Governor LeRoy Collins officially suspended Tax Assessor Mary Earle Walker from office today and named Richard McCanna, a real estate man and member of the County Board, to replace her.



McCanna, 62, has been a resident of the state 22 years, 10 of them spent in the real estate business. He was mayor of Maitland from 1938 to 1941 and in vice chairmanship of the county board.

McCanna was the choice of Collins supporters in Seminole County, the legislative delegation and others who had no meetings during the weekend to discuss possible nominees for the remaining 15 months of Mrs. Walker's term.

# Typhoon Racks Japan, Heavy Toll Reported

TOKYO (UPI) — The most disastrous typhoon in many years struck Japan for 12 hours today, the strongest with winds up to 125 m.p.h., leaving more than 1,000 persons dead or missing in its wake.

Damage to U. S. Air Force installation in this island nation was estimated at more than a million dollars, but the only known American casualty was an airman slightly injured by flying glass.

# Koufax Vs Storm Roars Toward Mainland

MIAMI (UPI) — Hurricane Gracie wallowed slowly through the Atlantic in the direction of the U. S. mainland today, and a hurricane watch has ordered from Savannah, Ga., to Wilmington, N. C.

The storm was moving toward the west-northwest at about six miles per hour. Meanwhile, the weather bureau reported it had located a "suspectious" low pressure area in the Atlantic more than 1,300 miles east of Florida.

Gale force winds extended about 200 miles in the northern semi-circle and 125 miles to the south. It was expected to continue moving to the northwest during the next 12 to 24 hours at about the same speed with little change in size or intensity.

# Cubans Smash Rebel Airdrop

HAVANA (UPI)—Government troops broke up an attempted airdrop of arms to American rebels in the mountains of the Sierra Maestra and arrested a number of prominent local residents, among them Consul General Francisco Sanchez and a number of businessmen.

Reports said a light plane of undetermined origin dropped two parachutes carrying 11 Springfield rifles and a sizable quantity of ammunition.

Government troops captured the parachuted arms and arrested a number of persons who appeared to be waiting for the airdrop.

## UN Asked To Discuss Red Suppression Of Tibetans

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI)—Ireland and Malta will ask the General Assembly today to discuss Red China's suppression to human rights in conquered Tibet.

