2 Army B-29s Crash Killing 17 Crewmen

Another B-29 Down In Atlantic Near Bermuda Is Missing With 20 On Board

Two superfortresses crashed in California and a third B-29 was missing in the Atlantic as troubles dogged military type planes in one of the worst 24 hour peacetime periods for such aircraft.

The death toll stood at seven with 31 missing.

Only four men survived when two Air Force superfortresses collided and crashed near Stockton, Calif., last night.

Seven of their companions were found dead in the wreckage of the planes which fell seven miles apart. Eleven are missing. The planes were part of a flight out of Spokane, Wash., base.

Meanwhile, search planes and ships scoured the Atlantic for trace of another B-29 which went down near Bermuda with 20 aboard.

In Washington a small B-17, a type once used for bomber crew training, crashed landed at national airport, the scene of the nation's worst aviation disaster early this month.

Neither of the two occupants of the civilian owned plane was injured.

Truman Says Worst Is Over For Business

President Pledges New England Businessmen Government Keeps Watch

BOSTON, Nov. 17—(AP)—President Truman today told New England businessmen he felt the country was "through the worst part of the adjustment that had to come after the inflationary boom we experienced last year."

But the President advised that the federal government still was "keeping a careful watch on business conditions."

"We have not been lulled into a sense of false security," he said in a message to a joint conference of New England businessmen and governors of the six states, sponsored by the New England Council, a regional promotional organization.

Mr. Truman urged them to use "boldness and imagination" in meeting the region's problems.

"For a time last summer," the President said, "we were deeply concerned over signs of a downturn in business conditions in some of your most important industries. It is very pleasant to know that employment in the textile and shoe industries and some of the other non-durable goods industries has increased considerably and that the general outlook is now favorable."

"I believe it is safe to assume that the worst part of the adjustment that had to come after the inflationary boom we experienced last year, has passed," he said, "but the government in Washington (Continued On Page Eight)

Crazed Husband Kills Wife, Patient Wounds Another

BRIDGEWATER, Vt., Nov. 17—(AP)—A 46-year-old nurse and her male patient—the son of a Washington, D. C., lawyer—were shot to death and another man wounded last night in what police described as a jealous attack by the woman's husband.

Mrs. Antonio Salas of Bridge water, and Randolph Ogilby, 38, of Washington, D. C., were shot to death after their automobile was blocked by another machine on a lonely one-lane country road.

Shortly thereafter, Edward Bramhall, a camp owner, was wounded in the right leg by a quarter of a mile from the scene of the double slaying.

Police seized the woman's husband, Antonio Salas, 46, of Bel lows Falls, at apartment house. He was arraigned in Windsor county municipal court and held without bail for the grand jury on two counts of murder and assault with intent to kill.

Ogilby was identified as the eldest of Charles Fitz Randolph Ogilby, prominent Washington attorney and a nephew of the late Rev. Benson H. Ogilby, former president of Trinity College, Hartford, Conn.

Lo, The Poor Indian, May Soon Become "Lo, The Poor Taxpayer"

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17—(AP)—Choctaw Indians of Mississippi, who once owned most of that state and a big chunk of Alabama, are seeking a possible \$200,000,000 in interest they never were paid for their land.

The claim has been filed with the Indian Claims Commission on behalf of the Mississippi band of Choctaw Indians, which includes perhaps 2,500 to 3,000 Choctaws still residing in their homeland.

Representing the Choctaws in the case are Attorneys William T. Wray, of Philadelphia, Miss., J. A. Riddell, of Meridian, Miss., and Robert C. Handwerk, of Washington.

There are various angles to the Choctaw claim but the chief claim, if upheld, would give the band something in excess of \$200,000,000 including interest for more than a century.

"What happened," Handwerk told a reporter today that while the Choctaws once owned 25,000,000 acres of Alabama and Mississippi, pieces of this treaty and a piece of the federal government, chopped the land into small parcels by that—until finally they had nothing.

Celery Shippers Discuss Use Of California Crate

A group representing the celery shipping interests of Seminole county met yesterday noon at the Mayfair Inn and around the dinner table discussed the use of a celery crate of the same size and type as that used by California shippers.

