New Identification System Instituted

WASHINGTON on - Scaled orders, secret until opened in the air, are tunneling aircraft flying the North Atlantic into the United States under a new identification system inaugurated by the Air

In its announcement of the new method today, the Air Force said each incoming plane-civil or military must enter an assigned cor-rator 225 unles before it reaches the Nantucket, Mass, radio bea-

This applies to all aircraft plan-ning to cross the U.S. coastline esset and north of Montauk Point,

New York.

The method is similar to a technique employed for the past year, with considerable success, on the west coast to identify planes arriving from Hawaii or from the

Alaskan Aleutian area.

It will be tried experimentally on the heavy incoming North At-lantic air traffic for a month Mil-itary planes started flying the Nantucket corridors last Sunday Civil participation is on a voluntary hasis However, the Air Force has been told that both of the U.S. transatlantic airlines—Pan American and TWA—and all the foreign authors crossing the North Atlan-
