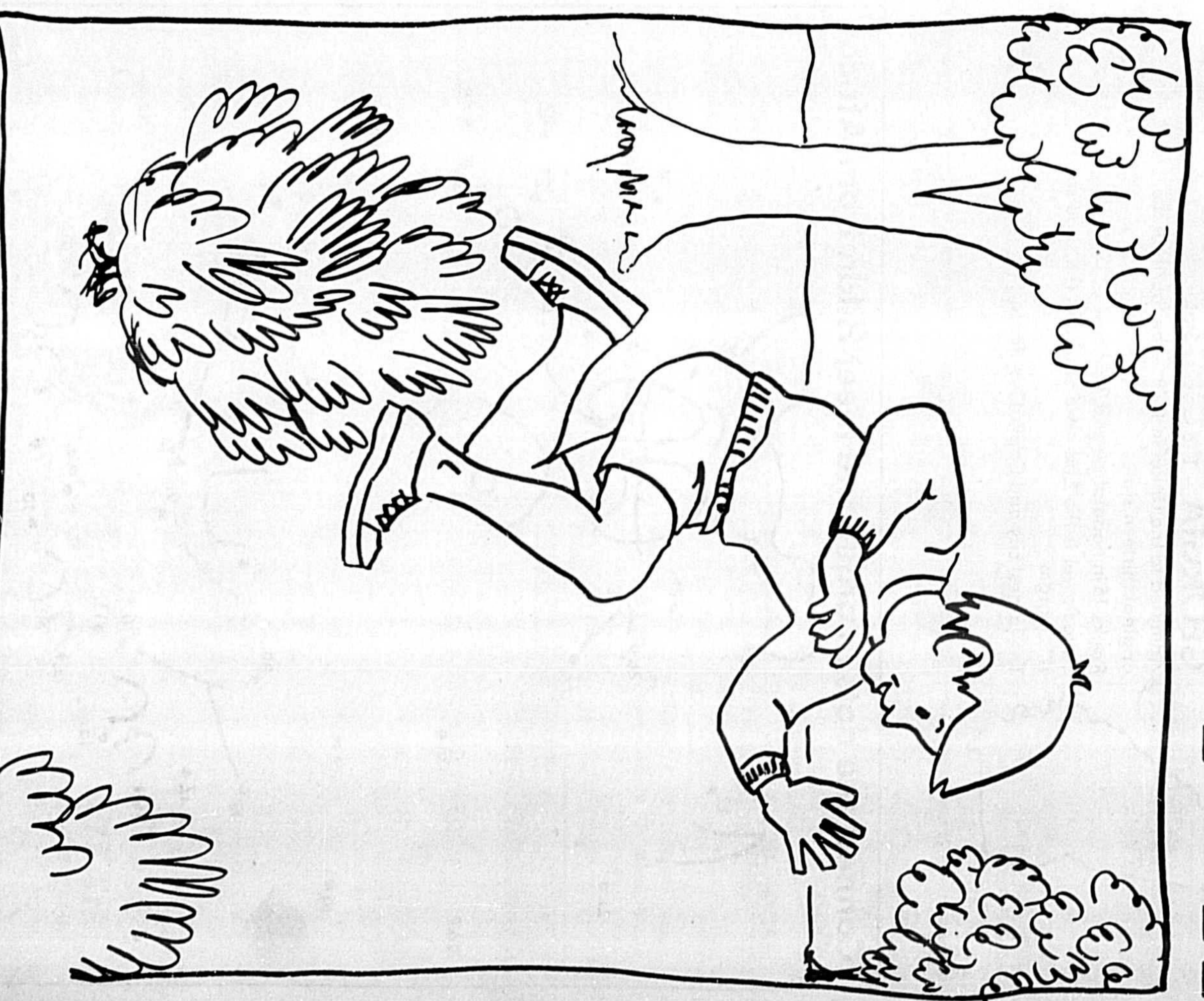

Jail Escapee, Wife Captured By FBI

DEVIL'S JUMP, Ky. (AP) — A jail escapee and his wife, accused of kidnaping six persons during a flight from Florida to Tennessee, have been captured in a wooded area near the Great Smoky Mountains. William Elisha Davidson, 27, and his wife, Ella, 28, were taken into custody Sunday about 12 hours after they released the hostages. They were held in the Madison County jail in Richmond, Ky., Sunday night, and were to be arraigned today, the FBI reported. Agents said they would be charged with kidnaping and interstate transportation of six persons. The Davidsons offered no resistance when they were arrested. "They just gave up," said McCreary County Sheriff Herman Hamlin. The sheriff said authorities set up roadblocks "on every dirt road in that country" Saturday night after members of a Miami Beach, Fla., family who had been held hostage pointed out the area of woods into which the couple fled on foot. Hamlin said a search party of about 75 FBI, state and county officers began combing the area early Sunday morning. The Davidsons were captured shortly before noon. Authorities said Davidson, armed with a shotgun, escaped from jail in Bartow, Fla. Friday morning, taking Deputy Sheriff Bruce Browning with him, and then took five members of the Mel Prine family captive Friday night. The hostages were released Saturday in a wooded area of Tennessee.

'Revealing Results' Seen Demo Fund Probe Asked

WASHINGTON (AP) — Saying the results could be "very revealing," President Nixon's finance committee has asked congressional investigators to audit Sen. George McGovern's fund-raising records as closely as they did the Republicans. "There must be no reluctance on the part of the General Accounting Office to pursue as vigorously with Sen. McGovern's staff the kind of investigation it has with the Finance Committee," committee chairman Maurice Stans said Sunday. "We will anticipate a report equally extensive," he said, adding that the GOP has "reason to believe (the Democratic accounts) will be very revealing." The former Commerce secretary's four-page statement, distributed by Nixon's official Committee for the Re-election of the President, charged that the GAO report was a sloppy, politically motivated job. It is apparent that the strong and persistent pressures placed on the GAO by Democratic members of the Congress are responsible to a high degree for the inaccuracies in the report," Stans said. John Connally, former Treasury secretary who's heading up the Democrats for Nixon drive, said on ABC's Issues and Answers program that the GAO report is a "nettleome thing." "I don't think it is going to be a major issue, anything of that kind," the former Texas governor and Lyndon B. Johnson protege said, "but I think it obviously doesn't help." Elsewhere, President Nixon entertained 400 movie stars and directors at a poolside party at San Clemente, Calif. Today he was scheduled to get a progress report from Defense Secretary Melvin R. Laird on plans for an all-volunteer Army by mid-1973, and counsel on the next announcement on Vietnam troop withdrawals.

