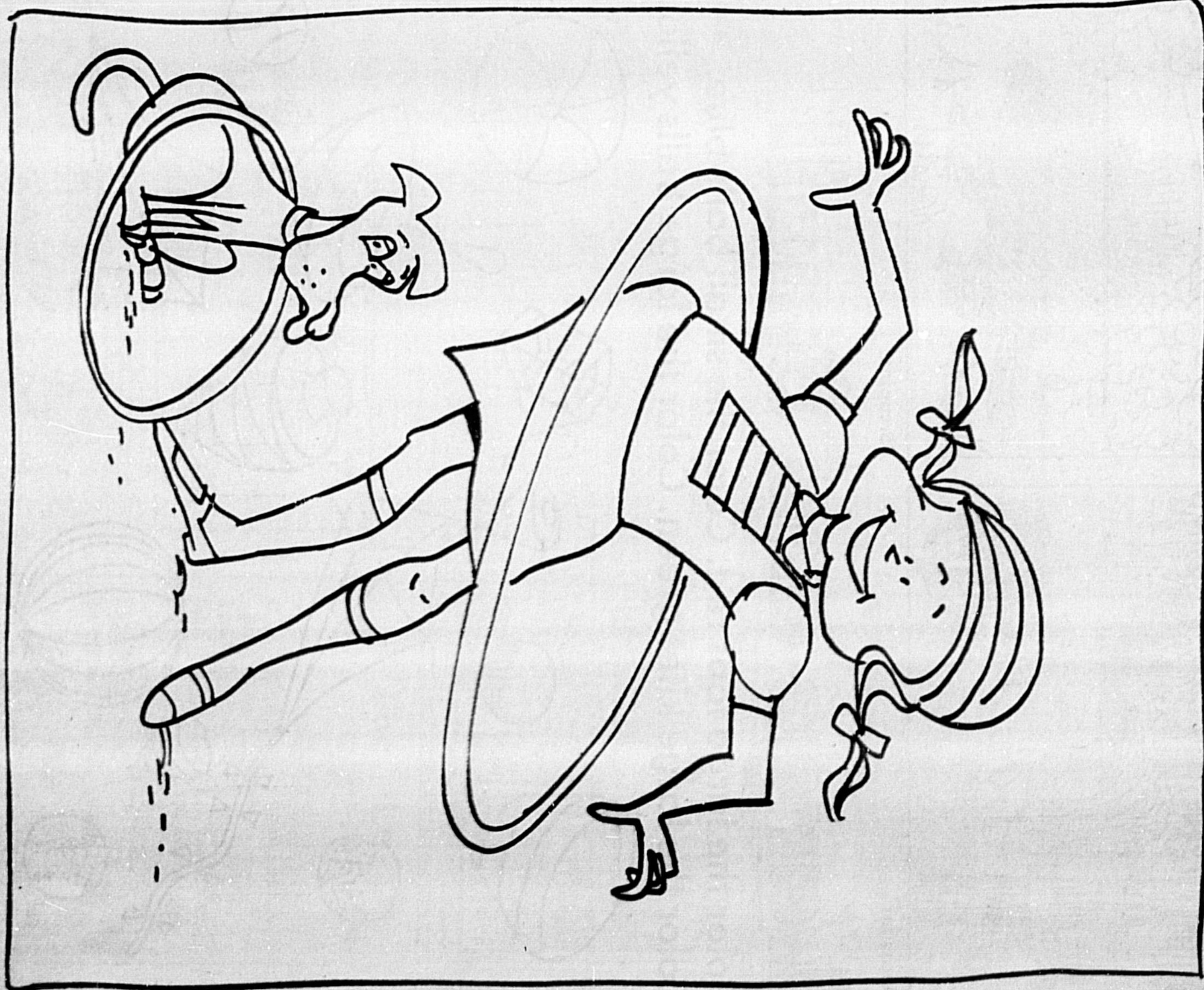

### Wounded Mate 'Fair'; Wife Held

Lawrence Wimberly Jr., 26-year-old Sanford man, is listed in "fair" condition today in the Seminole Memorial Hospital's intensive care unit where he was taken Saturday after having been shot three times by Leola Wimberly, his wife.

