SANFORD - Elementary schools in Seminole County are already gearing up for the next school year.

And it's coming sooner than you might think.

All the district's elementary schools will be operating on a year round schedule beginning in July.

'The school year does not start in September any more," said Brenda Griffin, program specialist for the Early Childhood Programs in Seminole County. "July will be here sooner than a lot of people think."

For planning purposes the schools try to get a good count on how many students they can expect for the next school

During the months of February and March, local schools will be conducting their kindergarten round ups and registration for pre-kindergarien and first grade.

The pre-registration period is designed for parents whose children will be attending Seminole County schools for the first time in the upcoming

Area attention caught by majestic launch of Discovery this morning

SANFORD - The sun was already up at 7:10 this morning when a flaming object followed by a dark contrail clearly jutted into the sky east of Sanford.

The spaceship Discovery blasted off on an eight-day mission, right on schedule today with its crew consisting of five Americans and the first Russian to fly on a U.S. shuttle. The joining of the two nations in the project has been deemed the opening of a new space

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Conklin strikes a plea

TAMPA - A teacher who admitted having sex with male mentally handicapped students has struck a plea deal that would keep him from serving even one day in prison

John Michael Conklin. 49, who taught at La Voy Exceptional Center, was sentenced to six years house arrest followed by 20 years probation for his guilty plea to five counts of sexual battery and three counts of engaging a child in sexual activity.

Conklin had faced up to 40 years on many more charges. But prosecutors said they were forced to drop some charges and make the deal Wednesday because at least one of the six alleged victims had recanted his story, and they were concerned about whether the others would make good

Charges dropped against Frazier

ORLANDO - Prosecutors dropped murder charges against Betty Joe Frazier after a doctor said her 3-year-old daughter could have killed Frazier's newborn infant.

Frazier sobbed and buried her head in attorney Gregory Eisenminger's shoulder after the Tuesday decision.

Authorities had charged Frazier with first-degree murder in the Sept. 20 death of 3-week-old Brianna Brook Renk.

Prosecutor Meryl Allawas said she had no choice but to drop the charges after Orange County Deputy Medical Examiner William Anderson testified in a pretrial hearing Friday he was not sure if Frazier, 38, or the 3-year-old killed Brianna.

New state law put to the test

HAINES CITY - A case involving two youths charged following a gunfight will be used to test a state law forbidding minors from possessing firearms, a prosecutor said.

"It may be the first case like it in the state," said Polk State Attorney Jerry Hill. "I'm not aware of any other."

A law prohibiting youths under 18 from possessing firearms took effect Jan. 1. Even if they don't fire the weapon, youths can be charged with a first-degree misdemeanor. Exceptions are hunting or target practice with adult supervision.

TALLAHASSEE - State lawmakers debating health care reform in the next two months will zoom in on the very heart of the subject: What services should be available to all Floridians?

How about annual checkups? Or second opinions from specialists? How about borderline emergency room visits? Lengthy hospital stays?

The answers to those kinds of questions will form a basic benefits package defining what has to be in every insurance policy in

'This is the nitty-gritty," said Doug Cook. director of the Agency for Health Care Administration.

"The Legislature in the next session will honest-to-God for sure be making life and

are expected to start operating later this "Last year I think we dealt with the structure of health care reform," Cook said.

This year we're dealing with the substance of health care." Cook's agency has recommended to lawmakers a basic benefits package put together by a citizens' committee that held

hearings around the state. But trying to decide what's in and what's out when it comes to mandatory services isn't the only health care issue before the Legislature, which starts its two-month

regular session Tuesday. Gov. Lawton Chiles has also put before lawmakers a proposal to use tax dollars to subsidize private insurance for about half of the 2.8 million Floridians who don't get benefits on the Job. can't afford private insurance and don't qualify for Medicaid.

"Without additional tax funds, we want to cover a million and a half - up to a million and a half people - that are uninsured," Chiles said.

Besides legislative approval, the governor needs permission from Washington since he expects to pay for the subsidies by diverting money saved in the Medicaid program. The federal government picks up just over half the tab of Florida's Medicald bill

Florida residents who make below \$17,425 for an individual or \$35,875 for a family of four would be eligible for a subsidy under Chiles' proposal.

Soldier rotted to death while in veterans hospital, family claims

TAMPA - Relatives of a soldier who died in a veterans hospital after more than a year in coma charge he was left to rot to death, his body riddled with bed sores, some which cut to the bone.

Russell Everette's family put the government on notice Wednesday it intends to bring a \$5 million negligence lawsuit against the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs.

"The only reason I'm doing this is because I saw how Russell was," mother Many Everette of St. Petersburg said through tears. "I don't want this to happen to anyone else. It's just not right."

Compounding that anguish is the mystery of Everette's initial head injury that put him into a coma while at a

U.S. Army post in Kitzingen. Germany, in August 1991. The explanation that appears In most medical records is an auto accident, and later statements from military officials say he either jumped or was pushed from a barracks

window. "I can't tell you what happened to him," said family attorney Scott Gordon. "Somebody knows, but everything we've seen is just a mess of contradictions.

