

## Company tries to sell bogus insurance

TALLAHASSEE — The Florida Department of Financial Services is warning that it has received reports of an unlicensed entity selling bogus homeowners' insurance in Florida. Global Insurance Group, headquartered in Aventura, Fla., has been aggressively advertising that it offers the lowest windstorm insurance rates in Florida. When asked about its licensing status, a company representative reported that it sells coverage through a company named Global property and Casual Insurance. Neither entity is licensed or authorized to sell insurance in Florida.

"Floridians need to be on guard against this kind of activity," said Florida's Chief Financial Officer Tom Gallagher. "Last year's hurricanes taught us how devastating and expensive property losses can be. It is critical for Floridians to make sure that an insurance company is licensed."

If a licensed insurer becomes insolvent, all outstanding policyholder claims will be paid through the state guarantee fund. However, if a company is not authorized, any losses sustained cannot be recovered from the fund.

# Antique show pulls out of city

SANFORD — An antique show organizer Wednesday cancelled five monthly events he planned to hold in Sanford saying city staff reneged on promises made to him in January.

City staff said discussions were held earlier in the year with Silas Pierce, but that he never received permission to use city logos in promotion and he never put up the money for a contract. In an email to Sanford Mayor Linda

Kuhn, Pierce said he withdrew The Downtown Historic Sanford Antique Show for "irreconcilable differences" between himself and Michael Kirby, director of the Recreation Department.

Pierce said he stopped by the office of Craig Hansen at the Sanford Civic Center July 22, but couldn't get a contract because Hansen was out of his

office. Pierce called Kirby Wednesday to inquire about a contract. He said Kirby chastised him for an earlier email that Pierce had sent to the mayor.

In the previous email to Kuhn, dated July 20, Pierce said he had received a "disturbing" call from Kirby about his use of the city logos. Pierce claims Kirby sat in on the January meeting

with then-City Manager Al Grieshaber when he was given a choice of which logo to use.

"I remember being at the meeting, but I do not remember him getting permission to use the logos," Kirby said Thursday. "We do everything we can to make people happy. He was not kicked out, he chose to leave."

Kuhn replied to Pierce that if the former city manager gave him permission to use the logo, Pierce should provide

# Eight in a row for Seminole budget

SANFORD — The Seminole County Board of County Commissioners approved the proposed budget and millage rate for the 2006 and 2007 fiscal year on Tuesday.

County Manager Kevin Grace proposed a budget of \$622 million in 2006 and \$596 million in 2007, with expenditures totaling \$451 million and \$466 million respectively.

The budget maintains the countywide millage rate at 4.9989 mills for the seventh and eighth consecutive years. At that rate, Seminole County will have the tenth lowest level of taxation of the 67 counties in the state of Florida, a press release said.

Grace said Wednesday that a solid tax base, which has been increasing at a healthy rate for

SANFORD — To hear Dr. Charles L. Park Jr. talk of his native Sanford in the "good old days" you get the impression that it was a mix between Mayberry and Mr. Roger's neighborhood.

"It was fun growing up here," he said in an interview

shortly after his 80th birthday celebration on April 24th thrown for him by his four children at the home of his youngest daughter, Leslie Lynn who lives on Big Lake Mary.

"Oh, my birthday party was a good excuse for getting us Sanford folks together. There were more than 150 in atten-

dance, including many Sanford natives, some of whom are now in their 90's, but mostly it was a mix of all age groups there, including second and third generation of family and friends," Dr. Park Jr. said.

One long-time friend, Nancy Morgan, actually checked out of the hospital to

attend the function and then went back in, Dr. Park Jr. said. "She did that just to be with us and to accompany her husband of 58 years, Dr. John Morgan, a former obstetrician in Sanford. It meant a great deal to us all that they were both there," Dr. Park Jr. said. Sadly, the beloved retired physician, Dr. John Mettinger

Morgan, a third generation Sanfordite, died on March 28, at the age of 83. Dr. Morgan, an OB/GYN, began practicing medicine in Sanford in 1951. During his 35 years of practicing medicine, he delivered more than 4,000 babies. Dr. Morgan was a member of both the Seminole County and the Emory University School of Medicine Hall of Fame. He had been an avid tennis player all of his life, even up until almost age 81. It was a great honor to him to have had the Seminole High School tennis courts named "The Dr. John M. Morgan Tennis Center."