According to Sanford police reports, the wounded man, who resides in Apartment 30, Higgins Terrace, was shot on East Third Street as he ran from the woman near the Goodwill Store.

Lt. Charles Fagan arrested Mrs. Wimberly just moments after the incident and charged her with discharging a firearm within the city limits and carrying a concealed weapon. She was jailed in lieu of \$500 bond.

According to police reports the shooting was witnessed by several persons in the area.

In county reports, an Orlando student was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Jay Leman early Sunday on four charges, including possession of marijuana, faulty car equipment, expired inspection sticker and improper tag.

Raymond Edward Hurd, 17, of 1021 San Luis Avenue, was placed in the county jail in lieu of \$1,100 bond after Deputy Leman stopped the youth's car on Howell Branch Road near the Plantation Apartments.

# Orphanage At Base?

The Sanford Herald has learned that an Orlando welfare agency has visited the Sanford Airport and expressed interest in leasing Building 210, a former Navy barracks, to house homeless children. Sanford Industrial Commission Director David F. Kelley today confirmed a report to The Herald that a representative from an Orange County agency toured the airport facility last Tuesday and indicated a liking for the airport building, now being mentioned for lease to the state for housing a police training academy. Kelley said he did not make the airport tour with the interested prospect and suggested more information could be obtained by contacting Airport Manager J. S. (Red) Cleveland but Cleveland had been selected for jury duty and was not available. Herschell Freeman, assistant superintendent for the Orange County parent home, advised he had toured the airport facilities after receiving a call from Jack McNeill, San. William Gusters' aide, telling him of the available space. Freeman said the home is "very interested" in airport building 210 and envisioned a parental home to be established here to house children from "three or four" counties, including Orange and Seminole. "We need more bed space at the Orange County facility," Freeman stated. The airport structure previously had been mentioned as a possible site for locating a minimum security prison to relieve the present overcrowding at Ruffolo but the city commissioners had indicated an unwillingness to locate the prison at the airport in leased facilities.

Previously, city policy has been to appoint a commissioner on the industrial board and Commissioner W. Vincent Roberts, Mayor Lee P. Moore and McDonald all served as the commission's "watch man" on the SIC's actions. New Commissioner Julian Stenstrom tried without success at last Tuesday's reorganizational meeting to put Meyer's name in nomination for McDonald's spot but his motion failed for lack of a second.

## County Commission Faces Lengthy Agenda

County Commissioners, following a brief respite from lengthy sessions last week, resume the possible all-day conducting of business tomorrow if the lengthy agenda is any indication. Scheduled is a report by Road Supt. J. C. Lavender on Barton Street. Also upon the agenda are appointments to various boards and committees within the county which was held in Reynolds last week due to more recommendations. These include Precinct six fire control district, historical commission, emergency resources management committee, agricultural advisory committee, Fred R. Wilson memorial law library, highway safety advisory committee, Seminole Community Action and East Central Florida Regional Planning Council. County Attorney Harold Johnson will report on the change order procedure for the construction of the new courthouse. Also to be reported by Johnson is the lease for the branch office of the courthouse, and in another matter a report on alleged utility violations in Meredith Manor. Public hearings include a continued hearing upon vacating and abandoning road rights-of-way in Rest Haven on Lake Harmony; rezoning from A1 to C-2 property on the north side of west SR 46; rezoning from R-2 to R-3 a portion of Eastbrook subdivision; adoption of an ordinance prohibiting large trucks from parking in residential districts; adoption of an amendment to zoning ordinances governing use of C-2, M-1 and M-2A, and extension of certificates for water and sewer service area for Casselberry and south Seminole Utility Company.

