County land swap draws questions

SANFORD — The Seminole County Commission is considering a land swap that would trade a storm water retention pond for 23 acres of wetlands, a move that not only infuriates several Lake Howell residents, but a couple of commissioners, as well. Commissioners Carlton Henley and Grant Maloy are displeased the commission is even considering a swap that they

say has no benefit to the county. If approved, the 3.47 acres of retention pond will be used as "developmental credits" by the developer enabling them to have a higher density of apartment complexes. The retention pond could make a difference of about 40 additional apartment

units at the development. The issue came about in November 2000, when county staff contacted the owner of the Casselberry property on the northwest corner of Howell Branch and Lake Ann Lane for a possible purchase. If acquired the land could possibly help the

county's stormwater division develop a regional stormwater facility within the Howell Creek Basin. Talks ceased after the property owners asked for more than \$2 million for the 40-acre tract, substantially more than the county's available funds. On March 26, the developer of the property and attorney Ken Wright with the firm of Shutts & Bowen met with county staff and proposed the trade. On May 8, the county commission approved See Swap, Page 7A

Colleges scramble to fill high-tech job vacancies

SANFORD — A joint initiative between area community colleges is helping meet the increasing demand for Information Technology (IT) workers in Central Florida. Seminole, Lake-Sumter and Valencia college presidents announced the program in April and set a goal of training 15,000 new IT workers in the next three years. An interim report indicates the initiative is an early success as IT capacity has increased 21 percent at the three colleges and enrollment has increased 12 percent. The three colleges prepared for the initiative by adding 14 full-time and 34 part-time faculty. The schools have also added 12 new IT programs and 12 new specialties, including a new E-business degree at Seminole and Valencia. Despite the increases, SCC Dean of Business and Information Technology Derek Crews said more students are needed in the new initiative to help fill the shortage of IT workers. College statistics note that the Central Florida region will need approximately 57,000 IT jobs next year. See Vacancies, Page 4A

and serve," Hargrett said. "When I was at the Orlando Police Department, they were big on community policing. Chief Tooley is also big on community policing." According to Hargrett, too often officers see homes with See Officers, Page 7A

Robinson discovers history of Crooms library among debris

SANFORD — A history of Crooms Academy classes of 1948 and 1949 has been found by Larry Robinson, a janitor at Crooms. Over 62 years of history was entombed in a capsule put behind the cornerstone of Crooms Academy Memorial Library. Robinson found the container with the historical documents in a pile of debris left by crews renovating the school. Inside the container was information about the library's dedication, which occurred on Sunday, May 1, 1949 at 3 p.m. The cornerstone was laid by Mt. Olive Lodge AF&AM, C.H. Taylor, Wishful Master. Affiliated lodges involved were from Oviedo, Altamonte Springs, Winter Park, Garden, Orlando and DeLand.

The addresses for the occasion were given by Professor G.L. Porter, President of Florida State Teachers' Association, also Mr. S.W. Curtis, Executive Secretary, Florida State Teachers' Association. The new library celebration ground breaking was an historical event. The new \$25,000 library site was approximately 150 feet north of the Academy. Superintendent T.W. Lawton, R. McGriff, a graduate of the Negro high school made the address (quote from April 11, 1949 Sanford Herald). Jacksonville Attorneys S.D. and N.K. McGill were associates in law. Persons breaking ground were asked to make donations, and their names were recorded for future use in the project said professor Crooms. See History, Page 4A

Zoo's Baby Animal Stroll puts unique animals on display

SANFORD — They're blue-eyed, bushy-tailed and ready to play. Catch the clouded leopard cubs and other furry, feathered, and scaly animal babies at the Central Florida Zoological Park during the Baby Animal Stroll. From Nov. 1 through Dec. 31, the Zoos Baby Animal Stroll will feature the endangered male and female clouded leopard cubs, a young spot-nosed guenon, wreathed hornbill chick, silvery-cheeked hornbill chick, juvenile Egyptian cobras, and a new-born prehensile-tailed skink. The male and female clouded leopard cubs were born July 24, and are made their public debut on Nov. 1 after being hand-raised by animal staff. The Zoo is one of two facilities participating in the American Zoo and Aquarium Associations Species Survival Plan successful-

