Navy Man Admits Beating, Robbing Army Sergeant

New Auto And Four \$100 Bills Are Reported Stolen

PITTSBURGH, July 21—(P)—A 22-year-old sailor, arrested aboard a plane here, last night admitted the beating and robbery of an Air Force sergeant near Milford, Ohio, earlier yesterday.

County Detective Stanley Spiegel said the sailor, John King Amoe, of Dearborn, Mich., made the statement after first maintaining he was "drunk and didn't remember anything."

Amoe and his companion, attractive Mrs. Bertha Dugger of Camden, N. J., a 21-year-old blonde, were accused of kidnapping Ben John Beard, 26, of Lowry Field, Denver, after he picked them up as they hitch-hiked along a road south of Detroit. Beard said he had a new car and four \$100 bills were stolen.

Mrs. Dugger also was held in connection with the incident. Neither she nor Amoe have been charged.

She was arrested yesterday afternoon as she prepared to board an airplane at Port Columbus, O., airport for Johnston City, Tenn. Amoe took a plane from Zanesville.

Spiegel said Amoe produced two \$100 bills which he had secreted in the pouches of the fall clothing. He admitted he had hidden the money in a pack of cigarettes when they searched him.

Spiegel said Amoe would waive extradition to Ohio. The youth was based at the Philadelphia Navy Yard.

Ohio troopers quoted Mrs. Dugger as saying that Sgt. Beard of her crew had been sent to Dayton by Detroit. However, with her at the wheel, they wandered south to the area near Wilmington, some distance from Dayton. Lieut. S. B. Radcliffe of the Ohio police said he told him that Beard "got smart" and then my boy friend beat him" and threw him out of the car.

Lieut. Radcliffe said she had some of Beard's money in her possession when arrested. The car was abandoned at Zanesville.

30 New Homes Are Built In Altamonte Springs In Year

About 30 new homes have been built during the past year in Altamonte Springs, between Longwood and Maitland. Near Lake Marion, Col. James E. Mathews, former mayor, is building a number of homes. Donald Harris is reconstructing new homes on Hermits Trail. Dr. G. Benson, member of the city council, has a new home which he is offering for sale.

J. D. Morrison, major of Altamonte, lives in a pleasant home just east of Adele. He is chief machinist of the Navy, he came to Florida three years ago from Waukegan, Ill. He serves as Railway Express Co. agent. Mrs. Morrison is president of the Altamonte PTA. Two sons, John and Joseph, attend the Lyman School which is between Longwood and Altamonte Springs.

A tennis court which was dedicated to the town by H. E. Fuller, park commissioner and merchant, is being put into good playing condition by the Chamber of Commerce. The court is located in the recreation center and park, which includes among other facilities a shuffleboard court and a barbecue pit.

New business projects include a hardware store recently opened by Mr. Rock. The Prairie Lake Theater, which opened during the past year, is close to the Altamonte Springs city limits.

The town is an important shipping center for citrus, ferns and flowers and ranks close to Maitland in this respect, according to Mayor Morrison. Among shippers of citrus are Norman DeForest, A. About 10,000 boxes of fruit were shipped from Altamonte Springs last December. Mayor Morrison estimated Vaughan's Inc., ships about 80 to 100 boxes of ferns and flowers. Another large shipper of ferns is C. A. Wales of Fern Park. Hugo Pilat, florist, brings cut flowers from Plymouth for shipment.

The Altamonte Hotel, one of the oldest and most picturesque in Seminole County, opens for the winter season in December and numbers among its guests each year, David Austin, vice-president of the U. S. Steel Corporation. The hotel is operated by E. C. Bates who spends his summers in Jacksonville, Fla.

The City Community House serves as a meeting place for the Seminole Civic Club, the Chamber of Commerce, Old Colony Post 100 of the American Legion, Post 100 for Vets, town committees, G. O. Club, and city committees.

Unique Summer Theater Produces Good Musical

LAMBERTVILLE, N. J., July 21—(P)—Something unique in summer theaters has sprung up on Woodlawn Mountain here—quite literally like a mushroom. At least, it looks a little like a mushroom. It is St. John Terrell's "mystery circus," dedicated to producing slick, professional, broadway-quality musical comedy on a circular stage without benefit of curtain or backdrop.

The "circus" name, perhaps, is misleading, although the entertainment includes fireworks, pink lemnade and a between-the-acts Swiss bellringer. Terrell explains he calls it a "circus" "because circuses are anything that centers on a circle, not just a menagerie."