## No. 2 Demo Expounds On Party Hopefuls

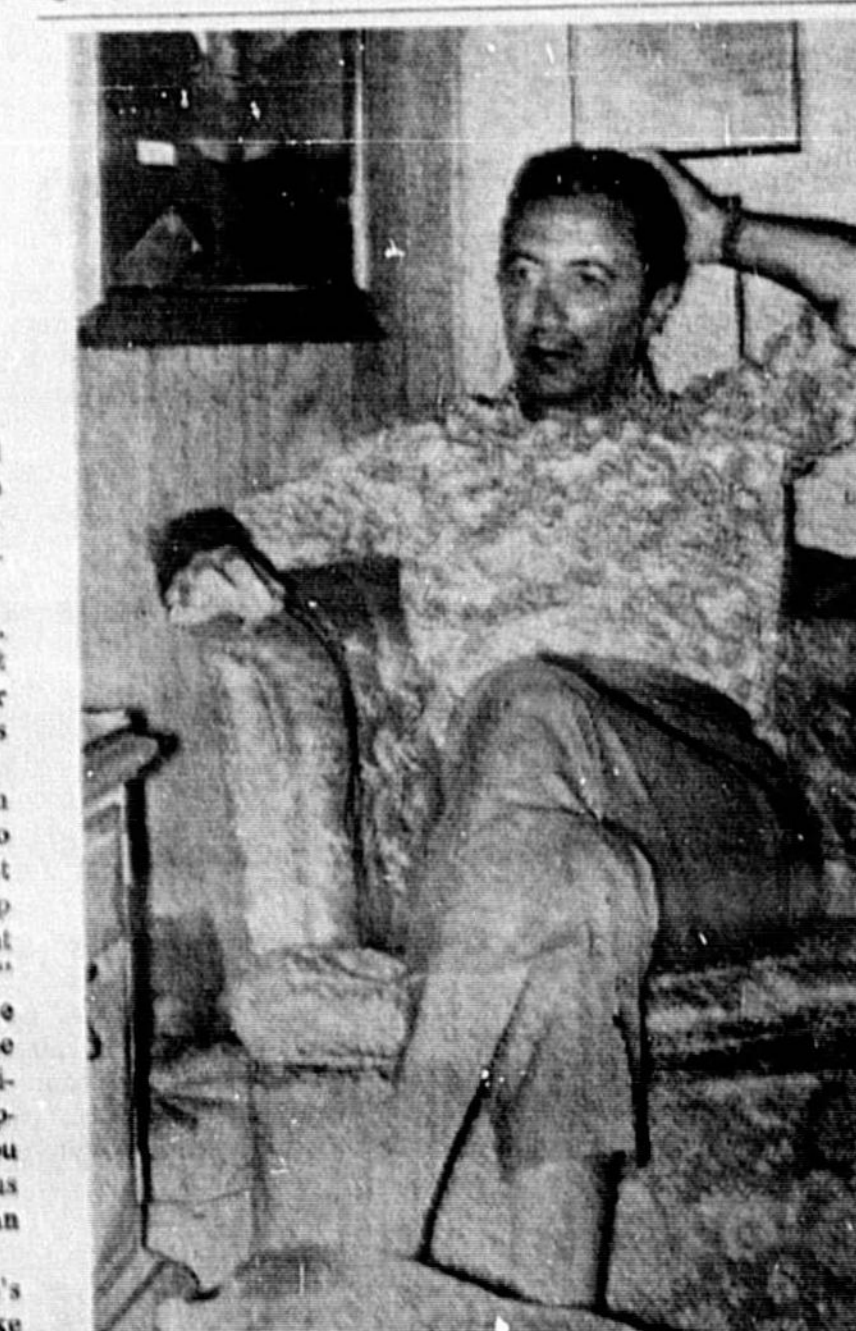

Does the name Nicholas P. Kostopoulos Sr. mean anything to you? Up until Saturday evening, my response was probably the same as yours, "Is that a foreign food or a disease?" However, if you were to sprackle the names of Ted Kennedy, or Edmund Muskie or Hubert Humphrey, and be told that he not only knows each of these men well... as well as any other prominent Democrat, the pieces of puzzle start to drop into place. Kostopoulos is the assistant to the chairman of the national Democratic committee, Larry O'Brien, and a visitor to Sanford as the houseguest of Mr. and Mrs. John Woodhouse, of Idylwild. Unless you are a national reporter, there's very little likelihood that you'll ever meet any, much less all, of the top political members of either national party. So, when the invitation was extended to meet the "No. 2" man in the Demo ranks and have the opportunity of asking unrestricted questions about these people and the aims of the party, I jumped at the chance. All of the visitor's answers were direct with the exception of which candidate he would personally pick for heading the Democratic ticket. "We're impartial and try to help all of 'em." The only time he betrayed this attitude was when the conversation drifted to Hubert Humphrey, for whom he campaigned in the last election. His eyes brightened in relating the remark attributed to President Nixon, who was campaigning in Detroit a day prior to Humphrey's visit. Through a close association with the press aides of the then campaigning Nixon, Kostopoulos did have breakfast with the Nixon group and was told, "history will record Mr. Humphrey as the best Vice President this country ever had. He was even better than me." As far as selecting a ticket, Kostopoulos never did run out of complimentary adjectives for each of the names offered as prospects by this reporter. Muskie — "Of course he's in the lead. But, it's much too early to come out and say that this will continue to stand up to primary time. An excellent man with tremendous ability." Kennedy — "People do have short memories... and maybe they'll forget about the incidents leading up to the Chap-paquiddick tragedy. And you can't overlook the tremendous machine which the Kennedys can muster." McGovern — "Now that he's officially announced, he'll make dramatic impressions on the people." # Castro Very Silent On Red Sub Base

