Undaunted by intermittent showers, crowds of people thronged Sanford stores and streets Friday night, in the largest influx of shoppers since the new Friday store hours began, four weeks ago. Merchants in general were well pleased with the steady flow of shoppers. Many stores were still waiting on people and finishing up sales after the 9 p. m. closing time.

Rain held back shoppers during the early evening hours and as soon as it stopped busy housewives, students and waiting people flocked into town to take advantage of Friday night bargains, prepare themselves for the fall season and stock up on school supplies.

Every available parking place was filled all evening and traffic was often backed up a block from the traffic lights.

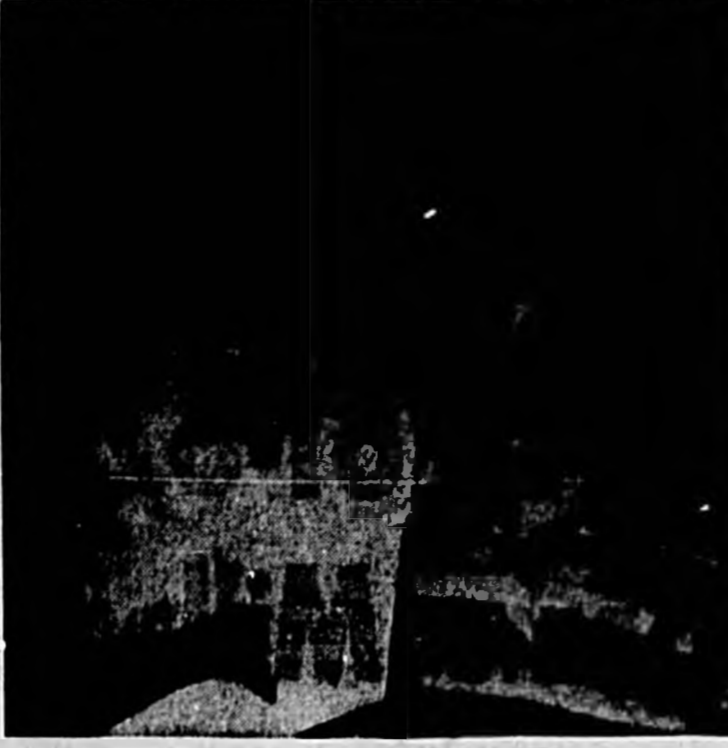

Carolina Town Hit By Race Violence

MONROE, N. C. (UPI) — This small Carolina town, racially uneasy for several months, exploded into violence Sunday when police tried to keep a white integrationist from joining Negro anti-segregation demonstrators in a taxi. A white policeman was shot in the neck.

Police arrested more than 50 persons, many of them whites, on charges of inciting to riot, and charged a Negro youth with assault with intent to kill the wounded policeman.

Police Chief A. A. Mauney also said Negroes temporarily held a white couple as hostages in an attempt to force release of integrated pickets jailed by officers during several hours of racial turbulence. He said, however, the couple was released unharmed.

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In the wild fighting which broke out, Rushing said he chased three Negro youths from the scene and exchanged gunfire with them. He said one youth, whom he identified as Albert Rorie, 17, crouched under a trailer and shot him in the left leg with a pistol. Rorie was charged with assault with attempt to kill.

Police arrested more than 20 picketers including Miss Lever and several whites in the thick of fighting. Later more than 20

others were arrested after Mayor Wilson deputized fire department employees and about 75 state troopers arrived in town.

Mauney said he received a telephone call about 8 p. m. threatening "something bad will happen" if the integrationist picketers were not released. He said he was informed that Negroes were holding a white couple, Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Stegal of nearby Marshville, N. C., as hostages in Williams' home.

Officers also said that at one point a carload of whites passed by Williams' house and were greeted by a volley of about 30 shots from the house next door.

Jasper N. Allman Dead At 89

Jasper N. Allman, 89, died Friday at the Allen Nursing Home in DeLand.

Born in Orlando, Allman lived the greater part of his life in Osteen.

He is survived by seven sons, Vivian, E. P. and King of Osteen; Alfred, Salerno; Woodruff, Fort Orange; Jasper, Lakeland; and Charles in the state of Washington. He is also survived by one daughter, Mrs. Pearl King of Oviedo, 19 grandchildren and 30 great-grandchildren.