In Car-Train Collision Fireman's Daughter Killed

The seven-year-old daughter of a Sanford fireman was killed in a Saturday night accident on SR 431 near Paola. It was the second car-train fatality of the year and brings the 1972 traffic death toll to 11 in Seminole County. Toni Helman, of Rt. 1, was dead at the scene, according to Troopers Robert Lovering and C. L. (Tommy) Tomlinson, Justice of the Peace Robert Carroll served as coroner at the scene. The accident happened at 8:05 p.m. The girl was a passenger in a 1969 Ford pickup truck driven by her father, Larry Elwood Helman, a fireman for the City of Sanford. Her mother, Linda Helman, 24, was also a passenger in the truck. According to Lovering, the truck was southbound over the tracks when it was struck broadside by the eastbound Seaboard Coast Line freight train. The impact knocked the truck nearly 100 feet down the track and all passengers were ejected. The train engineer was William H. Cagle. Mrs. Helman was flown to Florida Hospital by Herndon Helicopter ambulance. "Lifesaver One." She is reported in critical condition. Helman was treated and released at Seminole Memorial Hospital. Flying debris from Helman's truck struck a 1971 Ford pickup which had stopped for the train. The driver was Melvin D. Motes, 39, of Rt. 1, The Mates vehicle suffered body damage and a broken windshield. Lovering has charged Helman with careless driving in the accident. According to Lovering, it was raining at the time of the collision. Saturday's accident was the second car-train tangle at that crossing in recent weeks. The other car-train accident involving a fatality this year was at the crossing near Old Lake Mary Road and Airport Boulevard. In another Saturday accident, an Orlando man was injured when he was pinned between two parked cars on SR 436 between Oviedo and Slavia. George Jakubcin, 85, of Oviedo, driving a 1968 Plymouth, collided with a Ford Galaxie 500, occupied by Merrill Rhea Greenfield, 21, of 300 Vicki Dear Abby, forcing into a 1965 Buick owned by Andrew

King Jr., 26, of Oviedo; William M. Miller, 30, of 2702 Parklin Drive, Orlando, was pinned between the two cars. Miller was flown to Florida Hospital by Herndon Helicopter ambulance and Mrs. Greenfield was taken to Winter Park Memorial Hospital. Four persons were injured in a one-car accident on Interstate-4 at about 3 a. m. this morning. Robert A. Charsba, 18, of West Chester, Pa. lost control of the station wagon he was driving just north of the SR 431 exit. (Related Photo Page 2A)

80 Cars Pile Up, 7 Die

BAKERSFIELD, Calif. (AP)—Seven persons were killed and 96 injured, some seriously, as some 80 vehicles slammed into each other in dust storms that shrouded two separate locations in the Bakersfield area Sunday.

