Missionary kidnapping update

SANFORD — New Tribes Mission operations in Columbia reported receiving a brief, and very poor, radio transmission from the kidnapers of two missionaries on the morning of Jan. 16. The report said Steve Welsh and Tim Van Dyke are still being held and are apparently in good condition.

Meanwhile, residents of the valley from which they were kidnapped reportedly have obtained a petition with 53 signatures and sent it to the local newspaper for publication.

The statement from Columbia says, "It is our hope the guerrillas will realize that kidnapping our two missionaries is counter-productive to their goals, and simply set them free."

Joke not so funny, people say

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — While Punks-shutaway Phil may have seen his shadow predicting an additional six weeks of winter, there's an opossum in Altamonte Springs that foreshadowed a time of great controversy for a local radio station.

As a part of a Groundhog Day joke, WXXL-FM (108.7) announcers Doc Holliday and Johnny Magie suggested that an opossum be put on the newest leg of the Central Florida GreeneWay in Seminole County. They said that if the marsupial was able to traverse the road without becoming roadkill that Spring could not be far behind.

Thinking the suggestion was real, law enforcement officers, prompted by calls from an outraged public, spent time looking for the endangered animal. Officials at the Central Florida Zoo and at the Humane Society of Seminole County also received emotionally-charged calls from people concerned for the safety of the fictitious animal.

Station officials said the disc jockeys would be required to perform some community service, but would not be kept off the air because of their remarks.

Holiday Inn robbed

Sanford cops seek 2 gun-wielding suspects

SANFORD — Police are searching for two armed men who allegedly robbed the Holiday Inn at the Sanford marina Tuesday night. According to the police reports, two black males entered the office at approximately 11:40 p.m. Tuesday, each with handguns, and de-

manded the manager and two clerks go into an office and remove cash from the safe.

The report said the two women were also forced to give their purses and the man's wallet was also taken.

Police estimate \$1,100 was taken. The men then made their escape, but it was not immediately determined if they used a vehicle. One of men was described as approximately 23

years of age, six feet two inches tall, weighing about 200 pounds, and wearing a dark shirt and baggy jeans.

The other was said to be about 20 years old, five feet ten inches tall, 180 pounds with a stocky build. He was said to be wearing dark clothing and a blue baseball cap with some type of letter on it.

Murder probe revived

SANFORD — Two retired Seminole County sheriff's detectives are reviving the investigation into the 14-year-old unsolved murder of a young Lake County girl whose body was found in Fern Park.



Georgia Crews

Ray Parker and Herb Hartley recently volunteered to reactivate the investigation into the murder of 12-year-old Georgia Jane Crews whose body was discovered April 16, 1980 behind the Fern Park K-Mart off U.S. Highway 17-92. The Mineola Elementary School student, who lived in Montverde, disappeared eight days earlier as she walked to a store near her home. The case was never closed but became inactive when leads dried up.

Renewed interest in the case was sparked recently with a story on CBS' 48-Hours about a Massachusetts inmate, Lewis Lent Jr. Lent is being held in the slaying of a 12-year old boy and

Lake Mary makes plans for election

LAKE MARY — Although not on the agenda for tonight's regular meeting of the Lake Mary City Commission, plans may get underway for an immediate city election. The vacancy is for commission seat 4, which has been served by Commissioner A.R. "Doc" Jore, who died January 27.

Jore had been reelected to his second two-year term last November.

While no specific plans for an election have been announced at this time, City Manager John Litton, City Clerk Carol Edwards and other officials are studying requirements set forth by the city charter regarding methods of seeking a replacement on the commission.

"The Charter says we will have to call a special election," Litton said. "We have determined that it may be held as soon as the end of March."

Litton said a specific date would have to be decided after qualifying time is established, the voter registration list is updated, and clearance is obtained with the Seminole County Supervisor of Elections for an official election date.

"In order to do that," Litton said,

"we will also have to have the commission approve an emergency ordinance to set the steps of this election into motion."

When Jore first ran for election in November, 1991, he beat the incumbent by taking 57.1 percent of the vote. When he sought reelection in 1993, he was unopposed.

"Whoever is elected," Litton explained, "will serve only for the"

Think school

SANFORD — Elementary schools in Seminole County are already gearing up for the next school year.

And it's coming sooner than you might think.

All the district's elementary schools will be operating on a year round schedule beginning in July.

"The school year does not start in September any more," said Brenda Griffin, program specialist for the Early Childhood Programs in Seminole County. "July will be here sooner than a lot of people think."

For planning purposes the schools try to get a good count on how many students they can expect for the next school year.

During the months of February and March, local schools will be conducting their kindergarten round ups and registration for pre-kindergarten and first grade.

The pre-registration period is designed for parents whose children will be attending Seminole County schools for the first time in the upcoming

Area attention caught by majestic launch of Discovery this morning

SANFORD — The sun was already up at 7:10 this morning when a flaming object followed by a dark contrail clearly jutted into the sky east of Sanford.

