

Killer gets new hearing

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (UPI) - Robert Anthony Preston, who avoided four dates with the electric chair for the 1978 mur 'rr of a convenience store clerk, was granted a new sentencing hearing Thursday by the Florida Supreme Court. But there's a catch. The justices said they would re-impose the ceath sentence if the state prevails in a separate courtroom battle over Preston's prior felony conviction for throwing a "deadly missile" - a beer bottle - at a moving vchicle. The judge and jury that imposed the death sentence counted the prior conviction as an aggravating factor, under Florida' system of weighing aggravating and mitigating circumstances in determining which murderers should live and which should die.

SHS grads say good-bye

SANFORD — Seminole High School graduated 332 seniors in an early morning ceremony today.

The ground still damp from last night's rain did not deter the festivities at all. Dressed in white caps and gowns. The class tracked slowly across the field at Thomas E. Whigham stadium for the 8:30 a.m. ceremony.

The standing-room-only crowd of families and friends watched as the graduates of the class of 1990 take their first step to adulthood.

Shanon Stewart, one of the top 10 graduates chosen by her peers to address the class, said as they took their next step in life, they were not afraid of the future. "For we have seen yesterday and

that has brought us to today." she said. "And today is great."

She reminded the graduates they entered high school four years ago with fear. They came from different directions, she said, and had varied goals. Lake Mary principal hands out 551 diplomas

LAKE MARY — Five hundred fifty one high school seniors marched onto the school football field last night at 7 p.m. An hour and a half later, they had been transformed into young graduates of the Lake Mary High School class of 1990.

As the anxious parents and friends began gathering in the bleachers, a light rain was falling. By the time the seniors began their procession, as if on cue, the rain stopped. The procession was led by Principal Don Reynolds, officiating at his last graduation ceremony before his retirement.



443 Oviedo grads brave rainstorm

OVIEDO - Using their mortarboards to keep the steady drizzle off their heads, 443 Oveido High School seniors accepted their diplomas and stepped off the stage as graduates.

A watercolor gray sky dripped softly on the crowd of nearly 1,000 family members and friends, who despite the conditions remained enthusiastic. Laughter, applause and cheers were not slowed by the

But the 5th District Court of Appeal ordered that Preston be re-tried on the earlier conviction after defense attorneys found a new eyewitness.

"Should Preston be re-convicted of the prior deadly missile felony before his resentencing for the murder, upon notification thereof this court shall re-impose the original death sentence," the high court said in Thursday's unsigned, unanimous opinion.

The justices ordered a new sentencing hearing within 90 days.

The case involves the murder of Earline Walker, an Altamonte Springs convenience store clerk whose nude and mutilated body was found in an open field near the store where she worked on the afternoon of Jan. 9, 1978. The store had been robbed of about \$600.


Physical evidence including his handprint on the victim's car and the discovery in his mother's house of food stamps traced to the store linked Preston to the crime, according to court records.

Another candidate turns down county manager position

SANFORD — The Seminole County manager's job has been turned down for a second time.

Michael Bryant, county administrator of Hall County, Ga., told the county's search firm Thursday night that after consulting with his wife, they decided this was "not the time for a change," said Bob Slavin of the Atlanta executive search firm MSN Management Consultants. Slavin said he was not sure if medical problems in Bryant's immediate family affected his decision. In April, Greg Fehrenbach, city

administrator of New Brunswick. N.J., also rejected the position after commissioner's offered him the job. He cited unfinished business at his current job. Slavin said Bryant's rejection of



Titan 4 rocket launched

CAPE CANAVERAL - Turning night into day, a shuttle-class Air Force Titan 4 rocket successfully boosted a military spy satellite into space Friday after a secret countdown in a spectacular flight visible for miles around.

The towering 174-foot rocket's two solid-fuel boosters, each one as tall as a 10-story building, flashed to life at 1:22 a.m. EDT - six minutes behind schedule - shattering the overnight calm with a gush of fire and a crackling roar that shook the ground like a pile driver.

It was the first launch of a \$173 million Titan 4 since the problem-plagued \$7.1 billion rocket program's maiden flight a year ago this month and the first conducted at night.

Sources said the rocket was carrying an electronic signals intelligence satellite, or ELINT, designed to intercept data from Soviet rocket tests and to eavesdrop on other forms of communication.

