# **Conspiracy Count Dismissed** Blackburn's Assault Trial Underway

The trial of convicted gambling czar Harlan "The Colonel" Blackburn for the June 1971 shooting of associate Clyde Lee near Longwood began this morning at Sanford after Circuit Court Judge Volie Williams Jr. dismissed a conspiracy count in the case.

As selection of a jury started, prosecution sources said the state will press the remaining charge-assault to murder-alleging Blackburn was responsible for the wounding of Lee in a telephone booth on SR 434 at Interstate Four. The state's conspiracy case collapsed several weeks ago with the dismissal of charges against alleged hit man Sam Cagnina of Tampa, Black-

burn's attorney, Cheney Mason, had argued the former boss of area gambling could not be charged with conspiring with "unknown" per-

Williams today dismissed the Blackburn conspirancy count without comment. The dismissal cleared the way for the start of Blackburn's trial on the assault to murder count.

Williams told prospective jurors he won't run for re-election after this term. He has been on the bench 17 years.

Seminole Assistant State Atty. Bill Staley and chief investigator Jack Fulenwider told the court. they don't expect the Blackburn trial to go beyond Thursday.

As defense attorneys questioned prospective jurors about extent of their knowledge about the highly publicized case, Orange-Osceola State Atty, Robert Eagan joined Staley and Fulenwider at the prosecution table. Eagan was appointed special prosecutor in the case by Gov. Reubin Askew when charges were filed against Cagnina and Blackburn last June.

The prosecution suffered a serious setback in

prove Cagnina was at the shooting scene, despite Lee's testimony that Cagnina was the man who wounded him with a volly of pistol shots that shattered the telephone booth, then fled with another man in a car.

The state has charged that Blackburn, who allegedly was talking to Lee on the telephone at the time of the assassination attempt, commissioned the hit man.

Original charges also alleged Cagnina was the gunman who tried to kill Lee in a south Seminole apartment complex parking lot a month before the telephone booth shooting.

Authorities said Lee's temple was grazed and his coat and car riddled with bullet holes before he fled the parking lot.

# Americans Mature In Crisis View On Economic Extortion Changes

### COPLEY NEWS

A few weeks ago, the doubling of oil prices by the Persian Gulf states and, subsequently, other oil producing nations would have probably been called a crisis in the United States of America. Today the economic extortion by the Arab nations is generating mostly indignation and determination. We have matured a great deal since the Arabs first imposed their oil embargo.

Among other things, we have come to realize that a nation with the resources, technology and skills of the United States just does not collapse in the face of temporary adversity, nor will we abandon our principles at the whim of a Middle East emirate.

Indeed, the conviction appears to be growing in the United States that the Arabs may very well be doing us a favor every time they announce a quantum increase in the price of crude petroleum. We are fortunate that we have not. placed our energy needs into their hands to any great degree. With Arab oil selling at more than \$11 per barrel, a fourfold increase in just one year, power generated by coal, uranium and shale looks increasingly attractive and competitive.

Unfortunately, the goal of selfsufficiency by 1980 will mean huge outlays of capital funds. Some officials say that the expenditure of \$500 billion in the next 10 years just by the oil industry alone is not an unrealistic estimate of the funds that will be needed for exploration, technology and development of the U.S. petroleum resources.


In this light, the \$2 billion per year that Congress and the administration are discussing for energy development pales by comparison. As a result, attention has turned to the very large profits made in recent months by oil companies. Voices in Congress are suggesting an excess profits tax on the large oil firms. President Nixon has countered with a suggestion for a unique rew tax on the sale of crude oil by

domestic producers. He would have Congress determine whether the \$3 to \$5 billion annual revenue from the tax would be used to establish a new government trust fund for energy development, or whether the money should be refunded to those oil firms that develop new energy sources.

In any event, the taxes that the United States will realize from oil companies may be ephemeral. While their profits have been very high in the third quarter of 1973, the 1972 profit was a modest 8.7 per cent on investment, reflecting a continually downward trend. The comparable figure for industry as a whole was 10.6 per cent.

It is apparent that the government will not have a windfall from the oil companies' recent windfall -- that there is no cheap way of developing the energy that the United States will need to be self sufficient.

The money will come from the pocket of John Q. Citizen and its extraction will be painfu to him. Experience exhibits that it will be least painful if the absolute minimum of his money is routed through Washington before it is put to work; if he pays his share of the energy development cost as much as possible in the free market under the traditional pay-as-you-go American habit.

### Energy Action Unlikely

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)- Senate Democratic leader Mike Mansfield has told Gov. Reubin Askew that congress might not act on an energy bill until late

February, Askew's office said today. Askew met with Mansfield Sunday and said afterward that if congress doen't act until late February, "there's less likelihood for any special session," said Don Pride,

Askew's press secretary. "I would say the indication from the conversation is that there is less chance of a special session than there otherwise might be," Pride said.

