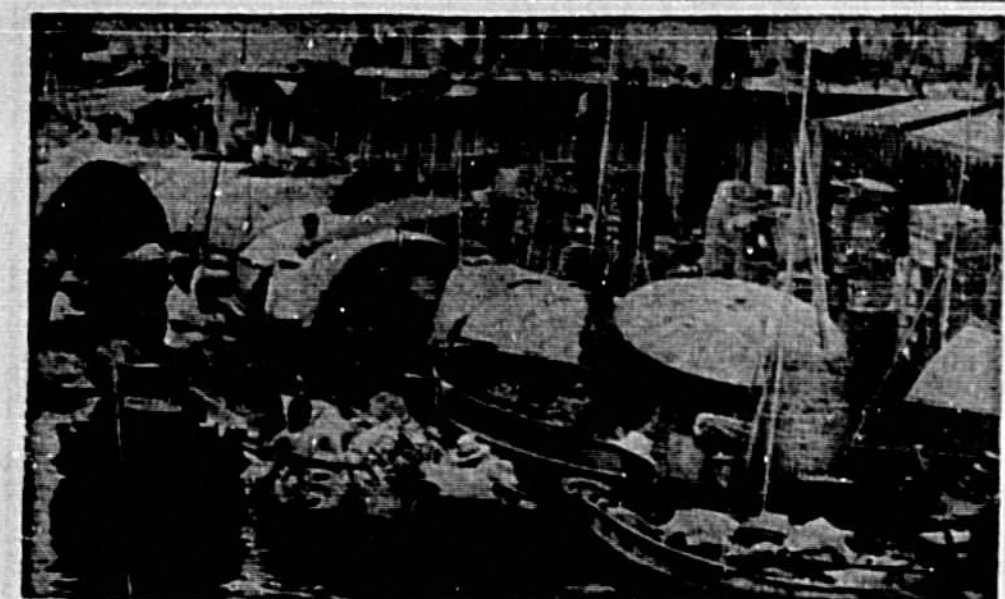

Reds Drive Allies Toward Border

HANOI, North Vietnam (AP) — Repeated North Vietnamese onslaughts are driving the South Vietnamese out of their bases in Laos and back toward their border with heavy losses. American helicopter pilots reported today that they had seen "They can talk about helicopter mobility all they want, but from where I'm flying there's only one way to describe it—retreat, and a bad one," said WO Fred Few of Chattanooga, Tenn.



Another called it a rout. In the past five days the South Vietnamese have abandoned two of their four fire bases south of east-west Highway 9, retreated 15 miles and now are about 14 miles from the Vietnamese border, the pilots said.

A third base, Landing Zone Brown, appears doomed. "Sure, they've knocked out quite a few enemy supplies and maybe even cut the Ho Chi Minh trail in one or two places," said one pilot, but they haven't stopped the enemy from moving men or supplies and they're taking a hell of a lot of casualties.

"The enemy is defeated," the Pathet Lao order said. "Now he is trying to retreat. Destroy him."

One ragged column of survivors reached Landing Zone Brown, the westernmost position still in South Vietnamese hands, only to find it under constant bombardment by enemy mortar rockets and artillery.

South Vietnamese officers in the field said the Saigon troops pulled out of Brown Tuesday night and between 100 and 150 North Vietnamese troops moved in. U.S. air strikes were called in on the hill after the South Vietnamese left.

Money King Of Vietnam Denies All

NEW YORK (AP) — When American combat troops began deploying across South Vietnam in 1965, digging foxholes and setting up tents in the searing heat, an obliging businessman named William J. Crum was often eager to provide basic comforts: beer on credit, bar snacks, the loan of a cooler, or sometimes a slot machine to pass the time.

The stocky, balding Crum parlayed his good will into lucrative contracts to supply the hundreds of servicemen's clubs that mushroomed across the country for troop morale purposes.

The Shanghai-born American businessman, who with his class eye and limp shuffled around Saigon like an aged seaman, quickly widened his circle of acquaintances beyond the thirty GI's. They soon included American generals and senior diplomats. His suspiciously riviera villa became a hideaway for American brass to relax from the cares of the war and pry reports out of the 32-year-old Crum closed out his Saigon villa late in 1970 and slid from view as surreptitiously as he had arrived five years earlier.

Crum's stocky build and orange pantsuit, embellished with Indian design, did not take any military examinations to determine if Powell had fired a gun, he said. Ronald Powers charged with second degree murder in the death of his two-year-old step-daughter, Lana Bennett, pleaded innocent this morning at his arraignment before Circuit Court Judge Dominick Salvi.

Powers, heavily built auto parts company employee, was arrested along with his wife, Charlene, on second degree murder charges after little Lana died in an Orange County hospital.

Powers and his wife were indicted by a county grand jury but at today's hearing the state attorney asked that the indictment be withdrawn in favor of a direct information filed by his office against Powers, who is to face trial beginning April 12.

Powers was represented by Roger Berry, attorney, who, with associate Mark N. Cleveland Jr., is expected to defend the accused. Powers' wife, Charlene, pleaded guilty to manslaughter at her trial which concluded Saturday and is out on bond awaiting a presentence investigation.

She could receive 20 years depending on how the court wishes, or she may receive a probationary sentence and be allowed to remain free to care for three other children, all by her previous marriage.