How many cats have to be mauled in the Mayfair neighborhood before city officials actually confront the owners of a white pit bull that is allowed to run loose? To date there are five dead or seriously injured. Is the city waiting until a child is mangled or killed before taking action?

I realize I've got — as Marilyn Maples would put it — "a bad case of the whines." Several months ago Ms. Maples told me she was a loyal reader of *Around The Clock* but she confided that she didn't like my whining. I think her exact quote was, "You're a whiny little man sometimes."

She's probably right, but it irritates the heck out of me to watch our city officials talk about the importance of code enforcement, then fail to do anything about it. Both Linda Kuhn and Art Woodruff preached the gospel of code enforcement during their campaigns. All we've seen so far is an update of the code book everyone is afraid to enforce.

If the city commission is serious about code enforcement it should allocate less money for writing new rules and more money for code enforcement and police officers to enforce the laws we already have.

Around *The Clock* reported that Longwood-based *Volcano's Coffee Bar* was going to locate on Park Avenue in the space that was formerly the *Devine Dell*. Those plans have changed. While that's unfortunate, *Virgil Hurley* says he has several other businesses inquiring about the space.

**Dance fever:** Anyone who has stopped by *Wolfy's Riverside Bar and Grill* during football season knows that the owner, *Frank "Wolfy" Wolf*, is a die-hard Philadelphia Eagles fan. What you may not know is that *Wolfy*, a Philly native, was a celebrity not only in the City of Brotherly Love but across the nation during the early 1960s.

*American Bandstand* was a Philadelphia phenomenon that gained a national audience in the 1950s. Viewers of the show in 1961 and 1962 not only saw *Dick Clark* they also caught glimpses

of a young *Wolfy*, who was a frequent visitor at the WFIL Channel 6 studios at 46th and Market streets in West Philadelphia.



interim City Manager Eugene Miller and Kirby with a copy of the written authorization. She said no document could be located in City Hall.

"Otherwise you must cease using the city's logo in any form whatsoever," she wrote to Pierce in an email that same afternoon. Pierce said he ran an advertisement in a local daily newspaper at a cost of \$1,500 on Thursday July 21. A check of the Seminole edition of the newspaper did not locate the advertisement.

Bruce Causey works for a monthly antique magazine based in Keystone Heights, Fla. Causey said Pierce had bought at least two ads for the Sanford show. One ran in the August issue and the second is in the September issue. He was not aware that the Sanford shows had been cancelled.

Pierce told The Sanford Herald that he is out about \$12,000 to \$15,000 that he had spent promoting the show and getting vendors ready. He called vendors Thursday morning to tell them the show had been cancelled.

He planned to destroy vendor's checks that he hadn't cashed yet or return their money, he said Thursday. Kirby said the city would return deposits made by Pierce, which Pierce said amounted to \$1,100.

Pierce said he had paid to have thousands of leaflets, contracts and tickets printed for the shows. He said Thursday even though he has placed ads with regional and national magazines, he said Thursday he doesn't plan to sue the city.

"I'd rather call it a loss," Pierce said. "I'm not really one to start trouble. Listen, I'm not one for litigation, we're just not going to have a show."

Antique dealers in the area said Pierce's decision to pull out of Sanford may be better for the city. Pierce has had problems at the show, which

used to be held at the Central Florida Fairgrounds.

Pierce said he had to leave that location because hurricanes had damaged buildings in which he held the shows. Others said the number of vendors and buyers had decreased over the years.

Fay Berryman of Orlando used to sell tickets at the Central Florida Fairgrounds show. She said at first Pierce was partnered with Verlon Webb, who owns at least three antique shopping centers including one in Winter Garden.

After what Berryman called some sort of conflict, Pierce partnered with a young couple. Berryman said they didn't advertise as much and the numbers started decreasing. She said they sold 300 to 500 tickets.

Pierce told The Herald he expected to have 1,500 to 3,000 people attend each of the events in Sanford, but Berryman doubted whether that would have happened.