Everette spent 14 months of his 16-month coma at the James A. Haley Veteran's Hospital in Tampa.

He died in late 1992 at the age of 21, his body curled up in a ball and weighing just 94 pounds. An autopsy listed the immediate cause of death as pneumonia due to infected decubitus ulcers, or bedsores, that covered his backside, his

shoulder and both ears.

Family attorneys contend commonly used techniques such as turning or floatation mattresses could have prevented the sores, and proper therapy and rehabilitation even could have allowed him to recover.

But officials at the 577-bed hospital contend Everette received top care. They said his body deteriorated naturally from such a long time in a coma and there was never any chance for recovery.

Jim Behrens, assistant to the hospital's chief of staff, said Wednesday that a routine chart review after Everette's death found no problems. A nurse who did an assessment of his care after his death wrote "the patient received optimal care throughout hospitalization."

Write your legislators

With the communications devices we have these days, fewer people are writing letters. There are times however, when letters are needed.

The Florida Legislature goes into session next week. It's time to let them know how the citizens of Florida feel about a number of matters which will be coming up.

Some believe in spending money to increase prison space. They believe such a program will allow criminals to be kept under lock-and-key for longer periods.

Governor Chiles wants 14,665 new prison beds, by selling \$300 million in revenue

Some other legislators will be suggesting alternate proposals. One would add a penny to the state's six cent sales tax to pay for 50,000 new prison beds.

Insurance Commissioner Tom Gallagher. said to be a potential Republican candidate for governor, also wants an additional one-cent sales tax raise for new prisons and other anti-crime program.

A Democrat representative is pushing for a ban on the sale, transfer and possession of 37 types of assault weapons.

Lawmakers will also begin consideration of legalized casino gambling. Some propose making it open state-wide. Others suggest allowing it in specific counties which would approve a referendum on the matter.

Additionally, there are suggestions to allow only riverboat gambling, the type suggested for the Port of Sanford. That would restrict gaming to on-board water vessels, and not allow establishments to operate at shore

Some of these proposals, such as riverboat gambling, became public knowledge only recently. It appears as though the matter may have purposely been kept quiet to prevent any onslaught on sentiment from the people.

Now, if people act quickly, they can let the legislators know how they feel. Many senators and representatives visited with constituents during the past few months. Chances are however, most area citizens have not given them any input.

In order for this to continue being government by the people, the public must let the legislators know how they feel. Outpouring of letters on a particular subject have influenced votes in the past. They may do so again.

You may be for or against the sales tax hike for prison beds or the governor's bond proposal. You should speak out if you will or will not support legalized castno gambling or riverboat gambling.

Our legislators should vote according to the will of the people and for the good of everyone.

Write to local legislators. Let them know, without a doubt, what the people want for the

The legislature goes into session next week. Time is important, and our future is at stake. Write today.

One of the oldest anti-Communist jokes have to do is choose to join the health plan he's



But in every city of any significant size, each of these medical problems is the province of a specialist who knows how to handle that

President Clinton's health plan would please that old Commie.

OK, then - you sign up with the health plan that carries on its rolls the doctor you consult most frequently. In my case, since I had bypass heart surgery five years ago, that will be my cardiologist. Luckily he's also an excellent all-around man of medicine, well versed in many fields. (Of course, if you're in a large corporate health plan, and your doctor isn't, you're out of luck

And what if you need -- as sooner or later we all need - the soothing services of a foot doctor? I know an excellent one; but will I have the right to go to him? Not ordinarily, unless he's enrolled in the same health plan as my cardiologist. And what if I had a pregnant wife? She could choose any obstetrician she wanted -- as long as he was enrolled in that same health plan.

Theoretically the Clinton plan would allow a person to go outside his basic health plan in certain cases (the "point of service option"), or even enroll in a "fee-for-service" plan under which he could choose a doctor practicing alone for fees specified by the government. But these options would be largely confined, as a practical matter, to the wealthy - and would depend, in any case, on the availability of such doctors,

Who is crime-fighting phony?

Every pol with a poll is talking tough on violent criminals by the throat." crime these days. So today the name of our game is "Find the Phony."

Recently, a prominent Washington pol charged that the leader of the other party was "a phony on the crime issue." Pick the description that fits the attacking pol (the other, of course, fits the opposition leader).

QUESTION: Was the speaker:
(A.) Politician No. 1? He talked tough on crime and backed up his words by proposing to put 100,000 more cops on the streets. He backed tougher sentences for repeat offenders. And he heeded pleas of the nation's police chiefs to enact the Brady bill and ban a few of the most dangerous rapid-fire assault weapons that drug gangs are using to kill cops and innocent passersby.

(B.) Politician No. 2? He talked tough on crime, but has rejected the pleas by police chiefs for gun controls. He was against the Brady bill. And he opposed a ban on certain domestically made assault weapons - many of which are identical to foreign-made guns the Bush administration classified as having no legitimate purpose for hunting or sports, just killing people.