About 30 vehicles were involved in a pileup on Interstate 5, 30 miles southwest of here, and about 50 vehicles in another pileup on U.S. 99, 15 miles to the south.

The accidents tied up traffic at both locations for several hours.

Lt. Max D. Smith of the California Highway Patrol said the zero-visibility dust storms were caused by unexpected, 30-50-mile-per-hour winds at about 5 p.m. Sunday over recently paved fields running along both highways. Some of the gusts were reported at 50 m.p.h., he added.

Smith said three persons were killed and 16 injured in the U.S. 99 collisions while four died and 80 were injured on Interstate 5.

The National Weather Service said the storm was one of many raging Southern California on the north and east as unstable winds moved in from the northeast under a low-pressure system centered around Blythe.

The main thoroughfare in the San Joaquin Valley and is a heavily traveled corridor between Los Angeles and San Francisco.

One motorist said he sat in his car during the dust storm and heard the sounds of cars crashing in front and back of him.

Glen Perry, 20, an attendant at a gas station two miles south of Bakersfield, said he heard sirens of 15 ambulances go by. "All I could do was hear them because the dust was so heavy, you could hardly see past your hand," he said.

Wreckage on Interstate 5 was cleared at 9:30 p.m. and U.S. 99 was cleared about an hour later.

County Commission Actions

Moratorium On Apartments Approved By County

The new water safety ordinance cost Seminole County \$482.40 in attorney's fees. The county attorney's office submitted the bill to court efforts in research, drafting, preparation and presentation. Commissioner Al Davis voted against payment of the fee since "it was an unnecessary venture for the attorney to get into the first place."

In other action, the county board voted against the objections of Commissioner Sid Vihlen, who cited undue issuance of notice, and passed a moratorium on the issuance of additional permits for apartments until the date of a hearing to be held concerning any property so zoned prior to April 1, 1969.

This motion for moratorium, offered by the chairman, followed the adoption of an alternate resolution amending the Seminole County zoning regulations.

Under the terms of the amendment, density standards will read: R-3, not more than 13 units per acre except as specified in section 1, R-3A, not more than 8 1/2 units per acre. Provided, however, where a development plan has been presented to and accepted by the Board of County Commissioners at the time of zoning, such reduction will not apply.

On recommendation of Davis setbacks from an existing family residentially zoned area will be a minimum of 100 feet from the property line for one story structures and 150 feet for any two or more story structures adjacent to residential property.

Off street parking must not be closer than 25 feet from the front or side yard setback area, but may be at the rear property line if a solid wall or fence six feet high is constructed at the rear property line.

John Kim, county commissioner, brought up the amendment as proposed feeling that it was prejudicial to some.