"I'm sorry Silas is not going to have the show, but it really doesn't surprise me," Berryman said.

Webb said he sold the antique show about a year and half ago. After that, he said the show declined rapidly. He would not characterize his relationship with Pierce, but he added that with his other antique endeavors, the

antique show at the fairgrounds got to be too much.

Pierce said he had given special discounts to local Sanford antique dealers and that some were going to take part in the show, including Arts and Ends and Deilah's, both on First Street.

Deilah's still had a sign in the window advertising booths for the Sanford show. Arts and Ends owner Carey Farrell said, however, that he never wanted to be part of Pierce's event.

"It doesn't surprise me that it's not going to go," Farrell said Friday. He had heard that Pierce was bad-mouthing the city, but the show had caused local antique dealers some concern.

"We were very concerned about this, that it was going to be held," Farrell said. He said some of Pierce's past dealings had fallen flat. Instead of the city giving him incentives to hold the show here, Farrell said Pierce had demanded that the city give him incentives.

"I would not believe the first thing he said about the city," Farrell said, adding that he has not been a big fan of some of the city's decisions either.

Millie and Bill Downey have operated the Sanlando Depression Glass show off and on in Sanford since 1973. Like Farrell, Millie said she worried about what affect Pierce's events would have on the glass show. She did say she has had no problems with the city or the civic center.

"I couldn't ask for a better place," Millie said. "I'm very very happy with everything." The Sanlando Depression Glass event takes place Sept. 17 through 19.

Pierce said he will seek another location, possibly in Osceola County. Causey said Pierce has advertised other antique shows as well.

Another problem he had with the city, he said, is that at

least one of his dealers, who is also the show's watchman has a toy poodle, and another vendor has a small dog that is brought to the shows. Pierce said he has seen dogs at the glass show, but he was told absolutely no dogs could be in the civic center.

In contracts with vendors for the show, it said dealers could keep only small dogs under 6 pounds, leashed or caged out of sight. Pierce said Kirby started yelling at him about not having dogs in the civic center. Mayor Kuhn said she has known Kirby for 20 years and could not remember him ever raising his voice.

"Like any other venue, there are restrictions for the civic center," Kuhn said.

Pierce also said he was told her could use the outside courtyard for dealer booths. He advertised them to vendors. Later he was told he would have to pay \$1,000 for a special permit.

"They even went so far as for me to discourage dealers to use the bar-b que grills as this would be (an) extra burden to clean!" Pierce emailed to Kuhn Wednesday. "This is a public park!!!!"

Pierce told The Herald he also had problems with the city when he wanted to have his own security people and his own caterers. He wanted to hand out fliers during the huge Fourth of July event in Sanford, but was told there would be a \$250 charge to do that.

"Every time I turn around these people are trying to prevent me from getting started," Pierce said before canceling the show. Later he said the show's over.

"I'm going to get on the phone for the next four or five days and tell them we're moving it to a city or town with a better facility," Pierce said. "We're going to take our 1,500 to 3,000 people who would have attended, and move. "It's a shame."

had attended Seminole High School together. "Growing up in Sanford John had loved all sports and was an outstanding athlete," Dr. Park Jr. said.

The Park's daughter Leslie, an Internet marketing specialist and her husband, Luke Lynn, a pilot with American Airlines, and their two children, Kyle, age 17, an upcoming senior at Lake Mary High School, and Lauren, age 8, who will be attending Lake Mary Elementary School in the fall, hosted the waterfront bar-b-q which was catered by "Blind Mullet" of New Smyrna Beach. The occasion provided many of the Sanford natives the opportunity to recall and laugh about some of the antics that took place in their lives in the agricultural Central Florida neighborhood known for years as the "Celery Capital of the World." (Find out more about the growing of celery in Sanford by visiting the Sanford Historical Society, Inc. online webpage).

Once a thriving citrus growing town, "The Great Freeze" of 1894-95 wiped out the citrus industry in Sanford and farmers began to grow celery. Dr. Park, Jr. remembers that even the two banks in the small town had the celery emblem on their checks. The high school newspaper as well as the football team was called "The Celery Feds" the girls' marching group was the "Celeryettes", and the youth center in Sanford was named "The Celery Crate." Celery was the much celebrated crop in Sanford for many years until the growing of it became cheaper and better in the rich, black soil of Zellwood and in the Glades of Florida. In 1956 the Sanford school's sports teams relinquished the celery connections and were renamed the Seminoles.

