Cash machine stolen

WINTER SPRINGS - Several suspects stole an automatic teller machine from a fast food restaurant Tuesday morning, sheriff's deputies said.

In the second such case in the county this year, deputies responded to a 2:10 a.m. alarm at the McDonald's restaurant at 1325 Tuscarilla Road, said sheriff's spokesman Ed McDonough.

Deputies said the suspects probably used a truck to steal the ATM, which weighed about 400 to 500 pounds. The machine was later found about four miles away, McDonough said.

Flooding to create storage

APOPKA In an effort to reduce flooding on Lake Apopka and the downstream chain of lakes, the St. Johns River Management District plans to intentionally increase flooding of former farmland today to create additional flood water storage in the region.

Any time any area receives as much rain as we have, flooding is going to be a concern, said John Weble, the district's assistant executive director.

As heavy rains forced lake levels to rise throughout the Christmas holiday, district engineers were tasked with reducing the flooding on Lake Apopka and the surrounding chain of lakes. To help ease the flooding in the agricultural area around Lake Apopka while balancing flood levels in residential areas around Lake Dora, the district will divert water to four cells in the northern portion of its marsh flow way project.

The flooding concerns were brought on by more than 12 inches of rain this month that soaked Central Florida. Normal December rainfall for Lake County rarely exceeds 2.5 inches.

Investigate before you join a health club

TALLAHASSEE-The excesses of the holiday season often give way to well-intentioned New Year's resolutions to lose weight and get fit. But Florida Agriculture and Consumer Services Commissioner Bob Crawford is urging consumers to educate themselves before buying a membership at a health studio.

The Department administers the Health Studio Act, which provides consumers some protections and recourse against businesses that do not comply with the law. Most health studios are required to register with the Department and post the registration certificate in a conspicuous place.

"I applaud the fact that Floridians are becoming more and more health conscious," Crawford said. "But in the past, some health studios have gone out of business after collecting membership fees up front. These are things consumers should know before making an expensive investment."

Crawford urged consumers who are interested in joining a health club to visit during the hours it would be most used to see how crowded the club is. Consumers should also find out about a health club's cancellation and illness policies prior to signing up.

Consumers can call the Department's Consumer Hotline at 1-800 HELP FLA (1-800-435-7352) to verify whether the health club they are considering joining is registered.

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

SAC teams stay alive

Two reach semifinals, three still in Consolation running at Florida Hospital Invitational

ORLANDO — When it comes to addictive substances, there are few as potent as success. Once a team or an athlete gets a taste of it, they'll work hard to get a taste of it again.

Take, for example, the Lyman and Lake Howell boys' soccer teams.

Last year, the Lyman Greyhounds suffered through a subpar season by Lyman standards that ended with a loss in the semifinals of the district tournament.

Meanwhile, the Lake Howell Silver Hawks enjoyed one of their better campaigns in recent years, a run that ended with a loss in the semifinals of the district tournament.

Both teams want more out of this season.

On Tuesday, the two teams advanced another step toward a possible meeting in the finals of the Florida Hospital Invitational with quarterfinal victories.

At Bishop Moore High School, goalie Shane Lefebvre stopped a pair of shots in the penalty kick tiebreaker to boost Lyman to a 2-1 win over the Oviedo Lions. In the late game at Edgewater High School, keeper Matt Campbell took stopped Lake Howell to a 2-0 shutout of DeLand.

In today's semifinals, Lyman will play Melbourne (which knocked off Winter Park 3-1 Tuesday at 1 p.m. at Bishop Moore) while Lake Howell takes on Satellite (4-0 winner over Leesburg Tuesday) in the 4 p.m. contest at Edgewater.

The championship game is scheduled for 4 p.m. Thursday, Jan. 1, at Edgewater High

Even though they graduated five key players from last year's team, the Silver Hawks have their sights set on winning the Florida Hospital Invitational.

"Before the season began, we had a meeting and the team set some goals for itself," said Lake Howell boys' soccer coach Scott Betsinger. "One of the goals they set for themselves was to do better in this tournament."

Considering the fact that the Lake Howell Silver Hawks finished second in the tournament last year, losing to Lake Brantley on penalty kicks in the finals, all that remains for Betsinger's boys' trojans is to win the tournament.

"We have put a lot of focus on this tournament," admitted Betsinger. "Seabreeze (which fell to Lake Howell 2-1 on penalty kicks Monday) helped bring us back to the reality that any team can beat any team in this tournament."

DeLand also tested Lake Howell's resolve, playing the Silver Hawks to a scoreless tie in the first half. Second-half goals by Marvin Gabriel and Jeremy McGovern boosted the Silver Hawks into the semifinals.

Steve Bowman assisted on McGovern's goal.

"The guys kept their wits about them and focused on the job at hand," said Betsinger.

Depending on whom you spoke with, you'd probably hear that Lyman didn't do much defeat Oviedo as it did survive.

One person who was of that opinion was Lyman coach Ray Sandridge.

"They (Oviedo) beat us," said Sandridge. "They were the better team tonight. But Shane stepped up and made some big saves tonight."

Knight tabbed All-America

ORLANDO — University of Central Florida men's soccer player Heikki Rissanen (Espoo, Finland) has been selected to the 1997 NSCAA/Umbro All-America Team.

Rissanen, a sophomore forward, is the first men's soccer player to earn All-America honors at UCF since the school moved up to NCAA Division I in 1984.