Acc Trouble Shooter Jessup To Represent U. S. At Meet To Be Held In Siam

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17—(AP)—The White House announced today that American diplomats in eastern Asia will hold a regional conference at Bangkok in January. President Truman is sending Philip C. Jessup, the administration's top diplomatic trouble shooter, to it. Jessup, who has the rank of ambassador-at-large, will make a survey tour of the Far East.

He will leave on the trip around the first of the year. The announcement said that he would depart after completing his work as a member of the delegation to the U. N. General Assembly.

The regional conference of top diplomats in eastern Asia and the Far East, as the announcement phrased it, will be held at Bangkok, at the end of January. Bangkok is the capital of Thailand (iam).

American Legion Answers Query; Why Did Dad Die?

LYNN, Mass., Nov. 17—(AP)—An American Legion answers the "Why Did Dad Die?" query.

That was the American Legion's reply to a query from its commander to 11-year-old Laurence Goldstein's heart-tugging question: "Why did my Daddy die?"

The puzzled little Jewish fellow put the query to his mother after he had been attacked by a group of older boys who called him "Jew," spit on him and beat and kicked him into the gutter.

Laurence couldn't understand why he should be so treated when his father died a war hero while serving with the 2nd Armored Infantry, 41st Division.

Neither could his mother, Mrs. E. Sylvia Goldstein. She pleaded with the world yesterday, through the Lynn Item, to give her the answer to the boy's question.

Commander George H. Craig his answer in Indianapolis yesterday: "You have been the victim of an isolated instance of hatred," he said.

"Your experience provides the answer why your daddy died a hero. He could not stand by and condone mass mistreatment of human beings."

"There were evil men who tried to enslave all the free people in the world. Your father went to war to prevent the wholesale destruction of human rights and freedom."

"All true Americans, whether Catholics, Protestants, or Jews fought to re-establish international law on such outrages should not go unpunished."

Businessmen Tire Of Drab Offices States Decorator

 NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—(AP)—What makes the tired business man tired?

"His office," said Leonard Hutton, interior decorator.

"A man's office should be like his den at home—comfortable and relaxing."

"But what is the average office like? It has an overcast desk—that is to show he's an important man—a swivel chair, two stiff chairs for visitors, and a leather-covered sofa. On the wall is a map of the United States—with flags stuck in it to impress his customers with how many salesmen he has across the country."

Hutton clucked disapprovingly.

"It's too sober—too dull. It gives him no life. Built-in desks and rooms make people tired and nervous—but they don't realize why. A man can work more efficiently, and make a better impression on his associates, if his office doesn't look like an office."

Hutton is full of concrete suggestions to put a littleumph in the American business office. He feels it should have some music, a hidden bar for entertaining prospects, no glaring lights, and colorful draperies that can be drawn automatically—by pushing a button.

"And no wall maps—good pictures or personalized photographs," he said. "Nor do you have to have stiff heavy chairs just because some crazy guy decided fifties was a good style."

"You should have comfortable chairs arranged in a friendly seating group, conference tables are no good. Who ever felt at ease at a conference table?"

If the business man must have files in his office, Hutton said, they should be recessed into the wall.

Files only remind the visitor he ought to be back in his own office working. How can you sell him an idea if he isn't at ease?"

Hutton thinks the tired business man doesn't fare much better when he goes home to rest from his dingy office.

"He comes into a living room decorated exactly in a schindler—they-use-these-days manner. Then the poor man has to sit in some uncomfortable reproductions of ugly style never was a style, but just a period."

"There is no place for him to lie down, because his wife won't let him rest on her good living room sofa or the bed in the bedroom might get wrinkled."

"So the man's unhappy at his office, unhappy at home—as that's why so much business is done in restaurants and cocktail bars."

Hutton, who recently decorated the Austrian embassy in Washington, is of German birth. He has a shop on "Mink Lane"—fancy East 57th Street. He believes Americans concentrate too much on decorating their homes to please or impress their friends rather than to satisfy their own taste.

"They do so much to make automobiles comfortable here—and so little to make homes comfortable," he said.