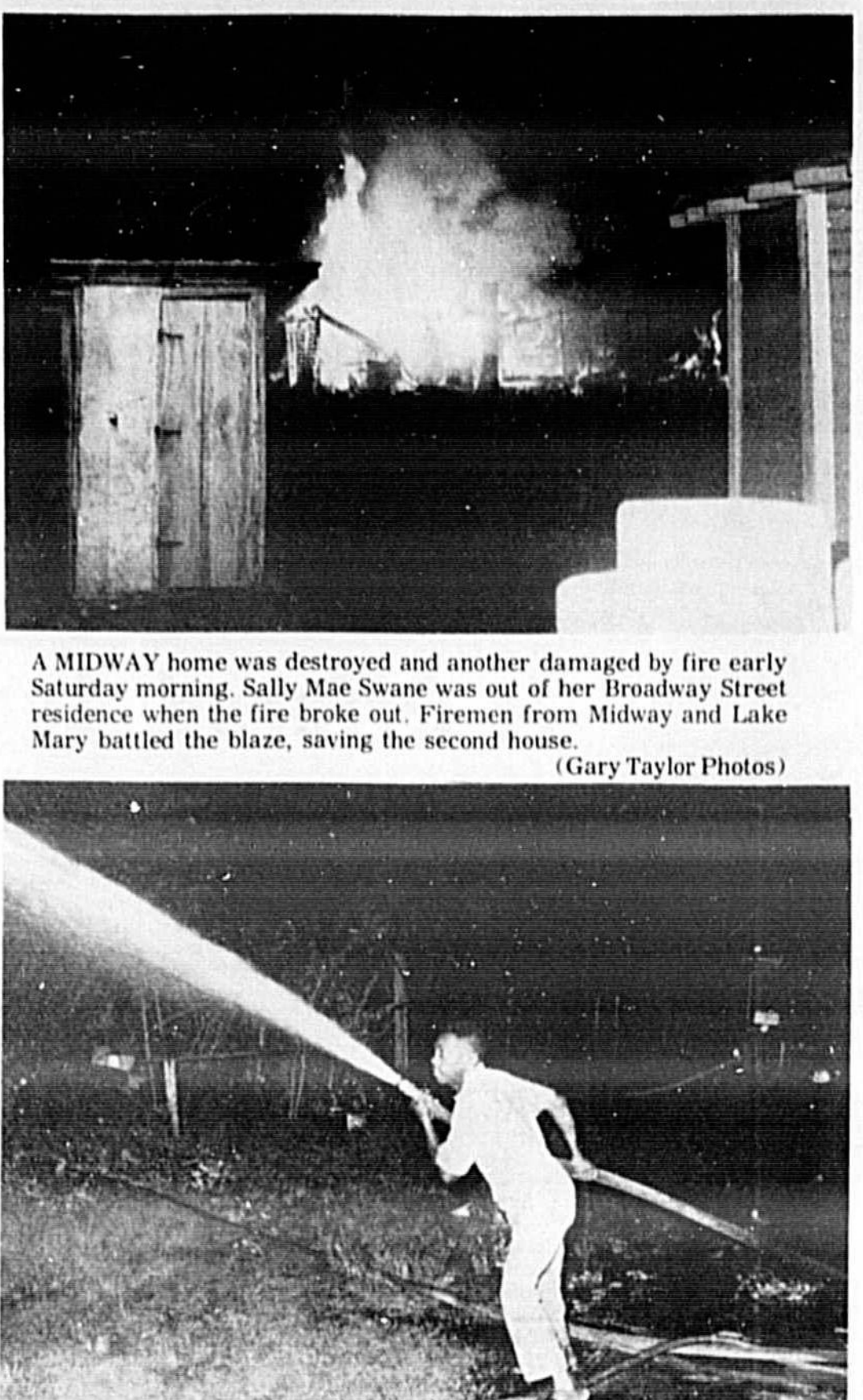

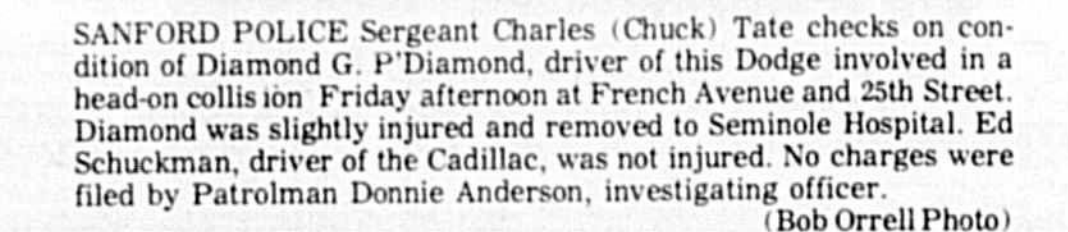

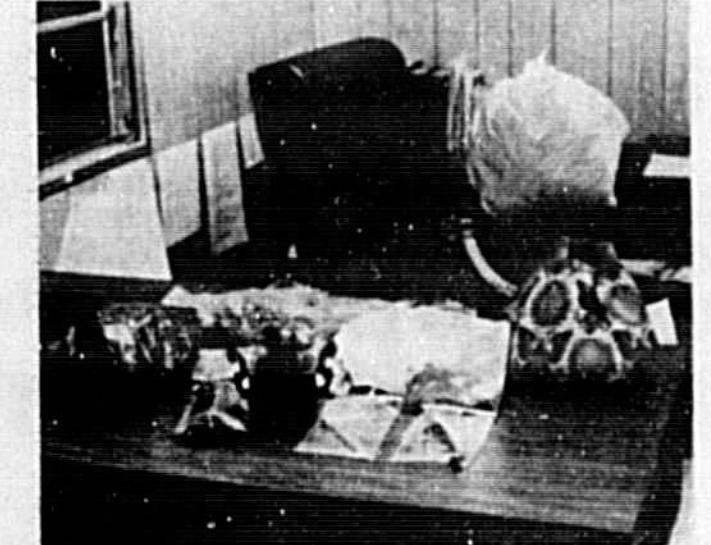

County Urges Joint Program City Frowns On Road Plan

Sanford City Commission appeared dubious Monday evening to an overture from the County Commission for the city to participate in a joint street paving program. W. E. Knowles, city manager, advised the panel of the request by the county for a list of roads on which joint city-county paving participation can be established.

The city manager said the county is now responsible for what formerly was state secondary roads. "I have worked with the county for 13 years and have gone in with them several times but I have yet to see the city come out in an advantageous position," Knowles added. Mayor Lee P. Moore agreed and pointed out the latest such incident was the installation of a light, which the city finally had to fund in total.

Water Is A Problem

Recent heavy rains are creating a health problem in Sanford, excessive water is "blowing out" the sewer lines, pressure pushing water and water up through manholes and flooding the streets, Jerald E. Hulen and Ronnie Green (right) indicate one such manhole in the 2400 block of Cedar Avenue. Human waste has been noted coming from this manhole. City Manager W. E. Knowles explained that in open days engineers built one sewer line for storm waters and sanitary waste whereas today storm sewers and sanitary sewers are built separately. Knowles reminded that the City of Sanford sought to alleviate the surplus water-sewer problem with a \$2.2 million bond issue but that the city voters rejected the bond issue in a city-wide election last year. 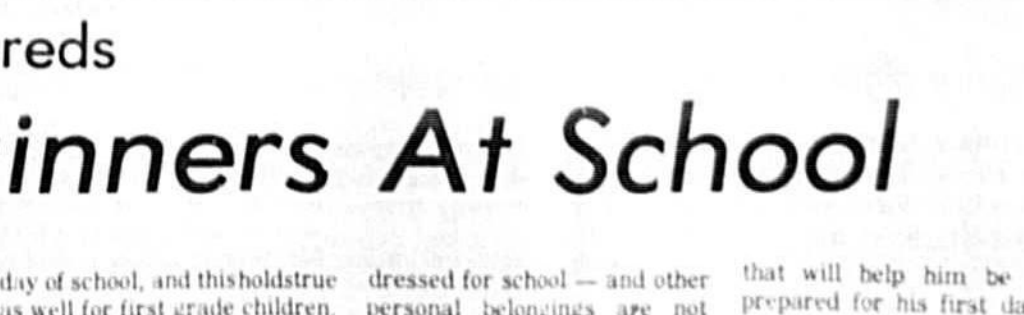
Ordinance 'Unavailable' Longwood Eyes Rate Hike

