

### Europe Will Have Another American Motorized Invasion

NEW YORK (AP) — Europe is about to have another American motorized invasion. This time, however, it is a peaceful trip by folks taking their own homes with them.

About 225 people, ranging in age from 8 to 85, are in the junket called "Trailer Tour of Europe." The objective is to tour Europe and make friends, both for themselves and for America.

Mostly retired folks, these tourists are taking a total of 60 trailer homes with them. They represent 17 of the states, the majority of them from California and Florida.

Wallie Byam, who heads the junket, says, "We want to make friends for America in a real way, without resorting to the dollar sign."

The 60-year-old retired Los Angeles construction engineer calls the mountain of work of organizing and arranging the trip—"a no pay to himself or others—"my hobby."

As an assistant he has his cousin Mrs. Helen Byam Schwamborn, whom he calls his "secretary." Like her cousin, friend-making abroad is a passion with her. This is how it is done, she says:

"We move our homes to their cities and become a part of their community, invite them to our homes and they in turn invite us to theirs. That way we make good friends."

Byam and Mrs. Schwamborn will leave in the first section of tourists departing from Brooklyn next Tuesday aboard the Black Diamond liner Black Condor. The other tourists and their trailers will leave via separate means.

# Newspaperman's Tour Report

This is the eighth in a series of articles written by Mrs. Carmage Walls, representing The Sanford Herald on a 28-day tour of European countries.

The highlight of our Cairo visit was an interview this morning with Egypt's premier, Colonel Gamal Nasser, Egypt, as all know, has had three years under the leadership of Colonel Nasser, the military man whose group forced the abdication and exile of the corrupt King Farouk and who also ousted the British from the country. Incidentally, Nasser is also the first Egyptian ruler to lead his people in over 2000 years.

I must confess that before coming to this country my opinion of the situation was that it was another dictatorship controlled by an egomaniac (which is usually the case and which may eventually be true here) power-mad from the success of a military coup. My personal opinion after listening to every one from American Embassy people to the merchants in shops and "dragomen" (local guides) and others - is that here in Nasser is a dedicated-to-Egypt puritan. His program is fantastic and, unlike many extreme reform programs, it is showing results - but, boy, this country needs those results and many more.

Because of the terrific cold I have had, I did not take the 100 mile trip to the "Liberation Province," a land-and-people-reclaiming project in the desert, but Carmage did go and here are some of the facts on the deal. Currently it is purely a social-

deal with the people living in government owned houses, working the land and receiving small wages plus their living quarters. Such a plan seems grim to us but, if you could see the squalor and filth in which so many exist (not live) here in Cairo (and I understand it's worse elsewhere) you would be glad to know something about it. I have seen children and parents are learning how to live with soap and water and decent houses and food.

On this vast area of desert, 80 acres are being reclaimed for crops each day and as fast as water is made available from the Nile, the tempo will increase to bring the total from the present 11,000 acres to 1,300,000. There are presently 15,000 men and their families living there - none of whom owned any land previously. According to the authorities, it is hoped to sell this land eventually to the people themselves in five acre tracts. One of the many interesting things about this place is the fact that it is completely financed and backed by Egyptians. Incidentally, this is the keynote of Nasser's philosophy - Egyptian-only. In our two hour interview with the Premier the point he stressed over and over was that he and his group are going to look after Egypt first - a point on which I could not disagree with him.

He told us that insofar as we were concerned the Russian threat was great but, insofar as his country is concerned, the British influence and long domination and the immediate and close treaty of Israel war were the things his people worry about.

Also to be mentioned is that Nasser alone has given Nasser arms aid in the Israel conflict in spite of the fact that Communism is illegal in Egypt and is dealt with as such at present.

This man said much in this long meeting - too much to digest and condense here but my personal opinion is that this 38-year-old, handsome, young Egyptian may very well be the country's "Lincoln." He is a puritan, apparently, an excellent orator, has a tremendous personality, and (this is important to me) I believe he is a peaceful man up to a point because Egypt can be built best by not fighting, but I also think Nasser would do anything to anyone who gets in his opinion, in Egypt's way. He is dedicated and sincere and obviously can do much here if he does not succumb to the age-old dictator's disease of "power-for-me."

At the moment, my personal opinion is that he will not. Although anti-American feeling is rather high here now because of our British-French alliance and because of United States money going to Israel, we have nevertheless been given a very hospitable and exhausting welcome by the Egyptian Information Service.