"It had been hard to come up with cheers urging on a stalk of celery," Dr. Park Jr. jokingly said, adding, "Of course, the opposition had an easy time with cheers involving crunch, wilt, limp, etc."

Dr. Charles L. Park Jr. was born in Sanford in 1925, shortly after his father, Dr. Charles L. Park Sr. and his mother, Geneva, had moved to Sanford from Macon, Georgia in late 1924. That was the year

that the Sanford Public Library was built at 5th Street and Oak Avenue as well as the year the bandshell and pier were built. Dr. Charles L. Park Sr. had moved here to be a local physician's assistant and ended up staying. A general physician, Dr. Park Sr., eventually opened his own practice in Sanford. Geneva became a pillar in the First Baptist Church of Sanford. Their first child, Charles L. Park, Jr., was born on April 23, 1925, at Fernald-Laughton Hospital and would grow up to practice medicine at that

very hospital.

He would also be a partner in his father's medical office on Mellonville Avenue prior to Dr. Park, Sr. retiring.

But much would happen in between...the "fun" stuff...as Dr. Park Jr. calls it.

He enjoyed reminiscing about the lazy days of summer when he and his friends would run barefoot day in and day out, even through the many games of tackle football they would play. Then they would perch themselves up in old seedling orange trees and eat as many green oranges as their bellies could hold. "Nothing tasted better," he recalled.

Dr. Park, Jr. explained that running around barefoot resulted in most of the kids having skin on their feet that was "as thick as a hog's back." "Why, once we ran a coral snake out of the grass and one of those cracker kids ground its head into the pavement with his bare heel and commented, it weren't nuthin' but a little old coral snake," Dr. Park Jr. recalled.

## Highways, Italian style

I have recently returned from a vacation in Italy. Don't get me wrong: I am not bragging about the trip, and not trying to convince people to make a similar excursion. I did, however, find a number of things during the trip that I thought would interest you, and that's the purpose of this column, as well as next week's column.

In addition to visiting all of the typical tourist spots, I was aware of the similarities I found between Italy and this country.

Of major interest were the highways. Just like us, they have the equivalent of interstate highways, and toll roads. Getting through the toll road was the same as what we have, including their version of the E-Pass or Sun-Pass as it's now called. All of the major highways have mile markers. Similar to our telephones to call for emergency assistance, they have telephones marked S.O.S. (the worldwide distress signal). These phone boxes are located about every two miles on the regular highways, and every mile on the toll roads.

They have rest stops about every 20 or 30 miles like we have, but these are beyond belief. There are restaurants, gift shops, gas service, and just about everything else you could imagine.

Those I saw were all spotless, and even though I can't speak a word of Italian, I had no problem in obtaining food. Speaking of food, I was told before I left that the pizza in Italy was nothing like what we have here - and don't order it or you will not like it. WRONG - their pizza was excellent in most cases with almost all of the toppings we have in the states. These rest stops also had beer and wine. (Those Italians, wine was available everywhere).

I saw many other businesses which made me feel at home. I saw Blockbuster video stores, a Toyota dealership (among European car sales), and McDonalds drive-in restaurants. One difference, many of these McDonalds also had an adjoining bar where any type of alcoholic beverage was probably available.

Tourists wouldn't have much trouble driving. They drive on the same side of the highway we do, and I saw both Avis and Hertz car rental services. There may have been more but I didn't see them where I was.

Other similarities I found while traveling the highways were campgrounds, Holiday Inns, Sheraton Hotels, ESSO, Shell and BP service stations, and at least in Venice, they had a lotto, similar to our Florida Lottery, with tickets available almost everywhere.

But getting back to the Italian highway system, I believe our Federal Highway System and various state's version of the Departments of Transportation, may do well in hiring the Italian

road designers to work over here.

Our tour bus covered many hundred miles through Italy. There is a mountain range running in the middle of the "boot" from south to north and we spent much time going through them.