MIAMI — Cuban Premier Fidel Castro is playing a strange role in the tug-of-war between the United States and the Soviet Union involving U.S. pledge not to invade Cuba.  
The government-controlled Cuban radio, monitored in Miami, had not said a word about a Soviet nuclear submarine base reportedly nearing completion at Cienfuegos, Cuba's south coast, at least up to the time President Nixon spoke out on the "understanding" between Washington and Moscow.

# Good News Today: Sailors Save Haven For Stray Animals

Animals, the U.S. Navy and students already are enacting major roles in the encouraging side of the news as 1971 heads into January.  
At San Diego, Calif., they're calling the USS Samuel Gompers, a destroyer tender, the "Gompers Ark." That's because the officers and men of the Gompers heard that the Humane Society's "Farm to Farnyard" was about to be shut down for lack of funds and they did something about it.  
For years the Farnyard has harbored stray domestic animals for which there was no home — horses, cats, sheep, even an occasional pig, and lots of ducks and chickens.  
When the Gompers crew learned that money was running out and the animals were about to be auctioned, Capt. Daniel L. Banks Jr., the tender's skipper, took over. In 24 hours crew members dug into their pockets and came up with \$1,000 to keep the farm animals off the auction block. With this went the promise of another \$2,000 later.  
For a time, at least, the Navy has saved the Farnyard for the thousands of children and adults who visit it annually to see their favorite farm animals. Is it any wonder that people have nicknamed one of the Navy's floating shipyards "Gompers Ark"?  
Four years ago W. C. Brooks of Knoxville, Tenn., helped save the life of a German shepherd puppy. Now the dog, a husky fellow named Buddy, has returned the favor.  
Brooks was cutting a tree on the bank of Flat Creek when it became entangled in grapevines and fell on him, knocking him unconscious into the creek.  
Buddy was digging for field rats nearby. Brooks lay in about six inches of water and was about to roll helplessly into a four-foot-deep pool when Buddy grabbed his master's collar in his teeth and hauled him to a farm well.  
In Barrington, Ill., more than 50 teenagers and college students have joined forces to help with retarded children. The volunteers wear jerseys which read "We Can Help!"

