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Norway Faces Crisis As Nazis Execute 2

Situation Said Acute In Several Cities Of Occupied Area; Workers Sentenced

R. A. F. Attacks Northern Italy

Russians Claim New Advances On Central Battlefield

BERLIN, Sept. 11.—(AP)—German planes observed Leningrad with pamphlets urging civilians not to defend the city, and the Germans said the Russians must decide whether Leningrad will be taken as a fairly intact city or as a heap of debris.

German-occupied Norway, seething against Nazi rule, faced a crisis today as Nazi authorities clamped down with the first firing-squad executions there and the state of civil siege which was proclaimed in Oslo, the capital, was expected to be extended to other areas.

German troops ringed Oslo following the execution last night of two Norwegian labor leaders. Other alleged leaders were sentenced by military courts to terms ranging from 10 years to life imprisonment.

In the war in the air, R. A. F. bombers rained fire on Italian cities for the first time since last winter.

On the Russo-German front, Soviet military dispatches reported that the Red Army had scored new advances as deep as 12 miles on the central front, where the head-long Russian counter-offensive had driven three wedges into the German lines.

The Red Army around Leningrad was shooting from all barrels last night and the Germans backed down measurably from their earlier claims that the city was imminently doomed.

The Germans suspected they might not try to overrun Leningrad after all, but probably would attempt instead to reduce it slowly by gunfire and starvation.

It was admitted by German informants, in effect, that any frontal assault on the city would, under present circumstances, amount to a suicide.

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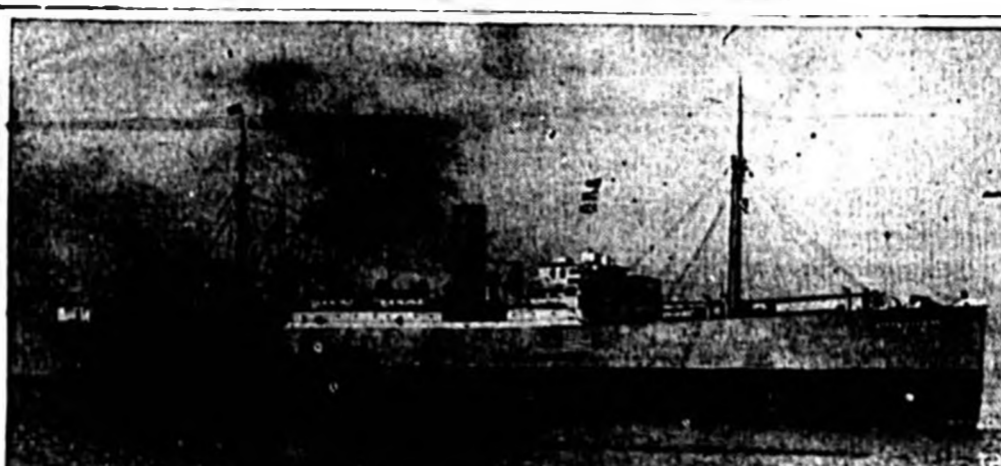
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Type Of Freighter Sunk In Red Sea

Substantial Progress

That the present form of government in Sanford and the system of electing City Commissioners has on the whole resulted in giving Sanford an efficient and business-like administration is shown by the fact that during the past five years the bonded debt of this city has been reduced from \$5,920,000 to \$5,443,000 without any corresponding increase in taxation.

A statement recently released at the City Hall also shows that the accrued interest on bonds in 1935 was over half a million dollars and today not one cent is owed for this purpose. Then there were also nearly two million dollars worth of bonds in default. Today there are none. As a result of the refunding operation, interest requirements for City bonds have been reduced from \$351,372.50 annually to \$86,260.

Although Sanford has not enjoyed the spectacular building boom which has marked some Florida cities, there has been a sound and steady growth in new construction. During the five year period ending Sept. 1, 1941 some \$41,381 of new construction was begun in Sanford. This compares rather favorably with the \$305,978 during the previous five year period. Undoubtedly there would have been more construction here if there had been a better market for our farm products in the North.