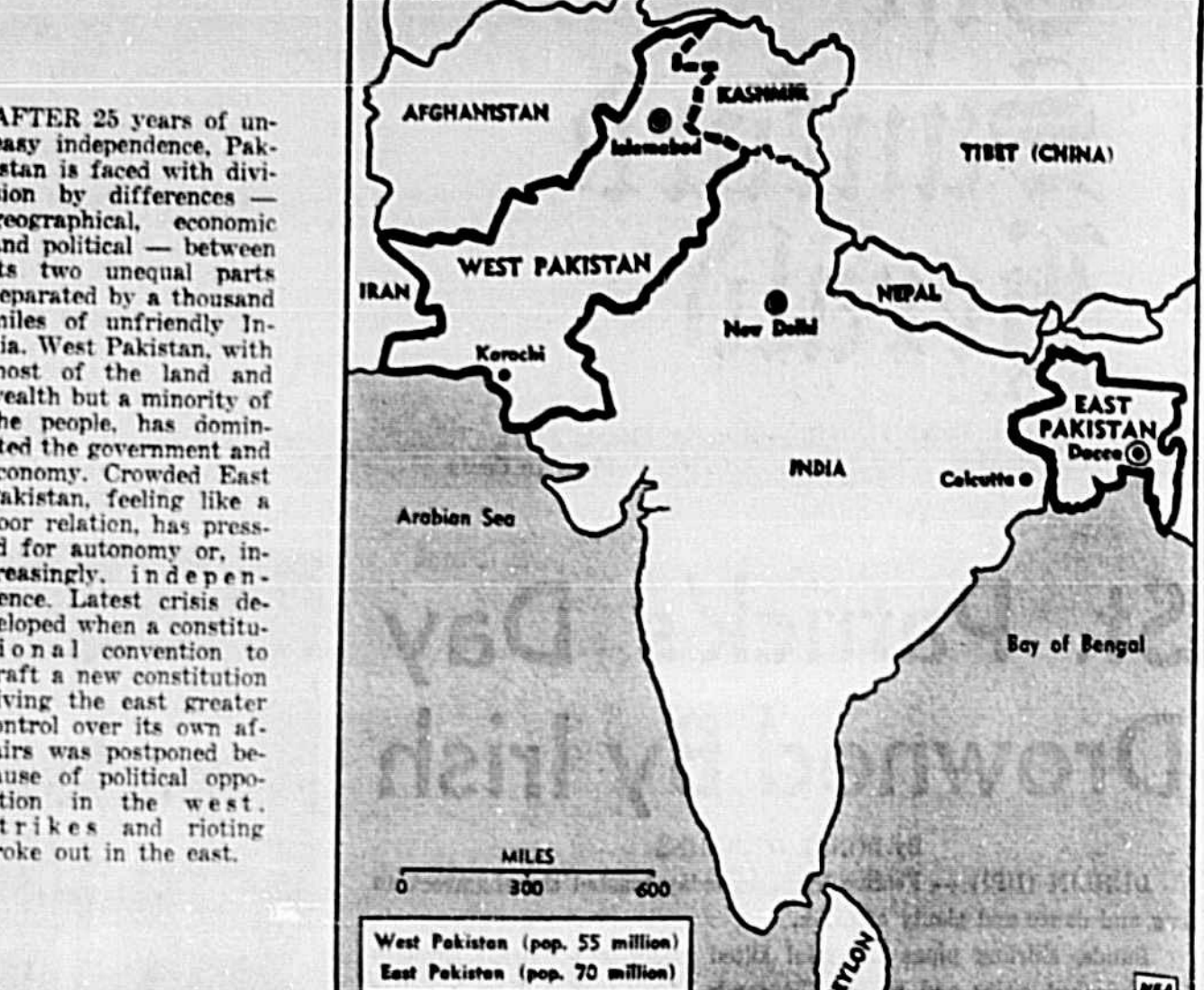
Powers in the meantime is being held on \$50,000 bond after he was rearrested by sheriff's officers when, during testimony, William Honchell, a guest in the Powers home, testified he saw Powers beat his wife in a Thanksgiving incident at the couple's Longwood home.

Powers, who was out on \$10,000 bond, was immediately arrested on assault and battery charges and his bond increased.

U. S. Participation Seen In Mideast Police Force

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Nixon administration is counting on Congress to support U.S. troop participation in a U.N. police force to secure a hoped-for Egyptian-Israeli peace settlement.

Secretary of State William P. Rogers said Tuesday he was satisfied that if an agreement acceptable to Israel and Egypt can be worked out "our Senate and our House of Representatives would support it."

Rogers also said hopeful conditions now exist for peace even though negotiations are at an impasse at the moment. He warned of danger to the world should the peace efforts fail.

He argued, therefore, the use of big power troops, including Americans, to guarantee any agreement would be a substantial contribution to world peace.

Officials say a peace-keeping force offering new security for Israel and protecting against the possibility of a major war would have strong appeal in Congress.

That any such proposal would face serious challenge in the Senate, however, was indicated by the initial reactions of Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield and Sens. Stuart Symington, D-Mo., and George D. Aiken, R-Vt., all members of the Foreign Relations Committee.

Symington said "the less we are involved there the better." And Aiken said a peering force "would be better left to the smaller nations with the United States and the Soviet Union left out."

Rogers said the impasse in the negotiations under UN mediator Gunnar Jarring re-

County Enters Zoo Picture

The Seminole County Commission indicated at yesterday's meeting that it is willing to become involved in the controversial Sanford zoo issue, provided it can be assured of a regional zoo site that it would be a local facility, according to County Planner David Farr.

The Lake Monroe park site was selected upon the recommendation of Farr. Both commissioners Greg Drummond and Sid Vidin indicated that they favored the Big Tree Park for the zoological park because of its central location in the county, but are willing to follow Farr's recommendation.

Farr recommended the Lake Monroe site because of what he termed "ideal" topographic and land conditions. Farr said that approximately one-third of the 82 acres is lowland with the remainder being fairly high ground which would facilitate the creation of pools areas and pasture sites without too much trouble. Farr also cited the proximity of the park to Highway 17-92 and Interstate-which would draw people to the site. He said that this was the problem with Big Tree Park, all that could be seen of the park from the main highway are signs.

Vidin was given the nod to represent the county at the night's zoo committee meeting to express to what extent county is willing to get involved and under what conditions.

Violations Of Laws Charged Stonesoup Private School License Is Suspended

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — Following notification by the Seminole County Health Department of numerous violations of state laws governing school sanitation and food service by the Stonesoup School, City Council voted unanimously to suspend the occupational license of the privately-owned experimental school.

Director of the school is Mrs. A. P. Pule, wife of county school board member A. P. Pule. The school was given until April 15 by the county to correct the 13 alleged violations, which include such items as lack of separate toilet facilities for boys and girls, drinking fountains, individual towels, proper wiring, and proper sanitation in food preparation.

The suspension is effective today but the owners will have the right of hearing before the license is actually revoked, according to Rodney Loyer, city clerk.