Fire at Trump house not suspicious

PALM BEACH - Fire brok out early Thursday in a bedroom and caused smoke damage to other rooms in the servants' wing at embattled Donald Trump's oceanfront 118-room mansion. firefighters said.

Firefighters arrived at the estate, known as Mar-a-Lago, at 8:08 a.m. and extinguished the flames within 15 minutes. Fire-Rescue Department spokesman Ken Elmore said. He estimated damage to be about \$50,000 in the wing and said the blaze did not appear to be suspicious.

"The fire was confined to the bedroom and its contents." Elmore said. "It was in the two-story wing in the southwest quarter of the mansion, which is the servants quarters. There was no structural damage. There was some smoke damage to several other bedrooms that are in that wing."

Scub-diving cops may lose jobs

JACKSONVILLE - Two Jacksonville police officers may lose their jobs because they decided to do some recreational scuba diving instead of searching for colleagues lost at sea, authorities say.

Duval County Sheriff Jim McMillan said officers Nelson Delongis and Robin Pierce conducted their search for two missing fellow officers in an area known for spearfishing rather than in the designated search area.

Six administrative charges have been lodged against the two officers

Officers Thomas Caron and Ronald Jones went fishing April 27 with a friend. Robert Duncan, off Florida's east coast near Jacksonville. The trio's boat was later found capsized.

Jones' body was later recovered but the other two men were never jound, although a shark caught off the coast contained feet belonging to one.

LAKE CITY - Two Columbia County teenagers have been charged with first degree murder in connection with the recent deaths of two women and will be tried as adults, authorities said. Authorities discovered the bodies of Frances Tomczak and her

daughter Patricia Everette last week in Tomczak's Lake City home. Both women had been shot in death. The suspects -Everette's 15-year-old son, Shawn W. Everette, and 14-year-old Losh Samuel Taylor - were charged Thursday.

Nuclear plant to restart soon

CR.'STAL RIVER - The refueling of Florida Power Corp.'s Crystal River nuclear plant is on schedule and the plant should resume power production within a few weeks, company officials Sav.

The plant was shut down March 14 for the refueling. A week-long strike by radiation safety workers did not delay the routine procedure, said Florida Power spokesman Mark Jacobs.

Jacobs said newly designed seals are being installed on reactor pumps and the plant's cooling system is being refilled, he said.

Insurance agency faces large fines

ST. PETERSBURG - State insurance regulators have fined a targe insurance agency following complaints that it used deceptive, high-pressure sales techniques on elderly customers.

The Florida Department of Insurance fined Diversified Health Services \$50,000 and put a representative in its offices full-time to monitor sales techniques.

Regulators say they also plan to punish as many as 30 current and former company agents. Those agents could face fines of upto \$20,000 apiece and license suspensions of 18 months.

The investigation began in early 1989, after complaints against the Medicare supplement insurance firm began.

Lake Mary braces for law suit over power line burial

LAKE MARY — City Attorney Ned Julian asked city commissioners last night for authority to take action to protect Lake Mary's interests after Pete D'Agostino and Al Stephens, representatives for Florida Power Corporation, made it clear that action In Seminole County circuit court would be initiated unless Lake Mary agreed to pay the full cost of undergrounding power cables along Lake Mary Boulevard.

Julian met with FPC Wednesday. He said he thought there might be some discussion concerning a resolution of the dispute short

of a lawsuit, but there was not.

"Rather than have the sherriff chase down the mayor and commissioners to serve papers. I will accept the service of process for Lake Mary," Julian said. "A suit is imminent."

Commissioner George Duryea jokingly agreed. "I move to allow Ned to be arrested in our behalf." he said.

Julian also asked the commission to allow him to identify and retain experts necessary to present the city's position in court.

He indicated a petition or counter-petition would be filed against the power company. "If the city maintains their position, Florida Power will sue. We will sue for immediate undergrounding." Julian said.

Mayor Dick Fess said he favors proceeding with the undergrounding project, which was to be done during widening of Lake Mary Boulevard scheduled to begin this year. "I think we should proceed with the widening of Lake Mary Boulevard with the power company and the city splitting the cost of installing the conduit for the underground cables. When the court and Public Service Commission decide who should pay, that's who would have to pay. We wouldn't have to tear up the road we just constructed, which seems to be standard procedure in many government projects," Fess said.