Services will be held Wednesday at 2 p. m. at the Osteen Methodist Church with the Rev. Eric Roberts officiating.

Burial will be in Osteen Cemetery. Brison Funeral Home is in charge.

Alfred McQueen Dead At 74

Alfred A. McQueen, 74, died Sunday at Seminole Memorial Hospital.

All-Out Search On For Missing Girl

TORRANCE, Calif. (UPI)—"We still hope she'll be all right," William and Laura Tompkins said today. "If she had been destroyed by anyone she would have been found."

Ten days ago, 11-year-old Karen Lynn Tompkins disappeared. The pretty, blonde little girl vanished as she was walking home from a school playground where she had just attended a party for a crafts class.

A schoolmate saw her skipping down the sidewalk toward her home five blocks away, carrying two toy covered wagons she had made in the class.

That was the last time she was seen. Karen's father, a sailor aboard the USS Ticnderoga in the Far East, flew home on emergency leave to help in the search. The shy little girl's mother, worn with worry, has been under sedation for the past several days.

"We have no information at all," said a detective today. "She just vanished. There's no indication of any kidnaping."

Officers have conducted a house-to-house search of Karen's suburban Los Angeles neighborhood and several suspects have been questioned for hours but then released when their alibis checked out.

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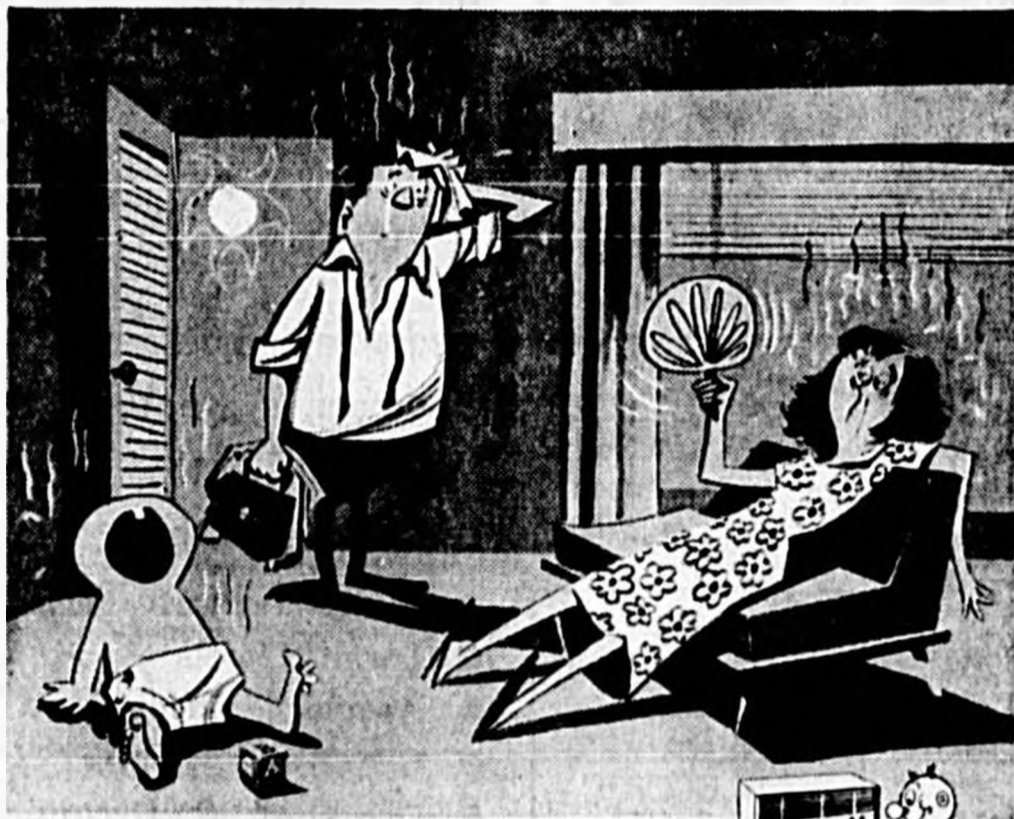
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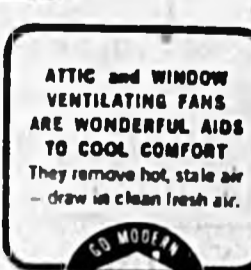