It is amusing in a country of electric toasters, bottle warmers and refrigerators that the home has been neglected to such an extent people believe they have to buy furniture just because it is old.

Clients make odd requests of decorators. Hutton hasn't lined up his walls with fur, but he has done a number in solid leather.

"Once I decorated a home for a wealthy man in Monte Carlo," he recalled. "He lived on a cliff. As a joke I suggested he ought to pump salt water from the Mediterranean into his swimming pool."

"Good idea," he said. And he did it."

Change In Navy Top Brass Shows Secretary Is Boss

 WASHINGTON—The recent change in the Navy's top command serves to point up one fact: The Navy's real boss is the secretary. No man in uniform can overrule him once he has made up his mind.

When a man is made chief of naval operations he becomes the highest ranking active officer in the Navy. He has command of the fleets and has the responsibility for keeping them ready for war. But the secretary always has command of him.

The job of chief of naval operations is a relatively new one. It wasn't created until 1916. Before then the secretary personally exercised control over all the fleets and bureaus of the Navy Department.

The office of secretary was created in 1708. The bureaus were established in 1842.

When the office of the chief of Naval Operations was created, by law, this country was following the British pattern. At the head of the British Navy is a civilian, the first lord of the Admiralty. Under him is a professional sailor who manages the navy for him. His title is first sea lord.

The powers of our chief of naval operations (CNO) were at first rather vague, the law said that he should, "under the direction of the secretary of the Navy, be charged with the operations of the fleet, and with the preparation and plans for its use in war." But the CNO was not clearly in command of the Navy. To correct this, during World War II the CNO was made commander-in-chief of the U. S. fleet. Fleet Adm. Ernest J. King held the dual position.

Shortly after the war was over, President Truman abolished the office of the commander-in-chief of the U. S. fleet and in an executive order gave a new, clearer definition of the powers of the CNO. The order stated flatly that the secretary of the Navy, under the president, but that the CNO "shall have command of the operating forces, and the related shore establishments of the Navy, and shall be responsible to the secretary for the Navy for their use in war and for plans and preparations for their readiness in war."

Most of the orders to the various bureaus and other units of the Navy issue from the office of the CNO. In one field, however, he does not actually have command. In matters concerning the procurement of materials he exercises only an advisory function. This is considered a type of work which can be best done by civilian specialists. So it is handled primarily by the assistant secretaries and the secretary.

Oil Well, Refinery In Spare Room Are Results Of Hobby

 WICHITA, Kas.—Got a couple of oil wells and a refinery in your spare bedroom?

Frank W. McCurry has. They're models, of course, but real oil gushes out of one of the wells.

Oil from the other is pumped to the refinery and turned into gasoline, kerosene, distillate and diesel fuel.

The models are McCurry's hobby but it's hard to tell where his hobby leaves off and his business begins. He's a vice-president in the Derby Oil Co., a leading Kansas independent petroleum firm. Nearly 10 years have gone into the building of the miniature oil field and refinery, McCurry says.

"I started working on it when I was a 12-year-old farm lad living near Peru, Kas.," he relates. "Our farm was close to one of the early oil discoveries in Kansas and I would sneak away from home to watch drillers working on a new well."

Several years later he enrolled at the University of Kansas and began to study oil and gas. He had to build equipment for some of his experiments and that gave him the idea of constructing a complete model refinery to add to his simulated oil well.

There are a lot of model refineries but this is the only working model," McCurry explains.

He makes one exception. Several years ago he built a similar plant for the University of Nebraska but he doesn't know if it is still working. McCurry says he has since turned down money offers from persons and even foreign governments desiring a similar model.

How much does he figure his plant is worth? McCurry says money couldn't buy it. However, he estimates it would take about \$10,000 to duplicate it.

For American Shipping

The Society of Naval Architects and Marine Engineers at its annual banquet in Washington recently heard an address by Frazer A. Bailey, president of the National Federation of American Shipping...

He also declared that, because of higher standards of ship safety, manning and crew comfort, American ships are not able to compete in the matter of rates with the ships of most other nations...

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THE WORLD TODAY

One of the greatest boons for peace and rehabilitation of Europe would be a solution of the bitter enmity between Germany and France—and from important quarters comes guarded word that there is hope the breach may be healed.

