Seven Miles Of Boxes

There is something a triffe gruesome in the matner of expression, but the comment of the Florida Safety Council that if you put all the bodies of the people who have been killed in automobile accidents in Florida during the past fen years in plus boxes, they would reach three miles in the air; or if laid end to end they would extend

for a distance of seven miles.

Now if everyone will stop to think of that, we may be getting somewhere. Every third car registered every year becomes involved in an automobile accident before the year is out. One person is killed in the state of Florida as a result of a highway accident every 12 hours. One per-son is injured every 20 minutes. There is one auto acci-tent every five minutes.

Last year 28 percent of all auto accidents in Florida resulted from driving too fast. Nineteen percent of the accidents were caused by drunken drivers. Fourteen percent were caused by persons who did not have the right of way; 18 percent by drunken pedestrians; 9 percent by reckiess driving; 7 percent by failure to give proper algebraics; 4 percent by improper passing, and 6 percent for miscellanames.

So if you eliminate the drunks, including pedestrians, you would eliminate practically one-third of all the accidents which occur in this state. You would reduce the number of deaths from 730 to 580. You would prevent 8,400 persons from being hurt in accidents every year. You would save \$277,000 each year in hospitalization costs.

The proposed Drivers' License Law will help to eliminate drunken driving as it will deprive anyone found driving while drunk of his license to drive. Such a law will also go a long way toward the elimination of reckless driving, speeding, and the other more important causes of accidents in this State.