But the major highways, limited-access (Interstate types) or toll roads, were all flat - level at all times - no ups and downs.

As any traveler in this country knows, our major highways, going through mountains or even foothills, go up and down most of the time. Yet the Italian highways were flat.

To accomplish this, there were many high bridges to travel over valleys, and many - I mean MANY tunnels going through mountains and hills. Contrary to our highways, there was no uneven surface on which any vehicle could roll up or down.

One might think that this would lead to speeding on the highways, but everyone appeared to be going at the posted speed limits. Except for a minor rear-end collision I saw in downtown Rome, I saw no motor vehicle accidents in my nine day trip.

I thought this information might be of interest to you. Being the average tourist, I was interested in the similarities between Italy and the United States.

Next week, I intend to discuss motor vehicles (among other things), and if I get my photos printed in time, I will show you what I consider the most unusual vehicles on the streets of Italy, which the locals called "Drunk Cars".



## Bank robbery suspect linked to Lake case

LAKE MARY — The Seminole County Sheriff's Office now believes the suspect in a bank robbery Wednesday near Lake Mary is linked to another bank robbery.

He was last seen driving a red to burgundy four-door sedan, possibly a 90s model Cadillac with cream colored top.

The suspect escaped with an undisclosed amount of cash.

First on the program was a short play "Flight 17-92" presented by the Theatre Guild under the direction of Francis Roumilliat. Featured in the presentation were Robert Mero, pilot, Dee Hershall, stewardess, Tommy Thomas, old man, Robert Armstrong and Mary Turner, newly weds, Doris Harriman and Mrs. R.A. Smith, club women, Gene Nunnally, mother, Frank Roum, problem child, Marge Hill, actress and Don and Jane Fletcher as the count and countess.

Rolland Dean, former editor of the Sanford Herald, and presently associated editor of the Orlando Morning Sentinel, related his experiences during a recent trip to England.

#### Mothers March for Polio


The Mothers March on Polio had been held the previous night and John Sauls announced that already they had collected more than ever received in previous marches.

## Stetson's Corner

### What do we want for our children?

The purpose of this reflection is to gather a sense of past, present and future as a small, rural school grows a vision together. What do we want for our children?

Looking to the future invites a glance at the past. Geneva, Florida was settled west of Lake Harney in the 1850's. With plentiful water and open range for cattle, families from Georgia and the Carolinas were joined by folks from Russia, France, and Scotland. The first one-room school was a log cabin built west of the cemetery in 1874. "It didn't matter who brought what, we all shared because that's the way Geneva was in those days." The memories of Elizabeth F. Mathieux, educator, referred to the picnics and watermelon cutting at Horse Pond in Reflections, Stories of Earlier Life in Geneva, Florida (2000) but the words still ring true today. Elizabeth first saw Geneva in 1942 when her husband, also a teacher, brought her to honeymoon in Geneva. Sharing in those days also extended to holiday cooking where young wives learned to rely on "Mom" Pearl Yarborough. She lent out big pots and pans and "even threw in a few eggs if necessary." This historical context is the setting of Geneva Elementary School, where today, "we all share because that's the way we do things," just as the earliest Geneva pioneers "took care to share equally."

Next, the search for Geneva's essence of school vision must embrace the present. Fundamentally, what are the qualities that make our school a special place to be? "We raise kids instead of just teaching them," a staff member commented when team leaders considered this question. "There is a familial spirit," summarized a teacher at a

grade level meeting. "We have a classroom family within the school family." Within this context of "kindred" relations, what are the enduring traditions that express the school's family focus?

Staff remarked that Geneva has a diverse school population that accepts each other. Many reported "compassionate students and faculty look out for each other" with "genuine caring." Overall, "kids are polite and feel loved here." One teacher wrote, "It makes happy memories to love the unlovable!"

How are new employees connected to the culture of school? Geneva boasts "Go out of your way" hospitality - social events, showers, fun, holiday and after school parties. "We always welcome new teachers with open arms." Starting with phone calls, the first message is "You are family now." Then, on an ongoing basis, teachers and staff also noted that they "invite, include, and assist others." They seek to "intentionally help others through tough times" with "watchful eyes to see when newbies need support." There are mentors, "always someone to take you under their wing." Strong teams, approachable team planning sessions, and kind professionalism also made the list.