Another name for the unusual stage arrangement is the arena theater. The audience is seated all around the stage. There is nothing new about this—it dates back to the dawn of the ancient Greek theater.

Terrell says their arena theater was used in early phases of the Greek theaters before the classic Greek drama reached its height.

But this is the first arena theater to be set up under canvas. Terrell says, which adds another element to the affair.

Terrell, a New York City perfume manufacturer, has been dabbling in summer theater as a hobby since 1930. He got the arena theater bug in 1938 when he read of its use by experimental theater groups in Texas and on the West Coast. The bug, oddly enough, played to audiences of less than reluctant to complain to the cast.

Promise Of Civil Rights For Spain Remains Promise

10 Years After War, Martial Law Is Still In Effect

MADRID, July 21—(P)—Generalissimo Francisco Franco promised Spaniards four years ago to respect basic civil rights, but the promise is still only a promise.

More than 10 years after the civil war, martial law is still in effect. Military courts try people without jury. A Spaniard who cries "long live the republic" is charged with "attacking the security of the state" and is liable to 30 years imprisonment. Another who strikes for higher wages also is "attacking the security of the state" liable to 30 years.

Since the end of World War II, however, such penalties are reserved for militant communists. Socialists or anarchists engaged in active, organized opposition. The ordinary Spaniard gets two or five years for his outbreaks of political fury to vote and of these laws.

Article two says this respect is extended to those who give their "loyalty to the chief of state" (Franco) and obey the laws of his regime.

NO STEEL BOOM NEW YORK, July 21—(P)—The fact-finding truce in the steel labor dispute should bring a temporary pickup in the industry, but it won't send steel sales zooming, the Iron Age said yesterday.

"Some buyers will begin watching low inventories more carefully to keep from being caught short in case of a deadlock this September," said the national metalworking weekly. "Some orders that were to be placed this fall will be entered now. A few other buyers had already built up excess stocks, giving an added push to stockpiling operations during the past few weeks."

South Urged To Operate Plants Idled Since War

NPA Report Shows Development Handicapped By 'Freeze'

WASHINGTON, July 21—(UPI)—The South should do everything possible to keep in operation the 296 industrial plants built there during the war, a National Planning Association report said yesterday.

Such a move, it held, will help raise the standard of living below the Mason-Dixon line.

The report was drafted by a 66-member "Committee of the South," organized as part of the Planning Association, which is a private organization devoted to planning in business, agriculture, labor and other fields.

The report indicated that immediate development of the new plants is handicapped by the government's 15-months-old "freeze" on imports.

The freeze dictated by international relations is preventing the sale or lease to private industry of 64 southern ordnance, chemical, oil, ship building and other plants. They are kept in stand-by condition ready for war use if necessary.

However, the Committee of the South noted that 44 complete plants and parts of two others have been declared wholly surplus.

It suggested that "multiple tenancy" be used on single large plants to attract small businesses to bring them into production.

The report, second in a series on the southern economy issued under NPA sponsorship, showed that the government's wartime price control contributed measurably to the South's industrial capacity. But more important, it suggested, was this "intangible" gain:

"The wartime experience showed many Southern communities that industrialization was possible xxx."

"It demonstrated the need for civic improvements, better government and better schools. It demonstrated the abilities of Southern industry and labor to produce."

"After the war was over, it did not ignore community action aimed at retaining those benefits."

"That action may eventually enable the population of the Southern states to achieve the standard of living that is possible with a full utilization of their resources."

Although the government made a relatively heavier investment in the Southern plan in other areas, more than half of it was in explosives and chemical lines, which did not lend themselves readily to conversion for civilian use.

Making allowance for this, it was stated, there is a question whether the South showed a larger gain in manufacturing potential during the war than did the nation.

"This very fact makes it all the more important that the South maintain in operation as much as possible of its wartime increase in industrial capacity," the report said.

The ADA sponsored a "full-day conference" yesterday. It adopted a sharp resolution in favor of positive and immediate action by the government to reverse the business decline and keep the nation's production expanding indefinitely into the future.

Friends Of Grass Say It Will Cure Your Headaches

B. OVID A. MARTIN
WASHINGTON, July 21—(AP)—
Grass may mean nothing but a headache to the homeowner who has to spend a hot weekend trimming his lawn.