Council approved borrowing \$200,000 from Barnett Bank of Seminole at Altamonte Springs to provide the city's matching funds in the HUD financial pollution control construction until the city can issue bonds for the project.

A letter was read from the Division of Health denying an operating permit to Chateau Le Mans Apartments on SR 436 with the recommendation that the complex tie into the sewer and water system of the city of Altamonte Springs. The apartments are not in the city limits, but the fronting road was annexed.

Zoning changes were approved at a public hearing prior to the meeting for Fletcher Properties in the Capistrano Apartments area of Maitland Avenue. Lot 610 was changed from R-1A to R-3 and Lots 583 and 585 were changed from R-3 to commercial.

Request of developer Wilson Knott to build a professional building on north side of SR 436 on Maitland Avenue was continued as it will entail signal light and geometric changes at the junction.

The city attorney was instructed to draft and prepare a resolution permitting the city to collect water and sewer connection charges at the same time other building permits are required.

The Florida Power Corporation franchise was passed on the first reading.

School Health Study Is Coming To A Close

ENGLISH ESTATES — Once again Seminole County leads the way.

Three workshops are planned and conducted a year — pre-school, Mid-year, and end of the term.

Unlike teachers, the health coordinator works 11 months a year.

In addition to teaching 26 classes a week in health for grades one through five, she sees that the clinic is in working order and makes house calls two mornings a week.

The director of the tri-county program is Fred Ganas.

Copies of the resolution are to be sent to U.S. Representative William Chappell and Senators Lawton Chiles and Ed Gurney.

Also at yesterday's meeting a letter from Commissioner Al Davis to Clifford McKibbin of the county's insurance committee was read into the record. The letter was a request by Davis to have his name withdrawn from the list of insurance agents in the county shared in the commission from the county's insurance business. In the letter, Davis said that he wanted to eliminate even the slightest possibility of a conflict of interest on his part while he was serving on the commission.

Commission Chairman Greg Drummond requested a consensus of the board concerning attitudes toward both the Cross-Florida Barge Canal and the Thiaville-Indian River Canal should the topic be brought up at the National Rivers and Waterways Conference in Washington, D.C., which Drummond will represent Seminole County this week.

The consensus arrived at was that there should be an independent study conducted by an environmental engineer that was not answerable to either the Corps of Engineers or the ecology groups. Drummond stated that for his part he was tired of irrational approaches of both extremes based on "bought studies."