Israel and Hussein

Because Israel cannot decide which way it wants to go on negotiations with the Palestinians in the occupied territories, it now has no more than a caretaker government. And because Israel has a caretaker government, it cannot make any significant decision with respect to negotiations. As a consequence, events, not reason, are in the saddle, while the initiative in the Arab world gradually shifts from the pragmatists to the extremists.

The Arab summit in Baghdad ended with softer declaration than the hard-liners, led by Iraq's Saddam Hussein, had demanded. But the political gridlock in Jerusalem, combined with the growing number of Soviet Jews arriving in Israel each month, can only increase the tensions, both inside and outside Israel. The Arabs have no right to demand a change in Israel's immigration policy, but as long as people like Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir link that immigration, expected to reach 150,000 this year, with references to the need for a greater israel, it will be tied to - may indeed come to symbolize - Israel's refusal to negotiate over the occupied teritories, was slowly running out of steam. But those fragile hopes were dashed by the acts of one madman with an Uzi. In the meantime, pressure is slowly mounting on wavering Arab moderates ike Jordan's King Hussein, who is himself threatened by militant Palestinains in his own country and who, in the absence of brighter alternatives, may yet seek military protection from his Iraqui namesake.

This country was spared the harsh condemnation and the threats of retaliation that the Iraquis and the PLO were seeking at the Baghdad meeting. But unless Washington can bring some sort of positive momentum into play - a resumption of the peace process, a clear end to Israel's continued construction of settlements in the territories, a mutual willingness to negotlate - the United States will likewise be at the mercy of events in the Middle East. Real and threatened persecution exacerbated by glasnost and renascent Russian nationalism - makes it imperative that Soviet Jews be allowed to emigrate. But the United States, which has taken the leadership in pressing Moscow to open its doors, also has a moral responsibility to take more than the 50,000 a year it has been willing to accept. At the same time, the reduced Soviet threat in the Middle East lessens American strategic dependence on Israel, a fact that Washington shouldn't hesitate to communicate to Jerusalem in the clearest terms. The United States cannot leave Israel exposed, either politcally or militarily, to a bloody agressor like Saddam Hussein. But neither can this country, which continues to bankroll Israel's deficit-burdened budget, leave itself perennially tied to the intransigence, now become inertia, in Jerusalem. It is in both our interests to stop the extremists in the Middle East and to strengthen the moderates.

WILLIAM A. RUSHER Yeltsin sets stage for upheaval

SAN FRANCISCO - The narrow victory of Boris Yeltsin in his bid for the presidency of the Russian republic puts an end to the optimistic theory that Mikhail Gorbachev has some clear strategic goal, toward which everything is proceeding according to plan. Gorbachev i' in fact floundering, at the mercy of events over which he has little or no control.

It tells us something about the depth of Gorbachev's difficulties when we hear that his supporters are welcoming Yeltsin's victory (which Gorbachev did everything in his power to prevent) because now there will be pressures on his "left" to balance those building up on his "right." It is true that Yeltsin's objection to Gorbachev is that his "reforms" don't go far enough and aren't going fast enough, whereas most of Gorbachev's other critics (at least in the higher ranks of the Communist Party, and perhaps the military) contend exactly the reverse.

But Yeltsin has not clawed his way to the presidency of the largest Soviet republic of them all just to balance the pressures on Mikhail Gorbachev. Yeltsin's aim is to overthrow him. and he can now make major progress toward that end. The "leftist" or "liberal" dissidents in the Soviet Union imeaning. in the weird vocabulary now in use, those who favor a market


economy and a multi-party democracy) now control the city governments of Moscow and

Leningrad and thanks to Yeltsin's victory - the government of the Russian republic.

What can Mikhail Gorbachev do about all this? In theory he has broad powers as president of the U.S.S.R., but he is undoubtedly aware of the dangers of using them. If he unleashes the military on the scale that would be necessary to curb Yeltsin & Co., he will himself inevitably wind up as the military's puppet. If he tries to throw in his lot with Yeltsin and the relatively "extreme" reformers, their price will almost certainly be his resignation and replacement by Yeltain or some designee of his.

