

Biggest In So. Florida Car Theft Ring Broken

MIAMI (AP) — Thirty men in three states and Puerto Rico were arrested today in a pre-dawn raid which cracked the largest auto theft ring that has ever operated in south Florida, the FBI announced.

The arrests in New York, New Jersey, Florida and Puerto Rico climaxed a five-month investigation which also resulted in the recovery of 43 automobiles valued at \$75,000 said Kenneth Whittaker, special agent in charge of the Miami FBI.

U.S. Atty. Robert Rust said 43 persons were named last Friday in a sealed federal grand jury indictment returned here. Those arrested were charged with interstate transportation of stolen motor vehicles, receiving, concealing, storing, harboring or disposing of the vehicles, or conspiracy to commit the various offenses.

Rust said the 30 arrested would be afforded bond hearings before a U.S. magistrate later today.

Conviction under any of the charges carries a five-year prison term, or a \$5,000 fine or both on each count of the indictment, Rust said. A conspiracy conviction provides for imprisonment of up to five years or a \$10,000 fine, or both.

Many of the alleged ring members were employed in automobile sales, service, junkyards or related occupations, Whittaker said. Wrecked cars were purchased in New Jersey and Florida from junk yards, insurance companies and auto rental companies, Whittaker said, to obtain vehicle identification plates, license tags and titles.

Then identical vehicles were stolen and sold under the titles, tags and plates of the wrecked car, the agent said.

CAP Will Fight Airport Eviction

Civil Air Patrol (CAP) squadron stationed at Sanford Airport has requested time on tonight's Sanford City Commission agenda. This was disclosed this morning by City Manager W. E. Knowles, who said the CAP commander, Don Knight, had dispatched a note to city hall today asking that the Commission hear a CAP delegation.

Presumably the CAP will answer charges made before the Commission July 26 when it voted to evict the air group from airport building 17.

The action that precipitated the eviction notice came after J. S. (Red) Cleveland, airport manager, advised the Commission of the problems he had experienced in dealing with the squadron.

Cleveland in a July 16 letter to Captain Knight, said someone had entered a building adjacent to the CAP structure and removed portions of tile from the ceiling. Cleveland stated, "I now find the same kind of the cut-up and nailed to the ceiling of the building occupied by the CAP."

The airport manager stated he previously had asked that CAP control the actions of its members; keeping them out of other airport buildings, and discontinuing taking materials and equipment of others.

Captain Knight has taken the position that Cleveland should furnish proof that a CAP member was responsible for the tile loss.

Knight is expected to explain the CAP's situation regarding the charges leveled against it at tonight's session.

For Seminole Students School Dress Codes Listed

Students entering Seminole County elementary, middle and high schools on Sept. 7 for the Fall term will be required to adhere to the following dress codes, depending on the grade entered.

ELEMENTARY
Each primary will form a group including parents, students and teachers to develop a dress code to suit the school.

Share this preliminary code with all students and parents via "print-out."

Recognize for the purpose of discussing parent and child reaction.

Establish dress code.
Submit in writing the established dress code to Seminole County, District School Board.

MIDDLE SCHOOL
A reasonable regulation concerning dress, hair style and cleanliness will stress that regulation is vital not only to the individual student but also to those with whom he shares a classroom or locker.

Students should not wear clothing or hair styles that can be hazardous to them in their school activities such as shop, lab work, physical education and art.

Grooming and dress which prevent the student from doing his best work because of blocked vision or restricted movement should be discouraged, as should be dress styles that create, or are likely to create, a disruption of classroom order.

Articles of clothing that cause excessive maintenance problems, for example, cleats on boots, shoes that scratch floors and trousers with metal rivets that scratch desks, are to be unacceptable.

Each individual school has the privilege of making whatever specific interpretations of this plan as will be warranted in their own circumstances.

HIGH SCHOOL
High school students are expected to be neat, clean and well groomed.

All girls will wear brassieres. Tank tops or muscle shirts will not be worn at school.

No see-through clothing will be worn by either male or female without proper undergarments.

Midriff blouses, bareback dresses, short shorts, excessive short skirts without shorts under them, hot pants, or cut-offs will not be worn to school.

Boys may wear mustaches, sideburns and beards, as long as they are well groomed.

Dress and hair will be worn or arranged so as to facilitate safety. Length of hair will be left to personal choice, as long as it is clean and well groomed.

