City Declines Requests For Financial Aid

Whithurst offered a resolution that \$100 be set aside in next year's budget.

In addressing the Commission Mr. Lehmann exhibited a number of photographs of the exhibit which occupies the entire 2nd floor (16,000 square feet) of International Building in Rockefeller Center. He said that vegetables on display there are bought in the Sanford area. Advertising displays are maintained in 19 theaters and department stores in the metropolis, and from 18,000 to 26,000 people visit the exhibit daily.

The board of directors, through Arthur Brown and H. Schmidt, asked for an additional appropriation of \$100,000 for fixing up the infield, building lockers and placing a flat floor over the concrete floor in the shower baths. All members of the Commission agreed that the \$150 already allotted for repair work at the municipal field together with the \$90 the city's baseball committee has retained from fees paid for use of the field is "all that the city can stand," and that the committee should be able to raise the balance, either by subscription or in receipts from games to be played by the Sanford team of the Florida State League next summer.

J. C. Hutchison and Harold Washburn, National Guard officers, appeared in behalf of the Army project asking for an appropriation of \$500. When attention was made to the WPA for the project the city agreed to spend \$1000, in cash, material and labor. It was not expected Mr. Hutchison said, that any of that would be paid out for land but more than \$500 was paid by the municipality for the Army site. The balance left in the city's \$1000 allotment is \$1011.

The Commissioners were told that unless enough money is put in the rough plumbing is forthcoming in the immediate future, work on the Army building must be halted. The plumbing and electrical work (which will not be paid for by WPA) will cost \$2,100. The County will pay \$1,000, the netliners reported, and they believed they know where they can get \$500 more.

After considerable discussion the Commission decided to refer a cover for consideration at a later meeting.

George Stovall and Robert Kipp were the spokesmen for a large delegation of DeMolay boys who attended the meeting, but the Commissioners advised them that if their request for free or similar requests must likewise use of the hall was granted otherwise the \$5 charge must be for use of the hall barely pays for lights and janitor service, Commissioner S. 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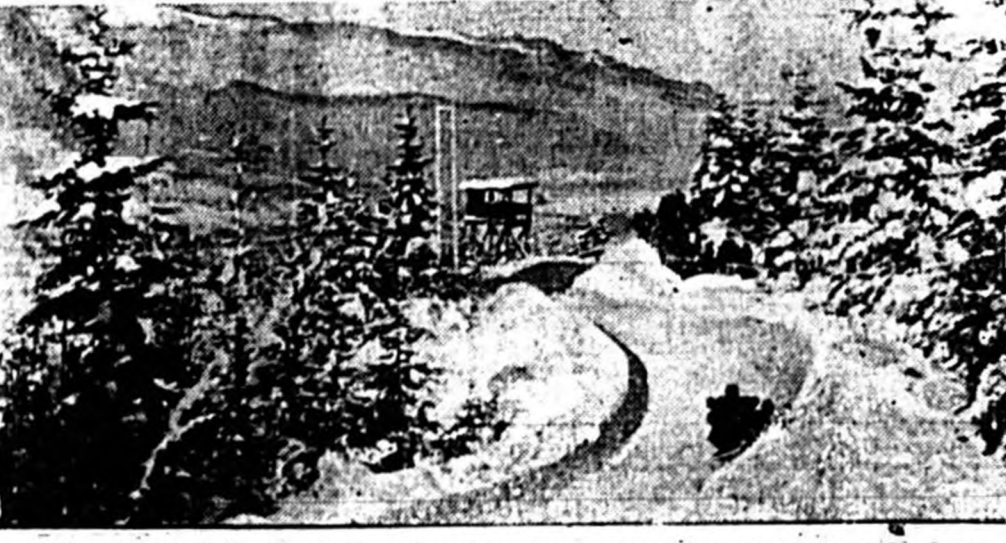
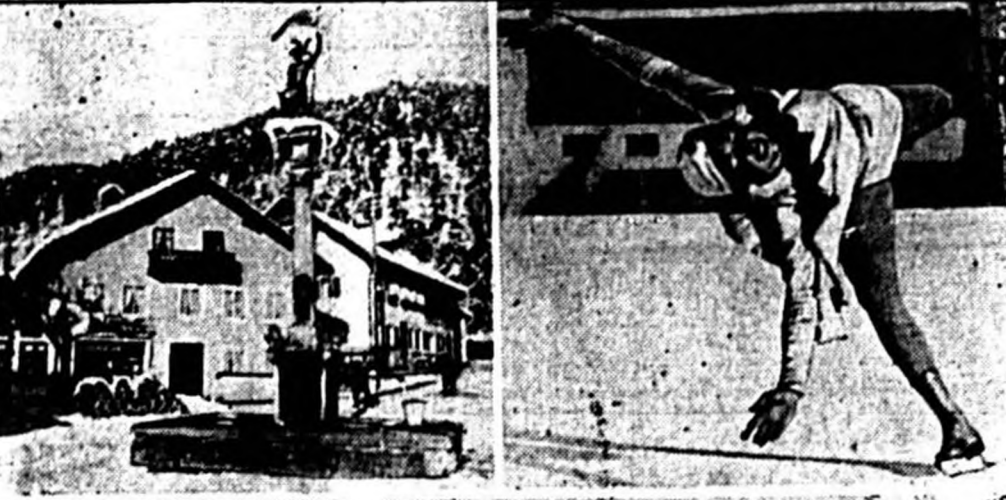

