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MacArthur's Troops Smash Enemy Lines In Surprise Attack

Allied Planes Over Raangoon Down 21 Japanese Craft; British Hang On

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24. (AP)—General Douglas MacArthur, and his fighting force won special attention from Congress today. They won't have in the income tax returns of the Philippines on Dec. 15. A Joint Senate-House conference approved the bill for fighters in the Philippines.

The return and payments, however, must be made when the war ends.

An Associated Press bulletin from Gen. Douglas MacArthur's headquarters in the Philippines today reported American and Filipino troops launched a surprise attack and hurled the Japanese invaders back several kilometers on the Bataan peninsula.

This was the most sizeable advance by Gen. MacArthur's beleaguered defenders since they were driven into the Bataan mountain wilderness nearly two months ago.

Fighting still is in progress. A War Department spokesman here advised newsmen to "make your own interpretation" of the reports.

There was no suggestion, however, that reinforcements were near arrival.

Allied fighter planes today shot down 21 Japanese raiders in battles for control of the air.

The Japanese reported that they had lost 21 fighters and 10 bombers.

British demolition squads continued their destruction of vital Raangoon installations.

The Japanese northern offensive against the British in the direction of India, was said to have begun last week from China.

The Japanese base 80 miles inside Thailand from the Burmese border.

Raangoon communications broadcast by the All-India announced that British-Indian-American volunteer forces had taken a terrific toll on the Japanese air force.

20 planes destroyed and seven were probably downed yesterday.

That the Japanese were lagging in behind the Allies was a stand against the Japanese army, estimated at 10,000.

British Announce Nazi Battleships Are Out of Action

An official British announcement today said that the German battleships, Scharnhorst and Gneisenau, and the cruiser, Prinz Eugen, are severely damaged and are being held in the English Channel.

The Red Army's strangulation of a German army trapped in the Bataan-Russia area appeared today to be the first stage of a maneuver aimed at trapping all Nazi forces in the bloody northwestern corner of Russia.

The Russians declared they had defeated the reserves which the Nazis are hurrying into the flaming battle of the Staraya Russia area, where the Soviet ring of destruction closed tighter upon the survivors of the smoldered German 16th army.

The German-Fascist forces are suffering great losses in manpower and equipment, today's communiqué said. "During" Feb. 25 our troops continued to advance and occupied a number of populated places.

A Russian dispatch dated Staraya Russia—indicating Red army possession of the strategically-located town itself—said the most furious fighting was continuing.

It intimated that new developments were imminent, after the smashing of the 16th German field army and the slaughter of 12,000 Nazis in a bloody trap about Lake Ima, some 140 miles south of Leningrad.

Staraya Russia in peacetime is only a summer resort, but militarily it was very as the springboard for many-phased operations.

Its capture means not only the thousands of German now being committed to the Leningrad outpost, from this base operations are possible to cut off all the Nazi armies north of Lake Ima to the Estonian shores of the Gulf of Finland.

The Red army's advance was carried out with the utmost of stealth in one case Red army units marched 27 miles in a single night without having to fire a shot.

The German army fighting here and elsewhere in large reserve, Russian dispatches said, are an effort to stop the push which is enveloping the Red army.

Meanwhile the Russians have lost more than 1,000 killed and several times that number in wounded in the capture of the town.

Jap Ships Have Been Hit Hard, Washington Says

At Present Rate, Sea Power Of Foe Will Be Doomed In Year

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25. (AP)—Such tremendous blows have been dealt to Japan's navy and merchant marine that if the rate of destruction continues for one year, the ever-vital ocean will be sealed, United States Naval officials disclosed last night.

This authoritative word was given to reporters after the navy disclosed officially that it had sent 53 Japanese naval and merchant vessels to the bottom since Dec. 10.

It also said in passing that it has good reason to believe that three more enemy submarines have been sunk by United States Navy forces in the Atlantic theater, and four damaged.

This brings the total ships sunk or damaged by the navy in that ocean since the war began at 21, inasmuch as Secretary Knox had declared on Dec. 21 that 14 had either been sent to the bottom or hit.

Mr. Knox, in mentioning the figure of 53 Jap ships sunk since Dec. 10, added that the navy believed it had sunk more and damaged five. Nor was this the whole picture.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25. (AP)—Three brigadier generals, including Joseph H. Hutchison, infantry, Camp Blending, were among the first graduating class of a 12-day course in motor transport operation and maintenance at the Hamilton, Md. Quartermaster Corps Motor Transport School, the War Department announced Wednesday.