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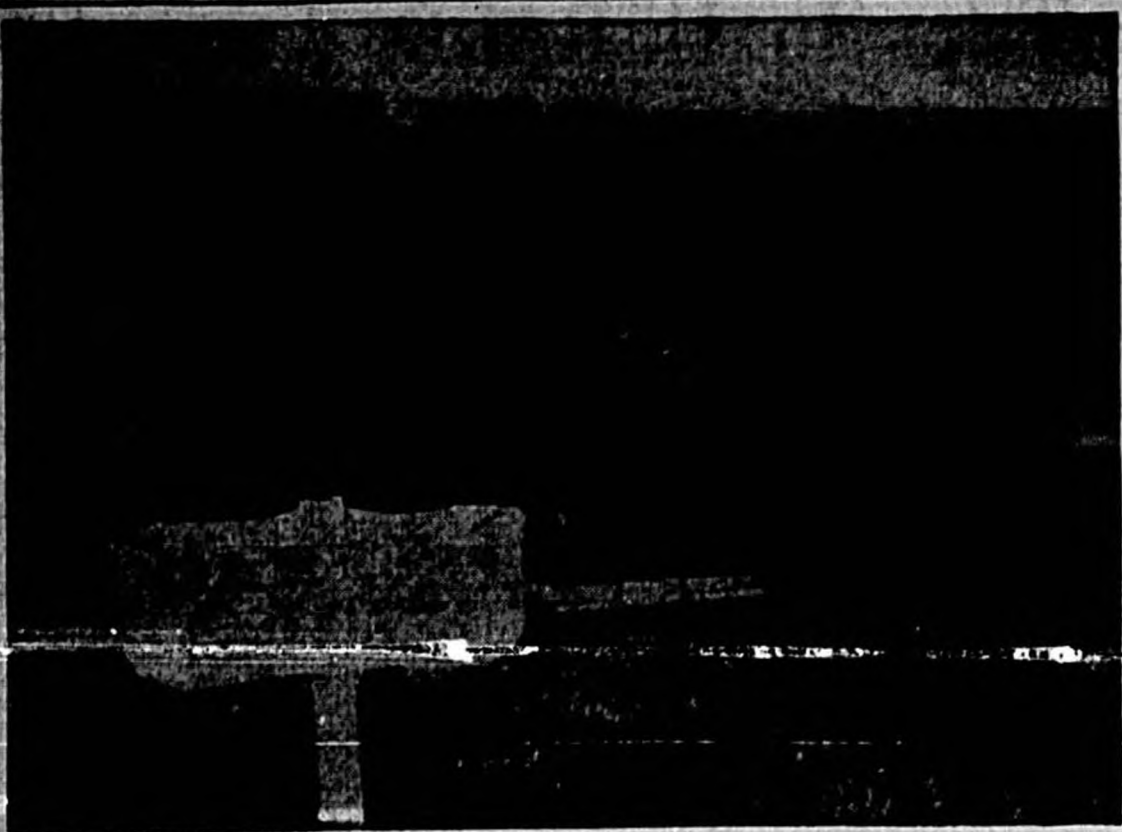

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Betting Clamp Down Being Considered

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Chairman John L. McClellan of the Senate investigations subcommittee suggested today that Congress might consider making it illegal to sneak betting information from race tracks.
McClellan made the proposal as his subcommittee prepared to begin its second week of hearings into organized gambling.
The Arkansas Democrat said one bill designed to counter gambling was on the verge of becoming law. He said the Senate may act soon to stamp final congressional approval on a measure that would make interstate trans-

mission of gambling information illegal.
He said the ban is aimed at destroying horse race information services which specialize in flashing race track information to bookmakers and horse parlors across the country.
And to follow this up, McClellan said, his subcommittee may propose a bill that would prevent "underground" operators at race tracks from transmitting information back to their home base.
Other congressional news:
Foreign Aid: A Senate-House conference committee began its second week of efforts to draft a compromise foreign aid bill. The conferees last week managed to reconcile some differences between the versions passed by the House and Senate. But they avoided taking up the key issue of long-term borrowing authority for the president. There were indications that the committee might begin work on the provision today.
Contracts: Rep. Frank Kowalski, D-Conn., said the Defense Department was considering including a clause in future procurement contracts to prevent the government from assuming the portion of costs resulting from lawful strikes.