ly reproducing these endangered species in 2001. They represent an important addition to the captive population of this leopard species. Many of these animals represent first-time births at the Zoo, including nine Egyptian cobras that were hatched after a 58-day incubation, some of which will be on exhibit. The Zoos first silvery-cheeked hornbill hatched on July 7, and emerged from the nest cavity on Oct. 5. The five-month old spot-nosed guenon is very active, exploring his surroundings and playing with his older sister. The seven-month old wreathed hornbill chick is growing quickly due in large part to the care provided by his parents. At just one month of age, the young prehensile-tailed skink is already more than half of his full-grown length and is on exhibit in the herpetarium with his parents. See Zoo, Page 9A

Education Week: A chance to get involved in schools

You can tell I'm in the older generation when I explain that (in rural Michigan) I went through a one-room, one-teacher school, which covered grades K through 8. My parents never missed a PTA meeting, and attended every function the school had. Once I went to high school however, I don't recall they ever went into the school for anything, especially PTA meetings. My father said it would be of no value, as the larger school was governed by bureaucracy, and nothing he could ever say or do would change anything, so why bother. While I hope there are no longer old-fashioned-thinking parents like mine, I imagine we still have many who think the same way.

If so, this is an opportunity to change all of that. The week of Nov. 11 through 17 is American Education Week, nationwide. It's been observed on the week before Thanksgiving for the past 78 years. On the national level, it is a special time to honor the teachers and school staff who educate the nation's 53 million school children. It also affords an opportunity to recognize the critical role public schools serve by caring for our children and imparting American ideals.

Many parents may attend functions in which their youngsters are involved such as sporting events, band or choral concerts, etc. But they simply ignore the PTA or other school meetings in which important issues that may affect their children are held.

OK, so you're thinking one person can't make a difference, but as we saw in Florida last November, one person CAN make a difference.


In addition to working to improve education, PTA involvement provides an opportunity to learn about your child's school, its operations, and meet and converse with the teachers. Just the truth please McKinney's playing of race card is trumped by the facts

To the Honorable Cynthia McKinney:

Your Oct. 29 commentary in *The Washington Post* — a defense of your controversial Oct. 12 letter to Saudi Prince Alwaleed bin Talal — started out so well. It was reasoned and well-written, explaining why you thought New York Mayor Rudy Giuliani had been wrong to reject the prince's \$10 million donation to the Sept. 11 relief fund.

Challenging critics who thought you should be silenced, you also defended your right to free speech; rebuffing those who called you unpatriotic, you noted your support for overtime pay for servicemen; answering those who called you anti-Semitic, you reiterated your longstanding support of Israel.

You even quoted from the lyrics of the patriotic song made popular by country singer Lee Greenwood — a clever and unexpected rhetorical device given the cultural divide separating his fans from yours.

Then you ruined your argument by gratuitously brandishing the race card.

"Why such a negative reaction to my letter?" you asked. "I believe that when it comes to major foreign policy issues, many prefer to have black people seen and not heard."

How incredibly stupid. What exactly do you think Colin Powell does for a living? What do you think Condoleezza Rice is doing in all those White House briefings?

That was not the first time you blamed racism for the criticism you received over your apology to the Saudi prince. You also whipped out the race card in interviews on urban-market radio stations.

Indeed, your original letter recited a litany of facts highlighting the continuing racial gap in American social well-being. Listing everything from homelessness among black Americans to the high rate of incarceration of black men, you asked the prince to donate the \$10 million to African-American causes instead.

Such a letter would have been controversial even without your plea for the prince's money. After all, you seemed to endorse his suggestion that the atrocities were provoked by U.S. foreign policy.

But your focus on America's racial divide was ill-timed in the aftermath of the attacks, which have united the nation across lines of race, class and religion. The terrorists murdered blacks, whites and browns, the young, the middle-aged and the elderly, Muslim, Christian and Jew.

More to the point, your litany of statistics was startlingly out of context. While black Americans still lag behind whites in several social indicators, we enjoy, as a group, more prosperity than blacks in almost any other country. After all, your letter gained attention because you are a member of the U.S. Congress, one of a growing group of African-American elected and appointed officials holding positions of power across the country.

