

Women Boost Parks

The newly elected president of the Seminole County League of Women Voters gently chided commissioners for not acting swiftly in disbursing the \$1.6 million parks bond issue voted in 1970.

Action came after Bush read a letter from DOT district engineer C.A. Benedict noting a state study proving the signals are necessary, and warranted state assistance.

Utilities Blasted

Commissioners concluded weeks of hearings into pollution violations by Ecological Utilities, noting the company could face \$500,000 in fines for daily violations since Feb. 9, when the company told the state it was fully operational.

A May 22 date was set for final verdict in the case, but ommissioners indicated some division on whether a prohibitive fine should be exacted, rather than requiring the utility to spend the money on the facility.

Citing overexpenditure in the city's budget, Comptroller Dick Baxter nevertheless painted a rosy picture of the

financial structure Baxter gave a projection of anticipated income and disbursements for the next six months, noting "I hope this will be taken in vein in which it's offered; I have no crystal

Baxter said there was a balance in the general fund account in March of \$107,419, with \$266,000 anticipated income. Outlining the several sub-accounts in the fund, Baxter said there would be \$650,000 in expenditures, mostly in salaries in which alone he said, the city was \$52,000 over

In departmental expenses Baxter said the city is running \$43,000 over budget.

An overall deficit, Baxter said, existed of \$277,000. Pinpointing ways and means of offsetting this deficit Baxter said several funds could be transferred; there is a recovery balance in the pollution control grant available to the general fund; the federal revenue sharing funds could be designated for a project; the construction funds for the city hall and civic center showed a surplus over contract which could be shifted to the general fund; utility tax funds could be committed as well as the West Altamonte tap-in fees for utilities in which a \$100,000 reserve could be returned to the general fund. In all categories, Baxter said, there is a \$392,000 surplus.

Judge Dominick Salfi was elected chief judge for a two-year term of office by his fellow judges at a circuit

judges' meeting Monday night. The chief judge is responsible in areas of securing speedy and efficient administration of the court's business, including prompt disposition of cases, assignment of judges and other court officials, control of dockets, regulation of the use of courtrooms, and mandatory review of status of inmates of the county jail.

"I am concerned with the lack of confidence that prevails today in regard to our judicial system," said Salfi. The general public's concern with the judicial system is not favorable

"I don't understand why we find ourselves in the position that we do," he continued. "Quite possibly it stems from lack of communication, and lack of understanding of what the court's needs are. And if that is the problem, we are getting exactly what we deserve.

"We can't afford more of what we deserve," said the chief judge, "An example of this is the critical need today for an additional courtroom in Seminole County, and the new \$4 million courthouse is less than six months old. Evidently we have failed to convey to someone what the real need is.

"Of great disappointment for me is that, for the second year in a row, it appears that the state legislature will deny Seminole County a third judge, " and this is in spite of the fact that each of those years the supreme court of the State of Florida has certified the need for such a position. Once again it seems we failed to communicate our real need, this time to our local legislative delegation.



"Nothing fails like success."

The headline in the Paris Herald Tribune stabbed close to the heart of American frustrations in Western Europe. Irritating bits of sand mar the justifiable pride in Uncle Sam's eye as he surveys his wards

Since V-E Day on May 8, 1945, Free Europe has made amazing strides. Nurtured by the Marshall Plan, protected by American troops and nuclear rockets, schooled by U.S. firms in modern business, technology and marketing, the orphan pauper of 1945 has grown into a vigorous old-young giant, capable of challenging even his

guardian in many areas. But like many a young man overtaken by ambition, Europe has an inclination to forget the source of its prosperity, to discount or dismiss the guardian who still protects it from possible

And like many a parent, Uncle Sam is vexed. Powerful men in Congress feel the young man is costing too much, that it's time he spent more of his own earnings on necessities, such as security. President Nixon has suggested that he accept his adult responsibilities formally and enter a full family partnership—a "new Atlantic

Such a park fiship, Mr. Nixon and Dr. Henry Kissinger remind Europeans, was the purpose for which so much American wealth and effort has been spent.

This is the context in which Western Europe must be judged this spring. From Athens to Frankfurt from Geneva to

London, Europe is a scene of bustling prosperity. The expanded European Common Market is adjusting to British, Danish and Irish newcomers. French and German production lines throb with the energies of 600,000 workers imported from Turkey. Yugoslavia, Italy, Greece and North Africa.