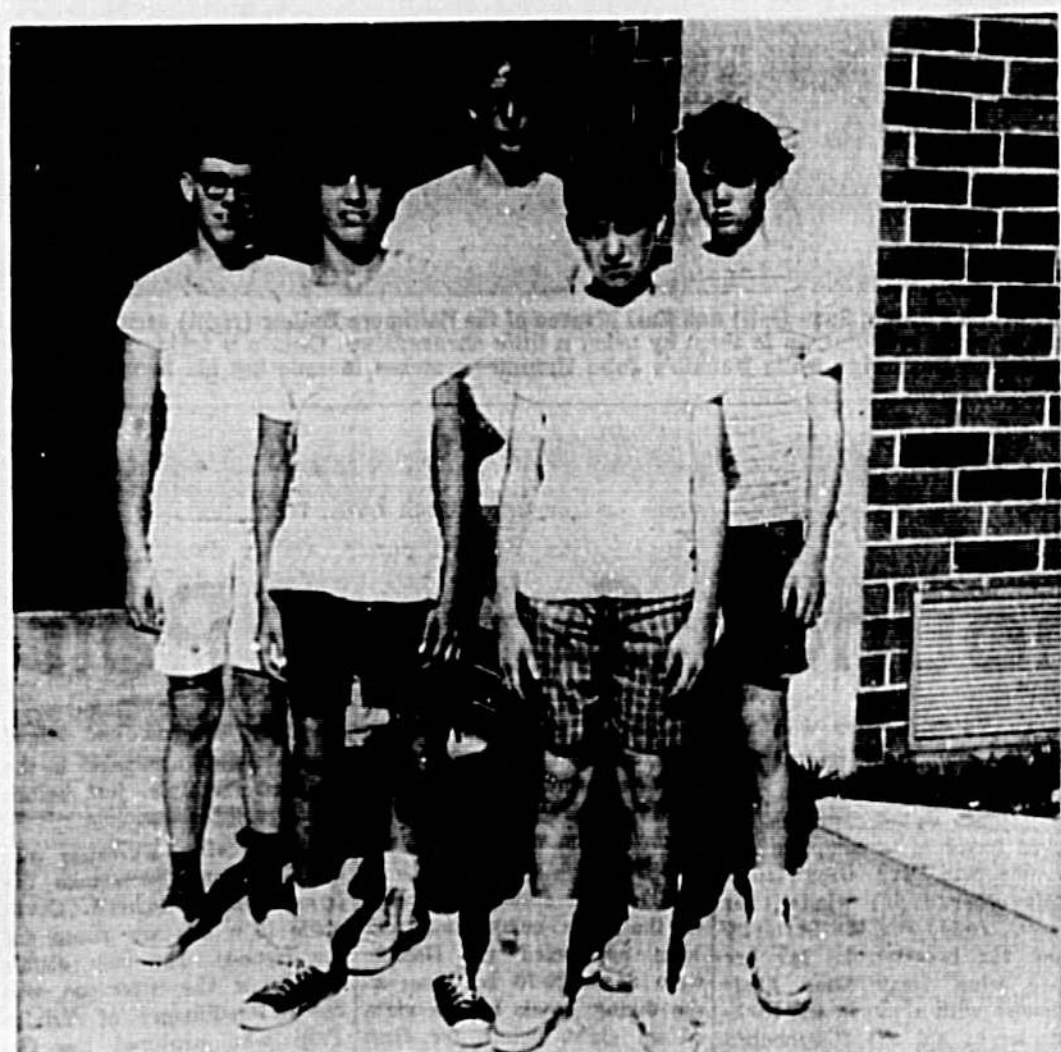

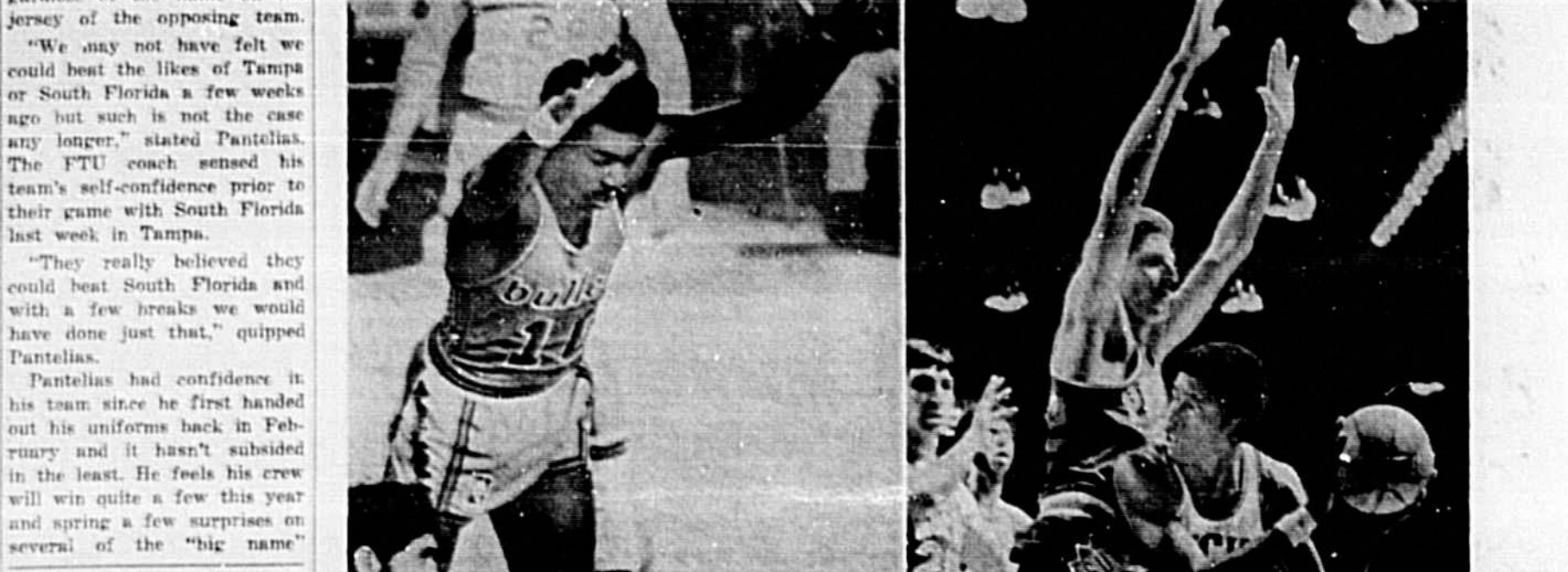

Divine Diet Has 830 Calories

I was the kind of lunchbox epidemic model over, and it was accompanied by two wines. But from the opening course of entrées, salads to the desert of strawberries, amounting to 830 calories, I was eating.

The meal was served at a New York restaurant, and the menu was conceived by Tad Godowsky, star of the silent film and a lover of fine food and drink who has been fighting a running battle to keep his weight down.

Since I have had something of a weight problem for years, I was interested in the recipe she is collecting under the intriguing title "Divine Diet." They prove that food does not have to be fattening to be good.

Dagmar came to America with her family at the outbreak of World War I. She was 14 years old and already stage-struck. Eventually she made it to Hollywood and played roles opposite Rudolph Valentino and other big-time stars.

Today, the green-eyed enchantress of the 1920s is leading a more sedentary life, but she still loves the haute cuisine and has a penchant for the wines of California.

At Madame Godowsky's press conference, however, her waistline began to wobble and she resorted to her struggle with calories.

But there was one bright note: "The only thing all the doctors seemed to agree on is that I can have a glass of wine with my meals."

And soon she made another discovery that led to the collecting of diet recipes.

I found I could still have wonderful food even with these "divine diets," she said. "There are many ways to make perfectly divine dishes with unadorned oils, and my friends in California made wonderful recipes for me so I can eat all my favorite things."

Judging from the samples I have seen, the recipes are really something. Here's one for scallops to make wine and according to Madame Godowsky, it is only 360 calories per serving. It is called "Carpole B. Jacques."

COQUILLES ST. JACQUES
1 pound scallops (washed and cut into small pieces)
4 medium mushrooms sliced
2 teaspoons unsaturated margarine
Juice of one lemon
2 tablespoons chopped parsley
Pinch of tarragon
2 tablespoons minced onion
1/2 cup dry white wine
1/2 cup water
1 cup skim milk
1 tablespoon flour
1 teaspoon unsaturated margarine
White pepper, salt
1 teaspoon grated Parmesan cheese
Wash scallops and cut crosswise into flat slices about 1/4 inch thick. Place mushrooms in a large skillet with 1 teaspoon margarine and lemon juice. Cover and cook 4 minutes. Add scallops, parsley, tarragon, onion, wine and water. Simmer 2 or 4 minutes until scallops are tender. Strain and return liquid to skillet and reduce to about 1/2 cup. Add milk. Heat 1 tablespoon margarine in small pan and mix in flour to make a paste. Add a little liquid to this and blend into the sauce, stirring until thick. Pepper and salt to taste.
Add scallops and mushrooms and heat. Spoon into scallop shells or individual oven-proof ramekins. Sprinkle with grated cheese and run under broiler till bubbly. Serve four and is good with a cold, dry white wine.

INNOCENT SPUD
Diet-conscious people who avoid potatoes as if they were ice cream sandwiches don't know what they're missing. A medium-sized spud, boiled, baked or pressure-cooked, provides only about 100 calories, or about as many as a large apple or an orange. That same spud contains worthwhile amounts of Vitamin C, two important B vitamins and the minerals iron, phosphorus and potassium. Naturally sauced or gratified or fried used in frying will add calories. But baked or boiled potatoes moistened with a little skim milk and seasoned with salt, pepper, herbs such as parsley and onion make delicious but low-calorie eating.

Supermart Customers Classified

NEW YORK (UPI) — An thelme Brillat-Savarin, a 19th century gastronome, had the right idea when he wrote a line that has since become a cliché: "Tell me what you are."