We were carried in buses to Giza on the outskirts of Cairo, where the Pyramids and the sphinx are. The history books have already given all the statistics, etc., on the Pyramids especially the largest one, Cheops, so I shall not bore you with it again. I will say, however, that it is extremely impressive. Our group was taken inside and we started the trek up toward the top some 450 feet away. This sounds simple enough except that the passage-way is a tunnel so low in height that one has to bend at about a ninety degree angle to go up

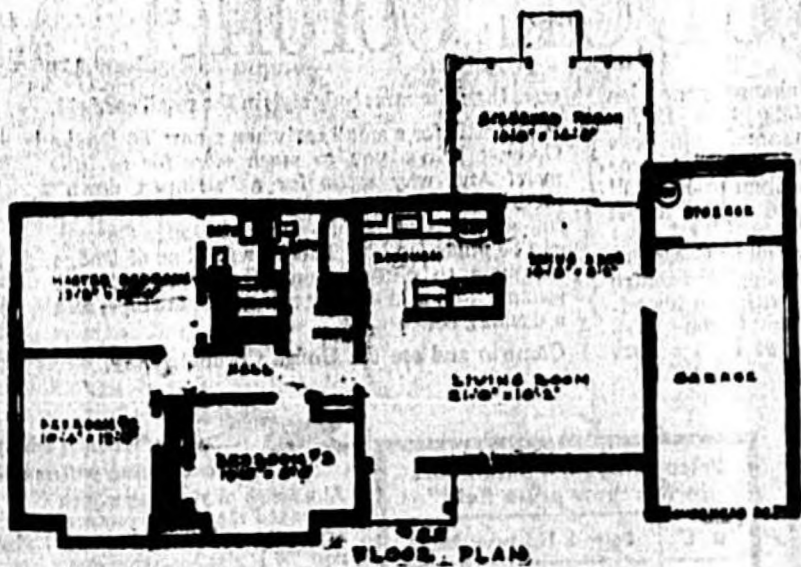

## Grace, Margaret—April Brides

**NEW YORK (AP)**—The beautiful blonde movie star will marry the prince, son of a thousand years of princes, in the Romanesque cathedral of Monaco.

Little girls will throw flowers, there will be dancing in the streets and fireworks. The day of the wedding will be a national holiday, delegations of dignitaries will arrive. There will be affairs with champagne and full medals, their ladies in rich ball gowns, ablaze with gems.

That's the fairy tale romance, a real life reenactment of every little girl's dream of happiness.

The pretty blonde girl from Independence, Mo., will marry the newspaperman from Zebulon, N. C., son of a druggist, in the small brick Trinity Church of Independence where her mother and father were married and where she sang in the choir. A reception will follow at the home of the bride's parents.

This is the American teen-ager's real life marriage. This is the story of a typical wedding, full of simplicity and warmth, even though the bride is a president's daughter.

Both of these weddings will take place next month and a nation, sentimental and incurably romantic, will linger and dream a bit over both of them.

On April 19, Grace Patricia Kelly, 26, daughter of a self-made millionaire Philadelphia contractor, ex-model, ex-New York actress and, she insists, ex-movie star, will marry his serene highness Prince Rainier III of Monaco, 32, who possesses also 23 other titles ranging from duke to seigneur.

A few days later Mary Margaret Truman, 22, daughter of the 33rd President of the United States, concert singer, television and radio performer, will marry Clifton Daniel, 43, New York newspaperman and former foreign correspondent.

The four principals—and the trappings of the two romances—couldn't offer a more vivid contrast. From their original meetings to wedding plans the two stories illustrate colorfully the number of miles between Independence, Mo., and Monte Carlo to the east and Hollywood to the west.

Starting at the beginning, compare these two courses of true love.

Grace Kelly, a prime box office property, was presented to his serene highness last May when, with

a photographer, she was making publicity shots against the backdrop of the 14th Century palace of the Grimaldis. The next time she saw him was in December when he dropped in to call on the Philadelphia Kellys. Less than two weeks later they announced their engagement.

Margaret Truman met suave, graying Cliff Daniels in early November when they were dinner guests of mutual friends, the George Backers, in New York. They dated around New York regularly for a couple of months. Daniel proposed late in January, she accepted, received the blessing of his prospective in-laws.

On March 2 he gave her a ring. No one suspected a thing. Then Daniel took his girl to Zebulon to meet his parents—and rumors started. They'd planned to make the announcement on March 13, but former President Harry S. Truman hastily called a press conference a day early and read the brief, formal traditional announcement.

There are other comparisons: Rainier, to seal his proposal in Philadelphia, presented his bride-to-be with a handsome circlet of intertwined diamonds and rubies, which, thoughtfully, he had packed along with him from Monaco. Later he replaced on the proper finger of the left hand a magnificent 12 carat solitaire—roughly the size and shape of a three cent stamp. Educated guesses place the ring's cost at around \$20,000.