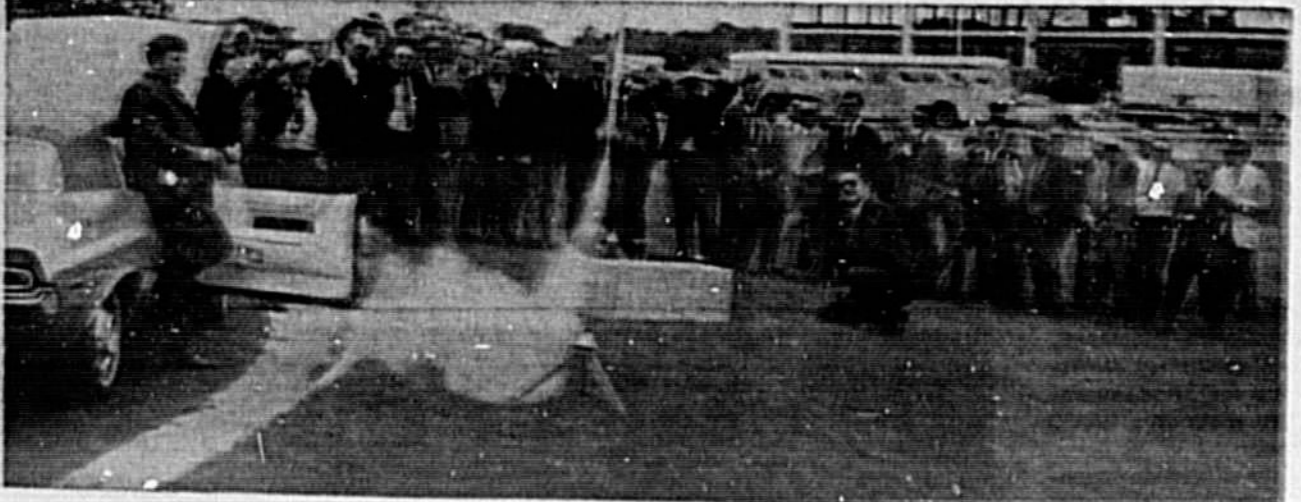

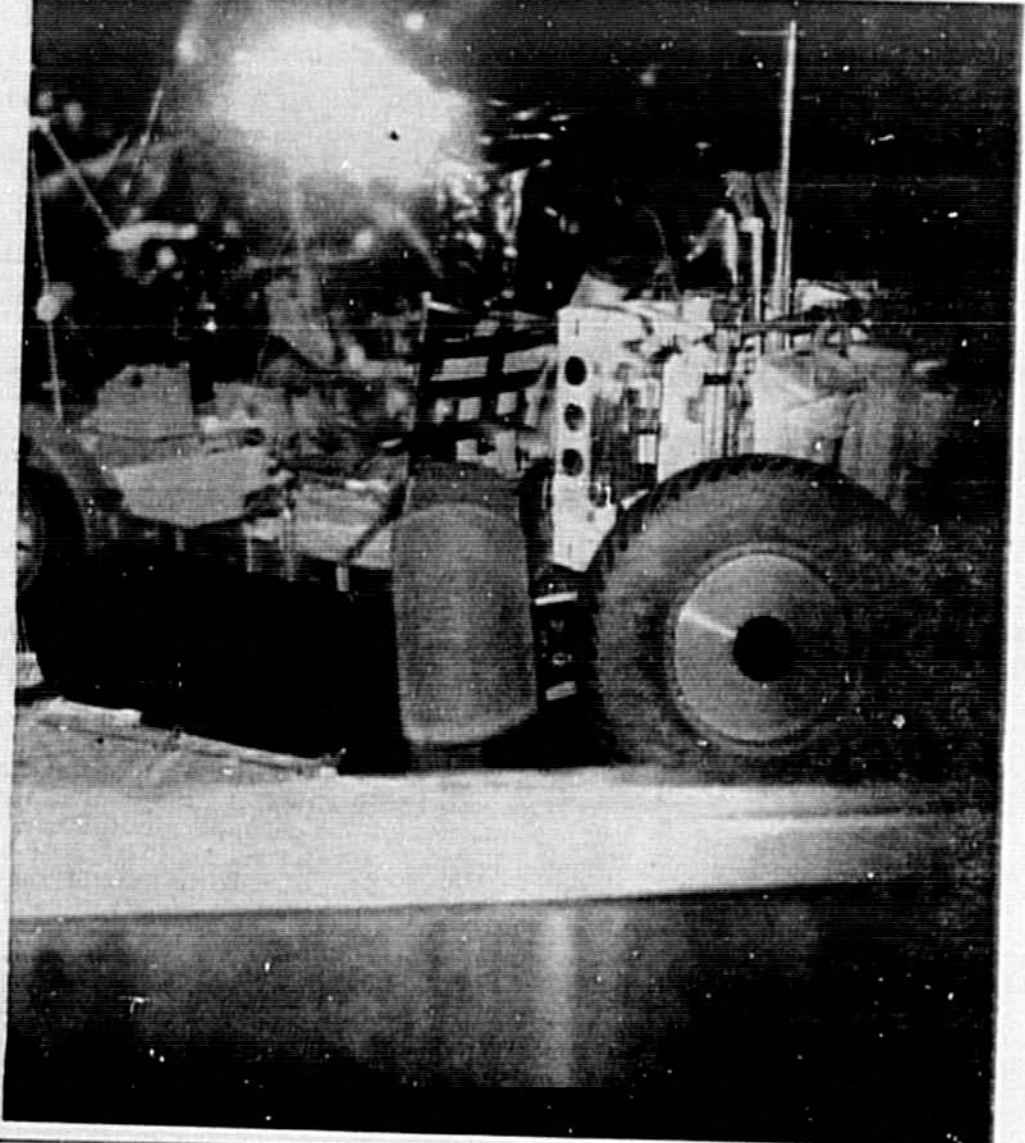

It's Rainy Season... But Sun Shines

MIAMI (AP)—In case you've forgotten, this is Florida's rainy season, but sunshine seems the order of the day.