ANSWER: B. It was Politician No. 2 — Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas - who was the attacking pol. The leader Gramm attacked as a "phony" in the war on crime was Politician No. 1 — President Clinton, who has been leading the Democrats back from the soft-oncrime political wilderness they wandered into decades ago

Actually, Gramm and House Republican Whip Newt Gingrich of Georgia teamed in a double-barrelled effort at the Republican National Committee winter meeting to take the crime issue away from Clinton on the weekend before his State of the Union address. A pair of ex-professors who became self-styled political pit bulls. Gramm and Gingrich are poli-reading masters who know what you want to hear about crime. In a recent Wall Street Journal-NBC News poll, 93 percent of Americans said crime was an "absolute priority" for government; 83 percent listed welfare; 67 percent, health reform.

Next thing we knew, Gramm and Gingrich seemed to be renaming the GOP - hear the Grand Old Panderers:

Gramm: "Bill Clinton talks a good game on crime. But when you get down to the bottom line. Bill Clinton is a phony on the crime issue.... (We need a crime bill) that grabs

Gingrich: Clinton is "rejecting virtually every principle that works in fighting crime." We need an emergency program to convert



To win a war on crime, our leaders and speechmakers must put policing above politics. That means an end to the mean-spirited distortions and pandering.

Even Professors Gramm and Gingrich must know this: There is a world of difference between using a bully pulpit and being a pulpit bully.

No matter what you hear and read, that is not Lawrence Walsh's fault. His entire tenure was a battle to overcome obstacles thrown in his path by others. Here are the facts:

The United States Congress, many of whose hypocritical members are now throwing darts at Walsh, Insisted on going ahead with bearings, which accomplished nothing of a positive nature and made a momentary hero and eventual millionaire out of a beribboned, blue-eyed, gap-toothed, document shredding, illegal gratuity-accepting

- The White House and the CIA claimed the national security would be jeopardized if many of the documents Walsh needed were to see the light of day. Numerous allegations therefore were never investigated. The investigating duo refer to themselves as "the Old Folks" but are looking forward to reviewing the case files, doing background checks and reinterviewing witnesses. The computer technology and scientific analysis available today should help in the investigation. Physical evidence from the old homicide is still available and new tests developed since the murder may provide more information for investigators.

Morris said he and Major David Briarton, who is in charge of the John E. Polk Correctional Facility, have never had the occasion to change the facility's policy on phone calls.

'We've never discussed it," he said. "The inmates have never given us any occasion to talk about making any changes."

He said corrections officials make an effort to make sure that no illegal activities are conducted over prison telephones. but there are issues of privacy that must be observed. "We have to be careful," he

said. Information from the Associated Press is



Civil Air Patrol Cadets open to Seminole youths

The Civil Air Patrol was established Dec. 1, 1941. This group of individuals has dedicated itself to humanitarian activities and is chartered by law as a non-profit benevolent organization.

In 1943 the control of the Civil Air Patrol was transferred to the Army Air Forces, and has been affiliated with America's military air service ever since. The premise behind Civil Air Patrol's creation was that members would use privately owned small aircraft to help in civilian defense. Air Force and Civil Air Patrol form a rewarding partnership today.

The corporation's emergency services mission includes air search and rescue, disaster relief, and civil defense. Its members fly 80 percent of the search and rescue mission hours directed by the Air Force Rescue Coordination Center at Scott AFB. III.

Civil Air Patrol's Cadet Program provides training for young people out of the sixth grade or 13 years of age. 

Patients should have doctor with balance

DEAR DR. GOTT: Please settle an argument. My friend would rather see a doctor who reads novels; I would prefer a physician who reads medical journals. Who is right?

DEAR READER: Every patient is entitled to a physician who keeps abreast of the medical literature. Remaining "current" is each practitioner's goal and duty. Therefore, it's important to choose a doctor who engages in continuing medical education. be it through seminars, conferences, video or audiotapes. journal-reading, or other methods of on-going education.

On the other hand, caring for sick patients requires a broader view than mere technological advances. The good doctor takes into account many such aspects. including psychological, ethical, humanitarian and socioeconomic factors. In dealing with people, the capable and competent physician must consider far more than the disease process.

Consequently, in answer to your question. I'd have to say that you and your friend are right - and wrong. What you both need to find is a doctor with balance, someone with technical skills who is more than an automaton

Most well-rounded physicians eagerly learn of new advances and therapies. But they will be equally eager to broaden their horizons by reading novels. seeing plays, going to concerts and the opera, and participating in other, non-medical activities that are intellectually stimulating. The "complete" doctor also values time spent with his family, with recreation, in spiritual pursuits, and in community

In my opinion, patients are best served by a practitioner with varied interests. I am not unique in this view. Many medical school admissions committees have recently recognized the value of a liberal arts education, and often give preference to applicants who are wellrounded, in contrast to the previous emphasis on purely