The officers were required to do repair work and to learn what repairs could be made in the field in case of sending motorized equipment to shops in the rear for overhaul. As part of their instruction, they were required to drive 100-ton trucks in a motor convoy through the streets of Baltimore.

Similar courses are in progress at motor transport schools in Atlanta, Ga., and San Antonio, Texas, the Department said, and a fourth will be started soon at Stockton, Calif.

Price Control On Pork, Beef Likely

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25. (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Wickard said Wednesday recent advances in prices of hogs and beef cattle brought the government face to face with the necessity of instituting price controls.

Prices of these farm products are high enough to be a great concern.

Mr. Wickard said the position of price controls on prices of hogs and cattle as authorized under the recently enacted price control law had been discussed with Price Administrator Leon Keyserling.

Mr. Keyserling said he would be making a study of the price administration.

Hit 2 Transports And 2 Other Vessels; Japanese Gain In Sumatra

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26. (AP)—Secretary of War Stimson asserted today the United States are making "massive" efforts to defend the Netherlands Indies, and had inflicted heavy losses on the enemy which he said the Japanese had not disclosed.

He added the United States is "losing every bit of aid possible."

American submarines torpedoed two enemy transports, an auxiliary ship and a freighter in attacks in the past 48 hours on the Japanese sea-borne invasion forces in Dutch East Indies waters.

The Dutch Indies headquarters also listed a Japanese warship, one of a squadron as "presumed" to be hit.

The Dutch acknowledged the Japanese have reached the narrow Sunda Strait across from Java in a drive down Sumatra, India naval forces bombed Japanese held Oosthaven, a southern Sumatra port.

Japanese bombers raided the Sumatra naval base and airbase in western Java. The Dutch reported continued fierce fighting on Celebes, acknowledging the Japanese capture of Sinkang, western Borneo, and the island of Bangka, off Sumatra.

At Oosthaven, the Japanese announced last night that they had strengthened now was completely controlled and declared that "considerable reinforcements" were urgently needed.

The Japanese occupation of Bati and Timor, a spokesman said, was completed, the encirclement of Java by cutting off its communications with Australia.

"On the other hand," he added, "the overall aspect of the situation is that the Japanese are spread over a large area. It will be possible to obtain local superiority and wipe out the Japanese invasion forces."

What with rubber, tin, tea and copper already scarce and disappearing and coffee apt to be scarce for the first time in our history, we are on the rest of the world for certain commodities.

Don't Fool The Public

What strikes us as a very mysterious thing happened on the Pacific coast night before last.

An "object," otherwise identified as a blimp or balloon was sighted moving slowly down the California coast in the neighborhood of Los Angeles. Apparently it proceeded leisurely some 25 miles in the direction of San Diego, looked the situation over calmly for some 25 minutes or more and then retired.

An alert was sounded. A blackout was ordered. Anti-aircraft guns went into action. A squadron of interceptor planes took off. And for about four hours southern California was treated to a pretty good first hand demonstration of what war is really like. One person died from a heart attack and three others were killed in blackout accidents.

But yesterday Secretary Knox said there was no "positive evidence" of any enemy planes having been in the vicinity. Army headquarters admitted there had been a blackout, something which must have been fairly obvious to residents in that area, particularly to those killed in accidents. But in general nobody seems to know what happened or why.

It hardly seems possible that an enemy dirigible could remain in the air anywhere near Los Angeles for 25 minutes or more and not be shot down either by anti-aircraft guns or interceptor planes. Enemy planes could have been in that area and gotten away, but it is not likely that even the Japs would subject themselves to such hazards without dropping any bombs, or just for the fun of it.

It is conceivable that the Army was conducting a realistic test of anti-aircraft batteries and civilian defenses. It has been suggested that an Army blimp might have been towing a target for anti-aircraft gunners to shoot at in order to get in some night practice. No doubt some such maneuvers are worthwhile in order to get ready for the real thing.

We believe, however, that the public interest will be better served under such circumstances if the people are fully advised as to the facts. If a practice blackout is to be held, the public should be warned beforehand. If anti-aircraft practice is to be engaged in there is nothing to be gained by allowing the public to believe it is the real thing.

And on the other hand, if enemy planes or dirigibles have appeared over the California coast, or anywhere else in this country, the public should be fully and truthfully advised immediately.

Peanut Boom

The Federal Government wants the South to produce a much greater volume of peanuts in order to supply oil needed in connection with defense.

The South's total acreage last year was 1,900,000, and now the Government is urging that the total for the next crop be increased to 5,000,000 acres. Steps have already been taken to have the Government release 60,000 tons of seed peanuts.