Clifton Daniel went ring shopping alone and presented his girl with a handsome round solitaire of something less than a carat. The pretty, delicate ring cost, a diamond expert said, around \$1,000—an important investment for a salaried man.

The prince and princess will go for a cruise on their 125-foot yacht. Margaret and her bridegroom will have a honeymoon, but again in the American tradition, the destination is a secret.

Margaret and her husband will return to New York—and an apartment. He'll go back to work. She'll continue her career, if she wants to. He says he won't object.

Princess Grace of Monaco will become chatelaine of a 120-room palace and preside over a number of other establishments the prince maintains. She has agreed to give up her career, the prince says.

So far as Monacans are concerned, her most important career is motherhood. For, lacking an heir or heiress, Monaco ultimately

will drop into French hands under a 1918 treaty, and 4,000 subjects of the prince and 14,000 residents of his picture postcard country will have to start paying taxes.

## Cost Of Producing Beef Is Going Up

What can we do to make more money from our beef cattle? The trend in land prices, labor, cost of equipment, and many other factors has pointed out one very important point which is that the cost of producing a pound of beef is going up.

If we try to produce beef without taking advantage of the new changes in programs for pasture management, feeding, breeding for market timing etc., we will not make as much from our cattle operations as we should.

Feeding cattle on a supplement basis has proved very profitable to the cattleman when he plans his operation properly. When there is adequate forage, feeding will help balance the cows daily intake so that you can get a higher percent calf crop, better bull condition during breeding season, heavier calves, better condition on market animals and other benefits. In times of poor pasture conditions feeding will help keep your animals producing pounds of beef at the lowest cost per pound besides keeping them alive.

The amount of feed you use depends on your pasture and market requirements. Since feed is costly you should use a feed designed to do a particular job, the job you need done. Today modern scientific feed manufacturers are producing feeds to do a particular job. Possibly fattening steers on grass, steers in dry lot, creep feeding calves, maintaining cow condition, wintering cattle, maintaining good breeding condition in your bulls and others. Each of these jobs is different and needs a different type of feed to do that job. No one feed formula will do them all at the most profitable level. Feed only when you know exactly what you want to accomplish with feed and use a feed that is designed to do the job you want done.

At this season there are two jobs that most cattlemen want done. One is to get lots of calves for next year and to do this you must have his bulls in top breeding condition. A bull out of condition cannot do the job he needs to do. The other job is to get his calves that he might now have or is getting to top market weight and conditions as fast as possible. To do these jobs he can help himself by feeding his bulls a conditioning feed and creep feeding his calves.

The right creep feed can help do this. Upgrading on your calves that may mean \$8-10 per calf above creep feeding costs. The packer is looking for the calves that are a higher grade than you get from just letting them run with their mothers. You can easily get them in the best grade by starting your creep feeding early and getting the jump on the ones that are just letting their run with the cows.

From creep feeding you gain calves. In cow condition you get 10 to 15 per cent more calves dropped the following season. The cows gain up to 4 1/2 pounds more when the calves are dropped. Creep feeding supplements cows milk and grass. It gets them ready sooner. For every dollar spent in creep feeding you

## Collins Attacked By Fuller Warren On Turnpike Issue

**Former Gov. Fuller Warren yesterday attacked Gov. Collins on the turnpike routing.**

Warren criticized the proposed routing around Jacksonville and said the Collins administration was using "unseemly haste" in validating bonds for the toll road. Collins replied that the turnpike routing was made to serve all of Florida and that many Jacksonville residents had endorsed it. He said there should be no delay in getting this needed project under way.

While Warren and Collins were exchanging verbal punches, Sumner Lowry and Ferris Bryant hammered away at the segregation issue.

In a speech last night in Telogia in Liberty County, Lowry declared that "if the South makes it known that we are willing to go all out to defend segregation, the agitators will retreat."

"The only way we can maintain our separate schools and free institutions is to have a governor who is strong enough and determined enough to tell the federal government to stay out, to tell the world the United States Constitution empowers us to run our own schools and that we intend to continue doing so."

Bryant said at Miami he doesn't believe President Eisenhower will call a conference of Southern governors and attorneys to talk about segregation.

## Scientist Finds Giant Ape Tooth

**LONDON (AP)**—The Chinese scientist who discovered the "Peking man" today announced finding the tooth of another giant ape who roamed China in prehistoric times.

Peiping radio said Dr. Pei Wen Chung made the new discovery in a cave in Kwangsi province. It was described as "fossil of a giant ape, four times the size of a man's tooth."

The skull and parts of the skeleton of "Peking man"—regarded by some anthropologists as the oldest link between man and monkey—was found in 1929 in Chowkowien, not far from Peiping.