A supermarket survey clearly indicates that customers can be classified by the contents of their shopping carts.

One that contains many low-calorie items, foods for entertaining, fresh produce and a high percentage of beef, veal, frozen entrées, desserts, cakes and pastries is apt to have behind it a high-income customer, one of several types profiled by Progressive Grocer, a trade magazine, at seven different stores of the world's largest supermarket chain (A & P).

The study also showed that young, growing suburban families share with the high-income customer a preference for fresh produce, beef and veal, but they're also big customers for convenience foods.

NEGROES BUY BASICS

They buy a third more entrées, pot pies and dinners than their composite counterpart, and are nearly twice as likely to buy frozen pizza.

No kitchen slave, the typical young suburban housewife is pictured as an average buyer of breakfast foods but the largest buyer of toaster pastries. She also buys diet bakery items four times as often as the average shopper.

"The Negro customer has become a dynamic factor in food retailing," the magazine noted. Included in its study was a supermarket within the densely populated, predominantly black central city area of Detroit.

Many, if not most, Negro shoppers must buy necessities to basics and in general, responsive items among the basic foods. The magazine added that they rely on higher than average use of spices and special sauces to make up for less expensive main course items.

NEGROES STRESS ECONOMY

It also debunked the common belief that Negro shoppers invariably put economy second to national brand name.

It may be true of individual products, the magazine said, but "as a general rule, it just isn't so."

Blue collar shoppers, whom the magazine characterized as industrial family shoppers with no mention of either ethnic or racial heritage, showed old-fashioned tastes for meat-and-potatoes, bread-and-butter buying.

They were described as "conspicuous consumers of calorie-rich food, for which substitutes have been introduced and on which other segments of the population are presumed to be cutting down."

Yet this same group was found to be the biggest consumer of fruit and a big buyer also of fresh mushrooms. Many industrial families in the area grow their own vegetables, which cuts fresh produce sales but produces a brisk business in seasonal canning supplies.

CANDY STILL POPULAR

By contrast, middle-income apartment dwellers showed a strong preference for produce, but in small quantities because of limited storage space. They're also party people, with above average purchases of such things as cocktail franks and ingredients for canapes and appetizers.

The small-town shopper's choices included a little fresh produce, because many are either farmers or backyard gardeners. Many also buy meat in large quantities direct from small packers and slaughterers, to save in their home freezers.

Anyone longing for the good old days will find a reminder of them in high sales of candy and gum at the small town store, where generations of children traditionally have got a package of one or the other to celebrate the trip home from each Saturday's food shopping in town.

Hungarian Louisiana Yams, Pork

 "Yams" still top the list as favorites for most teenagers, youth is experimenting more with food. This makes cooking for the family much easier for the woman who likes to try something new. A new twist on a pork dish is economical since pork is still plentiful.

Modern technology has produced a leaner pork with fewer calories but still "larded" with vitamins and minerals. Another technological breakthrough allows us to buy fresh yams through the winter and mostly at the peak of harvesting in October.

The yams are "cured" in special storage bins with temperature and humidity controlled. But the salty yams and a smoked pork butt together for a Louisiana dish. This includes green and red peppers, onion, a touch of garlic and spices. Such a recipe is a departure from the traditional candied yams most think of eating when yams are mentioned.

LOUISIANA YAMS AND PORK HUNGARIAN STYLE

4 medium Louisiana yams
 1 tsp. salt
 2 lbs. smoked pork butt
 1/2 cup butter or margarine
 1/2 large green pepper, cut into strips
 1/2 large red pepper, cut into strips
 1 large onion, sliced
 1 cup chicken broth
 2 cloves garlic, minced
 1/2 tsp. ground allspice
 1/2 cup ground cloves
 1/2 cup sherry (optional)
 Cook yams, covered in boiling salted water for 15 minutes, drain, peel and cut into 1/2-inch crosswise slices. Sprinkle yams with salt.

Meanwhile, trim excess fat from pork butt; cut into 1/2-inch slices. Heat butter in skillet over medium heat; brown pork slices a few at a time on both sides. Remove pork and set aside, reserving drippings in skillet.

Cook pepper strips and onion in same skillet until tender, about 5 minutes. Brown vegetables and set aside, reserving drippings. Place yams in bottom of shallow 2-quart baking dish; top with pork slices and vegetable mixture. Add chicken broth to skillet and boil rapidly over high heat until reduced to 1/2-cup. Stir in garlic, spices and sherry; simmer gently for one minute and pour over yam mixture in baking dish. Cover and bake in 400-degree oven for 45 minutes or until yams are tender. Makes 6 servings.

Stuffed Peppers with Tomatoes
 Green Beans
 Greek Walnut Cake
 Beverage
 GREEK WALNUT CAKE

Honey Syrup is poured over the baked cake.

1/2 cup unsifted flour, stir to aerate before measuring
 1 teaspoon baking powder
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
 1/4 teaspoon cloves
 2 large eggs, separated
 1/2 cup sugar
 1/2 cups walnuts, finely chopped

Line the bottom of a square cake pan (8 by 8 by 2 inches) with wax paper; grease paper.

On another sheet of wax paper thoroughly stir together the flour, baking powder, salt, cinnamon and cloves. In a medium mixing bowl beat whites until they hold soft peaks; gradually beat in sugar until whites hold stiff straight peaks. Make a well in the center of the egg-white mixture and add yolks; gently beat to blend. Add flour mixture and walnuts; fold in. Turn into prepared pan. Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven until a cake tester inserted in center comes out clean—30 minutes. Loosen edges and turn out on a wire rack; remove paper; turn right side up onto a flat serving platter. Slowly pour the Honey Syrup over cake.

Honey Syrup: In a small saucepan over low heat stir together 1/2 cup sugar and 1 cup water until sugar is dissolved; increase heat and bring to a boil; boil gently for 10 minutes; stir in 1/2 cup honey; cool before using.

Asparagus And Ham Casserole

When the great Roman emperor, Augustus Caesar, wanted to indicate something speedy, he said: "Quicker than you can cook asparagus!"

It would be interesting to know how such a sovereign personage got near enough to the kitchen to know that the dish of cooking asparagus perfectly is to it quickly. Perhaps on a fine spring day, he found out by inquiring of his cook what made his fresh asparagus taste so good.

