



BY LARRY VERSHEL A CONVERSATION WITH AUPT. OF SCHOOLS R. T. Appeal To FAA Looms **On Commercial Airport**

> Appeal to the Federal Aviation Agency may be the only way for Frederick Slade to keep the only commercial airport in Seminole County open, it was learned today.

Slade is faced with the necessity for lengthening his runways and altering the FAA approved traffic patterns at the airport west of Longwood.

Concern for the safety of private plane owners using the field has grown because of the erection of an overhead irrigation system in an orange grove at the end of the runway, which is owned by W. F. Gillies, of Maitland.

Gillies erected the system over the protests of Slade and the owners using the airport as a plane harbor.

The approach to the runway is endangered by the presence of pipes standing from 10 to 15 feet high right at the end of the runway, and will necessitate application to the FAA to change the traffic pattern, and the acquisition of more land at the west end of the airport to lengthen the runway at that end to provide the necessary distance for take offs and landings.

County Commissioner James P. Avery, in whose district the airport is located said, "This airport is just as important as new and improved highways." He deplored the fact that "a couple of dollars' worth of pipe can put the only commercial airport in the county out of business." Slade has said that over 1,000 planes use the facility annually.







But we can't see talking up a depression or panic and throwing money on the defensive . . . when it's like the world: it would be in good shape if it weren't for the people who handle it.

Now of course we can't sit here smugly at a typewriter in Sanford. Fla., and advise the bulls and bears on Wall Street about money. And we're not going to bother writing to Lloyd of London, either.

But it's fun to champion what definitely can not become the underdog in any situation . . . and such is the fate of money.

It will matter very little in the months to come if the market, the economy and the prosperity of the country undergo a change . . . money will emerge as the same evergreen god it always has been. When it's plentiful, we let it keep us. When it's more scarce we try to find it.

So we go 'round and 'round in this world . . . and even go 'round and round the entire world through outer space . . . because money has become such a pliable commodity. We have another beef about the

lettuce, too. Where are the plus and the skeptical who insist that money is the root of all evil?

We disagree.

We think conversation is the root of all evil and has gotten away with murder because money always had to take the blame for being at the bottom of misunderstandings ranging from family guarrels all the way up to full-scale warfare.

If we're going to stay healthy on the economic fronts we can do with a lot less talk about the threatened scarcity of money.

This doesn't mean there'll be a scarcity of evil, by the way. The moral is a sad one: it isn't

money which is the root of all evil but it is the conversation about it, the way it is handled or mishandled that causes all the pain.

The trouble is, we're all human. Okay . . . pull up a chair and we'll talk about money.

Facility Termed Hazard

Seminole County's only commercial airport has been closed to traffic by owner Fred Slade because of the hazard presented by the standing irrigation pipes erected at one end of his runway by grove owner W. F. Gillies, of Maitland. Slads, who owns and operates the airport located on the Sanlando Springs Road, west of Longwood, said he closed up shop because he didn't feel he could submit his customers to the dangerour landing and takeoff condition presented by the overhead irrigation system installed by Gillies last week. The Federal Aviation Agency office in Miami was contacted last week by Slade and they have inspected the situation and recommended that he seek help from the state and county authorities, who, according to Slade "are expected, by the FAA, to follow through on their recommendations."

Frank Stoudemire, State Aviation Director for the Fierida Industrial Commission, has visited the landing field within the last few days and has voiced his diasapproval of the installation and the hazard presented and told the airport owner the situation is within the purview of the county authorities to cor-

rect. Slade also pointed out that several manufacturers of electronic equipment in the Orlando and Seminole areas use the airport for a shipping and receiving point.

Slade has been advised by attorneys that the County could take action to opin the airport for traffic again, and awaken some interest on the part of the County aion in his plight. According to the office of County Zoning Director Robert Brown, no permit was isaued to Gillies for the construction of his building on the grove property.