Including the White House. With a black man serving as secretary of state, the most prominent post in the Cabinet and the chief architect of U.S. foreign policy, it was just ludicrous of you to suggest that blacks are not allowed to speak on that topic. Powell has crisscrossed the globe cementing a worldwide coalition against terrorism.

And then there's Rice, the national security adviser. Long included in the Bush inner circle, she clearly has the president's ear. During the campaign, she was entrusted with tutoring Bush, who acknowledged that his grasp of foreign policy issues was tenuous at the time.

Whatever you think of President Bush, you should give him credit where it's due: He has appointed African-Americans to more powerful positions than any other president. And you should not disrespect the accomplishments of Rice and Powell by failing to acknowledge their influence on American foreign policy.

You should also give up your reflexive tendency to blame racism every time you encounter difficulty. Your indiscriminate use of the word only cheapens the struggles of those who must still labor to overcome genuine racism.

"There are unfilled positions in IT fields even in the downturned economy," Crews said. "If we're going to continue to attract IT companies to Seminole County and Central Florida we're going to have to supply more workers. Roughly half the IT jobs in Central Florida are going unfilled."

Although the shortage is a national problem, Crews said it's important that Central Florida takes the lead as the area tries to develop a high tech corridor from Tampa Bay to Volusia County.

"Seminole County, in particular, has been one of the areas with the most high-tech companies," he said.

The program is endorsed by Gov. Jeb Bush, who hopes it can become an important part of Operation Paycheck — a program that tries to quickly retrain displaced workers.


According to Crews, IT positions are well paying and the

key is to find unemployed workers who are willing to learn a new field. Tracy Burchard, who works for Intellimark, an IT job placement company in Casselberry, agrees that more skilled workers are needed.

"The talent is not out there and a lot of that has been very recent — in the last six months to a year," Burchard said. "There just has not been enough people going through schools getting IT training."

In particular, Burchard said "hard-core programmers" are a premium as there is a major deficit of those who have expertise in computer languages such as JAVA, Visual Basic and C++ with a UNIX server background. She said she occasionally has to go out-of-state to recruit programmers and other IT specialists for Central Florida jobs.

Drastic measures may stop Taliban

Deputy Defense Secretary Paul Wolfowitz told *The London Telegraph* last week that Britain and the United States should expect a large-scale chemical and biological weapons assault on civilian targets by Osama bin Laden's terrorist group. The objective, said Wolfowitz, is to cause tens of thousands of casualties.

If such a forecast is based on sound intelligence, President Bush should consider emulating his predecessor, Harry Truman, and employ the use of at least tactical nuclear weapons against the Taliban should it be concluded that such a weapon might produce better results than the current bombing campaign. If this is war, why pull any punches?

There are similarities between Japan in 1945 - the first and only time any nation has employed nuclear weapons in warfare - and Afghanistan now. Then, Japanese troops frequently hid in caves and pillboxes and fought with a religious fervor inspired by their Emperor in whom they vested divine power. Now, the Taliban use caves as protective cover and are inspired by religious zeal.

Gen. George C. Marshall recounted Japanese resistance and the willingness of Japanese soldiers to fight to the death during World War II. "We had one hundred thousand people killed in Tokyo in one night of bombs, and it had seemingly no effect whatsoever," Marshall is quoted in "Truman," David McCullough's 1992 biography of the president. "It destroyed the Japanese cities, yes, but their morale was affected, so far as we could tell, not at all. So it seemed quite necessary, if we could, to shock them into action...We had to end the war; we had to save American lives."

That was Truman's main concern - saving American lives. As recounted in McCullough's book, the president took no delight in wiping out entire cities and thousands of civilians, but Japan, like the Taliban today, had started the war and would not give up. The Japanese, like the Taliban, promised more American dead, and Truman's first obligation, like that of President Bush, was to protect America and Americans. "It occurred to me," McCullough quotes Truman, "that a quarter of a million of

the flower of our young manhood were worth a couple of Japanese cities, and I still think they were and are."

"Remember Pearl Harbor" served as a rallying cry for a previous generation that taught war mongers the consequences of attacking the United States.

"Remember the World Trade Center and the Pentagon" should serve as a contemporary rallying cry. The Taliban fight with the weapons of terror, determined to kill every man, woman and child they can. The United States should spare no effort in wiping out the Taliban and all terrorists who would follow in their sandal-steps. If there is collateral civilian damage, that's war.