The spaceship Discovery blasted off on an eight-day mission, right on schedule today with its crew consisting of five Americans and the first Russian to fly on a U.S. shuttle. The joining of the two nations in the project has been deemed the opening of a new space

is a suspect in three other slayings in that state. Lent lived in Central Florida during the time Crews was murdered. Police agencies along the east coast with unsolved child murders or missing children cases are asking questions about Lent.

Parker was the lead investigator on the Crews case and captain of detectives when he retired in 1981 after 11 years of service. Hartley retired as a sergeant in 1987 after 14 years with the department. Although Hartley did not work on the initial murder investigation, he said he was interested in a couple of other cases Lent might have been involved with in Central Florida.

When Lent's name surfaced, Hartley got the OK from Seminole County Sheriff Don Esslinger to reactivate the murder probe

and enlisted Parker. Described as a drifter with no permanent job, Lent reportedly was in Central Florida for at least four years. He was issued a Florida driver license in 1977 and stayed in Deland and Paisley before leaving for New York in 1981, the detectives said. Lent was not a suspect during the initial investigation.

The investigating duo refer to themselves as "the Old Folks" but are looking forward to reviewing the case files, doing background checks and re-interviewing witnesses. The computer technology and scientific analysis available today should help in the investigation. Physical evidence from the old homicide is still available and new tests developed since the murder may provide more information for investigators.

They will be working with several law enforcement agencies, including the Lake County

Sheriff's office and the FBI Task Force.

Parker looks forward to working on the case again. "I got to know the Crews family," the former detective said. "I worked on the case so long. We had a couple of good suspects in the case and now we've got another one."

Asked to describe the reaction to the revived investigation by Georgia's parents, Parker said, "It made me feel good, that's all I can say." The couple lives on Florida's west coast. Georgia also had two older brothers.

After seeing the television program, a Caselberry woman identified Lent as the man who abducted her from a convenience store then raped her in January 1979 when she was 10. Police are investigating the claim and also a possible link to Lent in an attempted abduction from the same store five months later.

Sanford police Commander Dennis Whitmore said investigators have received reports of a white vehicle seen shortly after the robbery, being driven east on Seminole Boulevard at a relatively high rate of speed.

"We don't know if that was the car used by the two men in their get-away," Whitmore said, "but we are investigating every lead we have at this point."

None of the Holiday Inn personnel were injured in the robbery.

Whitmore said police are conducting an intensive investigation into the robbery and following a number of leads at this time.

age free of Cold War rivalry.

The long black trail following the shuttle, clearly visible from Sanford and much of the area west of the launch site, was in the path of the rising sun, giving the huge clouds of vapor left in the wake a pale orange glow.

Discovery quickly settled into its 218-mile orbit.

On board was cosmonaut Sergei Krikalev, who wore a Russian flag patch on the shoulder of his orange flight suit. Just before liftoff, the head of Russia's space program, Yuri Koptev, wished Krikalev good luck and a safe return home.

It's the first U.S.-Russian manned mission since the 1975 Apollo-Soyuz docking and the first time ever that astronauts and cosmonauts have been launched in the same spacecraft.

The Russians were treated to a rare, trouble-free launch, on time and with perfect weather. NASA had worried all week that the temperature might be too low for a safe liftoff, but it turned out to

be 46 degrees Fahrenheit, a little warmer than expected.

The United States and its former Space Race rival expect Discovery's voyage to lead to more joint missions and, by 2001, a shared space station. Up to 10 shuttle dockings are planned with Russia's Mir space station.

"It is sort of ironic" after years of Cold War rivalry with the former Soviet Union, said Jeremiah Pearson III, head of NASA's spaceflight program and a retired Marine officer. "But now there are no more wars to fight, and the space program's a good place to be."

A Mir veteran, Krikalev already has spent 463 days in space. Shuttle commander Charles Bolden Jr., pilot Kenneth Reightler Jr., Franklin Chang-Diaz, Jan Davis and Ronald Sega had logged a combined total of just 52 space days going into this flight.

On Saturday, the crew is to release a flying saucer-like satellite.

school year. Each of the schools has its own way of conducting the registration and makes their own plans as to when the registration will be done.

Parents whose youngsters will attend classes at a multi-track school are especially being encouraged to register early so that the special scheduling needs of families can be met and the needs can be addressed before schedules are confirmed.

The multi-track schools are Bear Lake Elementary, Caselberry Elementary, Eastbrook Elementary, English Estates Elementary, Goldsboro Elementary, Lake Mary Elementary, Lake Orienta Elementary, Longwood Elementary, Partin Elementary, Pine Crest Elementary, Rainbow Elementary, Red Bug Elementary, Sterling Park Elementary and Winter Springs Elementary.

The remaining schools (Altamonte Elementary, Geneva Elementary, Heathrow Elementary, Keith Elementary, Midway Elementary, Spring Lake Elementary, Wekiva Elementary, Forest City Elementary, Hamilton Elementary, Idylwild Elementary, Lawton Elementary, Sabal Point Elementary, Stenstrom Elementary, and Woodlands Elementary) are single track schools.