One of the outstanding municipal improvements of the last few years has been the development of Fort Mellon Park which, as its trees, shrubs, and flowers continue their growth, is coming more and more to be recognized as one of the principal assets of this city from a tourist point of view. The City has also taken over direct maintenance of the golf course, re-opening the back nine holes, remodeling the club house and constructing a pro-shop and locker room.

Of course the biggest development in Sanford in recent years has been the new airport which at a cost to the local taxpayers of only \$26,500 will result in an expenditure of federal funds of some \$410,000 by the time it is finished. And it is safe to assume, we believe, that the federal government is not spending that amount of money on an airport in Sanford if it did not intend to use it. There is no doubt that it will be of tremendous benefit to Sanford in the years to come.

There have been many other projects which the City has sponsored and improvements in its various departments which have been made, such as the installation of the two-way Police Radio Call System, which makes burglary so hazardous in Sanford today, the improvements at the Municipal Athletic Field and the construction of a diamond ball field equipped with lights for night playing.

All these things cost money and call for the full cooperation and influence of all civic leaders. The fact that they have been gotten without an exorbitant increase in taxes or charges of special favors is evidence of the high quality of membership on the City Commission and the proper functioning of a rotating system which encourages men of character to run for office and reduces to a minimum the number supply.

William Henry Stevens, noted British rubber technologist, now in the United States to study American methods of application of various types of synthetic rubbers, particularly in aircraft construction, is of the opinion that there will be no critical shortage of natural rubber in this country or Great Britain for military construction.

The rubber expert says that recent evidence from captured German war equipment indicates that the Nazis are getting virtually no natural rubber, and have been driven to the use of synthetic and reclaimed rubber entirely. Some of the German airplane and tank parts which were formerly made of rubber are being replaced by materials made from plastic bonded wood fibre, of which Germany has a good supply.

Most of the German synthetic rubber is of the butadiene type, for which petroleum is one of the best raw materials. Thus it can be seen that the Nazi dependence on oil goes beyond fuel and lubrication, and there are even more vital reasons why the Germans are interested in the oil fields of the Near East.—St. Augustine Record.

was not willing to contemplate it.

Berlin acknowledged that such harden positions as the Nazis had been able to occupy were down with the waiting death hidden in thousands of Russian and mines. In one instance, at the town of Schellensburg, 21 miles to the east, the Germans said that evacuated Russian homes, public buildings and even the very hospital beds had been incinerated.

German military reports told of dive bombing attacks which inflicted a number of Soviet anti-aircraft and artillery positions about Leningrad, cleared away field fortifications and caused extensive damage at the city's strategic works.

There were some indications, however, that the northwestern Soviet position had been improved in considerable part by the continuing Red counter-offensive along the central front.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—(AP)—There's quite a "brawl" brewing here over the old subject of butter versus margarine.

It's no brawl. The current fracas dates from Spring, when a committee on food and nutrition met to devise new methods for feeding America better with the hope of making the citizens stronger. The program so far as Washington is concerned.

The committee issued, among other things, a sample day's diet which would furnish the necessary vitamins and minerals, and still would cost only 32 cents for the three meals. The menus—all three of them—mention margarine, but not butter.

That prompted the Consumers'

Council of the Department of Agriculture to arrange one of its weekly radio programs for a discussion of margarine.

One of the characters on the program said: "Many people are finding out they can save quite a bit of money by using margarine instead of butter. It's quite a lot cheaper."

"Both butter and margarine are chiefly fat. By law or government rules, both must be at least 80 percent fat. Butter is made from the fat from cream. And margarine, according to new standards just set up, can be made from animal fat or oil, or vegetable fat or oil, or a combination."

"There's little to choose between the various kinds of pure

Senator Says Movies Are 'Monopolistic'

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Senator Clark (D., Mo.) contended in testimony before a Senate sub-committee Wednesday that the motion picture industry was a "monopoly controlled by a half dozen men" who were determined to "plunge this nation into war."