America's willingness to use nuclear weapons during World War II preserved the peace and struck fear into the hearts of our adversaries. It's time for another demonstration of our resolve. Perhaps nothing short of nuclear weapons will deter for another generation the enemies of freedom. Like the fanatical Japanese of Truman's day, the fanatical Taliban will not be dissuaded from murdering as many Americans as they can. This is not a time for diplomatic or political niceties. It is a time to wipe them out before they wipe any more of us out.

Harry Truman was not afraid to use the power he had to save America and the lives of its citizens. As David McCullough writes, "Japan had some 2.5 million regular troops on the home islands, but every male between the ages of 15 and 60; every female from 17 to 45, was being conscripted and armed with everything from ancient brass cannon to bamboo spears, taught to strap explosives to their bodies and throw themselves at advancing tanks."

That's the kind of fanaticism the United States faces in Afghanistan and in countries like Iraq. If we show them that our sword is bigger than theirs and, more importantly, that we will not shrink from using it to defend our people and our values, the likelihood we will have to do so again in the near future will be diminished.

There is a psychological and political downside to deploying even tactical nuclear weapons. But there's a bigger downside should Wolfowitz's forecast come true. Americans and Britons who would die in such a terrorist attack - and their loved ones - deserve to know that their countries are doing all they can to defend them.

Elton J. Moughton was the architect and Paul Campbell was the contractor for the one story structure of concrete block, which was 54 by 64 feet. Plumbing was by Lee

Brothers, wiring by St. Johns Electric Co. The ceilings will be noise absorbing, flooring of asphalt tile, steel casement windows, fluorescent lighting. The patrons raised \$6,000, which was for books and furnishings.

Professor J.N. Crooms and his wife, W.R. Crooms taught at Crooms from 1926 to 1953-54.

In 1949 Crooms revealed that he had come to Sanford 42 years ago and taught for five years at the old Hopper Academy at 7th

Street and Cypress Avenue. He married Wealthy Richardson Crooms in 1908 and she taught school at Hopper. In 1911 he was instrumental in planning and building the new Hopper Academy on Pine and 11th

Street. They served as principal there for 15 years prior to going to Crooms Academy in Goldsboro.

Crooms said his task was to carry on in such a way that boys and girls may have the opportu-

nity to prepare for a better life, he declared. He paid tribute to his wife, "who never faltered" in aiding him in his work.



The Way We Were: Who's Who in 1933

Again we return to the April 29, 1933 special edition of the Sanford Herald entitled "Who's Who in Sanford 1933." There are photographs and biographies of those prominently associated with the city's business life.

Lee Ransbottom
Lee Ransbottom, local shipper and packer of celery, entered the farming business in Sanford in 1922. Prior to that he managed a large wheat ranch in Canada and was in charge of a muckland experiment project on a ranch in northern Michigan. He was born in Ohio and during his early life he traveled all over the United States and Canada. He attended Ohio Northern College.

While attending to his interests in Sanford during the winter he resided at 612 Park Avenue and attended the Presbyterian Church. Early the previous fall, he had supervised the construction of a modern celery washing and packing house near the Mountain Ice Company Plant on the west side of town. During the recent season, his new project was patronized so well that he announced that it was a success.

H.H. Coleman
On Dec. 1, 1932, H.H. Coleman came to Sanford as the local manager of the Florida Power and Light Company. He succeeded Clyde Byrd who had been transferred to the Daytona Beach division of that company. Mr. Coleman was a member of the Masonic Order, the Elks, Rotary, Chamber of Commerce and Holy Cross Episcopal Church. He had established his home at 461 Mellonville Avenue where he resided with his wife, the former Irene Thayer. Mr. Coleman was born in Lykens, Penn. and completed

high school in that city. He later attended Allenbury Electrical School in Washington, D.C.

F.F. Dutton
F.F. Dutton, local produce dealer, packer and shipper of celery and other truck farm products was also president of F.F. Dutton and Sons, Inc., pre-cooling plant. Since coming to Sanford in 1912, he had been affiliated with several of the larger shipping concerns.

