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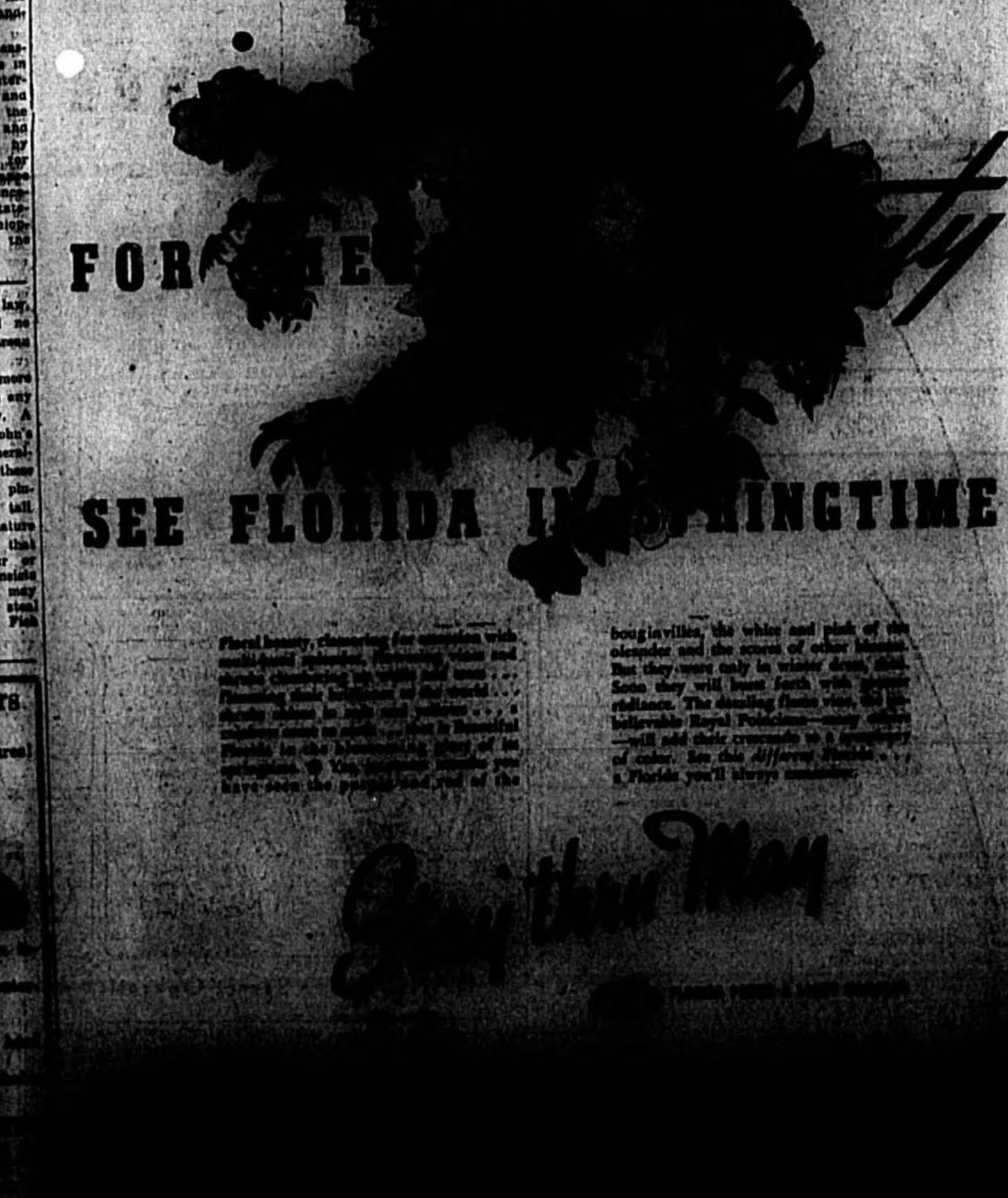

Legislature Given Bill To Legalize Slots In Florida

Senator Mapoles Says Devices Would Give State \$25,000,000 Revenue Annually
Retirement Plan For Judges Ok'd
Bill Passes Permitting Charges For Services By Cities
TALLAHASSEE, Apr. 12.—(AP)—The Florida Legislature, which legalized slot machines in 1935 and outlawed them in 1937, received today a bill to permit them once more under a State monopoly. Senator Mapoles, of Crestview, introduced the bill and estimated the revenue would run about \$25,000,000 a year.

His bill would finance the Social Security program with the money after providing an institution for wayward girls and unmarried mothers.

A resident Butler sent the bill to the Senate Finance and Taxation Committee.