Askew had planned a special session of the Florida Legislature on the energy crisis for Jan. 8, but canceled it after congress failed to pass an energy bill before its holiday recess. Congress is due to reconvene Jan. 21. Askew "feels it would be unfeasible to go ahead before congress acts," Pride said. "So it hinges on when they

### Efficiency Study On

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)- The head of a businessman's task force studying ways to make Florida government more efficient said today the study was not "to find any dirty linen or protect any sacred cows."

"We're just trying to find out the facts," Tampa industrialist Jim Walter told an organizational meeting of the governor's Management and Efficiency Study Commission

"We want to see if the same jobs can be done with more efficiency and less cost," Walter told the group of more than 50 businessmen present at the meeting. A total of 77 executives are expected to take part in the study. The executives will spend the next 12 weeks in

Tallahassee studying ways to cut government costs and improve operating procedures. Gov. Reubin Askew told the group their study was






You told me the next time we invited them over to say, "We'd like to see you, but please leave the children homethis time."







### Plane Crash Kills 11

JOHNSTOWN, Pa. (AP) - "I couldn't even scream. tried to scream, but nothing came out," said a young man who raced to the wreckage of a commuter plane. The crash killed II persons and injured six. Authorities said the dead included Mrs. Richard H. Mayer, 42, wife of the publisher of the Johnstown Tribune-Democrat; their 11 year-old son, Richard; and their niece Susan Imhoff, 13 The Air East twin-engine turboprop was on a scheduled commuter flight from Pittsburgh with 15 passengers and two crewmen aboard when it clipped a bank of approach lights here Sunday night, officials said. The Beechcraft 99 then slammed into the top of a steep embankment.

### Stations Ration Gas

NEW YORK (AP) - A number of service stations have instituted self-styled rationing plans and conditionedsales plans since the onset of the fuel shortages. But determining whether such a plan meets federal price control regulations is often difficult. "You just have to work with individual cases," said a spokesman for the Internal Revenue Service in wasnington, D.C. Judges in New York and Chicago hage ruled against owners who tied gasoline sales to purchases of trinkets or car washes. And the IRS has ordered rollbacks in cases where service charges of up to \$1 were added to the cost of a fill-up.

### Skiers Go To Alaska

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) - Snowy Alaska may not yet rank as a winter vacation haven, but Japanese ski enhusiasts are discovering it by the charter-load. Mission Control had asked Gerald P. Carr, William R. Pogue and Edward G. Gibson to evaluate their orbiting station and make recommendations for future space travelers. The astronauts, in the 53rd day of their planned 84-day mission, relayed their answers to the control center.

# **Arab Nations Run Risk Of Force: Schlesinger**

WASHINGTON (AP) - Secretary of Defense James R. Schlesinger says Arab nations run the risk of encouraging force against them by continuing their oil embargo, but doubts it will come to that. Schlesinger said neither the Arab states nor other nations should use their powers "in such a way as would cripple the

larger mass of the industrialized world." "That is running too high a risk, and it is a source of danger, I think, not only from our standpoint, but from the standpoint of the oil producing nations," he said in an interview taped for broadcast on public television stations tonight. Schlesinger was asked if a continued oil embargo might

generate increasing demand in the United States to deal with the situation with force. "I think that that is a risk," he said. However, the defense secretary said there are already signs of an easing of the embargo. He cited the Arab nations' decision to increase the flow of oil to some European countries and Japan.

He said the 10 per cent increase in Arab oil output announced last month "is an indication that the oil-producing states recognize their common interests with the industrialized world."

Although the Arabs did not lift their oil embargo for the United States, Schlesinger is known to feel that many Arab leaders believe the embargo against this country has reached a point of diminishing returns from a political stand-

Turning to another matter, Schlesinger estimated the possibility of an all-out North Vietnamese offensive in South Vietnam at less than 50 per cent.

If the North Vietnamese launched such a major assault, he said, it is "highly likely" that President Nixon would ask Congress for authority to help the South Vietnamese with U.S. tactical air power.





### From Salt To Fresh Water

The shad run sometimes starts as early as October, water temperature being the triggering factor in this fall migration. The American shad is a salt water fish which does its spawning in fresh water. With the first approach of cold weather, they enter resh water streams drawn by an irrestistable urge of nature to return to the place of their birth where they, in turn will spawn. The run continues throughout the winter months usually peaking in March.

Sports fishermen of all ages welcome this time of year as the shad is one of the scrappiest fighters that can be taken on light tackle in Florida waters. Trolling is by far the most popular method of catching them but they can also be caught by casting, fly-fishing and even still fishing for speckled perch sometimes vields a terrific strike by a passing shad. Tackte is optional, but almost sportsmen prefer a six to seven

### 'Shad Dart' A Favorite

Lures, too, depend mostly on the angler, but the most suc cessful in this part of the river has always been in a tiny wobbling spoon, silver for the bright days, gold seemingly the best when the sky is overcast. A tiny lead headed jig, known as a "Shad-Dart" is also one of the local favorites.

Many fishermen use a tandem trolling rig with a spoon and dart combination. Occasionally this really produces some rare action as two fish will strike at the same time. With a pair of lusty fighters headed in opposite directions at the same time, the fisherman is in for a real battle.