Rissanen finished the 1997 regular season ranked second in the nation in goals scored with 23. An ankle injury kept him from playing the final two games of the season, preventing him the opportunity to score the two goals he needed to break the school record he set for goals in a season last year (24 goals). He finished the regular season with 47 total points, 23 goals and one assist.

Rissanen has amassed 98 total points and 47 goals in the two seasons he has played as a Golden Knight. UCF was ranked as high as 13th in the nation by Soccer America this year.

Lake Mary, Cocoa to meet for Classic title

LAKE MARY — Lake Mary's Mike Gaudreau must be on cloud nine this morning.

Every coach designs his offense to get layups and short jump shots and his defense to force turnovers and long jump shots.

Tuesday night in the semifinals of the 1997 Lake Mary Holiday Classic, the Rams followed the coach's plan to near perfection as 26 of Lake Mary's 29 field goals came on layups and two of the other three baskets were on jump shots in the "paint" of less than 10 feet as the Rams whipped Central Florida Christian Academy, 68-48.

The only long jump shot came on a three pointer early by Randy Abrams.

Lake Mary forward Ben Kerschbrock picked up where he left off Monday night, scoring the Rams' first field goal of the night off an offensive rebound.

CFCA center Mike Grier then answered with a three pointer to give the Eagles a 3-2 lead, but Lake Mary scored the next 14 points and forced eight turnovers to take a 16-3 advantage with 1:56 left in the first period and CFCA would not get any closer the rest of the way.

Paul Beik led the way for the Rams, scoring a game-high 24 points netting six points in each quarter, hitting seven of 12 from the floor and 10 of 10 from the free throw line to go along with six rebounds, five assists and four steals.

Easy ante for a pot roast feast

The proverb tells us that in spring, a young man's fancy turns to love. But what does it turn to in winter? Pot roast, of course.

Pot roast is perfect winter food. It scents and warms the kitchen as it cooks, and warms YOU as you eat it, bathed in its own delicious gravy. Pot roast is Yankee soul food. Serve it with a bottle of red wine and a loaf of great bread and you've got yourself a mid-winter feast.

Now, maybe I'm imagining things, but it seems to me that pot roast has fallen out of fashion in recent years. All sorts of good plain dishes — like roast chicken and meat loaf — have made their way back into people's good graces, appearing on trendy restaurant menus and on tables set for company dinners. But it's a rare hostess who will serve pot roast to her guests these days ... which I think is a crying shame.

Because not only is pot roast perfect winter food, it's perfect company for dinner food: it can be made a day ahead (in fact, it's better if it is), requires little last minute fussing, and is loved by both adults and children (unless they are vegetarians). It requires few side dishes, and can serve lots of people for a relatively low cost.

I am very partial to good old Yankee pot roast, and am not ashamed to admit that I make mine with a package of onion soup mix (and a lot of red wine). I have to pass on this tip: If you are cooking pot roast on a gas range, stack two burner grates to distance the pot from the flame. This avoids two evils: burning the pot and boiling the meat, which makes it tough. I learned that tip from Cook's Illustrated magazine, and happily pass it on. I also pass on a tip I read in a 100 year old church ladies' cookbook: a spoonful of stewed tomatoes in the gravy is an improvement.

So now I always put can of tomato paste in my pot roast. Here's my last tip, which I learned from my mom, which is to cut slits in the meat and stuff them with slivers of garlic before cooking. This works for almost any dish requiring a hunk of beef.

But old fashioned pot roast doesn't sound fancy enough for you, try the following dishes: a Daube Provencal and a Stufatu, which I have taken the liberty of translating as "French Pot

noodles or mashed potatoes.

Yield: 4 servings
— Recipe from Chef Michele LeBorgne, New England Culinary Institute, Montpelier, VT.

STUFATU

1-1/2 cups dry red wine
1/2 cup olive oil
2 garlic cloves, minced
1 tablespoon chopped fresh thyme or 1/2 teaspoon dried
1 tablespoon chopped fresh summer savory or 1/2 teaspoon dried
Salt and freshly ground pepper, to taste
1 3-pound boneless beef rump or bottom round roast, trimmed of fat
1 large onion, peeled and chopped
1 large ripe tomato, chopped
1 2-inch strip of orange zest
2 canned anchovy fillets, drained and finely chopped
24 tiny black olives cured in brine (Nicoise olives)

In a large bowl, whisk together the wine and 1/4 cup of the oil. Add the garlic, thyme, summer savory, salt and pepper, and mix. Add the beef, spoon the liquid over the beef several times. Cover with plastic wrap and marinade in the refrigerator for 24 hours, turning the meat twice during that time.

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Drain and pat dry the beef, reserving the marinade. In a large Dutch oven and brown the meat, in batches, on all sides. Pour the marinade back into the pan and add the carrots, onions, tomatoes, and thyme. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Place in oven and cook for 3 hours. Add olives, stir through the pot to heat, and pour into a warmed bowl. Excellent served with cooked egg

Stir the wine and vinegar together in a large bowl. Put the meat in, stirring gently to coat. Cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate overnight.

Preheat the oven to 275 degrees. Drain the meat, reserving the marinade. Heat the oil in a large Dutch oven and brown the meat, in batches, on all sides. Pour the marinade back into the pan and add the carrots, onions, tomatoes, and thyme. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Place in oven and cook for 3 hours. Add olives, stir through the pot to heat, and pour into a warmed bowl. Excellent served with cooked egg

Careful planning crucial for battered wife



Many times over the years I have urged battery victims to leave their batterer. However, the decision when to make that move is a very delicate and personal one. The timing cannot be decided "for" someone, no matter how well meaning one is.