How are new students helped with their transition? Geneva's welcoming traditions include campus tours, introductions to specials teachers

and classroom peer buddies. Teachers observed that kids are excited to meet new kids. Staff members "Immediately orient students as a family member." Whether historically or with each new arrival Geneva culture says: "There is no problem with social status here... From multimillion dollar homes to the homeless, you can't tell because we take care of them all." Staff members quietly stock the clinic, buying underwear and socks for needy children. Geneva is a place of constant giving whether conducting holiday food drives or filling gift baskets during family illness or tragedies. From house fires to hurricanes, community members extend their resources to meet each other's needs.

In summary, we have gathered a sense of the past and present through reflections of school vision: what do we want for all children? First, we found we are a family to come home to when teachers and students arrive at school each morning. Staff determined that genuine acceptance and caring must be visibly manifested, reinforced through every new arrival. Welcoming others with open arms and staying connected with open hearts transforms the isolated business of education.

The roots of sharing in the Geneva community are deep. Our vision for the future is to continue to value all members, foster collegial relationships and support a common heritage sense of community.

the last 10 years, is a major reason for the county's ability to keep the millage rate the same.

Efficient operations is another reason for the county's ability to keep the millage rate the same. Grace said that they have 3.4 employees per 1,000 in capita, compared to Orange County who maintains 7.3 employees per 1,000 in capita.

"It's a very conservative county, fiscally. Employee growth is less than that of [our] population growth," Grace said.

All of this combined with raising property values, allows the rate to stay the same with additional revenue coming in from property taxes in unincorporated Seminole County and commercial buildings.

"You're still getting additional tax dollars," Grace said.

Grace said close to 80 percent of single, family homes in unincorporated Seminole County are homesteaded by

the Save Our Homes Amendment, which keeps the increase down to at least three percent a year, even if it would normally be higher.

The County's proposed budget is highlighted by a 12.8 percent increase in the countywide tax base over the past year.

"Revenues related to increases in the property tax base due to escalating real estate market values have allowed the County to replenish reserves depleted from the hurricanes of 2004," Grace said.

According to Grace, the hurricanes affected the County negatively to the tune of \$6 million. He said that the state and federal governments will cover approximately 75 percent of that, but the County will have to cover the rest.

"Seminole County Government has also been able to absorb the impacts of soaring fuel prices, substantially higher mass transit costs, and a \$2.1 million

annual cost for juvenile detention mandated by the Florida Legislature," he said.


The budget also proposed a \$25-30 million expansion to the County jail, which has been discussed for many years, the release said.

The County Commissioners recently established the expansion as a top priority.

Tuesday night, the Board of County Commissioners met and approved the proposed budget, so the millage rate cannot be set any higher at the county's budget work sessions next week where they will review Grace's outlined spending plan with staff.

The sessions, open to the public, take place at 9 a.m., Aug. 1-4, 2005, in the commission chambers at 1101 E. 1st Street in Sanford.

The Commissioners will also hold two public hearings as part of the budget adoption process. The hearings are scheduled Sept. 14 and 27 in chambers.

## Plaque marks community's patriotism

The threat of severe weather did not deter a large crowd of navy veterans and community members from gathering at NAS Sanford Memorial Park in June to witness the unveiling of a significant and long-awaited bronze plaque designed to complement the Vigilante, the centerpiece of the Memorial Park.

As the sun shone through the clouds it illuminated the shiny bronze and the words of the first paragraph made the reason for the occasion glowingly evident.

It reads "The Vigilante rises on this site to preserve a time in our history when the City of Sanford's indomitable sense of patriotism and community with Naval Aviation demonstrated the best of America's heritage. May this place be long remembered as a monument to the remarkable human spirit demonstrated by the citizens of Sanford, and by the men and women of the U. S. Navy and their families."