Meanwhile, as Gorbachev ponders these grim alternatives, circumstances conspire to put him in the worst of all possible positions. As president of the U.S.S.R. and the father of both glasnost and perestrolka, he is - not unreasonably - held responsible for the deterioration of the economy. Yeltsin, on the other hand, from his position of high visibility, can enjoy the luxury of criticizing Gorbachev mercilessly without having the slightest responsibility for the current state of affairs.



WASHINGTON - Behind the walls of the nation's weapons plants, crime, security lapses and contamination are almost daily occurrences. Backroom politics paying off

WASHINGTON - Everything that is right and wrong in Congress was put on display in its final burst of activity before it yielded the Washington stage to summiteers Bush and Gorbachev.

In their last pre-vacation week, the lawmakers used the negotiating skills that the best of them possess to move along two bills that will pay important dividends in better health, greater opportunity and a fuller life for millions. But then these same folks turned around and indulged their penchant for parochial politics in the interests of their own reelection by festooning an important foreign-aid bill with goodies for their home folks.

Already passed by the Senate, the Clean Air bill and the Americans with Disabilities Act guaranteeing handicapped persons equal rights to compete for jobs and use public facilites were overwhelmingly endorsed by the House. Once conference committees iron out the differences between House and Senate versions, they will be counted as two of the major achievements of this 101st Congress.

Except for the presence of many people in wheelchairs, tourists in the Capitol had few clues that anything unusual was taking place on the May days these bills were on the House floor. Debate was rarely passionate. Most of the disagreements had been negotiated privately long before the bills reached the floor.

That is more often than not the case when complex issues of social policy are being settled, not by executive flat or judicial decree but, by a large legislative body representing a wide variety of interest and views, which operates by majority rule and instinctively seeks consensus. It is not a process which suits the story-board formulas of television news or even the daily deadline requirements of newspapers. But the Clean Air and Disability bills showed how well this protracted. backroom business of legislating can serve the nation.

How do you measure the value to future generations of smog-free cities, non-polluting cars, or rainfall scrubbed of chemicals that kill lakes and trees? How do you calculate the gains for social justice and the overall sense of community - let alone for the 43 million people immediately impacted - when the protections that past civil-rights bills have provided to minorities are extended to those with disabilities.

When these bills reach the White House, speechwriters will find suitable sentiments for President Bush to utter - and the pbulic will applaud. Those who labored for months or years on these bills will be in the background. dim figures in the Oval Office chorus.

But note what Julie Rovner of Congressional Quarterly wrote about Rep. Steny H. Hoyer (D-Md.), the floor leader on the Disability bill

"He was ubiquitous during the measure's nine-month trip through the Education and Labor, Energy and Commerce, Public Works and Transportation, and Judiciary committees. He paced like an expectant father at each

of the seven subcommittee and full committee markups, and he testified at manyofthe multitudinous hearings on the bill." Although Hoyer has been in Congress for a decade and holds the No. 4 place in the Democratic leadership, it is doubtful that one American in 100 knows his name - let alone the role

Most of the he played. At the center of the Clean Air bill were two equally skillful and nationally unpublicized legislators: Reps. John D. Dingell (D-Mich.) and Henry A.

Waxman (D-Calif.), respectively the chairman of the Energy and Commerce Committee and its Health and Environment Subcommittee. Despite their common party label, these two men are opposites in background and philsophy. They represent consiluencies with clashing interests. They have fought epic battles and, while far from friends, have come to respect each other. And they were the keys to the agreements that let the House pass this complex legislation with only two days of floor debate and only 21 dissenting votes.

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But the bravos must mingle with boos, because this same Congress then turned around and displayed its fatal lack of fiscal discipline. It took a January request from the President for \$720 million in emergency aid to the fledgling democracies in Panama and Nicaragua and turned it by May into a \$4.3 billion boondoggle of goodies for favorite projects of politicians who serve on or have influence with the Appropriations committees.

This kind of experience buttresses Bush's demand for congressional spending reforms as part of any budget agreement. And it explains why critics of Congress find it so easy to lambaste the institution

those under wraps. But he was recently forced to go public with them. He gets daily briefing reports on all the mishaps at the nuclear plants. In March, a Department of Energy staffer accidentally faxed one daily report to the offices of various state governors. Once DOE officials

Once DOE officials found out about the blunder, they begged the governors to destroy the memos.

found out about the blunder, they begged the governors to destroy the memos. Not a chance. The states' governors must live with the messes the federal government creates at weapons plants, and they weren't about to pass up an opportunity to criticize DOE for its management of those plants.

