

The administrative order allows for persons arrested by police on city ordinance violations, including criminal traffic charges, to be held in municipal jails or tran-

sferred to the county jail All municipalities have been directed to file a certified copy of their municipal ordinances with the Clerk of Circuit Court for Seminole County so that the county court may take judicial notice of the ordinances. The administrative order outlining the city courts

phase-out also directs the Circuit Clerk to pick up daily (except weekends and holidays) copies of traffic tickets issued by city police officers.

Circuit Clerk Arthur Beckwith Jr. said that he is seeking

a meeting with Judge Hall on this point since the clerk's office isn't equipped to pick up the tickets. "I'm sure we can work this out with some discussion," Mall, Sanford. Trials of these cases will be scheduled as Beckwith said. "My office has no autos, no couriers and no

budget for them.' Beckwith said the ticket pickup job could be an all-day job for one person.

Supreme Court Delays Texas Execution

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Supreme Court today postponed the execution of a Texas murderer who did not want his scheduled did not wish any federal appeal of any sort whatsoever. Friday death in the electric chair delayed. The high court delayed indefinitely the execution of Robert Excell White, a 30-year-old drifter from Waco, Tex., who says he

It was the second time in four days that the Supreme Court had delayed the execution of a prisoner who wanted to die. On Friday, the justices postponed the firing squad execution of Utah murderer Gary Mark Gilmore, who had convinced state officials to let

The court voted 8 to 1 to tell Texas officials to postpone White's execution pending an appeal by his attorney. Justice William H. Rehnquist voted to deny the execution postponement. White's attorney, J.E. Abernathy, had asked the court for time

to challenge the state's death penalty, the indictment that charged White with murder and the method of jury selection used White does not want to appeal, however. In a Nov. 23 letter

the Supreme Court, White said, "Mr. Abernathy is acting against

my express instructions and desires. I explicitly told him that "I am mentally prepared to accept the judgment of sentence imposed upon me," said White, a death row prisoner at Huntsville, Tex., for the past two years. "Any delay now will only in-

flict needless mental hardship on me." Gilmore was to have died at sunrise today, and would have become the first criminal executed in the United States since 1967. His death was stayed at the request of his mother, Bessie Gilmore of Milwaukie, Cre.

Preparation of an appeal in White's case and its consideration by the court could take several months. White was convicted of murdering a 73-year-old grocery store proprietor in a 1974 holdup. Two teenage customers also were





Energy-Saver, Bill Reducer Draws Federal Attention

BOCA RATON (AP) - A Gold Coast condominium using a computer to monitor energy consumption has reduced tenants' electric bills by 42 per cent and has caught the attention of federal energy officials.

The computer system was developed by engineer Rod Tesche, resident manager of the 68-unit high rise. It can shut off air conditioning in each apartment, regulate lighting and temperature levels in public corridors and turn pump motors on and off in sequence for cheaper operation.

It can even tell building engineers other ways to reduce the building's power con-



The Fourth of July hoopla and fireworks were not, after all, the end of America's Bicentennial observance, but the beginning

As noted by Charles L. Andes, chairman of the Franklin Mint Corp., the birthday party of 1976 is only the start of the Bicentennial era. In an address in October to the Pennsylvania Sons of the Revolution, he reminded the nation that the story of the Republic's origin will be told and retold for another 13 years through the 200th anniversary of the ratification of the Constitution.

And of more importance, Andes insisted, is the rare opportunity to use the history lesson in preparing the United States for the next century. "We can choose our destiny," he said.

Americans first identified their goals of selfgovernment and independence 200 years ago. They then spent five years in the battle for freedom and another eight years in devising a durable system of government embracing the principles they had

They had the wisdom and endurance to keep attacking their problems until they found the right answers.

Can we do less today? Our problems are as demanding as we peek into the third century of independence.



ORLANDO - For the third straight year, Florida has sold more frozen concentrated orange juice than it packed, slashing inventory in state warehouses to less than 1412 weeks supply of its Cinderella product, United Growers said today.