The Missouri senator made the assertion in what he called moving picture propaganda "to arouse their emotions and make them clamor for war."

Clark's testimony drew from Wendell Willkie, 1940 Republican presidential nominee and counsel for the film industry, an assertion that the Missouri senator had failed to produce any evidence of propaganda and was seeking to "prejudice the public with his monopoly charge."

fat. They are all, more or less, equally digestible, and equally rich in fuel value."

That brought Rep. August H. Andresen of Minnesota to his feet on the House floor. His state, in 1940, earned \$68,000,000 from butter.

Andresen spoke of the program as "government sponsored propaganda" and called it "virtually a conspiracy against the farmer."

He said the radio performers did their level best to put over the idea that oleomargarine, under the new formula promulgated by the food and drug administration, was equal if not superior to butter in food value, and added that "they boldly urged consumers to buy oleo instead of butter."

Andresen asserted that in the past decade he has seen much of "the subversive work of leavender lawyers, pink economists, and naive home economic ladies."

He demanded an investigation, and further, he wanted the Department of Agriculture to stop its employes from "scuttling of American dairy farmers."

Rep. W. R. Page of Texas arose to remind his fellow members that there is another set of American farmers quite interested in the popularity of margarine—the men who supply the fats and oils, such as live-stock men and soy-bean growers.

So the fat is in the fire, quite literally. A group of retailers are rattling around Washington asking that a tax on margarine be removed.

Don't be surprised if that margarine tax argument turns into a serious defense matter. That's the way these Washington brawls develop.

If you were disappointed last Spring in not being able to get pansy plants in separate colors, you will want to look ahead this year and grow your own or put in an advance order with your nurseryman now. If you plan to grow your own, the first step is to order the very best grade of seed obtainable. Then, too, the seed are so small that a few seeds will yield enough plants for the average garden.

Seeds should be started in a well drained flat. A convenient size for easy handling is 12x15x3.

Norway Faces Crisis As Nazis Execute 2

Situation Said Acute In Several Cities Of Occupied Area; Workers Sentenced

R. A. F. Attacks Northern Italy

Russians Claim New Advances On Central Battlefront

BERLIN, Sept. 11.—(AP)—German planes showered Leningrad with pamphlets urging civilians not to defend the city, and the Germans said the Russians must decide whether Leningrad will be taken as a fairly intact city or as a heap of debris.

An authorized commentator asserted the Nazis are in a position to inflict much heavier punishment on Leningrad but were withholding it full might to give the citizens a chance to reconsider their defense tactics.

German-occupied Norway, seething against Nazi rule, faced a crisis today as Nazi authorities clamped down with the first firing-squad executions there and the state of civil siege which was proclaimed in Oslo, the capital, was expected to be extended to other areas.

Russia's armies reported today they had driven the Nazis back 13 miles on the central front, taken a total of 30,000 German dead and wounded in 30 days of fighting around Kiev, and seized the initiative in the siege of Leningrad.

Reports reaching Stockholm, Sweden, said the situation is acute also in other cities, where the Nazis are expected to be extended.

Joseph Terboven, German high commissioner for Norway, asserted that the measures were necessary to crush plans for a general strike of Norwegian workers set for today.

A quelling spy betrayed the plot for the strike, it was reported.

German troops ringed Oslo following the execution last night of two Norwegian labor leaders. Other alleged plotters were sentenced by military courts to terms ranging from 10 years to life imprisonment.

In the war in the air, R. A. F. bombers ranged far afield and attacked northern Italian cities for the first time since last winter.

On the Russo-German front, Soviet military dispatches reported that the Red Army had scored new advances as deep as 11 miles on the central front where the head-long Russian counter-offensive had driven three wedges into the German lines.

The Red Army around Leningrad was shelling from all barrels last night and the Germans backed down measurably from their earlier claims that the city was imminently doomed.

Roosevelt Is Expected To Get 'Em Told

Secretary Declares Radio Address Will Leave No Questions On Policy In Doubt

President Goes On Air At Nine

Day Is Spent In Conference With Other Important Officials

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—(AP)—President Roosevelt's radio address on foreign policy tonight was described at the White House today as one which will be "all covering" and will leave no unanswered questions.