The briefing report, with its almost casual litany of the daily goings on at the weapons plants, quickly leaked out. Watkins knew when he was cornered, so he agreed to make the daily reports public.

Our associate Scott Sinck reviewed several months worth of memos listing the gaffes at DOE plants. They show that crime, security violations and contamination occur with regularity.

On April 5, 1990 a worker at the Savannah River plant in South Carolina was contaminated as he helped a co-worker out of a plastic suit. On the same day, two employees were contaminated at the Rocky Flats plant in Colorado during the removal of their protective suits. And, on the same day, contamination was found on a worker's clothes at the Oak Ridge plant in Tennessee.

On April 13, three radiation incidents were recorded at a DOE lab in Richland, Wash. Workers were exposed in a chemistry lab. Tainted paint was used in another lab, and an employee was found to have radioactive material on his hand when he left work

Accidents at the plant aren't limited to radioactive materials. Earlier this spring PCB oil was spilled at the Oak Ridge plant. PCBs cause cancer, and PCB spills have been cause to evacuate neighborhoods and industrial sites. Asbestos was found at a steam plant at Oak Ridge also.

Some accidents can be excused, but there is no excuse for the crimes that take place at nuclear weapons plants. The DOE's sloppy security checks have not weeded out danger ous people. Crimes, such as drug deals and drug use and theft of classified documents are frequent occurrences at nuclear weapons plants.

We have exposed serious flaws in the DOE security clearance system, and the publication of the daily briefing reports proves our point. People who want jobs at sensitive and dangerous nuclear weapons plants are supposed to go through a lengthy clearance process, but many slip through because of lax scrutiny.

Secretary Watkins deserves some credit for going public with the daily incident reports. But that is where the credit ends, until Watkins shows that he can stop the mishaps.

Tampa man arrested in spy case

TAMPA - A former soldier faces espionage charges for allegedly selling military secrets to a former sergeant who was convicted this week of treason in West Germany, FBI officials said Friday.

Roderick James Ramsay, 28. a former sergeant in the U.S. Army 8th Infantry Division. headquartered in Bad Kreuznach, West Germany, was arrested without incident Thursday night for gathering or delivering defense information to ald foreign governments, FBI spokesman Larry Curtin said.

Ramsay was scheduled to make an initial appearance before a U.S. magistrate Friday Anter the morning. Curtin said.

FBI officials said Ramsay's arrest was made as part of an investigation into the activities of Clyde Lee Conrad, a retired sergeant who was convicted Wednesday of treason by a West German court.

Ramsay was assigned to West Germany from 1983 to 1985 and worked under Conrad's Immediate supervision, the FBt and 1985. Secret service experts said.

"It is alleged that he (Ramsay) received approximately \$20,000 from Conrad," Curtin said.

"In exchange for that \$20,000. he is alleged to have supplied Conrad with ... general plans for the defense of Europe, documents dealing with the tactical use of nuclear weapons by NATO and the United States, documents coordinating various NATO forces, technical manuals and military communications technology." Curtin said. "The documents were then given to Hungarian and Czechoslovakian intelligence services."

Conrad, 42, was sentenced to life in prison for selling military secrets to communist governments by a West German judge who ruled that he placed West Germany and U.S. troops at risk. The judge said Conrad, a native of Bergholz, Ohio, was paid more than \$1.3 million by

the former communist governments of Hungary and Czechosluvakia between 1975 said it was the largest known fee

paid to an agent. Conrad was arrested in West Germany August 1988 and formally indicted one year later for selling top secret nuclear and other military plans to the Hungarian and Czechoslovakian secret services over a 10-year period.

Conrad joined the army in 1965 and was transferred to the 8th Infantry Division in 1980.

He worked as a document custodian, which gave him access to key documents on U.S. installations and strategy. Some of the documents he was accused of selling were coded "cosmic secret" and related to U.S. missile bases and a NATO pipeline system.

Conrad has lived in West Germany with his German wife and their son since he retired from the army in September 1985

PENSACOLA - An Army ship operating out of Pensacola Naval Air Station is testing an electronics-laden blimp to gauge its effectiveness in catching drug smugglers, base officials said Thursday.