A good sized landing net is a must, for the shad has a paper thin mouth and the hook will tear out easily; a revolting development when the silvery blue fighter is brought up near the

In fact one outdoor writer with a corny sense of himor had the audacity to call this "Shad Row" in a story in a national magazine.

A shad of three to four pounds will contain roe unbelievably in large when brolied with lemon juice and butter, this is considered a gourmet dish. The flesh of the shad is very bony but it can be used by filleting, slicing into thin strips and frying crisp in deep fat. Another popular way of using this fish is to pressure cook, make into fish cakes and deep fry, much the same as salmon cakes (and much cheaper). Get the light tackle out, untangle the shad rigs, and -LET'S GO FISHING!





## World News Briefs

### Leader Resigns Party

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) - Brian Faulkner announced his resignation today as leader of the Unionist party. He remains chief executive of the Northern Ireland government.

His decision followed last week's decisive defeat in his party's council of his policies of power-sharing with the Roman Catholic minority.

Friends said they expert him to seek to set up a new grouping of moderate Protestants built around his supporters in the provincial Assembly.

### Mexican Painter Dies

MEXICO CITY (AP) - President Luis Echeverria has ordered the highest funeral honors for David Aifaro Siqueiros, the last of Mexico's three great muralists, who died of cancer Sunday. He was 77. The president ordered that the body lie in state for 24 hours at the Palace of Fine Arts in downtown Mexico City, Burial will be at noon Tuesday in the Dolores Cemetery at the Rotunda of Illustrious Men.

Siqueiros, a veteran of the Mexican and Spanish civil wars and a Communist for 50 years, died at his summer iwine in Cuernavaca, 30 miles south of the capital. His wife, Angelica, was with him. The other two members of the triumvirate of Mexican muralists were Jose Clemente Orozco and Diego Rivera. Orozco died in 1949 and Rivera in 1957.

### Supply Road Open

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (AP) - Government forces reopened Phnom Penh's supply road from the coast, then fanned out today to clear the area of Khmer Rouge insurgents who had blocked the highway for two months. Field reports said the insurgents who had controlled a four-mile stretch of Highway 4 since Nov. 12 had cut numerous trenches across the roadbed. The reports said it would be several days before the road was repaired and convoys could begin bring up the large quantities of supplies waiting in Kompong Som, Cambodia's seaport. The Cambodian command said the bodies of 81 insurgents had been found. There was no information on government losses.

### Korean Leaders Quit

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) - Two prominent members of President Chung Hee Park's Democratic Republican party resigned from the party today in protest against Park's suppression of freedom. The defectors were Chung Ku-Yung, the party's former president and an adviser to Park, and Ye Chun-Ho, former party secretary-general.



# **Fuel, Food Blamed**

WASHINGTON (AP) - Surging food and fuel costs drove wholesale prices sharply upward in December, closing the year with the biggest overall yearly rise in a quarter century, the government said today.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics said the December seasonally adjusted increase of 2.2 per cent pushed wholesale prices in 1973 to a level 18.2 per cent higher than a year ago, the biggest one-year increase since the 31.7 per cent in 1946.

Wholesale price increases usually are reflected quickly at the retail level, but not necessarily all of them. Consumer prices have been rising at an annual rate of more than eight per cent.



The year's overall increase meant it costs \$145.30 to buy the same amount of wholesale goods that \$100 purchased seven years ago, the base year for record-keeping on prices.

The 2.2 per cent seasonally adjusted increase and the 2.5 per cent rise on an unadjusted basis in December were not close to record increases recorded in August, but were still high by historical standards. A 2.2 per cent monthly rise, if continued for 12 months, is an annual rate of 26.4 per cent. Whole prices rose 6.2 per cent seasonally adjusted and 5.8 unadjusted in

Wholesale price increases usually are quickly trasmitted into sharply higher prices at retail and will be reflected in the coming weeks at

December's increase brought wholesale prices to a level 18.2 per cent above a year ago, closing out 1973 with the worst record in more than 25

years. The Labor Department said the wholesale price index rose 2.2 per cent last month on a seasonally adjusted basis and 2.5 per cent on an unadjusted basis.

Wholesale prices, which fell in September and October, began climbing in November as the inflationary effects of the fuel shortage and the Arab oil cut-off began to show their impact on the



# **Is Claimed**



OCALA, Fla. (AP) - Alternatives to oil and gas exploration are non-existent in terms of the nation's energy situation, an Amoco official claimed today as the oil giant sought approval to drill in Florida's

Ocala National Forest. Jerrold M. Pachman, Amoco director of economic production, testified at the start of a two-day hearing by the U.S. Department of Interior on proposed oil and gas operations in the 366,000-acre forest.

Amoco holds leases to 95 per cent of the federal lands in the Central Florida wilderness and since 1971 has been seeking Interior approval to sink an exploratory well. The hearing follows a preliminary assessment of environmental impact before the go-ahead can be given.

Pachman said that the energy deficiency will continue for the next 10 to 15 years.

"Since total energy supply is short of needs, no alternatives exist and the word 'alternative' will not apply for at least 15 to 20 years. We need all the energy source."