British Foreign Secretary Bevin told an audience in London that the recent Paris meeting of the Big Three foreign ministers (America, Britain and France) dealt with "probably one of the biggest problems of all—the integration of Germany into western civilization." And then:

"I am sorry I cannot say anything about these discussions here. It was a very delicate matter to handle."

"We can only hope that the results of these discussions will be the beginning of the ending of the age-long feud between the French and Germans."

The unexpected statement by one of the world's leading statesmen was preceded by other equally surprising pronouncements from the hostile camps themselves. Going back to the early part of this month we find French Foreign Minister Schuman trying to convince his people that the best way to avoid trouble with the Germans is for the two countries to become good neighbors instead of suspicious rivals.

That's strong medicine for the average French citizen to swallow. However, not only Schuman but other French officials said the chances of ending the old Franco-German feud were better than ever before in history.

And a few days later Ludwig Erhard, economics minister for the new West German republic, predicted in Paris, that the future of European cooperation will depend on Franco-German cooperation. He said it should be easier now to bring the two countries together because their economic ideas correspond.

Erhard told a news conference he was in Paris to find an economic basis for a political agreement which he expected would be concluded soon. He said Germany recognized the French need for security guarantees and was willing to make sacrifices in order to demonstrate its readiness for reconciliation.

Still are Frenchmen who can remember the Franco-Prussian War of 1870 in which France suffered so grievously, the terrible siege of Paris, in which the capital was reduced to stark hunger. The loss of the province of Alsace and part of Lorraine, and the great indemnity of \$1,000,000,000 to Germany.

A little more than a generation and France again was overrun by the Kaiser's World War troops, while Germany itself didn't suffer so much as a scratch physically. And then the bloodiest tragedy of all—World War II.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—(AP)—Britain's Chancellor of the Exchequer, Sir Stafford Cripps, told churches to stay out of politics. "The church should not attempt to devise remedies for particular social, economic or industrial evils," he said.

The Labor Party is concerned over a series of recent speeches by Church of England prelates as to what part churchmen will play in next year's general elections.

The Archbishop of York, Dr. Cyril F. Garbett, told his diocesan conference Nov. 8 that "ruin is unavoidable" unless British industry can produce more goods to sell overseas. He called on the government to "make the facts known to all" on the economic crisis.

Sir Stafford spoke to church leaders at a luncheon session of the House of Lords. The House of Lords is the lay sector of the church assembly, law-making body of the Church of England.

Sir Stafford told the churchmen: "We do not want politics in our religion, but we do want Christian standards in our politics."

University of Miami athletic officials announced more than 48,000 tickets had been sold, a new record for Hurricane home games.