The Carlson Tide began operating out of the northwest Florida port earlier this month and will run tests on the blimp until July. Final deployment of the vessel and blimp has not

"The Carlson Tide is undergoing acceptance tests prior to supporting the Department of Defense participation in the drug interdiction program." said a written response from the Army to questions about the vessel and blimp.

The Carlson Tide, which can accommodate up to 32 personnel, is dominated by an 84-foot-long, unmarked white blimp tethered to its aft. The blimp can rise to 2,500 feet and

remain aloft for 30 days, officials

said. Sensor systems aboard the blimp are designed to detect and locate low-flying aircraft and sea vessels. Army officials said. The data compiled by the blimp is passed on to civil law enforce-

According to the Army, the Carlson Tide is the first vessel to be developed by the Army solely in support of the DOD drug interdiction program. However, others "may be assembled at a later date," the Army said.

The 8-month-old Army program is an outgrowth of a 5-year-old land-based acrostat program designed to detect the vehicular movements of ground troops. The ship provides more mobility and flexibility in deploying the system.



Hurricanes, Gators will resume football rivalry

MIAMI - The Universities of Miami and Florida are negotiating with some success to resume their annual home football rivalry, Gator Athletic Director Bill Arnsparger said.

Arnsparger said the schools will play in 1996, 1997, 1999 and 2000. Games had already been scheduled at Gainesville in 1992 and at Miami in 1993.

"We wanted to do 1994 and 1995 too, but the contracts (with other schools) were just too light." Arnsparger said. "I'm glad we're going to be able to fill in some of our blanks with Miami."

Arnsparger said negotiations are continuing for a game in 1998 and in 2001. He said the 2001 game is virtually a certainty, but they have not yet found an acceptable date.

The two teams have not played since 1987, when Miami won 31-4.

'Obviously we've been working very hard all along for this series," Miami athletic director Sam Jankovich said. "We never wanted to drop it. When Florida left, it was hard to get comparable opponents and they didn't show an interest again until Steve Spurrier had been hired" as head football coach earlier this year.

The day Spurrier was hired he announced his desire to play the Hurricanes, last year's national champions.

"We can't hide, duck or blink when the University of Miami is mentioned," Spurrier said. "We need to play Miami. They've had the most outstanding program in the country. If our goal is to be as good as they've been, we need to play them."

Jankovich said he and Arnsparger began talks about scheduling after Spurrier expressed his attitude.

When Florida dropped Miami from its schedule, it blamed a Southeastern Conference requirement that each team play seven league games

Churches in chase for softball title



Drexler comes through as Blazers edge Pistons in OT

AUBURN HILLS, Mich. - Clyde Drexler. criticized in the past for failing in the clutch. came through for the Portland Trail Blazers when it mattered most.

Drexler forced his way toward the basket, was fouled and sank 2 free throws with 2.1 seconds. remaining in overtime Thursday mght, enabling Portland to even the NBA Finals at one game aplece with a 106-105 triump's over the Detroit Pistons.

"For anybody who thinks he's not a money player just look at the film tonight." Trail Blazers Coach Rick Adelman said. "Look at the plays he made tonight with the guys we had on the bench.

Drexle: made 13 of 20 shots and scored 8 of his 33 points in overtime. Portland played most of the extra session without starters Kevin-Duckworth and Jerome Kersey, who had both fouled out

Drexler's game-winning effort came after Bill Laimbeer had tied a Finals record with his sixth-3-pointer of the game, putting the Pistons ahead 105-104 with 4.1 seconds left,

"The final play was designed to go to me, to see what I had or to see what was open." Drexlersaid. "(Dennis Rodman) definitely blocked me. it was pretty obvious. It was a great call (by referce-Jack Madden)."

Portland recovered from its fourth-quarter fold in the opener to wrest the home-court advantage from the defending league champions and hand Detroit its first playoff loss in 11 home games this year.

With the next three games set for Portland's Memorial Coliseum - Game 3 is Sunday afternoon - the Trail Blazers suddenly are in control of the best-of-seven series.

Portland is 9.0 at home in the playoffs, and Detroit has lost its last 20 games on the Trail Blazers' court since 1974. Three more losses would give Portland its first NBA title in 13 years.

'Right now we're sitting pretty, we've got the next three games at home." said Terry Porter, who set a Finals record by making 15 of 15 foul shots. "We've got to feel good."