He was born Jan. 11, 1875 in Virginia and was raised on a farm in Illinois. He received his education at both the Dixon Normal College in Dixon, Ill. and Rochester University in Rochester, N.Y. Before entering the produce business, he owned and operated a commercial school in Philadelphia. In 1933 he was considered one of the best informed authorities on the shipment of celery and other farm products. Mr. Dutton was a member of the Masonic Lodge and resided at 2041 Mellonville Avenue. He had three children. Stewart Dutton and F.F. Dutton, Jr., both of Sanford, and Mrs. Frances P. Woodruff, Englishtown, N.J.

C.H. Eckerson
C.H. Eckerson, president of the Eckerson Fruit Cannery, Inc., first came to Sanford in 1921, remaining only a short time. He returned in 1930 to take charge of the newly formed company that had grown to be one of the foremost grapefruit and orange juice canning plants in the state, employing over 400 persons. Mr. Eckerson was born in New Jersey and received his education in Hackensack. Later he continued his studies at Drake's College in New York City. He was married to the former Blanch Louise Tanner and dur-

ing the winters they resided at 529 Valencia Drive. In the summers they lived either in Teaneck, N.J. or Shelbourne, Vt.

When in Sanford, the supervision of his plant required most of his time, but during his leisure hours he enjoyed drawing mechanical plans. His favorite recreations were golf, fishing and hunting.

H.F. Calhoun
H.F. Calhoun owned and operated stores bearing his name in both Sanford and Orlando. He first came to Sanford in 1906 with his parents but moved to Orlando shortly thereafter. He returned to Sanford in 1930 to become owner of the Calhoun Department Store on Sanford Avenue, which he presently operated.

He was a member of the Masonic Order and attended First Baptist Church with his wife, Luvera Smith Calhoun. They resided at 613 1/2 Magnolia Avenue. Mr. Calhoun was born in Birmingham, Ala, but attended Orange County Schools. His favorite sports were baseball and hunting.

Otto Caldwell
As the Sanford representative and agent of the St. Johns River Line, Otto Caldwell was considered largely responsible for the success of the company's business in Central Florida. He is responsible for placing regular boat schedules on the river from Jacksonville to Sanford.

Mr. Caldwell was born in 1900 in Indiana and attended schools in Kentucky and Illinois. He had been connected with the garage business in Peoria, Ill. until 1920.

The former Nell J. Sullivan was his wife, and they had one daughter.

County Manager Kevin Grace to authorize the developer to rezone the county owned pond. Grace said the developer was fairly warned that "there may never be an agreement."

"I do not see it as beneficial," said Henley who is also the district commissioner for the area. "I brought it up (before commission) three weeks ago because it's been going on since May. I've been getting calls and complaints on the project. I called staff in and said we've spent enough time on it and we're not going to be involved."

Commissioner Henley initially tried a motion to cease the swap, but that was denied 2 to 3.

The commission then voted 3 to 2 on Oct. 23 to wait on a deci-

sion until hearings between local citizens and the St. John's Water Management have been completed. Section 120 of Florida statues allows citizens to challenge decisions made by governmental agencies. The individuals are fighting environment permits issued by St. Johns to the developer.

All the delays are allowing Wright and Interested parties to lobby for the swap that clearly helps the developer, said Henley. He said he also fears if the swap is approved, it will be setting a dangerous precedent.

"When he wasn't there (at the Oct. 23 meeting) I figured he had his votes," Henley said. "I thought it was very interesting Mr. Wright asked in a letter to the board to hear the issue and then he didn't show up, which is

a sign to me he had his votes before the meeting or he would be in there fighting for it."

Commissioner Daryl McLain made the motion to continue the swap discussions until the hearings are over and disagrees with Henley's position. McLain said Wright didn't show up for the afternoon meeting because staff told him it was on the evening agenda.

"I think we have a responsibility to hear all the facts before we consider it," McLain said. "I try to make decisions on all the facts and not make the easy decision of just turning it down. I think it's only prudent we wait for the facts from the 120 hearings."



ORLANDO — For the University of Central Florida football team, today's game versus Akron at the Florida Citrus Bowl not only provides the Golden Knights with an opportunity to avenge a 35-24 loss to the Zips last season, it also provides a look into the future.

UCF, which will join the Mid-American Conference and begin conference play in 2002, will play in the Eastern Division of the MAC along with Akron.

