Buddy Lake To Hurl For Feds Here Sunday

Popular Local Youth May Be Added To Boston Brave Baseball Team Next Season

Buddy Lake, popular Sanford athlete, who is another "home town boy who has made good in the big city," will pitch for the Sanford City entry in the Central Florida Baseball League here next Sunday afternoon.

He will face the strong Leesburg Islanders who now are making a determined bid for the second half pennant and the right to meet the Deland Ringers in a post-season series.

He may be opposed on the ground by Enos Ydell, Leesburg manager and former National League and American Association star.

No matter whom he faces, Central Florida fans may expect to see a jump-up ball game in which a hustling "Sanford team" will be fighting from the first to put a full condition.

Manager Bill Page today ap-

pealed to Leesburg and Cocoa officials to give him permission to secure another shortstop and to use Al Lutz in the post-season series.

Lake, just returned from his third season with the Harrisburg team in the N. Y.-Penn. League, is in perfect physical condition.

Strong and sturdy this popular

Lake may be with the Boston Braves next year, it was learned today. A protege of Ned Rice of Sanford, Lake was called to the attention of Boston officials at the end of the 1934 season.

He worked out with the Braves in the spring of 1935, later being sent to Harrisburg where he has been seasoning since.

Before leaving for Sanford last week, he was advised that he was the choice of Boston officials as the player they would select from the Harrisburg side this year. Although he has not been officially signed officially, or thus affected from Boston, he is awaiting an announcement at any time.

The young man has last concluded an active and successful season in which he appeared in about 65 games as a pitcher, outfielder or pinch batter. He pitched in probably 15 games, and he started and finished 11.

Up until 10 days ago his record was 14 wins and eight defeats with a tallied ball club. Because officials of the club sold and traded players and had to use semi-pro players in their stead during the last 10 days of the season, the club officially was "shut" and as a result, Lake called on to pitch in seven of the last 10 days, dropping five straight to give him a season's average of 14 wins and 13 defeats.