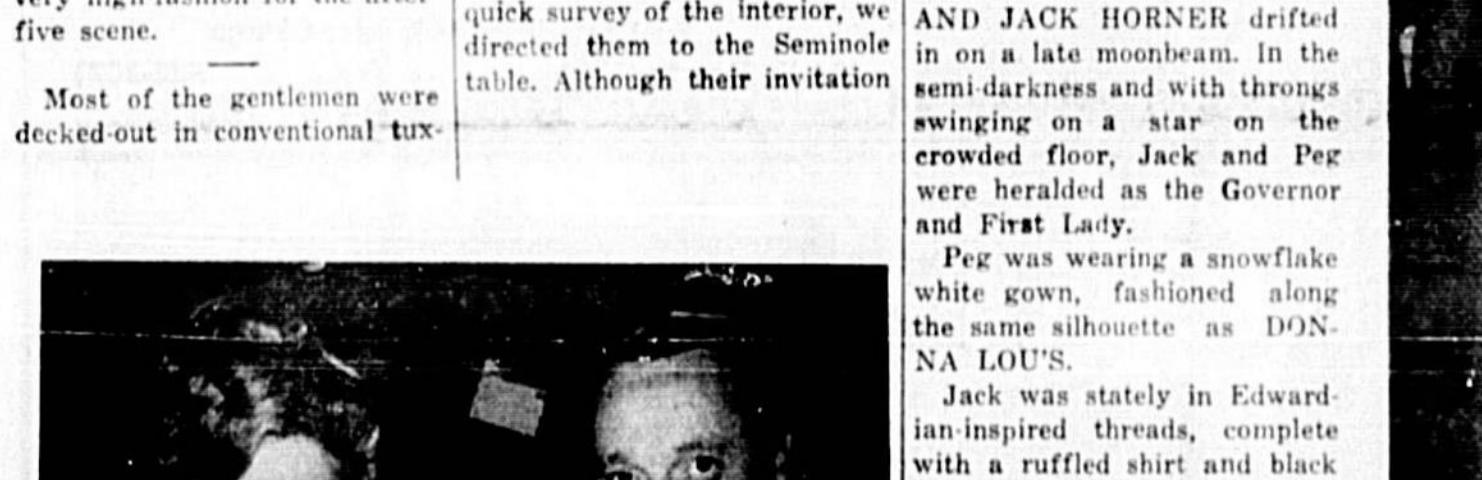