Meanwhile, the Oviedo defense had the Winter Park offense in reverse. In four of the Wildcats' first five possessions of the second half, they were faced with at least one play where they needed a minimum of 20 yards for a first down.

The fifth series started at the Winter Park 2-yard line and ended at the 4.



Despite personal tragedy, Ellen Ware fulfills her dream of owning a home thanks help from Habitat for Humanity.

SANFORD — Life is funny. One moment, all your dreams seem to come true. The next brings unimaginable tragedy.

Ellen Ware knows both extremes. After years of renting from other people, Ware was finally going to own her own home. She qualified for a Habitat for Humanity home in September 1999 and was diligently logging the 500 hours of "sweat equity" — volunteer hours working at the organization's Thrift Store, assisting with fund raising or participating in the actual construction of homes — needed for the down payment.

One June 2, her dream was within reach as ground was broken for her home on the corner of Maple Avenue and 5th Street.

Then life threw her a curve ball.

Seventeen days after construction had begun on her new home, Ware was involved in a traffic accident. She her boyfriend and her children,

four sons and a daughter, were fishing off the Lake Monroe seawall. Ware had gone to get more bait just as an afternoon thunderstorm had begun. On her return, she was waiting to turn left into the grassy area next to the seawall when a car slammed into her from behind. The force drove her through the grass and over the seawall at the spot where her daughter Chenitra was fishing. Chenitra died hours later.

"My gosh, how could this happen?" Ware said. "I'm finally getting my own

home, but I lose my daughter? I struggled real hard with that. The 19th of every month, it's hard. It's — it's just real hard."

A devout Christian with a unquenchable optimism, Ware relied on her faith and the prayers of her church family to pull her through. She also doubled her efforts with Habitat.

"I tried to stay busy, whether it was with church or Habitat or whatever," Ware said. "Staying busy helped. You're suppose to have 500 hours, I put in 800. I tried to be here at the house everyday."

Those hours paid off Sunday, Oct. 28, when Ware, her family and friends, and Habitat volunteers gathered for a dedication ceremony at her new home.

"I am so blessed," Ware said, tears rolling down her cheeks. "Everyone knows what I have been through losing Chenitra, but God takes care of things. I'm so happy, my knees are shaking. I'm going to be a home owner!"

Though Ware's experience is different because of her personal tragedy, her reaction to home ownership is very familiar to Habitat volunteers.

"It's a moving experience at the dedication ceremony," said Jim Geltz, construction supervisor for Habitat for Humanity in Seminole County. "These people are realizing a dream, and because of the sweat equity they put in, it's a dream they've worked hard for."

It's not just the home owners who worked hard. Volunteers — from church groups to civic organizations —

donate time in help these dreams come true.

"The number of volunteers who work on one house can run into the hundreds," said Allen Arseneau, chairman of the construction committee. "Each Saturday you get a different group coming to help."

Geltz said Habitat has "a core group of about a dozen," people who regularly assist with construction.

"They've become pretty skilled at building because they've done it so much," Geltz said, "but most of the work is done by 'unskilled' volunteers."

In fact, those are the people Habitat actively seeks to participate in its projects.

"We highly encourage people who think they have no skills in building home to volunteer," said Bob Saunders, president of the Seminole County Habitat. "We provide on-site training, and we have our core volunteers who provide assistance."

Geltz, whose day job is with Carpentry Construction Inc., oversees the operation making sure the homes pass code inspections and Habitat standards. He stays busy. In it's 10 years of operation, the Seminole County chapter of Habitat has built 46 homes.

Volunteers, of course are the backbone of the Seminole County operation, but so is the support from local businesses which donate money, materials and manpower. Florida Public

Utilities Company is one of many businesses which provided supplies for the Ware's new home. In fact, Ware's house is unique because it piped for natural gas thanks to Florida Public Utilities.

"Our company has been involved with Habitat for some time," said Barbara Ziegler, energy conservation consultant for the company. "We donated the materials and work to pipe the house, and we also supplied a gas water heater."

Ziegler said Ware's home is the first her company has piped for natural gas.

"We've done several other homes with Habitat, but on those we piped the homes for propane," Ziegler said. "This is kind of a first for us, and it's neat because Ellen's house is just around the corner from our office. Our company believes in the good work Habitat does and we want to support that."