The House passed a bill to permit municipalities to charge for such public services as sewage disposal, garbage collection, etc., to make up the loss in city funds from Homestead exemption.

The Senate approved a measure providing circuit judges to receive pay for extra judicial service on the bench.

A Senate committee recommended yesterday that Florida's general appropriations bill be amended to show each salary and general expense amount.

Senator Gilks of DeFuniak Springs made the proposal to Chairman Westbrook's Appropriations Committee and it was adopted unanimously.

Westbrook said that type of lifting in the annual money bill was abandoned after 1929. Now each appropriation is split only on two parts—"salary" and "expense" and regular expense.

Snow Brought To Many States By Wintery Blasts
CLEVELAND, Apr. 12.—(AP)—A big shipment of winter, imported from Canada, made the weather market polar bearish yesterday from Maine to the Rockies and southward into Kentucky.

Some places had the coldest April 12 in history. A blizzard struck Cleveland. Snow showed up in some communities in 15 States. Light snow and flurries were common.

Chicago's 21 was seven degrees colder than 1907's April 12, the previous champion. Louisville's 27 shaved five degrees off the record for the day. Cleveland's 21 and Detroit's 22 equaled records.

Commissioners in Wisconsin, Michigan and South Dakota had temperatures down to 8. The weather was freezing in parts of New England, Pennsylvania and New York, but New York City was in the 40's.

Four inches of snow fell in Central Vermont, bringing the total depth to substantial ground cover. Two additional inches fell in Northern New Hampshire. The snow cover in some parts of the Northeast is still in the 40's to 50's.

Greece Also Is Given Protection As Britain, France Extend Aggressor Barrier

Anglo-Italo Pact Is Undisturbed

Poland Denies Rumors Of New Territorial Demands By Nazis

Britain and France today extended their barrier against further German-Italian aggression by pledging support to Greece and Rumania if their independence is threatened.

The pledge was announced by Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain to an emergency session of the British House of Commons. He said if the independence of either country was threatened, Britain and France would give "all the support in their power."

The Prime Minister, however, refused to denounce the Anglo-Italian accord of 1938 because of Italy's Good Friday invasion of Albania, but he made it plain Britain felt Premier Mussolini had flouted the pact and disturbed the status quo in the Mediterranean.

Mighty warships of the two allies, meanwhile, kept a vigil in the Mediterranean which is a vital route to French and British colonial possessions.

Both nations feared that Albania having been absorbed, Italy and Germany hoped to gain new dominions in the Great Sea—domination of Greece, perhaps, despite a note of assurance by Italy to the Grecian government.

The Polish foreign office was reported to have called home the families of the Polish embassy and consular officials in Germany.

Fleet-Footed Negro Given 120-Day Term

G. T. Simmons, negro, was sentenced to serve 120 days on a variety of charges including carrying a gun without a permit, resisting arrest and gambling, by Judge Frank A. Miller in a special session of the Police Court called yesterday afternoon.

Agriculture Service To Celebrate 25th Birthday

The annual Achievement Day of the 4-H and home demonstration clubs of Seminole County will be held May 13 as a part of the State wide 25th celebration of the inauguration of the Agricultural Extension Service in Florida.

Prior to the county achievement day, a series of local achievement days will be held at the various clubs throughout the county.

In reviewing briefly the history of the service which, for the last 25 years has been co-operating with the farmers of the state, County Agent T. R. Dawson said invasion of South American fields by the boll weevil brought consternation in its wake, and an aggressive agricultural leader, Dr. Sennett A. Knapp, inaugurated in Texas a system of demonstration work to teach farmers how to produce cotton in spite of the weevil, and how to raise other crops.

Since the idea spread to other states, reaching Florida in 1912, it was supported by the General Education Board, donations by other firms, and the United States Department of Agriculture.

Mr. Dawson pointed out that May 8, 1914 saw the passage of the Smith-Lever Act setting up cooperative extensive services in all states, in which the United States Department of Agriculture, the various states, and the counties joined hands to bring up-to-date information to farmers and rural families.

At first its efforts were devoted largely to showing farmers how to make two blades of grass grow where one grew before, Mr. Dawson said, adding in this it stressed insect and disease control, proper culture and fertilization, the use of improved seeds and better livestock and other things which contributed to better production.

Later emphasis has been placed on economy of production, marketing the products to best advantage, proper utilization of the land, a satisfying home life, wholesome recreation and citizenship development, he said.

Mr. Dawson said thousands of boys and girls are enrolled each year in 4-H clubs over the state, which early became an important phase of extension work. Beginning as boys' corn clubs and girls' tomato clubs, they now include training for youngsters in every phase of farm and rural home life and development.