The fresh asparagus at your market now is not only delightful as a vegetable served for itself, but it also makes a fine casserole that is a meal-in-one dish. It's a creamy sauce combination of potatoes, fresh asparagus, sliced hard-cooked eggs and diced ham. The cook gets time off from washing so many dishes as usual the night that this is served. Everything to make a fine, nourishing dinner is all in the one casserole dish. You may want to add a salad for texture contrast and extra vitamin and minerals.

Here is a wonderful way to cook asparagus to make the most of this fresh-as-spring vegetable. It's a meal-in-one dish. Use your double boiler. In the lower part, in about 1 1/2 inches of boiling water, set the asparagus upright. Laid in serving size bunches with stems, trim the top of the double boiler and set it over the lower part like a dome. Then the more fibrous lower parts of the asparagus stalk will cook tender while the delicate tops are being steamed. Allow 15 to 20 minutes boiling time.

For a fine change of pace at mealtime, try Fresh Asparagus and Ham Casserole with the fresh green asparagus at your market now.

FRESH ASPARAGUS AND HAM CASSEROLE

2 pounds fresh asparagus, cooked
 2 medium potatoes, cooked
 4 hard-cooked eggs, sliced
 3 cups diced cooked ham
 4 tablespoons butter or margarine
 1 tablespoon flour
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1/4 teaspoon pepper
 1/4 teaspoon dry mustard
 1/4 cup soft bread crumbs

Place layer of cooked asparagus in bottom of 2 quart casserole. Silver cooked potatoes and place over asparagus. Cover with alternating layers of sliced hard-cooked eggs, diced ham and remaining cooked asparagus. Melt 4 tablespoons of the butter in a saucepan. Blend in flour, butter, then with remaining 2 tablespoons butter, mix with bread crumbs and sprinkle over the top. Bake in a 375 degree oven 30 to 25 minutes or until crumbs are brown. Makes 4 servings.

An old-fashioned dish that is still worth making.

2 pounds (6 medium) potatoes, pared and sliced 1/4-inch thick
 3 cups cooked ham strips
 Thin White Sauce, see below
 1/4 cup fine dry bread crumbs
 1/4 cup grated cheddar cheese
 In a 2-quart oblong glass baking dish (11 1/2 by 7 1/2 by 1 1/2 inches) or similar utensil spread about 1/3rd of the potatoes; add half the ham; spread with another 1/3rd of the potatoes; add remaining ham, then remaining potatoes. Pour the sauce over the top; sprinkle it run down. Mix crumbs with butter, then with cheese; sprinkle over top. Bake, uncovered, in a preheated 350-degree oven until potatoes are tender and topping is golden-brown—about 1 1/2 hours. Makes 4 servings.

Thin White Sauce: Over low heat melt 3 tablespoons butter and stir in 3 tablespoons flour; gradually stir in 3 cups milk, keeping smooth. Add 1/4 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Cook, stirring constantly, until thickened and bubbly.

It Takes Some Doing To Bake Good Napoleons

 My mother and her friends years ago, used to make a special distinction. Any number of women might be called good cooks. But only rarely was someone designated "a good baker." To be a really fine baker was considered a special art. I was reminded of this amusing use of the word "bake" when my helper in testing recipes turned out Napoleons—those puff-paste delicacies filled with creamy custard, covered with white frosting and given

drawn markings of chocolate or "good bake" upon her. Believe me, it takes some doing to make Napoleons. But worthwhile if you enjoy turning your hand to a complicated but supreme dessert. Here is the recipe with which success was attained at our house.

NAPOLEONS
 1½ sticks (¾ cup) butter or margarine
 1½ cups sifted flour
 1 tablespoon butter or margarine
 ¼ cup ice water

2 teaspoons white vinegar
 Cream Filling: Sugar Glaze, Confectioners' Sugar Glaze, Chocolate Glaze, see below
 To Assemble Napoleons, see below

Slice the 1½ sticks butter into ¼-inch pats. Draw an 8 by 6 inch rectangle on a sheet of wax paper. Lay the butter pats with in the rectangle; press and shape them together, distributing butter evenly, to form one dough. Carefully fold margins edges over butter then fold edges over dough over to enclose butter completely. Press lightly around edges. Roll dough to an 18 by 8-inch rectangle, then fold short side parallel to table edge, roll to a 14 by 6-inch rectangle. With floured sharp knife, trim edges neatly. Fold dough in half, then lift to ungreased cookie sheet; unfold. Chill in refrigerator 30 minutes. Preheat oven until golden brown—15 to 20 minutes. Cool completely before assembling Napoleons. Meanwhile prepare Cream Filling, Confectioners' Sugar Glaze and Chocolate Glaze.

Cream Filling. In top of double boiler, mix together ¼ cup sugar and 2 tablespoons cornstarch. Stir in 3 slightly beaten egg yolks and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Gradually stir in 1½ cups milk. Cook over boiling water, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens—about 5 to 8 minutes. Remove from heat, cover and cool to room temperature. Fold 1 cup heavy cream, whipped, into cooled custard.

To Assemble Napoleons: Frost top of 1 pastry rectangle with Confectioners' Sugar Glaze and Chocolate Glaze.

Glaze. Pipe on Chocolate Glaze in crosswise lines 1 inch apart. With a toothpick or tip of knife quickly draw lengthwise lines 1 inch apart through Chocolate Glaze to form chevron markings. Set aside decorated pastry rectangle. Spread about 1 cup Cream Filling on one of three remaining rectangles; cover with second rectangle. Continue assembling layers, using all filling and ending with decorated rectangle. Chill in refrigerator at least 1 hour before serving. Cut crosswise into 10 slices.

Barbecued Spareribs Coming Up

 Once prepared mustard appeared chiefly at the dining table, but nowadays it does duty both in the dining room and in the kitchen as a recipe ingredient.

Today, for example, cooks are likely to use prepared mustard in barbecue sauces for spareribs. One of the newest of these sauces came our way recently and when we tried it, we found it a very good taste.