The organization is always looking for support, either through volunteers or donations. Saunders said the biggest need currently is land.

"We need to find affordable land to purchase," Saunders said. "We've got seven families in the pipeline right now, and we are in desperate need for land. That's the big hold up for us. If we could get the property, we could build many more homes every year."

Winter lawns in Central Florida need special care

In Central Florida, lawn grasses such as bahia grass, bermuda grass, and St. Augustine grass, go dormant in the late fall and winter. During this period, these grasses grow very slowly, lose color, and turn completely brown with the first frost.

In order to get an attractive green lawn during the winter, a temporary grass is seeded into the permanent lawn. This practice is called "overseeding."

Winter grasses: Several cool season grasses can be used for overseeding, but by far the most common temporary grass used in Florida is ryegrass. There are three types of ryegrass, annual, intermediate, and improved (perennial).

Ryegrass has quick seed germination, a good initial growth rate, has wide adaptability, and is relatively low cost. It can grow well in either sun or shade, and tolerates close and frequent mowing. If seeded heavily and mowed closely, ryegrass can provide a very dense and beautiful lawn throughout the winter.

By the time the ryegrass dies, the permanent lawn grass should be actively growing again, and will provide color and cover the rest of the growing season. Ryegrass needs to be overseeded every year.

Timing: Seeding time for Central Florida is from mid-November to early December. It is recommended that seeding should be done when daytime temperatures are in the low- to mid-70 degree range. If seeding occurs during the warmer periods, water stress and diseases will reduce the stand.

Seedbed preparation: To prepare the lawn for overseeding, the grass should first be raked to remove all debris. Then, mow the lawn closely, catching or removing by raking the grass after mowing. If the lawn has excessive thatch,

it should be dethatched with the proper equipment to produce a uniform bed. Remove any additional material from your lawn before overseeding.

Overseeding: A seeding rate of 10 pounds/1000 square feet is used for annual or common and intermediate types of ryegrass. A seeding rate of 10 to 20 pounds/1000 square feet is used for perennial or improved ryegrass.

Use a mechanical seeder and sow half the seed as you walk in one direction, and the remaining by walking at right angles to the first.

After seeding, rake the ground with a stiff broom to ensure the seed gets through the grass and is in contact with the soil.

Watering: Water should be applied lightly and carefully to the seeded lawn once or twice a day until all the seeds have germinated. Watering should continue until seedlings are well established. Water only as-needed once plants are well established.

Maintenance: Winter lawns will require the same maintenance practices as the permanent lawn, such as mowing, watering, fertilizing, and pest control. Mowing can be done after plants are 1-2 inches high. Under normal conditions mowing should be done weekly. Mower blades should be sharp to avoid damaging the seedlings. Water only to keep the grass from wilting.

Use a complete fertilizer such as 6-6-6 at a rate of one half pounds nitrogen per 1000 square feet initially, then monthly applications of a nitrogen fertilizer such as ammonium nitrate, at a rate of one half pounds of nitrogen per 1000 sq. ft.

Diseases: Ryegrass is very susceptible to the fungus Pythium which can cause damping off or a disease called cottony blight. Over watering and over fertilizing

promotes the development of the disease. This disease is more severe during warm, humid conditions.

If cottony blight is present, a fungicide should be applied immediately because this disease can kill the entire winter lawn in 24 to 48 hours. Plant

only fungicide-treated seeds to prevent seedling infections.

Reestablishing permanent grass: Ryegrass will normally die out in late spring, but if the weather is cool, and the lawn watered frequently, it can remain for a longer period of time. As warm weather sets


in, discontinue fertilization and water as infrequently as possible to weaken the winter grass.

Daughters review history of county museum

In a patriotic setting, Karen Jacobs spoke to members of the Sallie Harrison Chapter Daughters of the American Revolution at the first meeting of the season at Best Western Lakeside Landing Room.

The museum, open to the public, is located on US 17-92, across from Flea World. Tuesday through Friday, 9:00 a.m. to noon, and 1:00 to 4:00 p.m.; and Saturday, 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. Plans are under way to erect separate buildings at the rear of the museum which will preview the Seminole County Agriculture Story.