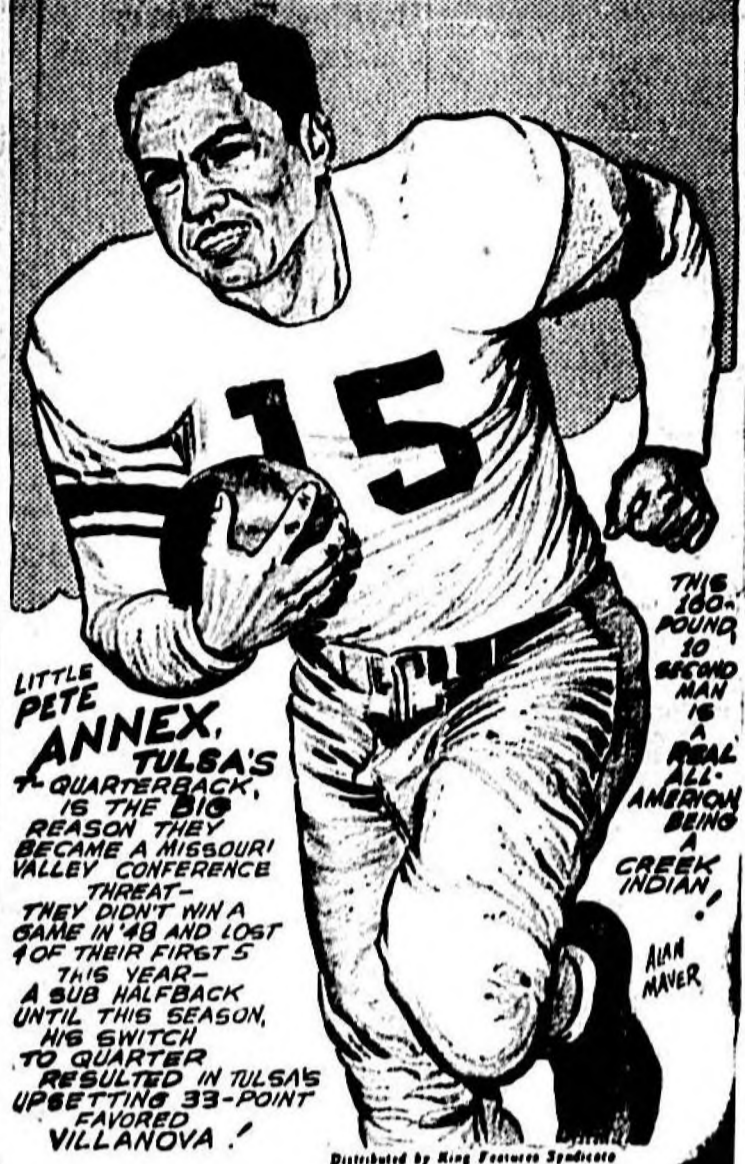

Chandler Predicts 15 Minor Players Will Be Drafted

CINCINNATI, Nov. 17.—(AP)—Commissioner A. B. (Haps) Chandler, who will supervise baseball's major league draft today, predicted not more than 15 minor league players would be selected in the annual grab bag.

"I took a look at that list of draft eligibles," the boss of baseball declared, "and there must be 10,000 names on it. But probably no more than 15 will be drafted."

The draft proceedings were scheduled to start at 11 A. M. but Commissioner Chandler was up last night helping recidivists simplify the baseball rules. The session of the 12-man board recessed long after midnight.

At that time the group had "sifted" through 34 pages of a 60-page revised rule, and had made some important changes. The committee was to go back into it this morning.

Some of the ancient rules have gone by the boards in early season, and some that have been in the rule book have been put there for the first time.

For instance, the first statement in the "objectives of the game" section states that "the object of each team is to win by scoring the more runs." That highly-important item was not in the old code.

Another rule which for almost a century has permitted the home team manager to decide whether his team should bat first or last was revised. Under the new regulation the home team bats last. Umpire Tom Connolly of the American League, who has been around quite a while, said he never heard of a manager wanting to bat first, but that the home club has had that right since baseball was invented.

Another far-reaching decision was that a manager desiring to protest a game over an umpire's decision must do so before play is resumed.

Seven-inning games as one half a double header gained approval of the law-makers, although Chandler said he wasn't in favor of such abbreviated affairs.

"I'm a nine-inning ball game man," the Commissioner said, "I never liked to play seven-inning games, and I don't like to see them. It does something to me when they stop at seven innings."

Famous Boxing Physician Advises Leaving Kayo'd Fighters On Canvas

HAVANA, Cuba, Nov. 17.—(AP)—Do you know the best thing to do when a boxer is knocked out? A famous boxing physician gave the answer today: Do nothing.

Dr. Leon S. Gordon, medical examiner of the District of Columbia Boxing Commission, recommends this treatment for KO'd boxers:

1. Let him remain on the floor of the ring. Remove the mouthpiece.
2. Do not rub his neck, shake his head, slap his face, or try to arouse him with an ammonia inhalant.
3. Always allow an unconscious boxer to remain "as is" until he has fully regained consciousness and can walk away without aid.

If he doesn't come to after a reasonable time, the injured man should be moved to a bed "on a stretcher, exactly as he lay on the mat" until medical examination can be made.

Dr. Gordon was a speaker on yesterday's program of the National Boxing Association. He said efforts to revive boxers might aggravate brain injuries or bleeding.

