A Victory Diet

You do not have to take vitamin pills or medicine if you eat properly, says Dr. Russell Wilder of the Mayo Clinic.

The Federal Security Agency has recently released a red, white and blue official "food guide" telling the people what foods they should eat in order to gain health and victory.

"Milk and milk products—at least a pint for every one, more for children, or cheese or evaporated or dried milk.

"Oranges, tomatoes, grapefruit—or raw cabbage or salad greens, at least one of these.

"Green or yellow vegetables—one big helping or more, some raw, some cooked.

"Other vegetables, fruits—potatoes, other vegetables or fruits in season.

"Bread and cereal—whole grain products or enriched white bread and flour.

"Meat, poultry or fish—dried beans, peas or nuts occasionally.

"Eggs—at least three or four a week, cooked any way you choose, or in "made" dishes.

"Butter and other spreads—vitamin-rich fats, peanut butter and similar spreads.

"Then eat other foods you also like."

Unprotected Bridges

The Bradenton Herald calls attention to the fact that no provision has been made to protect Florida's highway and railway bridges against sabotage or destruction by enemy forces.

"Florida's arterial highways and the railroads which run down the peninsula have many large bridges," says the Herald. "The bridge across the Manatee River at Bradenton is duplicated at other river crossings.

In case of an attempted invasion along the Florida coast by a hostile enemy, the army no doubt would take proper precautions to protect all bridge structures and connecting highways, essential for the transport of troops and supplies.

It is something to think about, the possibility that saboteurs might start about a systematic plan for destruction of highway and railroad bridges in a well-organized campaign to tie up the state's transportation system.—Ocala Star.