Generation Of Peace

Europe Needs Unity Resolution

Henry Kissinger's lengthy huddles with top leaders of the Soviet Union presumably have laid part of the groundwork for a "Year of Europe" in international diplomacy. The extent of the ground covered remains to be seen. The more we contemplate the array of problems to be dealt with in Europe, however, the more it would appear that the place to be laying most of the groundwork is not Moscow but the European capitals west of the Iron Curtain.

Indeed, Dr. Kissinger's April 23 speech in New York calling for a new Atlantic Charter spelled out challenges to the Western Alliance that could well demand a year of diplomatic activity in themselves. A "Year of Western Europe" might have been more appropriate for 1973. President Nixon is turning away from the agony of

Watergate to deal with those challenges. His recent meeting with Chancellor Willy Brandt has reaffirmed the pivotal position of West Germany in the Atlantic community. Mr. Nixon met earlier this year with British and Italian leaders, and will fly to confer with French President Georges Pom-This will clear the way for Leonid Brezhev of the Soviet

Union to visit the United States of America in June. The current impression is that the Brezhnev visit will have the nature of a "summit," a culmination of the preliminary discussions which have occupied Mr. Nixon and heads of other Western nations during the first half of the year. The President is understandably eager to see progress in

1973 toward the "generation of peace" which he hopes will flow from his diplomatic breakthroughs of 1972. However, we would look forward with greater anticipation toward summit-level developments in 1973 if there were more visible evidence of progress in the meantime toward developing the new Atlantic Charter that Dr. Kissinger spoke about.

The original spirit of the Atlantic Alliance has been overtaken, as Dr. Kissinger put it, by "a dramatic transformation in the psychological climate of the West." The Western nations, fully recovered from World War II, are beginning to look upcal themselves more as economic competitiors than as nations relying on unity for their strength and security.

Defining that change of climate is not enough, however. The Western community still faces trade and monetary negotiations to overcome economic jealousies and suspicions. The North Atlantic Treaty Organization is still searching for acceptable new formulas to share responsibility for European defense more equitably. Yet the atmosphere of detente is sweeping through Europe as though these major problems would somehow take care of them-

Europeans as well as Americans want the "generation of peace" to become a reality. It can, but only if the West is wise enough to build it on the groundwork of unity and resolution that assured the stability which Europe has enjoyed up to

Watergate Judge Pulls No Punches

WASHINGTON (NEA) Watergate is not the first time Judge John J. Sirica has challenged the high and the mighty.

Sirica, the federal district court judge who presided over the original Watergate break-in trial, has at one time or another in trials before his court taken on the secretary of Interior, the Justice Department, and assorted agencies of the U.S. government.

In a number of these cases he has, in no uncertain terms, verbally chastized men high in the federal government for what seemed to be an arrogation of power. One example will give the flavor of this man.

Stewart L. Udall, then secretary of the Interior, defendant, was tried before Judge Sirica. It was a case in which the Interior Department, had ridlen roughshod over the rights of the Tribal Council of the

In 1965, the case of Normal M. Littell, plaintiff, vs.

In ruling against Udall, who was attempting to get rid of the Navajo Tribal Council, Sirica said, "The court can only characterize that treatment, under the facts and circumstances of this case, as brutal and shabby . . . The court chooses to give more weight to their (the Indians') testimony than it does to that of the secretary (Udall) . and other Interior Department officials."

When Udall, as secretary, attempted to side-step and ullify the will of the Navajo Tribal Council in this affair. Sirica noted, "It has been the policy of the federal government to foster and encourage self-government for the Indians. . . . Indian self-government must be a meaningful goal rather than an empty phrase . . . The court finds from the evidence that the Tribal Council has the ability, knowledge and intelligence to handle its own affairs . . . It is hoped that in the future they (the Navajos) will be given the right and the opportunity (by the secretary of the interior) to decide their own problems

In fact, Udall had a right rough time with Sirica on a number of occasions for what the judge called "arbitrary. capricious, discriminatory" application of regulations. It must be noted of course that in these cases, Udall was a defendent as head of his department of government,

even though the actual governmental actions ruled against

were carried out by officials down the line. The top man, in ins capacity as civer, was new responsible. The whole concept of overwhelming government power and self-asserted rights seems to have bothered Sirica for

When, in a 1962 trial, officials claimed the government could not be prosecuted for its actions, even when these caused serious injury, and even when these actions were not in the line of official duty, Sirica ruled "the historic concept of sovereign immunity is waning." He affirmed that such a blanket defense for government "negligence, mistreatment or malpractice" is "an obsolete and dying

Now Sirica, as chief district judge, is in a position to assign himself to any further Watergate trials.