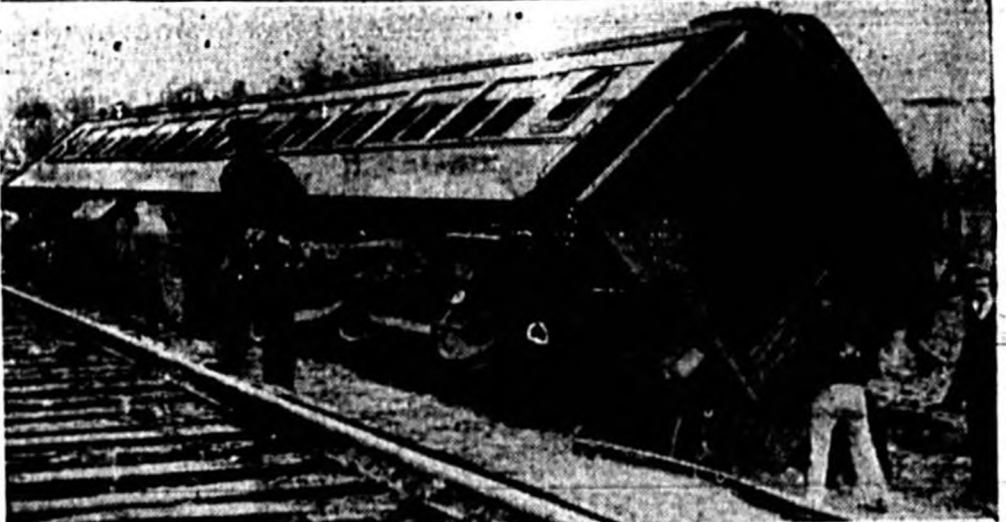

RAIN STORM AND TORNADO RAVAGE THREE STATES



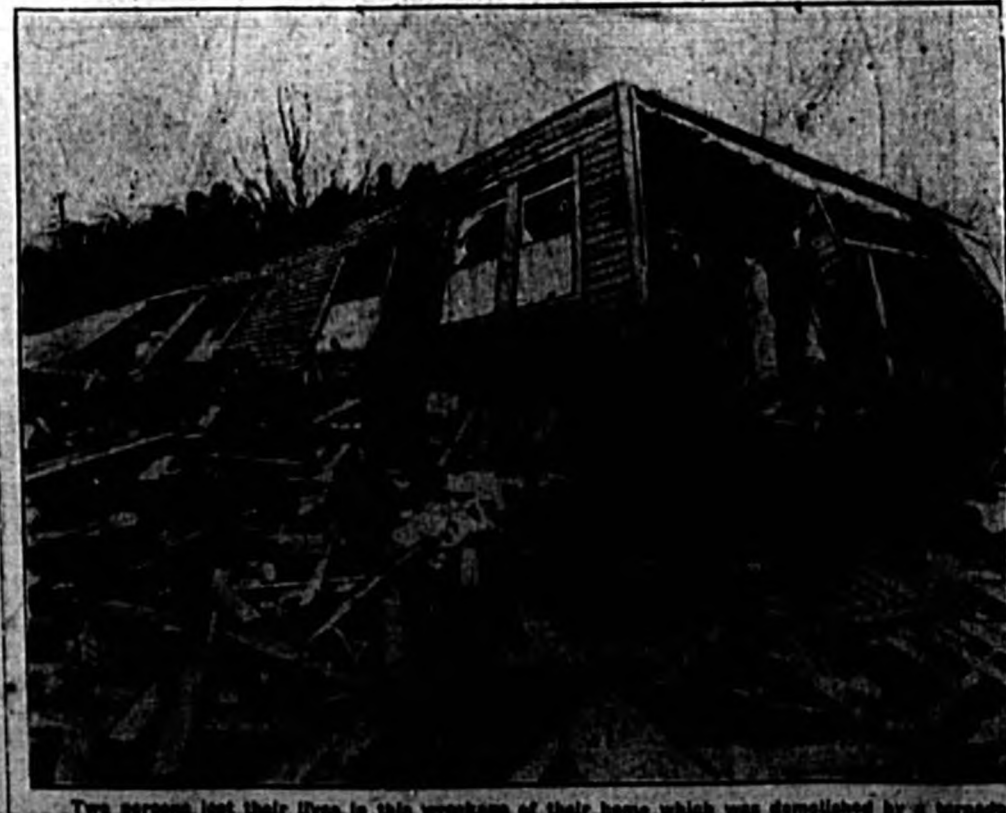

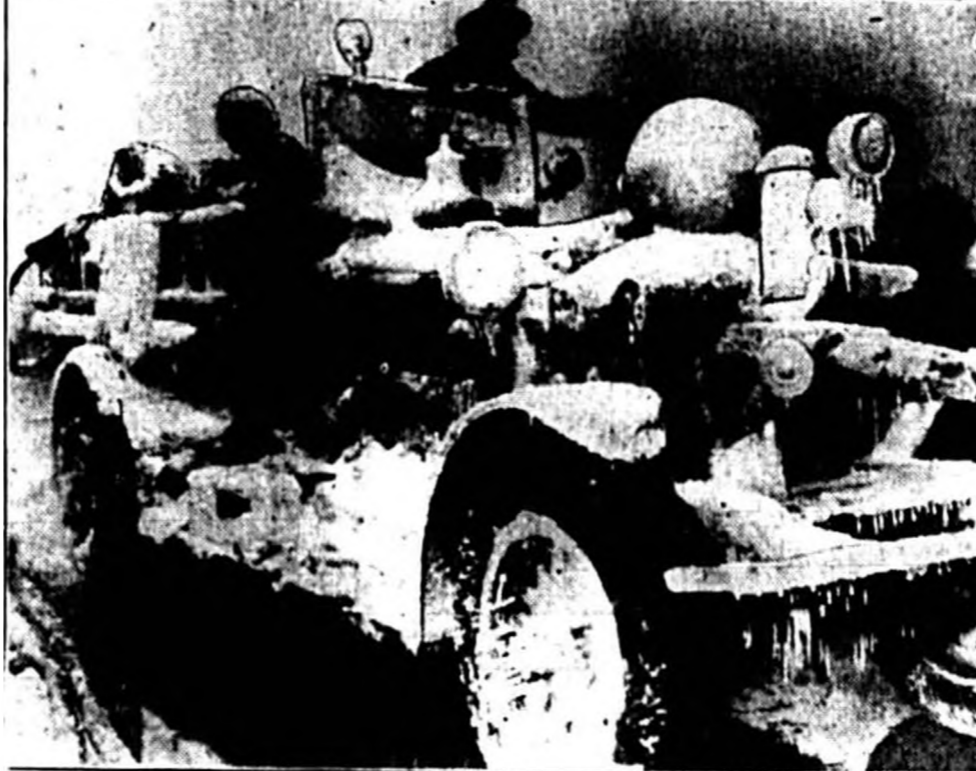

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How Japan Is Ruled

The government of Japan consists primarily of the emperor. Actually he can do practically anything he wants to regardless of the wishes of the people or anybody else.

The constitution consists of some 76 articles, 17 devoted to the emperor, 15 to the rights and duties of subjects, 22 to the imperial diet, 2 to the ministers of state and privy council, 5 to the judiciary, 12 to finance and 4 to supplementary rules.

The members of the cabinet, as well as the privy council and the ministers of state are appointed by the emperor and are answerable to him.

In theory every law requires the consent of the imperial diet, but the diet always is under the control of the emperor and can be dissolved whenever it can't be controlled.

The lower house is somewhat more representative. It is composed of 466 members elected for four year terms.

The emperor, too, while the supreme ruler in fact as well as in law, is said to be a mere screen behind which are a powerful group of aristocrats known as the elder statesmen who really control the government.

So while in effect Japan boasts a constitutional monarchy, practically unlimited powers are concentrated in one supreme authority who, as so often happens, is controlled by a power behind the throne.