The second of Lambeer's three 3 positiers to overtime with 1:28 left had given Detroit a

102-98 lead. However, Porter hit 2 free throws and Drexler nailed a tying jumper with 50.7 seconds left.

Porter missed a difficult jumper but Buck Williams, while struggling to control the reoound, was touled by Joe Dumars with 9.6 seconds left. Wuliams, a 70 percent free-throw shooter in the regular season, made both for a 104-102 lead.

Lambeer, who had 19 of his 26 points after the third quarter, then canned his final long-range basket but Drexler answered with his decisive free throws.

After I hit the shot I looked at the clock and still saw four seconds, which is an eternity in the NBA," Laimbeer said.

Detroit still had hope when the Trail Blazers. with a foul to give, grabbed James Edwards on an inhounds play. That set up another inhounds play with 1.5 seconds to go but Edwards missed a ladeaway jumper at the buzzer.

The overtime was the first in the Finals since 1984, when Boston beat the Los Angeles Lakers, Porter added 21 points and 10 assists, and See NBA, Page 2B





Southern Baptist fight gets uglier

Fundamentalists in the Southern Baptist Convention - in control of the denomination's presidency for 11 years and now extending their power over other board and agencies - are hailing "a new day" in the church's life.

But as messengers prepare to gather in New Orleans for the June 12-14 annual meeting of the nation's largest Protestant denomination, church members might

wonder what that "new day" will bring. There is, for example, Jerry Johnson, pastor of Central Baptist Church in Aurora. Colo.

Johnson is the fundamentalists' newcst addition to the board of trustees of Southern Seminary in Louisville, the convention's senior seminary and one of its most prestigious.

The pastor, who was 14 years old when the fundamentalist takeover effort was launched and who did not attend a Southern Baptist seminary, began his term in April with a bang, accusing seminary president Roy Honeycutt and several faculty members of "doctrinal infidelity."

"One would have to be as blind as a mole not see that Dr. Honeycutt just does not believe the Bible," according to Johnson. How do you respond to such charges?

I pray that these words will be a blessing to you as they are to 1st John 1 chap. 3-4 verse.

That which we have seen and heard declare we unto you, that ye also may have fellowship with us; and truly our fellowship is with the Father, and with his Son Jesus Christ. And these

things write unto you, that your loy may be full." (Joy cannot be made full without fellowship.) These are two great objectives in redemption; the first is relationship, the second objective is to restore to man his last

as righteousness is restored to hlm. Job 33 Chap. 26 verse. "He shall pray unto God, and

he will be favorable unto him: and he shall see his face with Joy; for he will render unto man his righteousness." (He restoreth unto man his righteousness.) We have found that sonship

without fellowship would neither satisfy the heart of the Father nor the heart of his child.

Fellowship must be based up n absolutely sure grounds so the child knows that he can go into the Father's presence with the same freedom that your child enters yours. It must not be based upon as our savior and confess him as grounds of pity or sufferance but our Lord then God himself, on the ground of love's own through the word by the holy relationship. Fellowship is based upon righteousness. Fellowship means sharing together, that is fellowship. Jesus said, "I am the vine and ye are the branches."





Senate panel approves cable TV bill

WASHINGTON - The Senate Commerce Committee passed a bill to re-regulate cable television rates in an important step toward giving consumers federal protection from skyrocketing cable TV fccs.

The legislation, sent to the Senate floor today on a vote of 18-1, would return to the Federal Communications Commission the authority to regulate rates for cable television services. "We're going to put the FCC back watching these things. I think cable is going to be disciplining itself." said Sen. Ernest Hollings, D-S.C., the committee's chairman.

The cable relevision industry was deregulated in 1984. Since then consumers have complained about higher cable prices and declining service.

Tropical forest losses 50 percent worse

WASHINGTON - The world is losing its tropical forests much faster than previously thought, with deforestation running at a rate of 40 million to 50 million acres a year - an area the size of the state of Washington, according to a new study.

In the first global deforestation estimate in 10 years, the report by World Resources Institute said Thursday new analyses of satellite photos show tropical rainforest is being wiped out 50 percent faster than was indicated by previous studies.

The institute, a Washington environmental research group, said the last comparable deforestation study was in 1980 by the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization, which put rainforest losses at 28 million acres per year.