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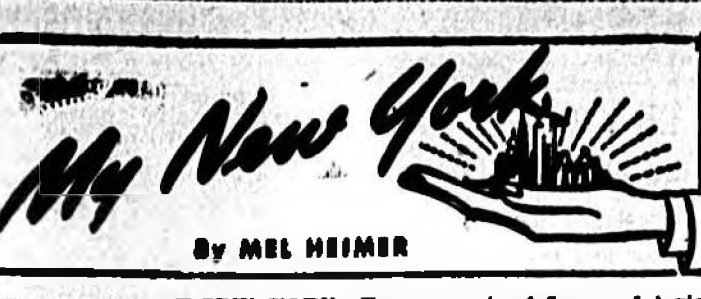

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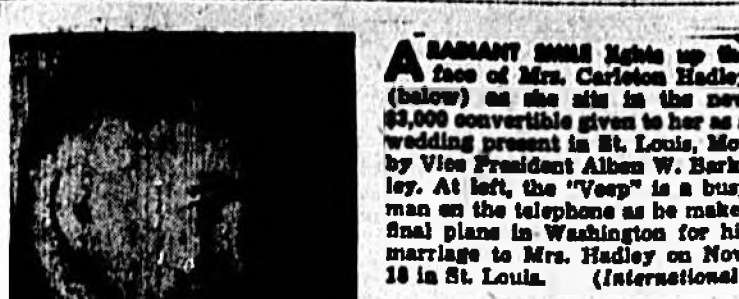

Polish Official Discloses Drive Against Spies

Reds Fight Spread Of Strong Terrorist Underground Army

WARSAW, Poland, Nov. 17.—President Boleslaw Bierut has disclosed the arrest of spies, saboteurs and terrorists in a drive to wipe out an "entire underground army" in Communist-ruled Poland. The report on widespread opposition to the Red government was made in a speech last week to the central committee of the ruling Communist party and published in detail yesterday in the nation's press. Observers believed the unprecedented revelations indicate a big series of treason trials soon. Bierut told the committee the number of persons engaged in espionage, sabotage, conspiracy, terror and all similar activities directed against the peoples regime. With these declarations and the ousting of three former important members of the Communist Party's central committee it appeared Poland was in the throes of an all-out purge. Bierut said "substantial numbers" had been arrested. Bierut lashed out most vehemently against former minister of construction General Marian Spychalski—one of the ousted committee members. There was serious speculation among Western observers that he may become the figurehead in a treason trial. The charges made by the president and enlarged upon in the party's resolution concluding a three-day meeting depicted Spychalski as a "nationalist deviationist" similar to former Hun-Rajk, who was hanged in Budapest on charges of plotting with Marshal Tito of Yugoslavia. Expelled from the party hierarchy with Spychalski were former Vice-Premier Wladislaw Gomulka and Vice-Minister of Justice Anton Kliszko. Bierut associated Spychalski with former Supply Minister Wladimierz Lochowicz, arrested a year ago as a spy suspect. He said also that the former construction minister cooperated with Gomulka in appointing spies in the former ministry of recovered territories which Gomulka headed. That ministry was dissolved last year after turning over to other government agencies the job of administering lands taken over by

Editor Says Atomic Security Lies In Progress, Not Secrecy

CHICAGO, Nov. 17.—(AP)—A Minneapolis editor said today that the United States should quit hiding out atomic "secret" under our shell and put our reliance on security through progress rather than on security through secrecy.

Gideon Seymour, executive director of the Minneapolis Star and Tribune, told the American Science Conference: "There can be no sound national policy in any field of foreign or domestic affairs, except where the people have been given the facts and have had a chance to live with them and argue them out and understand them." Seymour is chairman of a committee of the American Society of Newspaper Editors on atomic information problems. He said "The American people have no convictions about atomic energy because they haven't been told anything to speak of about it. The policies are made at high levels, on a shush-shush basis, and probably aren't worth the paper they're written on. It probably is a good thing that Russia has produced an atomic explosion, and that the world knows it. Some people we will quit holding our 'secret' under our shell and put our reliance on security through progress rather than on security through secrecy. As J. Army Relinquishes Submarine Mining To U. S. Navy

FORT MONROE, Va., Nov. 17.—(AP)—The Army is relinquishing one of its functions to the Navy—that of developing and planting controlled submarine mines in the nation's harbors.