The Extension Service in Florida now employs 58 county agents and 40 home demonstration agents in 60 counties, in addition to its state staffs of administrators and specialists, it was pointed out.

V. P. Miller, Lakeland, was named sovereign delegate and H. J. McCulley of Jacksonville, alternate.

the Lakeland unit, Mr. Collins said.

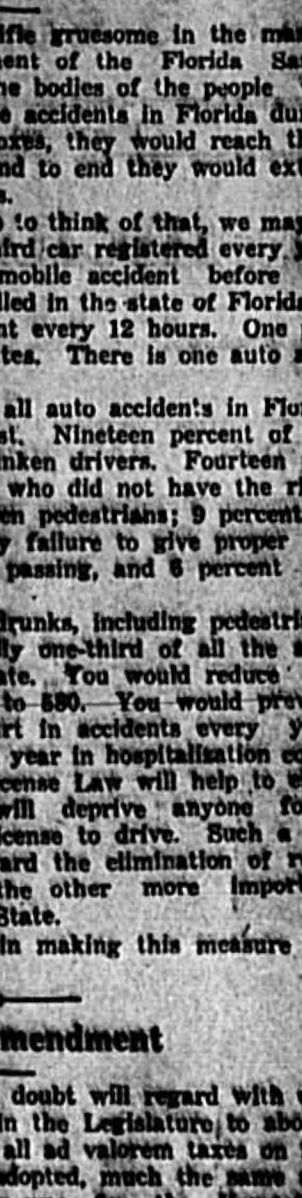

Reich Rearmament Program Draining German Treasury

By PRESTON GROVER WASHINGTON, Apr. 13. — (AP) — In the wake of German conquests arise questions as to how long that country can continue its enormous expansion without collapse. Nobody knows the answer. Nor can anybody compute. The capture of \$80,000,000 of Czech gold is a boon to Germany just now. Short term notes issued to pay the costs of mobilization and building of the Siegfried Line last Autumn are selling due at the rate of 500,000,000 marks a month. Every little bit, especially of gold, helps. It is an axiom of nations that a country never becomes insolvent. Often it cannot pay its foreign debts, cannot feed its people well, cannot longer finance armaments. But it can exist, nevertheless. To finance a staggering armament program, Germany has resorted to extraordinary expedients both in her internal affairs and in her external financing. Hjalmar Schacht, former economic minister, once was asked what he would do when the effect of his latest financial sleight-of-hand wore off. Repeatedly he replied: "We will do something else that is expedient." From every direction financial and trade troubles of the Reich appear to increase, yet U. S. officials returning from there say no economic collapse is in prospect. There is no way of determining just how large is the annual German expenditure and debt. Ger-

many has kept its budget secret since 1935. From Department of Commerce reports, the studies of British and American writers in Germany, and other available sources it is possible to estimate that the annual expenditures of the government are 30 billion marks. An estimated one-half is for the military. Marks are valued at about 40 cents. The 1935 budget, the last published, showed ordinary receipts of 7,805,000,000 marks and ordinary expenditures totalling 8,221,000,000 marks, leaving a prospective deficit of 400,000,000. Of the ordinary expenditures, war charges were listed at 482,000,000 marks. An unexplained item of 2,931,000,000 marks may have hidden other military or semi-military expenditures. The 1938 or 1939 "ordinary budget" in Germany undoubtedly has climbed higher than the 8,221,000,000 marks of 1935. Economists concede it may have doubled. That still leaves approximately 15 billion marks (\$6,000,

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Nightgown Lady Is Hit With The Navy

NEW PORT, R. I., Apr. 13. — (AP) — Physicians, nurses and attendants at the Naval Hospital went into a dither one recent early morning when a young lady clad only in a nightgown strolled into the institution. They couldn't find a thing in the regulations about what to do in the case of an attractive girl, scantily clad, wandering around to visit the patients. So they called the police. About the same time the police sergeant received a call from Mrs. George Peters, who said her daughter had disappeared. That still falls four or five billion marks short of a balanced budget. It is certain that Germany is having her trouble raising revenue. Expenses are getting higher. Her export trade is sagging, but imports increasing. The latest 1,500,000,000 mark security issue offered last November did not move as readily as its predecessors. It is a fair surmise that a new one may be whopped along now during the peak of enthusiasm over the latest conquest. The money can be used. For lack of ready cash, the government is compelling business men to accept trade vouchers in payment of goods needed by the government departments. They are simply I.O.U.s. This system amounts to a sort of forced credit, because in Germany no business man can refuse to sell to the government, cash or no cash. Pressure is increasing on all fronts, from within and from without. The 25 percent penalty tariff imposed by the U. S. on German goods shocked Berlin. And yet officials here insist that outside economic pressure is a slow tool, and not likely to be the one to divert the course of Germany.