Sales of 192.2 million gallons outstripped 1975-76 season pack by approximately six million gallons according to Florida Canner Association figures released Dec. 2 at Winter Haven.

Overselling the pack has occurred six times in the last seven seasons, according to Gen. Mgr. Wilson McGee. Such a marketing policy that seems directed to giving our product away at ruinous prices to growers instead of saving something back for the lean years that are always ahead needs urgent review," said McGee

He again urged industry adopt a voluntary plan to build in ventory to a minimum 80-million gallon annual carryover in ventory at the end of each pack year, traditionally the last full week in November.

"At current usage rates that would give us a 211/2 week supply reserve. California processors carryover a year's supply. Department of Citrus Economic Research reports show we can achieve this 80 million gallon carryover simply by maintaining a \$2.00 or better wholesale price for a dozen 6-oz. can equivalents instead of giving product away on allowances from fictitious card prices," McGee said.

Since the 1970-71 pack year, according to FCA figures some of which have been "adjusted" by the FCA and industry, FCOJ sales outstripped pack in all except the 1972-73 year when beginning inventory was inflated by a record 10.8 million gallons of foreign and domestic imported juice. Past season saw 6.59 million gallons imported, mostly Brazilian.

"As long as this Brazilian import comes in, so long will price and grower returns continue to be depressed, an 80-million gallon reserve might well close the door on this imported, cheaply produced juice."

\$90,000 Grant Marked For Midway Projects

A \$90,000 grant award for a drainage project in Midway, membership on an interim committee designed to ultimately construct a regional sewer facility for Sanford, Lake Mary and the county and \$3,000 needed to halt sewage overflow into homes near a lift station in South Seminole were on the agenda today of the Seminole County Commission. Commissioners awarded a contract to Schweizer Associates, Inc. to begin work on the Midway paving and drainage project. The amount of the contract

award was \$7,000. County planner Bill Kercher said the county has \$32,000 budgeted for drainage of a six-acre site in Midway - a predominately black area east of Sanford. Kercher said engineering of the drainage. project will require about three months.

Also included in a \$90,000 grant is about \$58,000 to pave broken substandard roads in the Midway

Kercher said Midway is a "blighted" area. He said when the water rises, septic tanks overflow and send effluent to the top. The effluent, Kercher said, represents a health hazard and is a breeding ground for mosquitoes, which sometimes transmit

Kercher said the paving portion of the grant is scheduled to begin sometime next year. He said dirt roads to be paved have not yet been decided upon. Commissioners were also informed by executive assistant Roger Neiswender that an interim Committee was to propose inter-local agreement for establishment of a regional sewer facility which has

been agreed upon. A goal of the committee, Neiswender said, is to draw up contracts, recommend funding formulas and assist the cities of Lake Mary and Sanford and Seminole County as they attempt to win federal funds for construction of the multi-million dollar

The executive assistant said plans are to apply for federal funds by March of next year, thus the


commission needs to approve the make-up of the

Neiswender said the committee will consist of two Commerce check over one of the several "scenic members each from three entities, plus three adroute" signs placed along Sanford roadways. The ditional members to be selected at large by the signs have been installed by the city's park and initial six members who represent Sanford, Lake

Commissioners said they will hold a work session prior to next Tuesday's meeting to determine whether or not they approve the makeup and intent of the interim committee. Neiswender said he needs direction before the next regional facility meeting, scheduled on Dec. 15.

County commissioners today also instructed the 5-A Office of Management Analysis and Evaluation 1-B (OMAE) to find \$3,000 to repair a lift station in the Indian Hills area. The lift station according to utility manager Craig Batterson, malfunctions and causes sewage to flow into homes of nearby residents. Batterson said about \$3,000 is required to repair

> County officials said about three major cleaning bills were paid after homes near the lift stations were inundated from sewage after a malfunction.