Parents should bring the following items to registration: the child's birth certificate or proof of date of birth; proof of residency; immunization records and a copy of the student health examination; and the student's social security number.

"But that's the only restriction we've ever put on them," he said. "To our knowledge, no one has ever taken advantage of this. We don't know of anyone who has ever been involved in any illegal activities using the telephones in this facility."

William Thurber, deputy secretary of the Department of Corrections, said the agency was working with the Florida Department of Law Enforcement on the investigation. He would not comment on the details of the probe.

Officials said they are trying to prevent inmates from abusing phone privileges enjoyed in state prisons, where convicts can make collect calls to anyone who will accept.

"These people got 24 hours a day, seven days week to figure out these things," Thurber said. "They keep us busy."

Morris said he and Major David Briarton, who is in charge of the John E. Polk Correctional Facility, have never had the occasion to change the facility's policy on phone calls.

"We've never discussed it," he said. "The inmates have never given us any occasion to talk about making any changes."

He said corrections officials make an effort to make sure that no illegal activities are conducted over prison telephones, but there are issues of privacy that must be observed.

"We have to be careful," he said.

The Pure Food Campaign, run by biotechnology critic Jeremy Rifkin, counts 150 producers, distributors and co-ops that don't want milk from treated cows.

The Ben and Jerry's ice cream company said it won't use milk from treated cows. A number of school districts, including the 23,000-student Madison, Wis., district, have said they would not serve students milk from cows that have had the drug.

And Farmland Dairies in Wallington, N.J., said it will buy only from 700 independent dairy producers who pledge to keep their herds free of the drug. The company says it can do so because it buys directly from farmers rather than through co-ops, where the product is mingled.

But not every co-op is as wary. Nor are all buyers.

McDonald's Corp. will accept the milk, noting the FDA approval.

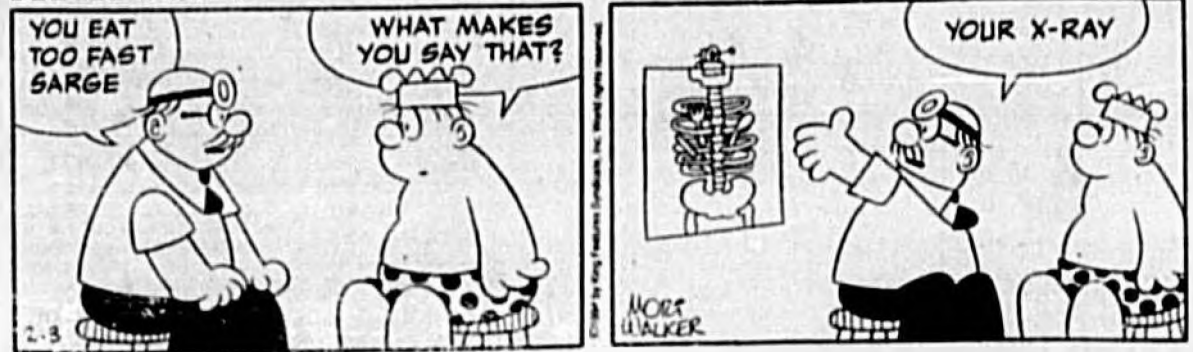

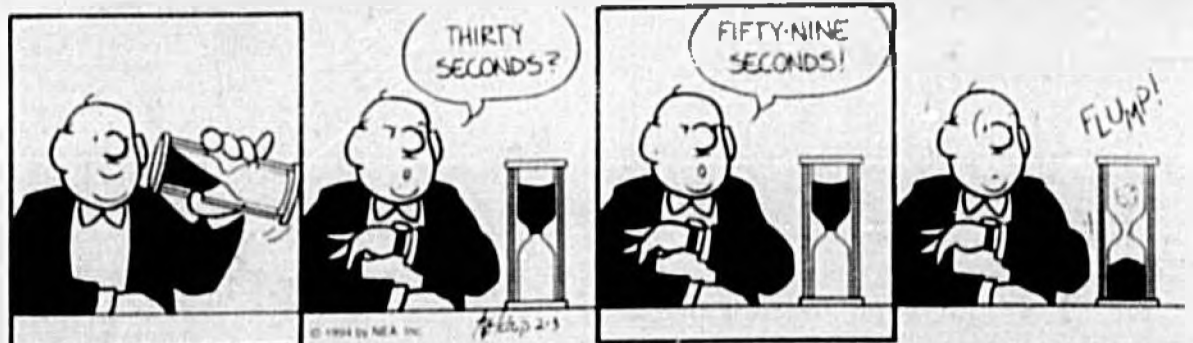

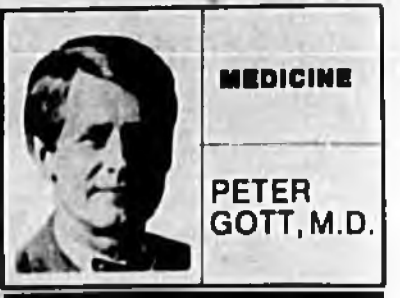