The 26- by 40-inch plaque was about 18 months in production. The design is a cooperation of three Memorial Committee members, all experts on the Vigilante, and all three from different areas of the program. Bob Curboy of Sanford is a former North American Aviation Vigilante technical Representative. Don Tise, also from Sanford and a Naval

Aviator, has numerous flight hours piloting the aircraft. Roger Wood of Columbus Ohio contributed to the project from his perspective as a former North American executive who spent the majority of his career in the Vigilante program. Dedicated to the men who developed, flew and maintained the last and most advanced aircraft stationed at NAS Sanford, the RA-5C Vigilante, the plaque depicts a plethora of technical and operational information about the extraordinary navy jet.

To enhance the uniqueness of the display the plaque is mounted on the Vigilante's tailhook. For those who may not know, the tailhook is a critical component of the aircraft which catches the arresting cable on the flight deck during carrier landings, thus bringing the jet to a stop. The tailhook is painted in the navy's traditional black and white markings.

Roger Wood, who traveled from Columbus for the event, said he felt "the Vigilante display is now complete" as the plaque answers the so often asked question of park visitors "exactly what kind of airplane is it, and what was it used for?"

Airport President and CEO Larry A. Dale was on hand to offer a few well spoken comments. He commended the

group on their efforts to honor our veterans and pledged the continued support of the Airport Authority on Phase II of the Memorial Park.

At the conclusion of the ceremony Memorial Committee President Jack Dow proposed a heartfelt toast to all of the men who served at NAS Sanford, and to their families and loved ones.

After the ceremony the group gathered at the restoration hangar at the airport for a "Tailhook Party", albeit a much tamer version of the now infamous gathering of naval aviators, to celebrate the day and rally the group for support of the next addition to the park, the PV-1 Ventura.

During the evening event Lake Mary City Commissioner Gary Brender presented Jack Dow with a check for \$1,000 from the local chapter of the Association of Naval Aviation.

NAS Sanford Memorial Park, located at the entrance to the Orlando Sanford International Airport, is open seven days a week. Everyone is welcome to stop by and enjoy the park and step back in time with the Vigilante. While you are there, do take a few moments to view the plaque and read about this amazing and significant piece of our naval aviation history.

### FCSL final in St. Pete Sunday




We managed a trout or two before the sun rose above the horizon. Shortly after the sun broke the darkness, the tails of redfish began to sway above the water line. Everything was perfect for a strong bite, except for the fish.

Those rascals were in the picky mood. Redfish get that way sometimes and they can tease you all day.

After about two hours of great casts a big fish decided to eat. Cameron finally hooked into a nice fish. A fish we worked very hard to hook. After playing tug-o-war with the 24-pound redfish Cameron was able to land the fish.

What a relief! I thought maybe the rest of the fish would now participate. Well, they had other things on their mind. The school decided to put on their running shoes. Sometimes I think they run just to see how far I will pole. Time to go to another school.

As we approached the next stop a huge school of reds arose from the bottom pushing a massive amount of water. They only went a short

Lopez tried to keep the Reds in the game, going one-for-three with a walk, a run scored and an RBI. Continued from Page 1B distance and began tailing. Alright! Some fish that were not moving around. There was one little catch, the Space Shuttle. I had never been on the water when a shuttle launched. I have always wanted to see how a school of red-fish would react. About five miles to the south we saw the magnificent site. The huge fire from the fuel, the cloud of smoke and the loudest rumble I have ever heard. The school of fish lifted and pushed away. To my surprise they did not go very far and they started to wave us over toward them.

Another school of happy fish, but very picky. Finally, after an hour or so a 15-pound red decided to eat. Jim landed the fish and we tried to catch another, but the fish were not interested. We ended the day trout fishing. We caught a few on the Rip Tide 3 inch Mullet and a couple on top water plugs. I don't know if the shuttle had anything to do with the slow bite, but it was slower than it had been. What a great gift for a father to give his son for a birthday. I really enjoyed the day and we had some memories to take home.

The redfish seem to be in a better mood and I look for a solid bite the next few weeks. The trout have been steady and willing to eat top water plugs in the middle of the day. The best way to rig is to use 4/15 Power Pro with a 20 pound fluorocarbon leader about 18-24 inches. Use Rip Tide Pro Jig Heads for jigs and Daiichi circle hooks for live or cut bait. Look for trout to hold in 2-4 feet of water and around sand holes. Find a mixture of mullet and glass minnows for best results. Redfish will be on the flat early and off the drops later. 