Peanuts sold to Government agencies for crushing will not be taxed. Florida farmers should investigate this situation with a view to planting their share of peanuts. It is an opportunity to plant with a market already in sight, and the demand for peanut oil is expected to become increasingly heavy.—Lakeland Ledger.

Milk Surplus Faces Florida Producers

MIAMI, Feb. 26.—(Special)—There is a possibility that some Florida milk producers may be faced with the problem of disposing of surplus milk, said H. L. Mosberger, chairman of the Research Section of the Agricultural Division of the Florida State Chamber of Commerce, here today. Milk is a valuable ingredient in poultry rations, it may be dried and used in the form of dried milk, according to advice received from N. R. Maharaj, poultry husbandman of the agricultural experiment station at Gainesville. Skim milk and buttermilk are most often used, he stated. Dr. E. L. Fouts, dairy technologist of the agricultural experiment station, advised that surplus milk should be concentrated so that it can be stored and its use distributed over a considerable period of time. Milk drying equipment seems to offer the best means of concentrating this product, Dr. Fouts said, and should be located near the source of supply. He advised that skim milk be used as the cream can readily be disposed of as bottle cream or in ice cream mixes.



"Chew Up A Set Of Rubber Auto Tires"

FALT LAKE CITY, Feb. 26. (AP)—Rubber that grows on the tree but wears out of the teeth of a strong set of teeth—and persistence unlimited. John E. Heppner, an old timer who says he's been chewing the rubber from rabbit brush for 65 years, recommends that anyone try to gnaw out enough for a set of tires, however. Heppner and his childhood playmates did it this way out in Beaver county, Utah, about 1877. They stripped the bark from stalks of rabbit brush, then carefully scraped off a thin, sweet-smelling inner bark. It is they chewed, until it became a pulpy mass. Small bits of rubber about the size of a wheat kernel can be extracted from the pulp. "After several hours of chewing a boy would have a small handful of pure rubber which, when heated, was used to toughen bowstrings," says Mr. Heppner. "We also used the stuff for chewing gum."

Hit Andaman Island; Nips Delay All-Out Drive For Rangoon, Vital Burma Road

Japanese warplanes made their first attack in Indian territory on the vital United Nations supply route to China and Russia today in the Far Pacific as A-119 bombers widened their counter-offensive assaults.

Japanese bombers today carried the war to Indian territory for the first time by raiding Port Blair on the Andaman Islands, 350 miles southwest of Rangoon between Burma and India. No land change in Burma was reported.

A temporary breathing spell on the Burma front today delayed an expected all-out Japanese drive for Rangoon and the vital Burma Road.

The new disposition of enemy troops along the last natural barrier to Rangoon, 60 to 70 miles above the city, was considered most threatening. Military experts here said it would compel the British and Indian defenders to disperse their already outnumbered and battle-cut battalions now defending the west bank of the Sittoung near the river's mouth.

When their reinforcements arrive from Singapore, the Japanese are expected to launch a simultaneous attack on the city and at the river's mouth in an attempt to encircle and smother the smouldering capital and its defenders.

The present lull in ground fighting is regarded as evidence that the Japanese suffered heavy losses in the attack. The British across the Isthmus said they now are awaiting fresh troops.

Of Britain's chances of holding Rangoon, London took a gloomy view. They said a lot depends on the Chinese, but there was no official evidence that Chiang Kai-shek's troops were yet in position or strength to divert the Japanese drive on the coast, now executed by virtually all civilians, glow with the fire of British "searched earth" demolitions and its sea approaches mined.

State Sales of Gasoline Fall Off 15 Percent

TALLAHASSEE, Feb. 27. (AP) The rationing and curtailment of joy riding in Florida last month cut the State's gasoline sales and tax collections 15 percent below the corresponding month last year, and Governor Holland said he expected a further drop in February.

"If it doesn't get any worse than 15 percent, we'll be happy," the Governor commented. "I'm pleased to see that it was no greater than it was in January. I don't expect the maximum has been reached yet."

"The reduction will have to be considerably more than that to endanger the general program of road construction and maintenance and retirement of highway bonds, for which the bulk of gasoline receipts are used."

From January, the State collected \$3,372,418 in January, as compared with \$2,784,577 a year ago.

Governor Holland said that although he expected further decreases during the tourist season, "the percentage of reduction should be small in the summer and fall" when the State's roads again are traveled mainly by residents.

He pointed out that a great part of the 1942 road construction will be on military highways which will be built with Federal aid and will not be such a drain on State revenues.

He said he had not determined where the danger point would be reached in financing of highway bond debts, but it will have to be moved from 15 percent reduction to 20 percent reduction.