"It has been an extremely dry season," said Glenn Taylor, weatherman for the National Weather Service, "and we are in an unusually dry year. There is no doubt we have a bad drought."

The months-long drought which turned the parched Everglades into fire-swept plains was never really broken by the recent rains.

Water tables in the Everglades are 64 per cent normal in the central portions and 55 per cent down in the southern section.

Lake Okechobee—the main water source for the heavily populated Gold Coast—is minus some 226 billion gallons of water, says Ken Hawman, public information officer for the Central and South Florida Flood Control District.

Hawman says said that the drought needs of the entire southeast Florida coast from Stuart to Miami for one year."

Flood control officials say rainfall levels this year are 10 inches below normal, and if the dry spell lingers beyond August, the next months will have larger and larger deficits.

Altamonte Construction Reaches New Record

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — End of the first seven months of 1971 saw record levels of new construction continue in the city close to the \$8 million mark.

July alone had building permits issued for structures valued at \$1,177,000. Biggest month, however, was May with permits for value of \$3,083,641 issued.

Construction has been centering on industrial and commercial complexes as well as residential units.

July had 28 homes for \$801,700 and three industrial buildings valued at \$321,000; June 22 homes at \$292,000, two warehouses at \$60,000 and other incidentals for total of \$1,087,200; May — three homes \$92,500, the new Florida Hospital North \$2,890,000 and other construction for total of \$3,083,641.

April had total of \$332,190 in new construction with 11 single family units at \$235,000, one professional building \$150,000 and one warehouse, \$24,000; March — \$214,000 for 11 single family units \$184,400 and others; February — \$761,400 for four homes, \$80,000, and the Windmeadows condominium \$650,000 while January had a total of \$91,700 which included 8 single family homes \$192,400, a professional building \$310,000 and a savings and loan for \$419,000.

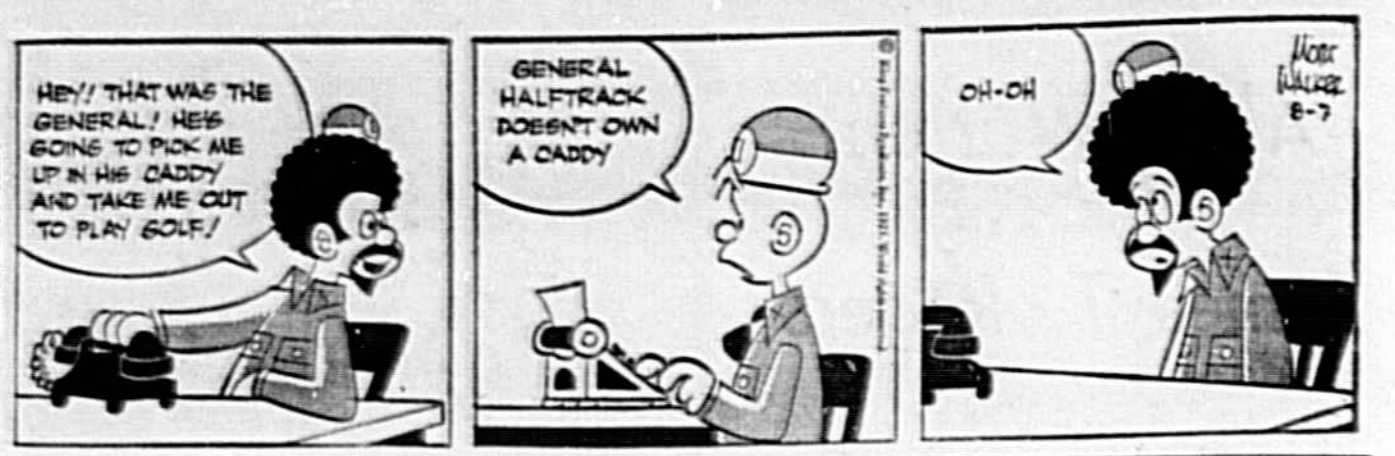

Veteran Assists Indians

DETROIT (AP) — Overcoming the Vietnam war injury that took his left leg, husky Blackfoot Indian John Gobert has blazed a trail bringing health services to the Indians in the isolated village of Supai, 2,400 feet below the rim of the Grand Canyon.

After 10 months in a Naval hospital learning to walk on a false leg, Gobert returned to civilian life in 1960. He took a pioneering assignment with the U.S. Indian Health Service in Arizona. The job was to bring medical care and public health services to the 300 Havasupai Indians living in almost complete isolation down the steep cliffs of the Grand Canyon.

After hurriedly taking courses from the U.S. Public Health Service at Phoenix, Gobert spent eight months in help he could not arrange to help the Indians. He was the first to bring medical help to the isolated tribe in the western part of the nation.

A preview of things to come: High speed rail transportation between Daytona Beach and Tampa, via Sanford (maybe). The preview will come Saturday morning when a high-speed TurboTrain passes through to acquaint the public with the modern transportation train.