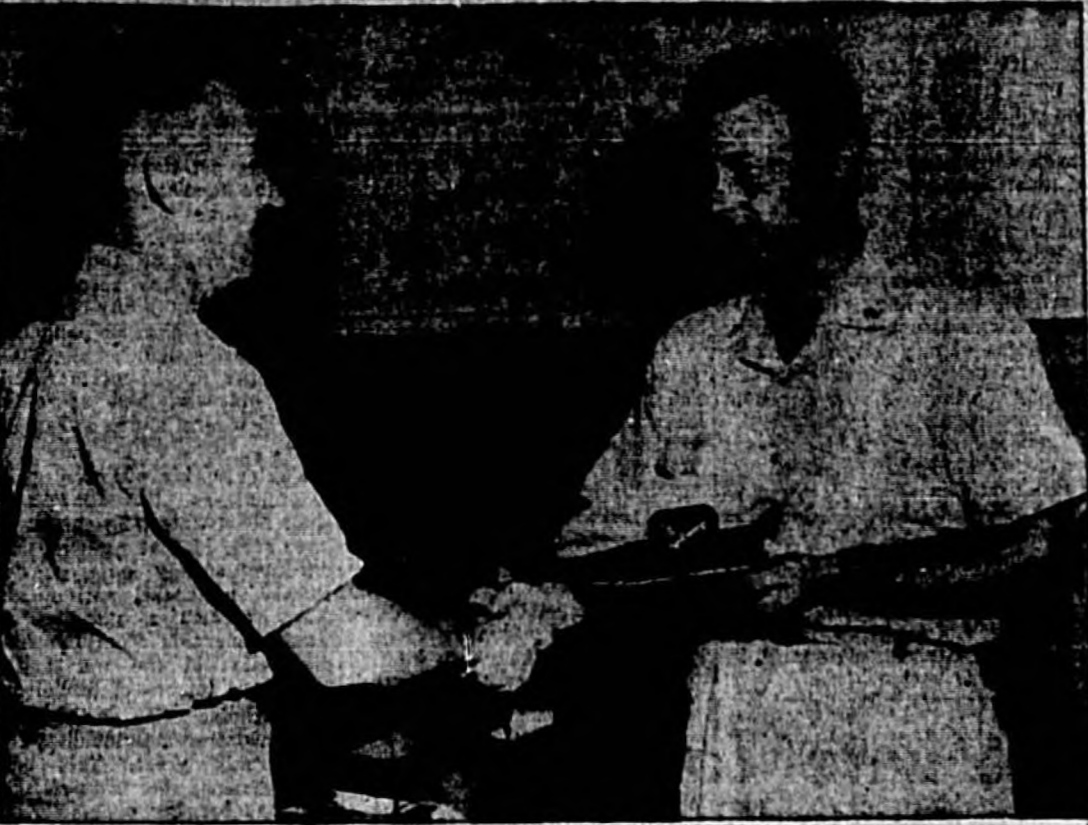

### Pilot Makes Use Of Busy Highway To Land Plane

SALEM, Va. (UPI)—The pilot of a private plane with three passengers used a busy highway near here as a runway Sunday night when he was forced to make an emergency landing. Witnesses said the plane with four vacationing Los Angeles residents crash-landed on U. S. 11, two miles west of here, and struck a car. The plane occupants and four persons in the car miraculously escaped serious injury. The pilot of the plane, Robert Ross 30, said he was forced to set the plane down when it ran out of gas. But Ross, a government employe, denied that his plane, which flipped over on one wing as it came down, hit the automobile. He said the car deliberately drove off the road to avoid a crash. Ross suffered a cut eye. His wife, Sophie, and two friends, Robert Gavin and Francis Scallick, were not injured. The four passengers of the car suffered only minor bruises. They were Charles A. Stump Jr., 36, his wife, Myrtle, 38, and their daughters, Victoria Lynn, 7, and Carol Ann, 20 months, all of Roanoke, Va. Traffic on the busy highway was tied up for miles. Workmen had to work two hours to clear away the wreckage and wash away spilled gasoline to avoid fire.

### Children's Committee Meet Slated Thursday

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Chairmen of county children's committees and representatives of state agencies and volunteer organizations will meet here Thursday to finalize a report covering every phase of the lives of children in Florida. The report is being made for the White House Conference on Children, but Florida Children's Commission Chairman Mrs. C. D. Johnson of Quincy said the work will find its greatest use here in the state. More than 100 persons have been involved in the massive writing job which covers everything from mental illnesses in children to juvenile delinquency. Some 21 areas will be dealt with in all. It will be the first full-scale report since the 1950 White House Conference. It will give the state a picture of the problems, services now available for dealing with them, and what can be done in the future. "Already the material gathered shows several serious gaps and unmet needs in services by both state agencies and private and volunteer organizations," Mrs. Johnson said. "We will use the findings as a basis for action in the months to come."