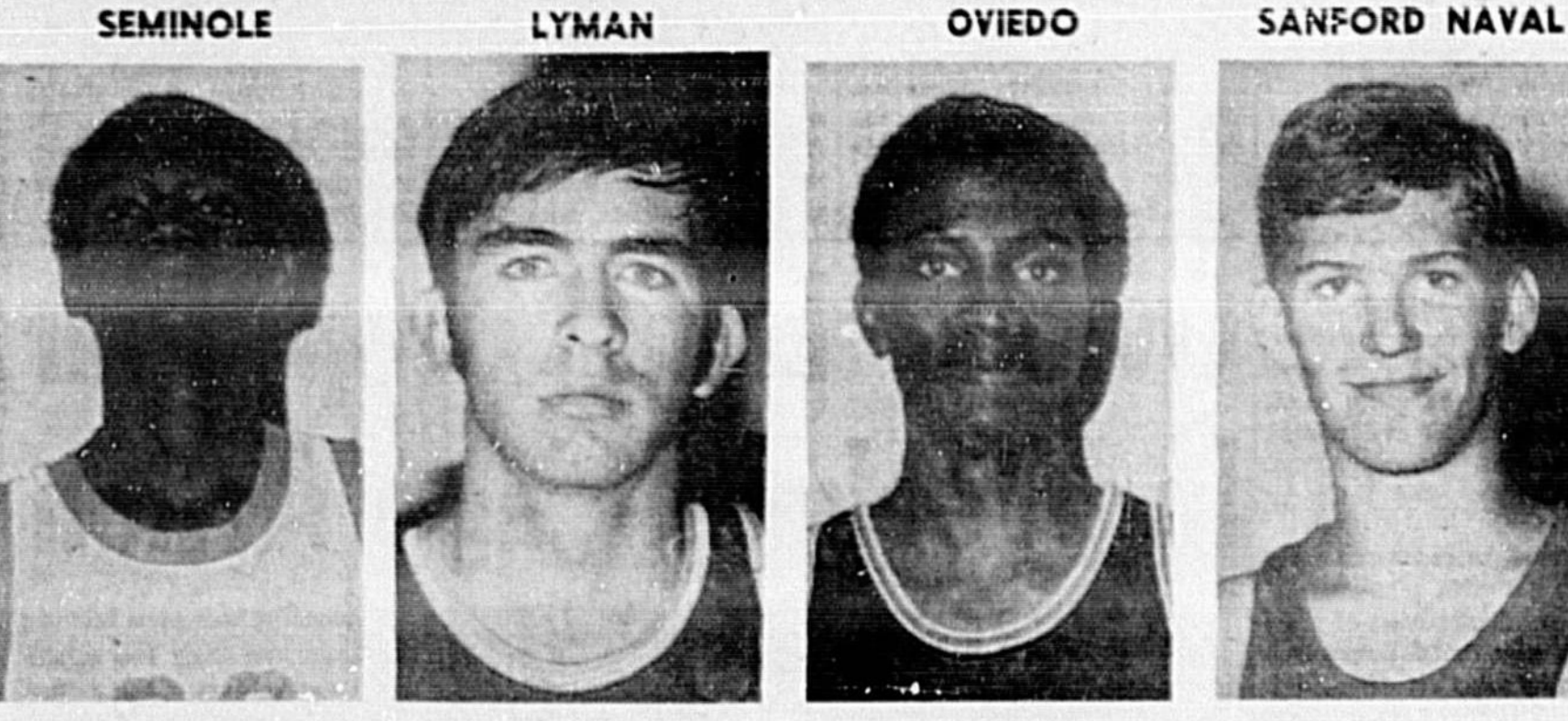

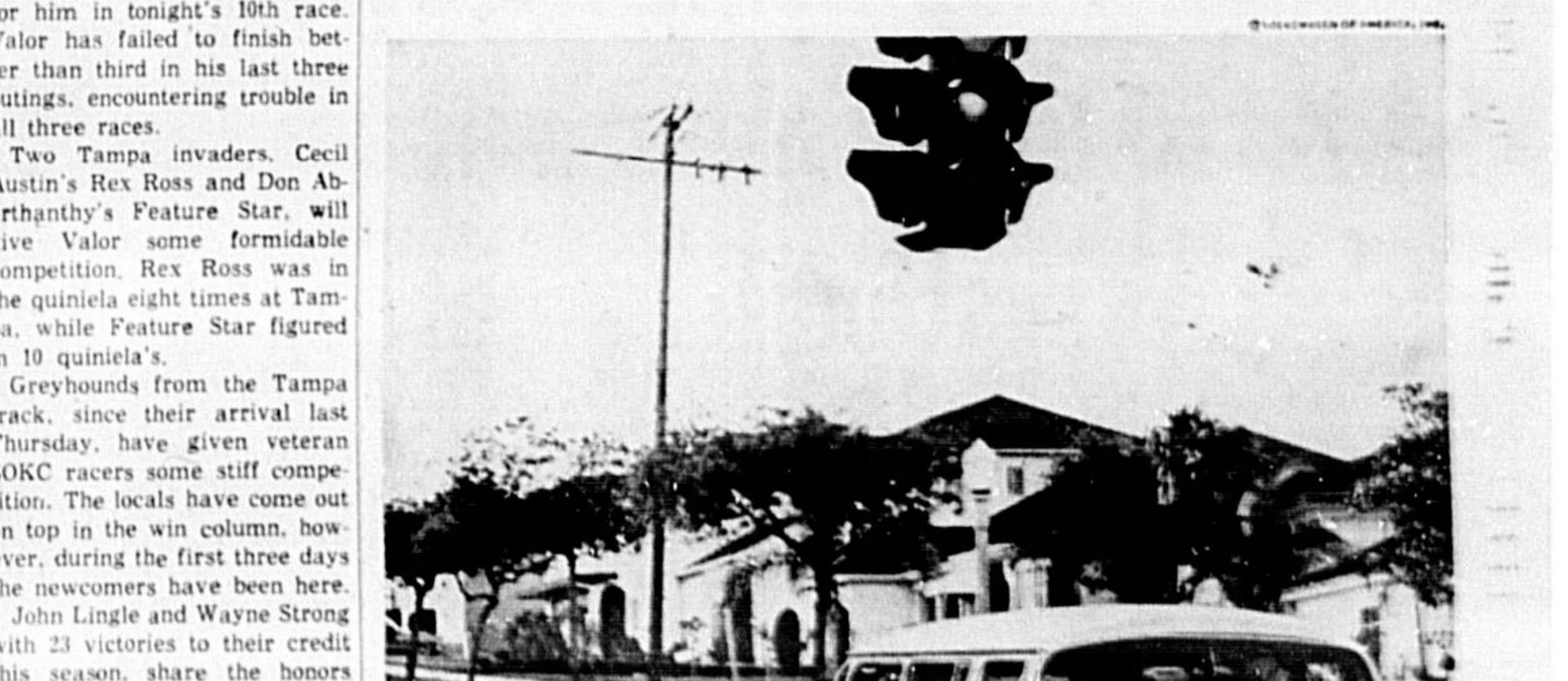
