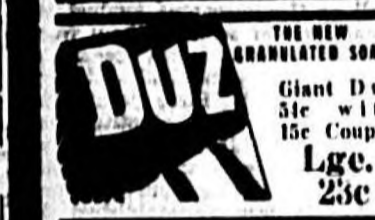

Friends Of Grass Say It Will Cure Your Headaches

By OVID A. MARTIN
WASHINGTON, July 21.—(AP)—Grass may mean nothing but a headache to the homeowner who has to spend a hot weekend trimming his lawn.

But it promises—so its greatest friends say—to ease taxpaying headaches for that same homeowner, and to free the farmer from some of the headaches arising from crop surpluses and depressed prices.

Stated in another way, the public is going to hear more and more in time goes by about grass being a better cure for the problem of fluctuating farm production, prices and income, than government production control programs and price-supporting subsidies. Subsidies, of course, require taxes. And the next few years—years when farmers will need to cut production of many crops from abnormal war and postwar levels—may give the proponents of grass a chance to prove their theory.

Grass is more than a long-leaved plant used to cover lawns. It is food—in a raw form. Processed through livestock farming, it comes out as meat, milk and dairy products.

But it can do even more. It can offer a method of producing food at a slower rate and smaller volume than has been the case since the war started. It would cut down on the production of wheat, corn and other grains starting farmers in the face, they need to slow up the process and volume of production, reduce to drop the wartime rate of production to bring down on surplus, with their constant headaches of declining farm prices and income and the

Terrell's tent holds 700, and the July 8 opening night production of Frans Lehár's "The Merry Widow" was a sellout. Broadway theaters seat from 900 to 1,200 persons, and most summer theaters from 250 to 400.

"The Merry Widow" stars stage and screen veteran Susanna Foster and her actor husband, Wilbur Evans, who created the leading roles in "Mexican Hayride" and "Up In Central Park."

The circular stage presented some unusual problems. Experienced Broadway actors and actresses like Evans and Foster took to it like a duck to water, but some of the younger actors were a little ill at ease at first.

For one thing, they tended to play towards the orchestra pit, on one side of the stage, although the audience entirely surrounds the stage. Terrell is thinking of extending the orchestra pit all the way around the circle.

Other problems of directing, casting and staging cropped up. Since there is no curtain, puppets and scenery must be lugged up and down the aisles between acts, to the obvious delight of the audience. It gives them something to watch during intermissions.

All entrances and exits, of course, also must be up and down the aisles, which Terrell thinks tends to bring the audience right into the play itself.

In the second act of "The Merry Widow" is a love scene subordinate to the main stage action. It is played in one corner. In Terrell's production it is played in one of the aisles, right among the audience.

Still another problem to be met was acoustics. The canvas tent has no resonance, of course.

The group had lots of ideas. One of them was to string piano wires around the tent—an odd theatrical trick. The idea is that the different lengths of wire catch the vibrations from the stage and vibrate sympathetically. Many a semi-arid area subject to severe erosion.

But Terrell's arena theater uses a different, though related, gimmick. The stage is constructed with wide boards in the center, gradually narrowing toward the edges. The orchestra pit, too, has wide boards in the middle of the walls, narrowing toward the top and bottom.

The boards act as a perfect resonator, Terrell says if you put your hand on the boards during a performance, you can feel them vibrate in resonance with the music and speech.

The tent itself is specially made. There can't be a center pole, because that's where the stage is. The poles are placed around the arena. They are made of special hard woods, so that they can be slim, but still strong. That way, there isn't a bad seat in the house.

Evans and Miss Foster will stay at the arena theater for the rest of the summer season. Although "The Merry Widow" took three weeks to produce, Terrell plans to put on a different show each week hereafter.

Lombardville is about 10 miles from the Delaware from Trenton, N. J. "Musical circus" draws a audience mostly from Philadelphia, although New York is within striking distance.

Terrell's tent holds 700, and the July 8 opening night production of Frans Lehár's "The Merry Widow" was a sellout. Broadway theaters seat from 900 to 1,200 persons, and most summer theaters from 250 to 400.

"The Merry Widow" stars stage and screen veteran Susanna Foster and her actor husband, Wilbur Evans, who created the leading roles in "Mexican Hayride" and "Up In Central Park."

The circular stage presented some unusual problems. Experienced Broadway actors and actresses like Evans and Foster took to it like a duck to water, but some of the younger actors were a little ill at ease at first.

For one thing, they tended to play towards the orchestra pit, on one side of the stage, although the audience entirely surrounds the stage. Terrell is thinking of extending the orchestra pit all the way around the circle.

Other problems of directing, casting and staging cropped up. Since there is no curtain, puppets and scenery must be lugged up and down the aisles between acts, to the obvious delight of the audience. It gives them something to watch during intermissions.

All entrances and exits, of course, also must be up and down the aisles, which Terrell thinks tends to bring the audience right into the play itself.

In the second act of "The Merry Widow" is a love scene subordinate to the main stage action. It is played in one corner. In Terrell's production it is played in one of the aisles, right among the audience.

Still another problem to be met was acoustics. The canvas tent has no resonance, of course.

The group had lots of ideas. One of them was to string piano wires around the tent—an odd theatrical trick. The idea is that the different lengths of wire catch the vibrations from the stage and vibrate sympathetically. Many a semi-arid area subject to severe erosion.

Continued From Page 1, Sec. Two companies about windshields reflection of bright finishes on instrument panels. A result has been the recessing of instruments on the panel by many car makers. Also there has been a steady reduction in the amount of chrome being used on the panels. It is quite generally understood the industry isn't going to build larger cars in the future. They have heard many complaints about the necessity of rebuilding garages and the difficulty of street parking with current models. Yet in few instances are the larger and wider passenger cars a postwar development. In most

cases the increased length and width came in the 1940 and 1941 models.

The engineers can cite figures to prove the postwar cars generally are no larger than those built just before the war.

Chrysler Corp. has capitalized greatly on the fact it has been able to increase the interior space of its newest postwar models while at the same time reducing overall dimensions. At the same time Chrysler has been one of the first of the car-makers to add shorter wheelbase models to its various lines.

A lot of engineering, though, is being devoted to cores of minor phases of car design. The major objective of every car maker, however, is to reduce the weight and increase the fuel mileage of his vehicles.

There has been little if any progress toward those goals over the last 10 years or more. But there has been greatly increased riding comfort and driving ease.

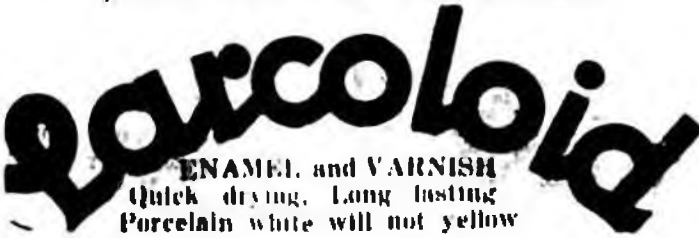

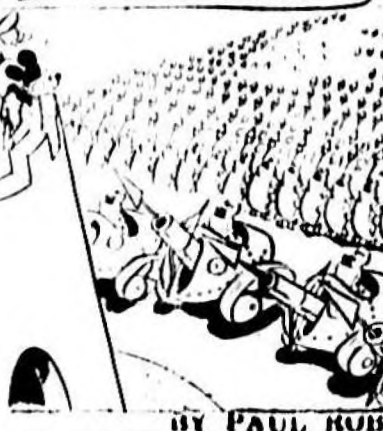