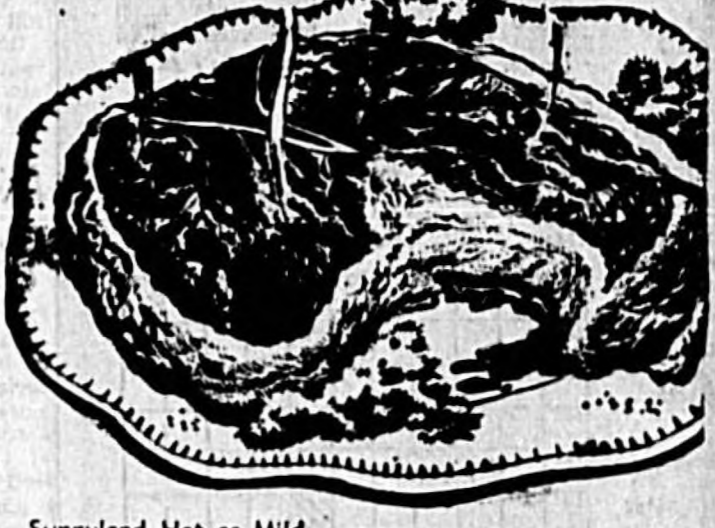

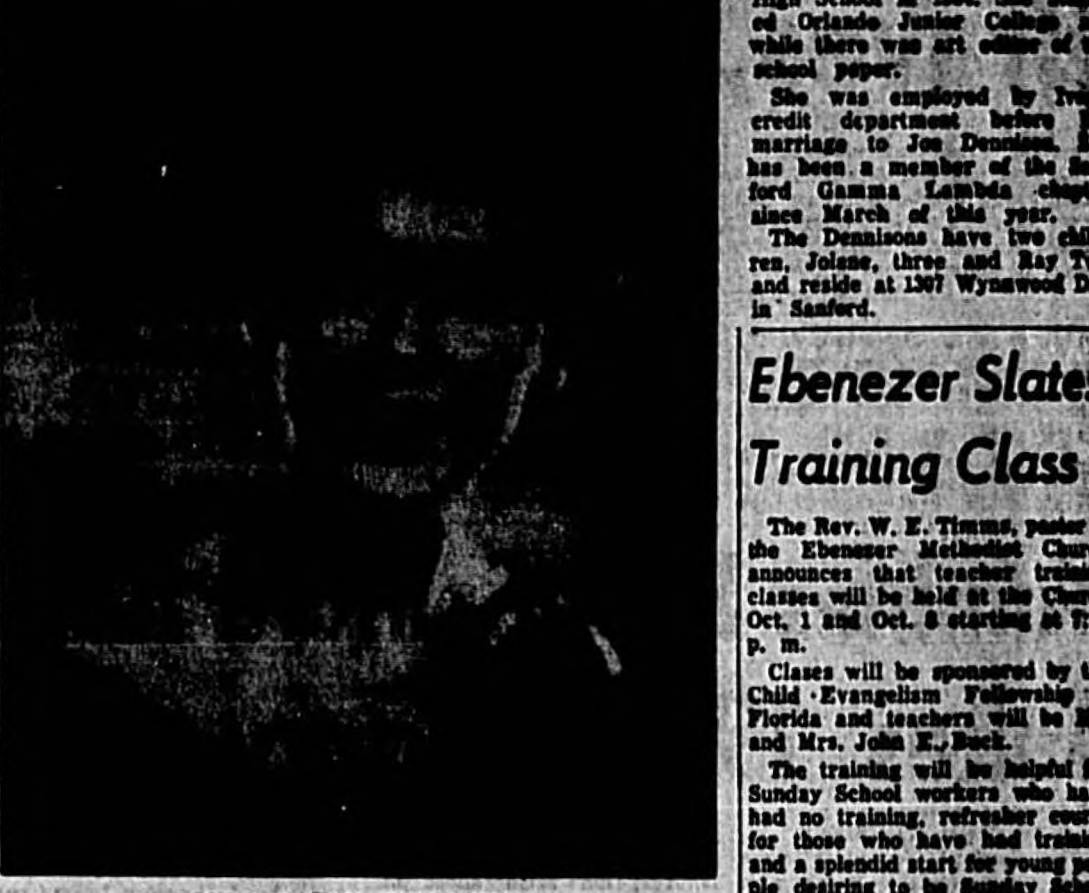

# Plenty Of Thrills In SEC Play

Plenty Of Thrills In SEC Play  
ATLANTA (UPI) — If it's thrills and spills they're looking for, the fans in the Southeast have already gotten their money's worth this season — and there are still two full months to go.  
Saturday was one of those days when few of the outcomes were decisive until the final gun. Here in Atlanta, Georgia Tech's 16-12 victory over Southern Methodist was still in doubt after the gun sounded.  
The Tech-SMU game was probably as exciting as any in the nation. It featured a brilliant passing duel between quarterbacks Fred Braseillon of Tech and Don Meredith of Southern Methodist in which the lead changed hands four times.  
Braseillon gained 132 yards running and passing and threw two touchdown passes. Meredith lived up to pre-season billing by passing for 191 yards and a pair of touchdowns. Place-kicking specialist Tommy Wells furnished Tech's margin with the only conversion of the game and a 29-yard field goal.  
A Tech interception ended a final Meredith passing threat with less than two minutes to go. But Tech punted in the closing seconds and SMU halfback Frank Jackson almost went the distance after the clock ran out in a 34-yard run.  
The revenge bent Tennessee Vols beat the Auburn Tigers 3-0 to end the Tiger string of 24 straight field goal stand up with some great defensive play. Four pass interceptions helped Tennessee hang the first loss on Auburn since mid-season 1958.  
Georgia entrenched its position as the SEC dark horse with the solid win over Vanderbilt. Speedy Fred Brown, sitting out the Alabama game after going AWOL the previous week, played as expected — scoring one touchdown and setting up another for the Bulldogs.  
Florida trailed Mississippi State 12-0 with less than four minutes to play and came from behind with some heads-up football. Tackle Dan Royal blocked a State punt and Dan Edgington scooped it up and went 21 yards to score. Still down one point, quarterback Dick Allen passed for the winning two-point.