BARBECUED SPARERIBS
 4 pounds fresh pork spareribs, cut into 1 rib portions
 ½ cup spicy brown prepared mustard
 ½ cup catchup
 1 cup canned pineapple juice
 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
 ½ teaspoon garlic powder

On a rack in a large shallow roasting pan place spareribs, meaty side up. Bake, uncovered, in a preheated 350 degree oven for 1 hour.

Meanwhile in a small bowl, with a fork thoroughly beat together the mustard, catchup, pineapple juice, Worcestershire sauce and garlic powder.

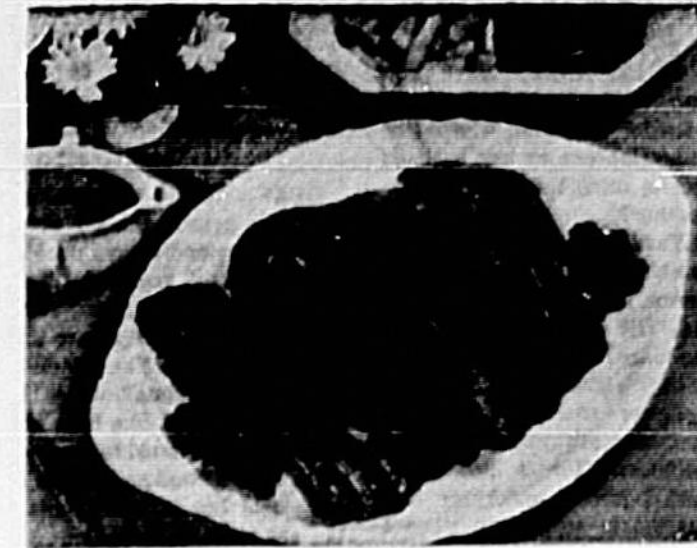
Remove ribs and rack; pour off fat in pan. Return ribs meaty side up to pan without rack. Spoon half the mustard mixture over them.

Return to 350-degree oven and bake, uncovered, for ½ hour. Shake pan and sauce remaining mustard mixture over ribs. Continue to bake, uncovered, in

350-degree oven until tender—about ½ hour longer, during this last half-hour shake pan and baste ribs every 10 minutes.

Makes 6 servings.

BREAKFAST OR BRUNCH
 Here's a good breakfast or brunch special. Combine ½ cup each of butter and firmly packed brown sugar and 1 tablespoon of light corn syrup; bring to a boil in saucepan, stirring constantly. Pour into 3½ cup ring mold or a 9 by 5-inch loaf pan and tilt to coat sides and bottom. Sprinkle with ½ cup of chopped toasted filberts. Prepare rolled biscuits from a mix, using 2½ cups mix and ¼ cup of milk. Stand biscuits on sides and place around the ring pan or in two rows in loaf pan. Bake in preheated 375-degree oven 30 to 40 minutes, or until biscuits are well browned. Invert onto serving plate, let stand 5 minutes, then remove pan. Makes 4 servings.

You should learn to play Stayman in response to a two no trump opening the same way you use it in response to one no trump. In this case, the club response is critical and asks partner to bid three of a four-card major if he holds one.

The major difference is that after a two no-trump opening and Stayman response the partnership is committed to game.

Like all conventions no guarantee goes with it. Without Stayman, North would simply raise to three no-trump. South would be looking at eight top tricks and at some stage of play he would lead a club toward his hand and score the ninth trick with his king.

Social Security Up

WASHINGTON (AP)—Congress has handed the Nixon administration a powerful catalyst to ignite the nation's economic, boosting Social Security benefits for 28 million Americans who usually spend instead of save.

The 10-per-cent across-the-board increase in benefits, retroactive to Jan. 1, will pump \$2.6 billion into the pockets of persons on limited incomes.

The increases were tied to a bill raising the national debt limit to a record \$3 billion to \$43 billion.

As President Nixon prepared to sign the measure today, the nation's economy was in a sluggish state, failing to respond to the fiscal and monetary policies he has put into effect.

The economic thrust of the Social Security bill will be far-reaching. The extra money, as one economic expert put it, "will go to a lot of people who will be forced to scrimp."

It will be June before the Social Security administration includes the new benefits in pay checks.

Nixon had asked Congress to increase Social Security benefits by 6 per cent, a proposal that would have put millions into the hands of retired persons this year the lawmakers opted for the 10 per cent hike.

The president proposed raising the income base on which taxes are paid from \$7,000 to \$8,000, an effective tax increase of \$2.3 billion.

Congress, following advice of federal Reserve Board Chairman Arthur F. Burns and private economists, postponed the tax increase until next June 1.

In 1970, consumer savings exceeded 7 per cent of disposable personal income, extremely high by historical standards.

The administration had predicted the savings rate would come down as the economy expands. The Social Security rise could help lead the way.

The administration's economic target is a 4 per cent increase in output of goods and services this year relies heavily on a sharp expansion in the money supply by the independent Federal Reserve Board.

The board has expressed resistance to expand the money supply as fast as Nixon wants and has talked instead of new fiscal measures, such as the Social Security rise, to give the economy an additional thrust.

Thomas E. Dewey Expires At 68

MIAMI BEACH (UPI)—Thomas E. Dewey, crime-busting attorney, three times governor of New York and twice unsuccessful Republican presidential candidate, died Tuesday of a heart attack. He would have been 69 March 24.

His body was to be flown to New York today for funeral services. The cause of death was listed as a heart attack, although the full autopsy report would not be released until later today.

Dewey had planned to attend a White House dinner Tuesday night and a St. Patrick's Day celebration today. President Nixon held a moment of silence at the dinner in honor of Dewey.

A balloon at the Seaview Hotel flew his body face up on a bed in his hotel room. The Jayvees hallow way to the room when Dewey failed to appear as chauffeur-driver limousine which was to take him to the airport. Dewey's luggage was packed on the bed beside him.

Guatemala Fighting Terrorists

GUATEMALA (AP)—This country has entered the fifth month of a state of siege decreed in an attempt to fight subversive groups.

Violence has not subsided but President Carlos Arana Osorio's government shows strong signs of survival.

It is starting a series of development programs aimed at increasing industry, attracting foreign investment and stabilizing the economy.

Arana Osorio was elected in February 1970 with the support of political groups from center and right. He took office last July and promised to pacify the country's civil war.