Florida Highway Accidents

We have previously published automobile accident statistics for the year of 1935 as recorded for the entire United States showing that 34,252 persons lost their lives on the highways, as compared with 34,538 during the previous year.

Florida had 573 automobile deaths during 1935 as compared to 608 similar deaths in 1934, Mr. Frank points out. There were 18,336 automobile accidents, and 14,642 people were injured in 1935.

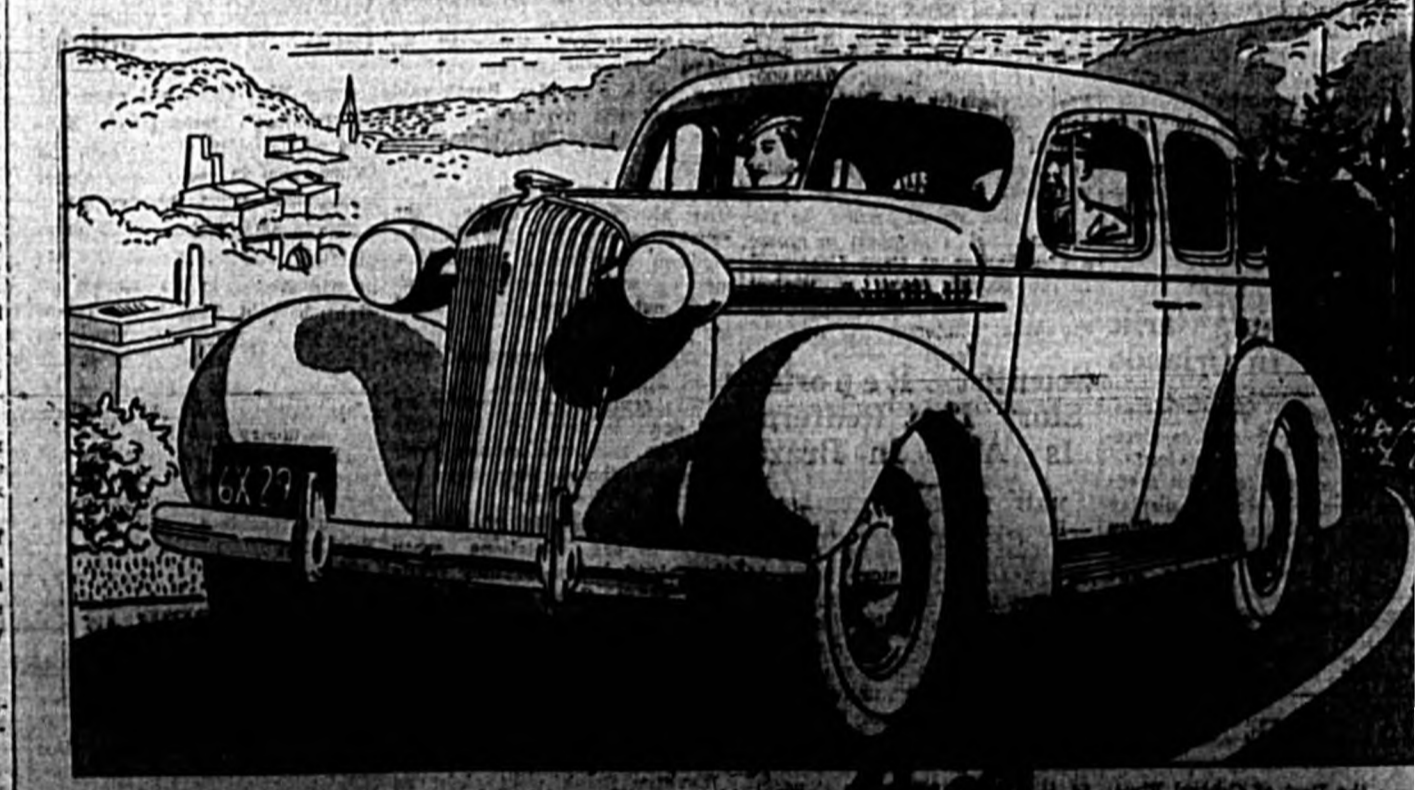

President Roosevelt yesterday denied in his press conference he was hostile to the measure which could be thrust on Congress and a satisfactory settlement sought. Any attempt to restrict the use of the \$250,000,000 in the bill would mean the withdrawal of the money from the war program, the president said. Projects to which the money would be turned a deal was made at the Cassiniquely total power project in Maine, the Atlantic Gulf ship canal in Florida, the power project in Mississippi, the Cochran dam in New Mexico and the Elizabethton reservoir in West Virginia.