## Close Pennant Chases Bring Out 19 Million Fans

Which may have a great though untrained ability to diagnose medical ailments. Beagles and bloodhounds are noted for their keen noses. And ailments of the body often produce a change in our inner chemistry, thus probably altering our sense of smell. How do you sense Fred's situation? Dogs seem to have a sharper sense than any of our medical technicians.

**By Dr. GEORGE W. CRANE**

**CASE C — 440:** Botch, aged 7, is a beagle dog belonging to her daughter Judy, although Mrs. Crane and I have been stuck with feeding and looking after Botch ever since she was a pup.

Beagles have an unusually keen sense of smell. Some dogs, like the greyhound, rely largely on sight, but others depend almost entirely on their nose.

And modern medical science might very profitably use this keen sense of certain breeds of dog in helping diagnose diseases early.

For example, friends of ours in Chicago had a dog that was very fond of a visitor to their home, named Fred.

When Fred would arrive, the dog would jump all over him with delight and stay by his side all Fred had to leave.

But Fred was away for six months. When he returned to visit our friends, their dog growled and treated him as an alien.

Indeed, the lady of the house had to hold the dog to keep it from biting Fred. Poor Fred was unhappy to find that his former canine pal was now an enemy.

But three weeks later Fred was growing so easily fatigued and short of breath that he consulted a physician.

Fred was diagnosed as having severe leukemia, and died therefrom a few months later.

At the time of his last visit with our friends, nobody even dreamed Fred was ailing.

But did the dog detect an unnatural scent, which caused it to regard Fred as a stranger?

That is quite possible, for leukemia is a serious blood ailment.

We human beings have a poor sense of smell and tobacco smokers have even less than normal, so we probably could never notice fine differences in odors.

But a "nose" dog, like a beagle or bloodhound, might easily be trained to pick out early cancer patients.

**CONDITIONED REFLEX**

In psychology, we find it possible to "condition" a dog to very minute differences in colors, sounds, and probably scents.

You may recall Pavlov's famous dog, which was conditioned to a flow of saliva when a bell was rung.

Well, it is entirely possible that a beagle could be conditioned to pick out early cancer patients before we physicians even suspect such a diagnosis.

In fact, not only might dogs detect cancer, but they might even be trained to distinguish between tumors of the prostate versus those of the womb or stomach or breast.

Similarly, they might be taught to detect early diabetes, as

# President Sets Talks On Strike

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Eisenhower, setting aside his hands-off policy toward labor-management disputes, today prepared to try to break some of the ties in the frozen steel negotiations.

The chief executive made his most startling move in the 17-day-old steel strike Monday by summoning industry and union leaders to separate White House talks Wednesday morning.

The president acted after denouncing the delay in reaching a settlement as "intolerable." He declared the walkout by 500,000 members of the United Steelworkers "must not continue."

Wednesday morning's discussions are expected to produce an early resumption of negotiations, probably in Washington. The White House said the President wants to get both sides talking again.

The possibility that he might invoke the Taft-Hartley law to halt the steel strike for 60 days abated temporarily. The White House indicated he would not seek a back-to-back injunction before he consulted with the spokesmen for steel labor and management.

Roger M. Blough, board chairman of U. S. Steel, and union president David J. McDonald both have accepted the President's personally telephoned invitation to come to Washington.

The hurricane, called "extremely dangerous" by the Weather Bureau, was about 100 miles southwest of Charleston.

# Rocket Finds Sun Has 180 Million Degrees Of Heat

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Scientists today reported rocket findings indicating that temperatures on the sun's atmosphere sometimes go as high as 180 million degrees Fahrenheit.

This is 10 times higher than had been assumed on the basis of previous findings. The researchers also reported extremely powerful X-rays which penetrated the earth's upper atmosphere after solar flares.

The new information came from Project Sunfire II recently completed by Dr. Herbert Friedman and associates of the Naval Research Laboratory.

The scientists fired 12 Nike-ASP rockets each equipped with 86 pounds of instruments. Eight of the rockets were successful, reaching altitudes of 130 to 160 miles.