Last April the West German ambassador Count Karl von Spreti, was killed by the leftist Rebel Armed Forces when the government rejected its demands for an immediate end to the state of siege begun in November, with suspension of constitutional guarantees. There have been 10 political assassinations, several kidnappings and scores of other terrorist acts carried out by extremist groups from both left and right.

After Loch Haven ceremony the group will walk across the street to replace the original bronze markers.

Senator C. O. Andrews was the first United States Senator from Orlando. His son was president of the Orlando Jaycees in 1944. President Harry Truman originally dedicated "the causeway" on March 8, 1949. Recently The Hubbard Construction Company has completed the widening and retainting of the road.

Support Of Canal Urged Of Solons

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Florida members of Congress were urged Wednesday by Jack Lucas, president of the Florida Waterways Association, to telegraph Gov. Reubin Askew requesting that \$10 million be allocated to preserve and protect the Cross-State barge canal project rendered to date.

The request to the Florida Congressional delegation was made at a luncheon for Florida delegates to the National Rivers and Harbors Congress, now underway.

Congressman Robert Sikes stated that only one state had been heard and considered regarding the state canal and that those in a position to provide economic, legal, and conservation information from those supporting the Cross-State barge canal have been ignored by the administration. He stated that "we could expect that other Florida projects could be next to be eliminated."

U. S. Gov. Tom Adams defended Randolph Hodges' past decisions and actions. He felt that Hodges was the unfair focal point for criticism that should be shared by the Florida Cabinet.

Adams urged the delegation to rededicate themselves to improvement to create a harmonious environment with nature. Adams predicted that halting of the Cross-State canal was the first step in initiating the "domestic domino effect of other projects."

Death Weapon Is Identified In Maynard Powell Murder

The trial of Sylvia Powell, charged with first degree murder in the death of her husband, Maynard Powell, literally dragged into its fourth day. The proceedings have been interrupted by intermittent recesses, and testimony is essentially a rebash of the trial of Henry Joyce, convicted of first degree murder in the same incident and sentenced to life imprisonment. The atmosphere in the courtroom is such that most spectators and court attaches appear to have difficulty in remaining awake.

This morning, following testimony of ballistics expert Don Champagne, State Attorney Abbott Herring called Robert Borem to the stand.

Borem sold the 38 caliber Rem-Revolver to Joyce. Borem did not answer the ballistics call and could not be located. Herring then called Joseph Pratt, a close friend and guest of the deceased at the time of his demise. Pratt, also, was not on hand and a recess was called, which was in progress at press time. However, both witnesses were located.

Herring finally succeeded in having the Rem-Revolver placed into evidence this morning after unsuccessful attempts yesterday. Also entered in evidence were the projectile which killed Powell and the expended cartridge case.

Champagne testified that he had conducted ballistics tests upon the evidence and found that the projectile was fired from the revolver, as was the expended cartridge case.

Under cross examination, the witness testified that the fatal shot, as indicated from an examination of the decedent's shirt and under shirt, was fired from a distance greater than four feet. He said that the bullet hole was eight inches from the side seam of the shirt in the left back area.

Yesterday afternoon 11 L. J. Kriz testified that there were two sets of footprints at the death scene and that a cast made of these indicated a size 10 1/2 shoe with a pointed toe. He indicated Mrs. Powell's willingness to cooperate with the sheriff's department in testimony given on Sept. 27, 1969, and Oct. 21, 1970.

L. Kriz, upon cross examination, admitted to defense attorney Wendell Harris that Billy Estep, who was the messenger for the love letters exchanged between Joyce and Mrs. Powell, was no longer a jail trustee, although still incarcerated. Harris questioned about the implication that Estep was an informer and queried if Estep received small bits of freedom in compensation for his assistance.

Carl J. Q. Galway testified as to finding the empty 38 caliber in Joyce's trouser pocket. Harris has a "fuzzy" pleasing personality which is making an apparent impression on everyone. He asked Captain Galway, "Do you mind if I call you (Continued on Page 2A, Col. 3)

County Supports City Zoo With Offer Of Facility Site

The Sanford zoo committee set up by the City Commission to plan for the relocation and operation of the Sanford Municipal Zoo, stated to be phased out Sept. 30 due to a lack of city funds, has an alternative if present plans to cooperate with the city to relocate on a new 42-acre site are not successful.

This was proposed at Wednesday night's zoo committee meeting by Seminole County Commissioners Sidney Vihlen Jr. and Al Davis, who outlined a regional Central Florida zoo at a 52-acre site in the proposed Monroe Park, just one-half mile outside Sanford on U. S. 17-92, adjacent to the St. Johns River.

Vihlen and Davis, accompanied by David Farr, county planner, and Martin Gainer, county administrative assistant, explained the county intends to purchase the property from the present land owners as part of the \$1.6 million bond issue approved in November by voters to establish six county parks.

Vihlen estimated the approximate price at \$160,000, of which 30 of the 52 acres could be used for the zoo, the rest for the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) would participate in the amount of 50 per cent matching funds for a 30-acre limit.

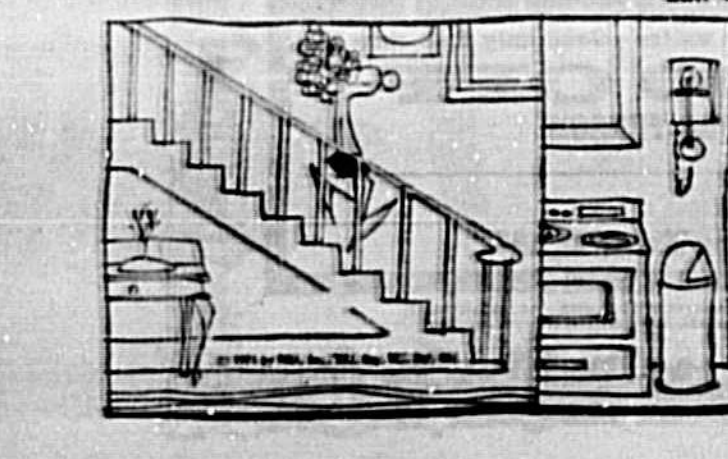