Stephen Early, press secretary, declared the speech "will mean what it says and will be written in English—English that will need no translation."

President Roosevelt returned Wednesday night from Hyde Park and the funeral of his mother to plunge immediately into actively reflecting deep concern over the impact of the war on this country.

Secretary of State Hull met the President at the railroad station and drove with him to the White House. The secretaries of war and navy also were called to the executive mansion for conferences Wednesday night, in advance of Roosevelt's important radio report to the nation today, which was expanded from its original scope.

Roosevelt's address will follow closely upon the sinking of the *Steel Mariner*, 300 miles this side of Iceland, the bombing and sinking of the *S.S. Steel Seafarer* in the Red Sea and last week's attack upon the destroyer *Greer* near Iceland, by a German submarine.

Most observers looked for a strong statement from the President and an announcement of actual steps taken to safeguard American ships and lives upon the sea—possibly including orders to the Atlantic naval patrol to sink on sight any Axis war vessels found in the area between the United States and Iceland.

Roosevelt announced that his speech, originally scheduled for 15 minutes, had been increased to 25. The news of both the *Seas* and the *Steel Seafarer* had been received since the original plan was made.

The President had finished writing the speech before he left his home at Hyde Park, but it was, of course, still open to revision. Judge Samuel L. Freeman of New York Supreme Court, who has advised the President on the content of many of his important speeches, was a passenger on the train.

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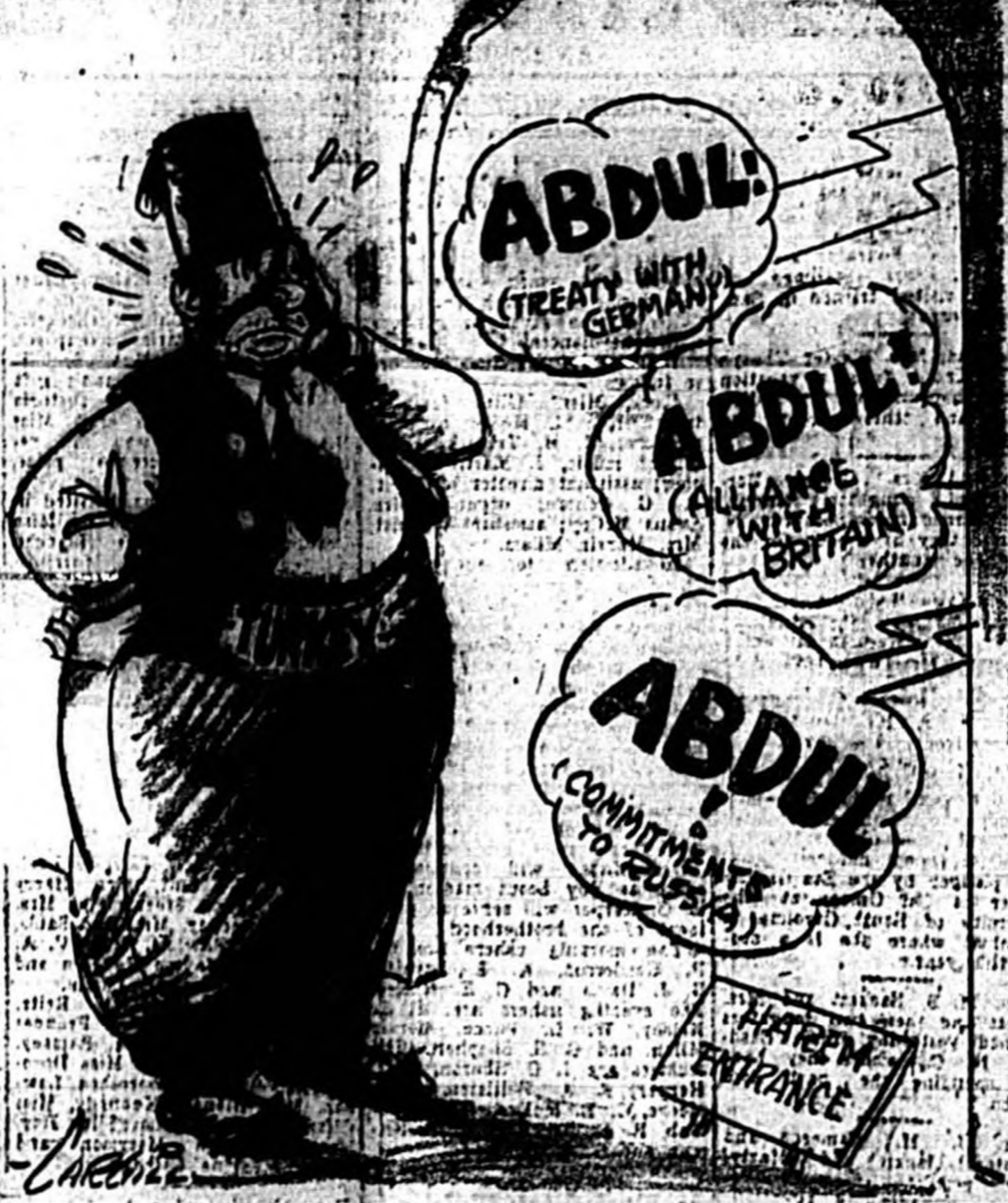