Three were launched during solar quiet or minor activity. X-rays with energies as high as 20,000 volts appeared above the absorbing layers of the earth's atmosphere after large flares.

Protons to Sunfire II the most energetic flare radiation ever detected ranged between 6,000 and 7,400 volts.

The solar atmospheric temperatures during flares were calculated from the X-ray energies.

The Game and Wildlife Commission plane spotted Richard J. Mills standing on a high ridge in the Glades with water surrounding him. The pilot reported Mills appeared to be unhurt.

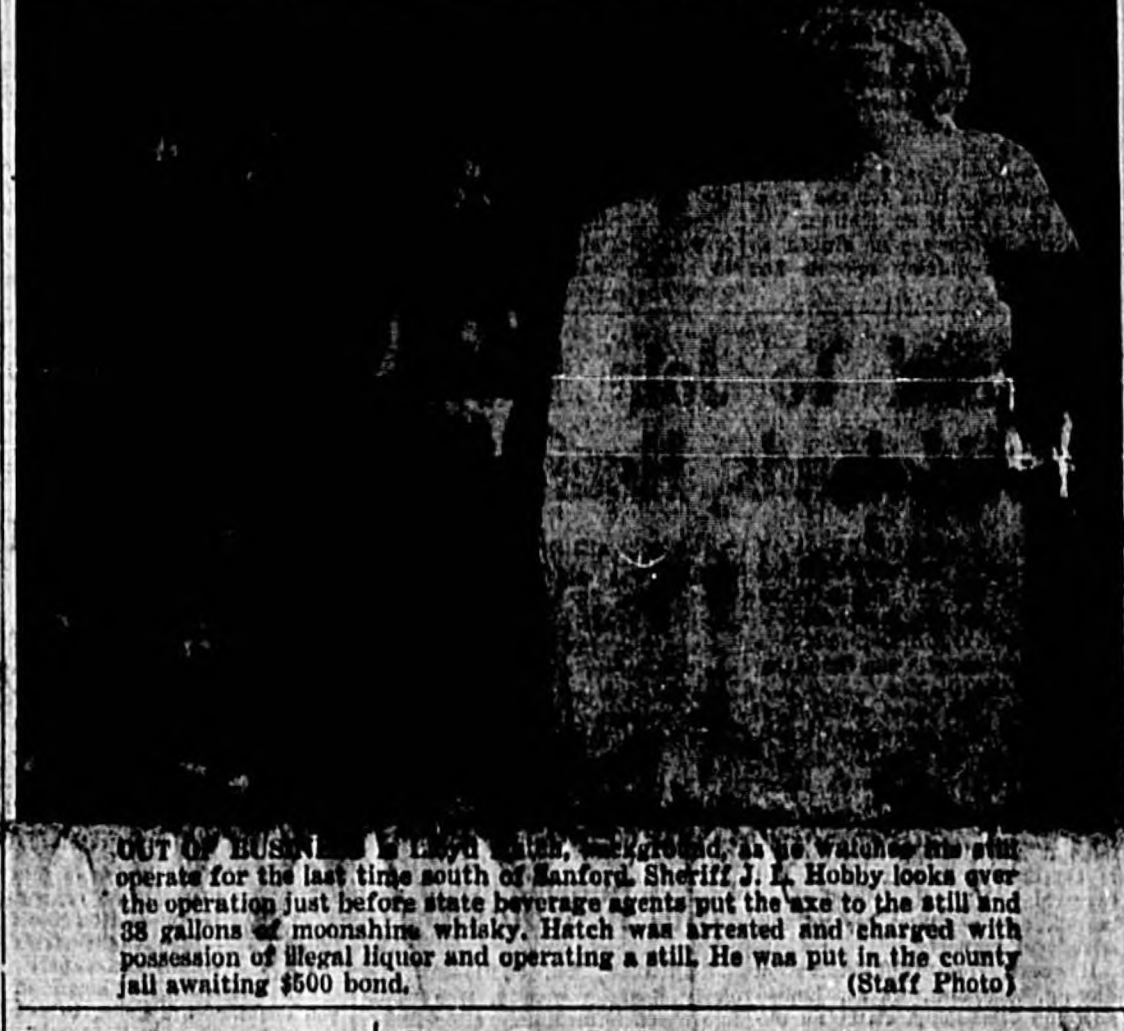