LONGWOOD — Substantial increases in the city's water rates ranging from 21 per cent for minimum users to 90 per cent for certain commercial users is contained within a new ordinance proposed for adoption by City Council. The new rates were proposed by the city's water committee composed of Councilmen Agnes Weber and E. E. Williamson. Council discussed raising the rates this morning at a work session with City Engineer William Palm, who insisted current rates penalize small users and give too much advantage to large users.

Under the new rate in the proposed ordinance, \$3.50 will be charged for the first 500 gallons minimum with 50 cents per thousand gallons for 5,000 to 15,000 gallons. Most users fall within this latter area and will receive a 96 per cent increase. For those users of 15,000 to 50,000 gallons monthly, the charge will be 43 cents per thousand gallons. The increase will be 30 per cent to those using up to 25,000 gallons and 30 per cent to those using over 25,000 gallons, but less than 50,000 gallons. Those using over 50,000 gallons will pay 30 cents per thousand gallons for a 50 per cent increase. Williamson indicated his feeling that this segment should be increased more. James said City Attorney S. Joseph Davis Jr. will be making slight changes in the ordinance to provide that individual homeowners will pay neither a connection fee nor the cost of extending water lines. The engineer's recommendation would provide even over 20,000 gallons. His recommendation was a minimum charge of \$3.25 for 1,000 gallons (24 per cent increase); 30 cents per thousand gallons over the minimum up to 10,000 gallons; 45 cents a thousand gallons to 25,000 gallons and 40 cents a thousand gallons over 25,000 gallons.