But it promises—so its greatest friends say—to ease taxpayer headaches for that same homeowner, and to free the farmer from some of the headaches arising from crop surpluses and depression.

Stated in another way, the public is going to hear more and more its time goes by about grass being a better cure for the problem of fluctuating farm production, prices and income, than government production control programs and price-supporting subsidies, subsidies, of course, require taxes.

And the next few years—years in which farmers will need to cut production of many crops from abnormal war and peacetime levels—may give the proponents of grass a chance to prove their theory.

There is more than a long-leaved plant used to cover lawns. It is food—in a raw form. Processed through livestock farming, it comes out as meat, milk and dairy products.

But it can do even more. It can offer a method of producing food at a slower rate and smaller volume than has been the case since the war started.

With surpluses of wheat, corn and other grains staring farmers in the face, they need to slow up the process and volume of production, reduce costs to drop the wartime rate of production, bring down on surpluses, with their companion headaches of declining farm prices and income and the

case the increased length and width came in the 1940 and 1941 models.

Truman Signs Historic North Atlantic Pact

President Asks \$1.45 Billions Arms Aid For Nations Which Are In Alliance

WASHINGTON, July 25 (AP)—President Truman signed the historic North Atlantic Treaty today and immediately asked Congress to back it up with a \$1,450,000,000 foreign arms program.

The Chief Executive said the Western European members of the newly ratified military alliance—as well as other nations around the globe—must have American help to build up their defenses against the threat of Russian aggression.

Barely an hour before he sent a special message to the lawmakers pleading for swift approval of his program to meet "the most pressing current needs," Mr. Truman penned his signature to the ratification instrument of the Atlantic Pact.

He called the treaty ratified only last Thursday as "a historic step toward a world of peace, a free world, free from fear."

"But it is only one step." He said in a statement issued at the White House signing ceremony.

"We must keep ourselves morally and materially strong. We must play our part in helping to strengthen freedom everywhere."

That was the thrust of his bold message to Congress.

By stressing what he called "the most pressing current needs," Mr. Truman obviously was hoping to short circuit demands in Congress for a less ambitious program.

Two Republican senators who have played an important part in drafting this country's first postwar foreign policy had served advance notices on the Administration that its views may not coincide with

Mrs. FDR Refutes Special Session Will Be Limited To Charges Made By Cardinal Spellman

"I Believe In Separation Of Church And State," She Asserts

TALLADEGUE, July 25 (AP)—Unless Governor Warren changes his mind, a bill requiring a two-thirds vote of both the House and Senate to take up any legislation after Sep. 7 special session except revenue-raising measures

In his announcement on special session plans Warren said he believed the session should be "voted entirely" to the raising of revenue.

Under Florida law nothing except what is included in the governor's formal call for a special session can be considered except by a two-thirds vote of both houses.

Warren announced the Sep. 7 date following a closed weekend meeting with 33 legislative leaders at nearby Wakulla Springs.

Both he and the legislators assumed that a special session was necessary to provide sufficient revenue to meet the "barebone costs" of State government. They agreed at least \$66,000,000 in new revenue will be needed to meet appropriations in full.

The restriction on matters to be considered in the special session is revenue-raising that such matters as a building program for state institutions may be delayed for two years.

She made the comment in her copyrighted column "My Day," published in the World Telegram. "I want freedom of religion to prevail in this country," she wrote.

Cardinal Spellman in a letter to Mrs. Roosevelt last Thursday criticized her for her opposition to federal funds for parochial and private schools. He said that "your record of anti-Catholicism stands for all to see—a record which you yourself write on the pages of history which cannot be recalled—documents of discrimination unworthy of an American mother."

Mrs. Roosevelt wrote that her Hyde Park telephone number is supposed to be private, but it rang every few minutes after the letter was made public by Cardinal Spellman last Friday morning. She said null does not reach them until between 8:00 A. M. and 12:00 noon and at first her son was completely mystified "and I had to tell her to say there was no comment, since I could hardly comment on something which I had not yet seen."

"Now that I have had time to read the letter carefully," she said, "I shall, of course, answer the Cardinal personally and in detail. However, since I consider it important that there should be as little bitterness as possible among the Protestant, Catholic and Jewish groups in our nation, I shall not discuss this further with him."

With the exception of a personal note to Cardinal Spellman, she has written to him again.

President Roosevelt, in a letter to Mrs. Roosevelt, said he had been asked to write to the Cardinal.

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