At least one family in Winthrop, Mass., and two others in Collinsville, Ill., are today asking themselves a similar

In Winthrop last January, 15 bearded, long-haired men waving guns and shouting obscenities suddenly invaded a home and proceeded to terrorize its occupants. In Collinsville on the evening of April 23, a similar group broke into a house and an apartment, again mouthing obscenities and brandishing weapons and, charges one complainant, held a gun to his head and threatened to kill him. In all three cases, the invaders turned out to be federal, state and local narcotics agents who, acting on tips, had mistakenly broken into the wrong homes. In all three cases, they left without a word of apology.

The question is: If a man looks like a criminal, talks like a criminal and acts like a criminal, what is he? And how much difference does it make if he carries policeman's identification in his pocket?

Another architectural firm sought the Winter Springs council's nod for erection of the new \$250,000 municipal complex encompassing police and fire departments and city hall. Making a pitch before city council Monday was Robert Koch, of the Orlando firm of Fugleberg, Koch Associates. Koch outlined areas of development performed and proposed by his firm such as Altamonte Springs "Devonshire;" Hanover Woods; Wild Kingdom and the Seminole County Zoological Park.

Koch noted Winter Springs is in the heart of one of the fastest growing areas in the country and cited the problem facing the city as being three-fold: dynamic growth, increased needs, and limited capital.

Outlining problems of the Casselberry city hall and the new Altamonte Springs city hall, Koch said, the former had aready exceeded its facility in growth and the latter, although now larger than present needs, had a limited land expansion area, with future expansion having to go upwards. Since Winter Springs has a large site, more than a onestory building would be needless Koch said.

The architect predicted, if his firm received the green light from council, construction could begin upon the complex before the year's end, and that a feasibility study would not be indicated.

With an eye toward organizing activities for vouth, Howard Allard, representing the Community Association, proposed a financial operation to generate capital to get the youth activities off the ground

Allard discussed a donkey soft ball team being promoted y Interstate Donkey Ball Co., Terra Celin, Celin, Florida. Alliard said the company guaranteed 50 per cent of the gate receipts to the city and that 100 per cent of the proceeds. would go toward organizing such groups as Boy and Girl Scouts and Junior Police.

Al'urd, saying the entire game would be "hilarious," received the comment from Mayor Granville Brown, "since you think its so hilarious, I appoint you as my representative." Councilman Victor Miller will organize the team for the

Brown said he "wouldn't give \$6.50 for the whole thing" and we've had nothing but tro ble with the damn thing. City Attorney Tom Freeman jokingly injected, "It's a good thing we haven't passed the obscenity ordinance yet."

Jordan requested council postpone action, tabling the matter until next Monday, until he receives a written agreement as to maintenance.
















Watergate Televison Thursday

NEW YORK (AP) - All three networks are stopping their daytime fun and games at 10 a m. EDT Thursday to televise the long-awaited start of public hearings by the Senate Select

Committee investigating the Watergate scandal. It will be the first time since work has halted its daytime soap operas, game shows and reruns for live coverage of Senate committee proceedings. NBC did it that year during a Senate inquiry into the unsuccessful Son Tay prison raid in North Vietnam.

A major witness in Thursday's Watergate hearings will be James W. McCord Jr., according to an aide to Sen. Sam Ervin Jr., D-N.C., head of the McCord, 48, is the former security chief for President Nixm's campaign committee, the Committee to Reelect the President. He is among those conv cied in last June's break-in at

Ervin Leads Senate Probers

Public Watergate Hearings Today

WASHINGTON (AP) — A tribunal of seven senators opened today historic hearings into the Watergate scandals of President Nixon's re-election campaign with a pledge to determine whether America's political and judicial systems have been undermined by subversion

Sen. Sam J. Ervin Jr., DN.C., the committee chairman, opened the nationally televised hearings in a crowded Senate caucus room.

He said if Watergate charges are proven true, "then the burglars who broke into the headquarters of the Democratic committee ... were breaking into the home of every citizen in the United States.'

And he said if that is the case, they sought to steal something far more

valuable than jewels or money-"the right to vote in a free election." The hearings began 11 months to the day after five men were arrested in side Democratic headquarters on a

In his opening statement, Ervin recited the record of Watergate, and the published charges of broader political surveillance and sabotage He said the scandal has "cast a black cloud of mistrust" over American government, and promised candid and intensive investigation to uncover all

Sen. Howard H. Baker, RTenn., said in his opening statement that the American people "must be the final judge of Watergate