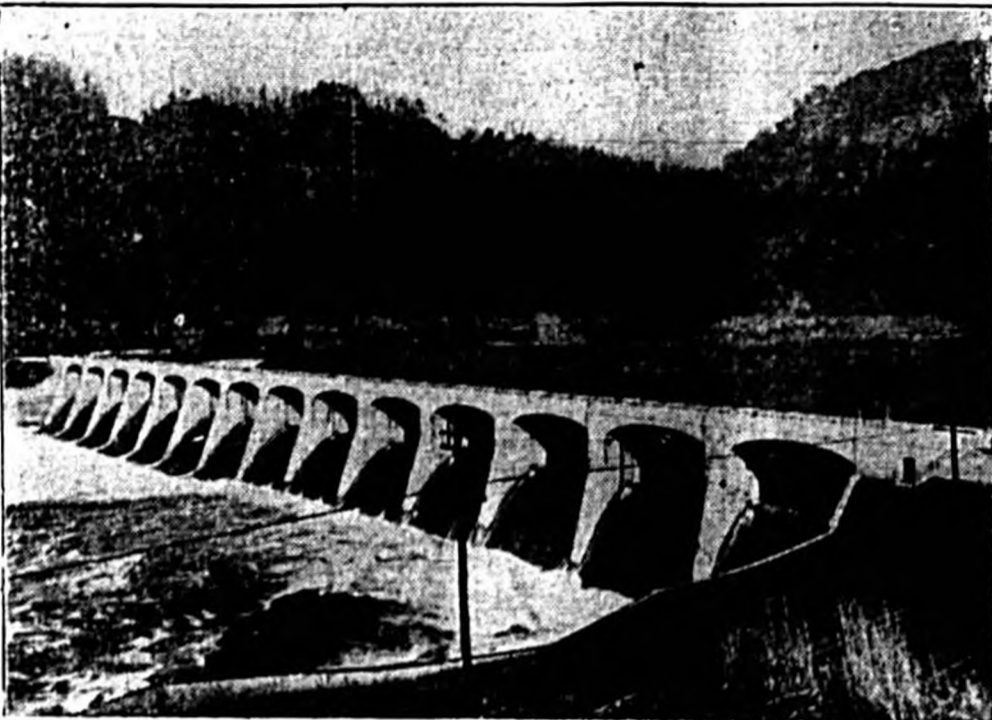

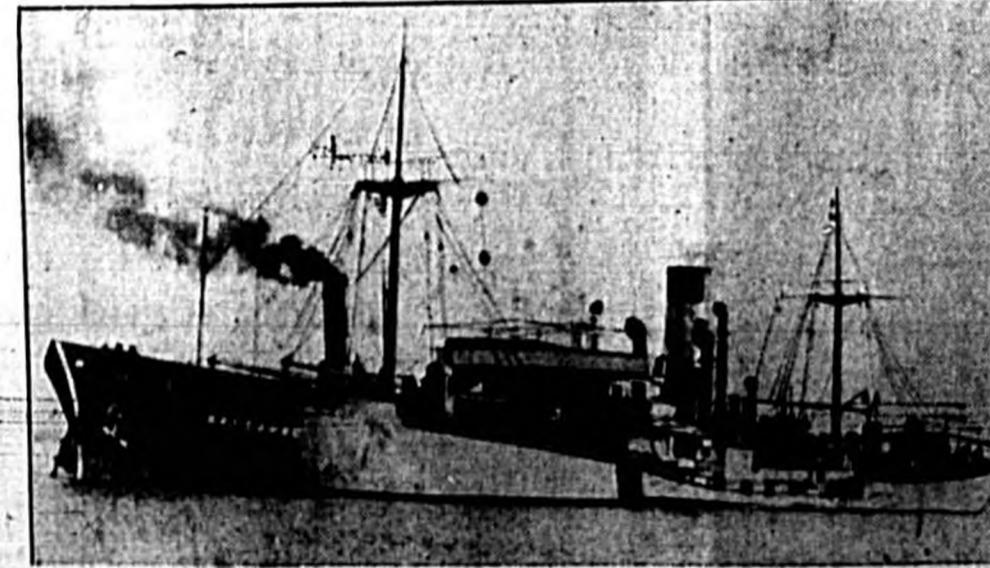