Broader Statute For Crop Benefits Planned By AAA

WASHINGTON, Apr. 13 (AP)—The Agriculture Department prepared regulations yesterday which would permit farmers to collect benefit payments under the farm law even though they planted no crops.

The regulations will be based on an amendment to the 1937 Farm Act signed by President Roosevelt Monday.

The amendment provides that a cotton, corn, wheat, rice, or tobacco farmer will be eligible for full benefit payments on the normal production of his acreage allotment, provided no plant within that allotment. Officials said a farmer with an allotment who planted no crops would be eligible for the full amount.

Breeding With Test Tubes May Become Broader

WASHINGTON, Apr. 12.—(AP)—Cattle breeding of tomorrow may be carried on by airplane.

A California dairyman is trying now to convince the Department of Agriculture it should mate his cows with a government bull in South Carolina. And he wants to mate the government's Carolina cows with his bull in California.

The method—artificial insemination.

It's been going on for some time, but without the long-distance implications that would make the airplane useful.

Artificial insemination was first worked on dogs—in the late 1700s by an Italian scientist, Lazzaro Spallanzani, but the idea didn't take hold then. Now it is being used in Denmark, Great Britain, Russia and other European countries and is spreading in the United States.

In New Jersey three dairy associations are breeding cattle by means of artificial insemination and a fourth association is being formed. Similar organizations have been started in New York state. Another is getting under way in Massachusetts and Connecticut.

The New Jersey activity has sprung up within a year. It took on a very practical aspect a few weeks ago when Shawmut Sally Queen wobbled around a Hunterdon County barnyard, the first test-tube calf born in the nation's first co-operative cattle-breeding unit.

The 400 members of the present New Jersey associations have entered 4,800 cows in a breeding project. These cows are served by 19 outstanding pedigree bulls. Artificial breeding, dairymen

Beauty Treatment Found Worth While

"Beauty treatments have a psychological effect" on patients, said Superintendent J. T. Warrmore. "They tend to retard mental deterioration and anything that can have such an effect is valuable."

ess, multiplies many times the usefulness of great sires, puts milking cows in barn space formerly occupied by inferior bulls and eliminates the possibility of spreading disease.

The program started in New Jersey with the co-operation of Alice—a six-year-old bull officially registered as N.J.E.S. Sir Mutual Army Jewel Alice, father of 17 daughters with a more milk-more butterfat complex.

Alice should father 250 daughters a year for the next three years under the artificial breeding plan. The limit under natural breeding would be 25 to 30.

Enos J. Perry, Rutgers dairy specialist, who has been a prime mover in the New Jersey project, warns farmers not to expect "magic results."

"The rate of conception on the average," he said, "is running as good as the natural figure, and frequently cows in abnormal condition have conceived, but on the other hand some herds do not respond quite as well, for reasons not altogether known."

One of the obstacles to long-distance use of artificial insemination, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture, is that no sure way has been found to keep spermatozoa alive much longer than 24 hours. The government is experimenting in an effort to keep them alive long enough to reach the point of fertilization by airplane.

Desire To Paint Provides Escape From Blindness

OKLAHOMA CITY, Apr. 12.—(AP)—Blindness was closing in upon Mrs. C. P. Cramer of Oklahoma City and a specialist had decided she must submit to a life-endangering operation.

Her hospital room was filled with fragrant flowers but Mrs. Cramer could distinguish only a blur of color without form.

Suddenly she had a desire to paint a picture of the flowers.

"From that moment on I began to recover," she says. Now, 15 months later, she is producing pictures that sell for as much as \$150 each. Before her illness she had never had an artist's brush in her hand.

"It couldn't be anything but a miracle," she says.

"Something seemed to guide

my brush over the canvas. My desire to paint was so great I never doubted that I would be able to do it."

Mrs. Cramer, suffering from a severe inflammation which specialists said surely would cause blindness, was not operated on.

She doesn't attempt to explain or analyze her experience.

"I do not know that my trouble has been cured," she says. "My eyes still trouble me and some day I may be blind, but I keep so busy with my painting I don't have time to worry about it."

INDIA CHECKS FOREIGNERS

NEW DELHI, India.—(AP)—An official bill to enforce registration and constant check of foreigners in India has been introduced in the legislative assembly and referred to a select committee. Contravention will expose a delinquent to one year's maximum imprisonment and a fine of about \$250. In the 1931 census about 450,000 people registered themselves as foreigners.