Some of the German airplanes and tank parts, which were formerly made of rubber are being replaced by materials made from plastic bonded wood fibers, of which Germany has a good supply.

Most of the German synthetic rubber is made from coal and other materials. Thus it can be seen that the danger of a shortage of natural rubber is not so great as it was once thought to be. The German synthetic rubber is more vital to the war effort than the natural rubber from the Near East.

Butter Versus Margarine Debate Likely to Get Better In Future

By SIGRID ARNE
WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—(AP)—There's quite a brawl brewing here over the old subject of butter versus margarine.

It's no brawl. The current fracas dates from Spring, when a committee on food and nutrition met to devise new methods for feeding America better with the hope of making the citizens stronger. The program so far as Washington is concerned.

The committee issued, among other things, a sample day's diet which would furnish the necessary vitamins and minerals, and still would cost only 32 cents for the three meals. The menus—all three of them—mention margarine, but not butter.

That prompted the Consumers' Council of the Department of Agriculture to arrange one of its weekly radio programs for a discussion of margarine.

One of the characters on the program said: "Many people are finding out they can save quite a bit of money by using margarine instead of butter. It's quite a lot cheaper."

"Both butter and margarine are chiefly fat. By law or government rules, both must be at least 80 percent fat. Butter is made from the fat from cream. And margarine, just set up, can be made from animal fat or oil, or vegetable fat or oil, or a combination."

"There's little to choose between the various kinds of pure fats. They are all, more or less, equally digestible, and equally rich in fuel value."

That brought Rep. August H. Andresen of Minnesota to his feet on the House floor. His state, in 1940, earned \$68,000,000 from butter.

Andresen spoke of the program as "government sponsored propaganda" and called it "virtually a conspiracy against the farmers."

He said the radio performers did their level best to put over the idea that oleomargarine, under the new formula promulgated by the food and drug administration, was equal if not superior to butter in food value, and added that "they boldly urged consumers to buy oleo instead of butter."

Andresen asserted that in the past decade he has seen much of "the subversive work of lawless lawyers, pink economists, and maverick home economic ladies."

He demanded an investigation, and further, he wanted the Department of Agriculture to stop its employees from "scuttling of American dairy farmers."

Rep. W. R. Page of Texas arose to remind his fellow members that there is another set of American farmers quite interested in the popularity of margarine—the men who supply the fats and oils, such as livestock men and soy-bean growers.

So the fat is in the fire, quite literally. A group of retailers are rattling around Washington asking that a tax on margarine be removed.

Don't be surprised if that margarine tax argument turns into a serious legislative matter. That's the way these Washington brawls develop.