Announcement of this decision by the Department of Defense was made yesterday by Army field forces headquarters here. The switch in this responsibility from the Army to the Navy is effective Nov. 30. Complete transfer, however, is expected to take until Jan. 31, 1950.

The Army will turn over to the Navy real estate and other property needed to carry on this activity. This building will be retained by the Army for use of the post of Fort Monroe.

The Army has operated the submarine mine depot here, a facility charged with mine manufacturing, and also controlled (submarine) mine school at the spacious branch artillery school, Fort Winfield Scott, San Francisco, Calif.

Instruction now given at the mine depot will be integrated into naval schools already established, according to present plans. The mine depot and the Navy Bureau of Ordnance have cooperated closely in the development and manufacture of underwater ordnance here since 1938, the Army explained. It said that transfer of responsibility for controlled submarine mines from the Army to the Navy is a logical outgrowth of this cooperation.

The submarine depot originally was established as the mine depot at Fort Totten, New York, in 1902. It was moved to Fort Monroe on Feb. 1, 1931.

A joint Army-Navy committee is working out details of the transfer.

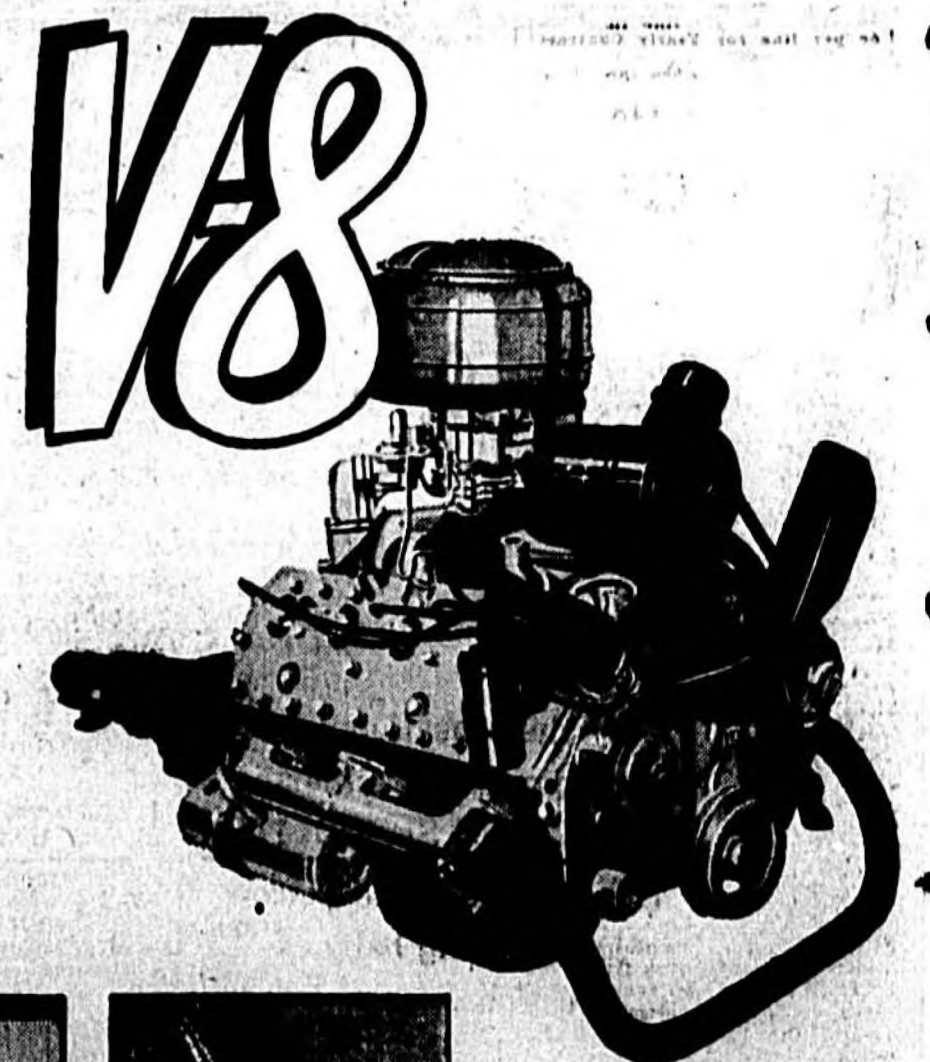

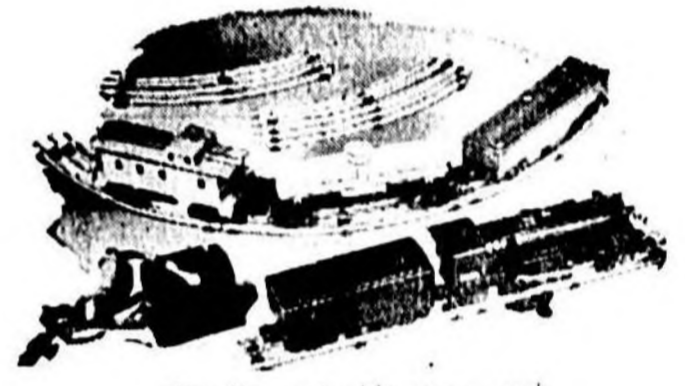

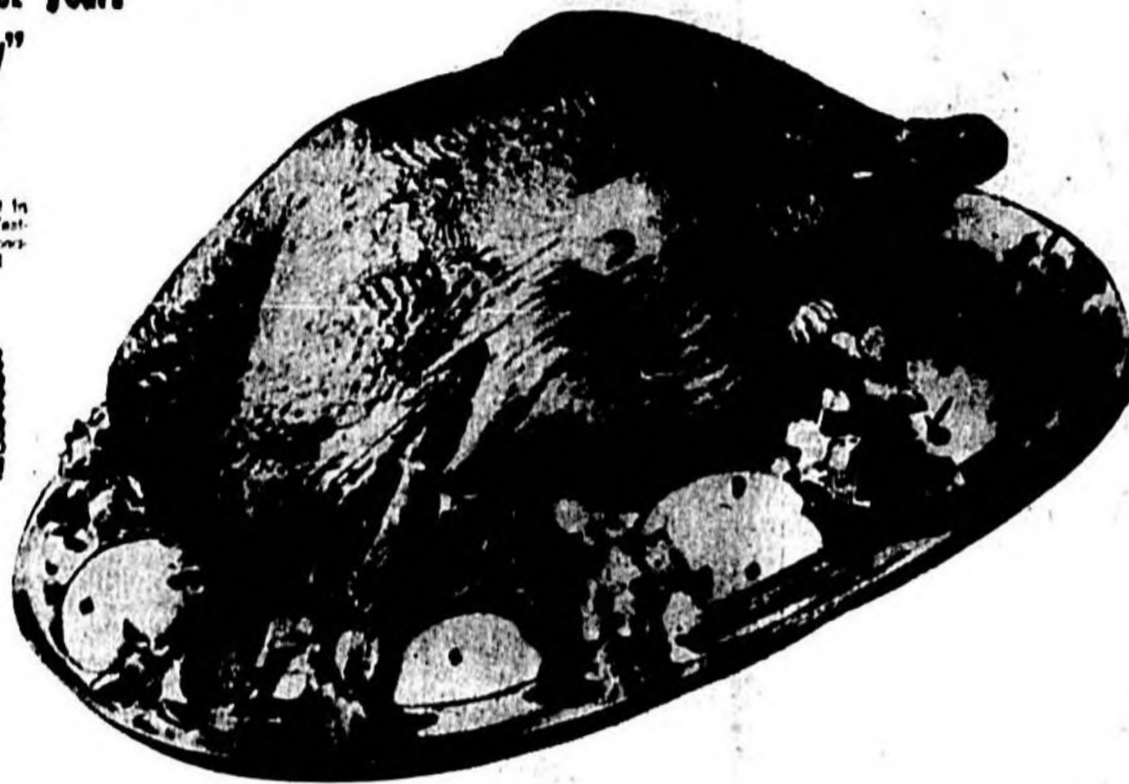