While acknowledging some uncertainty over the new deforestation estimate. James Speth, president of the institute, said his group's report clearly showed the 1980s were a decade of tremendous environmental devastation.

House overrides Bush's Amtrak veto

WASHINGTON - The House voted to override President Bush's veto of a two-year \$1.4 billion Amtrak authorization bill but Republicans, citing absenteeism and a possible lack of votes, blocked Senate action. The House voted Thursday to override the veto 294-123, more than the two-thirds vote needed, but Democratic leader George Mitchell of Maine predicted a "close vote" in the the Senate.

Bush vetoed the bill because it contained a provision that would allow the Interstate Commerce Commission to review takeovers of railroads by non-rail companies.

Despite 11 previous attempts, Congress has never overridden a Bush veto in his nearly 17 months in the White House.

Although MitcDell called up the veto override as soon as the House completed action, Senate Republican leader Robert Dole of Kansas refused to permit a vote. "We have five absentces," Dole said. "They would like to be here to and vote.

'Implicit consensus' to cut deficit

WASHINGTON - White House budget director Richard Darman said there is an "implicit consensus" among White House and congressional budget negotiators to cut the deficit by \$45 billion to \$60 billion next year.

Darman made his comments Thursday after negotiators ended a sometimes frustrating daylong discussion about possible cuts in entitlement programs such as Social Security. WASHINGTON - Government officials, farm groups, medical

researchers and patients de-nounced animal rights activists Thursday three days before a planned protest in the nation's apital by opponents of animal research.

"I am saddened and a bit angry myself that we have had to put up with major disruptions to science by the so-called animal rights activists - who are. in fact, nothing more than animal rights terrorists," said Health and Human Services Secretary Louis Sullivan.

"In the past they have tried to foster a siege mentality among our scientists and at our nation's laboratories. They have tried to put us on the defensive, through intimidation and even violence," he said. "They will not succeed because they are on the wrong side of morality. It would be evil to forsake vital animal research when lives hang in the balance."

Sullivan was joined at a news conference by actor David Birney.

Rep. Vin Weber, R.-Minn., received a petition opposing animal rights activities and condemned such actions.

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa - The announcement that the nationwide state of emergency would be lifted brought divided reaction from the leadership of the African National Congress but a decisive welcome from Western leaders.

The positive response Thursday from the White House and the British Foreign Office prompted Foreign Minister Roelof "Pik" Botha to suggest the West ought to review its economic sanctions against the country.

who spent 26 years in prison before being freed by de Klerk last year, described the president's announcement as one of his "half measures," and insisted the nearly 4-year-old emergency also be withdrawn from Natal.

Mangosuthu Buthelezi, the moderate politician whose Natal-based Inkatha movement has battled ANC supporters in the province at a cost of 3,000 lives over the past three years, described as "lamentably tragic" the emergency's partial reimposition but welcomed the overall measure.

De Klerk, continuing to chip at four decades of apartheid in spite of growing white resentment, said his decision to lift the emergency had removed one of the "major stumbling" blocks to full-blown power-sharing negotiations with the black majority.

He called on the ANC to demonstrate its "commitment to peace" by abandoning the armed struggle and its calls on the West to maintain

DEAR READER: As you imply. certain medications increase the risk of complications from surgery. For example, Tenormin (atenolo), a beta blocker used to treat hypertension) can cause a patient to have an unacceptably slow heart rate during general anesthesia. Therefore, the prudent patient always informs the physician, the anesthesiologist or the surgeon about medicines he is taking - both prescription drugs and over-the-counter compounds.

In addition, before surgery, a patient should never stop prescription drugs on his own. This could be dangerous. For instance, if you were to discontinue Tenormin, without your doctor prescribing an appropriate substitute, your blood pressure could suddenly rise to very high levels; the rise might be accentuated by the stress of surgery, putting you at risk for stroke or heart failure. Therefore, if patients need to forego their medicines for several days, this decision (and the subsequent monitoring) should be made by a physician.

In your case, you probably don't need to discontinue Tenormin because most prostate surgery is performed under spinal anesthesia, during which the lower portion of your body is temporarily numbed while you remain fully awake. Because heart function and respiration are not affected by spinal anesthesia - as they are by general anesthesia - the effects of the Tenormin should pose no threat.


